## PRAIRIE GETS McMAHAN GAS FRANCHISE WIND AND RAIN AGAIN PARALYZE MIDDLE WEST

### LATEST STORM BRINGS DEATH AND INJURIES

#### INDIANA AND ILLINOIS IN PATH OF TWISTER; DAMAGE IS HEAVY

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, May 19.—Peoria, Ill., and Indianapolis, Ind., were hardest hit in the latest of a series of spring storms which lashed through portions of Indiana and Illinois late yesterday.

Five persons were believed to have drowned at Peoria where six inches of rain fell within a few hours, flooding down town streets and basements.

Government boats were sent into the lowlands of East Peoria to rescue 300 families driven from their homes by rising creeks. Newspaper reporters who toured the area brought estimates to Peoria early today of a possible death list of five to 15 in East Peoria and Pekin, while police checked up on a number of missing persons.

**Damage is Heavy**  
The rain at Peoria and surrounding territory was accompanied by heavy fall of hail which broke thousands of windows. Damage was estimated at \$1,500,000.

Nearly a hundred persons were injured in Indianapolis, some seriously, when an 80 mile an hour wind struck that city, flattening more than 200 houses just outside the downtown area and blowing down a gospel mission tent while services were in progress. The storm damage was estimated at \$2,000,000.

**Railroads are Halted**  
Washouts at a number of places in two states played havoc with railroad schedules, and near LaPorte, Ind., three trainmen were killed when a big four freight train crashed into a creek, the bridge over which had been swept away by flood waters.

### Vaughan Says Mail Delivery May Halt

Many tenants in offices and other buildings in downtown section of Lubbock will in all probability be deprived of free mail delivery in the near future if mail receptacles and floor slots are not arranged over the buildings for convenience of the delivery man, Postmaster John L. Vaughan said Thursday.

It was explained that an inspector was here several days ago on a survey of the delivery situation, and that but for much persuasion, the inspector would have reported the condition to the department at Washington. This however, was forestalled, but Mr. Vaughan has issued the statement that unless receptacles and other required equipment are not installed at once, the service is likely to be discontinued at any time.

### Parole Recommended For Warren McCray

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—The federal parole board has recommended that Warren T. McCray, former governor of Indiana, sentenced to the Atlanta prison for ten years, be paroled in August when he becomes eligible for that clemency. Attorney General Stagg said today he had received the recommendation and would take it under immediate consideration. McCray was sentenced to the penitentiary in 1924, for using the mails in furtherance of a scheme to defraud in connection with his obtaining loans in cattle paper.

### Houston Officers Probe Crime Wave

HOUSTON, May 19 (AP)—Crime lifted its head in Houston during the night and police were called upon to solve five acts of violence including three robberies, an unexpected shooting and the criminal assault on a white woman by a negro.

Four youths were under arrest Thursday in connection with one of the robberies.

Wednesday night a negro jumped on the running board of a car in an outlying section, forced F. W. Baker to pull down the curtains of the sedan and drive to a negro section nearby. There he held a pistol on Baker while he robbed him of \$27 and assaulted Baker's girl companion.

Henry Morrow, 28, was shot in the neck by a negro as he sat in an automobile with a young woman on a country road. He was said to be recovering Thursday.

### DE LA HUERTA FACES CHARGE

#### Four Other Mexicans to Be Questioned By U. S. in Conspiracy Case

(By Associated Press)  
TUCSON, Ariz., May 19.—Adolfo de la Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, under whose banner certain revolutionary forces of that country are fighting, today faced with four others, charges of conspiracy against the United States and of exporting arms and ammunition into Mexico in violation of the presidential embargo.

The filing here yesterday of the charges against the quintet brought to a close an investigation department of justice agents say, that has been under way for at least two months, and uncovered evidence of comparatively extensive arms smuggling, at least four shipments of arms and ammunition being known, it is alleged.

**Warrants are Issued**  
Department of justice agents announced that warrants had been issued for de la Huerta, Alfonso Gomez Morantini, and Enrique Brededa, alias W. B. Hamilton, of San Antonio, Texas; the other two, Louis Gayou, alias M. Espinos, and Francisco Ferriz, alias Francisco Ferris, were being held in the county jail here following arraignment yesterday. Bail was fixed at \$5,000 each.

