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World watches emotional inauguration

Mubarak wields 'sword of law'

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — President Hosni Mubarak pledged in an emotional inaugural address Wednesday to pursue Anwar Sadat's search for Mideast peace hand in hand with the United States and to unsheathe the "sword of law" to punish Egyptians who turn to violence.

Shortly after the speech, Mubarak appointed himself prime minister in addition to president, retaining the Cabinet that worked under Sadat, the Middle East News Agency reported.

Paratroopers with rifles ringed the Egyptian Parliament building and guarded a hall near the rostrum where Mubarak spoke in case of an attack by assassins like the ones who killed Sadat last week.

Mubarak, Sadat's hand-picked successor, took the oath of office before the former interim president, Sufi Abu-Taleb, the 392-member Peoples' Assembly, foreign ambassadors based here and Moslem and Christian leaders.

In tears as he eulogized Sadat, Mubarak said Egypt will honor the Camp David accords with Israel and that the Reagan administration will continue as a "full partner" in the search for Mideast peace.

At Mubarak's side was Sudanese President Gaafar Nimeiri, one of the few Moslem heads of state to support Sadat after he made peace with Israel.

Egyptian Interior Minister Nabawi Ismail said Mubarak received 9,567,504 votes in Tuesday's referendum, with 149,650 voting against him for a 98.46 Percent plurality.

Referring to the Moslem fundamentalist army lieutenant and three civilians accused of gunning down Sadat at the Oct. 6 parade marking the 1973 Arab-Israeli war, Ismail called the vote a denunciation of "extremism and terrorism."

Mubarak warned the extremists in his speech: "I say from here, I say to all those who exploit the freedom of the people and their safety, that the fire of the people is worse, and that anyone who thinks of violence against the people, the decision of the people will not be turned back and they shall not escape fierce punishment."

"The sword of law will be used against any lawbreaker, no matter his rank, wealth or privilege."

Israel opposes any concessions

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israel congratulated Egypt's new President Hosni Mubarak on Wednesday but sent strong signals that it would reject any greater concessions on Palestinian autonomy than it had made in negotiations with the late Anwar Sadat.

At the same time, Prime Minister Menachem Begin's office played down the importance of reports indicating that Begin was ready to agree to U.S. compromise proposals on the deadlocked autonomy talks. Begin's spokesman Uri Porat said Israel had agreed to one American idea, but major areas of dispute remained unresolved.

Begin cabled congratulations to Mubarak on his election to succeed the assassinated Sadat, and pledged to continue the peace process.

Begin's message said: "I wish you full success in carrying out the great task with which the Egyptian nation charged you. I know we can repeat the reassurance we gave each other in our meeting in Cairo, namely: peace forever — the peace process will continue."

Israeli, Egyptian and American negotiators are scheduled to meet next Wednesday in Israel, resuming the long-stalled talks on autonomy for Palestinian residents of the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The sessions will be the first negotiations since Sadat was assassinated. Mubarak has called on Israel to recognize Palestinian rights to self-determination and to grant Arab rights in East Jerusalem, which Israel annexed to the Jewish state after capturing it from Jordan in the 1967 Mideast war.

In his first public speech since Sadat's death, Begin on Wednesday branded as "under-human" the Arab nations that cheered the assassination. "The same people who rejoiced in the streets of Tripoli and Damascus...are our enemies," he said.

"We must be careful, we must be strong," he told 3,000 Christian pilgrims.

Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir said on Israel Radio that Mubarak's position was "nothing new" and that Israel "will stand firm on its known positions."

Israel rejects Palestinian self-determination, a "code word" for an independent Palestinian state, and it says it will never permit the rededication of Jerusalem. Jerusalem is holy to Moslems as well as Jews.

Reagan still peddling his AWACS sales plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House overwhelmingly rejected Wednesday the proposed sale of AWACS radar planes to Saudi Arabia, but President Reagan, lobbying to save the sale, apparently converted two Senate opponents and a Senate leader who had been uncommitted.

"Well that was expected," the president said of the 301-111 House vote. "We knew that. But it takes both houses to say no."

Reagan referred to the fact that the sale goes through unless the Senate also votes to block it in a vote scheduled week after next.

The Senate vote had been scheduled

for next week but Tom Griscorn, an aide to Senate Republican Leader Howard Baker, said Senate leaders agreed to put it off.

Leaving a ceremony in the Rose Garden, the president said, "I have to go back to work and what I have to go back to work on is AWACS."

Asked if he would win in the Senate, where the administration has been concentrating its efforts, Reagan gave his standard reply: "I'm cautiously optimistic."

The latest Associated Press count shows 55 senators committed or leaning against the sale and 34 committed or leaning in favor of it, including the

three who switched Wednesday after meeting with Reagan.

Baker said he is confident that by the time the Senate votes there will be no more than 45 votes against the sale.

House opponents called the record \$8.5 billion arms sale, which includes several other items in addition to the radar planes, a threat to Israel and to the AWACS technology itself if the Saudi royal family is overthrown.

But supporters of the sale said a congressional veto of the sale would embarrass Reagan in the eyes of the world and undermine U.S. influence in defending Middle East oil fields

and achieving peace in the region.

All the while, Reagan was working his charm in face-to-face meetings with nine senators at the White House and apparently won over two opponents — Sens. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., and Mack Mattingly, R-Ga. — with promises of a letter answering their concerns.

Assistant Senate Republican Leader Ted Stevens of Alaska, who also attended the White House meeting, switched from the uncommitted column and said he would vote for the sale despite "serious, serious reservations" about giving sophisticated weapons to the Saudis.

Stevens said he made his decision after hearing Presidential Counselor Edwin Meese III tell the senators, "The ability of this president to shape foreign policy is at issue."

Richard V. Allen, Reagan's national security adviser, said the administration didn't have the votes yet to win in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. He also said that Reagan's letter probably would not be delivered to Capitol Hill until next week.

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., came away from a meeting with Reagan and Allen saying he is still uncommitted, and questioning if there could be

an enforceable U.S.-Saudi agreement on command and control of the aircraft. When a reporter said it appeared Hollings would vote against AWACS, he said, "Not necessarily. I'm going to look at the president's letter and see."

In addition, Sen. Charles H. Percy, R-Ill., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, raised the possibility that Reagan could go ahead with the sale even if Congress vetoes it.

"If the president's position is not sustained," Percy said, "the president has an obligation to look at the law."

Ticket sales brisk for Ford dinner

Ticket sales for the dinner featuring former President Gerald Ford are going briskly, according to Massey Brand, director of the Permian Basin Chapter of Associated Builders and Contractors.

The organization is sponsoring the dinner, which will be held Tuesday in Midland Center.

Brand said "over 45 tables of 10 persons each have been sold for the dinner to honor former President Ford. We expect to sell another 10 to 15 more tables."

Tickets are \$500 per couple. Money generated from the event will go to fund a training program to help workers learn any of 21 different construction-related trades.

R.B. Hampton, president of ABC's Permian chapter and chairman of the dinner committee, said, "We have invited a number of state congressmen and area dignitaries, and many of them have said they will attend." Interest in the event has snowballed, according to Hampton, and he expects Midland Center to be filled.

RRC official offers rebuttal of criticism

AUSTIN — Responding to criticism that the Railroad Commission should take more responsibility in preventing pipeline accidents, a RRC Oil and Gas Division official said Wednesday that oil and gas operators must take responsibility for the safety of well sites.

Bob Harris, director of the RRC's Oil and Gas Division, said his agency has no means of assuring that no underground pipelines exist at proposed well sites before granting permits to the well operators.

The RRC was criticized for not taking such action after three drilling crewmen were killed Sept. 27 when their drilling rig accidentally punctured a gas pipeline in the Midland area. The comment appeared in The Midland Reporter-Telegram in a column written by David Sodamann, oil editor.

"The three men were drilling a 'rathole' — a shallow shaft needed for the operation of a rotary drilling rig — when the pipeline was punctured and exploded. A fourth man was severely injured."

"We could possibly identify where the oil and gas lines are," Harris said, "but there are thousands of other pipelines that we couldn't." Those other lines include electrical, water and other types of pipelines, he said.

Harris said there have been attempts in the past by private individuals to set up a center where drillers could get such information on all pipelines at a single place, but those attempts have never gone far.

"We have the locations, generally, of the pipelines that carry oil and gas

products," said Harris. He took issue with The Midland Reporter-Telegram article which stated that the RRC did not have such information available to oil and gas operators.

When an oil and gas pipeline is constructed, a plat showing the line has to be filed with the RRC. Those lines are then plotted on county maps and the maps are available for inspection at the RRC headquarters in Austin, Harris said.

However, Harris said his agency does not have the personnel to inspect each proposed well site to ensure no pipelines are in the way.

"We have a hard time just staying up with the permit applications," Harris said. "We don't have the personnel to research every site."

Harris added that most major oil and gas companies take pipe finders — similar to metal detectors — out to

proposed well sites in order to locate underground pipelines. Operators also can locate pipelines from markers that are required to be posted at spots where the lines cross roadways.

Harris said he has not heard of any other accidents similar to the Sept. 27 incident in his 26 years with the RRC.

"It is the responsibility of the operator to find out what's at the site," he said.

However, the RRC has no regulations legally imposing that duty on the operators and, similarly, the Legislature has not imposed any legal duty on the RRC to do that.

The RRC will be conducting an investigation of the accident and Harris said RRC staff members already have been to the site. That report should be completed soon.

Some agencies feeling budget cuts

Although there has been no official word from the government yet, local agencies gathered Wednesday for the monthly Midland Health and Welfare Association meeting to discuss anticipated consequences of federal cutbacks.

An informal panel of nine representatives from various social agencies presented a five-minute summary each on "The Cutbacks in Health and Welfare Services: Doing Without in Midland."

Some agencies already have felt the cutbacks through loss of employees and the inability to rehire help.

Beverly Acker, program director of the Department of Human Resources child welfare department, said the proposed changes would result in altering priorities of investigating possible cases of child neglect and abuse.

Top priority of severe abuse and neglect won't change and will be promptly provided for within 24 hours, she said.

However, runaways who leave the home because they do not agree with the form of discipline, a child staying home to babysit or the lack of supervision of children will not be investigated as intensely as before the cutbacks because of reduced employees and money. However, Ms. Acker urged the public to continue to report any suspected cases of abuse or neglect.

Midland Independent School District will be cutting back on the special reading, migrant and bilingual programs, according to John Martinez, representative of the federal programs.

Dick Stagers, operating analyst, Odessa Social Security, said there will be eight definite cutbacks for Social Security, adding some of the

reductions have been needed for a long time.

