ITALIAN GREECE WAR THREATENED

100 New Witnesses In Ross-Good Case

IN ADDITION TO THOSE USED IN THE LAST TRIAL

CASE SET FOR SEPT TENTH AND KEEN INTEREST IS MANIFEST

ABILENE, Aug. 30. One hundred new witnesses, who were not used in the trial of the cases of Ross and Milt Good, which are set for hearing in the district court of Taylor county at Abilene on September 10th, have been subpoenaed by the defense in the trial of Tom Ross and Milt Good, which are set for hearing in the district court of Taylor county at Abilene on September 10th.

Ross and Good, well known Garza county cowboys, will be tried here on a charge of murder growing out of the killing of H. L. Robertson, cattle inspector at Seminole last April. The two men were tried at Lubbock for the killing of W. L. Allison, Robertson's partner. Ross was given 35 years and Good 25 years in that case. The slaying of Robertson and Allison, and the subsequent trial of the case at Lubbock attracted wide attention. The cases against Ross and Good charged with the killing of Robertson were transferred from Lubbock to Abilene for trial.

J. F. Cunningham, one of the counsel for defense, stated that the celebrated law firm of Scott & M. Lean of Fort Worth, had been added to the defense counsel. Between 400 and 500 witnesses will be summoned in these cases, it is expected. In addition, fully 1,000 other persons, including some of West Texas most prominent citizens, will be in Abilene during the trial as spectators.

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 30. The city's "Little Italy" is being scoured by the police forces today for Joe Bendezi, wanted for questioning in connection with the killing of Mrs. Lillian McGlone and chum, Miss Emma Vaccaro. The bodies of the two women were found in Mrs. McGlone's apartment. Her husband is athletic director at a college here, and is out of the city part of his time. Mrs. McGlone is a nurse, and once cared for Bendezi, and he became infatuated with her, according to information given by the police department. He attempted to continue his relations after her marriage to McGlone, and it is expected that he attempted to attack her.

MONEY FOUND BY HOUSER MAY BE BERGDOLL'S

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. The money found by Lee Houser, prominent near Agrestown, Md., is Grover Bergdoll's hidden treasure, is the belief of Thomas C. Wall, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who is now investigating the report. It is said that inquiry will be continued with a view to seizure of the money of proof that it was owned by Bergdoll.

KANSAS CATTLE RECEIPTS BREAK ALL RECORDS

CALLING IN OF LOANS AND CONTINUED DRY WEATHER IS CAUSE

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 29. Calling in of cattle loans by bankers and the continued dry weather in the Southwest is causing sockmen to flood the stockyards with beef cattle. More than 94,000 head were received in the yards here since Monday. The total receipts for Monday and Tuesday were reported as 79,000 the highest in the history of the stock yards. On Monday 51,580 head of cattle from Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma, received the largest number of cattle ever received in any yard in the world in one day. Despite the heavy receipts the prices held up well there, being a drop of only an average of 25c per hundred pounds from last week. Feeders are being snapped up quickly by eastern stockmen.

STARTS PENNANT FUND OF \$5,000 OR MORE

FORT WORTH, Texas, Aug. 30. (United Press).—So confident are local fans that Fort Worth is going to win the Texas League flag they have started a pennant fund with an ultimate goal of \$5,000. If the Cats fail to cop the bunting the money will be returned to contributors. If they win, the players will split the amount.

ENGLAND FACES DANGER OF A NEW CONFLICT

LONDON, Aug. 30. "Europe is suddenly confronted by grave and imminent danger of a new war," according to the Evening Star commenting upon British opinion of the crisis precipitated by Italy's twenty-four hour ultimatum to Greece demanding redress for the assassination of five Italian members of the Albanian frontier commission. Britain was startled by the suddenness of Premier Mussolini's drastic action. The press emphasized the gravity of the situation by commenting on it that it followed the Andalus ultimatum to Sibiria in 1914.

The Daily News denounces Mussolini's action and declared that "Italy is in a position to make a mistake which will cost her dearly." It says that the League of Nations is the only body that can prevent Italy from doing this. "If the League fails, it fails badly," said the News.

