Girl Victim Of Trap for Bootlegger

(By Associated Press)
LORAIN, Ohio, Sept. 27.—Miss Betty Heywood, 22, of Elvira, is in a serious condition in a hospital here from a bullet wound alleged to have been received when prohibition officers working under direction of Mayor J. C. Standen, fired on a car in which she was riding today at Lorain. The officers alleged to have done the shooting are in jail.
The officers, Frank Klady, Walter Knipper and Louis Cripe, all of Lorain, are held on technical charges of investigation.
The shooting occurred at a bridge where the dry agents were stationed to apprehend run runners. They are alleged to have fired on the car in which Miss Heywood was a passenger when it did not stop at a command.
Charles Edwards of Elvira, driver of the car in which his wife, daughter and Miss Heywood were passengers, said he believed the agents were holding speed when they ordered him to stop. As the car sped past, one shot was fired striking Miss Heywood in the neck.
Edwards drove to a hospital where he left Miss Heywood and then reported the matter to the police.
No liquor was found in the car.

California Woman Is Found Killed

SANTA CRUZ, Calif., Sept. 27 (AP).—A woman known here as Mrs. L. A. Thorneville was found shot to death in her home here today when investigators responded to a telephone girl's report she had heard a woman scream for help over the Thorneville telephone line.
A heavy rifle was found some distance from the woman's pajama clad body. In an adjacent room the telephone, its receiver off the hook, lay on the floor.
L. A. Thorneville, known here as the woman's husband, told sheriff Rudolph the woman was not his wife, but had used his name. Her real name was Cora Meade, the man said.
Thorneville, who said he had been living in a downtown house, admitted quarreling with the woman last night, but said he left her in good spirits.

REPUBLICANS RAPPED HERE

FOUR SPEAKERS ATTACK GOVERNMENTAL RULE OF OTHER PARTY

Centering a vitriolic verbal attack against the Republican party and virtually everything connected with it, four out-of-town speakers last night made addresses to a packed house in the district courtroom, under auspices of the South Plains Democratic club.
State Representative L. M. Kenyon of Galveston started the fight which was carried on by Mrs. Helen B. Moore, state representative-elect, John Darroest, Galveston attorney, and State Senator H. T. Holbrook. Herbert Hoover Republican candidate for the presidency, was charged with being in the employ of the Standard Oil company during his travels for the government in foreign countries. Speakers declared that the rich potash deposits of this section could never be developed.

LAST MINUTE REPRIEVE GRANTED TO SILVER

MOODY ACTS TO ALLOW TIME IN APPEALS COURT

FORT WORTH SLAYER WAS TO HAVE DIED EARLY TOMORROW
(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 27.—Robert Silver was granted a third reprieve today by Governor Dan Moody, effective until October 26. The Governor said his action was intended to permit action by the court of criminal appeals on a second motion for a rehearing now pending in that court.
Governor Moody declined to interfere further in the cases of Tom Ross and O. T. Alexander, negroes. They are scheduled to die tonight.

Silver Killed Theater Cashier

AUSTIN, Sept. 27.—Governor Dan Moody said he would be delayed today in announcing his decision on the fate of J. R. "Bob" Silver, scheduled to be electrocuted shortly after midnight tonight at the state penitentiary at Huntsville. The governor was on the program for the annual Texas Sheriffs Convention here, and he did not plan to announce his action until after he had addressed the officers. He decided the fate of Silver and two negroes, slated to die with him yesterday, but said he would not announce his action until he had time to prepare a statement in explanation.
Killed Theater Cashier
Silver was sentenced to death in the holdup and killing of Roscoe Wilson, Port Worth theatre cashier, in January, 1927.
Mrs. Mary Louise Silver of Port Worth, mother of the condemned man, appeared twice before the governor to plead for her son's life and Mrs. Ollie M. Wilson, mother of the slain cashier, pleaded with the chief executive and the pardons board.

