Lamesa Papers Purchased By R. A. And C. C. Woodson

The purchase of the Dawson County Courier and The Lamesa Reporter was announced this week by Ross A. Woodson of Cleburne and C. C. Woodson of Brownwood. The transactions were completed a few days ago with Joe Alexander, former Courier owner, and Virgil and Earl Williams, who have owned and operated the Lamesa Reporter.

Ross Woodson has already assumed active management of the two publications and plans to make his home in this city. He will move his family to Lamesa as soon as housing facilities are available. Current plans as announced by Ross A. and C. C. Woodson are to print both papers under their respective publication names, thus you can expect to receive your editions of the Courier and Reporter regularly as heretofore. Ultimate plans call for converting the Reporter into a daily newspaper, this action to be taken as quickly as labor and newsprint are again available.

In leaving the newspaper business in Lamesa, Joe Alexander, past Dawson County Courier publisher, states that he wishes his successors a most successful operation in this city. He further states that he is appreciative of the cooperation of the business and professional men and other residents of this area, and contributes the success he has enjoyed to their patronage. He plans to continue to make Lamesa his home.

Ross A. and C. C. Woodson, brothers, are experienced in the newspaper business, both having been in the publishing business for a number of years. In the past Ross Woodson has been connected with the Cleburne Times-Review and the Gladeview News Tribune, and has served as publisher of the Wise County Messenger and the Del Rio News-Herald.

C. C. Woodson currently is publisher of the Brownwood Bulletin in Brownwood where he makes his home.

The Woodson brothers made this statement upon purchasing the local newspapers: "We believe that Lamesa is the best city on the South Plains area and that in the future it will develop and expand to a great extent. We reached this conclusion by listening to Lamesa boosters, who are all convinced that this city will double in population within the next 10 years.

"We wish to assure newspaper readers and patrons in this city and trade territory of our continuous support, and we will at all times do our utmost to serve you satisfactorily."

Two Lamesans Are At Brooke Hospital Center

Privates First Class Max H. Harris and Alvin Blair, veterans of Lamesa, are among returnees at Brooke Convalescent Hospital, Brooke Hospital Center, Fort Sam Houston.

Harris is the husband of Mrs. Katherine Harris, 1011 North Fifth Street in this city and son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Harris of O'Donnell.

Blair is the husband of Mrs. Alvin Blair, and son Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Blair of 907 South Fifth Street, Lamesa. Harris entered the Army September 15, 1943 and took basic training at Camp Fannin, Texas. He served eleven months overseas as rifleman with Company "F," 128th Infantry Regiment, 32nd "Red Arrow" Division, in the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre of Operations, in New Guinea and the Philippines. He was wounded by machinegun fire during action on Leyte for which he holds the Purple Heart. He also has the Combat Infantryman badge, Good Conduct medal, Asiatic-Pacific and Philippines Liberation ribbons.

Blair served seven months overseas as machinegunner with Company "K," 253rd Infantry Regiment, 63rd "Blood and Fire" Division, in the European Theatre of Operations, in the Rhineland. He holds the Purple Heart for shrapnel wounds suffered during action in Germany. He also has the Good Conduct medal and European Theatre of Operations ribbon. Blair returned to the United States July 9, 1945 and was transferred from Glennan General Hospital, Okmulgee, Oklahoma, to Brooke Convalescent Hospital, August 25, 1945. Blair has a brother serving in the armed forces in the Pacific, Sergeant John Blair.

Tornadoes Will Clash Next With Brownfield Club

The sports spotlight this week will be focused on Lamesa's Golden Tornadoes as they invade Brownfield Friday night, September 21, when they clash with Brownfield High School's club at 8:30 p. m. The match will be played on the opposition's field.

Course For Store Personnel Is Scheduled Here

Several merchants were present for the meeting held at the Chamber of Commerce office Monday, September 17 at 10 a. m., at which time plans were made for conducting training classes for store personnel under the direction of Miss Gertrude Prince of the extension division of the University of Texas.

The present schedule of classes as announced by Miss Prince calls for a course for high school students, who are now working in the stores in the afternoon. This class is to be held in the sewing room of the home economics department of the high school from 12:45 to 1:45 p. m., and is entitled "Sales Personality in Business." The course opened today (Thursday, September 20) and will be held daily except Saturdays until October 3. This is a ten hour course, and high school students are availing themselves of the training through the cooperation of School Superintendent V. Z. Rogers, retail stores and through the diversified occupations program under the direction of E. O. White.