YOUNG MOTHER KILLED WHEN SHE FELL UNDER CAR WHEELS

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 29. The tragic life of Miss Violet Kashok ended in tragedy today when the nineteen year old daughter of two children died after being run over by a car. She had been severed from her body when she fell under a moving train. She had been driven by adversity to attempt to reach relatives in Wyoming. When she was married to a Russian, who she said deserted her to return to his native land after two children had been born to them. Unable to get work she decided she would go to her brother in Wyoming who could assist her. She had no money to buy a ticket, and went to the railroad yards and attempted to board a freight train, when her hand slipped and she fell under the wheels. She died in the hospital before she was able to give the address of the relatives in Wyoming.

HARDING'S DEATH CAUSED BY TOTAL ABSTINANCE SAYS PENN. GOV.

LONDON, Aug. 30. Harding's death was accelerated by the fact that he thought it his duty to abstain from his custom of an occasional drink of Scotch, says Governor Sproul, of Pennsylvania in an interview published in the London Evening Star. "I think President Harding's death was accelerated by the fact he thought it his duty, because of prohibition, to set a public example and abstain from his occasional drink of Scotch," he said. The strain of the Alaskan trip told on Mr. Harding who refused to take any stimulant at all.

WEST MAN KILLS WIFE AND ATTEMPTS LIFE OF MOTHER-IN-LAW

FORT WORTH, Aug. 29. Entering the home of his mother-in-law, Mrs. A. B. Miller, of Seminary Hill, in the outskirts of Fort Worth, Clifford Donald, 35, farmer of West Texas, yesterday afternoon fired a shot into the body of his wife, Ruby Kate Donald, killing her instantly. He then turned the revolver on his mother in law, firing one shot at her which physicians say probably will prove fatal. He then went into the yard and fired a third shot into his head, ending a few moments later while en route to the hospital.

Donald's wife has been making her home with her mother for the last few weeks. While her husband remained in West Texas. He arrived here this afternoon, he went directly to the home of his mother-in-law and the shooting followed ten minutes later. Mrs. Miller is the only surviving eye-witness of the shooting and her condition would not permit the taking of a statement by the district attorney.

HENRY L. WHITFIELD WILL BE GOVERNOR OF MISS. NEXT TERM.

JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 30. Henry L. Whitfield, prominent educator of this state, will be the next governor of Mississippi according to the returns of the election held Tuesday. Only a few precincts of minor importance are yet to be heard from and his lead over his opponent seems to be about 16,000.

MOTHER SHOT SON TO KEEP HIM FROM BECOMING A BANDIT

CHICAGO, Aug. 30. Dezzo Smith, age nineteen, was shot by his mother to keep him from becoming a bandit, was learned from him today as he groaned restlessly on a cot in a hospital and pleads that the police "make Mamma out of that place." His mother is at the police station. "I had nothing against her, but I didn't want to work at a cheap thirty dollar a week job." His mother at the police station said. "He would not work, just loafed. Yesterday I tried to get him to look for a job, but he just laughed and told me if I persisted in trying to get money from him, he would go out and steal. What then could I do? I had a gun and it went off. I'm sorry that the boy was shot."

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. "Kid" Draper, age thirty-five, notorious gangster, was shot to death outside the chief magistrate's office during the fact that a shooting in the clock tower building, which started two killed him. Kid Draper was a notorious gangster who would kill him.

MINER LEADERS ARE UNFAVORABLE TO PLANS

HARRISBURG, Pa. Aug. 30.

An agreement was concluded between the mine union leaders and operator representatives, placing the maintenance of the mines on an eight hour day basis, thus assuring protection of the mines in event of a strike. The operators look with disfavor on certain phases of Governor Pinchot's proposal. Some are strongly opposed to a "complete recognition of the union against which they fought four years. The operators will not make a public statement however, of their sentiment until tomorrow. Both sides are caucusing on the proposal.

DIRECTOR OF U. S. MINT AT SAN ANTONIO HAS RESIGNED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30. Howard Scooby, of San Antonio, director of the United States mint has resigned, effective October 1st. Scooby was a close friend of the late president Harding, and gave as his reason for resigning, that he came in with Harding and wanted to go out with him.

"COOLIDGE LUCK" MAY KEEP HIRAM JOHNSON OUT OF RACE

OMAHA, Aug. 29. "Coolidge Luck" may keep Hiram Johnson out of the Presidential race, Johnson intimated when he said that "Coolidge is the luckiest man in public life." Johnson said that he expected Coolidge to do something between now and the convention that would make it useless for anyone to run against him.

