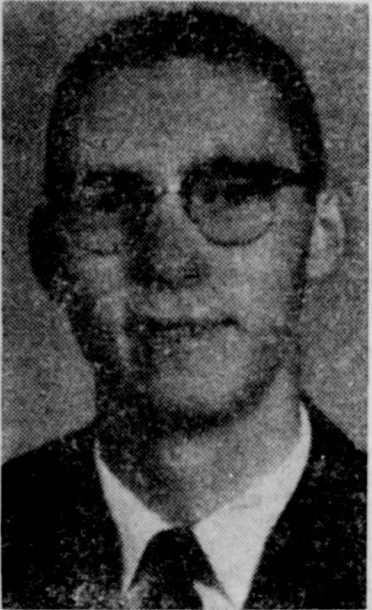


Snodgrass Is Representative For G. S. P. A.

In a major expansion of its membership service program, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association today announced the addition of two Field Service Representatives. In recognition of the increased problems brought about by the rapid changing of production and marketing patterns in both the North Plains and South Plains, the new representatives are being established in the heart of each area rather than in the headquarters office, according to Elbert Harp of Abernathy, President of the organization.

Rudie Tate is being named as the North Plains Representative and will be headquartered in Dumas and Y. F. Snodgrass is being named the South Plains Representative to be headquartered at Abernathy according to Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President of the farmer supported commodity group. Nelson said that each of these individuals are highly qualified with experience and education for their respective assignments. Snodgrass attended Texas Tech College School of Business and from 1955 to 1963 was the field man for the High Plains underground Water District and has worked with farmers throughout the South Plains in developing improved irrigation practices and water conservation methods. He will continue to operate his grain and cotton farm in Hale County. Tate until recently was County Agricultural Agent with the Texas A&M Extension Service in Dallam County at Dalhart and previous to that was Assistant Agricultural Agent for Moore County in Dumas after graduating in Animal Husbandry from Texas Tech.

Nelson pointed out that the Association is pleased to be able to announce this expanded membership program in order to be of assistance to local groups such as County GSPAs, Young Farmers Associations, Chambers of Commerce Agricultural Committees, and others conducting activities effecting the future of grain sorghum in the respective areas. He said that the need for such service is exemplified on the North Plains as shown in Sherman County where the acres of grain sorghum expanded from 51,000 in 1960 to 70,000 acres in 1965, as well as a yield per acre increase from 49 bushels per acre to an expected 85 bushels per acre this year making the total production of grain sorghum increase from 1.9 million bushels in 1960 to 6.1 million bushels in 1965, in this one county alone. This change in production has brought corresponding problems on the farmer, in the market-place, and in government policy which the Association has been effective in coordinating for a stronger position for grain sorghum.

Conversely, in the South Plains the acreage devoted to grain sorghum has been decreasing in recent years under the impact of government programs and the yields, while increasing slightly, have not shown the dramatic upsurge because of the already high production and in a different way, these changes too have added

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Friona Sneaks By Antelopes, 13-12, To Take District Lead; Lopes To Meet Dimmitt There

One point proved the difference for the District 3-AA lead in play at Antelope Stadium here last Friday night. The Abernathy Antelopes bowed to Friona, 13-12, to hand the Chiefs the undisputed lead in 3-AA.

Both stands were packed to see the crucial contest which was also Dad's Night at AHS. Dads of the Lope football players were seated in special stands at the field's edge and given special recognition before the game began.

Abernathy has now moved into a second place tie with Lockney, who scored their second district win over winless Dimmitt, 35-6 Friday night. In the other 3-AA contest, Olton nosed out Floydada 6-0 to gain a tie for fourth place with the Winds. This Friday's slate sees Abernathy at Dimmitt, Olton at Friona, and Lockney at Floydada.

Friona hit the field Friday night with a determination to win and on the first play from scrimmage put their first score of the game on the board. The six-pointer came on a 71-yard dash that started as an off-tackle run by halfback Joe Mabry. Bob Sims sent the ball sailing through the uprights for the eventual one-point difference in the game.

The Antelope defense dug in and later in the same period thwarted a Friona drive to the 25. The defense, which is to be commended for its otherwise strong play, did not seem able to pull down Friona's fullback, Ray Braxton, a 197-pound converted tackle. He kept Friona threatening the whole night on long runs that would nearly break loose. The Chiefs attempted a field goal at the 25 after the Lopes held them, but it was blocked and Abernathy took over.

With less than two minutes left in the first quarter, quarterback Lane Wade flipped a sideline pass to Senior end Jim Barton from his own 30. Barton grabbed the toss and outraced his defenders to the Friona 8 before being tripped up by the Friona safety. On third down from the 5, fullback Doyle Fuller carried the ball in to give the Lopes their first six points of the night. Fuller carried the ball on the try for extra points, but was stopped in his bid to put the Lopes ahead.

Friona came back strong in the second quarter by Braxton slipped through the Lope defense for 49 yards to the Abernathy 5. The alert Abernathy line, led by Larry Crowder, Terry Barton, and Fuller throughout the night, grabbed a fumble at the 1-foot line to stop that drive.

The Antelopes were forced to yield the ball and Friona drove deep again. This time, Darrell Johnson picked off his first of two interceptions at the Lope 14-yard line. Several plays later, Wade was caught on his own 1-yard line and Tannehill had to boot the ball out of his end zone. Friona took advantage of the field position and pushed the ball in from the 28-yard line. QB Lonnie Ellis bulldozed the ball over from the one for the score. This time, the kick was low. When the teams went in at half, the score stood 13-6 with Friona in the lead.

