Lubbock Man Surprised At Indictment

O. P. HARLAN IS CHARGED IN SHORTAGES

ATTORNEYS GIVE OUT STATEMENT TODAY AT ABILENE

ABILENE, Sept. 25.—O. P. Harlan, former banker and civic leader of Stamford, who has made \$5,000 bond at Lubbock on an indictment returned in the federal court at Dallas charging him with irregularities in the accounts of the Stamford Farm Loan association, today expressed complete surprise at the charges against him.

Harlan was secretary-treasurer of the Stamford association until his removal to Lubbock early this year.

Attorneys here for Harlan said today: "In view of the fact that Mr. Harlan has made a complete financial statement touching all items which it was claimed he owed, and in view of the understanding on both sides that a satisfactory settlement had been made, this indictment comes as a complete surprise. Feeling as we do that these charges against Mr. Harlan do not involve any moral turpitude on his part, we ask that his bonds be held until we have had opportunity to present his case."

The case is on call for Monday in the federal court here.

HARLAN IS RELEASED ON \$5,000 BOND HERE

Harlan, 268 1/2 West Tennessee street, was released on \$5,000 bond here yesterday before federal authorities in connection with an indictment against him charging embezzlement.

STIMSON LAUDS HOOVER RULE IN TALK

SECRETARY OF STATE MAKES KEYNOTE GOP SPEECH

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 25.—Henry L. Stimson, secretary of state, in the keynote address at the Republican state convention today, denounced the Hoover administration for legislative and executive actions that have redounded thirty-four of its thirty-five campaign pledges.

He made no mention of prohibition one of the major problems before the convention's platform makers.

Friday administration. He devoted his address to praise of the administration and said that it is measured in the light of the business depression. Citing President Hoover's activities after the stock market crash last fall, Secretary Stimson declared there had been "the ship of business steady."

"It was the first time that such leadership had been exercised by any of our presidents in a similar crisis," he said. "It prevented the immediate panic which threatened in the autumn of 1929, and to date throughout a long and worldwide strain it is still holding the labor and industry of the United States in a situation which is favorably compared with that in other countries, and in this country in other times."

BOY-MAN'S EDUCATION IS PUZZLE

SIX-YEAR-OLD HAS A MOUSTACHE, SHAVES, SMOKES CIGARS AND TALKS IN DEEP VOICE

TOLEDO, O., Sept. 25.—What to do with a six-year-old boy who has a moustache, shaves regularly, smokes cigars, talks in a deep voice, and does strong man stunts is puzzling Toledo school officials, as well as his parents.

The boy is Clarence Kehn, who is 3 feet 3 inches tall, weighs 84 pounds and has been doing "strong man" stunts worthy of a grown-up since he was 2. He has a high intelligence quotient. Physicians attribute his early development to his mother's super-activity of the digestive glands.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Kehn, arranged today to go to Columbus to take up with the Ohio department of education the matter of his education.

Thinks public school officials declined to enter Clarence, 3, in any first grade and schools of the Catholic diocese of Toledo have taken a similar stand after examinations by a physician and psychiatrist. Clarence is black, superintendent of schools, said neither the welfare of the boy-man nor the best interests of his classmates could be served by permitting him to enter the public schools.

There are no provisions in Ohio for education of a boy of Clarence's type in special classes.

PORT WORTH, Sept. 25.—Gruesome details of the torch slaying of Ray Hawthorne, whose body was found burning in a pasture near Lake Worth after he was slain July 26 in the home of A. E. Stanley, were recounted last night in the Tarrant county jail by Herbert A. Stanley, 30, son of the man in whose home Hawthorne was killed.

Stanley made a written confession of his part in the slaying to the Tarrant county sheriff.

He admitted participating in the slaying on Hawthorne but denied that he struck the blow that ended the life of the man who was said to have made the fatal trip to the Stanley home to deliver beer.

Arrived Last Week

Stanley, under indictment for the murder of Hawthorne, along with the younger Stanley, "Speck" Owens and R. D. "Red" Tate, but he was arrested in Oklahoma last week in connection with the robbery of the Commercial Bank at Alma, Ark. He was returned here yesterday from Van Buren, Ark.

The younger Stanley in his statement, said he only struck Hawthorne with his fist and did not intend to kill him. He said he took Hawthorne into the bathroom, washed his face, from his face and tried to talk him, telling him he thought he was going to die and asking Hawthorne if there was anything he wanted Stanley to tell him.