Two Yaqui Indians are being held as material witnesses.

De la Huerta, from his home in Los Angeles, last night issued a general denial of the charges, petitioning his old-fashioned arraignment that he is observing the neutrality laws of the United States. He said that if federal officers wish to question him he would be at his home to receive them at any time.

### Brededa Is Held In San Antonio Jail

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, May 19.—Enrique Brededa a political power in Mexico during the administration of President Carranza, was in the Bexar county jail here Thursday after he had been arrested Wednesday night by department of justice agents for alleged complicity in the smuggling of arms into Mexico for revolution purposes.

United States Commission S. H. Hall fixed his temporary bond at \$2,000. Failing to make bond, Brededa was held in jail preparatory to steps for his extradition.

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### FARMERS FLEE BEFORE FLOOD IN LOUISIANA

#### WARNINGS ALSO CAUSE 27 MORE TOWNS TO BE EVACUATED

(By Associated Press)  
NEW ORLEANS, May 19.—A new river, which army engineers estimated to be carrying much of the flood waters streaming through the Bayou des Glaises crisscrosses from the Thomas basin, was tearing its way through fertile farm lands of the Evangeline country today, driving thousands from their homes.

More than 7,000 already had been forced to flee from villages and towns in the Gulf of Mexico was cutting to the sea to take up temporary refuge in concentration camps.

NEW ORLEANS, May 19.—Residents of the vast west Atchafalaya basin were gathering their possessions today and fleeing from their homes because of ominous flood warnings issued by federal weather authorities and John M. Parker, state relief director. Their homes are from 100 to 150 miles from Orleans.

Mr. Parker had a score of telephone operators at work urging their inhabitants to get out of the path of the spreading waters. His instructions were obeyed by residents of twenty-seven towns, none of which had a population of more than 500. The section is on the route to the Gulf of Mexico expected to be followed by waters from the Bayou des Glaises levee breaks and torrents pouring through crevasses in the Atchafalaya river at Melville, from which 1,000 men, women and children have departed. These floods converge forty miles below Bayou des Glaises. A lake 250 miles long and from 15 to 100 miles wide was created.

**More Towns Flooded**  
A sudden inundation of an additional portion of St. Landry parish, sending several feet of water into Beggs, Garland, Dubuison, Whiteville and into the country surrounding Bunkie was reported. More than 5,000 persons were estimated to be in the inundated territory.

The highway between Beggs and Bunkie has been closed to traffic. It is covered with four feet of water in some places. Conditions were reported to be growing steadily worse in the section around Bunkie. Rescue workers said that the stubbornness of the inhabitants in sticking to their homes was causing much trouble. The Port Barre and Arnaudville sections were expected to be flooded within a few hours.

Firemen scorkers at Opelousas were kept busy last night and today answering a steady stream of calls for help which came from inundated sections. A hundred persons were removed from precarious positions in box cars and house tops at Palmato.

A naval aviator, flying from the Melville section, reported that 200 persons were living on levees there. He also reported that 12 others were marooned on a house top at Swayze lake. A relief boat was dispatched immediately and these were saved.

### Texas Woman Burns To Death—Suicide

EAGLE PASS, Texas, May 19 (AP)—Miss Blasa Garza, 43, was burned to death in an outbuilding at her home here Thursday. Kerosene had been poured on her clothing. It is said she had been grieving over the condition of an afflicted sister.

### WIFE IS VICTIM

(By Associated Press)  
BATH, Mich., May 19.—Mrs. Andrew Kehoe, wife of the maniac who yesterday blew up the consolidated school here, with a loss of 42 lives, his farm home and himself, was the first victim of his fury. It was established today. Portions of her body were found in the ashes of one of the outbuildings of the Kehoe farm. Her skull was crushed, leading to the belief that Kehoe killed her before casting her body into the building to be burned.

The discovery was made by Roy Cole, a deputy sheriff.

BATH, Mich., May 19.—One-fourth of the children of this village are dead, and many more are maimed, and the hand of tragedy has reached into virtually every one of the hundred homes of the community as a result of a carefully devised plot of a demented farmer.

