Blizzards Play In Ballinger Tonight; Already 'Champs'

The spotlight of area football-dom will be shining on the Ballinger high school football stadium Friday night, as the District 6-AA leading Winters Blizzards contest the Ballinger Bearcats.

Although not a crucial game, district-wide, the encounter promises to be a hard battle, and will command the attention of most football fans of the area. Regardless of the outcome, Winters already has won the right to represent the district in bi-district play, with their 4-0 conference record.

Friday night's football game will be marked by the decades-old colorful rivalry between the two Runnels County schools. Coach Bob Wright of Ballinger said that the rivalry between Winters and Ballinger is "probably the most colorful and strongest in the entire state."

The Winters Blizzards have a 6-2-1 record for season play, and have won all their games in district. Ballinger presents a stronger picture for the season, with a 7-2 record, but the Bearcats' two losses have been in games where it really counted, in conference play. Winters' loss experience came in pre-district competition.

Blizzard Coach L. G. Wilson said Wednesday morning that his boys are in good physical condition for Friday night's game. No injuries have shown up, and the squad is determined to ditto last year's record. The Blizzards team, in nine games this season, has held opposition to 82 points while marking up 162 for themselves. In district play, they have allowed only 38 points while making 8.

Strengthening the lineup for the Blizzards will be Steve Grisom, fullback, who was named on the 1962 6-AA All-District team. The squad will be generated by Denny Aldridge, who received honorable mention for All-District last year. Johnny Mathis, another honorable

mention for All-District in '62, Mike Mitchell, '62 honorable mention, and Mike Patterson, '62 honorable mention, will see action Friday night.

The Bearcats, a wide open team capable of running and passing, will pose a dangerous situation for any league. They also will field experienced players who saw action in the hard-fought '62 games. Gary Brown, who received honorable mention on the offensive 1962 All-District team, and who was named on the first All-District team as a halfback last year, will go against the Blizzards Friday night. Johnny Lugo received

honorable mention last year on defense for All-District, and will be in play this week. Another dangerous opponent for the Big Blue team will be Grant Lee, who has experience on the football field and received honorable mention last year.

Rivalry between the two schools dates back to 1924. From that year until 1942, Winters and Ballinger played 19 games. Of these, Winters won 9 and Ballinger 9, with one tie, in 1925. From 1940 until 1962, in 14 games, Winters has taken 4 with Ballinger winning 10.

School officials are expecting a full stadium for Friday night's game. The supply of about 600 reserved seat tickets assigned to Winters was exhausted almost immediately after they went on sale in Winters Wednesday morning. Another 300 tickets were sent from Ballinger with those already sold before they arrived. Additional tickets will be available at the gate in Ballinger before game time, it was indicated.

Poll Tax Receipts Ready In Winters Tax Sub Office

Otherwise qualified voters who wish to get their 1954 poll tax receipts early may now do so, according to Travis Jordan, deputy county tax collector who maintains an office in Winters. Poll tax receipts have been ready for some time, Jordan said, but because the outcome of the election last Saturday was in question, no effort had been made to get them before the public. However, in the face of the defeat of the constitutional amendment which would have made payment of poll taxes unnecessary, all voters will be required to get the tax receipts before they may vote in any state election in 1964.

Jordan pointed out that requirement for the poll tax receipt in other than local and state elections is as yet undecided, hinging on the possible ratification of U. S. Constitutional amendments. The deputy tax collector said that of the \$1.75 poll tax, \$1.00 goes into the state's school funds, twenty-five cents to be retained by the county for election expenses, and the remainder to go into other state funds. Deadline for payment of poll taxes for qualification in 1964 elections is January 31, 1964.

President and Mrs. Kennedy To Be Guests Of Texas Governor

Gov. John Connally has made public the itinerary of his famous guests, President and Mrs. John F. Kennedy.

They are due in the Lone Star State on November 21 and 22. The Kennedys will visit San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth, Dallas and Austin—in that order.

In San Antonio the President will preside at dedication ceremonies at the Aerospace Medical Center. He will arrive at Kelly Air Force Base about 3 p. m. on November 21.

That evening he will attend a dinner in Houston for Congressman Albert Thomas.

Next morning, Kennedy will be honor guest at a breakfast sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

At noon, he'll attend a Dallas Citizens Council and Graduate

Research Center luncheon in Dallas.

Then he'll fly to Austin, arriving at Bergstrom Air Force Base about 4 p. m. That evening Gov. and Mrs. Connally will honor the Kennedys with a reception at the Mansion. Elected Democratic State officials and their wives will attend.