Let Me Show You

Stanley said another man came into the bathroom with a "hammer" in his hands and said, "let me show you where to hit a man to kill him." He answered the man

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JOHNSTON PROPOSES COLLEGE AVENUE BOULEVARD PAVING ENTIRE LENGTH OF CAMPUS; TO BE PRORATED IN EXPENSE

Lubbock may have a mile or more of 40-foot boulevard on a state highway if the hopes of Guy R. Johnston, state highway department construction engineer for this district, are realized.

"The proposed boulevard would be along the east side of Texas Technological college between 18th street and the north end of the college grounds, near the Santa Fe line to Brownfield and Seagraves."

Street Belongs to State

Highway No. 1 to Clovis and the highway to Brownfield, pass a front of the college. The street is state-owned property, not city property as the city corporation line is on the east side of the highway.

Under ordinary circumstances a standard 20-foot highway would be built, leaving the rest of the 60 or 80-foot road as at present.

Mr. Johnston conceived the idea of a boulevard, with a 20-foot parking on either side of a 20-foot parkway, the latter with trees and grass or left so as to be paved later. He has submitted the proposal to both the city and county for consideration and is said to have met with some favorable response.

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VICTIM TAKEN AFTER ATTACK ON CHILD

OFFICERS THWARTED IN ATTEMPT TO TAKE HIM TO SAFETY

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., Sept. 25.—Willie Kirkland, 20-year-old negro convict, said to have been identified by a nine-year-old school girl as the man who attempted to attack her, was lynched here early today.

Kirkland, serving a sentence on the chain gang for horse stealing, was taken from Sheriff Gordon E. Davis and several deputies who were seeking to transfer him to a nearby town for safe keeping.

Numbered Between 30 and 75

The men who seized the negro numbered between 30 and 75. Kirkland was hanged from the limb of a tree in Magnolia Gardens, a suburb, about a mile from the heart of the town.

After hanging him the men tied his body to the rear of a truck and drove to the city. They carried the body to the city square and deposited the body there on the court house lawn.

Kirkland was arrested yesterday along with five other negroes.

During the night it was said that Kirkland, in custody of officers was taken from the jail to the home of the girl who identified him. Shortly after daylight he was taken before the girl who again said he was the one who attempted to attack her.

Diseases Reported Devastating China

PEKING, Sept. 25. (Special)—Serious spread of both typhoid and pneumonia plague throughout north China is causing some apprehension in medical circles here.

A telegram today from Kmer W. Chai, of the American board mission hospital at Peshawar, Sharad, said that unless authorities took some decisive action, northern China, already famine stricken, was threatened by the disease.

Trained investigators attached to the hospital found that the plague in both its forms started about five months ago and spread rapidly, wiping out entire villages. The panic-stricken people are fleeing from areas near the scenes of the heavy death tolls leaving piles of corpses unburied.

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RESERVE UNIT BANKS WILL GIVE AID

AMPLE CREDIT IS TO BE ALLOWED FOR COMING CROP

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Farmers were assured today by the federal reserve board that the federal reserve banks would provide ample credit for marketing agricultural crops this fall at rates cheaper than ever before.

CLARA BOW EXPLAINS HOW SHE LOST ALL OF THAT MONEY GAMBLING; WILL ROGERS DENIES INTRODUCING ACTRESS

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—Clara Bow, floundering redhead has broken a two-day silence to answer assertions that she stopped payment on checks for \$15,000 after offering them in payment of gambling losses at a Nevada hotel.

The actress' statement read in part:

Called "Twenty One"

"While I was at Lake Tahoe, Mr. Will Rogers invited Ben Bell, my secretary, Miss Dwyer, and myself to dinner. I did not know the hotel was a gambling place until after we reached there. After we had dinner Mr. Rogers went to one of the gambling tables and naturally we went with him. I began to play a little at a game called 'twenty one' which they call there 'Black Jack.'"

"They gave me fifty cent pieces to play with and I signed some checks in blank, telling the dealer to fill in the amount of the fifty cent pieces he had given me. There were four checks.

Represented \$100

"It now seems they claim these fifty cent pieces represented what they call \$100 chips and they put enough in the checks to amount to that."

"When the checks reached my bank they called me and said the checks had a slip on them asking the bank to 'wire fate of these checks.'"

