Commencement Exercises To Be Held Friday Night

A large crowd attended the baccalaureate service at the High School auditorium last Sunday night for the sermon by Rev. J. C. Foster. The auditorium was filled and persons from practically all Dawson county communities were among those present as well as several from Martin and Borden counties.

The seniors marched in at 8:15 to the melody of "Onward Christian Soldiers" played by Mrs. A. G. Barnard. Rev. David J. Murray read the opening prayer. Scripture selections were read by Rev. E. F. Cole, and Rev. M. M. Beavers offered the closing prayer and benediction. The girls chorus of the high school sang three musical numbers for the program.

Rev. Foster chose for his subject the topic "What Is Man That Thou Art Mindful of Him" and preached an inspiring sermon not only to the class but to the whole group.

Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Collins and daughter, Edith Mae, accompanied by a Courier representative, visited the Hardy Morgan Sheep Ranch, located in Howard county, seven miles southeast of Big Spring, Tuesday of this week. Sheep shearing was in progress and as this was the first time that any member of the party had witnessed the shearing operation it proved to be quite an interesting show. A portable power shearing machine, manned by sixteen Mexican workers was really making the wool fly. Approximately five minutes was required by each worker to shear a sheep and with sixteen men on the job at the same time a large number of sheep can be turned out in one day. It is estimated that around 1700 head could be sheared per day, with each sheep averaging from eight to ten pounds of wool. Figuring the price of wool at 38c per pound, it can be readily seen that a days shearing would run into quite a sum of money. Mr. Morgan estimated that he would have five thousand head to shear this year, having sold several thousand sheep in the wool some time ago.

The Howard county ranch consists of about 34 sections under lease and owned outright and is one of the largest ranches in West Texas devoted exclusively to sheep. John Hardy Morgan and family, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardy Morgan, live on the ranch and are actively engaged in its management.

Another Oil Test To Be Drilled In Dawson County

E. L. Wilson and Thornton Lomax, both of Dallas, were reported to be in Lamesa this week to survey a new location for another Dawson county wildcat oil test which will probably be known as the E. L. Wilson No. 2. Scannan, location for this to be in the north west corner of section 83, block M. E. L. & R. R. Co. survey.

Albaugh et al No. 1 John Robinson, Dawson county wildcat oil well was re-acidized last Sunday with 3,000 gallons, was swabbing. Total depth is 5,038 feet in lime. It is in section 46, block M. E. L. & R. R. Survey, northwest of Lamesa. We were unable to confirm reports of heavy production.

The E. L. Wilson et al No. 1 Texas Land and Mortgage Co. section 45, block M. E. L. & R. R. Survey, Dawson county wildcat, Wednesday was reported to be drilling below 4350 feet in lime.

Hugh Corrihan No. 1 Lewright, in section 1, block C-37, public school land, just over in Terry county, is now shut down at 5,133 feet after third packer failed to hold. A special Schlumberger tool has been ordered from Houston. Packer was set at 5,010 feet and failed after swab had been run five times, lowering fluid 1,800 feet.

Contract Let For Topping On Highway No. 15 East

A contract was let last week to complete the topping of Highway No. 15 east to the Borden county line, which will complete Highway 15 through Dawson County. A contract was also let for a seal coat to be applied to Highway No. 9 south to the Dawson county line. Work is expected to get underway on these projects in the near future and when completed will give Dawson county two all-weather highways across the entire county.

Rapid progress is being made on the roller base on the Stanton road south of Lamesa, several miles of the project already having been completed, with the work running six weeks ahead of schedule.

Workmen are busy down at the Dawson County Cotton Oil Co., site constructing additional storage space for seed. The new seed house will be considerably larger than the one erected last year, the size of the building to be 120 feet by 60 feet with an altitude of 50 feet. When completed the building will hold as many as 3500 tons of seed which will more than double the present storage space. The nice increase in business enjoyed by the firm last season and their faith in the future of Lamesa and Dawson county is the reason given for the new expansion movement.

Authorized 4 More Miles of Stanton Road

Four miles of road work has been finished with a high grade calliper, the second four miles to be finished in the same manner. Topping on the first four miles of road is also scheduled to be started in the near future.