Crown Prince Frederick William May Be Permitted To Return

BERLIN, Aug. 30. The National Prussian Government has agreed "in principle" to sign a permit for Crown Prince Frederick William to return to Germany. It was learned from reliable sources here today. If the final attempted permit is completed, William must guarantee to remain on his estate if permitted to return, and refrain from mixing in politics, it was stated.

J. H. WEST ARRESTED ON THE CHARGE OF UNLAWFUL USE OF MAILS

HOUSTON, Aug. 30. J. H. West was arrested today following his indictment on a charge of using the mails to defraud, in connection with the sale of oil stock. He was released on a \$10,000 bond. William Davis, West's secretary was arrested on a similar charge and released on a \$2,500 bond.

BATTLESHIPS ORDERED CLEARED FOR IMMEDIATE ACTION AND WAR CLOUDS HANG LOW OVER ATHENS

The Assassination Of A Number Of Italians Will Be Laid At Feet Of The Grecian Government

(Special Correspondent For United Press)

LONDON, Aug. 30. Milan dispatch to the Evening News states that the Italian fleet at Taranto was ordered to clear for action as a movement against Greece, which might occur at any time.

War between Greece and Italy can be avoided only by the acceptance by the Greek Government of the principal terms of the Italian ultimatum. Greece is in no position to wage a successful conflict against Italy and it is probable that Athens will satisfy the Italian demands should war result.

CONE JOHNSON UNDERGOES SERIOUS OPERATION

FORT WORTH, Aug. 29. Cone Johnson, widely known in State Democratic politics, underwent a successful operation at a Sanatorium here this morning after a long illness. Physicians believe that he will now fully recover from his illness.

STATE SEEMS TO REVOKE CHARTER OF HUMBLE OIL COMPANY

HOUSTON, Aug. 29. Admission that the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey owns more than fifty percent of the stock of the Humble Oil Company, was made by officials of the Humble Company in a statement in the anti-trust suit filed against them by the Attorney General. W. S. Parish, president of the Humble Company said in his opinion, ownership of Humble stock by the Standard was entirely legal. The attorney general's office has been aware of the purchase of the stock by the Standard, and the suit seeks to revoke the charter of the Humble Company based on the contention that the ownership of a majority of the stock is owned by the Standard, was illegal and was outlawed in Texas in 1913, as a violation of the anti-trust laws.

SCIENCE LOST TO ABNORMALITIES IN STRANGE COLUMBUS CASE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 30. Science lost grounds to a physical abnormality here in one of the strangest battles that was ever waged. For nearly three years Miss Berice Bedick, twenty-two, has had two distinct personalities, one of a normal twenty-two years old girl, the other having all the characteristics of a four year old child with an unusually violent temper. Physiologists believed they had been successful in "killing" the baby personality about a year ago, but the girl's health is declining rapidly and the scientists are baffled by their inability to cure the strange case. The girl will be removed to an insane hospital.

VOTE FOR THE AMENDMENT OF THE CITY CHARTER BEFORE SIX O'CLOCK TODAY

At two-twenty-five o'clock this afternoon there had been only one hundred and twenty votes in the election to amend the charter of the city of Lubbock, the election being held at the city secretary's office at the courthouse. The polls will not close until six o'clock this afternoon and every citizen in Lubbock should see to it that a large vote is polled for the amendment. If this amendment is not carried there will be no paved streets, light extensions, storm sewers, etc. built in Lubbock in 1924. The proposition is strictly up to the voters of Lubbock. Make it possible for the city of Lubbock to make substantial improvements by voting for the amendment of the city charter.

However it would be an easy matter for the Italian fleet to capture the Port of Athens and the Italian flag thereafter, would certainly fly over the Greek capital. Greek coasts would be quick prey to the Italians and the overthrow of the Greek government would immediately follow. Mussolini has seized opportunity to increase his prestige at home, and it is quite certain that a number of the border commissioners have been killed by the Greeks. It is possible that the assassins were Albanians. Mussolini declared that he would await the outcome of the investigation on the ground, that irrespective of the nationality of the murderers, Greece would be held responsible for not having provided adequate protection for Italians. It has long been suspected in Rome that the Greeks seek a secret alliance with the Albanians against Italy for the mastery of the Adriatic. Mussolini's quick action assures him the enthusiastic support of his fellow men and will be regarded at once as Italy's Saviour. The present is an entirely propitious time for Italy's action against Greece. Europe is so concerned with affairs in Ruhr, that Italy will likely have a free hand in the scrap. It will probably materialize. It will probably be a conflict that will spread into a world conflict.

