'A' And 'D' Books for Gas Available at Filling Stations

District OPA Director Howard R. Gholson announced today that application forms for the renewal of "A" and "D" gasoline books are now available at most filling stations and at the Local War Price and Rationing Boards. Motorists are urged to get them as soon as possible.

"OPA point with pride to the simplicity of handling of renewals this time," Director Gholson said. "There necessarily will be a heavy workload on boards, but cooperation on the part of the motoring public will help eliminate unnecessary hardship on members and clerks." He pointed to these rules which should be followed to speed the renewal job:

1. Applicants must attach the back cover of their present "A" book, properly endorsed on spaces provided for this purpose, to their application forms. (If applicants have lost their "A" book back covers, they must attach their state automobile license receipts to the application in lieu of the cover, which receipts will be returned to applicants by mail with their new books).

2. Applicants should read carefully the instruction on the form and fill it out exactly as required.

3. Applicants should mail their applications to their local boards and not take them there in person because Board workers will be extremely busy.

The District Director said applicants would not be required this time to attach their tire inspection records to their applications.

New gas coupons in the book will become valid September 22.

All books will be in the hands of motorists before that time, the official reported.

Warning Given On Price Increases for All Cigarettes

Because of a shortage of popular brands of cigarettes, there has been a tendency among some retailers to increase their prices in direct violation of OPA regulations, District Price Executive J. B. Mooney of the Lubbock OPA office, said today.

"Many complaints have been received by this office that prices of popular brands of cigarettes have been advanced to as much as 25 and 30 cents, the District Executive said. "There has been no increase in the ceiling price that wholesalers and retailers pay, and any increase charged smokers in this district or state is a violation of OPA price control regulations."

Mooney said he had received reports that cigarettes have entered black market channels locally through street vendors, who sell at black market prices and who, in addition, do not have state licenses to retail cigarettes.

The OPA Executive pointed out that smokers who have been overcharged for cigarettes have the right to sue the seller for three times the amount of the overcharge or \$25, whichever is the greater.

The majority of dealers in the Lubbock District have a ceiling price of 19c for popular brand cigarettes.

Work has begun in this county on the waste paper and scrap metal drive, which is being conducted by an army unit composed of fifty men and headed by Lt. J. P. Williams.

The men have brought a number of army vehicles to this area, and are going from place to place collecting these salvage materials.

According to instructions, all scrap metal is to be piled by your mail boxes and all waste paper is to be stacked on the sidewalks around town. The men will be happy to pick up any metal that is too large to be moved to the mail boxes, upon receiving instructions as to where it is located. They have equipment to care for any amount of metal.

Some of you have already put your stacks of waste paper and scrap metal out, but a large amount is needed. Metal and paper are two vital materials for the war. Your cooperation is earnestly solicited to make this drive a success.

Collections of waste paper alone in the United States for 1944 have averaged 79,000 tons monthly short of quotas. To jeopardize war production means an interruption in the flow of supplies, ammunition and equipment to the men on the fighting fronts. As long as there is a scrap of paper or metal available in this country, it is possible to help prevent an interruption in the war.

Gather all your extra scrap that has been lying around your farms idle and all your waste paper together today, and donate them to this group of army men. They will send them on to the mills where they will be converted into war implements of all sorts.

The army unit will be in this county approximately thirty days, and during that time they hope to collect a large amount of metal and paper.

Army Answers**
Your Personal
War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. When my husband went into the Army he cancelled his civilian insurance and took out National Service Life Insurance. Will he be able to continue this insurance after he is discharged?

A. Yes. He may retain insurance for five years from the date of issuance, or until the war ends, whichever is longer. He may retain such insurance indefinitely by converting it into ordinary life, or 20 or 30-year-payment National Service Life Insurance after he has had his present insurance one year.

Q. My letters to my son in the Army overseas have been returned from the port of embarkation stamped "APO Discontinued." Yet the return address on his letters to me is the same as the address I use. Is there anything I can do to get a letter delivered to him?

A. Yes. Write him again, using the same address. The Army will now forward the mail to him instead of returning it to you. Ask your son to check his return address. His unit undoubtedly has a new Army Post Office number with which he is not familiar.

Q. I am the mother of a World War veteran who recently passed away, and also a widow. Am I entitled to a pension the same as a soldier's wife would be?