Changes include elimination of the minimum benefit payment and ceasing of a widowed mother's benefits for a child when it turns 16. In addition, students 16-22 will not be able to draw Social Security for school after August 1982. The wage earnings test will no longer apply to those 72 years old, but will change to age 70 by 1983.

Other changes include discarding death payment benefits to the funeral home; using public disability benefits to offset Social Security benefits; requiring a person to be 62 the entire month prior to his eligibility and rounding benefits to the lowest number for computation of funds.

Martha Douglass, representing the DHR Income Assistance Program, said very few Midlanders will be affected by the cutbacks. However, Aid For Dependent Children and Food Stamp programs will be reduced by

40-50 percent.

West Texas Legal Services' staff attorney Chris McCormack said the agency was not sure about the effect the cuts will have. Presently, Legal Services is operating under a 90-day congressional bill; consequently, only emergency cases will be handled. If they are reauthorized, McCormack said the agency has a contingency plan for the projected cutbacks.

The Texas Employment Commission has experienced severe employment problems, according to Ruth Bolin, service representative. She explained several people have left the commission to work in the private industry; these people will not be replaced. However, Ms. Bolin stated there are only "12 filed cases of unemployment in an area populated by 90,000" people.

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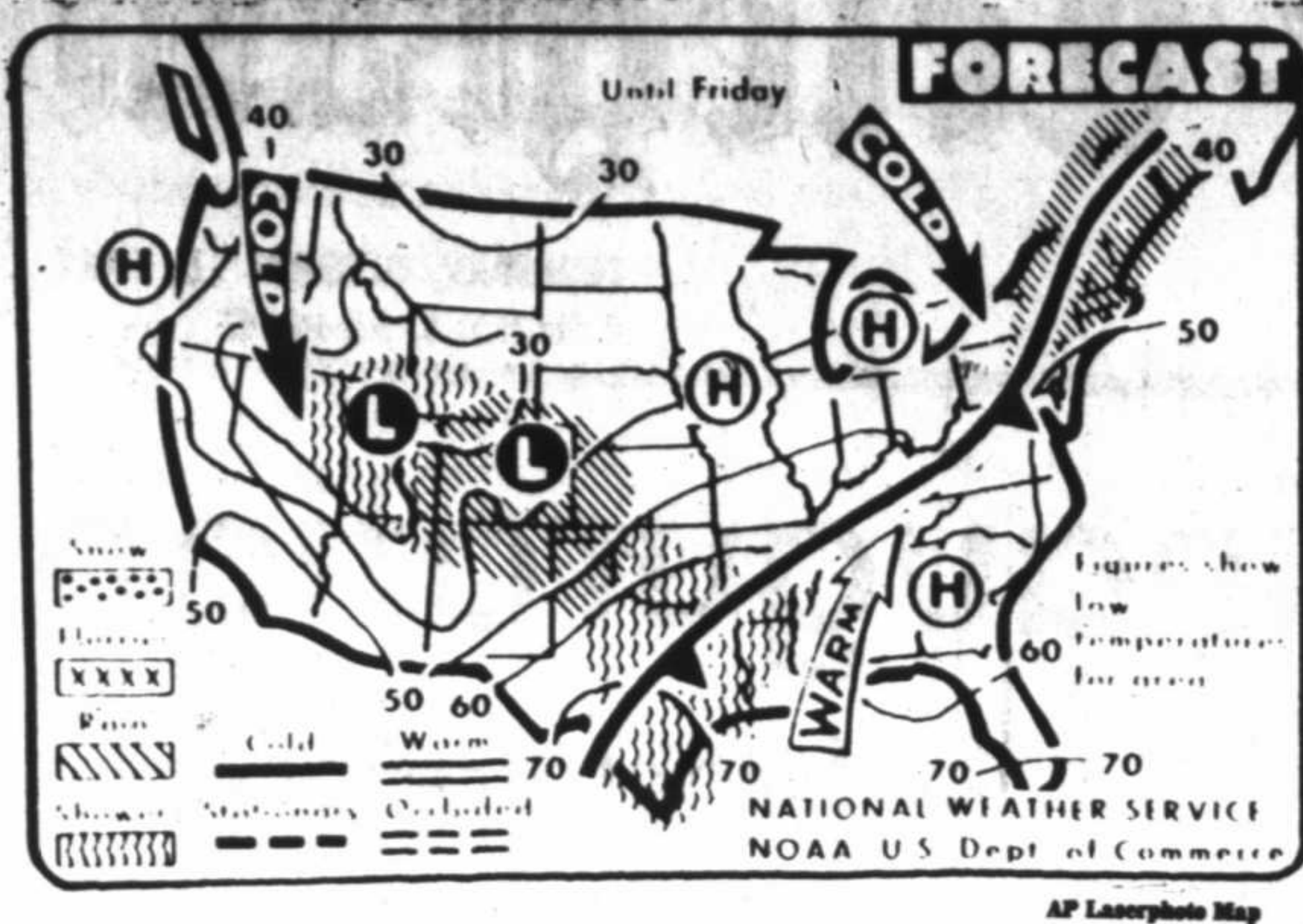

Total Image Program offers tips to Midland students

The first of what the Human Relations Council hopes to be a series of volunteers who will speak to Midland students on clothing, makeup, skin care and nutrition took place Wednesday afternoon at Goddard Junior High School.

Linda Van Auker, a registered dietitian, stressed the importance of good nutrition to 29 eighth grade students in Roxie Godfrey's homemaking class in the first Total Image Program (TIP) sponsored by the HRC.

"This is one of the busiest times of your life," Mrs. Van Auker said. "Rushing off to ballgames, school activities, your home life, personal activities — all of these can contribute to irregular eating habits."

Nutrition plays an important role in

the emotions of everyone, Mrs. Van Auker told the class. "Your vitality, your spark, that special something about you that makes you different from the other person are all affected by the foods you eat."

She cited crash diets as one of the major problems for young girls today. According to her, these types of diets are especially dangerous because, due to higher energy levels, the calorie intake at this age should be greater than in any other phase of life except pregnancy.

"There are lots of physical activities that begin at this age," she said. "And your body is going through some major changes — you're growing and your body is filling out."

"You have changing roles," she continued. "More responsibilities are put on you at home and in class to make better grades. These feelings

you have of pressure are stress. "Everyone thinks stress just applies to adults, but it doesn't."

Mrs. Van Auker discussed the four major food groups and gave the students a brochure outlining the recommended daily allowances.

The importance of eating the right amount of nutrients supplied in certain foods was proven to her when she was in college, she said.

During an experiment on protein levels, she said her class fed three laboratory rats different amounts of protein. The one that was given a smaller amount of protein than the recommended level "looked like a miniature mouse" at the end of the experiment. "The one that was fed extra protein looked almost like a cat to me," she said.

"If you don't believe the importance of protein levels, you should do

that experiment," she told the class. "It made a believer out of me."

She said that the effects due to the lack of protein are nothing compared to the lack of thiamin. "That can cause a nervous degeneration," she said. "Your hair falls out and you can't walk."

She said that type of deficiency is seen more in underdeveloped countries than it is here.

Mrs. Van Auker received her bachelor's degree in Foods and Nutrition from Texas Woman's University. She also did a working internship approved by the American Dietetic Association. She worked in the Dallas Independent School District before coming to Midland.

Court upheld murder conviction

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, an in 8-1 decision, has upheld the murder conviction of Death Row inmate Anthony Charles Williams in the beating death of a 13-year-old girl.

A Houston jury convicted Williams of murdering Vickie Lynn Wright during the course of a kidnapping.

The lone dissenter, Judge Marvin Tague, said Wednesday the other eight judges had invited the federal courts to impose standards on Texas for qualifying jurors on the death penalty.

Williams' appeal dealt mainly with the trial judge's decision to excuse four prospective jurors who had indicated qualms about the death penalty.

But the appeals court said the excused prospective jurors had indicated they would distort their answers to at least one of the three mandatory questions in capital cases to avoid inflicting the death penalty.

The death penalty is automatic if jurors find the defendant deliberately killed the victim without provocation and would endanger society if permitted to live.

"The record adequately demonstrates that these venire members' views about capital punishment would have prevented or substantially impaired the performance of their duties as jurors in accordance with their instructions," the court's opinion said.

Administration sends AWACS to Egypt

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration will send two AWACS radar aircraft to Egypt this week to help keep an eye on Libya and is considering a speedup of arms shipments to the bordering Sudan, the State Department said Wednesday.

Dean Fischer, the State Department spokesman, said the AWACS radar planes will be operated by American crews and will be assigned to Egypt for "an indeterminate time."

The actions underlined the rapidly expanding U.S. commitment to defend friendly Middle East nations from outside aggression, especially from Libya. Concern over the threat to the region has mounted in the wake of the assassination of President Anwar Sadat of Egypt.

Fischer said the administration is considering expanding its \$100 million arms package for Sudan for fiscal 1982, and that it may send some arms without waiting for congressional approval.

"Delivery of equipment within this package will be significantly accelerated to enable Sudan to meet the current Libyan threat," he said.

Fischer said the decision to send two Airborne Warning and Control Systems aircraft to Egypt stemmed from discussions Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. held with Egypt's president-elect, Hosni Mubarak, in Cairo over the weekend.

Fischer said Egyptian air force units will be given familiarization training in use of the aircraft, but they will remain under U.S. control.

The arrangement is similar to one for Saudi Arabia, where the United States maintains four AWACS to help protect Saudi oil fields from outside attack.

The administration now wants to sell five AWACS to the Saudis, but the House rejected that deal on Wednesday and President Reagan faces an uphill fight to salvage it in the Senate next week. Fischer said he didn't know of any plans to sell AWACS to Egypt.

He said the planes were being dispatched from Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma. AWACS are able to spot the movement of other aircraft for distances of up to 300 miles and therefore are invaluable in warning against enemy attack or in coordinating offensive air operations.

Officials here said they left Tinker Wednesday and are scheduled to arrive in Egypt on Thursday.

Fischer said the AWACS would be operated in Egyptian airspace. Other officials left no doubt they radar planes are intended to defend against possible air attack from Libya. "It's difficult to imagine another threat," said an official, who didn't want to be identified.

It won't be the first time an AWACS has been used in Egypt. Sadat had disclosed that the United States protected him with an AWACS aircraft during a trip to Sudan earlier this

year.

Fischer was non-committal when asked whether the additional aid for Sudan could include F-16 aircraft. He said the "principle elements" are likely to be armored equipment and air defense equipment.

Libyan forces are already in Chad and there have been reports of incidents involving Libyans along the Chad-Sudanese border.

"We are concerned about the whole area and the indications of cross-border incidents coupled with the rhetoric of Khadafi," Fischer said, referring to Libyan President Muammar Khadafi.

