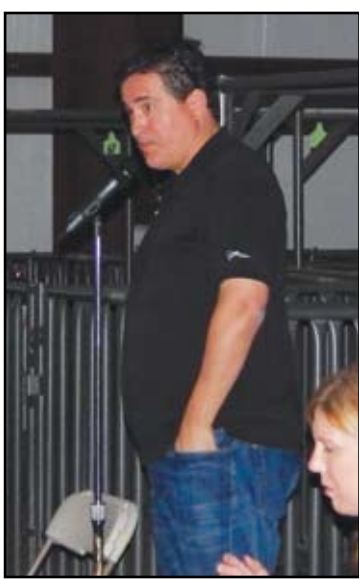
# Walker, Bowles family top honorees at Ag luncheon

# Trade Days

Tri-annual event returns to Stanton Saturday, Sunday

STANTON — The historic downtown streets of Stanton will be packed to capacity this weekend with vendors hawking what they and bargain hunters hope are the best deals in the Permian Basin.

With 620 vendors filling nine city blocks and seven buildings, Shawna Burch, Old Sorehead Trade Days executive director, said the thrice-annual event is booked solid for vendor booths.



At least 30,000 people will make the pilgrimage to Stanton this weekend, Burch said — more than 10 times the city's population — in hopes of bargain hunting from a plethora of merchandise and enjoy meals from a variety of food booths.

"We offer free parking, and you can find just about anything from buying and selling jewelry to Christmas gifts, decorations. It's all here," Burch said. "I think what brings people back every year is the people here are friendly."

Trade Days will be held from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and noon to 5 p.m. Sunday.

# Federal judge blocks Texas' voter ID law

AUSTIN, Texas — A federal judge likened Texas' strict voter ID requirement to a poll tax deliberately meant to suppress minority voter turnout and struck it down less than a month before Election Day — and mere hours after the U.S. Supreme Court blocked a similar measure in Wisconsin.

The twin rulings released Thursday evening represent major and somewhat surprising blows to largely Republican-backed voter identification rules sweeping the nation that have generally been up-

held in previous rulings.

Approved in 2011, Texas' law is considered among the nation's harshest and had even been derided in court by the Justice Department as blatant discrimination. Wisconsin's law was passed the same year and has remained a similar political flashpoint.

"We are extremely heartened by the court's decision, which affirms our position that the Texas voter identification law unfairly and unnecessarily restricts access to the franchise," U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder said in a statement. "We are

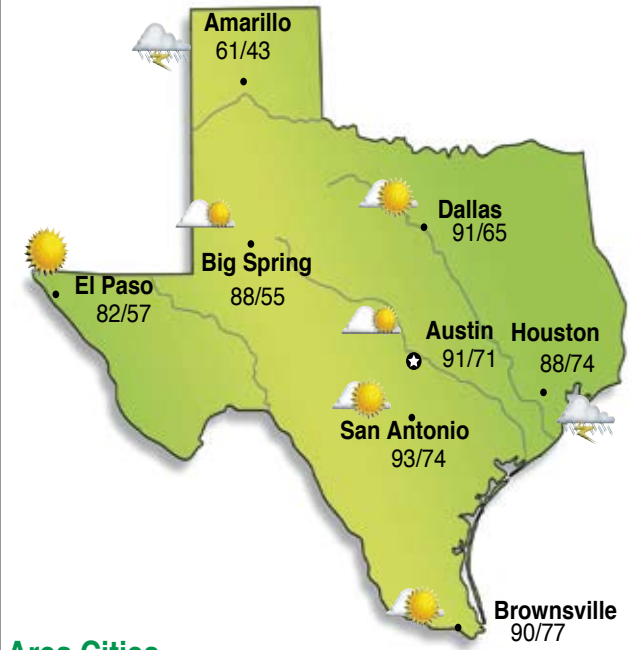

also pleased that the Supreme Court has refused to allow Wisconsin to implement its own restrictive voter identification law."

U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzales Ramos of Corpus Christi on Texas' Gulf Coast, an appointee of President Barack Obama, never signaled during a two-week trial in September that she intended to rule on the Texas law before Election Day. But the timing could spare an estimated 13.6 million registered Texas voters from needing photo identification to cast a ballot.