"This attracted the attention of my banker and I found out for the first time this gambling house claim. I had lost and owed them nearly \$14,000, so I told the bank not to pay the checks."

Must Have Claim

"If these people think they have an honest claim against me, I will gladly receive any legal document they serve on me, or they can present them to my attorney, Mr. W. I. Gilbert."

HANKINS HELD AFTER BEING FOUND HERE

MISSING MAN IS FOUND HERE WEDNESDAY; GONE MONTH

Although no charges have been filed, C. B. Hankins, 30-year-old preacher-carpenter of Levelland, who has been the object of search by Texas and Oklahoma peace officers since August 22 when his automobile was found abandoned in Erick, Okla., tagged with a note which said he was dead, was still being held in the Hockley county jail today following his discovery and subsequent arrest in Lubbock late Wednesday.

A telephone message to the Daily Journal from Hockley county officers today stated that Hankins would be held in jail pending word from Amarillo officers.

Discovered In Hotel

The missing man was discovered in a local hotel yesterday through an anonymous telephone call to Mrs. Hankins, who, since disappearance of her husband, was reported to be working in a Levelland hotel in an effort to provide for herself and children.

Mrs. Hankins' informant, who refused to give his identity, gave detailed instructions for coming to Lubbock to learn whereabouts of her husband. Mrs. Hankins had been attempting to collect on a \$500 double indemnity life insurance policy held by her husband, according to Hockley county officers.

Officers at Levelland were notified and subsequently, Deputy Sheriff E. L. Cannon of Levelland, head of the Hockley county, of Lubbock, arrested Hankins in a room of a local hotel about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon before Mrs. Hankins arrived here.

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WORLD COURT'S MEMBERSHIP IS NAMED

FIFTEENTH POSITION IS STILL LEFT UP TO COUNCIL

GENEVA, Sept. 25.—Frank B. Kellogg, former American secretary of state and thirteen other men, including two Latin-Americans, were elected to the bench of the World court today by the assembly and the council of the League of Nations.

For the fifteenth position on the court, two other Latin-Americans and a European were the candidates as balloting progressed in the afternoon without any decisive result.

The following were elevated in the first ballot in separate voting of both the assembly and the council:

Frank B. Kellogg, United States; Antonio Sanchez de Bustamant, Cuba; J. Gustavo Guerrero, San Salvador; Machado Adachi, Japan; Gafael Altamir, Argentina; Spain; Dionisio Anzilotti, Italy; Willem Van Eysinga, Holland; Henri Fromagot, France; Sir Cecil Hurst, Great Britain; Demetre Magdos, Rumania; Baron Nokin Jacquot, Belgium; Count Michael Rotkowi, Poland; Walter Schucking, Germany; Wang Chung-hui, China.

Nominees for the fifteenth position on the world court were Francisco Jose Utrilla of Colombia, Miguel Cordero of Chile and Aka Hammarskjold, of Sweden, with 27 votes necessary for election by the assembly.

TERRELL CUTS CROP YIELD ESTIMATE

STATE COMMISSIONER
SAYS TEXAS TO MAKE
3,995,000 BALES

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 23.—Based on conditions as of September 15, George B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture, today estimated the 1939 cotton crop at 3,995,000 running bales. He had placed the production at 4,250,000 bales on August 15.

Continued deterioration during August and September was responsible for the 255,000 bale reduction in the estimate, he said. Only two districts, the southwestern and central, were estimated to have higher yield potentials than last year.

Terrell declared 1939 was the "most disastrous year for the cotton farmer since the beginning of the World War, with the crop short and the price the lowest since 1914."

GROWTH STUNTED

Cast Iron Can No
Longer Get Larger
After Casting

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. (AP)—Cast iron that "grows" is one of the vexations of industry which the American society for steel treating believes has been corrected.

J. S. Vanick and Paul D. Merica reported to the society's convention today that "a way had been found to stunt the growth of iron."

Cast iron "grows," they explained, because of changes in the material's chemical composition induced by intermittent heat. Large castings have been known to grow as much as three inches within a year.

An alloy of nickel, copper and chromium has been developed, the metallurgists reported, to prevent the cast iron expansion.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—A silver lining in the clouds of business depression—that have hovered over the United States in recent months—was discerned today by Secretary Lamont.