Fischer said the administration already is contracted to send jeeps, armored personnel carriers and air defense weapons, in addition to six C-130 aircraft and 36 armored personnel carriers previously sent. All are part of a \$30 million arms package for 1981.

He said the decision on what equipment to send for fiscal 1982 and when to send it will be made in a few days. Since Congress hasn't approved the \$100 million in aid, he said consideration is being given to sending equipment from existing U.S. stores.

"We are anxious and determined to assist Sudan in their own defense needs," Fischer said.

Skeleton thought to be remains of Bonham man

MERIDIAN, Miss. (AP) — Lauderdale County Coroner Mari Cobbler said that a skeleton found under a cedar tree Wednesday was thought to have been the remains of a Texas man.

Cobbler said identification found on the skeleton indicated the body was that of Lanzo C. White, 60, of Bonham, Texas.

The records showed that White had donated blood as recently as August in Meridian. The remains were found near Interstate 59 on the Mississippi side of the Alabama state line, he said.

The Mississippi Crime Bureau was called into the case to help determine the cause of death.

House panel says Reagan should rehire controllers

HOUSTON (AP) — The rehiring of "a substantial number" of striking air traffic controllers is indispensable to any effort by the Reagan administration to rebuild the nation's flight system, a House committee staff asserted Wednesday.

The majority staff of the Democratic-controlled House Post Office and Civil Service Committee, in an analysis of the Federal Aviation Administration's plans for restoring the system to prestrike levels, concluded:

"Because of the unique nature of the occupation, the only way to lessen the strain on the system is to rehire a substantial number of the striking controllers."

The administration has steadfastly refused to consider any amnesty for 11,500 unionized air traffic controllers who walked off their jobs Aug. 3 when contract talks with the FAA broke down. The controllers were fired.

In its report, the committee staff challenged assertions by FAA Administrator J. Lynn Helms about the timetable under which the flight control system will be restored to pre-strike levels.

"The FAA may have satisfactory answers and convincing arguments as to how it will achieve its staffing goals," the report said. "The current projections, however, appear extremely optimistic, and even if FAA

reaches its goals, the overall quality and experience level of the work force will be questionable."

The report also challenged Helms' position that controllers fired by the administration cannot legally return to federal employment.

Appearing before the House transportation appropriations subcommittee Wednesday, Helms said his agency is seeking pay raises for controllers who remained on the job and those who joined the FAA since the strike.

"I have prepared a (contract) package, which has been presented to the secretary (Drew Lewis) and the White House, and it was approved this morning," he said.

"There are a couple of things in it that I have yet to nail down. I feel a

proper acknowledgment of our employees under a very heavy strain is in order," he said. "The (new 12 percent) cuts that are envisioned here will not prevent that from going through."

Helms said the package would be in addition to the 4.8 percent general pay increase that federal civilian workers received Oct. 1.

In its analysis of FAA plans for manning the nation's flight control towers, the House committee staff said that before the strike, the controller work force was 21,040, including personnel who were being trained and those in support positions besides people actually manning the radar scopes.

That number had fallen to 10,602 by the end of August, the committee staff report said.

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Help with refugees wins Nobel

OSLO, Norway (AP) — The office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees won the Nobel Peace Prize Wednesday for its work with the millions of homeless in the world's "flood of human catastrophe and suffering."

In announcing the award, the Norwegian Nobel Committee cited the UNHCR for carrying out its work "despite the many political difficulties with which it has to contend."

Poul Hartling, the United Nations high commissioner for refugees, said he accepted the \$180,000 award "on behalf of refugees everywhere."

The former Danish prime minister termed the announcement of the office's second Nobel Peace Prize as "a great and pleasant surprise." The UNHCR also won the award in 1954.

"I'm happy and deeply grateful. This is a statement to the world's refugees that you are not forgotten," he said from his Geneva, Switzerland, office.

In its official prize announcement, the Norwegian Nobel Committee said, "The stream of refugees ... creates serious problems in relations between states, and for this reason the activities of

the office of the high commissioner for refugees serve the interests of humanity and peace."

The UNHCR was set up in 1951 to replace the short-lived International Refugee Organization, which had cared chiefly for the displaced people from World War II. It was slated to disband by 1954, but violence and worldwide conflict changed that.

The Vietnam War, unrest in Africa and Soviet intervention in Afghanistan added to what the Nobel Committee referred to as the people who escape "from their native land, with no prospect of ever returning."

The UNHCR was involved in repatriating about 10 million refugees from India to Bangladesh after their country gained independence in 1971. It aided displaced people after strife in Cyprus and those in Uganda who sought shelter abroad during the Idi Amin regime.

The Nobel Committee noted that worldwide there are between 14 million and 18 million refugees. Hartling says his agency is responsible for handling about 10 million refugees, about half of them in Africa.

The committee noted "the mass exodus of peo-

ple fleeing from Vietnam, 2 million who have left Afghanistan and an equal number from Ethiopia."

Since 1975, the UNHCR has helped resettle more than 1 million "boat people" who fled Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos to other Southeast Asia countries. And it reports providing food and shelter for more than 1 million Afghan refugees in Pakistan.

Last week, the United Nations organization reported it has resettled 600,000 Zimbabweans.

The UNHCR, with a staff of more than 1,500 in 86 field offices, had a budget of \$500 million last year. The Nobel Committee said the work has been "supported and supplemented by large-scale contributions made by other international organizations, state-sponsored as well as private."

The Soviet bloc countries and its allies do not make any direct contribution to the UNHCR, saying the flow of refugees has been a result of Western "colonialism."

"We have assisted refugees and displaced persons regardless of race, religion or political persuasion," Hartling said Tuesday.

In New York, the U.N. secretary-general, Kurt

Waldheim, said the Nobel Peace Prize to UNHCR was a "well-deserved tribute" that focused on "one of humanity's most pressing responsibilities, the plight of nearly 10 million persons who, through no fault of their own, are uprooted from their homes and must be helped by the world community."

Jakob Sverdrup, the Nobel Committee secretary, said the office of the high commissioner for refugees was in competition with 17 other organizations and 77 individual candidates. But a committee spokesman refused to say who nominated the United Nations organization.

The Nobel Prize in literature will be awarded Thursday by the 18-member Swedish Academy of Letters.

The Nobel Prizes, started in 1901, are financed from the proceeds of Swedish dynamite inventor Alfred Nobel's legacy.

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Guinness closing the book on more dangerous records

NEW YORK (AP) — For a quarter century, people have eaten fire, swallowed swords, slept between beds of nails, even devoured a bicycle and a tree, just to get into the world's most famous record book.

Now the Guinness Book of World Records is "closing the book" on some of its records, declaring some winners for eternity in categories the editors consider life-threatening or particularly dangerous.

No more sword-swallowing. No more bike-eating. No more bodies sandwiched between beds of nails.

"There is sufficient planned lunacy on television without our having to add to it," said Norris McWhirter, the book's co-founder and editor in London.

"Something eventually reaches a point that we don't want to include it," McWhirter added in a telephone interview. "People can do what they like, but we're not going to chronicle it. Maybe the obituary columns will, but we won't."

The 1982 American edition of the book is being released Thursday. Since it was first published in 1955, it has been the superlative book of superlatives. But there are a few things it's never been, namely a place for what the editors call "gratuitously dangerous" feats like the lowest height from which a handcuffed parachutist has dived or the thinnest burning rope ever to suspend a man in a straitjacket from a flying helicopter.

"We are 3 or 4 percent zany, 25

percent sports achievements and the rest almost academic — the sciences and the like," McWhirter, 56, said.

Among the new zany entries: —M. Lotito of Evreux, France, who ate a bicycle during a 15-day period in 1977. He ate the frame in the form of metal filings; the tires were cut into leather strips and "stewed."

—Joe Swaitney, 19, who ate an 11-foot birch sapling — branches, leaves and a 4.7-inch diameter trunk — in 89 hours to win a Chicago radio station's "most outrageous" contest.

—Count Desmond, of Binghamton, N.Y., who swallowed thirteen 23-inch-long sword blades.

Desmond's sword-swallowing feats are the final word in that category. "We don't want him trying any more,

saying he cut his guts out for Guinness," said David Boehm, 67, American editor of the book.

The bike-eating category, which the book calls "the ultimate act of stupidity," was recorded because "it is unlikely to attract competition." No other entries will be considered in that category.

This year the fire-eating category is followed by a warning: "Fire-eating is potentially a highly dangerous activity."

Among eating records, McWhirter said the book will not list records for potentially dangerous items such as live ants, goldfish, chewing gum or raw eggs in shells.

Bursting a hot water bottle with sheer lung power has also been re-

tired as medically "most inadvisable," with the title going to Franco Columbu, who burst one of the bottles in 23 seconds in August 1979.

The "Iron Maiden" category is another being stopped. Vernon Craig of Wooster, Ohio, set the record in 1977 by lying between beds of nails with 1,642½ pounds of weight on top.

"It's quite extraordinary, but I think if they go up much higher there's a great danger someone will be impaled," McWhirter said. "We feel that's something we shouldn't encourage."

Other new entries include: —Picasso was a prolific painter, but Morris Katz, 49, of New York City made the new book after finishing his 82,000th saleable painting. Katz says

he sells his paintings "cheap and often."

—Walter Cavanagh of Santa Clara, Calif., has the world's largest credit card collection — 1,088 cards with a combined line of credit of \$1.25 million.

—The world's most prolific living mother is Leontina Albina, 57, of San Antonio, Chile, who has produced 44 children and was pregnant when the book went to press.

One record holder is the Guinness book itself, the "all-time copyrighted best-seller and world's fastest selling title," with 44 million copies in print increasing by 60,000 to 80,000 a week. It's published in 23 languages, and a Chinese edition will come out this year.

IRA organizing new wave of terror

LONDON (AP) — British security authorities believe the outlawed Irish Republican Army has reorganized its network of cells on the British mainland and has enough explosives to wage a new terror blitz, police sources said Wednesday.

The authorities believe that the IRA squad responsible for a deadly bombing last Saturday outside the British Army's Chelsea Barracks in London is part of the new network established by the IRA's "Provisional" wing on the mainland over the last year, sources said.

Two people — an elderly woman and an 18-year-old youth — were killed and 37 were wounded in that bombing, the first IRA attack in mainland Britain since the collapse of a 7-month-old hunger strike by convicted guerrillas in Northern Ireland's Maze prison seeking political status.

The IRA, outlawed in the mostly Roman Catholic Republic of Ireland as well as in the predominantly Protestant British province, wants to unify the north and south.

"We know there are explosives dumps set up some time ago that we haven't found and it's fairly safe to assume that they've got other stuff through the security screen," said one source who asked not to be identified.