The Justice Department says more than 600,000 of those voters, mostly blacks and Hispanics, currently lack eligible ID to vote.

Gonzales Ramos' nearly 150-page ruling says the law "creates an unconstitutional burden on the right to vote, has an impermissible discriminatory effect against Hispanics and African-Americans, and was imposed with an unconstitutional discriminatory purpose." It added that the measure "constitutes an unconstitutional poll tax." Republican Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's office said it

would appeal, but in the meantime the state may hold the election under rules that predate the voter ID law.

"The Court today effectively ruled that racial discrimination simply cannot spread to the ballot box," said Sherrilyn Ifill, president and director-counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund.

In the Wisconsin case, meanwhile, the nation's highest court used a one-page order to grant an emergency stay sought by the American Civil Liberties Union and blocked implementation of the state's voter ID law — overturning a decision by the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals three days earlier that declared it constitutional.

Justices Samuel Alito, Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas dissented. Wisconsin Attorney General J.B. Van Hollen said in a statement that he believed the law was constitutional and that

"nothing in the Court's order suggests otherwise."

Still, Luis Roberto Vera, Jr., national general counsel for League of United Latin American Citizens, said "You can call it the perfect storm against voter ID." "It's a total victory on both fronts," Vera said. Dale Ho, director of the ACLU's Voting Rights Project, said the order "puts the brakes on the last-minute disruption and voter chaos created by this law," that he said imperiled the vote for thousands of registered voters in the state. Wisconsin advocates now have 90 days to file a formal petition asking the Supreme Court to take up the case, a deadline so far beyond Election Day that the law may not be reinstated by Nov. 4. The dissenting Supreme Court justices raised concerns that absentee ballots had been sent with no notification of the need to present photo IDs — and that there was not enough time to address

this issue before voting begins.

Nineteen states have voter ID laws. Courts nationwide have knocked down challenges — including at the U.S. Supreme Court. But Texas' case attracted unusual attention from Holder.

He brought the weight of his office to the case after the Supreme Court last year struck down the heart of the Voting Rights Act. It had blocked Texas and eight other states with histories of discrimination from changing election laws without permission from the DOJ or a federal court. Holder vowed to wring whatever protections he could from the new and weakened version, and made Texas a first target.

"Even after the Voting Rights Act was seriously eroded last year, we vowed to continue en-

forcing the remaining portions of that statute as aggressively as possible. This ruling is an important vindication of those efforts," Holder's Thursday statement said.

Abbott is the favorite to replace outgoing Texas Gov. Rick Perry in the Nov. 4 election. His office had argued that minorities and whites alike supported the law in public opinion polls.

It also pointed to other states, such as Georgia and Indiana, where the similar measures have been upheld. But opponents slammed Texas' law as far more discriminatory. College students IDs aren't accepted by poll workers, but concealed

handgun licenses are. Free voting IDs offered by the state require a birth certificate that costs little as \$3, but the Justice Department argued that traveling to get those documents imposes an outside burden on poor minorities. As a result, attorneys argued, Texas has issued fewer than 300 free voter IDs.

