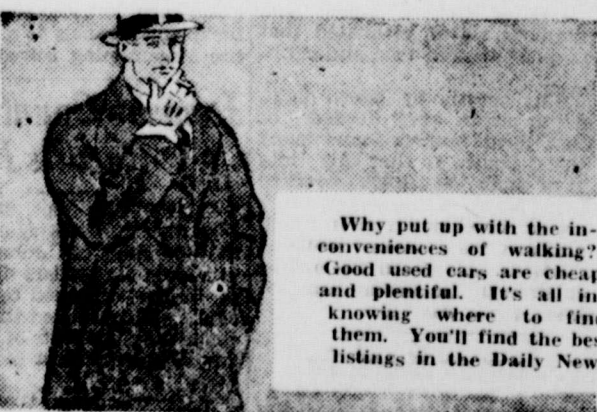

better hiding place for the body.

Determined Drive

The finding of the baby's body left authorities free to marshal all their forces in a determined, unrelenting search for the criminals.

Curtis and Condon immediately were taken to New Jersey for questioning. Condon convinced authorities of his innocence but Curtis was arrested charged with compounding a felony and perjury.

He was tried that summer at Flemington, N. J., and found guilty. He was sentenced to a year in prison and a fine of \$1,000, but the prison term was suspended when he paid the fine.

Other angles of the search those 72 days before the body was found moved how futile all the man hunting machinery of state and nation had been. Gaston Means, confidence man and author of "The Strange Death of President Harding," was arrested for swindling Mrs. Edward B. McLean of Washington out of \$10,000 on the promise to obtain the return of the Lindbergh baby.

Injecting himself into the case only a few days after the kidnapping he failed to return the baby or the \$10,000. He was convicted and sentenced to Atlanta penitentiary for 17 years.

Capone Sought Freedom

Al Capone, Chicago gangster in jail on charges of income tax evasion, informed the press that if he

were free he would be able to find the baby because of his underworld connections. Although his offer was rejected, it is understood Capone emissaries let it be known in the underworld that there was ten times the ransom sum—a cool half million dollars—awaiting the person who would turn the child over to them, and no questions asked. This tactic offer of course was useless.

SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

YOU don't need to live beside the bounding waves these days to enjoy choice sea food as often as you like. What with the efficient new methods of packing and shipping, fish, lobster, shrimp and all the other delicacies of the coast can travel for days inland and arrive as delightfully fresh as when they started.

I like to serve fish at least once a week throughout the year. It makes for variety, is nourishing and wholesome. Besides, there's a variety in market to fit any pocket-book. A big catch of a certain kind of fish means that particular fish will be cheap for a few days and there's always a big catch in something.

Any kind of fish can be made appetizing if it's cooked right. For a change try baked fish. Sea trout is the fish used in this recipe but you may use most other varieties.

Baked Fish
Two pounds sea trout, 4 small tomatoes, 2 cups Italian squash cut in narrow strips, 2 cups tomato sauce, 1-2 cup grated Parmesan cheese, 1-2 cup bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons melted butter.

Bone and skin fish, season with salt and pepper and place whole in a buttered baking dish. Place tomatoes and sprinkle squash strips over and around fish. Mix melted butter with tomato sauce and cover trout. Mix cheese and bread

crumbs and sprinkle over sauce. Put into a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) and bake thirty minutes. Serve from baking dish.

Tomato Sauce
Two cups canned or chopped fresh tomatoes, 2 tablespoons onion finely chopped, 2 teaspoons sugar, 4 whole cloves, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1-2 cup chopped celery leaves, 4 teaspoons quick cooking tapioca.

Melt butter, add onion and cook over a low fire until a pale straw color. Add tomatoes, celery leaves, cloves and sugar, salt and pepper mixed with tapioca. Bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Cover and cook over boiling water for five minutes, stirring occasionally. Rub through a wire sieve and pour over fish.

Slot Machine Theft Epidemic at Borger

BORGER, Sept. 21.—A new racket has invaded Borger—the stealing of slot machines.

About midnight recently while 30 people were playing pool in a domino parlor, a new car drove up to the curb. The lights were left on and the engine kept running while a man jumped from the back seat, rushed inside, grabbed a slot machine and made his get-away before bystanders could stop him.

The slot machine taken was a nickel one, while a penny machine, also at the front of the building was left undisturbed.

The incident happened so quickly that observers reported to the police

NEW DEAL IS FACING TEST IN MISSOURI

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Sept. 21.—Missouri will furnish an out-and-out test for the Rooseveltian New Deal in the November general election.

United States Sen. Roscoe C. Patterson, old-guard republican stand-patter, is running for reelection against Harry S. Truman, an administration democrat elevated to the position of the party's nominee through power of T. J. Pendergast, Kansas City boss.

Attacks New Deal
Patterson's campaign speeches have been confined to bitter attacks on the New Deal and its relief legislation. Truman's whole campaign cry has been two words—"Follow Roosevelt."

Patterson has contended that the men were driving a green coupe, a maroon-colored car and cars answering to almost as many different descriptions as there were people present.

Backs New Deal Policies

The republicans are seeking support by holding the threat of "Pendergast bossism" over the heads of out-state voters.

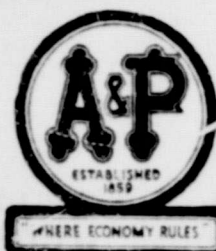