Among the 41 victims of the blasting of the village school house yesterday, was the perpetrator of tragedy, Andrew Kehoe, 45 year old farmer who once was known as a man of brilliance in the community, but whose mind had been diverted to schemes of revenge against the school board be-

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### CINEMA STARS WILL DIVORCE

Jack Pickford and Marilyn Miller will plead for decree in Paris.

LOS ANGELES, May 19.—Marilyn Miller, musical comedy star, and her husband, Jack Pickford, motion picture actor, have come to the parting of the ways, and will seek a divorce in Paris early in June, Pickford admitted here last night.

Pickford revealed that his wife, who is now in Chicago, would sail for France shortly. He said he would follow her abroad a short time later and a Paris tribunal would be petitioned for a divorce on the grounds of incompatibility. Both will appear at the proceedings here, so that Miss Miller will not be forced to establish a residence in France.

"We tried a year's separation," Pickford admitted, "in order to avoid a divorce, but we finally decided that we were temperamentally unsuited for each other and decided to quit."

### Prominent Lamesa Clubwoman Is Dead

### Walker And Bailey Released On Bonds

BELTON, Texas, May 19 (AP)—Whitely Walker and Ed Bailey have been released on \$5,000 bond here in connection with the Hemphill jewelry store robbery which occurred February 8.

Walker and Bailey appeared here Tuesday, after being released at Berger on their own recognizance in the cases in which they are charged with the killing of Deputies Buchanan, Terry and Kenyon.

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### BERTAUD WILL NOT NAVIGATE FOR BELLANCA

#### CHAMBERLIN IS GIVEN ANOTHER AIDE FOR ATLANTIC HOP

(By The Associated Press)  
NEW YORK, May 19.—Lloyd Bertaud definitely will not make the Paris flight in the Bellanca monoplane with Clarence Chamberlin, and his successor is already selected, Charles A. Levine, head of the company backing the flight, told the Associated Press this afternoon.

Levine's announcement followed an almost night long conference at the end of which Bertaud had said that all difficulties had been ironed out and that he would go on the flight as navigator as originally planned.

Levine made no statement at the time but when reports gained circulation that the situation was not quiet as Bertaud believed it to be, he was asked to state definitely that the results of the conference were.

"Bertaud is not going," he replied. "That is definite. His successor has been selected but his identity will not be revealed until the plane is ready to hop off."

### Navigator Says He Will Make Flight

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—Differences that threatened the New York-Paris flight of the B-Banca monoplane Columbia were settled today, Lloyd W. Bertaud, navigator of the plane, announced after a conference with Charles A. Levine, sponsor of the trip.

Bertaud said that temporary injunction proceedings to prevent the Columbia from starting on her trip without him would be withdrawn. The aviator felt satisfied, he said, that he would be with Clarence D. Chamberlin when the craft hops off.

A temporary injunction returnable tomorrow was obtained by Bertaud yesterday.

**Weather Delays Flight**  
Adverse weather reports further delayed the Bellanca flight. Stormy delays between here and Newfoundland coast also held to earth Commander Richard E. Byrd's giant Fokker monoplane America, and Captain Charles Lindbergh's Ryan monoplane "Spirit of St. Louis."

Marked activity about the Byrd hangar today, however, indicated completion of final preparations for the flight of the America. Mechanics hustled about the huge craft, making it ready for what might be its last test flight preparatory to start tomorrow. Lindbergh was ready to depart.

### Public Hearing To Be Given Fruit Ban

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—A public hearing has been called to be held here June 20 to discuss the advisability of quarantining Texas to restrict or prohibit the movement of citrus fruits as the result of the reported discovery of the Mexican orange worm in grape fruit groves of Cameron and Hidalgo counties. In making this announcement the federal horticultural board expressed hope that it might be possible to provide for shipment of citrus fruit under inspection and certification from infected areas.

The Mexican orange worm also is known as the Mexican fruit fly.