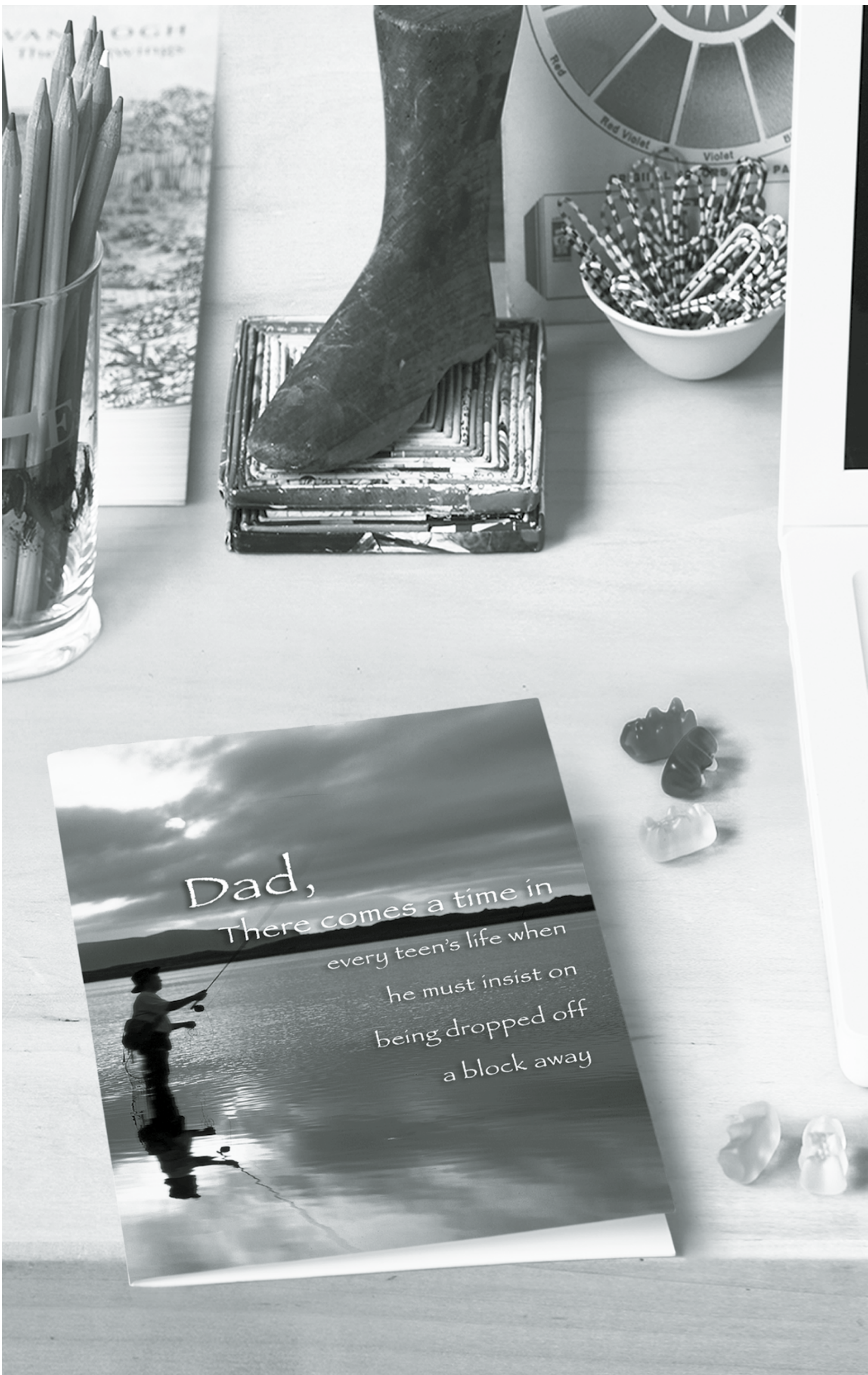

# Don't be blown away

## Psalm 1 (Part 4)

The righteous person who spends time in the study of God's word will continue to grow and bear fruit. Nourished and fed by those living waters of Scripture, their roots will grow deeper as their understanding of God's word increases. Psalm 1 also illustrates the outcome of the one who does not delight in the law of the Lord and who chooses to live in rebellion to God's will. Psalm 1:4-5, The wicked are not so, but are like chaff that the wind drives away. Therefore the wicked will not stand in the

judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous."

With a poetic metaphor, the writer of this psalm illustrates the ultimate outcome of the person who lacks a spiritual foundation based on God's Word. Grain, whether wheat,

barley, or other, was a vital crop grown in Israel. When the stalks were harvested, the heads of grain were placed on the threshing floor and a large stone

was rolled over them to break the outer layer of the kernel loose. This outer layer, or husk, is called the chaff once it is separated from the kernel. Workers would then toss the kernels into the air and allow the breeze to blow the lighter chaff away so that only the desired kernels would remain. There is coming a great day of harvest when the Lord will judge everyone who has ever lived.

On that day, the wicked and ungodly will be separated from the faithful and will be sentenced to eternal destruction. 1Cor 5:10, For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive

what is due for what he has done in the body, whether good or evil.

I believe this metaphor could include those who claim to follow Christ yet do not meditate on His law day and night.

They do not have those deep roots and a firm foundation through consistent study of God's Word. These individuals are like those mentioned by Paul in Ephesians 4:14 as being tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine.