The information, supplied by usually reliable sources within security ranks, could not be confirmed officially.

Police suspect that some bombers may have slipped into Britain from France, the Netherlands or Belgium, where the IRA has a network of sympathizers, to evade the tight security on all air and sea traffic from Ireland.

Police in the Republic and in Britain claimed a year ago they foiled an IRA effort to move explosives into Britain via the Continent after a known Belfast "Provo," Peter Rodgers, was arrested in the Republic driving a vanload of gelignite destined for France and ultimately Britain.

"The indications were that the Provisionals were aiming to bomb London and other cities during the Christmas shopping rush," a Dublin official said. "It stands to reason they'll try it again."

The Provos and splinter groups have been blamed for nearly all the 370 bombings reported on the mainland since 1972. Saturday's bombing raised the known death toll to 67. Hundreds of people have been maimed or wounded in the blasts.

Scotland Yard, headquarters of London's police force, Wednesday issued composite pictures or artists' impressions of three of the IRA team members authorities believe were involved in Saturday's bombing — the first such guerrilla attack in London for more than a year.

None of the composites resemble any of the hundreds of known IRA activists or sympathizers the Yard has on file, bolstering British intelligence reports that the Provos have infiltrated men unknown to security authorities into the mainland or activated deep-cover "sleepers" established some time ago.

British Intelligence believes the Provos have rebuilt their mainland network, decimated by

police in earlier years. The last major crack-down was two years ago.

The sources said security authorities believe the new IRA network comprises at least some activists not known to the army or police in Ireland and who do not take cover with Britain's Irish population of one million. Police infiltrated the Irish community years ago.

Authorities suspect the Provos' "Active Service Unit," or ASU, operating here probably includes experienced guerrillas who have been based in the Republic and operated along the Northern Ireland border.

"The men who carried out Saturday's bombing attack were cool and efficient," one source said. "They rigged their bomb the day before they detonated it. You might even say they were reckless because they exposed themselves to several witnesses."

What alarms authorities most is that the bombers used a remote control device for the first time on the mainland, instead of the normal clock timers, an indication of the increasingly sophisticated electronic techniques the IRA now employs.

Police say they believe at least two Provos were present when the bomb was exploded. One was watching the target, a busload of soldiers, while 300 yards away another detonated the bomb packed with three-inch nails to cause maximum injury, police say.

In Northern Ireland, a Protestant legislator claimed that classified police files containing the names and home addresses of almost 100 Royal Ulster Constabulary officers, including details on undercover Special Branch agents, have been found on a public garbage dump east of Belfast.

Peter Robinson, a member of the British Parliament, told a news conference in Belfast that he was given more than 40 RUC documents by a man who said he found them on the municipal dump near Randalstown over the weekend.

Headquarters of the mostly Protestant RUC declined comment.

He charged that the documents provided a "ready hit-list" for the IRA Provos who have killed 159 police officers since sectarian and political violence erupted in the province 12 years ago.