Twenty-three Take Entrance Exams

Twenty-three pupils from five schools came to Lamesa High School building last Saturday and spent most of that day taking examinations in the subjects which they had studied during this school year. These examinations were for the purpose of complying with the State Department of Education requirements for their admission into the eleventh grade of accredited school. Eleven pupils were from Fairview, four from Five Mile, four from McCarty, one from Key and three from Mullins. The number was smaller than last year when more than forty appeared.

The reduction in number was explained by the standardization of the schools in Dawson county. Pupils from standardized or accredited high schools take no examinations other than those given at their own institutions in order to be received at other accredited high schools. Other schools are now taking examinations under the direction of Miss Bulsterbaum at their home schools to comply with standardization requirements and as these institutions qualify, the entrance examination problem will be reduced and more and more Dawson county pupils will then be admitted without the test requirements to any accredited high school in this state. The subjects in which tests were given were American Literature, American History, Plane Geometry, Business Arithmetic, Texas History, Bookkeeping and Civics. If these pupils should enter the Lamesa High School with the present Junior class the membership would be increased to more than one hundred.

ROTARY CLUB HEARS TALK BY F. T. MCCOLLUM

The Lamesa Rotary Club in its regular meeting last Friday enjoyed a splendid talk by Mr. F. T. McCollum, principal of the local high school. H. J. R. No. 26-A HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the payment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may impose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedient, providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000); and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor, providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51d. Subject to the limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by law, the Legislature shall have the power to provide for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years; such assistance shall not exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family; provided that the amount to be expended for such assistance out of State funds shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. The Legislature may impose residential restrictions and such other restrictions, limitations, and regulations as to it may seem expedient.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance to destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any

one family and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial assistance for such payment."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial assistance for such payment."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

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H. J. R. No. 23 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all

governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent

discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment have write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication.