Another course which Miss Prince is instructing is entitled "Human Side of Selling During The Recession Period." This class is being held at the Chamber of Commerce office from 9 to 10 a. m. and is for experienced salespeople. It is also a ten hour course and will convene each day through October 3, except Saturdays.

"How To Supervise Employees" is another course which is being offered to local residents. The remaining dates for this class are September 20, 24, 25 and 27 and the classes will be in session from 8 to 10 p. m., on the designated nights in the Chamber of Commerce Office. "How To Supervise Employees" is a course in personnel relations and principals of supervision. Store owners, managers, and all who train employees to render a better business service are eligible for this course.

A ten hour course in "Professional Development in Retail Selling" will be organized as other classes are completed and as time permits the scheduling of this class, according to Miss Prince.

Miss Prince further states that plans are being made to organize a class for all who train employees. The course will be entitled "How To Train Employees," and will convene October 1. Classes will be held during the evening in order that all those who train employees in wholesale, retail and service occupations may attend.

Clarence Ham, A Vet Of Both Wars Returns To City

Clarence Ham, a veteran of World War 1 and 2, is now making his home in this city, having moved here during the latter part of August.

Ham served with the Army in the World War, and saw service in France, Belgium and Germany. In addition he served at stations on the Philippine Islands and in China. He was discharged in 1924.

He again entered the military service when the second World War opened, joining the Marine Corps in March of 1942. During the last conflict he saw action in the Tarawa Campaign of the Gilbert Islands, and the Marshall Island Campaign, where he was wounded. He suffered shrapnel wounds on February 12, 1944.

After serving overseas for a period of 13 months in the second World War, Ham was returned to the States. He received his discharge December 26, 1944 from the hospital in New River, North Carolina.

After being distributed his discharge, he went to Arkansas, where he accepted a position with the Naval Ordnance Plant, and where he worked for 7 months.

He then moved to this city, and recently purchased the Arnett's Helpy-Selfy Laundry, which he is currently operating under the name of Ham's Helpy-Selfy.

Ham made his home in this city for many years prior to entering World War II. He formerly operated a grocery store and service station on North Fourth and Dallas Streets.

He and his wife and 13 year old son, are now residing at 406 South Taft Street.

It is the desire of the committee to complete the special gifts drive by the end of the week, at which time other phases of the War Chest Campaign will get underway.

It is announced that J. P. White will serve as chairman for the city drive, and that P. K. Humes will head the rural War Chest Campaign.

In connection with the United War Fund Drive, Chairman Leuenberger made this statement: "The end of the war has not diminished the need of the War Chest--on the contrary it has stepped up most of the needs.

"Men serving in the armies of occupation, heartick veterans, and men at home recuperating from wounds, all need a lift to their spirits. General Eisenhower is so aware of this problem that he has asked the USO to quadruple its entertainment for men still overseas.

"Maybe you forget the Greeks, the Dutch, Belgians, Norwegians, Chinese, and Filipinos, harried by common enemy at every step. Yet today, as a result of pillage, torture, mass butchery, they lie homeless, in rags, bone-rum, from starvation--brave peoples, gallant nations, lie prostrate.

"These peoples--your Allies--need help. They are in desperate need of money for food, medicine to restore health, clothes to provide warmth, and of friendliness to provide hope.

"Through your generosity in this final 'Victory' campaign, you can show the fighting men and allies your full appreciation for their sacrifices and help to complete Dawson County's War Chest quota which will provide funds to keep USO and other war fund agencies going until America's fighting men have been returned home."

SEVERAL DAWSON COUNTY MEN RELEASED FROM SERVICE

To a number of Dawson County boys, their years of military service are but a memory now. The following men recently received their honorable discharges from service and have again returned to a civilian status. Included in the group are James L. Glass, James Moss, Carlston Biggerstaff, Carl D. Gardner, Paul W. Morgan, Eulis Jackson, Oliver S. Cates, Rudolph J. Duty, Erma S. Thornton, Glenwood Stovall, Wilmer H. Price, Johnny C. Holcomb, Ewell L. Roberson, John T. Fowler, Delbert D. Bracey, L. P. Bedwell, and James M. Faulkenberry.