Moreover the stocks of retail stores are exceptionally low and there is good reason to believe that their purchases from manufacturers and wholesalers will increase materially."

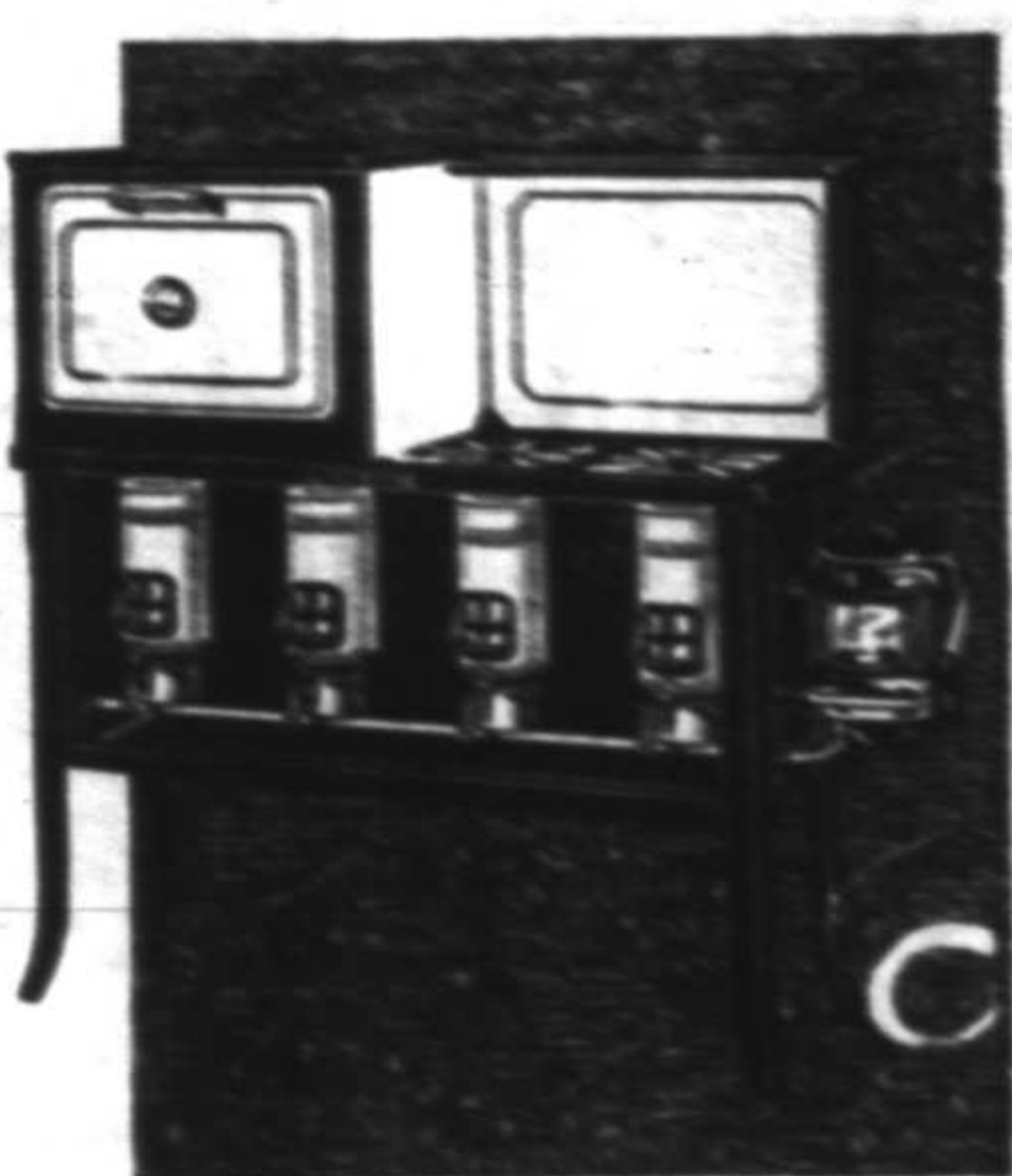

PLANT BLAST UP IN MEET

AMERICANS SEEK SOME SETTLEMENT FOR EXPLOSION

(By The Associated Press.)
THE HAGUE, Sept. 25.—The fatal day of January 11, 1917, when the Kingsland, (N. J.) munitions plant caught fire and blew up was dealt with by Robert Bonyne, American claims agent and counsel for the United States, in this afternoon's session of the mixed claims tribunal. This tribunal's adjudicating American claims against Germany resulting from damages inflicted before America entered the World war.
"On that day," said Commissioner Bonyne in the trial today, "Womjak and Rodriguez, who were in German employ, were working side by side at a bench in the plant and it was at that bench the fire originated."
"Both Womjak and Rodriguez had been supplied with incendiary devices by the German agent Hermann, who had been sent to America with instructions to blow up munitions and ammunition plants."
"Two other German agents, Jahnke and Binch also had claimed while working in Mexico they were responsible for the disastrous explosion the Black Tom (N. J.) terminal."
This claim, Commissioner Bonyne concluded, was corroborated by the fact that an official named Thorne, who was assistant employment manager of the Kingsland plant, was an acquaintance of Binch and had caused Rodriguez to be em-

AMERICAN RABBIS FAVOR FIVE-DAY WEEK AND BIRTH CONTROL REGULATION

(By The Associated Press.)
BALTIMORE, Sept. 25.—A statement favoring a five-day week for industry and "an intelligent attitude toward birth control," adopted by the commission on social justice of the central conference of American rabbis, is to be read at synagogues over the country during the 10-day Rosh Hashana holiday period, it was announced here today.
The announcement was by Edward L. Israel, chairman of the commission and Rabbi of the Har Sinai congregation here.
"If our constantly improving machinery with its displacements of human workers is not to produce unemployment before it produces surplus, not only must the number of working days a week be reduced; there must also be a minimization of working hours a day with corresponding increases of wage rates, enabling all workers to earn sufficiently," says the statement.
On birth control the statement said: "Following in the wake of the central conference of American rabbis, Universalists, Methodists, Presbyterians and Unitarians have, of late, received upon an intelligent attitude toward birth control. Birth is one of the many forces of nature which like steam, air, gravitation, electricity and chemical valences, succumb to human control played at the plant from December, 1914, until the time of explosion."