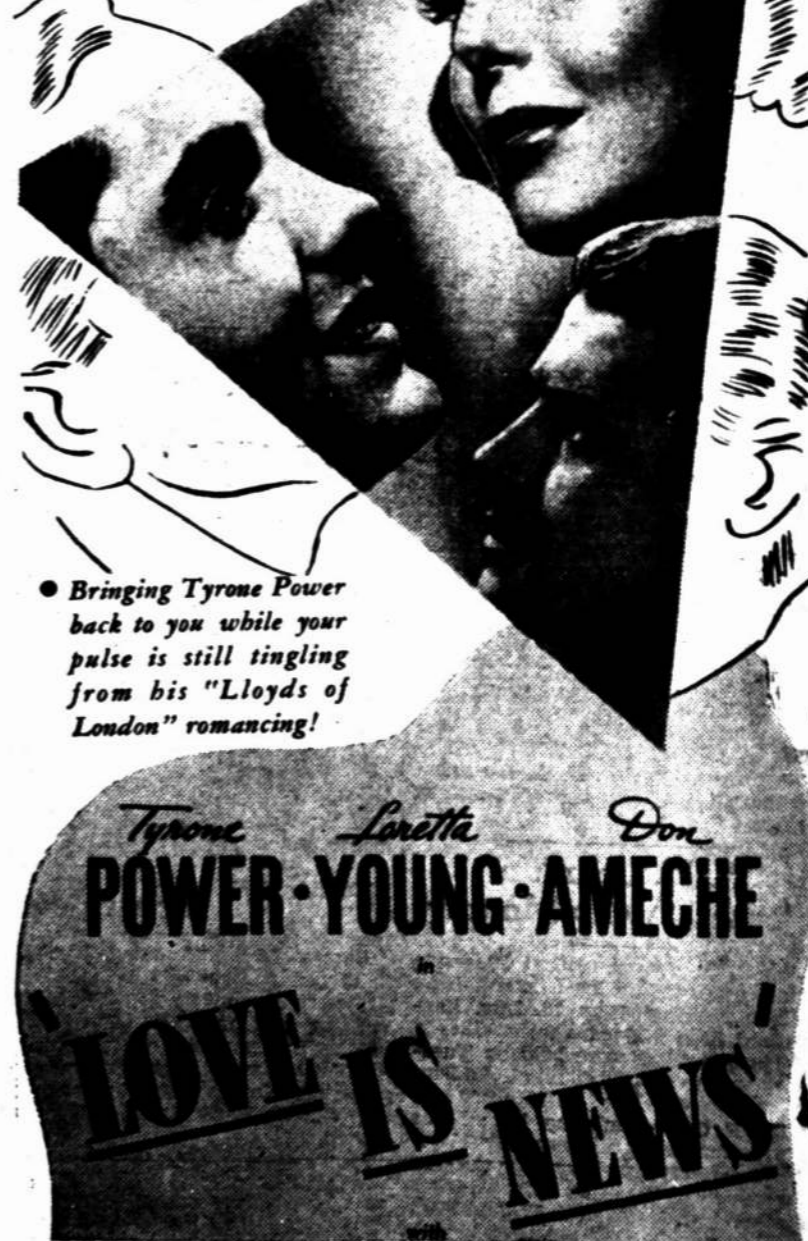

RESETTLEMENT ADMINISTRATION HELPS 2136 BORROWERS

Miss Gladys Wright, Resettlement Administration home management supervisor for Dawson county, today released figures showing how the Resettlement Administration has helped 2136 borrowers in the 47 Panhandle counties of Texas to attain higher standards of living and insure a more rugged, self-sufficient type of agriculture. Miss Wright gave the following interesting information as indicative of the great progress being made in the home life of the families who are being rehabilitated through loans from the Resettlement Administration.

Among the basic factors on which the report is based is the average size of a family is 4.6 persons with the health of 93 excellent, 1426 good and 649 fair. The average size of a home is 3.5 rooms with 98 houses in excellent condition, 854 good and 330 fair. One hundred and sixty-two have excellent water supplies and 1446 have a rating of good, 318 fair. Families having water piped into the house number 268; 1809 use well water and 228 must haul water. Garden irrigation is practiced by 941 families. Refrigeration facilities are used by 1610 families.

The 2136 borrowers own a total of 4055 milk cows, or an average of 1.9 cows per family; 265 have washing machines; 1929 have pressure cookers; 1125 have sewing machines and 264 have sealers.

The following figures show the number of families who met 75 per cent or more of their classified dietary needs, according to the standard set up on the 1936 home plan. Families meeting milk needs numbered 1917; meat, 1063; poultry, 1645; eggs, 1632; potato, 659; tomato, 537; green vegetables, 826; other vegetables, 780; canned vegetables, 511; stored vegetables, 195; dried vegetables, 468; fresh fruit, 702; canned fruit, 301; dried fruit, 393; bread and cereals, 845.

Gardens were successful with 355 families being rated at 100 per cent, 378 between 95 and 75 per cent and 210 between 70 and 50 per cent. Families meeting their clothing needs numbered 557 with 1424 meeting better than 50 percent of their clothing needs. Three hundred seventy-three families purchased all clothing while 1535 made and purchased some. Families meeting fuel needs numbered 1677, 1745 purchased all fuel, 110 obtained fuel with out cost and 254 purchased part of their fuel. Home account books were kept by 547 families.

Sales of garden, dairy and poultry produce by 568 families amounted to \$33,849.65, or an average of \$59.59 each.

Miss Wright cited these accomplishments as major factors in the rehabilitation of Resettlement clients and the establishment of a sound live-at-home program which will be continued.

BE CAREFUL OF SNAKE BITES SAYS STATE HEALTH OFFICER

Austin, May 19.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges every one to be careful when in the country to prevent snake bite. In Texas the chief offender is the rattlesnake; and, contrary to common belief, it does not always rattle before it strikes.

About seventy-five per cent of all bites occur on the lower extremities and could be prevented, to a large extent, by wearing high top boots and leggings. About twenty per cent occur on the hands and arms. Care should be exercised in not putting the hands in invisible places when climbing rocks and to look before picking up anything that may be obscured by vegetation, brush, or rocks.