James L. Glass received his military discharge September 8 after serving with the 388th Service Group overseas as a private. His discharge papers were distributed to him at Ft. Sam Houston.

Glass entered service April 6, 1942 in Lubbock. He received an overseas assignment and left for the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre July 23, 1943. He remained in that zone until September 2, 1945 when he was returned to the States.

A member of the Military Police, he was overseas 3 years and 1 month and wears the Asiatic-Pacific Medal.

James L. Moss, a technical sergeant with the 5th Photo Reconnaissance Squadron, received his discharge September 8, at Ft. Sam Houston.

As a civilian Moss was a teacher and made his home on Route A. He entered service May 17, 1942 in Lubbock and left for Europe on August 31, 1942. He returned from his first tour of duty on January 12, 1945 and again left for overseas service in Europe on March 17, 1945. Moss was sent back to the States on September 2, and soon thereafter received his discharge.

He participated in the Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Rome-Arno, Northern Apennines, Po Valley, and Southern France Campaigns, as well as in the air war over the Balkans. For his services he has been awarded the EAME Campaign Medal with 8 Bronze Stars, the Distinguished Unit Badge, and Good Conduct Medal.

Another Dawson County man who has been released from military service is Carlston Biggerstaff, who served as a private first class with the 341st Signal Company. His discharge papers were granted to him August 31, at Ft. Sam Houston.

Land - Power Being Restored

Experience of Extension-Service-TVA demonstration last year indicates that average soil, when treated properly, contains land-power some farmers had thought irretrievably lost a decade ago.

For example, J. S. Barron, Smith county demonstrator, made 714 pounds of seed cotton per acre on land which had been treated with TVO phosphate and planted to vetch. A check plot without phosphate and vetch yielded only 455 pounds.

A summary of the experience of 68 demonstrators in five East Texas counties showed that proper soil treatment increased cotton yields 68 per cent, corn yields 75 per cent, and sweet potatoes by 85 per cent.

according to E. A. Miller, agronomist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. The increased yields occurred on land previously planted to a legume and treated with TVA phosphate.

Where land was given in addition a side-dressing of TVA ammonium nitrate, cotton production was increased 80 per cent over an untreated check plot, and corn production was increased 150 per cent. Counties where the comparisons were included Rains, Rusk, Smith, Washington, and Titus.

Any successful soil improvement program, Miller says, must include four steps: (1) holding the soil by engineering practices such as terracing, (2) use of a legume cover crop to serve as green manure and to capture nitrogen from the air, (3) use of a perennial non-cultivated grass crop to restore the proper granular structure of the soil, and (4) the proper balance of lime and

Sugar Question Analyzed By U. S. Agriculture Dept.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture holds up the mirror to the world sugar situation and predicts that production for 1946 probably will be somewhat larger than this year. Notwithstanding, this will be insufficient to meet unrationed demands at current prices for sugar.

In a statement received by the A. and M. College Extension Service, the U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts that Cuban production may be slightly larger next year since the drought which reduced the 1944-45 yield appears to be broken. The outlook in Europe suggests a gradual increase in sugar beet production in the years ahead and a similar increase normally would be expected in the Philippines. Recovery in that area, however, may be slower because of the length of time necessary to re-establish cane fields and harvest a crop. World sugar supplies in 1945 are the smallest since the war commenced. Accordingly, supplies available to the United States this year will be about 20 per cent smaller than the quantity used in 1944, the statement says.

REA Construction Will Help To Aid Employment

Rural power line construction by borrowers of Rural Electrification Administration funds in Texas offers prospects of immediate employment for returning service men and discharged war plant workers.

Loan funds totaling \$16,081,505 are available to 93 REA-financed cooperatives to finance new construction in Texas as rapidly as materials and labor can be obtained.

War Production Board restrictions on rural power line building were lifted four days after victory in Europe. Since then the REA-financed cooperatives in Texas have received applications from thousands of farmers for electric service. Fifty-nine new loans have been allotted to borrowers since V-E Day to finance construction of 6749 miles of lines to serve 15,829 new customers.

