Texas Pine Shows
Production Gain

HOUSTON, August 15—Actual production and shipping of Texas yellow pine showed gains of 10.1% and 11% respectively during the week ended August 5 over the comparable period of 1949, according to an August 9 sampling comparison report by 22 identical Texas lumber mills. "However, production and shipments of Texas yellow pine during the week of August 5 dropped slightly from that of the previous week ended July 29," said Jim Ben Edens, president of the Texas Lumber Manufacturers Association.

Orders on hand at the beginning of the week of August 5 continued to rise for the fourth consecutive week. They were up 6% over the previous week ended July 29.

Stocks on hand were 2.1% below the previous week and 41% under the same period of 1949. Orders booked dropped 40.3% under the week of July 29. This was 7.4% under the same week of last year.

Funeral services for John Kleiner, 54, well known West Texas oil man, will be held in the First Presbyterian Church at 4 p. m. Wednesday with Rev. Stuart McC. Rohre, Rusk, officiating. He will be assisted by Rev. Len Orr, local minister.

Mr. Kleiner died at 3:30 a. m. Monday in an Abilene hospital after an illness of some four months.

He was born in Cisco on January 29, 1896 and had lived in and near Cisco all his life. He and his brother, the late Charles J. Kleiner were among the early developers of the shallow oil field in western Eastland County and eastern Callahan County and John Kleiner still had ex-

tensive holdings in that area at the time of his death.

The two Kleiner men developed their leases themselves and at the time he became ill John still handled most of the work necessary to producing the wells.

Mr. Kleiner was married to Miss Johnnie Mae Jensen on December 25, 1905. At the time of his death they were living at 511 West Second. The couple had no children of their own but raised a boy and a girl whom they cared for and educated. They are Mrs. Kenneth Bidwood, Austin and Capt. Leslie M. Moore with the Air Corps in Weisbaden, Germany.

New Distributive Education Program
To Be Offered High School Students

Supt. Arlin Birt of the Cisco High School has announced that a new vocational program, Distributive Education, will be installed in Cisco High School for the first time this year.

Distributive Education is a vocational program of interest to all students who will make their careers in retail, wholesale or service selling businesses. In addition to classroom training which the students will receive during the morning, they will be employed downtown by employers in retail and wholesale businesses, cooperating with the school in the training of these students.

One objective of the D. E. program is to bridge the gap between school and employment for high school graduates. Trainees who enroll in this program receive laboratory credit, as well as a training wage, for the work that they do in downtown stores, and this work is supervised by the coordinator employed by the high school.

Students who enroll may receive training in stock control, buying, merchandising, selling, advertising, display, credit office work—in any of the numerous fields associated with retail, wholesale, or service selling work.

Of Perdue No. 1
Is Expected

Another valuable addition to the rapidly growing Mrs. Briggs Owens oil pool, located some three miles east of Cisco, was assured when the Bankline Oil Company's A. V. Clark No. 3 began flowing naturally from the Lake sand Monday. Operators were trying to shut it in so that hydrafrac treatment could be given the new producer.

Operators indicated that the new well showed possibility of being one of the best in the field. Choate Drilling Company had moved their rotary equipment from the Clark No. 3 to the Mrs. Briggs Owens No. 6 and were setting surface pipe Tuesday.

The top of the Lake sand was reached in the Clark No. 3 well at 3,298 feet and the sand was cored to 3,316 feet before drilling operations were stopped.

In the same area Crossman and Savage were setting pipe on their No. 1 Perdue. The well was drilled to the Lake sand and observers were expecting a good well. The well will extend the pool to the north.

A mile west of Cisco McElroy Ranch Company was at work on their Lela Latch No. 1, an Ellenberger lime test which was begun recently. Kadane & Son had moved in equipment and set it up Saturday. The well is being watched with a great deal of interest as a possible new area of development in the local area.

Rev. J. E. Montgomery, assistant to the president at Texas Christian University for the past eight years, has resigned from the University staff to accept a call to the pastorate of the First Christian Church, Breckenridge, President M. E. Sandler announced today.

He will leave Fort Worth and begin his Breckenridge ministry on Sept. 1, Dr. Sandler said.

"Mr. Montgomery is a very superior person in his ability to create good will and make friends," Dr. Sandler said in announcing Rev. Mr. Montgomery's resignation. "We deeply appreciate all the good services he has rendered to TCU. We can also easily understand his desire to return to the local pastorate."

Prior to going to TCU in 1942, Rev. Montgomery was minister of First Christian Church in Longview.

Widely known throughout Texas, Rev. Mr. Montgomery during his eight years at TCU has served as a "roving ambassador of good will" for the University among the local churches and has frequently been guest preacher, lecturer and fellowship speaker at countless Disciples churches across the state.