A. Yes, but you must prove dependency on the soldier before he passed away. Your claim for a pension will be handled by the Dependency Claim Service, Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., to whom you should write for a pension application.

Q. I am still receiving government alimony checks from my divorced husband in the Army, even though I married another man on June 12. Am I still entitled to these checks?

A. You were entitled to the check for June, which should have reached you early in July. Any subsequent checks should be returned to the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, with a statement explaining your second marriage on June 12.

Q. For what purposes will money be loaned to discharged veterans under the G. I. Bill of Rights?

A. Under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, (The "G. I. Bill of Rights") money will be loaned for homes, small businesses and farms to discharged servicemen who meet certain requirements.

Q. What does the little silver star on my brother's Army theater of operations ribbon mean?

A. It means that he has been active in five battles or campaigns

in that theater of operations.

There are no "national" holidays in the United States, since each state decides on its own observance.

A. You may arrange with your postmaster to send legal papers by a special registered mail service reserved for paper needing the attention of service men overseas.

A. Only if you are named as co-owner of the bonds. If you are not named as co-owner, it will be necessary for him to fill out PD Form No. 1762, by which he may name you as co-owner of bonds already purchased. With this form, the bonds may be cashed and a check issued in your name.

The Army ANSWERS Your Personal War Problems

Q. Will you please explain to me what the G. I. Bill of Rights is?

A. The "G. I. Bill of Rights" is the popular name given to a law recently passed by the House and Senate and signed by the President, which will assure the welfare of the veteran in his return to civil life in the postwar world. Among the benefits which will be available to the veteran are education and loans for small businesses, home-building and hospitalization.

Winter Legumes Are Great Aid To Production

There is no better means of maintaining soil fertility and obtaining increased production in the eastern half of Texas than by growing and plowing under winter legumes. E. A. Miller, agronomist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says that the acreage of winter legumes in parts of Texas where they are adapted compared unfavorably with that of other states where acre-yields, especially cotton, have been greatly increased through their use. Experiments and demonstrations show that yields of cotton and other crops in adapted areas can be increased considerably by improving the fertility of the soil with winter legumes.

Bur clover, among the more suitable legumes, is adapted to the heavier loam types of soil of the eastern half of the state and to the blackland area of the central and northern portion. It has the advantage of reseeding for several years after a good crop of seed has been produced. All of the seed will not germinate the first, or even the second year, Miller says.

Planting a plot for producing seed is a good way to start bur clover. A proved method is to mix one bushel of burs and 50 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate, or its equivalent, with one ton of rotted manure and applying the mixture on top of cotton rows without removing the stalks. Before applying the mixture, however, soil should be plowed to both sides of the beds to provide a groove for the seed. The first rain will cover them sufficiently for germination. When the seed matures in the spring the vines should be removed and the seed swept together with stiff brooms or fine tooth rakes, and sacked.

Another method is applying the mixture to every fourth row and planting a row of corn half way between the clover seed between the

corn rows. The clover should cover seed between the corn rows. The clover should cover the entire space in the fall and reseed itself for several years.

Miller says that if the bur clover is planted in three-foot rows about five one-ton loads of the mixture per acre should be distributed. If planted on every fourth row, one third of the amount is needed. But Miller cautions that merely planting bur clover seed on sandy soil without mixing it with manure and phosphate seldom proves satisfactory.

Chilean Spy-Chaser Warns Of Post-War Nazi

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — The man who made Chile's "Department 50" one of the world's famous anti-espionage organizations, says democracies had better be on guard when this war is over lest there be a resurgence of the German zeal for conquest.

He is Herman Barros Bianchi, 33, who personally led his agents in innumerable raids to break up a sensational Nazi espionage organization. Department 50's work put Chile in the forefront in activities against espionage. It helped gather some of the evidence in Chile that put German spy Luning before a firing squad in Havana, Cuba. Its detection of the espionage ring helped to turn Chilean public sentiment from neutrality to a forthright anti-Nazi policy, leading later to a breaking in diplomatic relations with the Axis.

De Forest To Set Up Research Lab In Old Mexico

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Inventor Lee DeForest, 70-year-old pioneer in wireless telegraphy, is transferring his research laboratory from Los Angeles to Mexico City.

DeForest will concentrate, he said, on commercial development of radionics. He also is working on a ground-speed indicator for airplanes, similar to automobile speedometers, so that despite wind and weather conditions pilots will always know their exact ground speed.