TICKETS BY THE TON

Most touted attraction of President Kennedy's Texas trip is the \$100-a-plate dinner, which the State Democratic Executive Committee will sponsor in the Austin Municipal Auditorium at 7:30 p. m. on November 22.

An SDEC aide estimates that a ton of invitations—60,000 in all—have been mailed to Democrats over the state.

GOLDWATER WAGON

State Rep. Dick Morgan of Dallas, chairman of Texas' Draft Goldwater Committee, named Lewis J. Moorman Jr., San Antonio rancher-oilman as state finance chairman.

Moorman was state GOP finance chairman during the Nixon-for-President Campaign, and in U. S. Sen. John Tower's race in 1961.

GOP National Committeeman Albert B. Fay of Houston appointed members of the party's Candidates Committee to recruit a blue-ribbon slate of

candidates for Republican primaries in 1964. They will meet in Dallas on December 12, for Republican primaries in 1964. Recruiting Committee includes Fay, Mrs. Ike Kampmann Jr. of San Antonio, State Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr. of Dallas, Mrs. G. N. McDaniel of Borger, Mrs. Tobin Armstrong of Tyler, W. J. Klattenhoff of Slaton, and J. C. Man Jr. of Wichita Falls.

HOSPITAL POLICIES AIRED

A special committee to review hiring policies in State hospitals was named by the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools. Action followed disclosures that a convicted kidnapper and former mental patients have worked as doctors at some state institutions.

Dr. Raleigh R. White of Temple said he considered employment by the San Antonio State Hospital of a woman doctor who had served a prison sentence for kidnapping an "error in judgment."

Board Chairman Howard T. Tellepsen of Houston, reacting to newspaper criticism of hiring a former mental patient as a doctor at Wichita Falls State Hospital, pointed to progress made throughout the hospital system.

"Out of a total of some 220 doctors, we have a wonderful, dedicated group of men," Tellepsen commented. "You will find a few sour apples even among personnel of private companies which pay the best salaries, and we don't have a high wage scale compared to private industry."

Tellepsen named Dr. White to the personnel study committee along with Dr. George A. Constant of Victoria and Ward R. Burke of Diboll.

Another committee was named by the Board to select the site for a new school for the mentally retarded, to be located west of the one-hundredth meridian. Members of this committee are C. E. Bentley of Abilene, Chairman; Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe; and Walter F. Wood of Austin.

ADVERTISE TEXAS

Twenty-seven advertising agencies are interested in handling Texas' \$200,000 account to promote travel and tourist spending in the State.

The 27 firms told Texas Tourist Development Agency they want to compete for the privilege of ballyhooing the State's attractions to the world. They represent 20 per cent of all agencies contacted. At a November 15 meeting TTDA will determine which firms will be asked to make formal presentation of advertising plans at their next meeting, set for January 16-17.

COURTS SPEAK

State Supreme Court, reversing itself, agreed to hear arguments on January 8 on Shell Oil Company and Aluminum Company of America suits against the Railroad Commission's oil and gas production formulas. Issue pits major oil firms against independents. Latter now are favored by formulas used in 300 gas fields and nearly 2,000 oil fields, the major oil firms contend.

High court voided a Texas Highway Commission prohibition against use of imported material in State road building and maintenance. Its decision backed up the Third Court of Civil Appeals.

Third Court took under advisement arguments in a suit to halt construction of the giant \$65,000,000 Millican Dam on the Navasota River.

Contesting the project are property owners whose land would be flooded by the huge reservoir—estimated to be twice as large as all seven lakes in the Colorado River Chain.

Accurate Records Necessary On Farm For Social Security

There are many cases each year where a farmer's monthly social security benefits are delayed because he has not kept good farm records, Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager, San Angelo Social Security Office, said today.

Complete and accurate records are necessary not only for good farm management but for getting proper and continuous protection for social security benefits as well, he said.

Mr. Ellington explained that farm operators are required to make accurate reports of wages for their hired hands and to report their own earnings to the Internal Revenue Service for social security purposes. Good farm records assure prompt and accurate payments of social security payments to the farmer, he said.

These records do not have to be elaborate, Mr. Ellington added, but they should show the various types of farm income and expenses.

Information on becoming eligible for social security benefits may be obtained from the San Angelo Social Security Office, 204 Continental Building, San Angelo, Texas.

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

ORIGIN OF THE LAW

The law is a system of rules and regulations governing the whole field of human relations. Just to name some of the fields of law, there are criminal law, tax law, the law of contracts, business associations, torts, bills and notes, property, mortgages, sales, domestic relations, labor relations, wills and the administration of estates, and many others.