HOW TO CHANGE A LEOPARD'S SPOTS

Can you change the spots on a leopard? The platitude says no. But the spots on that particularly dangerous breed known as "the reckless driver" can be changed.

This thought is prompted by the approaching Labor Day holiday. The record-breaking carnage of the Memorial Day and Fourth of July weekends has been duly recorded by the National Safety Council — but possibly forgotten by too many of us. Will the Labor Day weekend bring another casualty list of 400-odd persons killed in traffic and an uncounted number injured?

Most of us are responsible drivers of reasonable skill and prudence. We don't want to kill anyone — least of all ourselves.

But there are some drivers on the highways — say one out of ten — who are always potential accident-makers. The speed demons, the arrogant lane-weavers, the drunks, the law-flouters.

Their spots can be changed — by police and court action!

That is the only way to get quick results. Highway engineering, driver training, thorough education — these are desirable and worthwhile objectives. But their promise lies in the future.

Meanwhile, Labor Day is upon us. Concerted and vigorous action by state patrols and city police — backed by quick justice in the traffic courts — can hold deaths to a minimum, as many states demonstrated with a perfect or near-perfect record over the Fourth.

Strict traffic law enforcement is commonly believed by the poli-

all of us to get behind a crack-down on motor madness by police and traffic courts during the summer's last holiday.

Is it worth a three-cent stamp and five minutes of your time? Then write to your mayor and governor. Let them know you want the laws enforced. Tell them you are with them in any all-out effort to put an end to holiday horror. They can do it with your help!

