Well it is beginning to look as if this is going to be one of those years we periodically expect in this country—a short crop year. We have been extremely fortunate here for the past ten or twelve years. Crops have been good almost every year for the past ten or twelve years and the price paid for them has been fairly good too. Just about everyone has done well. But we are never quite ready for a short crop.

Crops are better this year in spite of the long dry hot weather than it looks like it is possible for them to be. In some parts of the country rainfall has been very scant—as low as five or six inches—and had the land not been terraced to hold the rainfall on it crops would not have been as good as they are. In 1918 it rained as much as it has this year in some parts of our territory but crops then were a complete failure because the land had not been terraced. Not all parts of our territory are as dry as the above—rainfall has amounted to ten to fifteen inches or more and in these spots crops are quite a bit better, but nothing like a bumper crop.

Right now Loraine seems to have plenty of water from the wells on the hill. How long that supply will last is not known. The underground water table is lowering and should rainfall be below normal for another year or two it might lower even faster.

We believe it would be good insurance for our city to get the water rights on either Champion or Barnett creeks so that in case our wells fail to produce enough water we could put a dam on one of them to catch the flood waters, if any. It will not cost anything to get the rights.

Drivers License To Cost More Sept. 7

Austin, Sept. 1 (Spl)—A. F. Temple, Chief of the Driver's License Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reminded motorists today that the fee for Texas Operator's and Commercial Operator's license will be doubled effective September 7, 1951.

The increase which was authorized by the 52nd Legislature sets the new price of the Operator's License at \$1.00 and the Commercial License at \$2.00. Fee for Chauffeurs License will remain at \$3.00. The Operator's permit will remain valid for a period of two years while the Commercial and Chauffeurs will continue to be issued for one year periods.

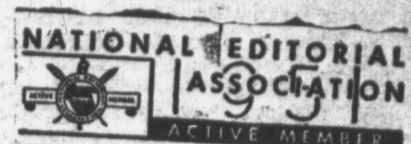

Mitchell County and Colorado City News

The Colorado City Record building and equipment at 136 Walnut was seriously damaged Thursday night by a fire of undetermined origin.

The fire was discovered by National Guardsmen at 8:35 from their Army which lies back to back with the Record building with a narrow alley between. The Guard turned in the alarm, then fought the blaze with Volunteer Firemen until the fire went under at 9:15. They then mounted guard on the building at the order of District Attorney, Eldon Mahon.

Walter Whipkey the former owner of the Record, said that a \$12,000 press was totally ruined and other equipment seriously damaged. He estimates the damage to the building which he still owns at \$15,000 and said that damage to Record equipment might reach \$30,000. Both building and equipment are insured.

Buck Persons is the Business Manager and is in charge of Record operations. Persons said damage was severe, but added that he was unable to give an estimate as to damage at this time.

The Record is a semi-weekly purchased from Whipkey in June by Byron Geller of Detroit.

District Attorney Eldon Mahon and Fire Marshall B. L. Wren were investigating the blaze but had reached no conclusions as to the cause.

"The fire began in the southeast corner of the building," said Wren, "but there was nothing there that we could see to start

a fire" Wren said the major damage was at the back of the building, with damage at the front from smoke and water.

The Winn number 1 well, 18 miles south of Colorado City had drilled into the Ellenberger and was scheduled for testing Friday. Tests made Thursday were inconclusive.

The H. L. Hunt well five miles east of Colorado City was down 1800 feet.

Roy C. Dozier, 62, retired businessman of Colorado City, was appointed as acting City Manager at a called meeting of the City Council Friday afternoon.

Dozier is a World War I veteran and member of the famous Rainbow division and is a trustee in the American Legion. In previous years, he served three terms as councilman.

Dozier will replace Jack Tallent, former city manager who was removed August 2nd by the city council. His appointment is immediate. Neither Tallent nor Dozier were present.

