Special Election On Tax Transfer In Titus County

A special election in Titus County is scheduled to be held sometime during June, according to an announcement by County Judge W. W. Mason. The outcome of the election, he said, will determine whether more or less money can be spent on rural roads.

Effective this year, Judge Mason said, the state ad valorem tax has been eliminated. This was in the amount of 30c per each \$100 evaluation. The tax was eliminated by constitutional amendment, but at the same time the amendment permitted counties to levy the tax, provided the property owners of the county approved it in special balloting. The money derived would go into the county's road and bridge fund.

All homesteads up to \$3,000 evaluation are exempt from the tax, just as they were under the state ad valorem. Only property in excess of \$3,000 will be subject to the tax.

The tax must be approved by qualified tax paying voters. All funds derived, if the tax is allowed must be used strictly for roads and bridges.

Property owners in Titus County are reminded that if the special road and bridge levy is approved, it can not possibly raise taxes above what they were last year. Approval merely means that the 30c per \$100 would be transferred from the state to local funds.

At the present time the property valuation in Titus County total about \$11,000,000, and by the time the statutory exemptions are taken out, the 30c levy would add between \$20,000 and \$25,000 to the road and bridge fund in this county. Judge Mason continued, and this amount would go a long way toward better rural roads in the community. With the state cutting down on appropriations for farm-to-market roads, Judge Mason further said, every bit of extra rural road money will be needed to keep the roads in good shape.

Hooks will more than likely be put on first base. Brown Williams, Arnold Glover, Mac Pittman, Pepper Martin, Bolin and a few others will be moulded with the new players to try to make the Oilers a strong contender for a place in the playoff in the league.

McCrury-John-town Road Being Re-Opened

Most new roads are new roads and traverse new territory, but this is the story of an old road that grew up in brush from disuse and a washed-out bridge, was fenced up and ceased to be a road. Now it is to become a road again.

It was first opened in 1904, according to old timers, from McCrury to Johnstown and later closed when the bridge over Mustang creek went out. It is being reopened and a new bridge built over Mustang by County Commissioner R. V. Patterson. Bogata's Tomato Crop About Ready For Marketing

Bogata's tomato crop of 700 acres this year is more than double its 320 acres of last year, and the condition of the crop is about the finest since tomatoes have been commercially grown in this area in the opinion of Morris Trim, Bogata ag. teacher. Banker S. T. Smith also says it is a fine crop and when a country banker talks that way one can depend upon it being so.

Some tomatoes are expected to start moving to market next Monday, and three sheds instead of two will be in operation at Bogata this season. Buyers and packers will be Sam Tayloe of Ed Couch, who will buy and pack at the shed across from the P. & Mt. P. depot.

Alexander Marketing Co. of San Benito, will occupy the west shed on the highway. This firm has purchased and packed Bogata tomatoes for the past four years.

John J. Janick Produce Co. of Pharr, will purchase and pack tomatoes at the east shed. This will be the second year for this company to operate at Bogata.

A few worms have appeared in some of the fields and these have been poisoned, according to Trimm, who says he believes that if a hail or some other unforeseen condition that could happen to a tomato crop does not happen that Bogata's 700 acres will produce more than 200 carloads of tomatoes this year.

Last year's crop from 320 acres produced 42 car loads, but some of the local crop was trucked away to other markets. In 1949 the crop amounted to 43 carloads. For those who do not know, a carload is 750 lugs, weighing about 30 pounds to the lug, or about 22,500 pounds to the carload.

SECOND SMACKOVER LIME TEST SCHEDULED FOR TALCO SECTOR

A second try at finding Smackoverlime production south of Talco has been scheduled by W. B. Hinton, Dallas.

The operator has filed for application to drill No. 1-A Hoffman-Beall-Chamness as a 10,000-foot hole nearly five miles southeast of Talco townsite. Location for the venture is 330 out of the NEC of an 80-acre tract in the E. Hobbs survey.

That should put it east and south of the No. 1 Hoffman et al., drilled last year as one of the most closely followed wildcats drilled in the district. That operation failed to find porosity, but it apparently did not eliminate the "inside the fault" geological theory on which it was drilled. The theory gave rise to an extensive trend lease play.

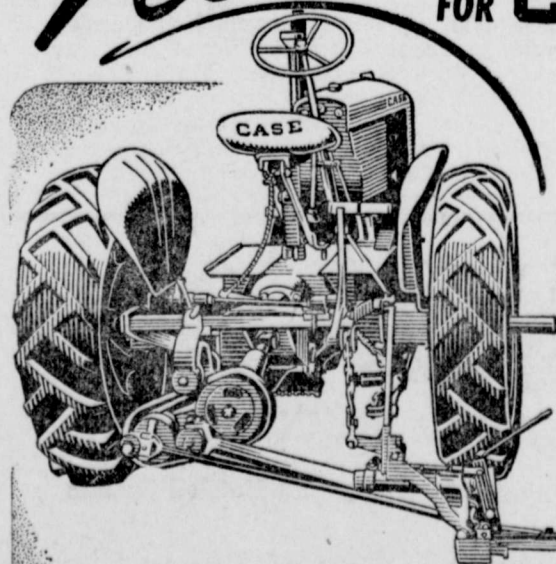

Alcorn Has Experiment Underway to Perfect Plant to Whip Johnson Grass

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, may not get anywhere with his contention this week, but you can't blame him for trying.