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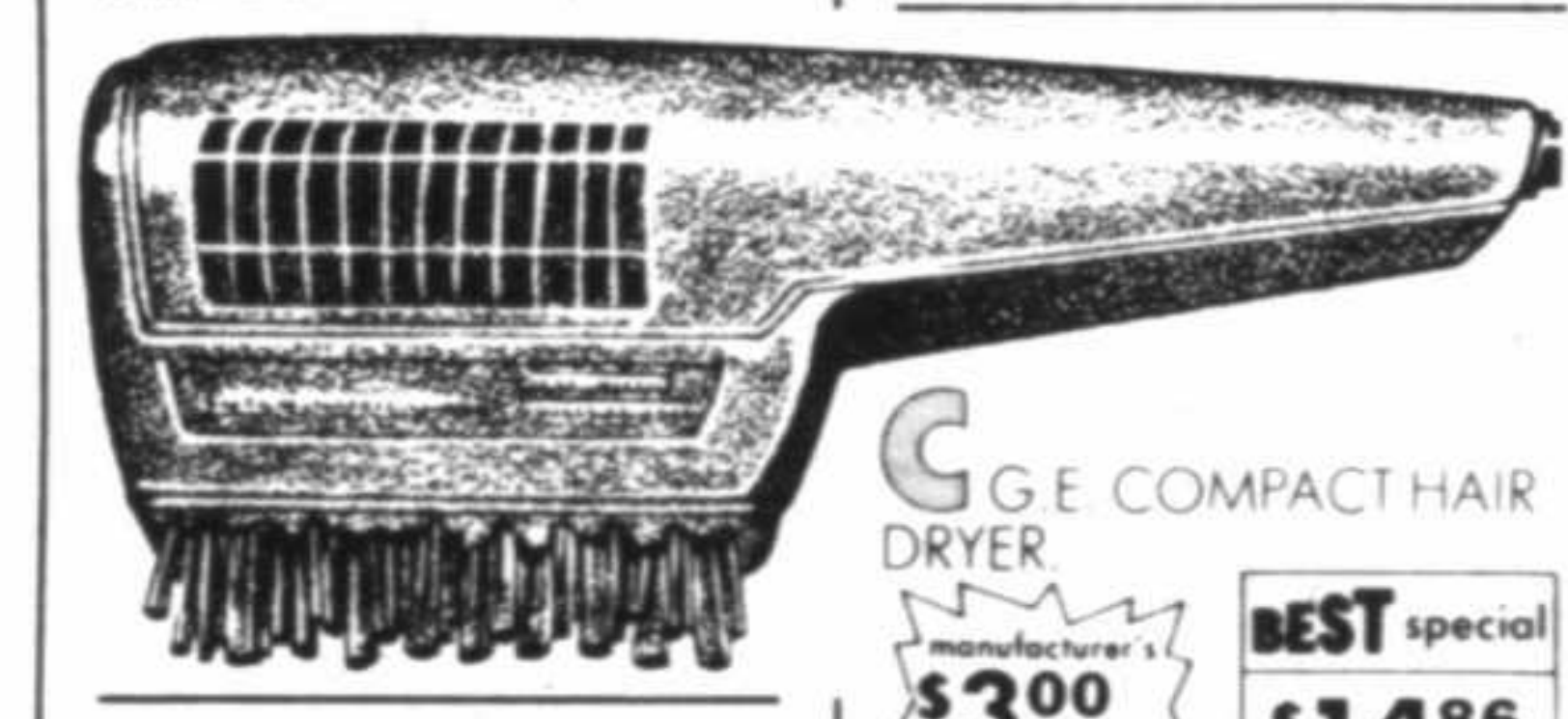
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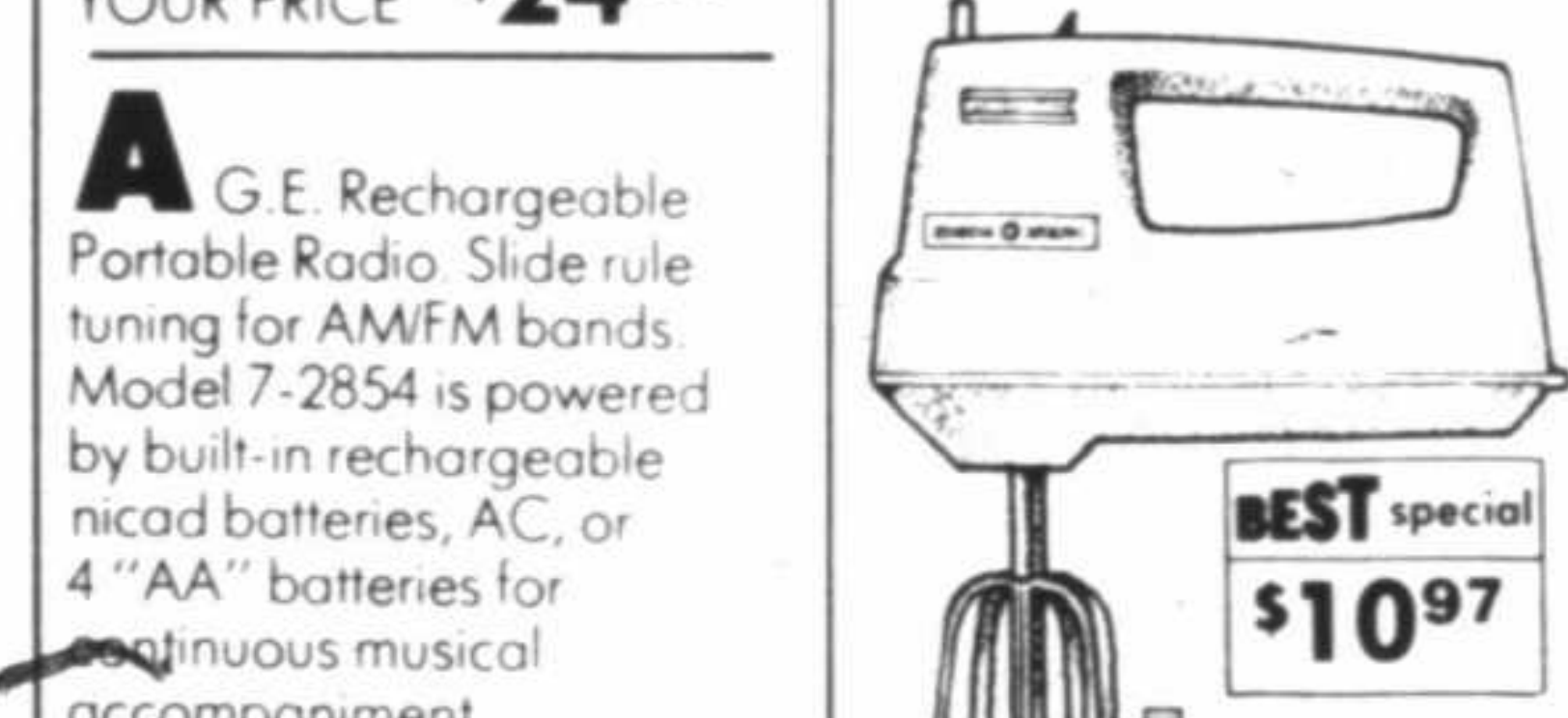
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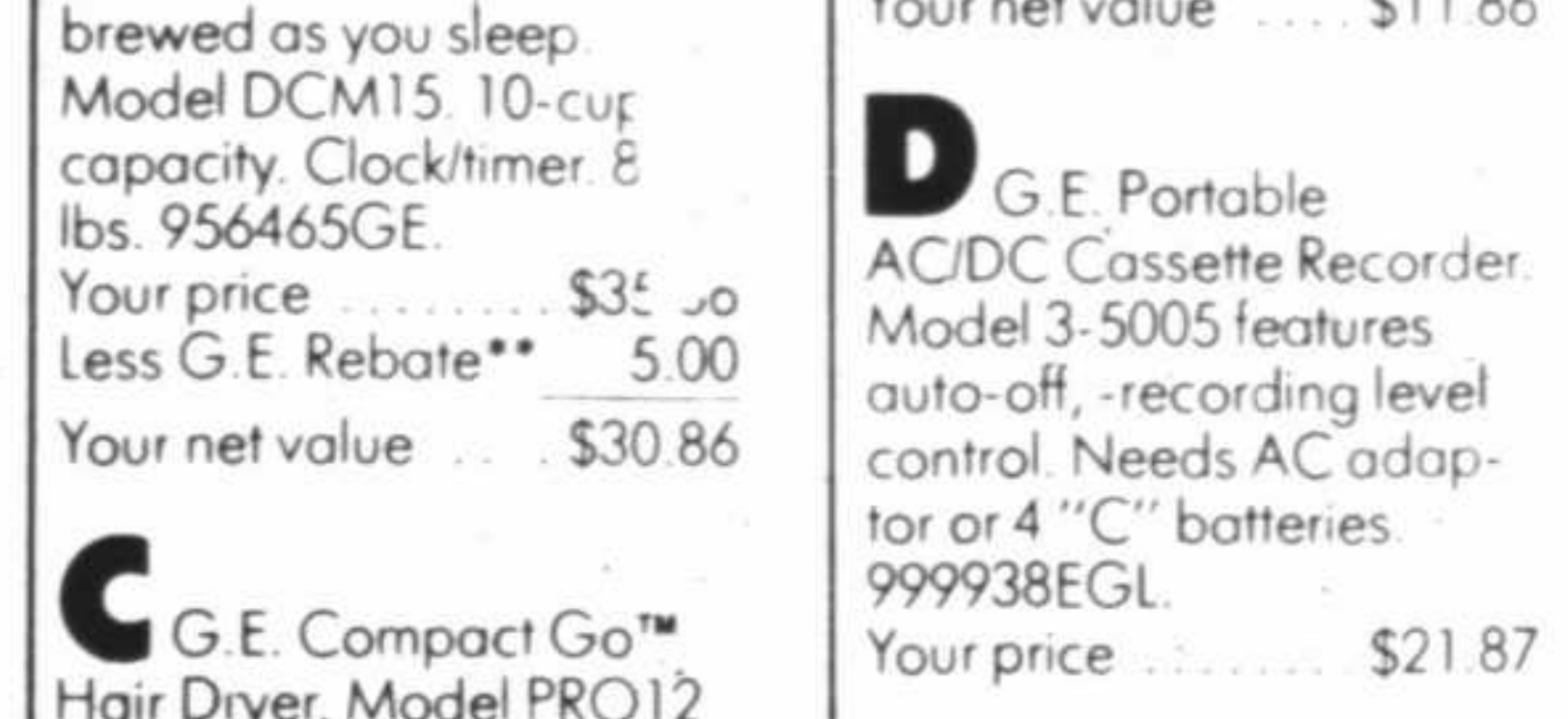
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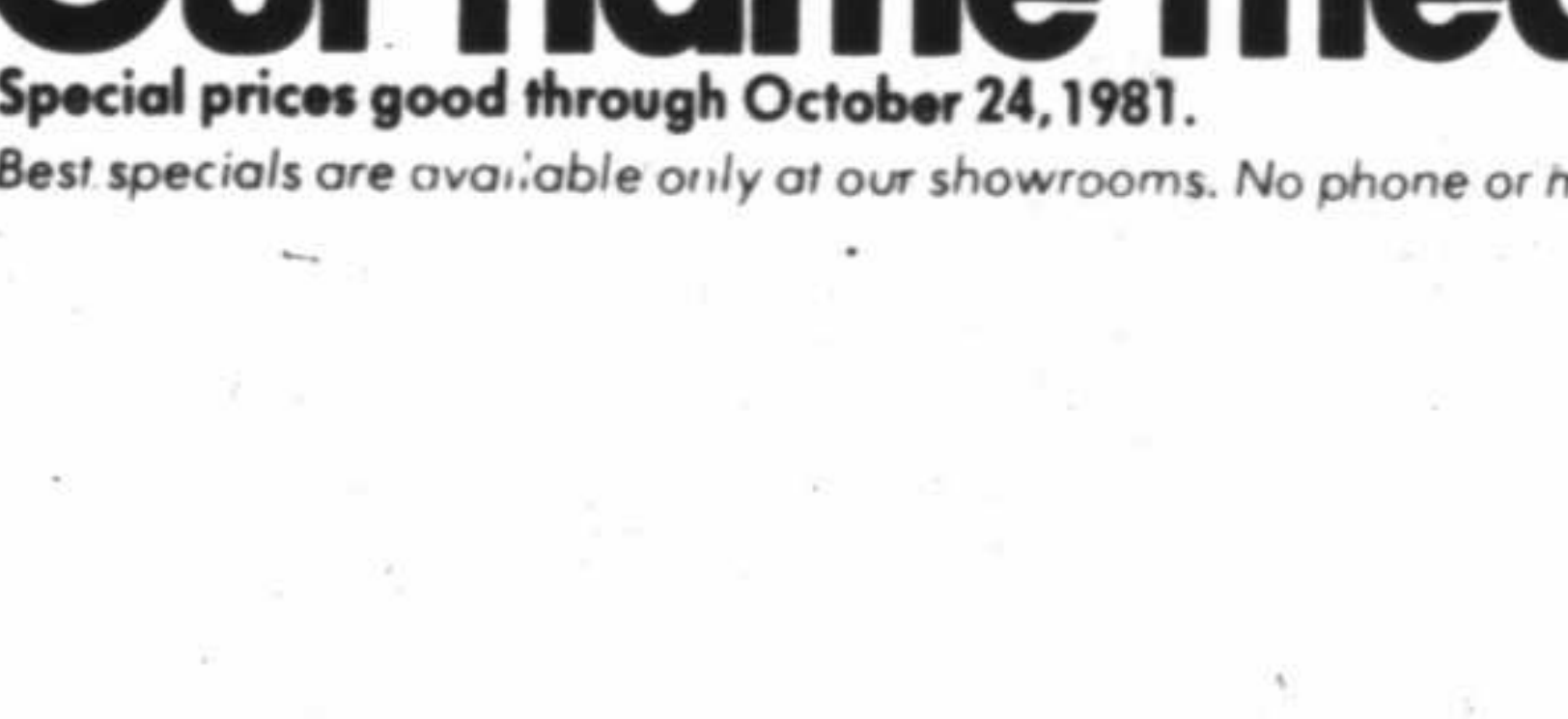