YOUNG MAN AFFLICTED WITH LOCOMOTOR ATAXIA AXIA ARRESTED

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 30. W. H. Hurry, possesses a certificate of sobriety obtained from the city commission. Mr. Hurry told the commission that he is afflicted with locomotor ataxia, which made him stagger and waver in his walk. He said he had been arrested four times in the last four months by policemen and charged with drunkenness, but each time acquitted by the court, and asked the commission to issue a certificate stating that he is not intoxicated. The certificate was issued and signed by the mayor.

FORT WORTH CHALLENGES WORLD-ON-CROQUET GAMES

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 30. (United Press).—A challenge to croquet players here has been received from Fort Worth mallet artists. The challenge says a good prize will be given the winners and a "free dinner and supper service to out-of-town players."

IF GERMANY SHOULD TURN BOLSHEVIST

A real fear is expressed in diplomatic circles in Washington that Germany is about to turn Bolshevist. The recent fall of the Cuno government was expected. In fact, surprise was general that the cabinet lasted as long as it did. What may follow the collapse of Cuno's cabinet is what is causing misgivings in America.

Since the Treaty of Versailles, Germany has professed to follow a policy of fulfillment of the treaty of peace. Despite the fact that this profession is regarded in many quarters as plain bluff, Germany's avowed policy for the past four years has been one of fulfillment of the treaty.

This has been a sort of "western policy," for through fulfillment of the treaty, Germany hoped to remain in the family of so-called western nations, and after finally discharging the obligations that rested upon her in the Versailles Treaty, again to become one of the principal powers of the Western world. This was the only course which Germany saw open to her through which to remain a factor in the western world. Of course, if Germany had the power to defy the allies and throw off the yoke of the Versailles Treaty, that would gladly be taken advantage of—but Germany has not such power. Therefore, the only other course Germany has along which to develop her foreign policy is towards the east—Soviet Russia. This has been a spectre of alarm to the eyes of the western world since the peace at Versailles—an alliance between Soviet Russia, Nationalist Turkey and finally Germany.

Such a triple-alliance already has been partly made. Turkey has her treaty of alliance with Soviet Russia, and there is the Rappalo economic treaty between Germany and Russia. However, the effect of the Russian-German treaty is believed to have been largely negligible, and neither have Turkey and Russia recently been as close allies as might have been expected.

But now Germany is regarded as standing at the crossroads of her future—whether to attempt to remain a part of the western world or turn to the arms of Soviet Russia, arms that are open and ready.

Germany's condition has grown steadily worse since the armistice. Her currency now is verging on the point of being worthless, and is going down the same paper path that spelled the obliteration of Russia's currency.

German observers here say: "What has the western policy of the post-war government of Germany brought her? Nothing but ruin! The nation can now only turn eastward to Soviet Russia."

An alliance between Germany, Russia and Turkey is frankly feared by western diplomats. They regard its possible consummation as a threat of future—perhaps early—war. Such alliance would have vast man power and natural resources. With the technical skill which is conceded the Germans, organization of a huge and powerful army is considered possible.

There is also a question in the mind of Washington whether Germany would regard such alliance as a threat to her aspirations. She wants a firm foothold in the Asiatic mainland. Russia could well afford, diplomats say, to cede to Japan a large portion of the eastern Asiatic mainland in return for adherence to such alliance. A free hand in China would be a possible added bait.

The result might be an alliance between eastern Europe and

Asia against Poland, France and Belgium. England, it is believed here, would stand aloof, trying only to save her eastern empire. The attitude of Italy is problematic, while the Americans are not figured as a possible factor in the tangle. Japan, it is felt, given practically unlimited sweep in eastern Asia, would no longer menace the eastern possessions of the United States at least not for generations.