Flogging Charge Brings 8-Year Term for Farmer

CAIN ANDERSON FOUND GUILTY ON THIRD TRIAL OF CASE

(By Associated Press)
CANTON, Sept. 27.—Cain Anderson, wealthy Harrison county farmer, was found guilty of violating the Texas anti-mask law in a verdict returned by a jury today and was sentenced to eight years in the state penitentiary.
The defendant, who was alleged to have participated in the flogging of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Richardson in 1927, was previously tried twice, but the juries were unable to arrive at a decision in the case. Arguments were completed yesterday after the defense had introduced DeWitt Osborne, a surprise witness, in the case. Osborne, who was jointly indicted with Anderson, and given a one-year term after pleading guilty, asserted the farmer was not present when the whipping took place.
Involved New Law
Anderson's original trial was the first involving the anti-mask law enacted by the Texas legislature after much agitation over the Ku Klux Klan and attracted much attention throughout the country. It brought an array of counsel for both defense and prosecution, including a representative of the state attorney general's office.
The trial developed that Mr. and Mrs. Richardson were taken from their cabin home on Anderson's large East Texas farm in the dead of the night by four masked men, and despite the fact that Mrs. Richardson told her abductors she was ill, were hurried to a nearby wood and severely beaten with a rope. A daughter and son of the Richardsons, who were in the house at the time, were struck by the raiders.
Were Told to Leave
The Richardsons had been employed on the Anderson plantation to work in the fields, and at the trial both testified that they had been accused of not working diligently and had been ordered to leave the country.
Anderson's defense consisted in the main in an alibi which sought to establish that he was at home in bed at the time the Richardsons were flogged. His wife and daughter testified to this effect. Other witnesses testified that Anderson was seen at his home about the time of the flogging.

MINNESOTA TO BE TOLD SMITH FARM POLICIES

NOMINEE ENCOURAGED BY SUPPORT FROM NORTHWEST AREA

GOVERNOR SMITH'S TRAIN EN ROUTE TO MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 27 (AP).—Bearing encouraging reports on the presidential political outlook in North Dakota, Governor Smith today entered the grain belt of Minnesota to make the fifth speech of his western tour at St. Paul tonight—a direct appeal for support from the mass of voters of the 1924 La Follette movement.
Farm relief, the tariff and other allied subjects are expected to form the hub of the address. By working late last night as his train traversed the farming sections of North Dakota and western Minnesota, the Democratic presidential nominee completed a draft of his speech and was free today to engage in a round of activity preliminary to his delivery tonight in the St. Paul auditorium.
A parade and reception in Minneapolis and a press conference were on the program for the nominee, while a reception and luncheon had been arranged for Mrs. Smith and other members of the party. Gets La Follette Votes.
Many reports have reached Governor Smith during his swing through the region that a majority of the 1924 La Follette followers are lining up behind him, and his managers are frank to say this part of the electorate is one of the chief.

British Flier May Attempt Long Jump

HARBOR GRACE, N. F., Sept. 27 (AP).—A young British naval officer who believes in hunches was here today for a proposed solo flight across the Atlantic within the next fortnight. If the weather is favorable and he has a hunch he will attempt the flight; if not he will pack up the plane and return to England.
Commander H. C. McDonald, 28 years old, whose chief aeronautical achievement was a flight from London to Baghdad, although he was only 80 hours of flying to his credit, thinks he will be able to demonstrate that a British Moth plane with a solo flier is able to stand up against Atlantic weather.

WRONG PLEDGE COSTS JOB IN UPTON COUNTY

SHERIFF'S VICTORY IS INVALIDATED DUE TO 'PARTY' IN OATH

RANKIN, Sept. 27 (AP).—The race for sheriff of Upton county will be open to anyone who wishes to run. Judge C. R. Sutton ruled yesterday that the substitution of the word "party" for the word "primary" in the pledge as printed on the ballot invalidated the election and left the county without a nominee for the office.
The ballots carried the following pledge: "I am a Democrat and agree to support the nominee of this party." The pledge as prescribed by law reads, "I am a Democrat and agree to support the nominee of this party."
J. O. Barfield, who had been declared elected must now make the race against whoever chooses to run. If he wants the office, W. C. Fowler, who ran against him in the first primary, sued the county committee to force a run-off primary. Judge Sutton, in deciding the suit made no reference to the question of a run-off, but declared that Barfield's nomination had been illegal.

Good Grooming Is Imperative, Amelita Galli-Curci, Opera Prima Donna, Says

I do not believe that the dress makes the woman, but that woman makes the dress. She stamps it with her own individuality. We all know that two women, given dresses exactly alike, will present an entirely different appearance in them. The one may look chic and stylish, the other as if her clothes had been originally intended for another.