### Amarillo Pastor In Divorce Trial

AMARILLO, May 19 (AP)—Temporary hearing on the divorce suits filed by Rev. Lewis N. Stuckey and Mrs. Stuckey here late yesterday opened today in district court. The hearing, which recessed at 11 a. m., until 2 p. m., was to pass on injunctions asked by Rev. Stuckey, pastor of the Park Street Methodist church, to restrain Mrs. Stuckey from occupying the parsonage and an order sought by Mrs. Stuckey giving her the right to re-enter the home.

The court will also pass on Mrs. Stuckey's request for \$200 a month alimony, pending the full hearing of the suit. Rev. Stuckey, one of the more prominent members of the Northwest Texas Methodist conference, came to Amarillo from Abilene two years ago.

### BANDITS MAKE THEIR ESCAPE

#### Kimes And Terrell Get Off With Big Sum; Oklahoma Poses Are Busy

BEGGS, Okla., May 19.—Headed by two of the south-west's most notorious and daring desperadoes, Ray Terrell and Matthew Kimes, the band of nine robbers which yesterday held up two banks at Beggs, killed Chief of Police W. J. McAnally and wounded Mrs. Charles Campbell, today apparently escaped.

Reports that the men had been surrounded at Quay were denied by Joe Hayless of that town, who said that everything in his community was quiet. Other reports that the robbers had been trapped in other sections likewise proved unfounded as posses of officers and citizens scouted from one town to another in the man hunt.

Traced through Pristow, Shamrock, Yale and Cushing to a point six miles beyond the latter town, nothing definite has been heard from them since. They were last believed seen by a truck driver on an oil lease at 10 p. m. Wednesday night.

The robbers obtained approximately \$10,000 in cash in the robbery of the Farmers National and First National bank and a large quantity of jewelry.

Garrett, Ramsey, barber, one of the witnesses to the invasion, said today he is positive that Kimes and Terrell led the robber band. He was sitting in his car when the bandits drove up to the banks. They ordered him to get out and get inside a building, Ramsey said he had known both Terrell and Kimes for several years and that he recognized them.

Kimes is probably better known in Beggs than anywhere else in the state. He spent his boyhood days on a ranch about eight miles west of Beggs, where an abandoned automobile, blood stained, with a bullet hole through it and a flat tire, was found after the robbery.

### Legion Committees Will Meet Tonight

The several committees on arrangements for the American Legion convention here Saturday and Sunday of this week are to meet tonight in the legion hall in the Temple Ellis building at 8 o'clock, when a final check-up will be made on all plans for the convention, it was announced today.

The local registration campaign, launched here Monday night in an effort to register every local ex-service man for the convention before Saturday, probably will be the main topic of discussion, although every phase of the two-day program will be touched upon. While committees are all who have been notified, the meeting is open to any ex-service man, it was said.

### Local Kindergarten Teacher Is Secured

Miss Allie Babcock of Fort Worth will have charge of the kindergarten work in the Lubbock public schools for next year. Miss Babcock holds her bachelor's degree from Texas Woman's college, Fort Worth, and in addition to her training in that school, she has during the past year served as student assistant in its kindergarten department.

She comes to the local schools thoroughly equipped and her coming will mean much to the kindergarten work in the schools.

### TO CARRY OUT ALL TERMS OF HUGE PROJECT

#### BIG OIL COMPANY AND RESOURCES BEHIND PIPE LINE

The West Texas Gas company franchise, granted by the City Commission of Lubbock last year for a natural gas line from the Panhandle oil fields has been transferred to the Prairie Oil and Gas company of Independence, Kansas, under action of the commission in session here this afternoon.

S. K. Moody, president of the Prairie Oil and Gas, T. J. Flannery, general counsel, and V. A. Hays, head of the gas department of the company, were in the session representing the Prairie, while A. J. McMahon of Oklahoma City, to whom the franchise was granted; Geo. R. Bradford, Oklahoma City; S. M. Williams, construction contractor, of Tulsa; and J. W. Moore, contractor of Amarillo, represented the McMahon interests in the session.

**Name Not Changed**  
The company will continue to operate under the incorporation as the West Texas Gas company. Mr. Moody told the commission, Mr. Moody is responsible for contracts entered into by Mr. McMahon. In short, he said, his company is taking up the project where Mr. McMahon drops out, and continues in every phase under his contracts.

