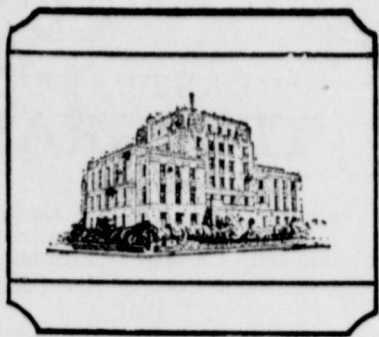

FOURTEENTH FLAG DAY OBSERVANCE

Saturday, June 13, 1970

Eastland, Texas, Post Office Lawn

8:15 a.m.: CITIZENS PARADE WITH FLAGS Parade will form at the corner of Daugherty and Main (west side of Post Office). Citizens, led by the 328 Army Band, other military personnel, and local policemen will march east to the square, circle the courthouse, and back to the Post Office.

8:30 a.m.: FLAG DAY CEREMONIES on the Post Office Lawn, will be followed by an informal brunch. Eastland families are invited to bring sandwiches and cookies to share with the visiting military personnel. Coffee and cool drinks will be served by the VFW.

John Willen, 28, Former Resident, Buried Tuesday

John Robert Willen, 28, former Eastland resident, was killed Sunday night as he walked along U.S. 67 near Prescott, Arkansas.

Funeral was held at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Pioneer Drive Baptist Church in Abilene, with Dr. Frank Royal of Dallas, and the Rev. Jack Riddlehoover, pastor of the church, officiating.

Burial was in South Gate, Kentucky.

Investigating officers said Willen was struck and killed by a car driven by a soldier from Dallas whose vision was temporarily blocked by a tractor-trailer truck which had swerved into the soldier's lane to avoid hitting Willen.

Born September 24, 1941 in Kentucky, he moved to Abilene in 1959 while in the Air Force. He married Glenda Jean Webb in Abilene in 1961.

He moved to Eastland in February, 1967, where he managed the Goodyear store until moving to Mineral Wells in 1969.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Robert, eight; one daughter, Sheryl, one; his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hanna of South Gate, Kentucky; three brothers and three sisters.

The Citizens Parade with Flags will leave the west side of the Post Office at 8:15 a.m. and return to the post office after marching around the square. The parade will be led by local policemen, visiting military from Fort Wolters, and the 328 U. S. Army Band. Everyone is urged to bring a flag and join the parade. All Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Brownies, Vacation Bible School students, Little League ball players are especially invited to march in the parade and to lead in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Marchers are asked to carry a flag of any size, if they have one available.

The ceremonies will begin at 8:30 a.m. on the Post Office lawn, with Jay Staggs as master of ceremonies. The Rev. Eugene Williams, pastor of First Christian Church, will give the invocation, and James Reid, mayor pro tem, will welcome local citizens and guest. Allied students and other distinguished guests will be introduced by Lt. Col. L. J. Rochat and Virgil Seaberry.

The flag will be presented to the Color Guard by Mrs. Marene Johnson.

The 328th Band will present the National Anthem as the flag is raised.

The Pledge of Allegiance will be led by Dick Johnson, leader of Scout Troop 103.

A featured speech will be presented by Col. Rochat and the Rev. Bill Goff, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, will present the benediction.

Chamber of Commerce President Ben McKinnis will present the appreciation award for the Eastland Jaycees.

Following the program, sandwiches, coffee, and cold drinks will be served. Local families are asked to bring sandwiches and the VFW will serve coffee and cold drinks.

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Legal Notice

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Turkey Federation of Bryan, Texas proposes a referendum election on July 27, 1970, under provisions of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not turkey producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of two cents per live hundredweight paid for plus an additional one cent per head on mature birds as defined by U. S. D. A. grade, to be collected at the point of first processing or sale, and to elect members for a fifteen man commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment for purposes of promotion, research, education, and disease and insect control designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of turkeys.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot furnished to all eligible voters not later than fifteen days prior to election date. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P. O. Box 3929, Bryan, Texas 77801, before midnight on the election date.

