Texans Help

Agriculture Leader Cites Nixon's Salute To Farmers And Ranchers

Texas farmers and ranchers helped earn national recognition in President Nixon's recent White House salute to agriculture, according to Clarence A. Danklefs, Texas farm program leader.

The President, in a unique tribute to agricultural achievement, said, "Thanks to American agriculture for making us the best fed, the best clothed people in America; thanks to American agriculture for providing the basic industry that is essential for any nation to be strong."

He cited specifically a 300 percent per man-hour productivity increase for agriculture in the last 20 years, comparing it with the 150 percent increase recorded by other American industry.

Danklefs, who is Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, said all Texans should recognize that this national salute to agriculture is a salute to Texas farmers as well as those in the other 49 states.

Producers in Texas produce about 40 percent of the nation's cotton, about 50 percent of the nation's grain sorghum and about 20 percent of the nation's rice. During the last 20 years the per-acre production on these crops has nearly doubled because of increased irrigation and improved cultural practices. Texans also contribute substantially to the nation's

supply of peanuts, wheat, vegetables, fruit and nuts.

"This is the kind of productivity the President was talking about when he said recent agricultural statistics are the most exciting, the most dramatic of all American industry," Danklefs said.

"In our farm program agency, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service here in Texas, we are of course most interested in the crops under the set-aside farm programs, (corn, grain sorghum, wheat and cotton), those under marketing quota programs, (peanuts, rice, extra long staple cotton) plus crops which are eligible for the loan, principally (soybeans, barley, oats, rye, dry beans, flaxseed, etc.).

Some 83,000 cotton farms, 120,000 feed grain farms and 48,500 wheat farms in Texas are participating this year in the new market-oriented set-aside farm programs. Some of the restraints on production and kinds of crops which were imposed in previous years have been removed, as was noted by President Nixon recently in a national speech on agriculture," Danklefs said.

"The President told the nation that American farmers have proven their ability to capitalize on new opportunities and can compete successfully whenever they have the chance to compete. Nixon said he is determined to see that agri-

culture has that chance," the ASC Committee Chairman said.

The White House salute to agriculture not only drew national attention to farming, but also served to concentrate efforts to better American agriculture's competitive position, according to Danklefs.

President Nixon told the salute to agriculture audience: "It is a rule in a free society that whoever produces more should be compensated for more. The income per capita of those who live on America's farms has gone up in the last 20 years. But in terms of sharing in this increased productivity, those who live on America's farms, those who produce from America's farms, have not had the rewards from increasing productivity that their colleagues who work in American industry have had for their increase in productivity.

"It is that problem that we have been addressing ourselves to. It is that problem in which, of course, we need cooperation among all branches of government, the administration, the Congress, and the farm community to see how we can see that America's farmers receive their fair share of a dramatically increasing productivity."

The focus on farming which was initiated May 2 with comments on agriculture by the President, broadcast nationwide, culminated in daylong activities of the White House salute to agriculture on Friday,

May 7. A representative group of farm leaders heard addresses by the President, Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin, Attorney General John N. Mitchell, Secretary of Housing and Urban Development George W. Romney, and other government leaders.

Following these addresses and conferences with officials, the group was entertained at a dinner at the White House with President and Mrs. Nixon. Throughout the day, an exhibit on the White House lawn included modern farm machinery and equipment, plus purebred livestock.

Among those attending the day's activities were Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Schuhart of Dalhart, Member of the Federal Farm Credit Board; Mrs. A. W. Anthony Jr. of Lubbock, President of the National Grain Sorghum Producers' Assn. and Mr. and Mrs. John Butterbrodt of San Antonio, President of Associated Milk Producers, Inc.