Taken as a whole, the German menace to the peace of the world is regarded here as increased by the political and economic developments of the last few weeks.

SEE SMALL FARMS AS SOLUTION OF NEGRO PROBLEM.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 30.—Farm negroes migrating north won't return as long as they find work. So the southern planters, foreseeing the doom of the many-acre plantation, are attempting to induce the white man of moderate means to settle down on small farms.

W. H. Dick, president of the Southern Alluvial Land Association, will hold a conference at Washington this month with immigration officials on a proposal to revise immigration laws to allow bringing to the south larger numbers of Irish, Scotch, English, German and Scandinavian immigrants.

Members of the organization, according to Dick, are in some instances furnishing "reliable white farmers," with mules, implements, seed, credit for necessities and allowing him one half of the crop as tenant.

A Chicago mill and lumber company recently sold 50,000 acres of logged-off land to 700 purchasers, the average size being 70 acres. Terms to the purchasers ranged from one-sixth cash payment with the balance in five years, to no payment for five years, provided the purchaser paid taxes and interest and put a certain number of acres under cultivation.

The Alluvial Association announced its belief after a survey of labor agencies throughout the north, that the negro wouldn't return as long as he has work.

New Pony Express Record May Be Set By Modern Riders

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Aug. 30.—The western plains will again witness a speeding horseback rider carrying the United States mail.

The pony express will be revived for the one trip starting tomorrow. The modern riders will attempt to beat the old time records in transporting mail by pony to Sacramento, California.

Two opposing teams, each composed of cowboy riders and one of pony cavalrymen will participate, and will cover a total of twenty-one hundred miles. The pony express record of 1860 was seven days and twenty-one hours against riding time.

Starting from St. Joe, the first riders will change horses every ten miles and at fifty-mile points mail pouches will be handed to fresh riders. Two hundred and fifty horses and forty riders will participate.

The child stars spend very little of their enormous salaries, and most of it goes to trust funds. Baby Peggy only gets three dollars a week spending money and Jackie Coogan gets about seven dollars a week.

However, after visiting Lubbock and looking through the sanitarium and hospital, and becoming better acquainted with conditions here, he remarked that Lubbock is the only place in West Texas that should have been considered at all, and declared that the city is far beyond his expectations, and he looks upon Lubbock as the future stronghold for education in West Texas.

Net Container Act Sent Into Effect Monday, August 13

The attention of the West Texas merchants is called to the "Net Container Act," a copy of which was furnished the Avalanche by Weights and Measures Inspector G. R. Scott.

Mr. Scott pointed out that the merchants can best protect their interests as well as the interests of their customers by giving this act special attention.

Net Container Act

Passed by the Thirty-eighth Legislature, Second Called Session (Chapter 63). Approved June 4, 1923. Effective August 13, 1923. H. B. No. 110.

An Act to regulate the packing and the marketing of packages and containers; requiring the net quantity of contents of such package or containers to be plainly and conspicuously marked on the outside of package or container; defining the term "container"; giving authority to the State Superintendent of Weights and Measures to supervise the enforcement of this act; repealing Section 8, Chapter 130, Act of the Regular Session of the Thirty-Sixth Legislature, and all laws in conflict, and declaring an emergency.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. This Act shall be known as the Net Container Act.

Section 2. This act is designed to protect purchasers of any commodity within its provisions against deception as to the quantity or amount of the commodity purchased.

Section 3. The provisions of this act shall apply to feedstuffs and stuffs to be used or prepared as food for human beings, and shall apply to feedstuffs and to any commodity when sold, offered or exposed for sale in packages or containers.

Section 4. Except as otherwise herein provided, the net quantity of the contents in all cases of feedstuffs, feed or other commodities, sold or offered or sale, in package form, other than drugs so sold in packages or containers, must be plainly and conspicuously marked in terms of weight, measure, or numerical count, on the outside of the covering or container.

The quantity of the contents so marked shall be the amount of such feedstuffs, feed or commodity in the package.

The statement of the quantity of the contents shall be plain and conspicuous, shall not be a part of or obscured by any legend or design, and shall be so placed in such characters as to be readily seen and clearly legible when the use of the package and its circumstances under which it is ordinarily examined by purchasers or customers are taken into consideration.