CRUDE PRODUCTION SHOWS REDUCTION

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 25.—The daily average production of crude oil in the United States for the week ended September 20 was 2,419,744 barrels, an increase of 2,737 over that for the preceding week, the Oil and Gas Journal estimates. The output of light gravity oil declined 1,481 barrels, but an increase in the heavy oil yield more than offset the drop.
Increased production in the Oklahoma City and Seminole fields caused Oklahoma's output to jump from 548,705 to 562,810 barrels.
The total for the mid-continent area, including both light and heavy gravity oils, was 1,272,843 barrels, or 7,225 under the preceding week's figure. Declines in West Texas, north central Texas, and the Texas Panhandle accounted largely for the decrease. West Texas production was down 5,893 barrels at 272,117; north central Texas showed a loss of 12,897 with an output of 103,250 barrels; and the Texas Panhandle had a decline of 2,633 barrels at 81,751. Kansas production was 116,970 barrels, a drop of 1,363.
Eastern production remained unchanged at 120,000 barrels. The Rocky Mountain area registered an increase of 3,599 with a yield of 113,418 barrels.
California light oil production was 322,500 barrels, an increase of 2,500. Heavy oil production in that state kept the United States out of foreign entanglements.

IRISH POET, PAINTER AND ECONOMIST DECLARES AMERICA IS FACING PERIL IN CITY CIVILIZATION; FARMS POWER

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—George Russell, better known as "AE," Irish poet, painter and agricultural economist has arrived to warn America of the peril of city civilization.

Unless the movement of population away from the farms to the city is checked, he said, the vitality of the people is likely to be weakened.

Quoting statistics of American economists to the effect that 20 per cent of the population now is on the farms, Russell said: "If your civilization becomes 90 per cent urban and 10 per cent rural, you are going to be faced with a difficult situation. At present your cities are teeming with vitality from the people of the countryside and the sturdy peasantry that came here. 'City life, however, tends to depopulate the great mass of poor inhabitants. After three generations of life in the slums vitality is apt to show depreciation.'"

PROHIBITION TO BE UP SOON

HOOVER'S COMMISSION
MUST PASS ON PRO
LAW IN OCTOBER

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23. (P)—President Hoover's law enforcement commission will be faced with the proposition that it pass judgment on the prohibition problem when it reconvenes October 8.