If one is bitten, prompt action is necessary and a physician should be obtained as soon as possible. No time should be lost in removing the poison by suction; this can be done by suction cup or by mouth. First a tourniquet should be applied above the wound, so as to increase congestion and assist in washing out the poison. A cross cut incision with a sharp clean knife or razor blade should be made over each fang mark, or preferably to connect the two fang punctures. These cuts should be at least a quarter of an inch deep and at least that long. Suction should be applied for at least half an hour. The tourniquet should be released every ten or fifteen minutes for a minute at a time.

If bitten by a snake, do not run or get overheated; do not take alcoholic stimulants; do not use potassium permanganate (which is now known to be of no value as an antiseptic) to cauterize the wound; and do not depend on home remedies.

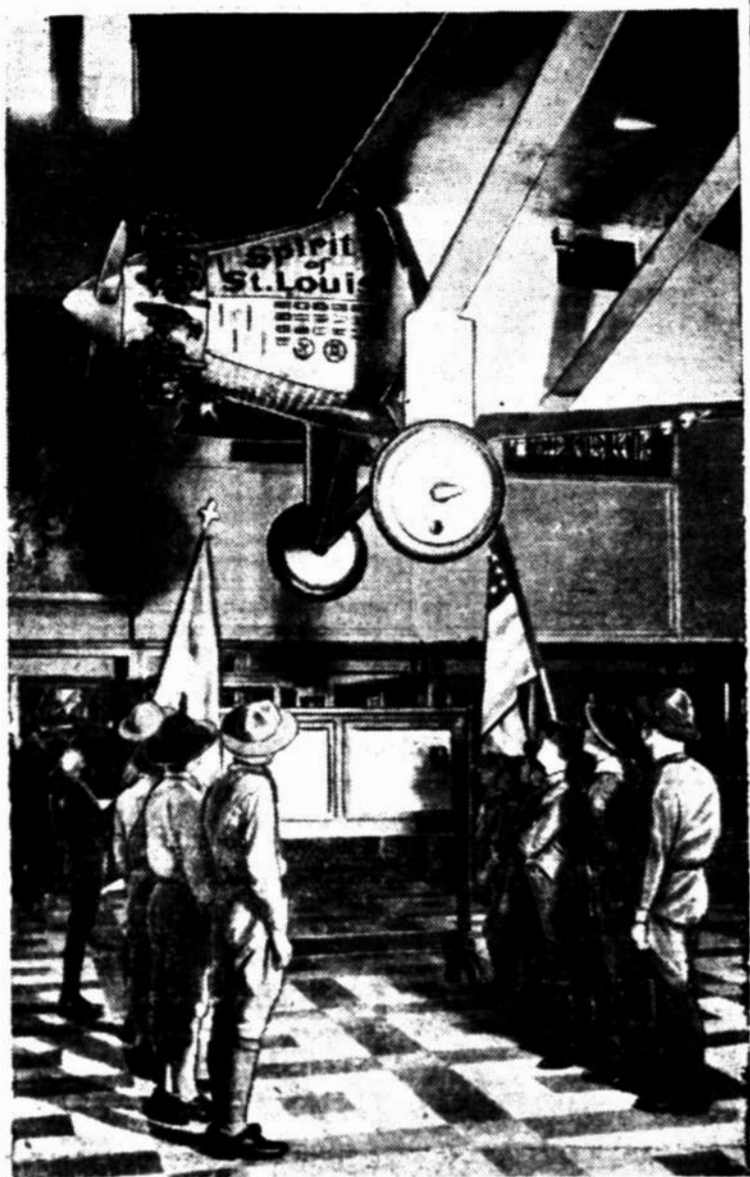

ACCURATE MEASURE OF TEXAS FARM LANDS TO BE MADE

College Station—Accurate measurements of farm lands in Texas will be available for future agricultural programs through the system now employed by the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee, according to E. N. Holmgreen, executive secretary of the committee.

In 91 counties of the State, measurements will be by plane table, and only those farms which are participating in the current Agricultural Conservation Program will be measured. Aerial surveys will be made on 80,000 square miles, or approximately 100 counties, including Dawson county, and in this case all the land in the counties involved will be measured. The remaining counties in the state will check compliance on farms entering the conservation program on the system used in previous years.