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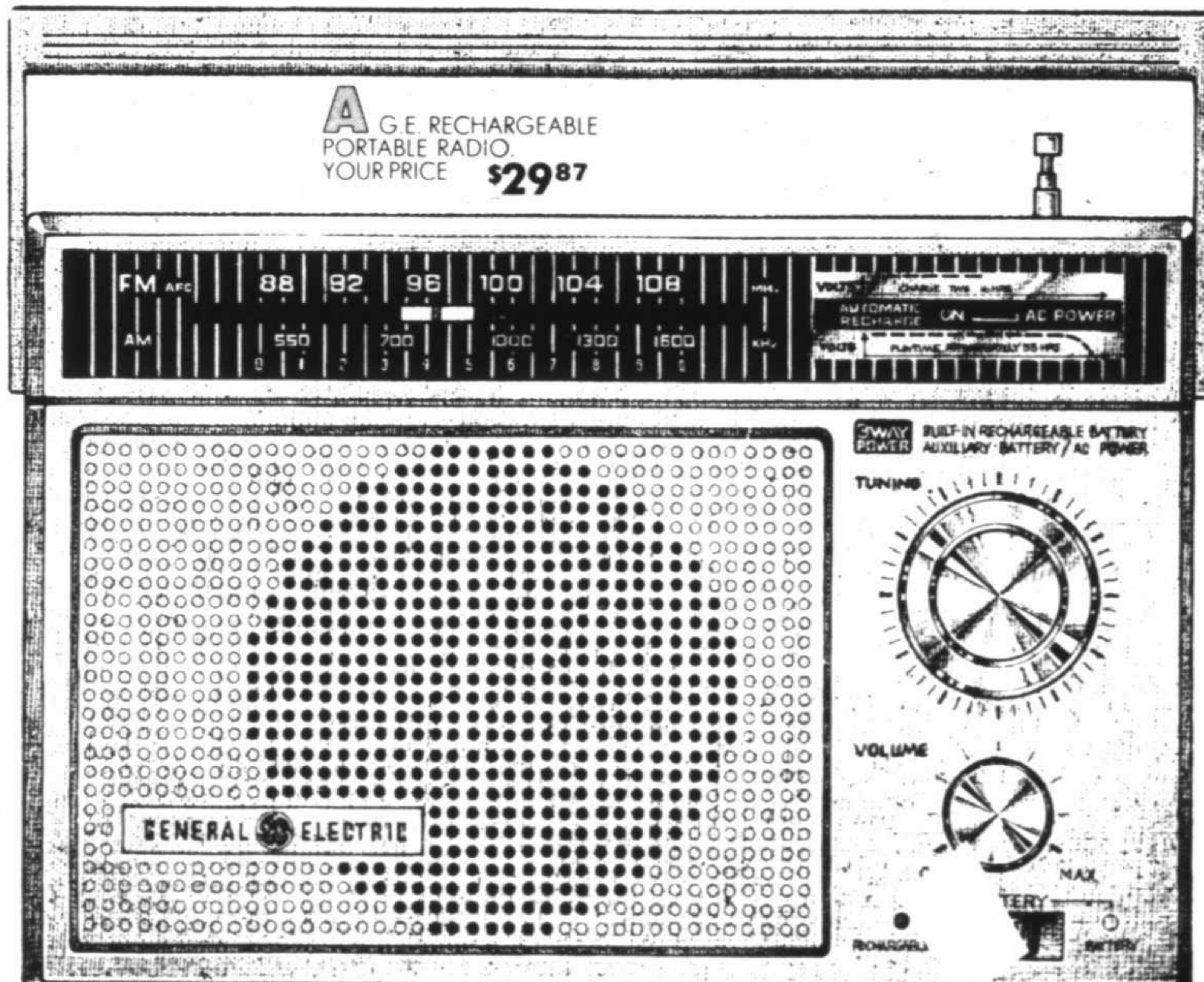
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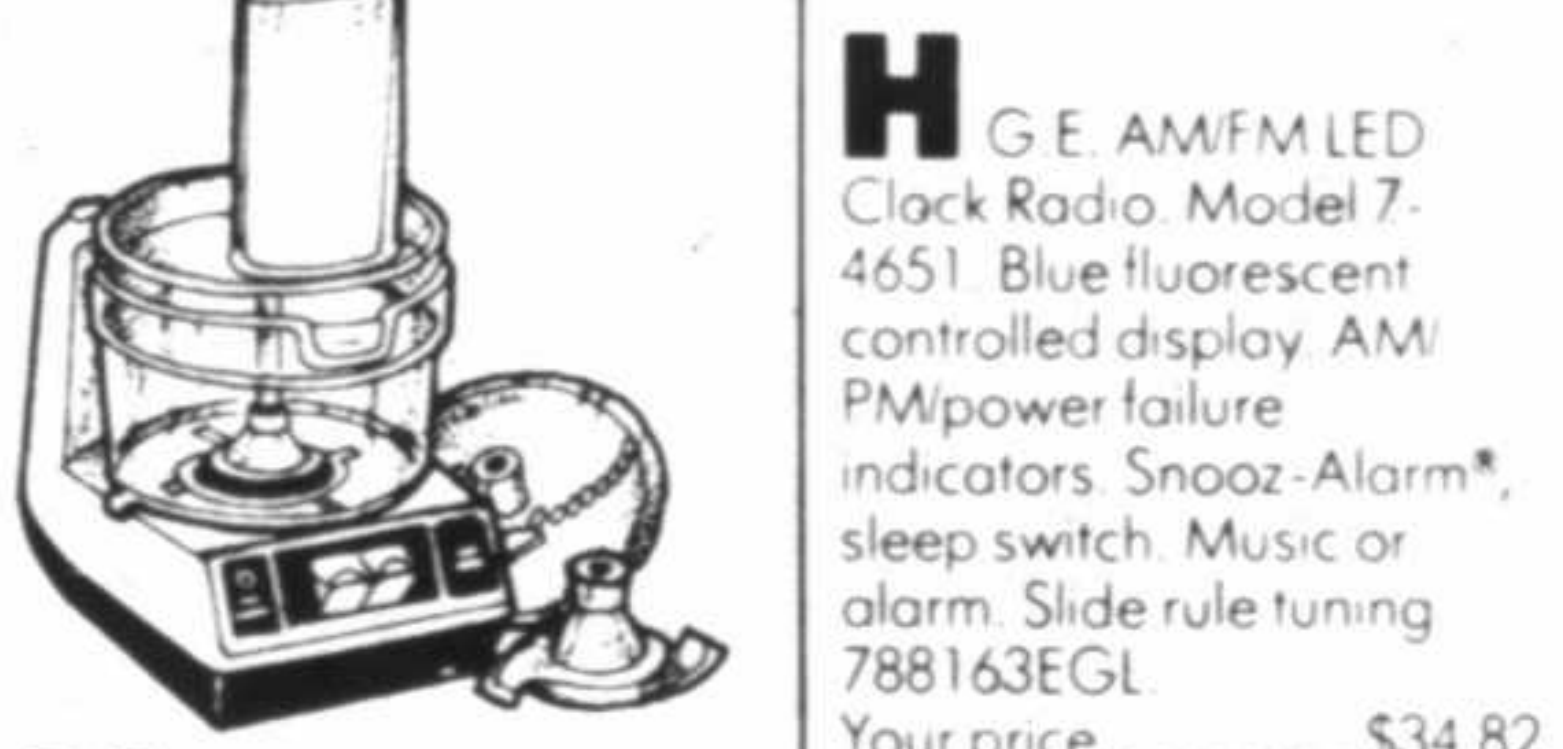
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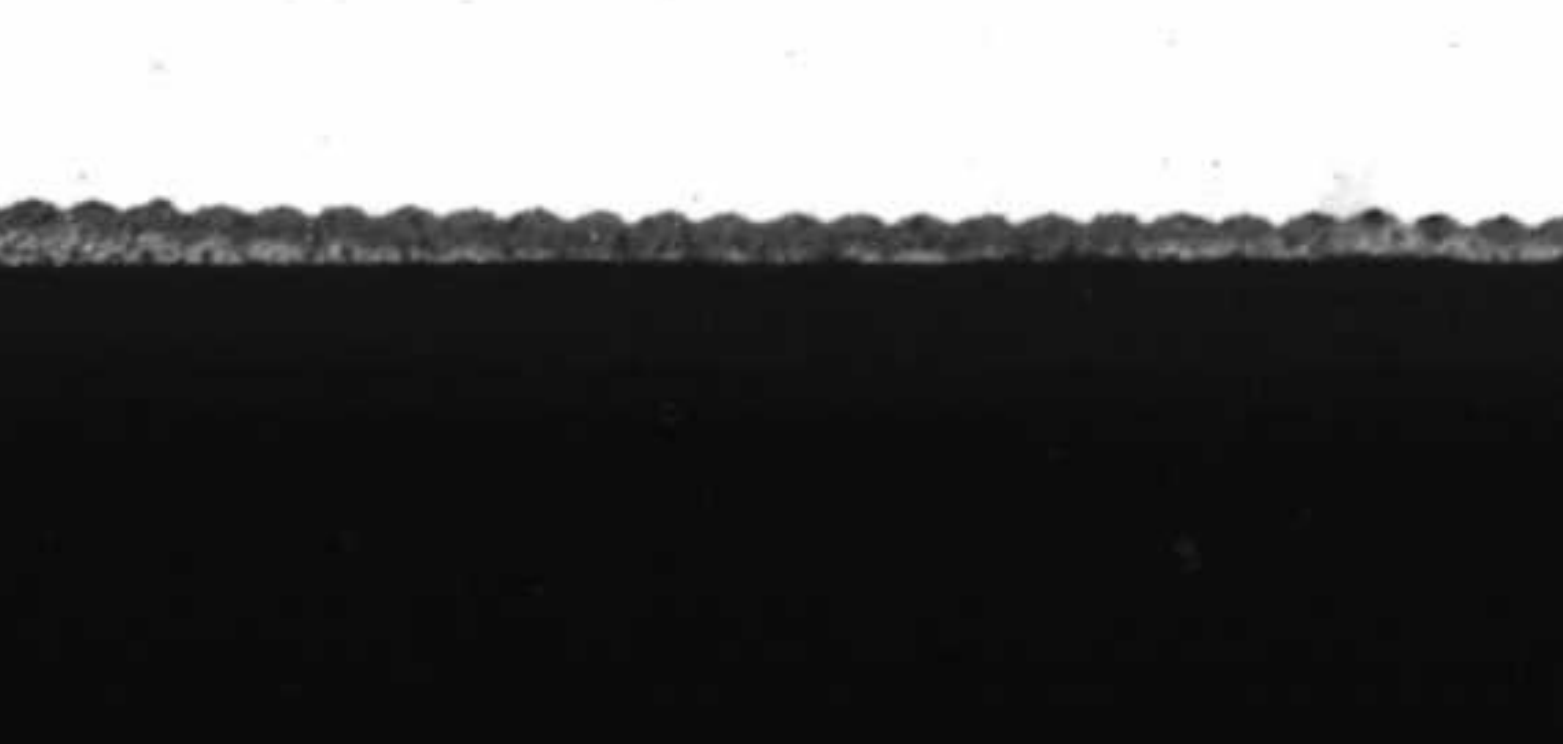