This contract requires actual construction work on the line to be started not later than June 1 under an extension recently granted Mr. McMahon. Two cars of pipe are now on cars in the Santa Fe yards here, and work is to be started in the next few days, Mr. Moody said. The Prairie Oil and Gas company with general offices in Independence, Kansas, is one of the largest operating firms in the southwest, and has gas lines in many portions of the country.

### Two Lubbock Men In Automobile Accident

Major Postum Hemphill, division engineer of the state highway department, and Claud Hurlbut, local man, narrowly escaped serious injury and possible death late Wednesday when the heavy car in which they were returning to Lubbock from the south on highway No. 7 overturned into a ditch near Hagtown in Bexar county when the brakes stuck on an attempted sudden stop behind a light car that ducked quickly across the road in front of them.

The car, a Buick coupe, was considerably damaged. Major Hemphill said today that a man was driving in front of his machine upon hearing the horns, turned out slightly of the highway for him to pass, but when he neared, the man suddenly began to cut back across the road. He jammed his brakes, he said, and they stuck, throwing the heavy machine into the air and toward the barpit alongside the highway.

The machine crashed into a wooden structure after turning on its side, and the structure prevented the car from catapulting into the ditch to possible death of the two occupants. Neither occupants of the car, however, was injured except a slight shaking up.

## National Leaguers Continue Their Bitter Struggles

### UPHEAVAL HAS SHOWN CARDS FARTHER DOWN

#### AMERICAN LEAGUE HAS SHAKE-UP, TOO, AS FIGHT GOES ON

(By Associated Press.)  
Swift descent of the world champion St. Louis Cardinals from second to fifth place in the National league drew attention today to a hot struggle for second place by four teams.

While the Giants, like their fellow townsmen, the Yankees, in the American league, had a good hold on first place, the next four teams in the National circuit were bunched so closely a cap would cover them.

**21 Points Divides Them**  
The four were the Cubs, Phillies, Pirates and Cards, gamed in the order of their present rank below the Giants. Between the first and last of this quartet just 21 points separated them.

A single defeat is enough to send one of the four down several steps and that is what happened to the Cards when they lost to the Braves 8 to 1, while Pittsburgh was trouncing the League Leading Giants, 13 to 6. Chicago was beating Brooklyn 7 to 4, and the Phillies were idle.

Willie Sherdel of the Cards, hitting the ball king, was battered out of the box in the seventh. Larry Benton of Boston held the champs to eight hits and he added a double of his own in the sixth that tallied three runs.

**Bucs Hit Hard**  
In their first appearance at the Polo Grounds, the Corsairs crashed out 18 hits off three pitchers, while Vic Aldridge held the Giant bats to just half that number. Joe Harris, Pittsburgh first sacker, had a perfect day at bat with four singles and a pass, in four attempts. Home runs were made by Wright and Traynor of the victors and Doc Farrell, the youthful Giant.

Charley Root's pitching, plus those Brooklyn fielding gave the Cubs the victory that carried them from fourth to second place. It was Root's sixth win of the season, a shakeup in the American league took place when the Tigers made three hits count to defeat Washington, 5 to 2, and the Browns outslugged the Red Sox, for an 8 to 5 decision. The Senators thus took back from Indians to tie with Cleveland for next to last, while Detroit and St. Louis were dead-ended in fourth position. Disputes with the umpires featured the Detroit game and one man of each team was banished for talking back. Whitehill fanned six times.

The high spot at St. Louis was the battling of "Big" Miller of the Browns, who made four hits, one a home run, in five times up and boosted his average to .446 for the season.

Eddie Collins, now with the Athletics, was banded a wrist watch, diamond stick pin and nose on sale by his old teammates at Chicago before rain ended the game in the second inning.