Tallent had a thirty day period of grace which expired Friday. Councilman Lenord Henderson asked that a letter be added to the meeting of the meeting giving reasons for Tallent's discharge. The letter should properly have been offered at the August 2nd meeting, giving reasons for discharge and giving the City Manager thirty days to reply to the charges in writing. In his letter, read Friday, Henderson alleged that Tallent was "unqualified, incompetent and his public relations were bad."

Tallent also had sent a letter to the council to be read. His letter

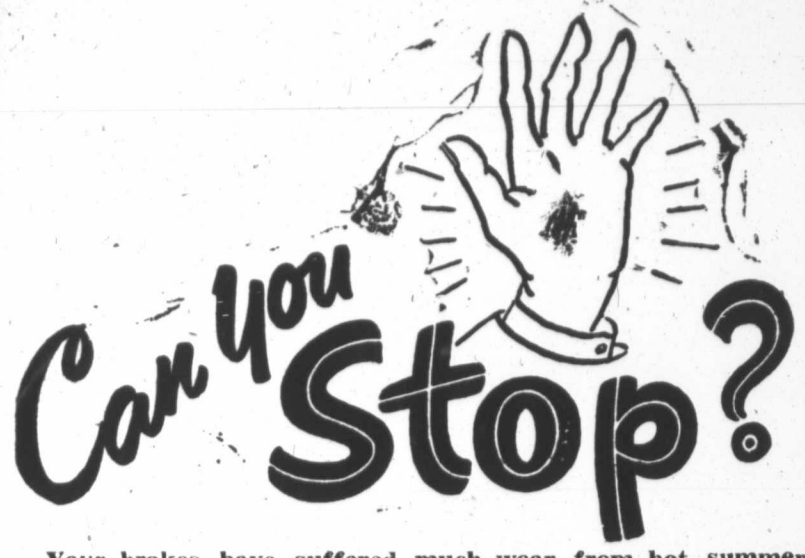

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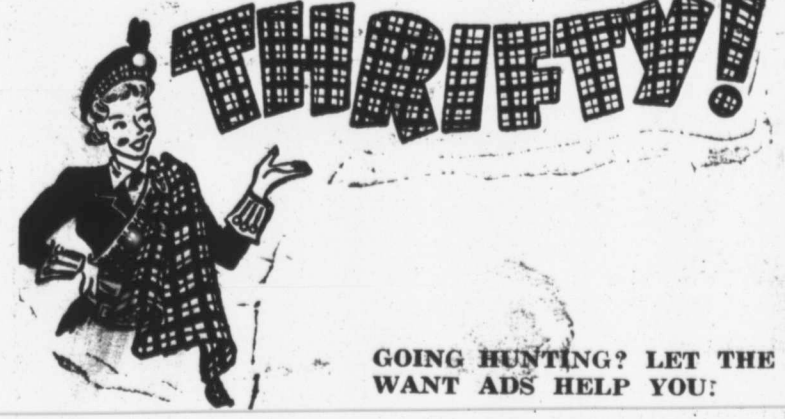

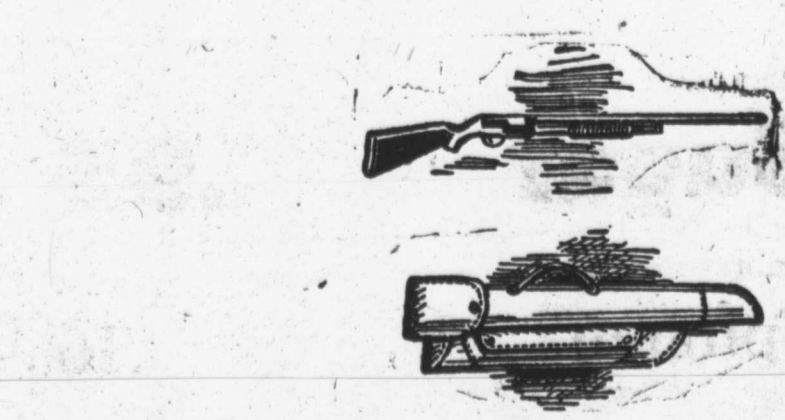