The process of putting clothes on is all-important to the woman who wears them well. For that reason the woman who races with time, when dressing, never looks smartly turned out.

As every careful woman knows, being well groomed is a first essential in appearing well dressed. Every detail should receive meticulous care: the hair, the skin, the nails and make-up. Twice a day, at least, the skin should be thoroughly cleansed. A last minute dash precludes this careful grooming, as it precludes a thorough neatness.

Make Good Grooming a Habit. It is impossible to appear well dressed occasionally. To really look it, a woman must be well-groomed always. To make good grooming a regular habit requires far less time than to make it the exception. And this brings us to the important point of taking care of clothes. This last is particularly related to the care of evening dresses.

No woman appears to good advantage in soiled or crumpled finery. And a good share of that state comes from throwing a dress carelessly over a chair or even on the floor in a mad rush to get to bed on coming home at a late hour. Not every woman has the advantage of a personal maid, but a few minutes given personally to putting the evening dress on a hanger will yield permanent reward. Clothes wear doubly long if given those five minutes of attention.

Our grandmothers were not far wrong when they preached on the proverb "a stitch in time saves nine," only they pictured the real fact too mildly for it saves ninety, not nine, stitches later. While my life is a busy one, traveling great distances and singing so many nights in opera or concert, I find the only safe plan is to superintend a thorough looking over by daylight of a dress I wore the night before.

EXTENSION IN LEAGUE SCOPE IS SUGGESTED

HINDU STATESMAN SAYS MORE STRESS MUST BE IN FAR EAST

(By Associated Press.)
GENEVA, Sept. 27.—A warning that while the League of Nations is established in Europe, its position in Asia is not assured, was given delegates of the League of Nations assembly during its closing moments today by the Earl of Lytton, British statesman, who spoke for India.

Delegates of 80 nations, who started for their homelands tonight with the ninth assembly history, were thoughtful as the result of his speech.

Sees League Tendency
The earl scored the tendency of the league to place no limits on its expenditures and demanded that more attention be paid to questions outside of Europe and that there be greater collaboration between Europe and Asia.

While digesting this warning delegates were cognizant of press messages from Buenos Aires reporting the Argentine parliament had voted to suppress the leagues dues and thereby implied complete separation from the league.

The assembly adjourned with evidence that disarmament continues the biggest problem of the league and with fears privately voiced that little progress can be expected in the reduction of armaments for the near future.

Sees Further Progress
In his valedictory address to the assembly, President Heriuf Zahle, Danish minister to Germany, expressed conviction that during the coming year arbitration and conciliation would make "further triumphant progress," that "international friendship and confidence is growing stronger daily," and that "the new methods of international frankness and direct discussions will remove the causes of conflicts."

The 52nd session of the council of the league also adjourned tonight after clearing its slate of a great variety of matters inherited from the assembly.

Chief among these was the creation of a central board under the Geneva option convention to direct combat against the opium and narcotic evil.

Dr. Vernon Kellogg of the United States National Research council was one of the eleven nominated by the council today for the governing body of the new cinematographic institute in Rome.

PLANE STRIKES WALL

MRS. WILLEBRANDT SAYS PROHIBITION NOT MAIN ISSUE AND DECLARES THAT NO APPEAL MADE ON RELIGIOUS BASIS

(By Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Any doubt as to whether Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt has been speaking under auspices of the republican national committee was dispelled when she called at western headquarters.

"I am sorry only that she can not give us more of her time," said Walter Newton, chairman of the speakers' bureau.

His declaration resulted from a question put to the woman assistant attorney general as to whether she had been free-lancing. Turning to Mr. Newton, Mrs. Willebrandt, suggested he could best answer it.

Has Other Speeches
"Mrs. Willebrandt has been speaking under the auspices of the speakers' bureau of the republican national committee and she has future engagements in several states, including Kentucky and Tennessee for October," answered Mr. Newton.

Mrs. Willebrandt, whose recent campaign addresses stirred criticism from newspapers and individuals arrived here yesterday. She did not explain her visit and said she was leaving for Washington tonight, after completing a conference with James W. Good, western manager for Herbert Hoover.

"Do you consider prohibition the big issue of the campaign?" she was asked.

Assails Smith's Judgment
"I think Mr. Smith has made it an issue," she replied. "It is a moral issue in this country."