Where did this law come from? At the risk of over-simplification, the law comes from two sources. One source is from the legislature of our state and from the federal Congress. This is referred to as statutory law. The second source of our law is frequently referred to as the common law. This common law started its growth in 1066 A. D. when William the Conqueror set up his judicial system in England.

Under William's system, when a person became aggrieved because of the act of another, he presented his grievance to a court duly constituted by the king. The court, after affording both parties an opportunity to be heard, then decided who was right. The judge's opinion was based upon former decisions of other judges, if any, and upon the justice of the situation and upon the customs of the people. If the king had made a law, a statute, then it controlled the situation and the other factors

could be given no consideration. The opinions or decisions of the court were then written down and referred to as precedent when a similar situation arose at a later time, thereby giving a consistent pattern to the law.

As time went on the common law developed to meet the changing times. The change in the common law was somewhat slower than the progress of society with the result that occasionally the judge-made common law was (and is) sometimes out of date and worked unjust hardships. Into this gap, the king, parliament, or the legislature stepped and by the enactment of a statute, changed the common law.

When the colonies were settled by the British, they brought with them their system of common and statutory law, both of which continued to grow to meet the ever-changing times. After the revolution the states of our nation continued to follow this system of jurisprudence.

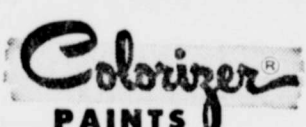

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Blizzards Trap Tigers 20-8 On Wet Field For Top Gridiron Season

While Winters was whitewashing Anson on a field that had received one and one-half inches of rain Friday, they were handed the District 6-AA Championship on their own 20.

The strong Blizzard line led by Chester Puckett and Roger O'Neal forced the Tigers to punt only five plays later. Deep in their own territory at the 31 yard line, the Blizzards were again headed for pay dirt.

Although the Big Blue Blizzards appreciated this favor, they did not need any help, as their game with Anson proved them to be the "team to beat."

Winters received the opening kickoff on their own 30 and with two fast first downs moved to the 50 before punting to the Anson 2.

Anson was moved back 10 yards in two plays by offside penalties, but claimed a first down to the Anson 37. Moving only three yards in as many plays, they were forced to punt to the Winters 20.

Although the officials were putting a new ball into play each down, the slippery ball left Denny Aldridge's hands on the first down, and Anson recovered on the Winters 15.

Donnie Lain, 185-pound Anson fullback, claimed 5 to the Winters 10 before Anson fumbled and Aldridge claimed the ball on the Winters 8.

Alternating Steve Grissom, Larry Awalt, and himself, Aldridge maneuvered the Blizzards to the Winters 46 before Donald Parker punted to the Anson one.

All young people should realize that they own and control such an efficient factory within their heads. Show them how—with a good working knowledge of reading, writing, and arithmetic—this brain can make every student healthy, prosperous, and happy.

Water, air, and proper foods are fed in as raw materials. These move along through con- veyors and "cooking systems" not unlike those found within the most up-to-date electronic factory. The raw materials are magically changed into muscle and cultural "gifts." And there is far more. Students can turn an "electric knob" and find out whether his or her automatic factory will produce physical force of the sort used by com- mon labor, brain power such as that required by executives and other leaders, or a cultural prod- uct such as music, painting, and poetry.

Use Your Factory Fully—I think it is time for school committees to wake up, and to tell students to do likewise! Automation has already caught up with us. You have probably seen one of the more fascinating results of electronics: Cordless remote control. You can turn radios and TV sets on or off with out setting up from your chair, with just a flash of light. Darkness can turn on your bur- glar light, daylight turn it off. TV channels can be changed without wires or cords, com- mercials can be shut off. This power of remote control all students have had from baby- hood on. But are they using it to best advantage? It should surely be one of the great respon- sibilities of the public schools and of the parents to teach stu- dents their capabilities in time for them to use them early and completely.

Babson Discusses Our Dollars—Babson Park, Mass. During my travels I have watched for young men who have original ideas and I found one in Scott City, Missouri. His name is Ed- ward E. Shrum, who wrote for me most of the following, based on Gresham's Law. Mr. Shrum is Secretary of the Magic Circle Educational Foundation.

What Is Gresham's Law?—One of the oldest and most generally accepted monetary theories is known as Gresham's Law. This is the principle that "bad money tends to drive out good money." This means peo- ple tend to hoard the "good money"—that is, the money they have confidence in—and tend to pass on the bad money. The term "bad" money refers to money which is less valuable than the so-called "good" money.

"Clipping" The Coin—The remarkable validity of this law is demonstrated in the extremely interesting example of what happened to England's money in the period from 1663 to 1700. Prior to that time, Eng- lish coins were of the hammer- ed variety, without milled edges. This made it easy for the edges of these coins to be often ground off. Thus, in time, most of the coins became less valuable.