May we be dedicated to God and the study of His Word so we can be grounded in the Truth and able to stand firm upon its teaching.

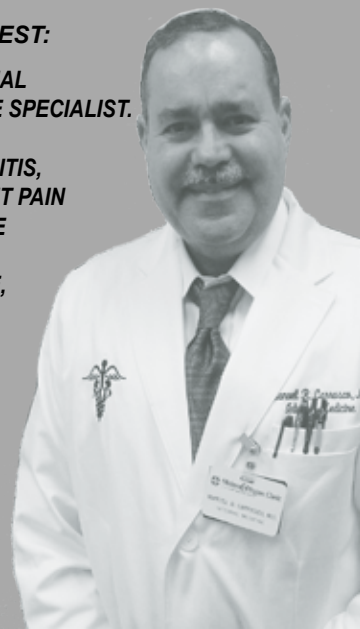

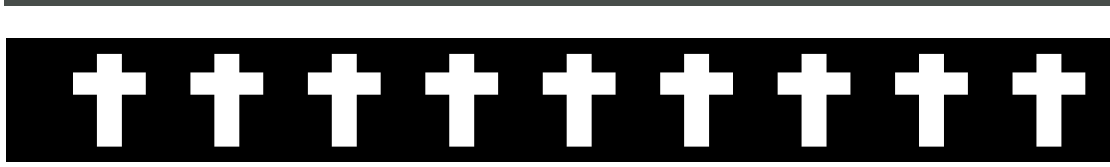

## Malala Yousafzai, Kailash Satharathi, win Nobel Peace Prize for struggle for children's rights

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Malala Yousafzai of Pakistan and Kailash Satyarthi of India were jointly awarded the Nobel Peace Prize on Friday for their work for children's rights.

The Norwegian Nobel Committee cited the two "for their struggle against the suppression of children and young people and for the right of all children to education."

Malala, 17, is the youngest ever winner of a Nobel Prize. A schoolgirl and education campaigner in Pakistan, she was shot in the head by a Taliban gunman two years ago.

Satyarthi, 60, has maintained the tradition of Mahatma Gandhi and headed various forms of peaceful protests, "focusing on the grave exploitation of children for financial gain," the Nobel committee said.

The Nobel Committee said it "regards it as an important point for a Hindu and a Muslim, an Indian and a Pakistani, to join in a common struggle for education and against extremism."

## Experts say Ebola airport screening measures rely on established federal law, Constitution

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration's plans to screen certain airline passengers for exposure to Ebola are based on the Constitution and long-established legal authority that would almost certainly stand up in court if challenged, public health experts say.

Airline passengers arriving from three West African countries — Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea — will face temperature checks using no-touch thermometers and other screening measures at five U.S. airports, starting with New York's Kennedy International on Saturday. The measures, aimed at identifying sickly passengers from countries expe-

riencing the Ebola outbreak, will expand over the next week to Newark Liberty, Washington Dulles, Chicago's O'Hare and Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta international airports.

Though airline passengers may find it intrusive to have their temperature taken or directed against their wishes to seek medical care, the government has wide power when it comes to public health and border control, experts say, including quarantine and isolation. Courts would likely defer to the judgment of public health professionals in the event someone sued over what they saw as an intrusion of civil liberties.

"You are subject to an entrance screening per the laws of the land," said Rebecca Katz, an associate professor of public health policy at George Washington University. "You can choose not to be screened, but then you don't get to come into the country."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention cite as legal authority the Commerce Clause of the Constitution, under which the government regulates trade with foreign countries. Separately, the 1944 Public Health Service Act also allows the federal government to take action to prevent communicable diseases from spreading into the country or between states.

## The story of 2 schoolgirls: Islamic extremists build networks to lure young women to jihad

LEZIGNAN-CORBIERES, France (AP) — On the day she left for Syria, Sahra strode along the train platform with two bulky schoolbags slung over her shoulder. In a grainy image caught on security camera, the French teen tucks her hair into a headscarf.

Just two months earlier and a two-hour drive away, Nora, also a teen girl, had embarked on a similar journey in similar clothes. Her brother later learned she'd been leaving the house every day in jeans and a pullover, then changing into a full-

body veil.

