Only Four Weeks Remain To Take Half Price Paper

Paper Will Be Two Dollars Per Year After Campaign Closes Saturday, July 27

Bountiful Rains Covering Entire Area Put Farmers To Work Cultivating Land

Rainfall Shows Average Of Over 2 Inches In June

Figures released this week by the Soil Conservation Service at the Lamesa CCC camp show that Dawson County has had an average of 2.84 inches of rain during the month of June.

While some sections are not as heavy as others, those reporting show that Harmony, which received the lightest fall reported, received 1.35 for the month and Higginbotham with 2.95, was the wettest spot. The fall by stations is given below.

The rains the first of the week over most of Dawson County, as well as West Texas, have put farmers to work all over the territory. Many farmers have cotton growing very nicely, and some report blooms and small bolls. The rain in these instances will practically guarantee a crop.

Others sections have been so dry that there was not sufficient moisture for planting. The rains in these areas will enable farmers to get planting done.

With the exception of a few small scattered areas, the county received all the rain necessary. As a result there have been few people in Lamesa this week.

A drive through the rural areas, shows tractors and teams on practically every farm. The roar of tractors, is in sharp contrast to the roar of tanks which are heard in many sections of the world. The tractors are bent on the production of commodities, while the tanks are bent on destruction. That is America in contrast to Europe today.

Clean-up inspection sheets delivered Monday, June 24, by Boy Scout troops. Girl Scouts delivered entry blanks in yard-improvement campaign. High school band, boy scout and girl scout troops, girls armed with mops, brooms and hoses and wearing aprons paraded at 4:30 Tuesday, Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock painters began work on the boy scout hall at corner of North Houston and North Third streets. Albaugh Gets Oil Show In Wildcat Report Reveals

Attention in the North Permian Basin Wednesday was turned to the Ray A. Albaugh No. 2 John Robinson section 34 block M. EL&R survey, wildcat well in northwest Dawson County. This wildcat was shut down at 5,214 feet in line, after finding a good show of oil in time from 5,295 feet to bottom.

The horizon is below the sulphur water, topped at 4,983 feet. When the well was shut down at 5,214 feet after logging the oil show, it was standing with 4,000 feet of water in the hole. The test had filled with 2,000 feet of water in 48 hours from an increase at 5,000 ft. to 5,056 feet. Drilling ahead, the test had picked up a show of gas from 5,118 feet to 5,123 feet and a slight show of oil from 5,125 feet to 5,133 feet.

The test is located one and one-half miles northwest of Albaugh's No. 1 Robinson, a small producer, and four and one-half miles east of the Gaines County line.

700 Mattresses To Be Provided Dawson Farmers

Following closing date for applications for government mattresses in this county June 20, approved applications are expected to reach the 700 mark, according to Miss Mattie Phenix, home demonstration agent.

Applications totaling 672 had been approved last week, and there were other applications which had not been passed on or had not been returned to the central office which were expected to bring the total to 700 by the final date, June 30.

Miss Phenix added that materials for this county have not arrived and that it is impossible to tell when work will begin until they do. In the entire state applications to receive materials have passed the 100,000 mark with 119,079 filed in 203 counties which are participating in the Department of Agriculture's program for aiding low income farm families. Of this number 95,363 have already been certified by

county agricultural conservation as eligible.

In announcing this response, Mildred Horton, vice-director and state home demonstration agent for Texas A. and M. College Extension service, reported that to date 10,069 mattresses have been made in the 46 counties to which materials have been shipped by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation.

Commenting on the rapidity with which Texas communities have prepared for operation of work centers, Miss Horton paid tribute to 4,999 women leaders and 2,258 men leaders in the state who are volunteering their time and services to enable all eligible families to benefit from the program.

Merchant Marine Still Best In Transportation

The world's number one transportation device is still the merchant marine, and it will continue to hold preeminence in spite of temporary eclipses by aircraft.

To Dr. John H. Frederick, University of Texas transportation professor, who makes this prediction, two factors will operate to maintain maritime shipping's position:

(1) The ship is still the only device which can travel long distances with heavy loads.