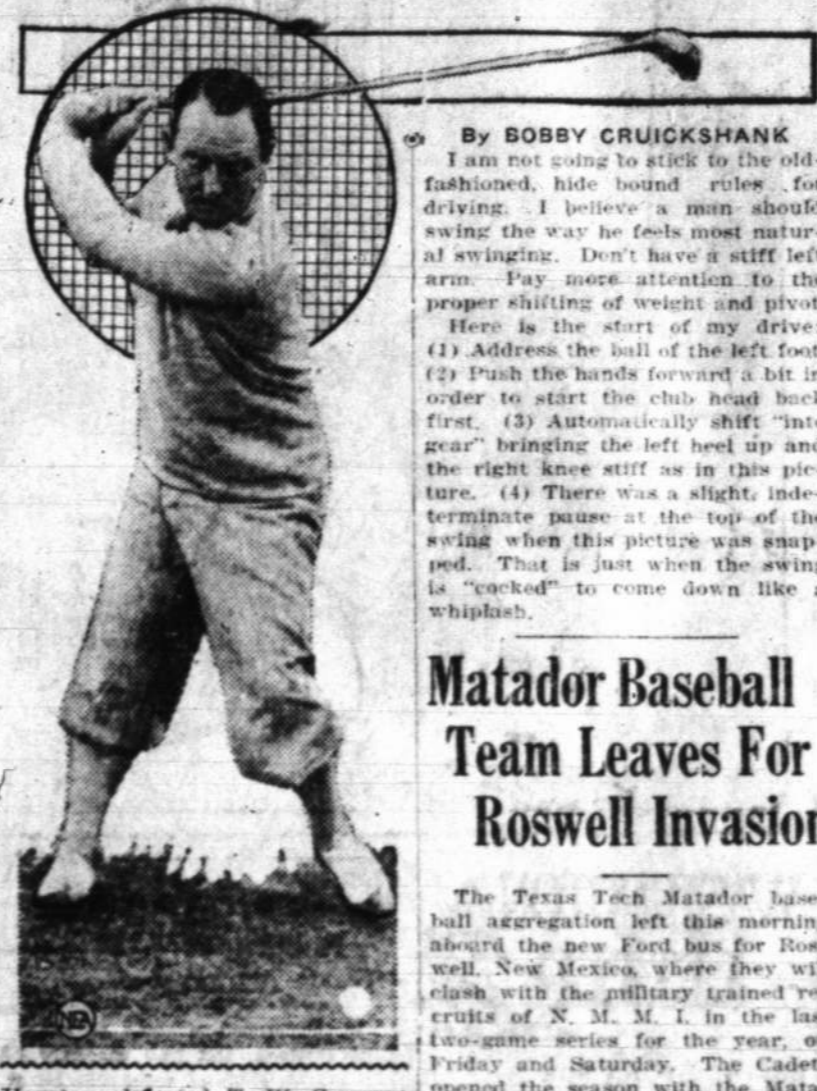

BRAND'S PLAN FOR NO-WAR TREATY WITH U. S. GETS NO RESPONSE

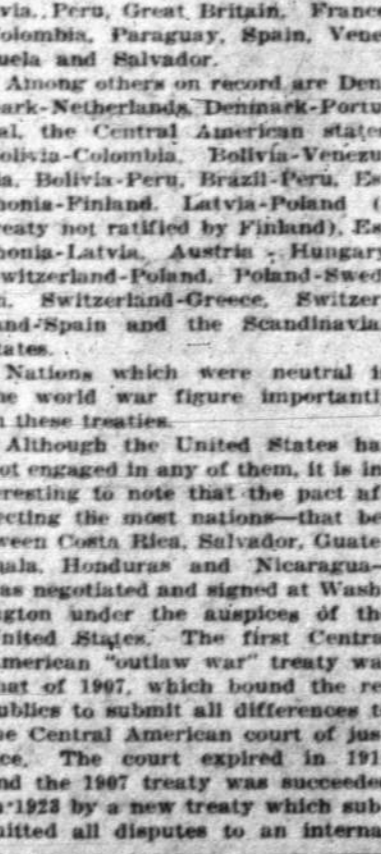

#### PRESBYTERIANS HEAR SKINNER AT SESSION IN EL DORADO

(By The Associated Press)  
EL DORADO, Ark., May 19.—Dr. J. W. Skinner, president of the Texas-Mexican Industrial Institute for boys at Kingsville, Texas, told the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States today that "no other class of men are doing more to make it possible for men to work with God, than are scientists."