Neither had ever set foot on an airplane. Yet both journeys were planned with the precision of a seasoned traveler and expert in deception, from Sahra's ticket for the March 11 Marseille-Istanbul flight to Nora's secret Facebook account and overnight crash pad in Paris.

Sahra and Nora are among about 100 girls and young women from France who have left to join jihad in Syria, up from just a handful 18 months ago, when the trip was not even on Europe's security radar, officials say. They come from all walks of life — first- and second-generation immigrants from Muslim countries, white French backgrounds, even a Jewish girl, according to a security official who spoke anonymously because rules forbid him to discuss open investigations.

## Islamic State group shelling Syria-Turkey border crossing to cut off Kobani, says official

MURSITPINAR, Turkey (AP) — The Islamic State group shelled a Syrian border crossing with Turkey on Friday to try and capture it and cut off the embattled town of Kobani, a local Kurdish official and Syrian activists said.

The official, Idriss Nassan, said Islamic State fighters aim to seize the crossing in order to close the noose around the town's Kurdish defenders and prevent anyone from entering or leaving Kobani.

By mid-morning Friday, occasional gunfire and explosions that appeared to be rocket-propelled grenades and mortar shells could be heard from across the border in Turkey, and plumes of smoke were seen rising in the distance.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the militants shelled several areas in Kobani, including the border crossing, which is the town's only gateway to Turkey.

Islamic State group this week pushed into Kobani for the first time since launching its offensive in the area in mid-September. The onslaught has

**Bidding Quiz**

You have the following hand, neither side vulnerable:  
♠ K1063 ♥ J874 ♦ 652 ♣ K3

1. Partner bids One Heart, and you raise to Two Hearts. Partner bids Three Clubs. What would you bid now?

2. Partner bids One Heart, and you raise to Two Hearts. Partner bids Three Diamonds. What would you bid now?

3. Partner opens One Club. What would you respond?

4. Partner opens Three Hearts. What (if anything) would you respond?

5. Your left-hand opponent opens One Heart. Partner doubles, and your right-hand opponent bids Two Hearts. What (if anything) would you respond?

\*\*\*  
1. Four hearts. Partner's three-club bid indicates that he is interested in game and that he needs help in clubs. Your doubleton king is probably just what he's looking for. Since your hand has improved because of the club bid, you should accept his invitation by jumping to four hearts. You would also bid game if you had a maximum raise even if your club holding was not as good.

2. Three hearts. Here your hand has depreciated in value, since you lack any assistance in diamonds. You therefore bid three hearts to tell part-

ner that you have a minimum raise that has not been improved by his diamond bid.

3. One heart. In responding with four-card suits, the general principle is to bid "up-the-line" — that is, the cheapest suit first — regardless of suit quality. This leaves your side the maximum amount of space to operate in. In the present case, bidding one heart caters to the possibility that your partner can support hearts, and at the same time leaves room for him to bid one spade.

4. Four hearts. You are not raising to game expecting to make it, but rather to try to talk the opponents out of bidding five clubs or five diamonds, which they seem likely to make. This deceptive tactic might well succeed in stealing the contract — undoubled — if the missing high-card strength is about evenly divided.

5. Two spades. Since partner is marked with a singleton or void in hearts, you can surely make a partscore in spades, and possibly even a game if partner has extra values. You should not allow the fact that you have only seven high-card points and four cards in the opponents' suit to persuade you from entering the bidding. A typical hand for partner would be: ♠ QJ94 ♥ 3 ♦ KQ83 ♣ A1096, in which case you would surely want to be in two spades.

## ISD trustees approve class size waivers

Big Springs school trustees gave the go-ahead to seek 13 class-size waivers from the Texas Education Agency during their monthly meeting Thursday.

Citing increased enrollment as the main factor, this will allow the district to exceed the 22 student to 1 teacher ratio limit. Superintendent Chris Wigington said the district is down two teachers at this time but continues the search to fill those positions.

BSISD is up 147 students in enrollment from this time last year, Wigington said.

In other business:

- Trustees approved to seek a foreign exchange student waiver to drop the limit of acceptance down from three students to one. If approved by TEA, this will go into effect for the next school year.