(2) The current vulnerability of the merchant marine to aerial bombing is a temporary situation due to the lopsided division of air power between the warring powers. In short, shipping of the future can be protected from hostile aircraft by its own planes.

Although admitting that British shipping faces the gravest threat in its history, Dr. Frederick foresees a possibility that England may yet escape the German straight-jacket stretching from Norway to France.

England still possesses plenty of replacements for vessels which are lost, can still man armed convoys through the gauntlet from the English coast to the comparative safety of the open sea, and the patrol of the bomber is still relatively limited, he pointed out.

"All risk" crop insurance on the 1940 wheat crop has been taken out by 378,000 wheat growers of the nation, according to the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. By this act they have guaranteed to themselves 106 million bushels.

TEXAS OUT-OF-DOORS

WILDLIFE VALUED
AT \$94,350.394

Texas continues to lead the nation in the value of its wildlife resources, according to figures assembled after surveys were made by the federal government and forwarded to the executive secretary of the State Game Commission.

Not only does Texas lead the nation, but its wildlife resources are worth approximately three times as much as those of the second leading state.

Wildlife resources are valued at \$94,350.394 by federal experts. This takes into consideration the value of insectivorous birds to the farmer, of game and the amount of money spent by hunters it brings the land owner, hotel owners, stores and tourist camps; the value of the fur crop in the state and myriad of other ways in which game is of actual monetary value to the Lone Star State.

DETROURED TRAFFIC FOR QUAIL

A mother quail and her nest of twenty-one eggs recently caused travelers to do a bit of detouring between Brackettville in Kinney County and Rock Springs in Edwards County. The state highway department's crew of engineers and construction gang, in building a road between those two communities located a quail nest of twenty-one eggs. All traffic was detoured around that spot until Mama Quail hatched nineteen of her twenty-one eggs and the little birds were able to leave the nest. It is reported to the State Game Department's executive secretary.

QUAIL HATCH IS EARLY

The quail hatch in several sections of North Texas is reported earlier this year than usual. Several hatches in Denton County near Lake Dallas are the earliest ever reported.

While the rains which have been general throughout Texas will do much to aid the game crop in Texas this year, early hatchings of eggs of quail, turkey and prairie chickens in some areas have been washed out by exceedingly heavy rains. However, should the rains cease soon it will not be too late for some species of game to lay second or even third hatchings of eggs.

GOT HIS PLUG BACK

Not only did Will Baugh of Bonham, Texas hook a nine-pound catfish on a plug twice, but the strikes came two days apart and he got back his first plug, which he broke the night of June 26. Baugh of the Bonham Favorite relates, Mr. Baugh was fishing on a recent Saturday when he felt a heavy tug on his plug. He hauled the nine-pound cat to within a few feet of the boat when the fish broke his line. Baugh went fishing again on Monday and it was not long before he again got a heavy tug on his line. He landed a huge catfish which proved to be the same one he had tangled with on Saturday. The way he knew? The catfish still had Baugh's first plug dangling from its mouth!

TRIED GAR FISHING YET?

The State Game Department's campaign to get anglers fishing for cat continues to progress. Have you tried the sport yet? Gar fishing with a wire noose is proving one of the most thrilling of all sports to hundreds of Texas anglers. A request to the State Game Department at Austin for a leaflet describing the procedure and how to make the noose will bring you one free of charge.

RADIO FOR ANOTHER WARDEN

The West Texas Game Association of San Angelo recently purchased a short wave radio receiving set for the game warden stationed at that West Texas city and the set, installed in his car, has already proved its worth. Now comes word that the state game warden at Brownwood has equipped his car with a short wave set and station KNGW, the police station of Brownwood is cooperating with him. Lack of funds prevents the State Game Department from equipping all its cars with short wave receiving sets.

GEORGIA BREAM FISHING GOOD

Reports are coming into the State Game Department office from various sections of the state concerning the excellent luck anglers are having fishing for those large red-eared bream, a fish which had been overlooked by most anglers before the department started a campaign to acquaint piscators with the fun of catching them.

The red-eared often reach a length of twelve to thirteen inches. You fish for them on the bottom of streams or lakes and the lighter tackle used the more sport there is in it.

Once for once, bream have more fighting ability than any fish found in Texas waters.

