Enrollment Shows 45 Per Cent Increase

Records show that 437 are now enrolled in the entire school, while the enrollment of the high school is 67. New pupils are enrolling every day.

Miss Tucker Inspects the Crane Home Economics Department

That the Home Economics department of the Crane High school will compare favorably with that of other schools was the statement made by Miss Clara Tucker, of the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas, when she inspected the home economics department recently. Miss Tucker stated that the clothing laboratory was above par, and that with a few changes in arrangement and the addition of some new equipment, the foods laboratory will be the equal of that of other schools.

Miss Tucker complimented the work that is being done in home economics in the school, under the direction of Miss Dudley Ben Hambricht, home economics instructor. She said that she was especially pleased with the interest shown by the pupils.

The home economics suite is composed of four rooms: the clothing laboratory, the foods laboratory, the dining room, and the supply room.

The clothing laboratory equipment consists of three Singer machines, three oak cutting tables, one screen, one display cabinet, and one full length triple mirror.

The equipment in the foods laboratory consists of two hotpoint electric ranges, one large supply cabinet, three sinks, one lavatory and three small work tables. Miss Tucker suggested that many adjustments in the arrangement of the furniture be made in the foods laboratory. She suggested, also, that some new equipment be bought.

The furniture in the dining room at present consists of one dining table with six chairs. Mr. Bankston states, however, that extensive improvements are to be made in the dining room soon.

The supply room contains the hotpoint electric water heater, and serves as a store room for the china, silver, linens, and cooking utensils.

Two classes in home economics are taught. A senior high school class and a junior high school class. The classes are studying clothing this term. They will take up foods at the beginning of the next term.

Board Purchases New Stage Equipment

Another step forward was taken by the Crane Public Schools when the board of trustees in a regular meeting on October 25, purchased from the Great Western Stage Equipment Company, of Kansas City, Mo., an entirely new set of stage equipment.

The equipment will be installed on or before November 20.

The equipment consists of a purple velvet curtain with a velvet valance edge with gold fringe and bearing the monogram C. H. S., a complete operating equipment, one grand border, two tormentor wings with flipper doors, two neutral borders, one wood drop, four wood wings, one interior modern box setting of nine pieces, and one folio drop.

District Home Eco. Conference Holds Meeting in Odessa

Miss Peak and Miss Tucker are Principal Speakers

The problems in home economics and how to apply them to the needs of the individual, the development of an all-around high school girl, and the development of proper ideals and habits of home economics pupils were among the things discussed at the district Home Economics Conference held at Odessa on October 25 and 26, says Miss Dudley Ben Hambricht, home economics instructor.

Miss Lillian Peek, state home economics supervisor, and Miss Clara Tucker, supervisor of teacher training in home economics at the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, Texas, were the principal speakers at the conference. Teachers from McCamey, Rankin, Big Spring, Ft. Stockton, Crane, Odessa, Wink, and Midland engaged in round table discussions of their teaching problems.

Entertainment during the conference was provided by the Odessa High school, and the citizens of Odessa. Members of the Home Economics club of the Odessa High school met the trains and busses, and escorted the teachers to the hotels. A luncheon for the teachers and superintendents was held on Thursday in the home economics dining room of the Odessa high school. Miss Tucker and Miss Peek were honor guests at this luncheon. In the evening of October 25, the Odessa Chamber of Commerce entertained the teachers with a cowboy supper. All teachers were given free passes to the show and furnished free transportation during their stay in Odessa.

The conference was both inspirational and beneficial, Miss Hambricht states.

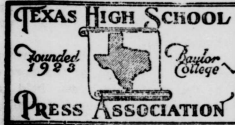

GRADES INSTITUTE HEALTH PROGRAM

All that is possible is being done in the grade school to make the children strong in body as well as in mind. The daily program of every room contains a health period of twenty minutes or more in which the simple health habits are stressed. Health lessons presented through song, story and play cause the children to form habits of personal cleanliness and neatness, which they will carry through life. Various health clubs in the grades have presented interesting health programs recently.

Children Are Weighed

The children in the first grade of Miss Harris' room have been weighed. After a careful check up on those weighed it was found that twenty-two of them were underweight, three normal, and four overweight. A plan for providing milk for a mid-morning lunch for the underweight children is being considered by the P. T. A. This plan is sponsored by the home economics pupils of the high school.

The first grade pupils of Miss Mable Smith's room have been weighed and seven children were underweight, none overweight, and twenty-two normal weight. The weights of the pupils of Miss Anderson's room show three overweight, thirteen underweight, and ten normal.

Fight Being Made Against Candy
The second grade children of Mrs. Miller's room are having a contest to determine what pupils maintain the standards of "five point children." The five point child is clean, has good food, drinks milk, chews no gum, and eats good candy if any. A fight against cheap candy is being made in the primary grades. This was discussed in a regular meeting of the P. T. A. recently and every parent pledged his support to the "no cheap candy" movement.

The pupils of the second grade in Miss Cox's room have been weighed and it has been found that out of twenty-four weighed, twelve were normal, three overweight and nine underweight.

The weights of Mrs. Miller's room show one overweight, twenty underweight, and seventeen normal.

The health program in section three consists of an investigation of hands, teeth, and a report on how much milk each has drunk and how many vegetables have been eaten during the day. A star is given as a reward.

Third and Fourth Grades Organize Health Clubs

The third and fourth grades of Mrs. Agnew's room have organized a combined health and English club called the "Talk Right and Live Right club." Officers of this club are: President, Bobby Freeman; Secretary and health officer, Mildred Still. Critics appointed by the president were: George Dearman, R. V. Wilson; health officers were Allen Gerdis, Charlie Hartwell, and Smithy Jay Townsend. Their first program was given Friday afternoon, October 24, at which time the third grade presented a playlet, "The Barber of Bagdad." Other stories and health talks were given.

The two grades are having a rival journey across the "Sea of Good English," one traveling in a zeppelin and the other in an airplane. Each error detains the journey so many miles.

School Hopes to Secure Nurse
After a thorough investigation of the health situation in the Crane

schools it has been found that the field is ripe for the work of a Red Cross nurse. Our superintendent, J. H. Bankston, says "In all probability we shall have a Red Cross nurse the first four weeks before Christmas. She will work with Crane and Crane county. She will make a physical examination of all children and do all she can in the time she will be here to improve nutrition."
