Local Teachers Present Monday P-TA Program

Parent-Teacher Association Monday evening in the school gym. Mr. James Cryer, called the meeting to order. Mr. Harold Walker gave the invocation. Mrs. David Anderson, accompanied by Mrs. Wayne, led the group in singing.

Bernell Jernigan's fourth class presented the room. The program, "The Unlabeled," was given in connection with United Nations Week. The program was centered around the study of the fourth grade geography class. The young people presented directions for all nations which were presented by the flag of that nation. The directions, presented by the students, were: Honesty, self-control, obedience, cheerfulness, thriftiness, reverence and respect.

The business session Mr. Jernigan presided. Mrs. Hubert Hester East, Glenn and Harold Walker as a committee for selecting a suitable amount of money to be made for the P-TA Carnival. The general assembly voted to have the P-TA Carnival Monday night, Oct. 10.

Bill Christian, membership chairman, reported a present enrollment of 94 members.

Topic, "New Resources for Learning" was presented by local teachers. Mrs. J. J. Hester, special reading teacher, acted as moderator in explaining the equipment local schools obtained through the Elementary Education Act. Mrs. Hester stated that the controlled and instrument designed to increase the reading ability of a child is expected any day in the local schools.

Mrs. Braune used the overhead projector to explain her program. She explained how it could be used in the classroom. Mrs. Hill, English teacher, explained how the overhead projector could be used in teaching composition. Bernice Jackson, first teacher, demonstrated the use of the Phono-Viewer called "The Tell." This instrument

resembles a small television set; however, it shows film strips and has a record that is placed on top and regulates the film strip automatically.

Mrs. O. C. Cook, third grade teacher, demonstrated the use of the tape recorder in helping students with special reading problems. The tape recorder has ear phones that can be attached to the instrument, letting the student or students listen to a story or do an assignment while the rest of the class goes about doing other activities.

Mrs. Joan Lee, fifth grade teacher, showed the use of the film strip or slide projector. The film Mrs. Lee showed was accompanied with a record. Mrs. Braune read a list of films and records that had been purchased for the elementary grades, many of them Walt Disney productions.

In high school, the English, government and history departments have purchased records describing poetry, prose, and various political debates as well as battles of importance.

David Anderson, high school biology teacher, showed the use of the opaque projector. He demonstrated how it could be used to project pages from a loose leaf notebook or a section from a text book on the screen. He also showed the procedure used by the school for using the copying machines. Mr. Anderson made a transparency which was then used on the overhead projector.

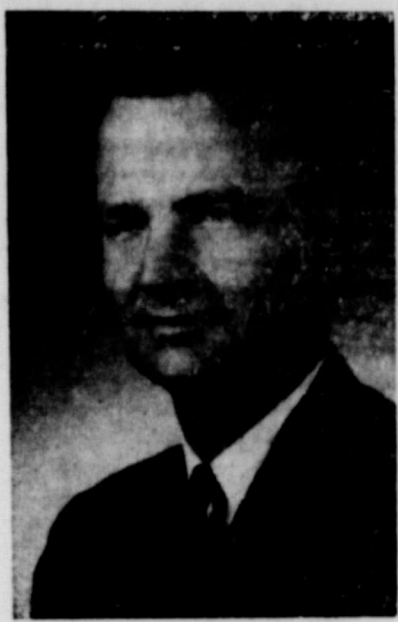
Following the program, refreshments were served by the hospitality committee in the cafeteria. Room count was won by the 4th and 10th grades. Reported.