Should the sportsmen of the state fish for gar and bream, of which there is an abundance of each, in sufficient numbers, the balance between game fish could be restored in Texas waters.

SLAKE SWALLOWED BIG CATFISH

More evidence that snakes do cut into the supply of fish in Texas came to light recently when the Game Department was forwarded the stomach of a three-foot water snake. In the stomach was a 12-inch channel cat which weighed approximately a pound.

Travis' letter from the Alamo: Commander of the Alamo Bojar, Feb. 24th 1836 To the People of Texas & all American in the World—

Fellow citizens & compatriots—I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna—I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for 24 hours & have not lost a man. The enemy has demanded a surrender on pain of death, or else to be put to the sword. If the fort is taken—I have answered the demand with a cannon shot, & our flag still waves proudly from the walls—I shall never surrender or retreat. Then I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism & of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid with all dispatch—The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily & will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible & die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his honor & that of his country.

William Barrett Travis, Lt. Col. comdt.

P. S. The Lord is on our side—When the enemy appeared in sight we had not three bushels of corn. We have since found in deserted houses 80 or 90 bushels and got in to the walls 20 or 30 head of beefs.

Q. Were the heirs of any soldiers who served in the Texas army ever granted land by the Republic of Texas by reason of such service?

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No Danger To Food Supply From War

More than ever today the farmers and the rest of the nation's population are in need of continuous operation of the AAA, George Slaughter, chairman of the state AAA committee, told that committee in College Station last week.

Former export markets for cotton, wheat, and other farm products have been destroyed and lost to the American farmer, the chairman continued. If it had not been for the support given the farm price structure by the Ever-Normal Granary, prices for farm products would have suffered much more severely than they have and resulting distress for the farmer would have been severe.

In Texas, as in the rest of the nation, the AAA is set up on a county-by-county basis with 751 county committees administering the program. In farm communities in the state 2,868 local committees are overseeing the work. All of these men are co-operating in assisting the government to adjust agriculture to the demands made upon it and to see that administration of the program is kept up to the minute.

With such machinery in operation, there is no danger of the American people being threatened with a shortage of necessary foods, Slaughter said. In fact, the great problem is to find markets for the tremendous supplies available, as there is plenty for the American market and the Ever-Normal Granary is overflowing.

"We sincerely hope and believe that the various parts of the AAA program are sufficient to save the farmers from any such disastrous times as they have experienced in past years, such as 1914," he said, "and that farmers in Texas and the rest of the country will continue to cooperate with the program as they have in the past."

Cabbage and carrots have been named as "surplus commodities" by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace for the period June 10 to 30 in stamp plan areas of Texas and 10 other southern states. This new ruling makes it possible for these two vegetables to be obtained with blue food order stamps under the program administered by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation.

Peas, beans, and other vegetables were designated as "seasonal surplus" products in other sections of the country. This more flexible plan will make it possible for participating families to get needed fresh vegetables and at the same time will expand markets for truck farmers who market in stamp plan areas.

During the vegetable season, designation of "surplus" commodities will be varied according to seasonal changes in supply and

marketing conditions. In addition, the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation will continue direct purchases of surplus vegetables under a program which has been in operation for more than two years. Vegetables purchased under this program are donated to state relief agencies for direct distribution to needy people in areas other than stamp plan counties.

Dr. Cox Says:

Looking ahead to the approaching observation of the Fourth of July, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, warns against the irresponsible use of fireworks and other explosives.

Dr. Cox pointed out that celebration of the Fourth of July has associated with it inevitable increase in hazards to life and limb; auto accidents increase in added traffic congestion; an undue number of drownings occur, chiefly affecting non-swimmers in places lacking adequate safety supervision; and a great many injuries and not a few deaths are directly attributed to fireworks. The past several years have seen the introduction of municipal ordinances in certain cities designed to prevent the indiscriminate and intemperate use of fireworks, particularly the more dangerous types, and this has to some degree reduced the hazard associated with their general use.