P. S. And another big way to help them is to drive safely yourself.

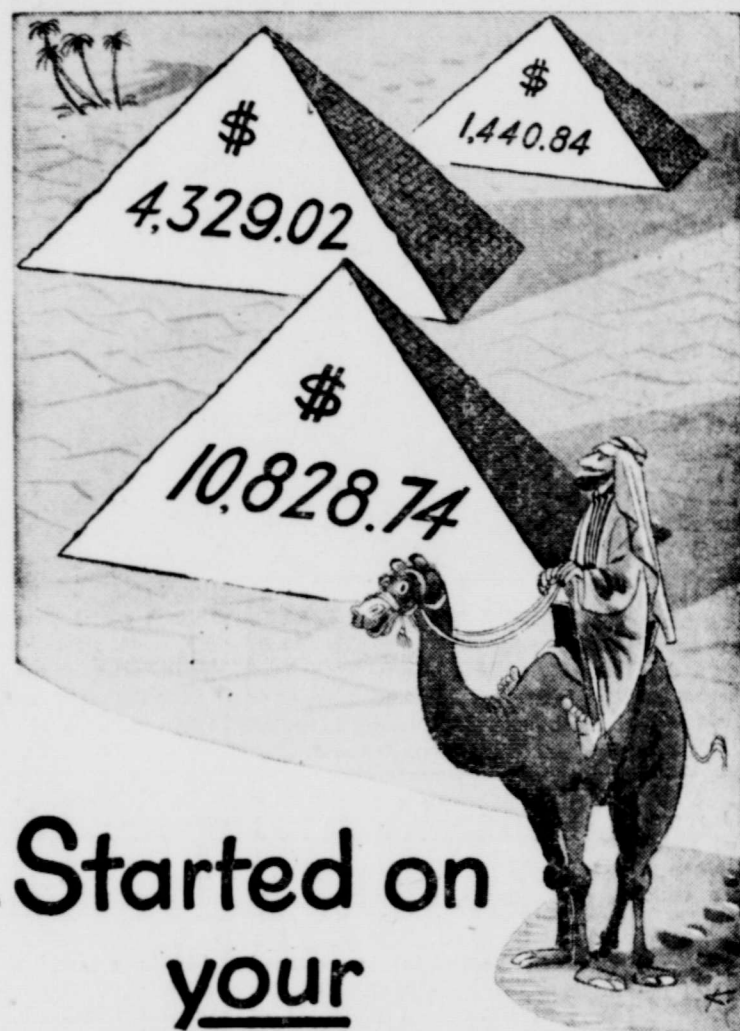

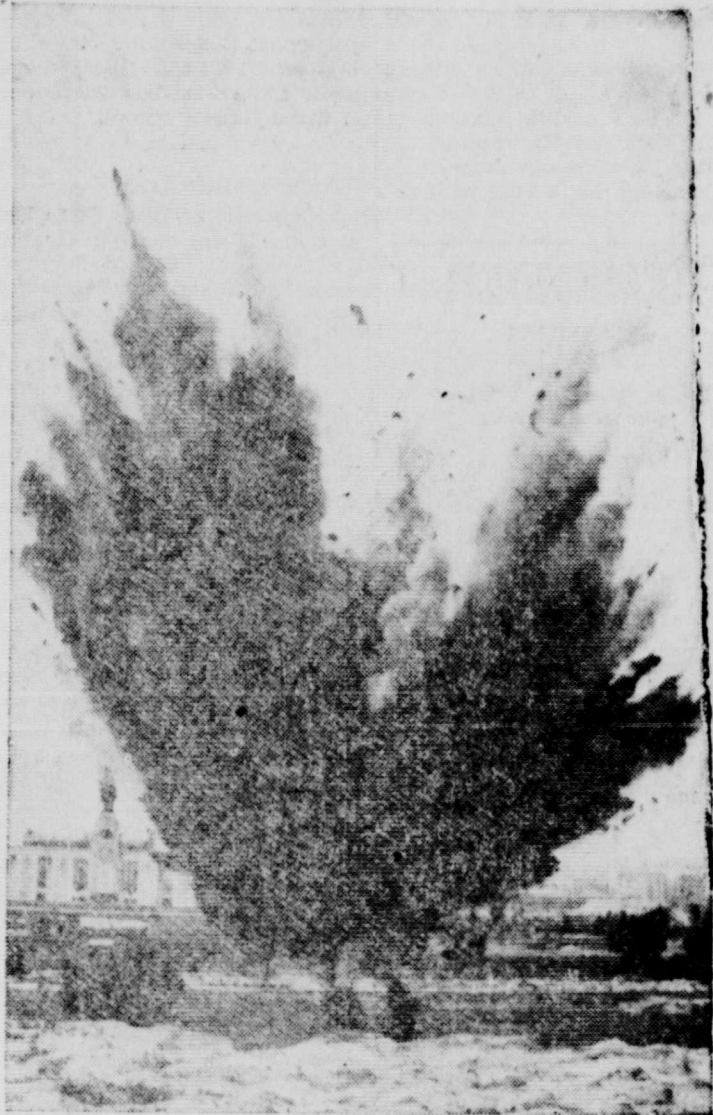

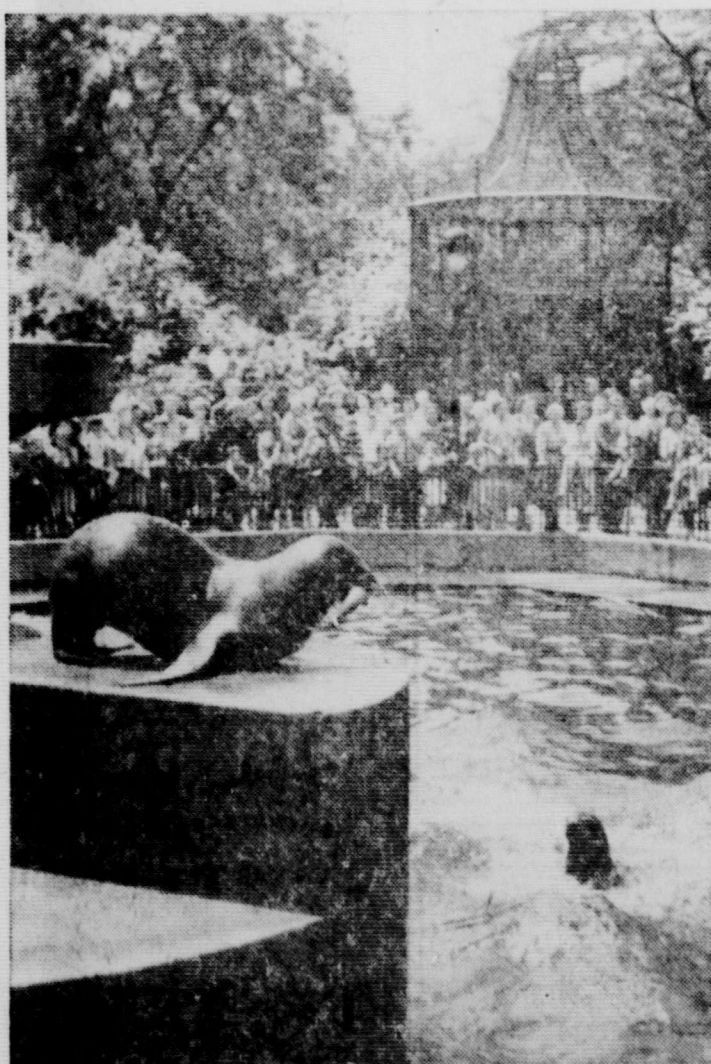