Section 5. The provision of this act shall not apply:

To any sale of a commodity within the provisions of this Act when such sale is made from bulk and the quantity is weighed, measured or counted for the immediate purpose of such sale.

To a sale of a commodity, in any container, of a net weight of one-half ounce or less, or of a commodity, in any container, of a measure of two fluid ounces or less, or of a commodity in any container of a numerical count of six or less.

To the sale of medicine, when prescribed by a licensed physician, veterinarian, or dentist; or to medicinal or pharmaceutical preparations or mixtures of two or more medicinal substances.

Section 6. The term "container" as used in this Act is hereby defined as any receptacle or carton, bag, wrapping, with which any commodity is wrapped or put up for sale, or is to be offered or exposed for sale, or any device, system, or form of consolidation that serves to create or make up or compose a unit of quantity, measure or count. No containers, boxes, or baskets wherein food products or other commodities are packed shall have a false bottom, or be so constructed as to facilitate the perpetration of fraud.

Section 7. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be punished by a fine in any sum not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, nor more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

Section 8. The enforcement of the provisions of this Act shall be under the supervision of the State Superintendent of Weights and Measures.

Section 9. The term "person" as used in this Act shall be deemed to include firm, company, co-partnership, corporation, association or organization (joint stock companies and receivers and distributing agents, and all officers, directors, and managers of such concerns shall comply with the terms and provisions of this Act on behalf of their respective concerns).

Section 10. Section 8, Chapter 130, Acts of the Regular Session of the Thirty-Sixth Legislature, and all laws and parts of laws in con-

flict with this Act are hereby repealed.

Section 11. The fact that there are no adequate weights and measures laws upon the statute books covering all of the standards of weights and measures, and there are no adequate penalties provided for the enforcement thereof, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the rule requiring bills to be read on three separate days, be suspended, and that this bill take effect from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

THE TEXAS CONSERVATION COMMISSION ASKS PRO- TECTION FLOODS

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 29.—Every effort will be made toward cutting down Texas' \$5,000,000 flood loss by pushing the huge state levee system, which will be made by members of the Texas Conservation Association in session in this city. The Association will insist that the expenditure of the \$600,000 appropriated for the flood survey of the state now available should be followed by a definite program calling for dams along Texas streams and other constructions which would open twelve million acres of rich fertile soil that is now seldom ever productive on account of the danger of flood waters.

"Hackelberry Slim" Rodeo Will Show At Crosbyton Saturday

"Hackelberry Slim" and his force of well trained bronco busters, both men and women, will leave this afternoon for Crosbyton where they will conduct their rodeo Saturday, September 1st.

"Hackelberry Slim" has been in Texas for some time, and has had his rodeo outfit in practically all of the towns of the State and he doubtless has one of the best rodeo shows in the country.

His men are all experienced cowboys who are not afraid of work, and they know how to entertain a crowd.

He has eleven Brahman steers, as well as some of the trickiest horses in the country, and when the cowboys contract to "stay with them" they take a few chances that are not conducive to good health. Though the crowds were exceptionally large here, "Hackelberry Slim" and his force entertained them despite unfavorable conditions, and they leave Lubbock with the very best wishes of their acquaintances here.

TO FIX VALUE OF PINT OF BLOOD

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—The question of the value of a pint of blood is scheduled for settlement in San Francisco courts sometime in November.

At that time the suit of Leona Pearl Standiford against the estate of Mrs. C. P. Hilliard (both of San Francisco) will go to trial.

Miss Standiford says a pint of blood, or a pint of her blood at least, is worth \$2,500. She quotes the heirs to the Hilliard estate as valuing it at only \$15.

Miss Standiford set forth in her complaint that she gave a pint of blood in a transfusion operation in an attempt to save the life of Mrs. Hilliard. An infection, she alleges, followed the operation and she must have money for medical treatment.

These strawberries are especially good this season and the comptroller expressed great surprises on finding that they could be grown in such quantities and of such quality.

Mr. Scott assured the comptroller that West Texas is just as productive as any area of the State, and that the great variety of fruits thrive in the ideal climate of the South Plains.

GERMANY UNVEILS HER TRIBUTE TO AIRMEN

GERSFELD, Germany, August 30 (United Press).—Field Marshall von Hindenburg appeared here today in his post-war role of "monument unweaver and trop reviewer."