The aerial survey will be continued in 1937 in all counties which have enough participation in the program to warrant the service. Holmgreen said. The aerial survey enabled the state committee to have on hand permanent and accurate maps of each farm and will eliminate the annual expense of costly chain measurements.

Holmgreen indicated that farmers who participate in the 1937 Agricultural Conservation Program will receive a blue print of their farms when located in counties where aerial surveys are made.

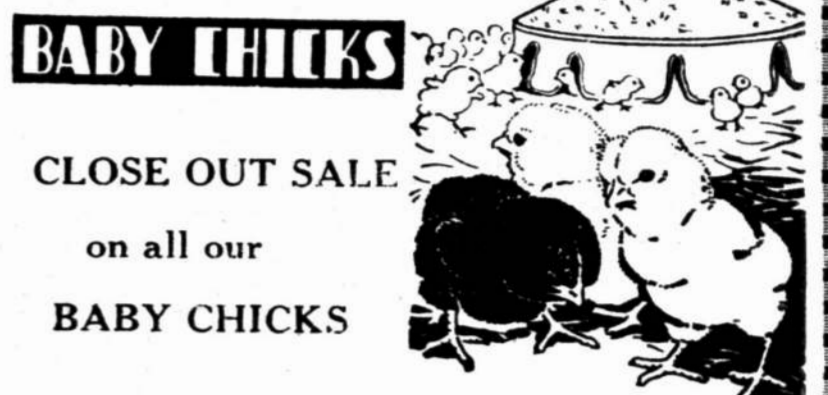

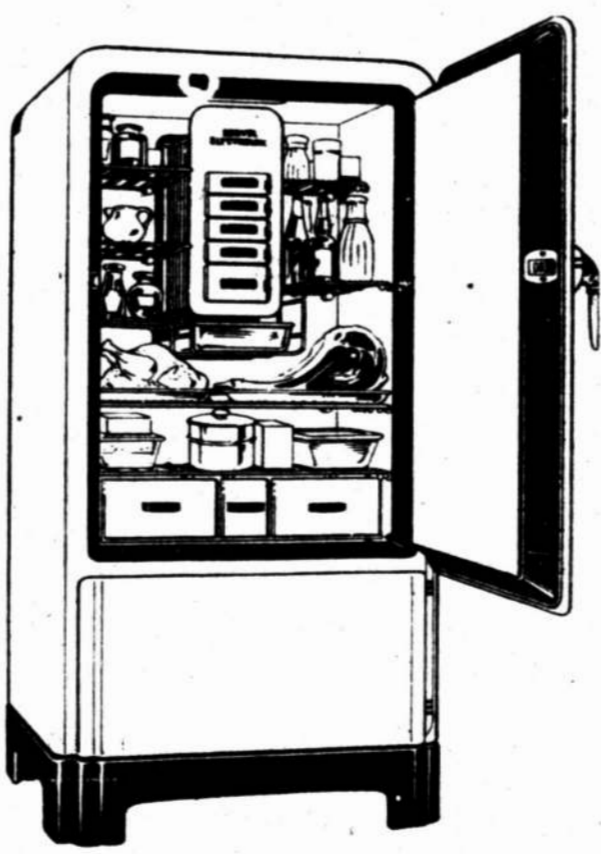

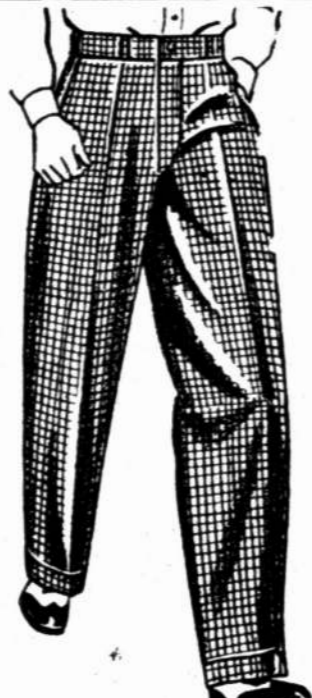
