### Schwiening Baby Buried Thursday

Final rites for George Sutton Schwiening, Jr., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Schwiening, were held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock from the Alfred Schwiening residence. The Rev. Stanley F. Hauser, officiated. Interment was in the Sonora Cemetery.

The baby became ill Tuesday afternoon and was rushed to a San Angelo hospital about 7:30 o'clock that night when his condition suddenly became worse. Death came about 9:30 o'clock.

Born September 18, 1947, the infant is survived by the parents, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Storms of Fort Hancock and Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Schwiening. Pallbearers were the uncles, Curt, Harold and Alfred Schwiening, Jr., Ralph Jones, Dayton Cain and N. J. Moore.

### Former Sutton Rancher Buried Here Sunday

Fountain Tolbert (Fount) Mayfield, former Sutton County ranchman, who died at his home in Del Rio Saturday, was buried in the Sonora Cemetery Sunday afternoon.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Doran Chapel in Del Rio and graveside services were held here at 5 o'clock.

Survivors include a son, John Thomas Mayfield, and three grandchildren. His wife, the former Beulah Brewton, died in 1907. He was a cousin of Ed C. Mayfield of Sonora.

F. T. Mayfield was born in Bosque County Jan. 12, 1877, a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Mayfield, both natives of Texas. He was reared on his father's ranch in Bosque County and attended school at Valley Mills, near his home.

As a schoolboy he spent his summers on his father's ranch and on leaving school operated the elder Mayfield's ranch in Sutton County. He later leased a ranch on North Llano, where he ran cattle and some horses for three years. After a return to the Mayfield-Allison ranch in Sutton County he bought what became his headquarters ranch in Val Verde County.

He entered the sheep business when he bought the ranch in 1910. He ran some cattle up until 1928 when he sold off all but a few head. It was in 1912 that he entered the goat business.

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### Murray Seeks Aid For Butane Users

Railroad Commissioner William J. (Bill) Murray, above, is pleading in Washington for larger allocations of steel with which to prevent another butane shortage next winter.

Testifying before a joint meeting of the U.S. Senate's Small Business Committee and the steel industry's advisory council, Murray, a graduate petroleum engineer, said "People in Texas will be cold again next winter unless we get more steel with which to store butane during summer months."

Murray's appearance before the steel conference last week was in answer to an urgent invitation for Texas representation at the hearing sent to Gov. Jester by Sen. Kenneth Wherry, senate committee chairman.

### Executive Body Picks Chairmen For Convention

### Barkley Named Keynoter, Rayburn Commended

In recognition of their long and valiant service to the Democratic Party and to the nation as a whole, Senator Alben W. Barkley, of Kentucky, and Representative Sam Rayburn, of Texas, minority leaders of the Senate and House, respectively, have been named unanimously to fill key posts at the Democratic National Convention, convening in Philadelphia at 2 P.M., Monday, July 12.

The party executive committee, meeting in Philadelphia recently, elected Senator Barkley as temporary chairman and keynoter and commended Representative Rayburn to the convention as permanent chairman.

Representative Mary Norton, of New Jersey, was commended to the convention as chairman of the credentials committee, a more important post than ever before held by a woman. Commendation by the executive committee is usually tantamount to election by the convention.

The executive committee authorized Senator J. Howard McGrath, of Rhode Island, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, to select a temporary committee to begin the preparation of a platform, draft. It also authorized Senator McGrath to make other necessary convention arrangements.

### Building Permits Continue Rise

Texas building permits eased fractionally upward from March to April, the Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index rose 22 per cent from March to 674 per cent of the pre-war base (1935-39) period. Compared to April 1947, buildings permits jumped 86 per cent.

Substantial March-to-April gains were turned in by Brownville, Cleburne, Denton, Longview, Texas City, Gainesville, Lockhart, and Nacogdoches. On the other hand, building permits fell below March levels in Amarillo, Big Spring, Gladewater, Graham, Kenedy, McAllen, Lamesa, Snyder and Palestine.

Del Rio, Texas City, Pampa, Coleman, Wichita Falls, Childress, and Longview showed outstanding

increases over April 1947. Over-the-year declines were registered by Jacksonville, Kerrville, McAllen, Snyder and Lamesa.