The occasion, the final day of the Rhen glider contests and the unveiling of a shaft to the memory of German airmen who lost their lives in the world war and in peace, found Germany's flying heroes from all over the country gathered to honor those who died and those who lived to help Germany attain a place in the air.

The monument is the gift of German aviation organizations. The particular spot on the cliff from which German fliers have made such extraordinarily successful flights in their gliders during the last few years was chosen as particularly appropriate in view of the development of motorless flying since the Allies curtailed Germany's motor aerial development.

The flag covering the monument was lowered as the little Rhen valley band played national airs and the former aerial officers stood at attention.

APPLICATION MADE FOR EXTENSION OF RAIL ROAD TO SNYDER

Special to the Avalanche.

SNYDER, Aug. 29.—E. J. Anderson, secretary of the Rotan Westward Extension Committee today filed application with the Interstate Commerce Commission for a permit to construct a line of railway from Rotan to Snyder, a distance of 28 miles. In asking for a "Certificate of Public Necessity," Secretary Anderson states that he is representing a committee composed of O. P. Thrane, Snyder; C. W. Meadows, Waco; R. Q. Lee, Cisco; G. B. King, Albany; D. Dorward, Gail; J. R. Lowrie, Lamesa; N. A. Stansell, Lovington; N. M. J. M. Eastley, Seminole; A. P. Schmidt, De Leon; J. J. Patus, Moran; H. O. Cassie, Hamlin; J. D. Corbin, Rotan; Louis Keel, Roswell; N. M. C. E. Doak, O'Donnell; W. G. Cooney, Slatford.

If the Interstate Commerce Commission grants authority for this 28 miles of railway, the gap between Rotan and Snyder will be closed and a direct through railway connection between Waco and the Plains country will be perfected. Also by connection at Cisco, via Texas & Pacific Railway, Fort Worth will get a through connection to the lower South Plains country via Snyder and Panhandle & Santa Fe Railway at Snyder.

GIVE ALL STUDENTS A CHANCE IN ATHLETICS AT STANFORD

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Aug. 30 (United Press).—Stanford University has launched a 15 year athletic program, designed to make athletics for the many and not just for the few who start a scholastic.

The program includes the building of an "athletic plant" covering 140 acres on the Stanford campus.

The first unit, comprising nine football fields, for use not only by the varsity squad but by class and various minor teams, will be ready for the present season. Twelve football teams have been organized on paper to be ready for play October 1st.

Other items in the plan include:

increasing four times the size of the campus swimming pool; construction of six baseball diamonds; two soccer fields; 26 tennis courts; eight basketball courts; six handball courts and two running tracks. Two wings will be added to the present gymnasium and the present basketball pavilion will be enlarged to accommodate 3,500 spectators. The cost of the program is estimated at \$270,000 and will be financed through the proceeds of student activities, including athletics.

Great Battle Fleet To Greet World War Veterans At Frisco

By the United Press

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29. Promise that the greatest armada the American Navy has ever assembled in one port in times of peace, will be here for the American Legion Convention, opening October 15, has been made by Admiral Robert E. Coontz, U. S. N., commander of the battle fleet.

"Probably twelve first class battle ships, 40 destroyers and an undetermined number of cruisers and an auxiliary fleet will be gathered to hold 'open house' during convention week.

Permits will be given under which dances and entertainments of most every kind can be held aboard the ships and special attention will be paid to welcoming back to the quarterdeck or crew's quarters legionnaires who served on the vessels during the war.

Eleven hundred officers and 20,000 men will comprise the complement of the fleet to be concentrated here.

Lieut. Gen. Hunter S. Liggett, U. S. A., retired, is in charge of local arrangements for the convention. For Gen. Liggett it is, in a way, a chance to greet again his men, for he was second in command to General Pershing during the early days of the war and commanded America's First Army Corps in France.

Foreign Nations Invited.

Invitations to 22 European, Oriental, South American and Central American countries to send naval representations, either of ships or men, have been sent out thru the State Department at Washington.