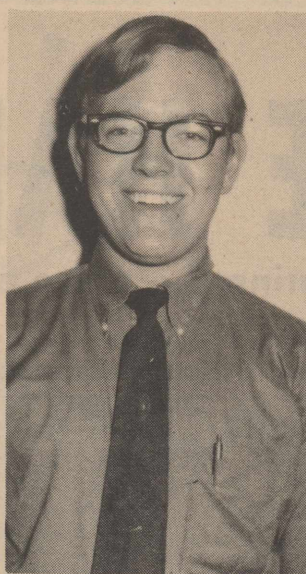

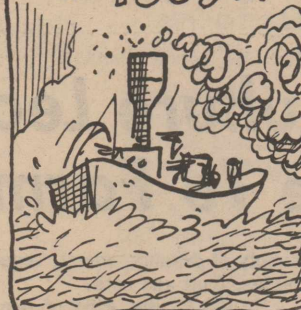

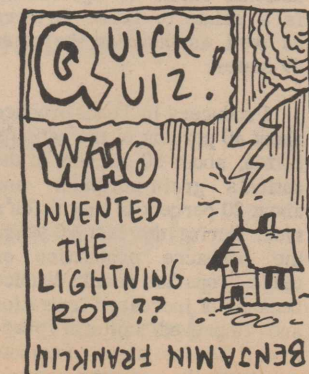
AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS
WEED CONTROL IN COTTON
--Because of weather conditions, weed control in cotton is likely to present some tough problems, says Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist. He suggests using both mechanical and chemical control methods whenever possible. Producers are advised to pick up a copy of B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals," from the office of the local county agent.

Continuing from last week's column, we are using favorite recipes of Mrs. Theron Morrison.

AVOCADO SALAD

1 pkg. lime Jello
1 1/2 c. boiling water
Thicken then add:
1 1/2 c. mashed avocado
1/2 c. sour cream (I usually use whole box)
1/2 c. salad dressing
1 T. finely chopped onion
1/2 tsp. salt
tabasco sauce to taste

MANDARIN SALAD

1 can Mandarin oranges
1 c. small marshmallows
1 c. pineapple chunks
1 can coconut
1 c. sour cream

Mix above ingredients and set in refrigerator several hours.

FLORENE'S SALAD

2 pkgs. orange Jello
1 1/2 c. hot water
1 small can thawed orange juice
1 pt. vanilla ice cream
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
1/2 c. nuts

LIME FLUFF

Heat to simmering 1 cup gingerale. Dissolve 1 package lime Jello in it. Add 1 cup cold gingerale. Chill until thickens.

Add:
1 c. halved green grapes
1 small can crushed or diced pineapple
1 c. whipped cream

CRANBERRY RING

1 c. pineapple juice
2 c. cranberries (or more if you use more Jello)
1 c. sugar
2 cut up oranges
Flat can crushed pineapple or chunks
1 c. nuts

Grind raw cranberries. Put on stove with sugar, warm enough to dissolve sugar. Cool and add pineapple, nuts and pieces of oranges. Heat juice and pour over Jello. Add 1 cup water. Add other ingredients and pour in mold to chill and set.

1 1/2 c. water
1 small jar pimento cheese
1 pkg. dream whip
1/2 c. sugar
1 env. gelatin
1 c. nuts
1 small can crushed pineapple

Dissolve gelatin in 1/2 cup water. Boil water and sugar. Add cheese, then gelatin and let thicken. Add nuts and pineapple and fold in whipped dream whip.

