WILSON STARTS BURIAL ASS'N.

LOW COST BURIAL INSURANCE TO BE PROVIDED PEOPLE OF THIS AREA UNDER NEW PLAN

Announcement is made this week of the founding of the Wilson Burial Association with headquarters in Perryton. The Association, which will serve members residing in Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Hansford counties in Texas and the Oklahoma Panhandle, has been organized by Mr. and Mrs. G. R. Wilson, owners of the Wilson Funeral Homes in Perryton, Spearman and Booker. Mr. Wilson is president of the Association and Mrs. Wilson is secretary-treasurer.

Mr. Wilson states that representatives of the Association will start today on a thorough canvass of the area to be served in a sincere effort to explain the rules and regulations under which this low cost burial insurance is obtainable and to give an opportunity to those who are eligible to apply for membership.

Under the plan of operation announced by the Association, there will be no initiation or membership fee. Dues have been set at a very low rate when compared with the benefits. The dues range as low as twenty cents quarterly for a \$50 benefit. The greater part of the membership will probably be interested in the \$150 benefit for ages six to 50 years costing only fifty cents every three months or \$2.00 annually.

The Association will be operated under a ruling of the Supreme Court of Texas. All the funds of the Association are handled by the Secretary-Treasurer who is bonded.

County Agent Makes Annual Report on Work in County

In making an annual report of work done for the past year by County Agent E. W. Thomas, plans for 1939 call for much more time to be spent in the field by the agent than appeared desirable or possible during 1938 according to Mr. Thomas. With allotments definitely established for individual farms, and the measurement of wheat lands already accomplished, the minimum of the agent's time should be required attending to the AAA Program. Particular emphasis is expected to be placed on Boys' 4H Club work, which became fairly well established in 1938. A large number of boys already have their demonstrations with beef calves, swine and sheep well started for the year. A Club show is planned prior to the Amarillo Fat Stock show. Three 4H Clubs have been reorganized with regular meeting dates.

The whole farm demonstrations which made some progress this year are expected to be much better organized with complete inventories and records carried on throughout the year.

As a result of sheep feeding demonstrations completed or now in progress, greatly increased interest is expected in feeding lambs on stubble and wheat pasture.

Due to the fact that the wheat acreage must be greatly reduced in order to comply with the Farm Program, an increase in barley oats and grain sorghum is expected, and provision must be made for the disposal of these crops which will be logically through feeding livestock. Use of the trench silo is expected to be increased. Very little feed was available in Ochiltree county for silos due to the fact that feed from conserving land could not be used.

Indications point to the fact that grasshopper control will require considerable attention in 1939.

An entirely new demonstration activity will be the organization of wild life and game management area of Wolf Creek. The preliminary steps for setting up the area have already been taken.

The summary of the work done by the County Agent's office in 1938 follows:

Agricultural Engineering: 45,000 acres of land contour summer fallow, 53,694 acres of wheat sown on contour, 4,593 acres of row crops were planted on contour. Twenty seven dams with a yardage of 27,965 cubic yards were constructed.

Pasture work: Deferred grazing was carried out on 26,043 acres, 2,129 acres of pasture land was contour furrowed, and cactus was out on 7,272 acres.

Poultry: Eleven club members at the completed demonstrations. Feeding and disease control information was given to a large number of farmers.

Beef cattle: Feeding by club boys was started. One calf was shown in Amarillo and five calves are being fed for 1939 spring shows.

Obituary: Minnie Bell Johnson was born September 22, 1869, at Montezuma, Iowa, and departed this life December 29 after a sudden illness at the home of her son Lloyd Cowan of Gray, Okla., at the age of 69 years, 2 months and 23 days.

Her early years were spent in Iowa and Nebraska, where in November of 1888 at Grand Island she was united in marriage to John A. Cowan. To this union was born three children, the eldest son, Arthur deceased.

TO ERECT NEW CCC BUILDING

MATERIAL RECEIVED AT LOCAL CAMP FOR A WOODWORK SHOP FOR USE IN EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

Company 2874, CCC, Perryton, will have a new building for the woodwork shop. Captain G. W. Coffman Jr., commanding officer of the camp, states that the material for this building is here and construction will probably start within the next month.

The machinery and equipment used in the woodwork classes, now located in the educational building, will be moved and installed in this new 20x40 room. This entire building will be used in the school program and for the benefit of enrollees studying woodcraft. Also the removal of the machinery from the educational building will make another class room available.

As part of a continuous improvement program, Captain Coffman is now directing the erection of a 16x20 addition to the bathroom. This room will be used by the enrollees as a laundry room. Plans are being made to install washing machines and other equipment to aid the enrollees in laundering their clothes.

CELEBRATE ON 98TH BIRTHDAY

JACKSON SEARCY OF BEAVER OBSERVES 98TH BIRTHDAY WITH A PARTY ON DECEMBER 22

Jackson C. Searcy, one of the oldest men in the northwest part of Oklahoma, celebrated his 98th birthday Thursday surrounded by friends and relatives who came to spend the day with him. A large dinner was served to the guests at noon after which old-time music was furnished by Mrs. Cecil Cook, Mrs. Elmer Searcy and Jasper Holms.

Jackson was born in Marion County, Illinois, December 22, 1840. After several years the Searcy family moved to Davies County, Missouri where Jackson grew to manhood. He joined the Missouri militia in 1861 and later joined the U. S. regular army and saw service in several skirmishes along the Mississippi river.

Jackson has been a member of the Masonic order since he was initiated into the lodge in Missouri in 1881 and is a member of the Beaver lodge. He attended the regular meeting of the lodge last Thursday night, further celebrating his 98th birthday. He had to be carried up the steps but he enjoyed meeting with the lodge and visiting his old friends in the order. The Beaver lodge presented him with a gift, an appreciation of his friendship and loyalty to the order.

Jackson's wife died in 1923 after they had moved to Beaver from the Logan neighborhood where he settled when he came to this country in 1908. Two daughters preceded the mother in death. Seven sons are still living.

Jackson has a total of 134 direct descendants. If your membership is not in good standing, it will be wise to pay your dues at once thus making you eligible for service as the next \$75.00 a week president. If the first president elected Saturday is ineligible to serve, then elections will be held until an eligible president is elected. This president will be paid a \$25.00 salary.