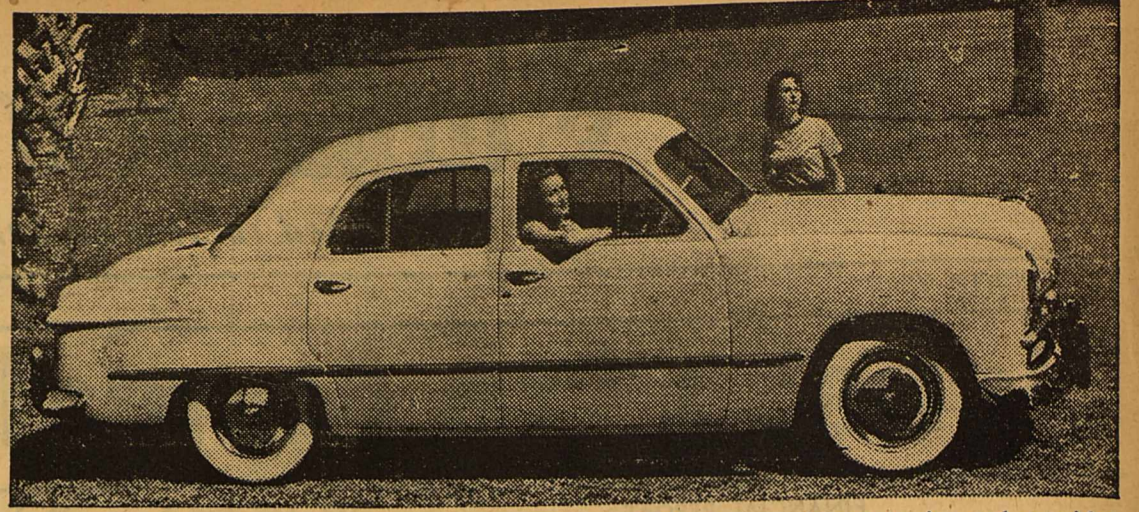

### War Assets Adm. Surplus Sales News

A long-standing priority, that of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, has been removed from future disposals of surplus property. Heretofore, the RFC had preference rights in the purchase for resale to small business just under World War II veterans in all personal property sales and below government agencies in disposals of real property. In recent months this priority group has been active in securing camp buildings and other real property from War Assets Administration for resale. But Congress' new RFC act, passed May 25, 1948, repeals this agency's authority to function in the surplus property activities. However, War Assets Administration will continue to encourage the development of small business and will

maintain the present priority accorded to dealers and businessmen who are World War II veterans. The latter part of June, during which the WAA southwestern region will lose more than a fourth of its present working force, will also be marked by a number of small sales of war surplus to veterans and other buyers. Because of WAA's rush to finish these disposals before it loses some of its sales people, customary advance notice to the public may not always be given. Local newspapers, however, will be advised of the sales several days in advance. Additional information will also be furnished by contacting the WAA Customer Service, Center, Grand Prairie, Texas.