In delivering the opening sermon to the assembly in session here, he said that scientists "in close by their thought and uniform of ten called against, have done more in the last few years to make the world safe for a new race of men, more to make available favorable conditions for men more to take their part of the burden of the world, more to take the drag out of human toil, more to banish ignorance, more to bring in light than the church of God did for 1,000 years, in the centuries between 400 and 1400."

"God is known as greater God today than was taught 200 years ago. The Bible is a richer treasure of truth in the light of the illumination of modern science; no class of men live and labor more in the spirit of Jesus Christ than many self-effacing men in the scientific research laboratories."

Michigan State college and had been a leader in community affairs since settling here several years ago. He was "looked upon as a sort of a sage here because of his superior schooling. Recently his demeanor suddenly changed, according to residents, and he showed signs of a persecutory complex. The comparatively loyal school tax levied against him, was ruining him financially, he told acquaintances, and he became morose.

Officials of the school board, of which he was a member himself, were called upon and decided for the tax levy. He engaged in controversy with members on every occasion and then suddenly his attacks ceased.

In the interlude it was believed by officials, he arrived upon the

scheme of destroying the school and its occupants the results of the details of his sick mind.

#### Dynamite in Basement

According to information placed together by officials Kehoe is believed to have mined the basement of the school house with dynamite several days ago. Electrical contrivances were put in place to set off the blast. Kehoe was seen running from the school shortly after 9 a. m. yesterday and the blast soon followed.

The first explosion lifted the floors and burst the walls of the building, hurling the children through windows and crashing walls. A second and heavier explosion completely demolished the frame building, burying children and their mentors under tons of debris. When the blast occurred, according to witnesses, Kehoe was seated in his automobile nearby, checking with maniacal glee.

Not contented with the destruction he had wrought the demoralized farmer caused the death of Emory E. Huyck, principal of the school and two bystanders by firing a shot from an army rifle into a box of dynamite in the rear end of the automobile.

This explosion tore Kehoe's body into pieces and instantly killed Huyck, tore the legs from Glen Smith, postmaster of Bath and killed Nelson McFarren, who had approached the car. Smith died on the way to a Lansing hospital.

Prior to the explosion Kehoe had set fire to his farm house and out-buildings which were burned to the ground and he even destroyed the trees on the place. On the fence of the place was found a

A delegation from San Antonio, led by W. N. D. continental royal families, but to marry at home.

There was universal expectation that within a reasonable time King George would confer a dukedom on Lascelles. But honors have been announced from year to year and somehow Lascelles' name always is among the missing.

There are only three royal peers—the king's uncle, Duke of Connaught, brother of King Edward VII, the Prince of Wales, who has the place by right of birth; and his brother, who was created Duke of York some years ago.

The king's other son, Prince Henry and Prince George, some day may be made dukes, but so far they're just on the waiting list. Outside of the royal peers there are only 28 dukes in Great Britain. Only two of these 28 have been created in the past 60 years—namely the Duke of Abercorn and the Duke of Westminster.

Lascelles some day will have a seat in the house of lords, as he is the heir to the title of his father, the Earl of Harewood, who is now 81 years old. And it is probable that after he is an earl for a while, his royal father-in-law may give him a step-up in the peerage to make him a marquis. But of becoming a duke there are no prospects.

An Unenviable Role In the meantime, Lascelles is not entirely enviable. Mary, a royal princess, at great pains he takes a place inferior to his wife. Forty-five years old, serious minded and a bit austere, never has hit it off with his younger brothers-in-law. He is hazy on the distant side of the royal family. Queen Mary frankly likes and is pleased with him, it is said.

Lascelles is a multi-millionaire in his own right, having been the legate of a wealthy, eccentric, miserly Irish nobleman who devoted to his English nephew, As a soldier Lascelles had a record. He served throughout great war, being wounded three times and receiving the Distinguished Service Order from his country, and the Croix de Guerre from France.

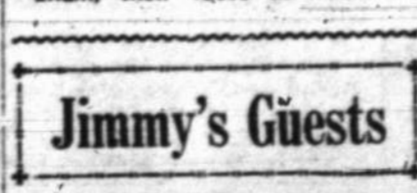