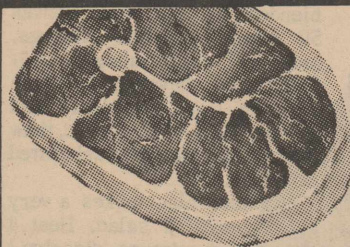

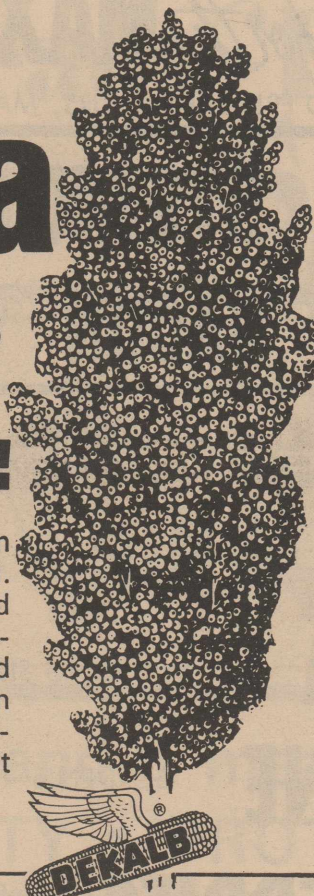

It is always a pleasure for me to share recipes with you. Many of you have tasted Reta Welch's fruit punch and asked for her recipe. This week she is sharing it with us. The nice thing about this is that it can be frozen and used for salad or ice cream in addition to punch. Thank you, Reta for letting us have this recipe.

FRUIT PUNCH

- 4 c. sugar
- 6 c. water
- 1 - 46 oz. can pineapple juice
- 2 - 12 oz. cans frozen orange juice (thawed)
- 1 - 12 oz. can frozen lemonade (thawed)
- 6 bananas
- 6 - 28 oz. lemon-lime carbonated beverage or ginger-ale

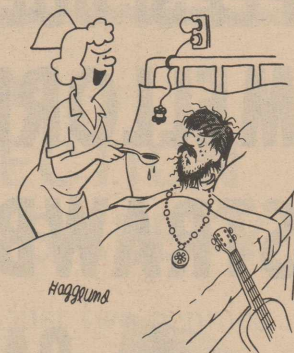

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SENSING THE NEWS

The big push to enact new welfare and "family assistance" legislation is under way in Congress. Taxpaying Americans, who will have to pick up the tab for the expansion of giveaway programs, should make themselves heard in Washington.

U. S. Rep. Wilbur Mills (D.-Ark.), chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, has put together a new handout package that will really hurt the taxpayers. The Nixon administration has accepted the principal features of the Mills plan, which would provide a guaranteed annual income of \$2,400 for a family of four. The plan also calls for 200,000 "public service" jobs for welfare recipients, a 1971 version of the old New Deal WPA boondoggle.

An even more costly program has been proposed by 20 members of the Liberal-Left coalition in the House, including such radicals as U. S. Reps. Shirley Chisholm (D.-N. Y.), and Ronald V. Dellums (D.-Calif.). This plan, supported by the National Welfare Rights Organization, would guarantee a family of four \$6,500 a year. Federal aid payments would continue until the family earned \$11,000 a year.

Fortunately, there are members of Congress who are willing to speak out against doubling of people on welfare. U. S. Sen. Russell Long (D.-La.) recently charged the administration's Family Assistance plan was really "The Welfare Expansion and Mess Perpetuation Plan." He warned that the Family Assistance program would increase the welfare population from 10 million to 24 million. Sen. Long also pointed out that the federal government has been hiring "poverty lawyers to bring suits to make the states put on the welfare rolls all those people that neither the Congress nor the states thought ought to be on those rolls."

Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr. (D.-Va.) is an outspoken Senate leader who is battling expansion of welfarism. "It is utterly fantastic," he said in a recent speech, "to talk about more than doubling the number of people on welfare when they (the federal agencies) cannot even administer the program they now have with 10 million people." He added: "I wish that one of the senators could explain how we would reverse the trend on the welfare state by doubling the number of people on welfare."

Now is the time for the nation's taxpayers to speak up loud and strong against a guaranteed annual wage for relievers. If this system goes into effect this year, as both Mr. Mills and the administration intend, welfare rights organizations will be back next year demanding that Congress hike the annual "wage" for non-workers. Each year, the demands from the welfare population will become more outrageous.

Sen. Long put his finger on the truth when he said: "It will not be long before we have not 50 percent of the people of the nation on welfare but 75 per cent, and the question will be who is going to work and earn a living when 75 per cent of the people in this country can go on welfare."