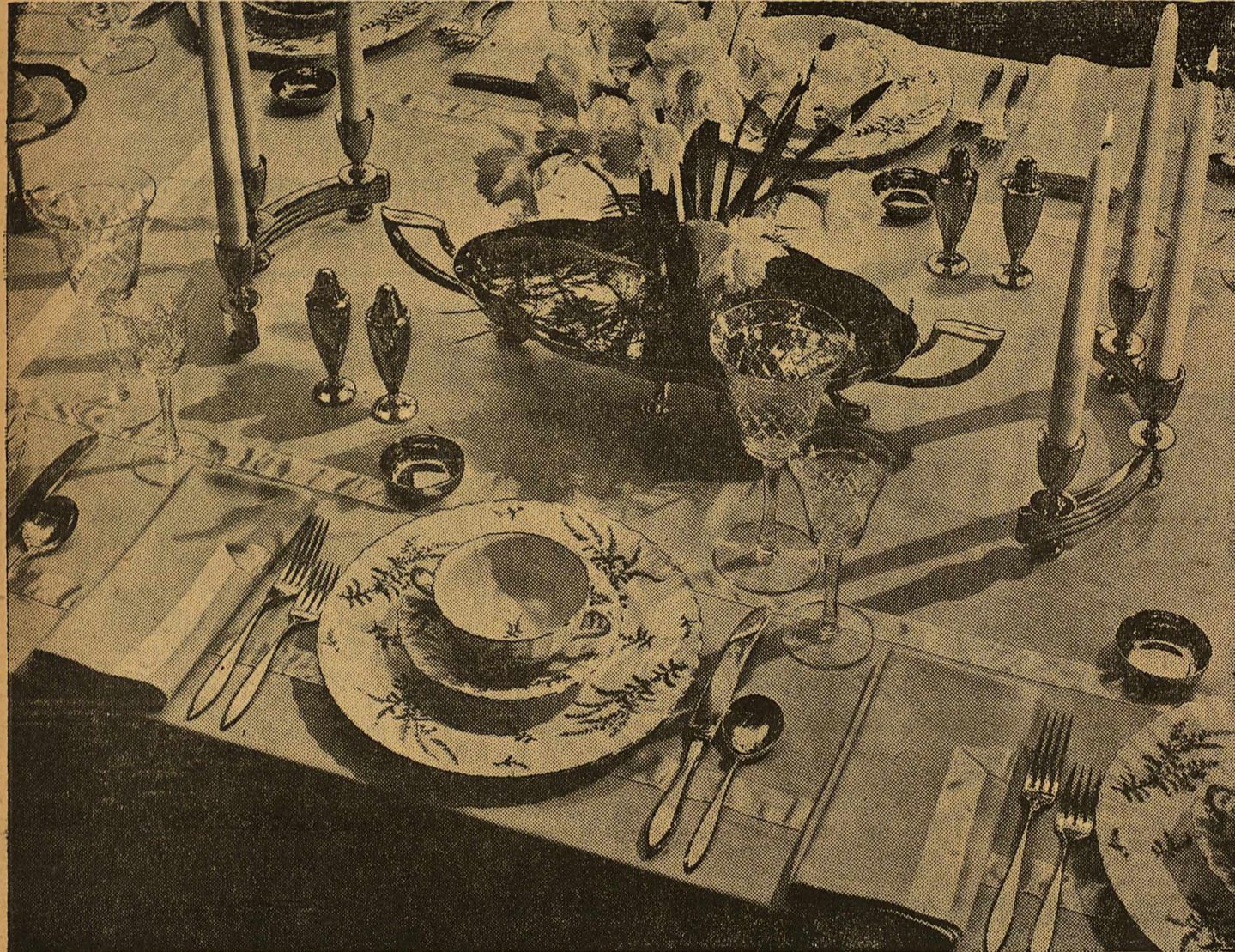

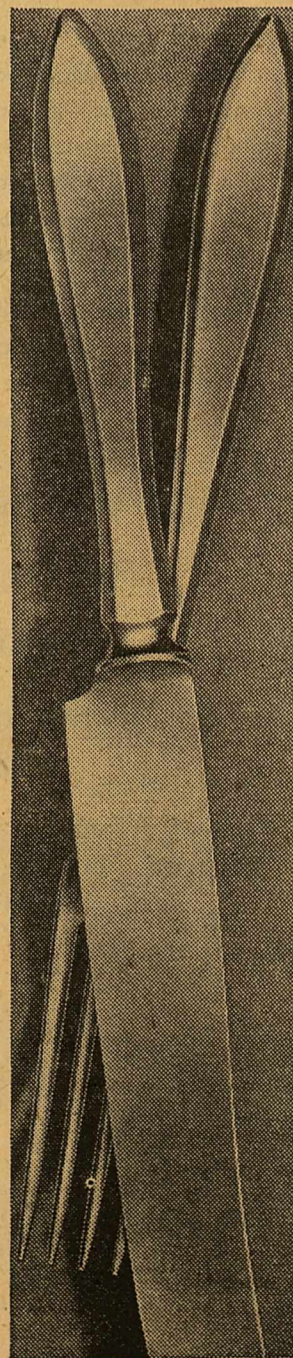

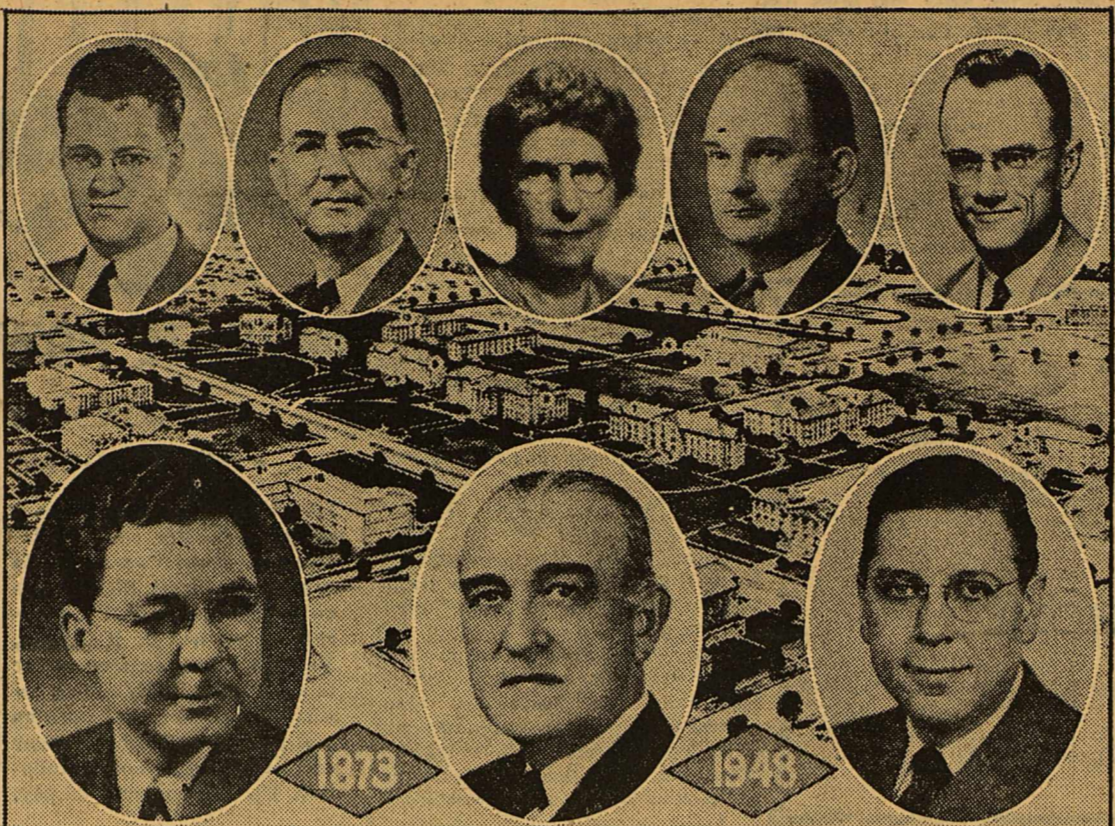
Mrs. Tipton and daughter were to have sailed April 16, but due to the international situation her trip was canceled. The ship left at that time, but with less than half the original passenger list.

### WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

**Preparedness Advances**  
On the heels of a warning from General Omar Bradley that there is a "plausible possibility" of war with Russia, the House last week appropriated \$6½ billion to operate an expanded Army and Air Force in the fiscal year 1949. This brings the total 1949 defense costs to \$13.3 billion, since Congress already has granted \$3.2 billion extra for Air Force and Navy plane procurement.

General Bradley pointed out the Soviets have an armed force of 4,000,000 men and 14,000 planes. This, he said, provides an iron fist for the aggressive policies of Moscow and presents an alarming menace to the security of the United States.

Secretary of Navy Sullivan disclosed that the Russian navy potential includes more than 250 submarines, which is five times greater than that of Germany at the start of the recent war.

It is believed this stepping-up of American strength will be a strong deterrent to Russia ambitions and is the best possible insurance against war.

**"If We Had Been Prepared"**  
A letter from Mr. Fritz Sageser of Harper is in point. He scorns the shortsightedness of the isolationists who opposed preparedness before the war and speaks as a father who lost a gallant son during the landing on New Guinea.

"Now I know from experience if we had been prepared my boy would not have been killed out there," he writes me.

— The only way to keep

peace is to keep a strong navy, airforce, etc., more than competes with any other nation. And I further say that money can never buy lives back again... Now, for God's sake," he concludes, "be prepared. That is the only thing to keep the peace."

**Texas Looks Good**  
Taking advantage of a slack period, I was recently able to get away from Washington for a few days and visit in the district for the first time since Christmas. It is always inspiring to do that and have a chance to talk with some of the folks and inhale some good old Texas air.

At Uvalde I addressed a convention of Home Demonstration clubs and was able to go to Rocksprings and speak at the charter night of the Lions Club. Good rains have fallen there and the country looks fine.

My friends at Brackettville invited me over, and I met with a delegation on REA business and also spoke to the Rotary Club. I was to accept invitations to address high school commencement programs at Leahey, Sabinal, London and San Saba. I was also on the program of the 21st district postmasters convention at Del Rio. My sincere regret was that due to shortage of time I was unable to respond to other invitations.

