From the Heritage Foundation comes the fascinating idea that prevailing fear of nuclear by-products may be a big mistake, and the subject deserves a great deal of thought. Recent publication of a study by the Foundation shows that the materials everyone has been trying to dispose of are really very valuable national resources. It presents a new twist in the debate over where to dump the "nuclear waste."

According to Milt Copulos, the Foundation's energy analyst, these so-called wastes could be used for a variety of purposes... including possible use in future artificial hearts, the preservation of foods, and the conversion of municipal wastes into valuable fertilizer products. The article did not mention feedlot wastes but it seems likely that they too have a great potential.

Considering the concern with conservation, it is amazing that so little thought has been given to the tremendous waste of resources which occurs in disposing of the by-products of nuclear fission, says Copulos. He estimates that each US nuclear reactor produces about \$14 million worth of re-usable material each year. In view of anticipated nuclear construction in the coming two decades and increased values due to inflation, he estimates a possible waste of near \$80 billion by the year 2000. That's a lot of money that could be a tremendous help in the national economy.

Copulos says that those figures reflect only the dollar value of materials contained in fission by-products. They do not refer to the value of secondary benefits that are possible by re-use of the materials, such as saving of energy, enhanced quality of life, and reduction of the volume of material that must be disposed of.

Here are a few of the anticipated benefits. An estimated 180,000 lives might be extended or improved through the use of plutonium powered artificial hearts, which are now being researched.

World food losses could be enormously reduced by using cesium-137 for irradiation of foodstuffs during post-harvest storage. Also cesium-137 irradiation could make the environment cleaner and healthier by converting waste to valuable fertilizer. And a related benefit is increased food production resulting from increased supplies of fertilizer. One can imagine a chain reaction effect in which more fertilizer results in more food, resulting in a decrease of world hunger. Adding the volumes of food that might be saved by irradiation, one can even visualize the eventual elimination of famine.

These are only the possibilities which are in sight now. In addition, no doubt, there will be other discoveries and developments in keeping with this country's amazing record of progress. This generation could be on the threshold of a brand new frontier. The more one thinks of it the more he is convinced that this subject deserves intensive and extensive study. And the first step in that direction is to set aside prevailing attitudes and prejudices.

Old timers can recall the enormous waste in early days of the petroleum industry when fields were lighted up with flares of surplus natural gas being burned. Hopefully, future generations will not have to regret a similar waste in disposal of a valuable nuclear by-product.

As the deadline approaches for your 1977 remittance to IRS, you can take some comfort in the fact that rich people generally are not getting by for less than their fair share of the income tax. Washington Post has been quoted as saying that 48 per cent of the American public, earning more than \$10,000 in 1976, paid 94 per cent of all personal income taxes.

Human Events supplies more figures on the subject. The richest one fourth of American households, those with incomes of \$17,000 or more, took home half of the income and paid more than 70 per cent of all income taxes. By contrast, those in the poorest one quarter, whose wages were less than \$5,000 a year, received less than 5 per cent of the nation's income and paid

## Books by Mail Are Available to Shut-in People

What's more fun than a new Sears catalog? What's cheaper than a first class stamp? The answer to both questions is the new Books By Mail catalog being mailed to many homebound readers in the Northeast Texas Library System.

Any person unable to get to a local public library due to a physical handicap, lack of transportation, residency in a nursing home, or who is homebound for any other reason, is also eligible to receive a Books By Mail catalog.

Books By Mail catalogs are available from: Books By Mail, Northeast Texas Library System, 1954 Commerce, Dallas, Texas 75201.

No library card is needed to order these books. The reader fills out the pre-addressed post card provided with the catalog, adds a 9c stamp, and mails the card to the Northeast Texas Library System in Dallas. The books arrive in a re-usable canvas mailing bag which includes a pre-paid return label.

Best sellers, mystery stories, westerns, romances, cookbooks, and joke books are among the many types of paperback books listed in the catalog. Books for pre-school and school-age children are also available.

75 large print paperback books have recently been added to the Books By Mail collection and are now available to people who have difficulty reading regular size type and who are homebound. Like the regular Books By Mail service, the large print books are available at no cost to the borrower, except for the 9c stamp on the first post card.

Fifty public libraries in the area belong to the Northeast Texas Library System which administers the Books By Mail project.

**The Panama Canal Treaties**

My opposition to ratification of the Panama Canal treaties rests with my view that proponents have never satisfactorily made their argument that it is in our best national interest to relinquish control of the isthmus waterway.

Let's look at the reasons why we have been told the United States should adopt a new treaty. Underlying the argument of treaty proponents is the proposition that America's good neighbor image could be tarnished otherwise, and by removing American influence in the region we remove impediments to Panamanian self-determination.

The canal no longer serves as a vital route for commercial and naval ships as it once did, we are also implored to believe, because it no longer accommodates the world's deep draft vessels.

Moreover, if we expect continued tranquility in relations with Panama, and hope to avoid possible sabotage, political upheaval, and even guerrilla warfare, an expression of good faith is now required.

None of the above convinces me in whole or in part. First and foremost, the Panamanian government has always been subject to internal political upheaval. Surrendering military and operational control of the canal to a dictatorial regime would likely only subject operation of the canal to the same instability.

Though obsolescent in many strategic and operational respects, the canal is still an important commercial and naval waterway; over 98 per cent of our naval vessels still can transit the canal, and the trend in naval construction toward smaller vessels is all the more reason we need such an unobstructed world wide commercial passageway between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

I have other very serious objections to the treaties and the need for them now, principally the current treaty language which would give Panama veto power over U.S. negotiations with any other country to dredge a future sea level canal. This provision in the treaties, in and of itself, is justification to vote against ratification.

As currently written, the treaties include the complete withdrawal of American military presence almost immediately and operational presence by the year 2000, and call for continued neutrality after that date. In addition to relinquishing control, we also will be accepting a commitment to pay the Panamanian government for the privilege of assuming control, a commitment which could reach some \$70 million annually.

I don't believe the majority of Americans would concede more payments to Panama, particularly in such exorbitant sums—nor should they have to. There is little on the record, for that matter, to convince us Panama could even operate the canal as efficiently as it is now and there is nothing in the treaties which requires them to operate it at all after the year 2000.

The overriding question Americans—and the Congress—should be asking is what we stand to gain by relinquishing our control in Panama. The objective answer is that we have nothing to gain.

only .01 per cent of the income tax bill. Also, those in the top 5 per cent, who makes \$30,000 or more a year, received 22 per cent of all income and paid 39.2 per cent of the taxes.

The stats also show that the poorer people are more favored now by IRS than they used to be. Tax Foundation figures show that the wealthiest one fourth of the population paid 68.3 per cent of all taxes in 1970, and by 1975 the figure had increased to 72 per cent. On the other end of the scale, the poorest quarter of the population paid .9 per cent of the total tax in 1970 and only .4 per cent in 1975.

Presenting the case from another angle: 14 per cent of the population, with income of \$50,000 or more, receive 10.7 per cent of the total income and pay 23 per cent of the tax bill.

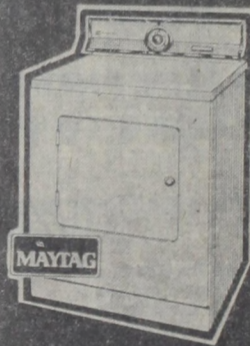