However, it is not to be inferred that risks to health and life from fireworks have been eliminated completely. Temporary stands inside city limits make explosives accessible to the Independence Day celebrators, while the large majority of Texas communities have as yet adopted no regulations barring them. Non-thinking parents still permit thousands of children to use this dangerous method of celebrating the Fourth, with the inevitable result that some of them find their way to the hospital, and others to the undertaker's establishment. Tetanus always is in the shadow where high explosives are being handled for amusement by amateurs. Any person receiving a powder burn or wound, however superficial, should see a physician immediately. Anti-tetanus serum, in the majority of cases, will be administered to prevent the possibility of lockjaw. To treat an injury of this type unconcernedly is to

run an unjustifiable risk. Moreover, the post-Fourth's casualty items are augmented by the carelessly operated automobile. Statistics show that not only in Texas, but throughout the nation, the misoperated motor vehicle is a real fourth of July hazard. Again, the list of drownings is definitely increased on that day, and finally, snake bites, polluted drinking water, sunburn, and poison ivy are always ready to meet the excursionist half way.

There is no desire to dampen any one's enthusiasm for fun and relaxation on the Fourth, but the wise person will appreciate that harmful possibilities to life, limb and health do exist, and will govern himself accordingly.

Celebrate July 4 Without Fire And Noise Is Plea

With Europe giving a display of its own brand of fireworks, there is more than ever a reason why the United States should attempt to celebrate the Fourth of July this year without the fire and noise which has been traditional. Marvin Hall, state fire insurance commissioner, said today.

American Medical Association reports show that 31 Texans were seriously injured last Fourth of July while playing with fireworks. In cities prohibiting fireworks by local ordinance, firemen can materially aid the cause of safety by enforcing what laws they have, Hall declared. In locations where sale is allowed, departments can enforce safety measures for every fireworks stand. No stand should be allowed in front of a store, where it is conceivably might cut off exit in case of fire and firemen should enforce "No Smoking" rules and require fire extinguishers or water pails.

Average Age of 4H Club Girl Is Twelve Years

The average Texas 4-H Club girl is about 12 years of age. At least, more girls are 12 than any other age according to a survey enrollment cards made recently by Onah Jacks state girls' club agent and Helen H. Swift, sociologist for the Extension Service of Texas A and M College, who deals with rural women's organizations.

The study shows that 6,648 of the 35,988 girls are 12 years of age. The next largest number—6,008—is comprised of girls 11 years of age. In comparison 142 girls are under 10 years of age, and 63 are 20 years of age.

A similar study was made to determine how long most of the girls have been engaged in 4-H club work. Approximately 45 percent of all the 4-H Club girls are enrolled this year for the first time; 30 percent, of 10,803, are in their second year. While the turnover in the higher age brackets is large, the number of girls remaining in 4-H Clubs over a period of years has steadily increased until this year there are more fourth year girls enrolled than at any time in the history of club work. Seventy-six girls, most of them about 17 years of age, reported that they had been active club members for more than six years.

At present there are 1,991 girls' 4-H Clubs in Texas. This is slightly less than the 2,100 home demonstration clubs in the state. Aggregate enrollment of women club members is 37,289.

Plans for the purchase of American surplus food supplies by the price has been announced by the United States Department of Agriculture. The shipment for war refugees in France will include 5,881,000 pounds of wheat flour, 1,250,000 pounds of corn meal, 750,000 pounds of lard, 800,000 drums of prunes, and 800,000 pounds of raisins.

Adapting weapons of warfare to domestic needs, Forestry Service officials have announced that a new lightweight radio is being used by paratrooper fire fighters for use in the National Forests. Tests made last year revealed the feasibility of dropping a crew of fire fighters from airplanes to put out small fires in inaccessible areas. Radiophones keep the "smoke jumpers" in touch with their pilots.

Airplane flights over Louisiana recently detected cotton boll moths 2,000 feet high. Pilots also spotted cucumber beetles at 3,000 feet and mosquitoes 5,000 feet—nearly a mile. Experimenters said the insects were blown to those heights by the wind.

Modern oil refining methods have doubled the amount of gasoline recoverable from a barrel of crude oil, in effect doubling the size of Texas' vast petroleum reserve.

Food Expert
Gives Tips On
Summer Canning

If homemakers are to have high-quality canned products and reduce spoilage to a minimum there are several problems they need to recognize. The problems are brought on principally by several successive dry years in some portions of the state, according to Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College.