The Mills-Nixon proposals are a slap in the face of the working, self-reliant people of the United States. It is terribly important, therefore, that taxpaying citizens let Congress and the White House know the strength of their opposition to welfare legislation that penalizes people who earn their living.

The producers, not the non-producers, are the people whose wishes should have the greatest weight with the Legislative and Executive branches of government.

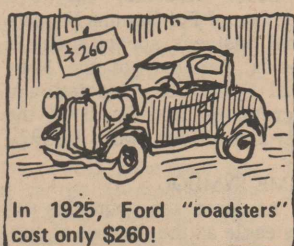

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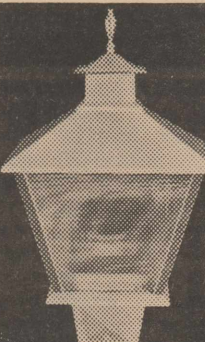

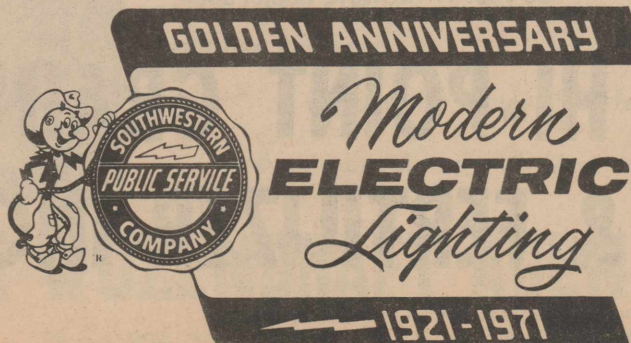

Extension Specialist Tells Ways To Aid Food Budget

Are you finding it harder each time you grocery shop to make a given amount of money go the same distance?

Prices of practically all goods and services, including foods, have increased, but not as fast as incomes, reports Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Still, a major concern of homemakers is how to save on food expenditures.

Remember several factors influence food prices, she says. Along with the general national economic climate, these include business costs, weather, and future market expectations.

Mrs. Clyatt makes several suggestions to help cut food costs.

First, figure how much you presently spend for food. Some record-keeping may be necessary for a few months, you will know just how much you are spending.

Then determine why you are spending what you are. Several factors affect family food spending: inflation, age of family members, frequency of entertaining, nutritional requirements, family size, types of food purchased, planning and preparation skills, and family likes and dislikes.

To help cut the food budget, put some tools to work -- a sharp pencil and some paper, the weekly newspaper food ads,

a favorite cookbook, and generous amounts of desire, says Mrs. Clyatt.

If you are cost conscious and want to improve your buying skills, you will make full use of label information, advertising, store displays and even friends' comments.

In the grocery meat department this week, you will find beef prices have changed little in the past two weeks. Most markets are featuring various cuts of mature and baby beef at special prices; be sure to check the ads for your family's preferences. In general, Mrs. Clyatt suggests best values will be found on round steaks and roasts, chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef and liver.

Pork prices are unchanged from a week ago, she says. Best buys include shoulder roasts and steaks, end-cut loin roasts and chops, ham, picnics and liver.

Fryers remain a bargain, along with large size eggs. Frozen turkeys are available at prices below last year's, and make an excellent choice.

Produce counters are beginning to get the "fresh" look we expect this time of the year, the specialist reports. Carrots, cabbage, celery, green onions, cooking greens, lettuce, potatoes, sweet potatoes, radishes and rutabagas remain low cost items. Cauliflower, eggplant, squash and broccoli may also be added to the list of reasonable, good quality vegetables.

Quality fresh strawberries and cantaloupes are appearing in many stores at reasonable prices. Other selections worthy of your consideration are apples, avocados, bananas, grapefruit, pineapples, oranges, lemons and tangerines.