Around 1663 new full-weight coins were minted, with milled or inscribed edges. These coins began disappearing into hoards. By 1690 this had reached a critical point. Then a group, in- cluding Sir Isaac Newton (who was then warden of the mint) convinced the government that it should call in the defaced coins. They were then melted down, and reminted at full weight with milled edges and outline inscriptions.

Then the "good" money came out of hiding! **The American Experience**—Here in the United States, we too experienced the painful workings of Gresham's Law during the Revolutionary War period, in 1797, 1818, and from 1837 to 1842. Gresham's Law A Threat Again Today?—Gresham's Law has been nei- ther repealed nor nullified. In view of our much-publicized loss of gold, the growing short- age of coins, and the impending replacement of the Silver Cer- tificates (the remaining currency bearing a full reserve of the metal), there is again the real danger of "bad" money driving out the "good" money.

If we do suffer any adverse effects from Gresham's Law this time, the trouble is likely to stem from over extension of credit. This huge structure of debt which we have built is be- coming harder and harder to handle. Unless managed prop- erly, it could cause untold hard- ship to the economy. The use of credit is an "easy street", but it must be traveled within the speed limits if a tragic crack-up is to be avoided.

Gresham's Law A Threat Again Today?—Gresham's Law has been nei- ther repealed nor nullified. In view of our much-publicized loss of gold, the growing short- age of coins, and the impending replacement of the Silver Cer- tificates (the remaining currency bearing a full reserve of the metal), there is again the real danger of "bad" money driving out the "good" money.

If we do suffer any adverse effects from Gresham's Law this time, the trouble is likely to stem from over extension of credit. This huge structure of debt which we have built is be- coming harder and harder to handle. Unless managed prop- erly, it could cause untold hard- ship to the economy. The use of credit is an "easy street", but it must be traveled within the speed limits if a tragic crack-up is to be avoided.

biologists and sportsmen ver- ified that thousands of quail had been destroyed. Despite all the planting of multiflora roses—and other cover plans—the birds had been wiped out.

Opponents of the state-owned quail hatchery at Tyler, includ- ing some biologists who work for the state, thought it was a bad investment. But that quail hatchery during the past several months has poured some 21,000 quail back into the Coastal area. Barring another disaster there will be a great comeback of the wonderful bobs next year.

Matagorda County, one of the heaviest hit by the hurricane, received the bulk of these trans- planted quail, with a total of 4,870.

Calhoun County got 4,431 and Brazoria County received 4,027. Remainder went to Orange, Jefferson, Galveston, and Aran- sas Counties. Birds were distri- buted from April through Septem- ber, with the heaviest planting in May.

Just to release these birds in the wilds probably wouldn't have done the job. Fortunately the landowners and sportsmen's groups, with the help of game personnel, saw to it that the birds were properly provided for. Shelter, cover and feed were made available. The bobs were given every chance to make a comeback in a land that had been swept bare of their species.

There will be some shooting in the area this year. Generally, however, landowners will keep their places closed in an effort to give the quail a good start. Hunters who do take birds are requested to turn hands over to game wardens. This is so that a careful check can be made both of the new hatch and the bird migration.

Quail, especially the bob, is a wonderful upland bird. In many states it is considered a song bird and is on the pro- hibited list.

Biologists long have consid- ered this an unsound policy be- cause of the heavy die-off and predation during the winter months. They contend that only about 20 per cent of the birds carry over from one year to the next.

In other words, if the hunter doesn't get them, something else will. And the quail is one of the finest eating bird species in the world.

So from the devastation of Carla may come not only the restoration of quail in that stricken area, but perhaps the salvation of the entire quail hatchery program.

NEW LOOK IN NURSING—About 4,000 students in Texas are working to add "R.N." (Registered Nurse) to their names. Many are following via revised routes free of some of the old-fashioned restrictions that used to cause a high rate of drop outs.

Miss Bernice V. Johnson, sec- retary-treasurer of the State Board of Nurse Examiners, says many are studying under the so-called "Plan Two" sys- tem, which allows a nurse hopeful to take 36 weeks of acade- mic work in the college of her choice, before assuming the added duties of a hospital trainee.

INSURANCE COST CUT—A \$3,000,000 reduction in Workmen's Compensation in- surance costs to employers, be- ginning December 1, has been announced by the State Board of Insurance.

Average cut will be 2.2 per cent. Industry-wise it is as fol- lows: Manufacturing 3.7 per cent; and all other industries 2.4 per cent.