I have promised to return to the district this week-end and speak to the Directors' meeting of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association on June 11 at Uvalde, and will stop over at Lometa for a Ladies Night event of the Lions Club there.

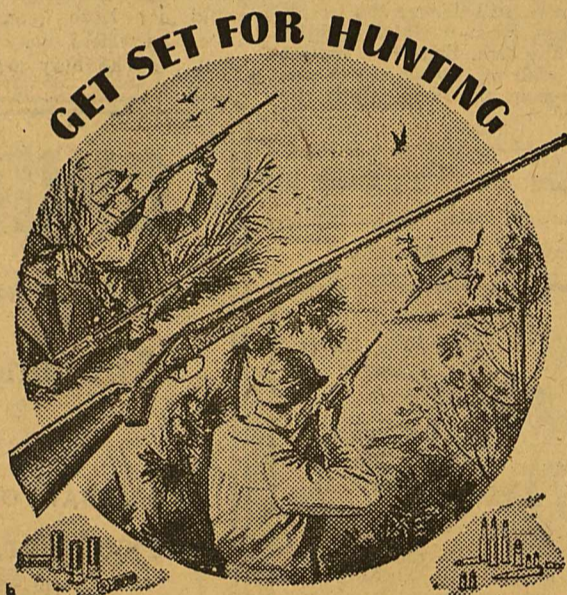

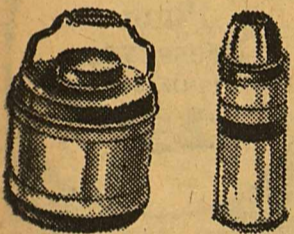

## YOUR HEALTH

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint."

"The chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk; water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the babies formula; and improper amount of food," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formula for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanliness and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule, since their stomach and bowels can be easily upset if fed irregularly or whenever they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and said every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develop, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called, 'summer complaint' can be a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

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## SWING OF SOUTHWEST MARKETS

Most farm products brought steady to strong prices at southwest markets last week, except for wheat and milo losses, reports USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

This week's sheep and lamb trading opened on the same firm basis as set last week at southwest markets. Spring lambs made the sharpest gains. Prices ranged from \$28.50 to \$29.50 for top grades. Medium to good shorn ewes brought anywhere from \$10.50 to \$11.25 at San Antonio to \$11.50 to \$11.75 at Denver.

Except for occasional weak spots on lower grade cattle and stockers, southwest markets reported steady to strong prices for slaughter classes so far this June. Light receipts last week were just about half as large as for the same period last year, but Monday's run was heavy. Good demand took common and medium cows around \$17 to \$21.50 at Texas markets, while medium and good cows ranged from \$22 to \$24.50 in Oklahoma, Colorado and Kansas.

Heifers reached an all-time high at \$33.25 at Denver.

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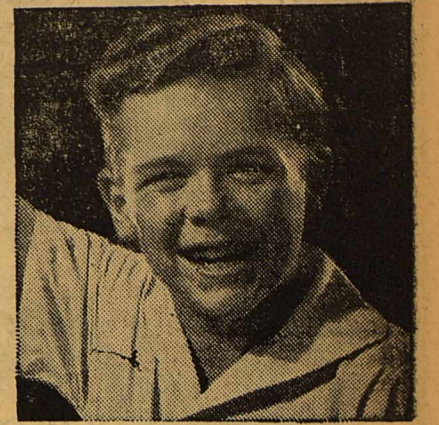
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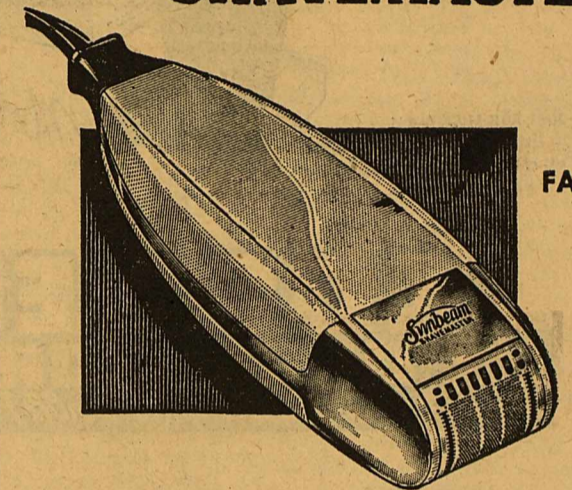