Among the notable Americans expected to be present are: General Pershing, Admiral Hilary Jones, Major General J. A. LeJune U. S. M. C., General Frank T. Hines of the Veterans' Bureau; John J. Tigert, commissioner of education; Judge K. M. Landis, baseball's dictator; John Barton Payne, of the Red Cross; James A. Flaherty, supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus; J. W. Willett, commander of the G. A. R.; General J. S. Carr; of the United Confederate Veterans; T. L. Huston, of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Antonio P. Entenze, of the Spanish War Veterans.

President Coolidge, Woodrow Wilson, Secretaries Denby and Weeks, and President Samuel Compers, of the American Federation of Labor, have been invited.

Important Topics.

While no official forecast of vital matters to be considered is available, lively discussions are probable: The soldiers' bonus, care of disabled men, veterans' welfare problems, immigration and many similar questions are expected to get close attention.

To relieve the strain of the convention meetings dozens of diversions have been arranged.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 29. (United Press).—A drive to raise several million dollars to promote the sesqui-centennial exposition in 1926 to celebrate the one hundredth and fifteenth anniversary of American Independence, will be launched October 1.

Bonds in \$10, \$25, \$50, \$100, \$250, \$500, \$1000 and multiples of \$1,000 to \$100,000 will be floated, the smaller bonds being issued to afford everyone an opportunity to become a sesqui-centennial stockholder. The bonds will bear 6 per cent interest, payable at the end of 1926.

Plans for the great fair are rapidly developing, according to the officers of the exhibition association. Word has been received from New York that two New York buildings will be erected for the fair. One of these buildings would be for children and named after the late President Harding because of his love and ambitions for the children of the United States.

MOSCOW, Aug. 30.—Of all the machinery occupied in printing the trillions and quadrillions of Soviet rubles since the revolution, American machinery stood the test best. This certificate was given to William Recht, expert manager of the Fuchs Lang Manufacturing Company of New York, by M. Enokidze, managing director of the Russian state printing works at Moscow. Owing

to the difficulty experienced about Russians going to America to purchase machinery, Enokidze sent a representative to place orders to the value of a quarter of a million dollars in Germany.

This order was halted at the last moment, after Recht had inspected the Russian shops where he was told that some American machines had been working between ten and twenty-five years, while others were out of order only because of the lack of certain small parts which the Soviet authorities were unable to replace.

Enokidze admitted that the perfect manner in which the American currency was printed proved the superiority of American machinery and declared that he would like to send an engineer to America to inspect the various banknote establishments and buy machinery. Twelve thousand men and women are employed at Moscow's three bank note factories, apart from the paper mills. Among the American machines still running are the cutting, printers, rollers and casting machines, job presses, etc. There is a school attached to each factory to teach boys and girls of 16 the art of printing bank notes, Soviet roubles, railway tickets, bonds, lottery tickets, etc. One aim of the Russian engineer's trip to America is to discuss measures for the prevention of counterfeiting.

SENATOR SHEPARD SAYS COUNTRY SUBJECTS PROTECTED

NORMAN FAMILY ABLE TO RETURN HOME THIS WEEK

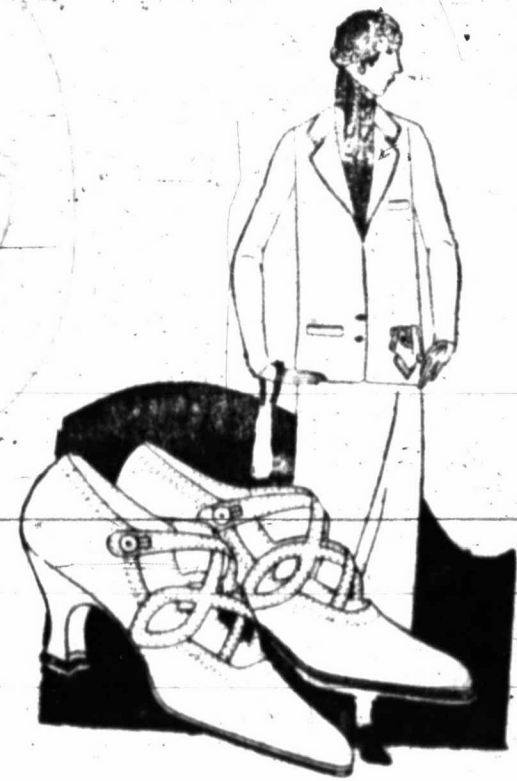
Mr. and Mrs. Norman and child-