## Mathews rushes for 3 TDs in Big Spring's 44-0 rout of Snyder in District 3-4A opener

For the most part, the Big Spring High School freshman offensive line doesn't get much attention. In fact, it weren't for the occasional penalty that draws the coaches' attention, most of them are pretty unknown. They are so unknown, some even have to remind their parents they are around the house, or have their photo put on the back of milk cartons to get recognized.

Such is the life of center Jordan Dunn, guards Edward Aguilar, Ivan Delgado, Tyrease Washington, Vaughn Green and Dylan Tredway.

The Snyder Tigers' probably wish they hadn't gotten to know the Steers' "Pretty Boy Security" unit quite as well on Thursday at Memorial Stadium. All the big boys did was lead the way to a dominating 44-0 rout in the team's District 3-4A opener.

Here's a news flash. Thanks to the offensive line's efforts, the game wasn't even as close as the final score showed.

"I think we played amazing," said Big Spring running back Leon Mathews. "We played as a team and did everything we had to."

### Steers set to travel to Snyder tonight

The Big Spring High School Steers varsity football team will try and open the District 3-4A race on a positive note tonight when they travel to Snyder to face off with their long-time rivals.

Big Spring, which will kick off action at 7:30 p.m., is 4-1 for the year. Snyder enters the game at 2-4.

The game can be heard locally on the KBYG and KBST radio stations.

"The O-line did a great job up front," said BSHS coach Eric Tuttle. "They did a great job controlling the line of scrimmage."

Big Spring didn't waste any time in getting off to a quick start against the Tigers. The Steers scored through their six touchdowns midway through the opening quarter. Dylan Cantu capped Big Spring's first scoring drive by lofting a 12-yard strike to Christian Horton, giving

the Steers an 8-0 lead at the 5:09 mark of the first quarter.

The BSHS offense went back to work early in the second, following the efforts of the offensive line on a 9-play, 78-yard march that ate up more than 4 minutes.

After Michael Renteria had ignited the drive with a 13-yard run on the first play, Mathews reeled off back-to-back runs of 15 yards and another for nine more to move the BSHS offense to the Snyder 45.

Five plays later, he finished off the effort by taking a handoff from Cantu and sprinting around the right end for a touchdown.

Mathews' first TD staked the Steers to a 16-0 cushion with 4:47 left in the first half.

The news got even worse for the Tigers seconds later. Horton recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and gave Big Spring the ball at the Snyder 48.

One play later, Mathews made the Tigers pay dearly for the miscue, racing 48 yards for a touchdown and a 22-0 advantage.

Big Spring, now 2-1-1 for the season, went back on the offensive on their first

## Luna, Steers rip Snyder, 21-0, for 1st win of year

The 0-fer equation is history for the Big Spring High School junior varsity football team.

David Luna helped make sure of that.

Luna caught a touchdown pass and returned a pass interception for another score and helped power the Steers to an impressive 21-0 shutout of Snyder in the District 3-4A opener for both squads.

With the win, the Steers improved to 1-2-1 for the season.

Big Spring, which picked up more than 60 yards rushing from both quarterback Riley Henson and running back Keenan Whites, turned in a solid effort on both

sides of the ball against the Tigers. The Steers rolled up more than 200 total yards in the game, while holding Snyder to less than 150.

The BSHS defense played havoc with Snyder in the first quarter. The Steers forced a key turnover in the first quarter and battled its way to a 0-0 deadlock.

Big Spring got its offense in gear in the second. The Steers opened the frame by reeling off a 8-play, 56-yard drive that ended when Hansen lofted a pass to 13-yard scoring strike with 7:57 left in the half.

Big Spring put Snyder in an even deeper hole moments later. After forcing the Tigers to punt away their ensuing possession, Big

Spring struck quickly, going 40 yards in four plays for a 14-0 lead.

Luna capped the Steers' second scoring drive by hauling in a 41-yard touchdown pass at the 3:48 mark of the frame.

Luna dealt the Tigers' a death blow less than 2 minutes later, capping a 21-0 run in the second quarter by stepping in front of a Snyder pass at the BSHS 39 and returning it 61 yards for a score.

The Steers defense took over from there. Big Spring held the Tigers to just 96 total yards in the second half.

Cayman Chavez drove the final nail into the Tigers' coffin by recovering a fumble with 8:18 left in regulation.