Board said this is the first over-all reduction in Workmen's Compensation insurance pre- miums in the past five years.

Coalition of Liberals Temporarily Rescues Civil Rights Legislation

A Coalition of northern liberal Democrats and Republicans on the House Judiciary Committee last week rescued, at least tem- porarily, Bobby Kennedy's Civil Rights bill and sent it to the Rules Committee. There clear- ance must be had before it can be considered in the House.

The bill is not due to breeze through the Rules Committee despite the majority on that committee who are rated pro- Kennedy by virtue of the com- mittee packing that succeeded at the beginning of the session this year. One of the new mem- bers who was added to the com- mittee under the packing ar- rangement was Carl Elliott of Alabama, a New Frontiersman on about everything except Civil Rights. And the committee has a member from Arkansas, also a New Frontier mainstay, who has a problem in his district on issues such as this.

So if the Rules Committee clears the bill for House action it may be only done by a coal- ition there of northern liberals on that committee with the committee's Republicans. Poli- cies make strange bedfellows!

Mis-labeling of Mohair con- tent in apparel products being sold in retail stores is now un- der scrutiny by the Federal

Trade Commission and the Commissioner of Customs. Last week a mis-labeling racket was exposed when I revealed that 14 sweaters were purchased at random at leading stores in New York, then tested and found to contain only a fraction of the mohair which their labels indi- cated.

These sweaters were among one million imported from Italy, then put on the market with false labels of the amount of mohair each contained. This practice downgrades mohair be- cause purchasers who become dissatisfied with the garment would naturally blame the com- plaint on the failure of the mo- hair in the purchase to uphold its traditional quality, and would do serious harm to the reputation mohair has acquired.

The retail stores that sell these sweaters have indicated surprise and a willingness to remedy the mistake. In the meantime, The Federal Trade Commission is expected to order additional tests and then take appropriate steps to clamp down on this type of fraud and deception.

HEALTH LETTER

Housewives normally wash dishes three times daily in a sinkful of suds. A flick of her wrist when dishes are done, and dishwasher vanishes down the drain.

The discarded water, laden with suds, joins other liquid wastes and flows along a net- work of pipes to a community sewage treatment plant. Here plant specialists apply modern scientific processes to clean up or "degrade" the waste ma- terials.

After the chemical cleansing, the water is shunted into a creek or river or bayou.

Given the right equipment and the right personnel, there are no special difficulties inherent in handling the ordinary range of municipal wastes. But when it comes to degrading some of the popular modern-day deter- gents which housewives are so fond of for dishes and laundry, city sewage plant managers are temporarily stumped.

Their problem: what to do with the suds?

It is a particularly difficult question to answer in states where cities and industries bor- der a single river, using and re- using the same water. Foam accumulates with each deposit of waste water from thousands of sinks and washing machines. The result is drinking water

with a head on it like a stein of beer. Besides its possible ad- verse effects on human health, it is aesthetically unpleasant to drink. And it is unsuitable for many industrial uses.

Fortunately, Texas is not yet hooked on the horns of this frothy dilemma, since few of the state's cities depend on a single river as a source of water.

But the potential exists in Texas, and State Health Depart- ment water pollution control engineers are keeping alert to it. Water pollution control is essentially a matter of preven- tion, and of making the best possible use of available water in the face of accelerating needs in homes and industries.

Engineers keep a sharp eye on all state water sources. They regularly collect samples from around the state, checking, among other things, for suds content or "ABC"—short for alkylbenzene sulfonate.

Meanwhile, hopes are high among public health engineers, soap manufacturers and re- searchers for an early solution to the suds dilemma. Different processes for degrading or re- moving the froth are under development.

Mrs. Camilla Ard, organist, accompanied Miss Shirley Ratliff as she sang "Because" and "The Wedding Prayer."

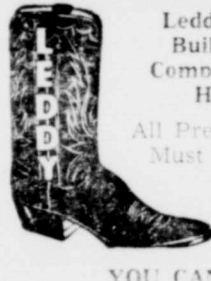

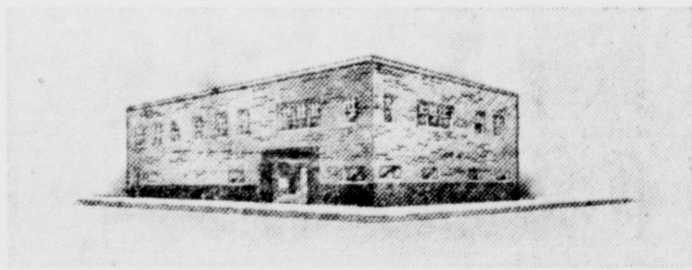
Carelessness