For purpose of this referendum, a turkey producer is defined as a person, firm, or corporation having actual ownership of turkeys during production. All persons in this category are eligible to vote in the referendum and election, since they would be required to pay the proposed assessment.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum and election may place his name in nomination for election to the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such application must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote in this referendum who does not receive a ballot prior to July 12, 1970 may obtain one at his local County Agent's office. 5-8-64-6-11

IT HAS BEEN

The story goes that Eastland County was organized in December 1873. The County clerk's office, the treasurer's office and the sheriff's office were located near Mansker's Lake. Henry Schmidt was sheriff at this time. Ike P. Schmidt was county treasurer and A. J. Stuart was District and County Clerk. He lived in a log cabin near Mansker's Lake and kept the county and district records there. Merriman was the county seat. A little frame building was used as a court house,

never used except when district county court was held. The county did not have a county judge, but they did have three or four justices of the peace who made up the commissioners court. Freil Hale was chief justice, John W. Gibson, who lived on Palo Pinto Creek, was one of the Justices and J. E. Ringer another.

There were few houses in Merriman at this time and it was far removed from the center of the county. C. U. Connelley and J. S. Daugherty laid out a townsite where the city of Eastland now stands with the hope that the county seat could be moved from Merriman to this location.

A \$5,000 bond was given to the county with the promise that if the county seat would

be moved to the new location a rock building would be erected, two stories high. The second floor to be furnished and used for a court house and district clerk's office.

An election was held on August 2, 1875, and 127 votes were cast (every man in Eastland County voted). Eastland received 67 votes which was a small majority.

After the votes were canvassed the Justices of the Peace who constituted the Commissioners Court issued a certificate to the effect that Eastland was the county seat.

As soon as this declaration was made work was started on the construction of the promised building, located on the north west corner of the public square in Eastland.

The upper floor was used as a court house and county clerk's office until 1883. This building was destroyed by fire, November 26, 1896.

The Texas and Pacific railroad came into Eastland during the year 1880. The Houston and Texas Central was built to a crossing of the T&P at Cisco in 1881.

There were no towns at Cisco or Ranger until the railroads came to the county.

A lot sale was held at Cisco in May, 1881, and soon after, Cisco petitioned for an election for the removal of the county seat from Eastland to Cisco. But Eastland received the majority vote.

When fire destroyed the court house in 1896, Cisco again called an election to move the court house to Cisco. Again Eastland was the winner.

A rock building was built

to replace the former court house and the upper floor used as a court house. The lower floor housed a general mercantile store. Later a flour mill occupied the lower floor.

July 22, 1927, was an important day for Cisco. That date marked the dedication of the official opening of the bridge across the dam at Lake Cisco, and other important projects.

Approximately 50,000 people were on hand to witness the dedication of a bridge that topped the largest hollow type

concrete dam in the world. The Cisco Club, the \$50,000 state fish hatchery and the \$100,000 Lake Cisco bathing beach and the largest concrete swimming pool in the world.

Gov. Dan Moody was principal speaker of the day. Swimming and diving contests, motor boat races on the lake and other entertainments were important.

The high light of the day was the bathing revue, when girls from Cisco and numerous west Texas towns competed for "Queen for the Day."

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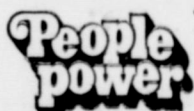

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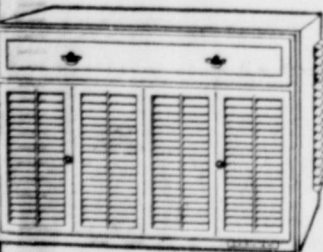

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Pearson Takes Lone Cedar Title

Hometown greenkeeper Roy Pearson, who just recently graduated from Texas Christian University, played another round of steady golf here Sunday to capture the 10th annual Lone Cedar Country Club golf tournament by three strokes.

Pearson virtually had the title wrapped up going into the back nine, when he had a four-stroke lead over this nearest competitor, second-place finisher Don Needham. Tall, tan and strong Tim Bennie of Cisco, a recent graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, fired another 73 to match Saturday's 73 for a two-round 146, good for third place. Bennie also broke a tie with Edward Brooks for the medalist honors. Brooks and Bennie tied Friday in the program and failed to settle the tie Saturday in the first round of play. Bennie had to come from one down the back nine to get the medalist honors.

Pearson, who was the high-point golfer on the TCU varsity golf team, carded two

birdies, two bogies and a double-bogey in his two over par 72 Sunday.

The calm, tan blonde Pearson sank a 35-foot birdie putt on the second hole, but fell to even par with a bogey on the next hole, three-putting. A 15-foot putt on another birdie, but he again bogied the next hole, this time after hitting his drive into the rough.

Pearson admitted his game was good in the tourney, but added, "I was hot and cold Saturday. However, I was steady Sunday playing mostly par golf."

The TCU grad has entered the tournament several times, also winning it in 1963.