Kenneth Mackintosh, former Washington state supreme court justice and a dry, said today he would insist that the commission of which he is a member "go to the guts of the prohibition question."

Mr. Mackintosh, who has been studying exhaustive reports on crime and prohibition with the commission for more than a year, wants the commission to say whether the dry law is enforceable and if it is not, what could be done about it.

He is convinced the commission will seek to meet the issue which he regards as one of the most outstanding economic and social problems since the question of slavery.

He also is convinced the 10 men and one woman on the commission are still of an open mind on the controversy awaiting study of the final reports.

FARM INCOMES INCREASE

YEAR 1929 IS BETTER
ERA FOR FARMING
IN U. S. REPORT

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—An increase in the gross farm production income from \$11,740,000,000 in 1928 to \$12,860,000,000 in 1929 was reported today by the department of agriculture.

The gross income from livestock and livestock products for 1929 was estimated at \$2,800,000,000 and that from crops at \$10,060,000,000. As compared with 1928, the crop in-

crease of 10 per cent was not as great as the increase of 15 per cent in the livestock products.

come declined \$73,000,000 but the gross income from livestock and livestock products increased \$33,000,000.

Department economists said the decrease in the crop income last year was largely due to drought in the main grain and cotton areas, which more than offset an increase of nearly \$200,000,000 in the gross income from vegetables. In the livestock and livestock products groups, wool was the only commodity to show a decrease.

Operating costs of farming during 1929 were virtually the same as in 1928. After deducting operating costs, wages to hired labor, taxes, interest on debts and rent paid to non-operating owners, the balance available for capital, labor and management was \$3,300,000,000 compared with \$3,470,000,000 for 1928, an increase of \$170,000,000.

Marillo Awarded Tax Collectors Meet

DALLAS, Sept. 23.—Marillo was chosen for the 1931 convention of the Texas Tax Collectors association at the closing session of the annual meeting here Wednesday. Ray Law of Chicago, was elected president to succeed Neil Campbell of San Antonio.

The members engaged in a long discussion of the tax bill, placing a maximum limit on earnings of county officers, which goes into effect next January.

An effort to have the discussion continue session was defeated. J. G. Le Cleve of Beaumont criticized certain sections of the bill. Other speakers adopted what they termed a "philosophical attitude" toward the tax act, pending a vote.

PAID GIRD MEN
Football stars who are paid for their services, "are in the same category as paid workers in art," without benefit of industry," according to a decision just rendered by the British Ministry of Labor. The statement was made in connection with the question of placing a ban on football players in British football teams. The Ministry has directed the English, Scottish and Welsh football associations to establish their views on the proposed ban.

CATHOLIC CLERGY DISCUSSES MEANS OF COMBATING INDECENCY IN DRESS

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Methods of combating what was termed the indecency of modern dress for women were discussed at length today by clergymen attending the National Eucharistic congress. The Rev. Martinus Stock of St. Ignace, Neb., led the discussion.

"The spirit of liberty in its exaggerated form, and the lack of continuity of Christian modesty in thought, contact with life in the midst of an overwhelmingly large population, that is Catholicism in its own right," was blamed by Rev. Stock for making "very seriously good Catholic women and young ladies unconscious of the indecency of modern dress and its offense against public Christian morality."

Message Extended
The pastor declared that the message of Pope Pius XII on January 22, 1929, regarding the dress of girls pupils in schools taught by sisters had by reference been extended to Catholics the world over. He mentioned that Pope Pius had ruled that "a dress cannot be called decent which is cut deeper than the two fingers breadth under the pit

of the throat, which does not cover the arms at least to the elbow and actually reveals a bit beyond the knee." He also reiterated the Pope's condemnation of dresses of transparent material and flesh colored stockings, "which suggest the legs being bare."

Rev. Stock also emphasized that Pope Pius had decreed that "modern" girls and women who wear transparent dresses shall be denied holy communion, and shall not be admitted as sponsors at baptism and confirmation, and, if needs be, shall be stopped from entering any church.

He concluded that "it will require a concerted effort to bring about a return to the Christian sense of modesty."

RAIN-MAKER IN AFRICA

Tests of a new device for making artificial rain are being made in Central Africa, in Egypt, and in the West Indies. The machine is a huge sprayer, and distributes water in such a way that it falls from a precipitation height of 200 feet in the form of a fine mist.