The three-year postwar program drawn up by the Texas cooperatives would provide electric service to an additional 157,200 rural consumers. It would require expenditures of \$50,000,000 for construction of distribution lines and \$16,000,000 for the improvement of existing electric equipment. REA estimates that the construction work alone will require 25,000 man-years of labor.

Hundreds of workers will be needed to install systems in the homes and on the farms of the new consumers. REA estimates that each new farm consumer will spend an average of \$145 for this purpose. REA believes each new farm consumer will spend an average of \$400 for electrical equipment.

Seventy-one of Texas' borrowers have systems in operation. They are serving 104,216 consumers along 41,609 miles of lines.

The GI had given him Japanese-printed Philippine occupation currency.

A Rot-Resistant Been Developed

A new cotton fabric that will not mildew or rot has been developed by scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The new fabric was buried in the ground for six months with no significant loss of strength.

This new material has the strength and appearance of ordinary cotton, in addition to its ability to resist rot. And the process by which it is made causes no discoloration of the fabric. The treatment is somewhat similar to the acetate process for rayon, but the new cotton fabric has no odor and it does not become sticky. And fortunately the treatment will not cause any harmful effects on foods, so it will make excellent sacks for shipping fruits, vegetables, and other food and feed products.

Specialists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service hail the new development as a boon in two general fields which consume large amounts of cotton. First this modified cotton cloth, yarn and sewing thread will make clothing which will not mildew. It can be used for awnings, lawn furniture, and tents which will not rot in damp climates. Fish and tennis nets will profit, too. The new fabric also is expected

to be used in making rot-resistant bags. Soybeans were first imported into the United States in 1894.

Harry L. Phillips Serves Aboard The Famed Missy

ABOARD THE U.S.S. MISSISSIPPI, Tokyo Bay — Harry Lee

Phillips got his first glimpse of the Japanese homeland August 27, when his ship, the U. S. S. Mississippi, sailed up to Tokyo Bay as part of Admiral "Bull" Halsey's powerful Third Occupation Fleet.

He served as a member of the Engineering Department aboard the 40,000 ton battleship during the Aleutians, Gilberts, Marshalls, Bismarck Archipelago, the Palau,

the Philippines, and Rykyus operations. He wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with 8 battle stars, the Philippine Liberation ribbon with 2 stars, along with the Good Conduct Ribbon.

Harry Phillips is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Phillips and is married to the former Miss Frances Foster of O'Donnell. Mrs. H. L. Phillips and son reside in O'Donnell.

The present Mississippi, claimed to have been sunk on several occasions by both the Japanese and Germans, was duplicating the feat of a previous warship bearing the same name. In 1883 Commodore Matthew C. Perry conned the first Mississippi into the then uncharted waters of Tokyo Bay to open world commerce to Japan. Commemorating the return of the Missy the flag waved proudly from the mainmast below the Stars and Stripes.

Protecting the life lines to Britain at the outbreak of World War II, the 28 year old battleship escaped the infamous Japanese attack at Pearl Harbor in 1941. The Mississippi, along with her sisters, New Mexico and Idaho, were rushed to the Pacific where they served as a backbone of the fleet until other "old" battleships were repaired and new units readied for action. After supporting operations in the South Pacific, she assisted in the recapture of important Aleutian Bases. Heading South she helped inaugurate the amphibious island jumping sweep which now ends triumphantly in Tokyo.

Along the way, the Mighty Missy reeked havoc on the Nips at Makin, Kwajalein, Abey, Wotje, Tarao, Kavieng, Peleliu, Negesbus, Leyte, Luzon, and Okinawa. She served as flagship of the battle line for Vice Admiral Jesse B. Oldendorf's Seventh Fleet Task Force at Surigao Strait.