As to the religious issue, the slightly grayed attorney said: "There is nothing in a single speech or utterance of mine, public or private, that could with the slightest degree as fairness be twisted into the construction of arousing religious prejudices or an abuse of Mr. Smith or anybody else on the ground of religion."

"It is Mr. Smith himself who is trying to dodge behind his own church. I personally have too high a respect for the Catholics with whom I have worked not to feel sorry to see a prominent Catholic like Mr. Smith attempt to create a notion in the public mind that the criticisms that are directed to him by drys and by people who are opposed to Tammany are aimed at his church."

Election Contest Gets Postponement

UVALDE, Sept. 27 (P)—Withdrawal of all of the contestant attorneys forced postponement here yesterday of the election contest in which Bud Hardin of Mission is seeking to upset the nomination of Congressman John M. Garner of this city. Hardin charges that thousands of illegal votes were cast and that \$100,000 was spent in Garner's campaign.

CURTIS TALKS ABOUT TARIFF

KINDLES REPUBLICAN FIRES IN ELEVENTH STATE, MISSOURI

(By Associated Press.)

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Sept. 27.—Kindling republican fires in Missouri—eleventh state visited in his western campaign—Senator Curtis, the party's vice presidential nominee, last night talked tariff and Herbert Hoover to a crowd gathered in the Shrine Mosque here.

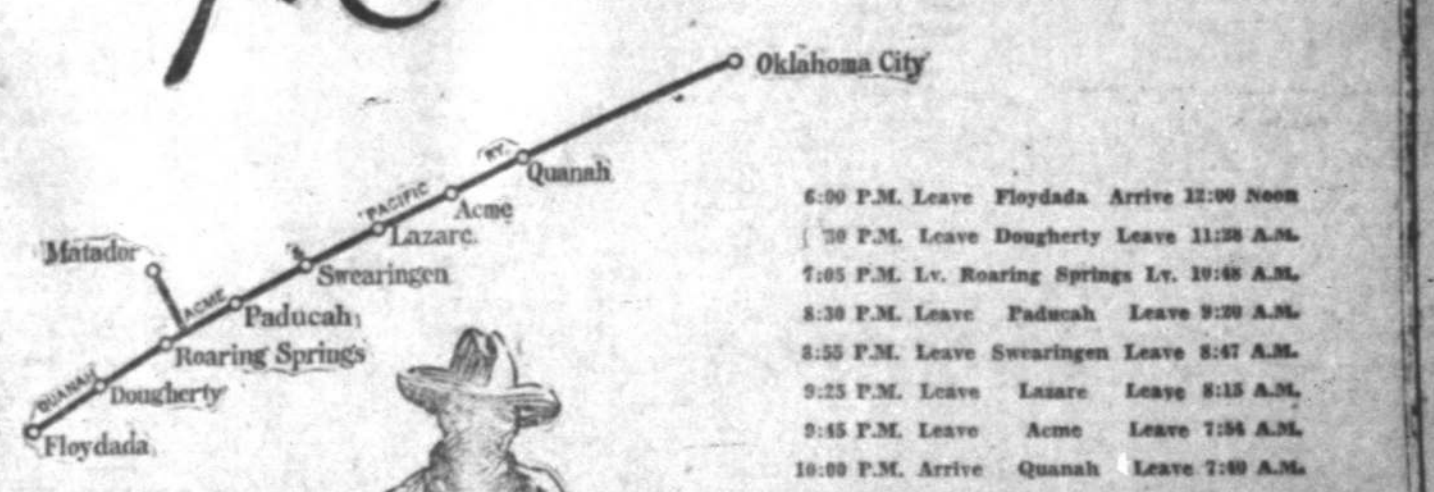

LOCATION STAKED FOR BUILDING AND BIG HANGAR ON SITE

(Special To The Journal)
SAN ANGELO, Sept. 27.—Taking the second step toward building San Angelo into the air capital of West Texas, the aviation committee of the board of city development and city officials today staked the location for an administration building and an 80 by 100 foot hangar on the 250 acre site recently secured for San Angelo's airport.