For instance, vegetables produced in a dry year have less moisture content. "This means," Miss Neely points out, "that they will soak up liquid during the canning process. Therefore, lesser packs or use of less food and more liquid in the can, should be the general rule with vegetables during a dry year." Food canned in this way, especially corn and root vegetables, will keep better. The specialist also recommends adding a few minutes to the pre-cooking time of vegetables such as corn, root vegetables, and field peas in excessively dry seasons.

Another suggestion to home canners is that they can all vegetables during the early stages of production; that is, when the vegetables or fruits are in prime conditions for eating and canning.

Time tables for pressure cookers appearing in the Extension Service publication, B-85, "Canning Fruits and Vegetables," which Miss Neely prepared, are those tested and recommended by experiment station laboratories over the nation. These are available free upon request from county home demonstration agents or from the Extension Service headquarters.

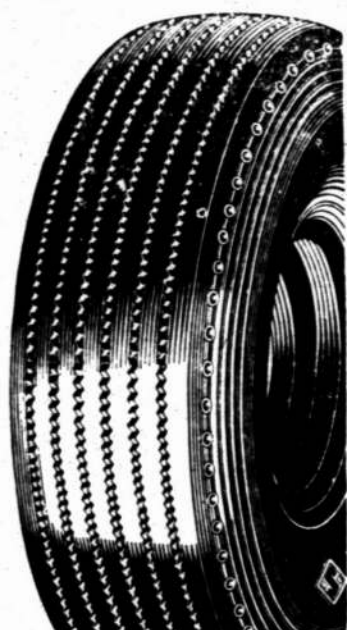

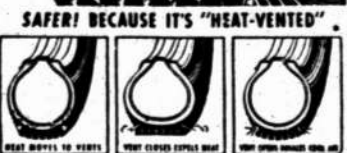

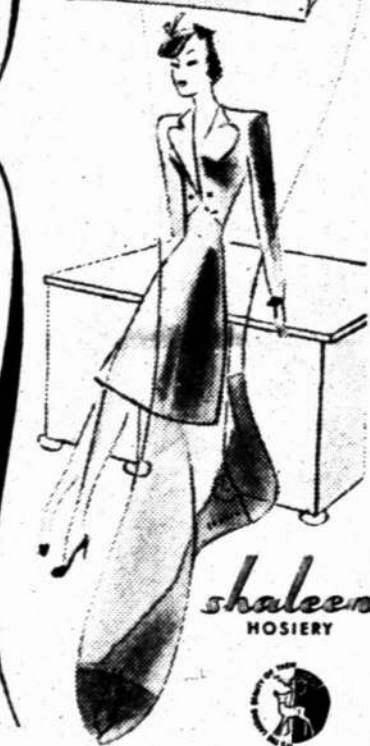

Tin Cans For Theatre Tickets

If you can scrape together a dozen tin cans of any description, you can use them for a new purpose Friday, providing you are not over 14 years of age.

The only condition, according to officials of the Chamber of Commerce, which is staging the clean-up campaign, is that the cans must have been picked up within the city limits.

Doors of the theatre will be opened at 9:30 and the "squawkin'" picture will begin at 10 o'clock. Bring your cans and see a good picture!

Sodium Fluoride Kills Cockroaches

Sodium Fluoride, either pure or mixed with equal parts of flour, is the ticket for killing cockroaches.

Roaches will tackle almost any kind of food and usually pollute several times more than they actually eat. The pests hang out in the kitchen or pantry or other places where food is kept.

For control, dust sodium fluoride in the places frequented by the roaches, especially along the edges of the rooms. The best results will be obtained by use of a dust gun which will force the dust into cracks and crevices.

The insecticide is most effective when applied in the evening, since roaches do not move around much in the day time.

"Sodium fluoride is toxic to man and animals and should not be used where children may get at it," warns Cameron Siddall, entomologist for the Texas A. and M. Extension Service.

"It can be swept out each morning, but I recommend ground pyrethrum in homes where they are small children." Pyrethrum is not poisonous to humans.

The entomologist says commercial sprays are not effective unless the insects are actually hit by the spray.