Phillips entered the Navy on February 17, 1942, and took his boat training in San Diego, California, where he also went through Machinist Service School. He reported aboard the U. S. S. Mississippi October 14, 1942 and has served

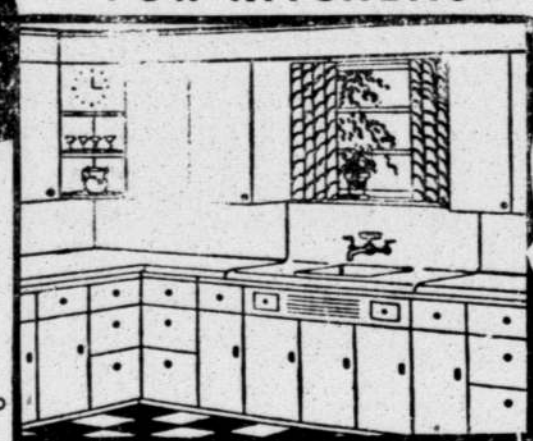

Pvt. I. McKinney Now In Japan, Writes A Letter

Editor's Note: Below is printed a letter from Pvt. Ike McKinney, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ike McKinney of this city. Pvt. McKinney landed September 5, with the occupational forces in Japan, and is now located 30 miles from Tokyo. He entered service November 28, 1944 and left for overseas duty May 30. He arrived in Manila June 24, and has been stationed on the Marshalls, Carolinas, and Philippines since that time. A member of the 43 Division of the Combat Engineers now, he had spent 26 days on the front with the Infantry near Manila prior to the close of the war. His letter follows:

September 6, 1945 Japan.

Dear Mom, Dad, and Ozella: I will drop you a few lines to let you know I'm in the land of the rising sun. They took us off of the ship and put us on an airplane and flew us to Japan. We're about 30 miles from Tokyo. It is a little cooler here than in was in the Philippines.

Well folks, I guess maybe I might be home by March. Anyway, I'll be home before you know it. Say Mom, you can put this in the paper. I hope I'm the first one from Lamesa to get here, but I guess that's nothing though. I said I would see this God forsaken country before I came home.

Boy, I mean Tokyo is blown all over this little old island of Honshu. Boy, I'm glad of it too. These Japs don't seem a bit pleased about the whole thing either. I enjoy kicking them around.

Well, has Grady gotten home yet? I sure hope so. I don't think he will have to come over here now. I wish they would hurry up and send some replacements over for us. But if I get home by March, I will be satisfied—won't you?

Boy I liked my plane ride. We were in a C-54. What a big bird it is. We cruised about 200 miles or more. We got here in ten hours. I think—or something like that.

There are not many soldiers here yet but there will be in a few days now. I hope so at least.

Well, I will close.

Veasey In First Occupation Unit To Land In Japan

ON THE TRANSPORT MERIWETHER IN TOKYO BAY—Charles R. Veasey, coxswain, Route B, Lamesa, sailed into Tokyo Bay aboard the Meriwether and landed in the first occupation forces on the conquered soil of Japan.

A few hours before General of the Army Douglas MacArthur's triumphant arrival at Atsugia Airfield the Meriwether landed a contingent of Marines at Futtsu Saki, on the eastern shore of Tokyo Bay. The ship moved past silenced Japanese batteries of 16-inch guns and unloaded the first Marine occupation force.

The ship took part in the conquest of Okinawa. Her crewmen are credited with shooting down a Jap suicide plane and with the rescue of a number of sea survivors.

Prepare Now For Winter Dairy Herd Problems

Although Texas still is in the shank of summer, G. G. Gibson of the A. and M. College Extension Service believe it isn't too early for dairymen to commence thinking about the problems which come in with the frost, chill winds and cold rains. It's a hard fact, he observes, that with a little over-delay it will be too late in the season to do anything about some of them.

The major problems, says Gibson who is the Extension dairy husbandman are adequate fall pastures, supplemental feed, proper winter shelter for milking cows, and selection of the over-winter herd. An early start and progressive follow-up getting these things in hand, Gibson says, will enable dairymen to ride into the spring with fewer worries.

Adequate small grain pastures for fall and winter grazing should be the first thought. Early planting is urged in order to get maximum growth before cold weather. With a limited supply of protein feed possible, there is more reason than ever for attempting to assure small grain pasturage. Here is one sure way to get more feed for less money.

The silo should be ready for the late feed crop. Each farmer and dairymen should use the kind of silo which best suits his condition. It is important to have the storage available when the feed is harvested.

Winter normally being the expensive feeding period, now is the time to examine the herd and cull out low producers, Gibson says. By keeping only high producers feed is sold to the cows which pay highest prices. With fewer cows to be milked and cared for the owner can give them more personal attention.