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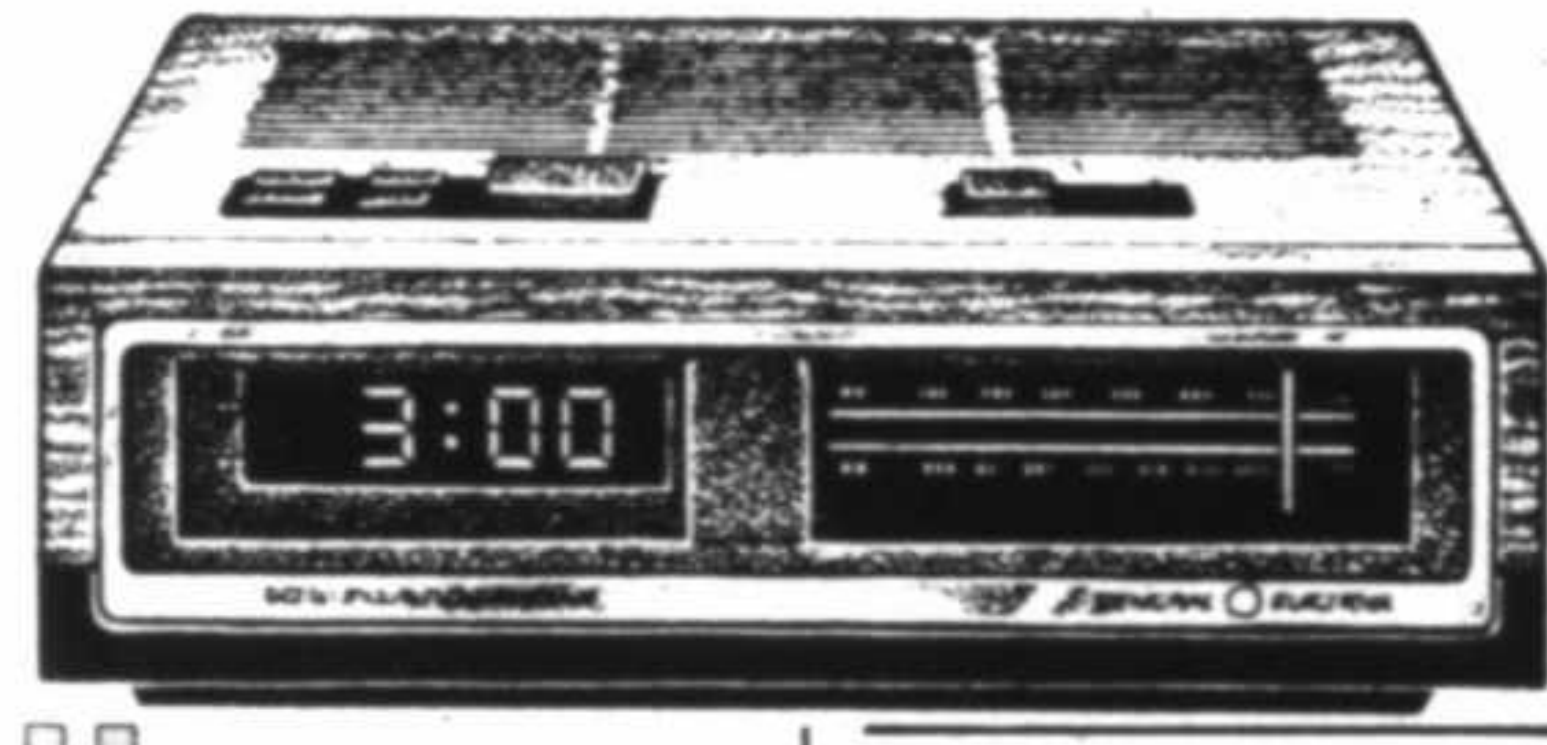
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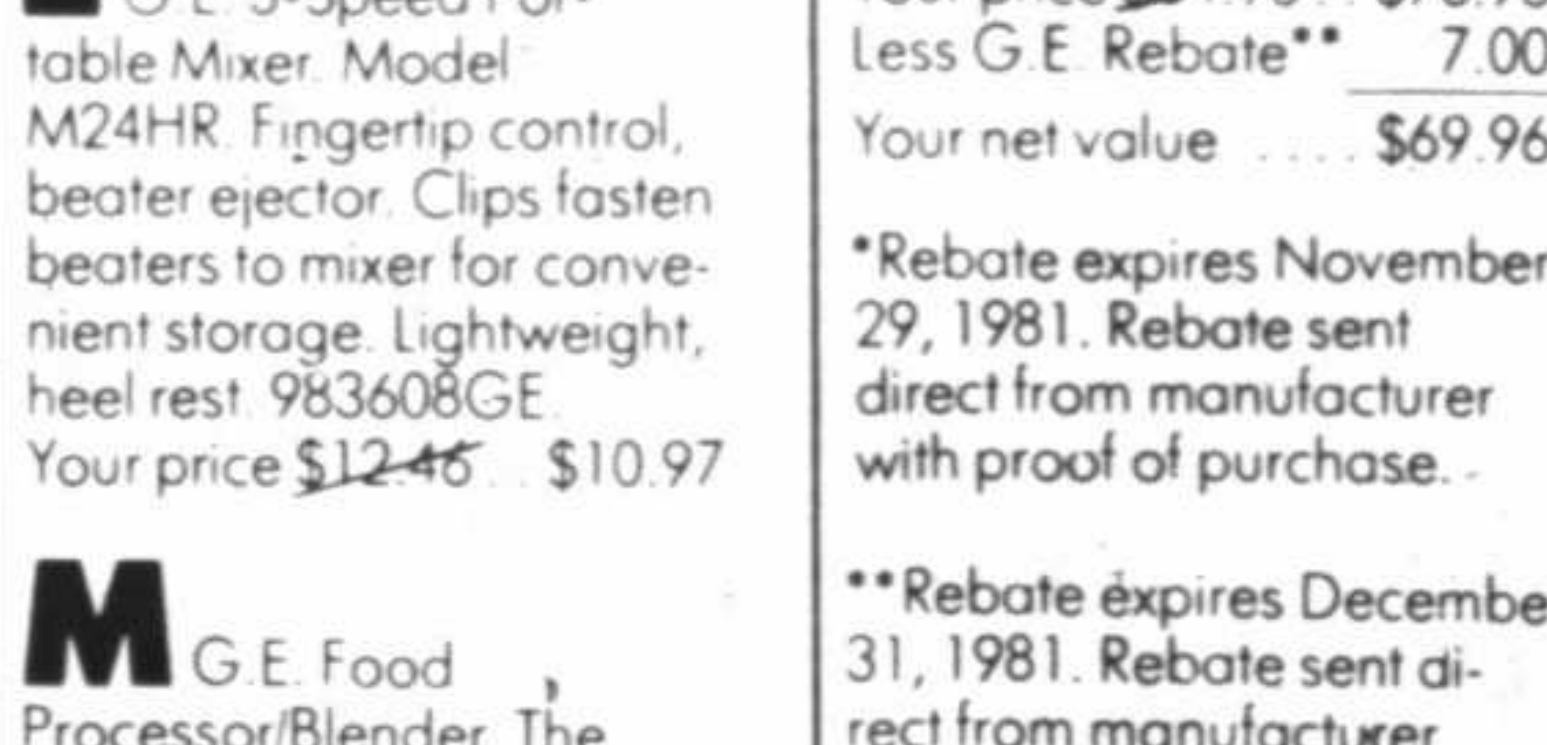
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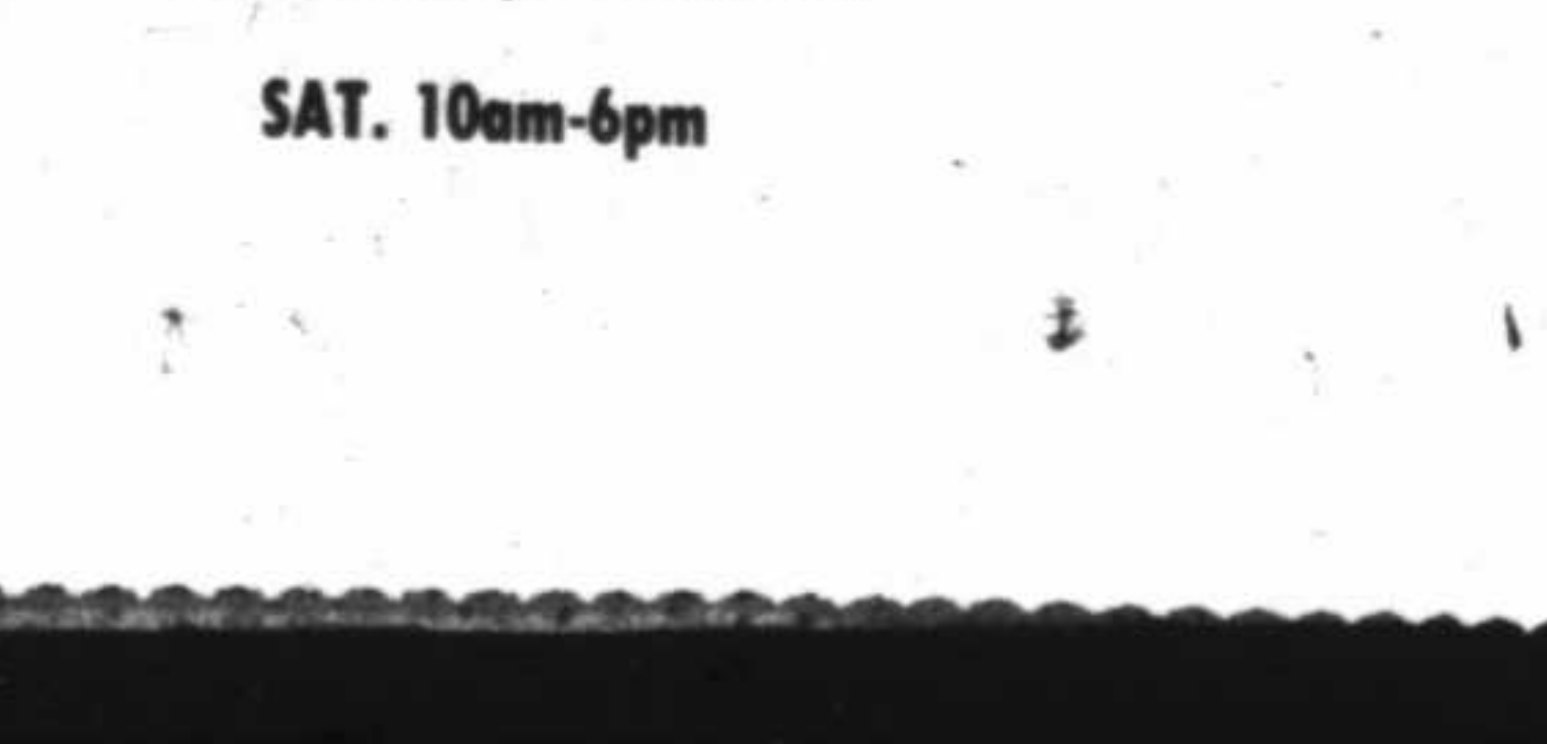
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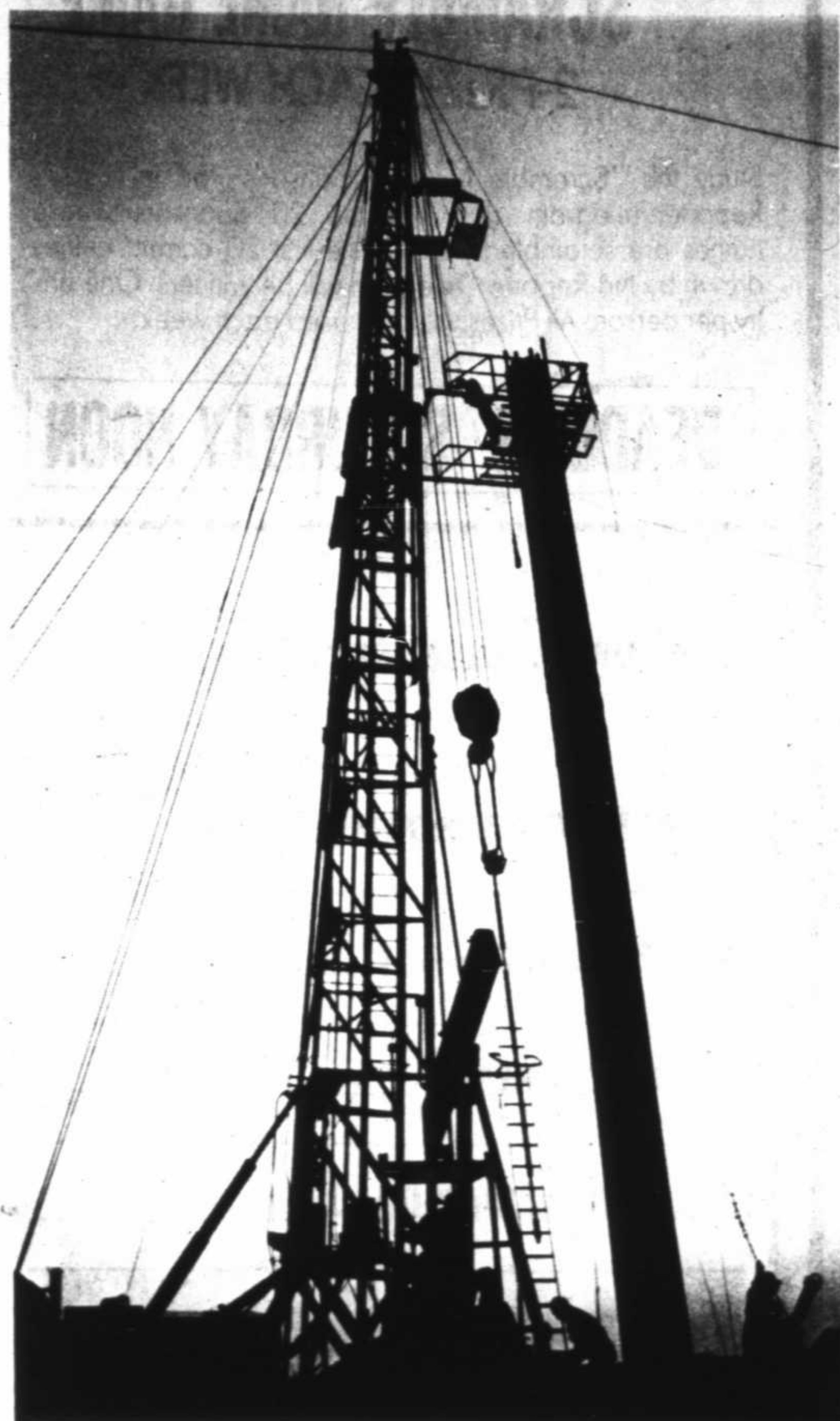