Dear Editor: I was reading last night in a farm magazine, which most farmers read to get their minds off the realities of actual farmin, about an experiment being conducted in the state of Washington, where timber operators are "scarin" their trees into producing more seeds and cones in a hurry by putting metal bands around the trunk. This, according to the article, makes the tree feel it's being choked and it makes an extra special effort to grow fast before it's too late, thus producing more seeds and cones.

This has been heralded as something new, but it ain't. I been doing practically the same thing out here on my farm for years.

A lot of people drivin by my farm take one look and conclude I'm lazy, sayin nobody but a lazy good-for-nothin farmer would have as much Johnson grass and weeds in his crops.

Them weeds and that grass is in there for a purpose. They're stimulin the crops to produce faster before they're choked to death, as my crops have learned long ago their growin season is limited, it's a lot shorter than some of these garden-clean farms.

What I've been doin over the years is workin on a harder strain of cotton and corn, a brand that can fight its way through grass and weeds without no help from me. With me, pamperin a crop is as bad as pamperin a child. Most farmers try to keep their fields so clean their plants are almost hot-house things, they do well while conditions are exactly right but at the first hint of a disease they fall out. Why, some crops are so carefully protected from the rough and tumble of livin they're probably subject to whoopin cough and the colic, whereas my crops know if they make it they'll have to fight their own way up.

I may not get quite as good a yield, but on the other hand I don't wear out nearly as much equipment.

What A. & M. College experts ought to be workin on, instead of how to throw up a protective screen of complicated poisons and fertilizers to get these lilly-

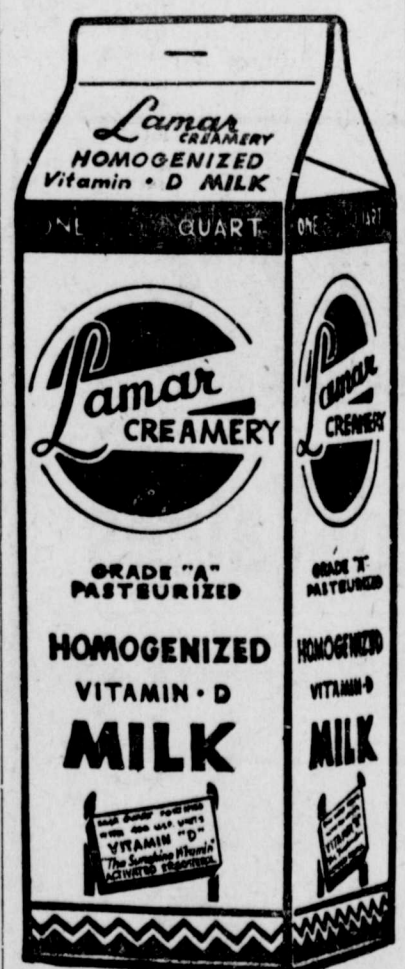
ENTERTAIN WITH CANASTA PARTY

Care Urged When Handling Poisons

The battle with bugs is now underway. As the fight becomes more intense, there often develops a tendency among the human fighters to become careless. Any relaxation of proper handling and methods of application of many of the commonly used insecticides can result in injury or even death, say the Extension entomologists of Texas A. & M. College, to the careless handler.

They point out that insecticides kept in the house should be stored only in a closed metal container. When insecticides that are classed as dangerous are being mixed or applied, the handler is urged to wear a respirator and avoid dust drift or spray mist. The clothing worn when dangerous materials are being handled should be removed and washed before being worn again.

They advise anyone to consult a doctor immediately if any degree of illness is noted during or after applying one of the dangerous type insecticides. All fruits and vegetables that have been treated with insect poisons should be washed thoroughly before they are eaten. Applications of organic insecticides such as DDT should not be made within two weeks of harvest.

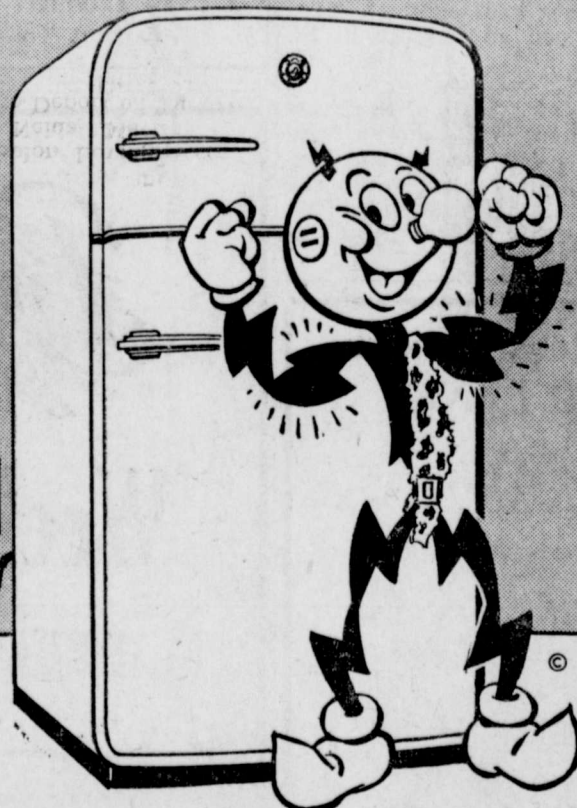
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