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Accent On Health

Known to man for nearly 5,000 years, marihuana is one of the most common and least understood of all drugs. Most of the American experience with marihuana has been limited to the widespread, relatively infrequent use of a rather weak form of the drug. Although the principal active ingredient in the plant is thought to be a very complex substance known to scientists as Delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC for short, much remains to be learned about the chemistry of marihuana and related substances.

The Texas Health Department, as one of the prime dispensers of information on drugs of abuse in the state, feels that it is time to cut through the volumes of words and contradictions spoken about this drug, and separate the facts from fiction.

There is general agreement among medical researchers that at the common levels of usage the typical subjective effects of marihuana are: alteration of time and space perception, sense of euphoria, relaxation, well-being and disinhibition, dulling of attention, fragmentation of thought, impaired immediate memory, an altered sense of identity, exaggerated laughter and increased suggestibility. Other less common effects are dizziness, a feeling of lightness, nausea and hunger.

The drug's effects on the emotions and senses vary widely, depending on such factors as the user's expectations, the circumstances of use and, of course, the strength and quantity of the drug used. Typ-

ically, time is distorted and seems such extended -- five minutes may seem like an hour. Space may seem enlarged or otherwise distorted--ten feet may seem to be 100 feet. Sounds and colors sometimes seem intensified, and hearing seems keener. Controlled laboratory tests on humans indicate little or no influence on creativity, one way or another. The distortions of the senses apparently account for the user's feelings of being more creative.

Recent studies indicate that marihuana has no effect on body temperature, respiratory rate, blood pressure, blood sugar, or diameter of the pupil. The drug does produce an increase in the pulse rate and causes a reddening of the eyes at the time of use, and some dehydration.

The drug can produce illusions, or misinterpretations of various sensations. But hallucinations, or the experience of a non-existent sensation, and delusions are rare.

Marihuana does not lead to physical dependence. Therefore, it cannot be considered addicting. Chronic users become psychologically dependent upon the effects of the drug. Thus, it is classified as habituating.

The Texas Health Department is constantly updating its information on the drugs of abuse as new data becomes available. Much knowledge on the effects of marihuana has been gained from scientific research in the past year. Thousands more research projects are underway to determine the health implications of marihuana.

Horses Need Protection From Harmful Mosquitoes

It's that time of year again! Flowers are blooming, trees are turning green, and mosquitoes are out. Their bite is painful, but even worse, they carry diseases. If you are a horseowner, arthropod-borne diseases should be of special interest to you. Sleeping sickness or Equine Encephalomyelitis, also known as "Encephalo", is almost always fatal when it attacks but is so easily preventable. A series of two injections of the vaccine will protect your horse during the mosquito season.

Another disease, though not carried by mosquitoes, is always of special concern. This is Tetanus, "Lockjaw." This disease, rarely seen in humans because of routine vaccination programs, is much too prevalent in horses. Again an often fatal disease is easily preventable by something so simple as a vaccination. Every horse whether pastured or stabled, upland or marshland, hot or cold country, should be tetanus-protected. The bacteria that causes tetanus is a spore-former and can live dormant for years in almost any environment.