DOE says heating oil supplies will be enough

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supplies of heating oil should be adequate to meet demand this winter, but consumers will be paying more, the Energy Department predicted Wednesday.

The DOE's Energy Information Administration projected demand for heating oil to be 3.25 million barrels a day from October through December of this year, down from the 3.28 million barrels daily used during the same time last year.

This reduced demand comes at a time when heating oil stocks of 241 million barrels are 4 percent higher than at the same time last year, the EIA said.

Government forecasters predicted the price of heating oil will rise from

\$1.18 per gallon in September to \$1.24 in January and reach \$1.31 by the end of 1982.

They predicted gas prices, currently at an average of \$1.35 per gallon for all grades, would remain steady for the next six months and then rise to \$1.45 per gallon by the end of 1982.

This projection assumes that the price of oil will hold steady for the rest of the year at \$36.70 per barrel and then rise at the same rate as overall inflation in the economy.

Government forecasters predicted that overall energy use for 1981 would be 1.6 percent lower than 1980 with oil use dropping by 4 percent. It predicted that energy consumption would rise by 3 percent in 1982, matching the projected upturn in the economy.

Slack demand, Saudi's push is forcing OPEC price cuts

NEW YORK (AP) — Gradually and without fanfare OPEC is moving closer to a unified price that could end the worldwide over-supply of oil, industry sources said Wednesday.

The pressure of Saudi Arabia's high production, coupled with continued slack demand for petroleum by importing nations, has forced member states of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to reduce their prices.

These forces have intensified in recent weeks, producing a flurry of speculation that OPEC will hold a special meeting later this month to affirm a formal pricing agreement. The cartel's next scheduled meeting is Dec. 10 in Abu Dhabi.

An OPEC price agreement, which analysts presume would raise Saudi Arabia's price by \$2 a barrel to \$34 and result in less production, would lead to similar price increases in non-OPEC oil but would have little immediate effect on U.S. gasoline prices.

Humberto Calderon Berti, the energy minister of Venezuela, said in Caracas on Wednesday that OPEC "almost certainly" will hold a special meeting this month and agree on a base price of \$34 a barrel. He said informal negotiations were under way.

Oil industry sources cautioned, however, that such predictions made in the past had proven wrong. Reports circulated in Kuwait in

September and earlier this month that an OPEC session would be held before December. But Saudi Arabia, by far the largest and most important exporter, has not indicated it would accept an early meeting.

"Lots of times in the past people have said what the Saudis will do, but it hasn't worked out that way," said Halsey Peckworth, editorial director of Platt's Oilgram Price Report, a New York-based industry newsletter.

Some oil traders believe Saudi oil policy will remain uncertain until Congress decides whether to allow the sale of radar planes to the Saudis. If the sale is denied, the Saudis could drop their moderate stance on oil prices, traders said.

Saudi Arabia, which produces nearly half of OPEC's estimated output of 20 million barrels a day, has kept its production high in an effort to force the higher-priced members to lower their prices. Saudi Arabia charges \$32 a barrel, while official prices of other members range up to \$40 a barrel.

Th Saudi strategy is beginning to succeed. Just last week the Brazilian state-owned oil company Petrobras disclosed that Iraq had cut its offering price by \$1.50 a barrel, leaving its prices in a range of between \$32.50 and about \$35 a barrel.

Iraq reportedly was one of the OPEC members that blocked a proposal at the cartel's last meeting in August to unify prices at \$34 a barrel. Venezuela was another.

Oil spill rate may be down

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — The amount of oil spilled into the seas in accidents in 1980 dropped by 55 percent over the previous year, researchers said Wednesday.

A total of 149 million gallons of oil was lost in spills or tanker sinkings reported in 1980, compared with 328 million gallons in 1979 and 210 million in 1978, according to statistics to be published Friday in the Oil Spill Intelligence Report, a weekly newsletter of the Center for Short-Lived Phenomena.

But the drop "may prove somewhat misleading because OSIR decided not to include an estimate for the total amount of oil lost during the Iran-Iraq war," the report said.

That would add "at least 100 million gallons because both Iran and Iraq concentrated their war efforts on a region with a high oil throughput and because historically, in other regions of the world, individual attacks on oil facilities have resulted in losses of over 10 million gallons."

The 1980 figure also is conservative because not all countries require the reporting of spills, said Richard Golub, director of the center.

"It is important to realize the major decrease may seem staggering," Golub said. "But if you look beyond the statistics at the number of major oil spills above one million gallons, in 1980 there were about as many major spills as in 1979 and 1978, and yet in

1980 there were no massive catastrophic incidents.

"A headline that states oil pollution decreases by 55 percent may be somewhat misleading because the frequency of major spills has not decreased significantly, although the magnitude has decreased."

In 1978, more than 68 million gallons spilled when the Liberian tanker Amoco Cadiz grounded and broke up off Portugal, France, in March, accounting for 32 percent of the 210 million-gallon total.

Two disasters in 1979 accounted for more than 66 percent of the 328 million-gallon total. A total of 84 million gallons were lost in the collision of tankers Aegean Captain and Atlantic Empress of Trinidad-Tobago in July, and 134 million gallons were lost in the Gulf of Mexico when the Ixtoc I well blew out that June.

"This may be the beginning of a trend, yet I would be optimistic to say each year oil pollution or the amount of oil spilled each year would decrease by 50 percent, and that by 1990 the amount would be insignificant," he said.

Among the worst accidents reported in 1980 were the loss of 42 million gallons in a blow-out of Occidental of Libya Inc. south of Tripoli, Libya, in late August or early September, and of 36 million gallons spilled from the Irenes Serenade, which exploded and sank near Ploos, Greece, on Feb. 23.

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And still, Carter got no apology

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Washington Post doused a "hot new twist" with ice water on Wednesday, saying the rumor it published nine days earlier about a pre-inaugural bugging of Ronald and Nancy Reagan was "utterly impossible to believe."

But Jimmy Carter's attorney said the Post's latest statement, an editorial, hasn't dissuaded the former president from considering libel action against the newspaper.

And Carter's former press secretary, Jody Powell, declared that "This (editorial) says to me that 'we didn't believe it was true when we published it, that we don't believe it now, but we defend our right to publish it.'"

Post publisher Donald E. Graham said: "The editorial speaks for itself. I have no further comment."

The Post's chatty "Ear" column reported on Oct. 5 that there was "a hot new twist" to the story that Nancy Reagan wanted Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter to move out of the White House early so Mrs. Reagan could start redecorating.

"They're saying," Ear reported, "that Blair House where Nancy was lodging...was bugged. And at least one tattler in the Carter tribe has described listening in to the tape itself."

Blair House, across the street from the White House, is the official government residence for Very Important Visitors. It normally houses foreign heads of state and others who would be upset at having the White House eavesdrop.

The Carters' lawyer asked the Post

last week for a retraction and public apology and executive editor Benjamin Bradlee responded: "It will be perfectly obvious that there is no retraction in the paper."

On its editorial page Wednesday, the Post said, "We weren't there. But everything we know about the presidency of Jimmy Carter suggests otherwise, that it was false."

The Post said the point of the item was that a story was circulating and that it was "accurately sourced."

"It said there was a rumor around. There was," the editorial said. "Based on everything we know of the Carter instinct and record on this subject, we find that rumor utterly impossible to believe."

That didn't sit well with Carter, who was ending a two-day visit to Washington.

"He finds it incredible," said his lawyer, Terrence Adamson. "They said they published a rumor knowing it was false."

Adamson said the former president put this comment on paper after reading the editorial in the morning: "I consider the owners and publishers of the Washington Post responsible for their libelous action and for their failure and refusal to correct it in a timely fashion," Carter said.

Moreover, said Adamson, Carter "has not been dissuaded from pressing suit. But he has not made a final decision."

The word apology did not appear in the Post editorial.

"Perhaps it is foolish to expect people to read newspapers with rabbinical or juridical care, to sift out the fair from the unfair or the justified from unjustified inference that can be drawn from a collection of words," the Post said.

"The best we can do here...is to be as blunt and clear about what that Ear item said as we know how. It said there was a rumor around. There was."

Powell said Carter plans to sit down with his lawyers and family this week to decide whether to file the libel suit.

"He has to figure out how much money he has to see if he can afford to go ahead with it," Powell said. "It will be long and drawn out and very expensive."

Powell said Carter found the Ear item and the editorial that followed "wrong and unfair."

"When you make a mistake that hurts someone, normal people say they've made a mistake and won't do it anymore," Powell said.

"This (editorial) says to me that we didn't believe it was true when we published it, that we don't believe it now, but we defend our right to publish it. If you, dear readers, didn't understand it, that's your fault."

Asked if the Ear column operates under different rules than the rest of the newspaper, Graham replied: "I refer you to the editorial." He declined further comment.

Permission needed to publish memoirs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former high officials of the Carter administration and other administrations may face federal suits if they try to publish memoirs without clearing them in advance with the Reagan administration, a Justice Department official said Wednesday.

Assistant Attorney General Paul McGrath said in an interview that the administration may try to prevent

publication on the grounds that former senior officials have an unwritten obligation to get pre-publication clearance to make sure their books don't disclose classified information.

McGrath said the government may also sue to confiscate the royalties of authors who violate that unwritten obligation.

McGrath said the administration only wants to prevent disclosure of classified material and isn't interested in censoring political views.

One former official who is writing a book, Jody Powell, said he wasn't aware of the new policy.

Powell, Carter's press secretary, said, "my intention has always been that if I had any questions about anything I planned to publish, I would run it by somebody in the government."

The unwritten, or "fiduciary obligation," is a key part of the administration's new policy regarding writing by former government officials.

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