Early in the second half, Robert Mason jarred the ball loose from Braxton and the Lopes had the ball at the Friona 48, their best field position of the night. In seven plays, Mike Tannehill was over for six points from three yards out. Tannehill had the big run of the drive for 25 yards down to the 3. Wade rolled out for the go-ahead extra points, but his pass was overthrown and the score stood 13-12.

In the remaining two quarters, Friona threatened twice more, but the Lopes tightened up each time and held the Chiefs. Abernathy's outside

A report from child welfare director Jan Stanley and discussion of a letter from the Farm Bureau constituted the major part of a brief Hale County Commissioners Court meeting recently in Plainview.

Stanley talked with Commissioners about a letter from state child welfare commissioner, John H. Winters stating the state's willingness to go along with a plan proposed by the Court at its last meeting.

The letter said the state would assume the salary of a child welfare worker in the Hale County office if the county would pay for a stenographer now on state salary.

Commissioners had requested this plan to avoid having to pay for a raise for the worker, who was county-paid but on a state wage scale.

The position involved will be filled by a new worker, Stanley said, since Mrs. Beverly Held recently requested a leave of absence to work with a children's training center being organized in Plainview.

F. B. Suggestion

County Judge C. L. Abernethy read a letter from Bruce Rigger of the Hale County Farm Bureau, informing the county of a resolution asking that the county require welfare recipients to do work to earn what they receive.

Abernethy said he had replied to the letter, saying the Court welcomes all inquiries and is interested in suggestions. He said all indigents are carefully screened before receiving aid, but since state and federal laws are involved the county cannot require work without precipitating problems and conflicts.

Abernethy invited the Bureau members to come to any Court meeting to discuss the matter further if they desire.

Commissioners approved a request of County Tax Collector Bill Hollars to raise the price of tax certificates from 50 cents to one dollar. Hollars said the school and city are planning a similar increase.

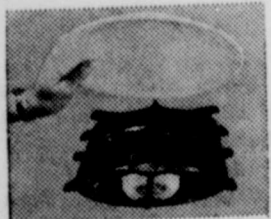

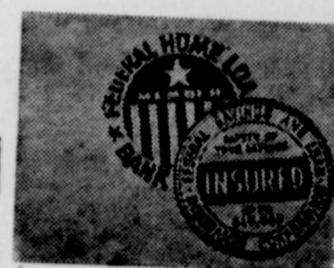

GSPA Gives Info On Farm Program

Since the passage of the Farm Bill, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association has attempted to alert grain sorghum producers to the fact that even through there is little change in the basic principles of the "feed grain law" that there is room for widespread effect on farmer income (up or down) by administrative interpretation not only of feed grain provision but also of other commodity programs, particularly wheat

and cotton.

Some of the fears GSPA had about things that might happen—and in turn GSPA worked to prevent were: Cross-compliance between Wheat and Feed Grains and cross-compliance between Feed Grain and Cotton. Removal of Barley from the feed grain program—this could be done at the discretion of the Secretary. Barley is not a big income factor in the sorghum area, but it being in the program allows the farmer to use it as feed grain base and pick up extra milo

acres and also, particularly on the North Plains, if a farmer has no milo base, barley base will give him a point of substitution with Wheat which allows him to really grow all the milo he wants up to the extent of his wheat allotment.

These above things are things that might or could have been. Below is our present understanding as we work with administrative officials of what they really are going to be. Again we have proof that "organized efforts of farmers get results!"

1. A Wheat farmer must comply with other crops to the extent that no marketing penalties are assessed. (meaning some degree of cross-compliance between Wheat and crops with marketing quotas, i.e. peanuts, cotton, rice, tobacco.)

2. A Wheat farmer can not comply on one farm and exceed his allotment on another, except by substitution with feed grains.

3. Feed Grains are just as in the past, a farmer can't comply on one farm and exceed his base on another.

4. A Cotton farmer can participate in the cotton program and be out of compliance on feed grain or wheat, (but not above, a wheat farmer can't be out on cotton.)

5. BARLEY REMAINS IN THE FEED GRAIN PROGRAM.

RR Hale Taxes Are \$60,104.00

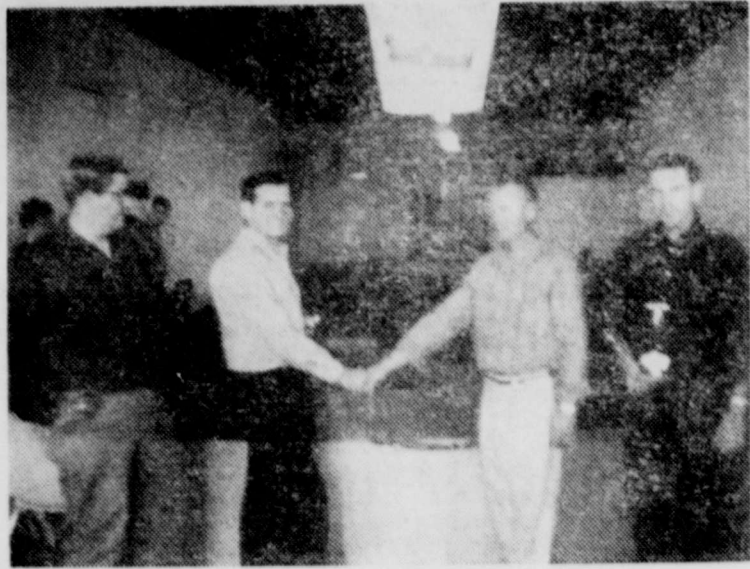