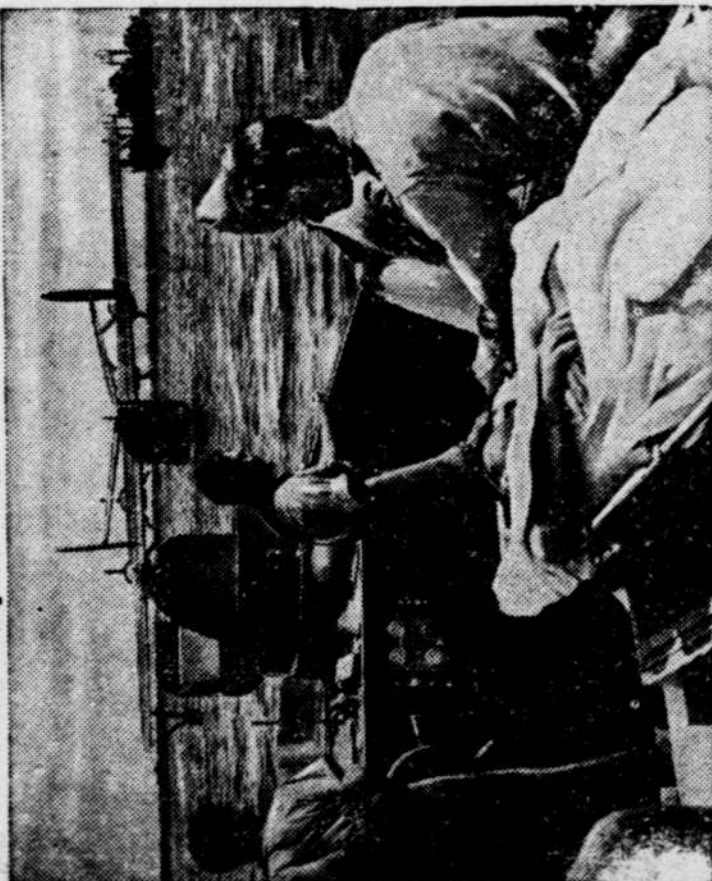

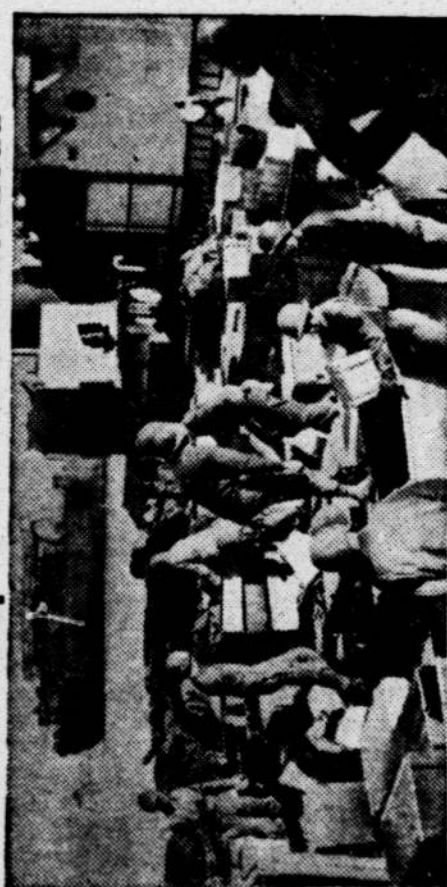

Cases Heard On OPA Violations Recently

Suspension order hearings held this week in El Paso, Big Spring, and Lubbock resulted in suspension orders ranging from two weeks up to the duration for dealers who were shown to have violated gasoline, tire, or food rationing regulations. Howard R. Gholson, District Director of the Office of Price Administration has announced.

Heaviest sentence given was at Big Spring, where a gasoline dealer was suspended for the duration. Several cases were dismissed with no order, when evidence showed that violation had not been wilful.

Cases were heard in informal session, with each defendant free to call his own witnesses or to offer counsel in his behalf. Harry Hall of Dallas, Chief Hearing Commissioner for the OPA, heard the cases.

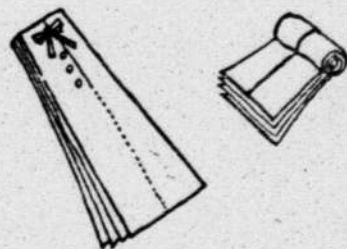