"Grow A Mattress In 1940" Asked Of Farm Families

"Grow a mattress in 1940."

That's a suggestion farm families in Texas who raise cotton are being asked to adopt by Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home improvement for the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College. Now that cotton has already been planted in practically every section of Texas and harvest will soon begin in Rio Grande Valley areas, she's urging farm families who are short on bedding to save back at least 50 or more pounds of their best clean, long staple cotton to go into a home-made cotton mattress.

Planning in advance to save back this small amount of lint cotton will pay big dividends, for the materials and equipment necessary for making mattresses in the home are quite inexpensive, she says. Principal item is the 10 yards of eight-ounce ticking.

The fact that more than 10,000 mattresses were made in 1939 by home demonstration club women proves that there are plenty of demonstrators and other members who can help their neighbors making mattresses for the first time. In addition, the Department of Agriculture program for helping low-income farm families obtain mattresses is resulting in the training of thousands of potential mattress makers in Texas.

Approval to this and other means of increasing cotton consumption and adding to the comfort of Texas farm families is being given by the 40,000 members of the Texas Home Demonstration Association. In November the Association's Board of Directors recommended that each club woman in 1940 might utilize 50 pounds of cotton in mattresses, towels, quilts, sheets and other cotton articles for home use.

S. C. S. Notes

Row crop land is usually not terraced in the summer time, but J. H. Reese of Lamesa expects to build terraces on his entire 320 acres before harvest time next fall.

For two years Reese has been practicing contour tillage on his farm located five miles southwest of Spangenberg and he claims that the crooked row farming paid big dividends in increased yields of cotton and sorghum crops last year due to the moisture conserved. He is cooperating with the soil conservation CCC camp near Lamesa and has been expecting to terrace the farm for some time, but the rush of work and lack of equipment has prevented his doing so up to date.

This spring heavy rains coming after his crops were planted washed out most of the crops and a severe hail storm finished what was left. Although the land was contour tilled, the lister ridges had been worked down in planting operations and the contour furrows by them selves could not hold the heavy spring rains. Hence, most of the crops were washed out. Reese believes that terraces are the solution to this problem.

The Reese farm lies along Sulphur draw on land that has a slope of one to four per cent. The farm has been in cultivation several years and has suffered moderate erosion by both wind and water and in some fields a few gullies are beginning to appear.

Realizing that soil and water conservation practices are necessary not only to increase his crop yields, but also to save the farm from eventual destruction, Reese began cooperation with the CCC camp at Lamesa last year in an effort to install a complete conservation program on the entire farm.

Since Reese does not have a crop on most of his land at the present time he figures this summer is a good time to get his terraces built.

"Take Off" Instead of "Forward March" at Randolph



Early morning scene at Randolph Field, Texas, the "West Point of the Air," as the 500 Flying Cadets, soon to be full-fledged military pilots in the Army Air Corps, march to their planes for the daily flying routine.

Half of these pilots are scheduled to complete their second phase of training at Randolph Field about June 15. Ahead of them lies a final ten weeks course of advanced flying at Kelly Field before they are awarded their wings.

Two more training centers, comprising both basic and advanced flight training, soon will be opened to aid in the training of 7000 pilots annually, the Air Corps' present expansion plan.

NYA Projects To Give Further Employment

A wide variety of work experience and training will be offered boys and girls working on National Youth Administration projects in the Lubbock District during the next fiscal year which starts July 1, according to A. W. Bullock, District Director. Plans have been made to have projects to employ at least eight hundred boys and girls in the twenty-four counties in this district, Bullock said. The projects will include Resident Training Centers for both boys and girls. Home-

making crafts projects for girls, both woodwork and metal work and machine shop projects for boys, clerical projects and a number of construction projects.

All projects have been planned so as to give the youth job training and work experience to fit him for private employment.

At present one full time Resident Center is being operated for fifty boys sponsored by Texas Tech. Two part time Resident Centers for girls being operated give home making training to sixty-eight girls. The projects located in Anson and Lubbock Homemaking crafts projects are being operated in Lubbock, Crosbyton and Pecos. Other projects are being planned for Plainview, Lamesa and other towns in the district.