The contract for concrete foundation work under the hangar was let this week and officials have been notified that also for the hangar is enroute. The huge hangar will accommodate tri-motored Fordas, Pkers and other large type planes. After October, Enid Hunt, well known Texas aviation leader, will assume charge of the field at all hours. Water and fuel facilities have been arranged and a huge beacon light, an exact duplicate of those used by the government along established air mail routes will be installed immediately.

BRIBE RECORD PRESENTED IN LIQUOR PROBE

300-LEGGERS ACCOUNT SHOWS \$200 WEEKLY PAID OFFICERS

(By Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 27.—The grand jury investigating bootlegging and police graft has been shown a little book containing records of money alleged to have been paid police by liquor racketeers for protection.

The book was produced in Judge Lewis' court at a hearing at which Captain of Police Charles Cohen and other members of the police force appeared to answer charges of bribery and extortion. All were held under bail for trial.

Members of the grand jury recessed from their deliberations and attended the hearing in a body. They heard a confessed bootlegger, Morris Clearfield, testify he had paid weekly tribute to police. Clearfield identified his weekly payroll.

The payments averaged about \$200 a week for approximately 10 weeks, Clearfield testified. During that time he turned out about 250 or 300 gallons of alcohol weekly without molestation from police. Subsequently he was closed up by federal agents.

Harry Goldstein, a tailor, testified that he, home, where Clearfield rented a room was used as the "pay-off" office where police received plain white envelopes. He said he or his wife handed the money out to police when they called.

HOOVER SHOWS NO CONCERN AT FARM REPORTS

D A K O T A, MINNESOTA VOTERS DECLARED TO BE FOR DEMOS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—While some pessimistic reports have come to Herbert Hoover about the present situation in the northwestern wheat belt, where the McNary-Haugen plan of farm relief has had strong support, there were no indications today of deep concern at the general headquarters of the republican presidential candidate.

The break in wheat prices came before Hoover visited Cedar Rapids a month ago and was one of the subject matters of the conference which he had there with leaders from throughout the wheat belt. He left those conferences fairly well satisfied with the outlook for him in that section and the bulk of reports received since that time has not served to lessen his confidence.

Farm Again Topic
At the start of the campaign the northwestern section was one that caused some republican leaders anxiety, but since that time militant organizations have gone into operation and a concerted campaign has been waged. Hoover already has dealt with the farm relief problem in two speeches and it is likely he will have more to say on that subject.

The route he is to follow on his journey homeward the last of next month has yet to be chosen. He has been urged to go into the northwestern territory as well as to visit a number of cities outside of the wheat belt. He will make several addresses on the way and it will be that he will wind up the campaign with a further discussion of what has been one of the big issues.

East and South Get Attention
For the present the republican in conjunction with the grand jury investigation, Mayor Mackey blamed "near-beer" parlors as one source of liquor violation. A New "400"

Some things in this world are a
bit puzzling to a man who isn't
into everything.
Here is a little story to prove it.

Police officers and detectives are

the law. So is making whisky or
beer. So is the selling of these
commodities. So is murder.

Got those? All right. Now for
the story.
In Chicago the other day there
was buried a gentleman named
Lombardo, who had been shot down
in bright daylight, at the world's
busiest street corner.

Lombardo was a gunman, gang-
ster, beer runner, and so on. His
funeral, consequently, was far grander
than that of most law-abiding citizens
can ever aspire to. There were 12
pallbearers, in tuxedos. The very
cream of Chicago's underworld was
present. The crowning glory lay in
the fact that Al Capone himself
was present. In person. This great
man mingled with the throngs, sur-
rounded by an alert bodyguard. He
was affable and peaceable.

During all of this, of course,
thousands of police and detectives
stalked about through the crowds.
It is hard to make out just what
they were doing there, but they
were, anyway.

Yet nobody was arrested or bother-
ed. When Capone had viewed the
remains sufficiently he went
away in peace. So did his follow-
ers. The police manifestly resisted
any temptation to spoil the oc-
casion by making arrests.

What's it all about? Are gun-
men a class beyond the law? Is
there a "white" within a state in Chi-
cago? Are the law enforcement of-
ficials absolutely helpless?

Solve this little puzzle, so vexing
to us average men, and you will
solve the whole puzzle of America's
crime wave.

You won't solve it, however, un-
less you ask a good many questions
dealing with politicians, high-pres-
sure lawyers, legal technicalities
and a court system so antiquated
that it creeps to high heaven.