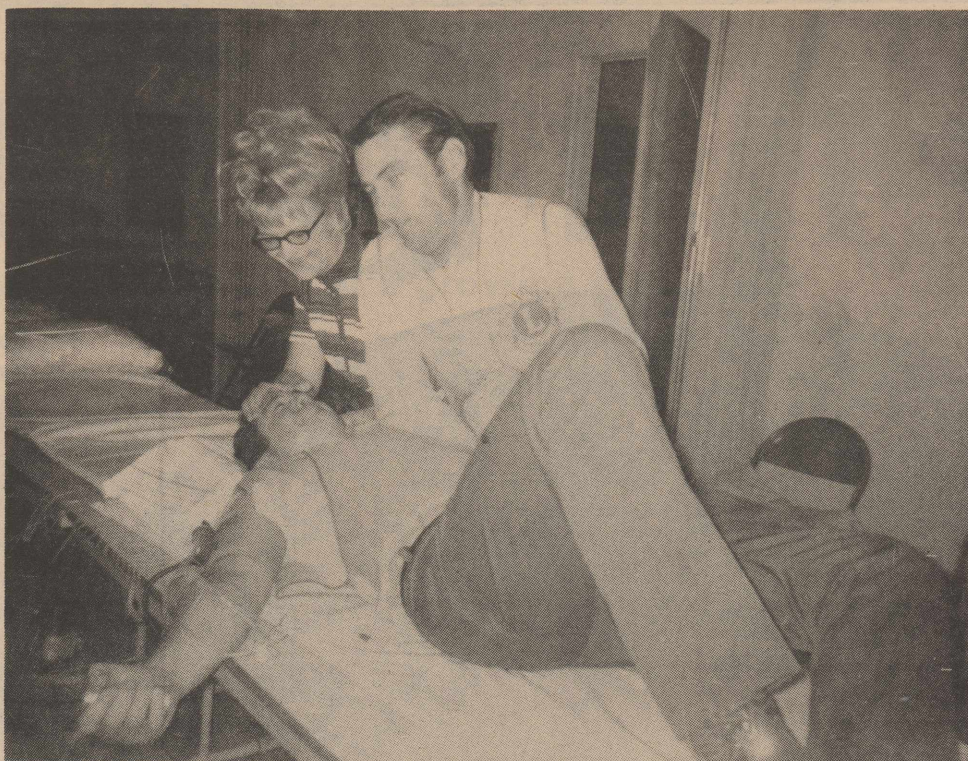
Vaccination time is a good time to have routine tubeworming done. Bot flies begin to get active at this time of year and lay their small yellow eggs on the hairs of your horse's legs and underside. When the horse licks himself, the eggs are carried into the stomach where they hatch. The larval bot then attaches to the stom-

ach wall and feeds. Imagine how painful a small army of these monsters (about the size of a marble) can be! They also rob your horse of strength and stamina he needs. Other internal parasites such as blood worms, round worms, and pin worms can be treated at the same time.

These are some of the preventive procedures that should be done routinely. They are extremely simple compared to the costly, time-consuming and often unsuccessful treatment of the conditions after they occur.

FOREIGN VIRUS DISEASE OF HORSES--A horse killer, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, is reported to have been responsible for the death of about 6,000 horses in southern Mexico in 1970. It has moved northward from South America into Central America and southern Mexico. VEE is an infectious and often fatal disease of the central nervous system of equines causing mortality as high as 80 to 90 percent. Transmission of the virus to man and animals is usually through the bites of infected mosquitoes. The USDA warns livestockmen to be on the alert for the disease.

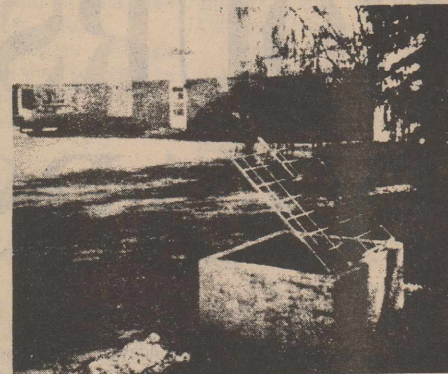
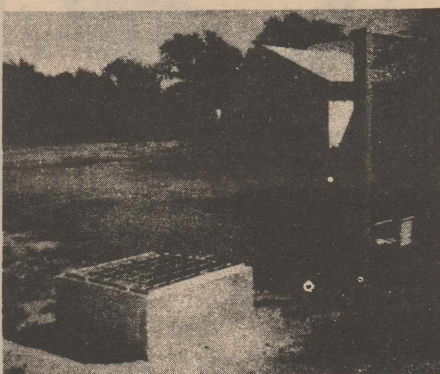