Shelter sheds should be inspected carefully with an eye to providing dry floors for the cattle. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has been using sand floors in shelter sheds for several years and found them satisfactory. About eight inches of riverbed sand makes a cheaper and more satisfactory bedding than straw or other material. The point is that good milk production cannot be maintained where cows are exposed to wet and cold, or knee-deep mud. Neither can young calves be raised satisfactorily under similar conditions.

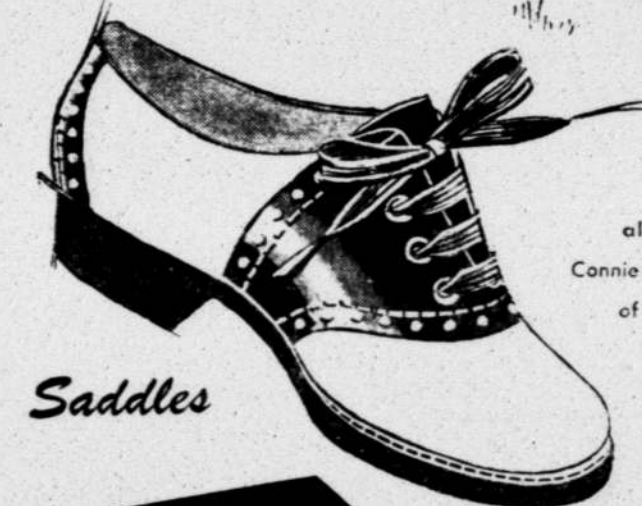

Residents Should Register Now With Lamesa Co-Op Gin Officials To Obtain Cold Storage Lockers

He states that people are already registering for these scarce items, and that others may register now, in order to receive these items as soon as they are put on the markets.

Mr. Jones states they are hoping to secure large lockers with a storage capacity of 300 pounds. These boxes will enable renters to store all types of meats, vegetables and fruits the year round.

It is the intentions of Co-Op Gin officials to install all the needed equipment for the successful, efficient operation of the plant and to retain an efficient staff of employees to capably supervise operations there.

If you have not yet signed for a box at the cold storage plant, do so at your earliest convenience in order that plans for the locker can be completed.

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army per-

sonnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. Does the Bronze Arrowhead count five points for discharge?

A. No credit points for discharge under the adjusted service rating system are allowed for the Bronze Arrowhead, which is awarded to those who have participated in a combat parachute jump, combat glider landing or initial assault landing on a hostile shore. They will count their battle stars for the same engagements, however.

Q. My son was inducted to serve in the Army for the duration of the war plus six months. Because V-J Day came in September, does that mean he will automatically be discharged in March?

A. No. Although the Japanese have surrendered, the war is not yet officially over. The date selected as the official end of the war will be announced by a peace treaty, a Presidential proclamation or by a joint resolution of both houses of Congress. Any period up

to the date thus fixed will be considered as part of the war's duration.

Q. My husband is a sergeant in the Army. Now that the war is over, will I continue to draw my family allowance?

A. Under the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended, family allowances will continue to be paid to enlisted dependents of men in the service until six months after the date of the official end of the war. See question immediately above to learn how the war will be declared officially at an end.

Q. I will soon become eligible to be drafted. Is it true that the Army is again accepting enlistments? If so, are there any advantages for those who volunteer?

A. Enlistments have been reopened. You may enlist in the Regular Army for three years. Among advantages for volunteers are a choice of arm or service (i. e. Infantry, Artillery, etc.) and a choice of overseas theater.

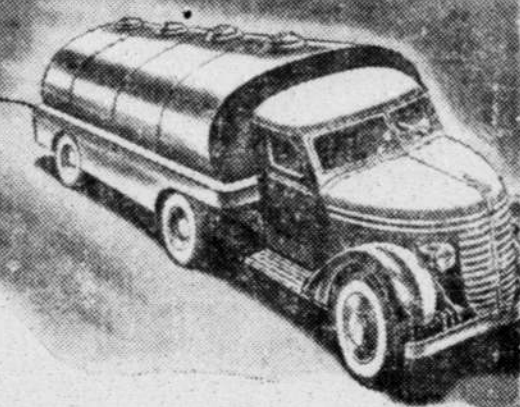