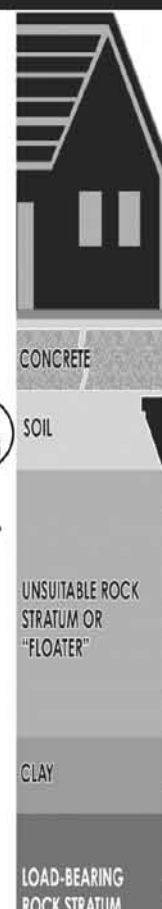

# Colts hold on for 33-28 win over Texans

HOUSTON (AP) — When Indianapolis raced to a big lead over the Houston Texans in the first quarter, Colts coach Chuck Pagano was worried they'd let up.

They did, but that early lead was so big that they were still able to hold on for a 33-28 victory Thursday night.

"You're going up and down on the sideline screaming at everybody: 'Don't take your foot off the gas,'" Pagano said. "Next thing you know, just like that (it's close). It's never over in this league."

The Colts (4-2) led 24-0 after one quarter, but allowed Houston (3-3) to cut it to 33-28 early in the fourth quarter on J.J. Watt's fumble return for a touchdown.

"You give a team a 24-point lead right out the gate, you're going to have a difficult time," Watt said.

The Texans had two opportunities to take the lead late, but the Colts recovered fumbles by Andre Johnson and Ryan Fitzpatrick in the last five minutes.

"You can finally start to see the type of defense that we envisioned a long time ago to go out there and do that week in and week out," Pagano said.

Luck finished with 370 yards passing and three touchdowns for his fourth straight 300-yard passing game and T.Y. Hilton had a career-high 223 yards receiving with a touchdown to give Indy first place in the AFC South.

"We realized with the recent history of Thursday night games, teams who are going on the road are struggling, and we didn't want to do that," Luck said. "We were lucky enough to get off on that fast start. It takes focus, and you almost have to trick yourself into it."

The Texans were driving with less than five minutes remaining when Johnson — called for pass interference two plays earlier — caught a 13-yard pass and fumbled.

Watt knocked down Luck's pass on third down on Indy's next drive to give Houston one last chance. But Bjoern Werner sacked Fitzpatrick and stripped

the ball and D'Qwell Jackson recovered.

"I was trying to make a play ... just poor ball security," Fitzpatrick said.

Fitzpatrick threw for 212 yards and a touchdown and Arrian Foster had 109 yards rushing with two scores for Houston.

Indianapolis led by 12 when Luck fumbled and Watt recovered it and returned it 45 yards for a touchdown. It was Watt's third touchdown this season. He also has scored on an interception return and a reception.

Foster had a 34-yard run before Johnson grabbed a 26-yard reception to get Houston down

to the 2 in the third quarter. Foster ran wide before cutting back inside and into the end zone untouched on the next play to get the Texans to 27-21.

The Texans were within six points in the third quarter when Luck, who was under heavy pressure, threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to Hilton.

## Texas Tech chases first Big 12 win vs. WVU

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Texas Tech's season thus far has a considerably different feel than last year.

About this time last season, the Red Raiders were approaching a No. 10 ranking after going 7-0. When it plays West Virginia on Saturday, Texas Tech will be trying to avoid starting conference play with three straight losses for the first since 1990.

The Mountaineers (3-2, 1-1) are aiming to build off their first Big 12 win, a 33-14 victory over Kansas last

week that followed a home loss to Oklahoma.

The two coaches know one another well. West Virginia coach Dana Holgorsen was coaching receivers at Texas Tech when Kliff Kingsbury was the Red Raiders quarterback.

Holgorsen sees similarities between Mountaineers quarterback Clint Trickett and Kingsbury's time behind center.

"He would come in and want to watch a ton of film and knew how to be a leader in the locker room — knew

how to be a leader in the huddle," he said of the second-year coach. "He was extremely competitive. I see all of those qualities with Clint."

Trickett's counterpart, Davis Webb, is looking to rebound after throwing a career-high four interceptions (he has 10 for the season) in the Red Raiders' (2-3, 0-2) loss at Kansas State last week. Kingsbury said he's sticking with Webb as thrown for 1,603 yards and 16 TDs as his starter.
