## Palo Pinto Co. to Receive Grain Aid

Washington, D. C. Congressman Omar Burleson today announced the availability of government owned feed grain at reduced prices to eligible livestock owners in Palo Pinto and Carson Counties, hard hit by drought. Also as agent for the Office of Emergency Preparedness, the Department of Agriculture offers hay transportation assistance to these two Counties.

This brings to 166 the number of Texas counties offered aid because of the drought conditions which have persisted since last fall.

Many producers would be forced to liquidate part of their foundation herds if relief were not provided.

## Texas Children Must Be Immunized

Texas school children will soon be among the best immunized in the country.

The recent session of the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Education Code to require immunizations against certain childhood diseases as a condition for entering school.

"This new state law will have great impact on the immunization level of the school population and, eventually, all the population of Texas," says Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner. "We are delighted with the law."

The Texas State Department of Health now has authority to set the rules and regulations for implementation of the compulsory immunizations. The Board of Health has set January 1, 1972 as the date by which all children's immunization series must have begun. School districts that have required compulsory immunizations in the past will still maintain their usual September deadlines for proving immunizations to enter school. The immunizations previously required for all school children were set only by the individual school district, but now the state is requiring immunizations for up to six childhood diseases in some cases.

Elementary students will now be required to be immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, polio and smallpox. If there is no history

of measles, that shot will also be required. All children under 12 years of age must also be immunized against rubella.

The number of required immunizations is fewer for junior high, high school, and college-level students. Junior high and high school requires immunizations against only diphtheria, polio, tetanus and smallpox. College requires full immunization against polio if the student is under 19 years of age, and immunization against diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox within the past ten years.

Nearly every student in the state will be covered by this broad new law. Immunizations will be required of students in kindergartens that are associated with elementary schools, all the elementary or secondary public schools, private or parochial schools, academies, colleges and universities, schools for the blind, deaf, mentally ill and mentally retarded. The only children exempted are those with religious conflicts, or medical problems - those that a physician determines would be injurious to health.

Dr. Peavy said he "urged all parents to contact their physician or public health clinic now, and begin their children's immunization program long before they enter school."

Mrs. Emma Foster, 93, passed away in Stephenville Skilled Nursing Home Sunday July 4, 1971, following a lengthy illness.

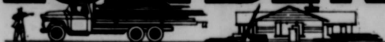

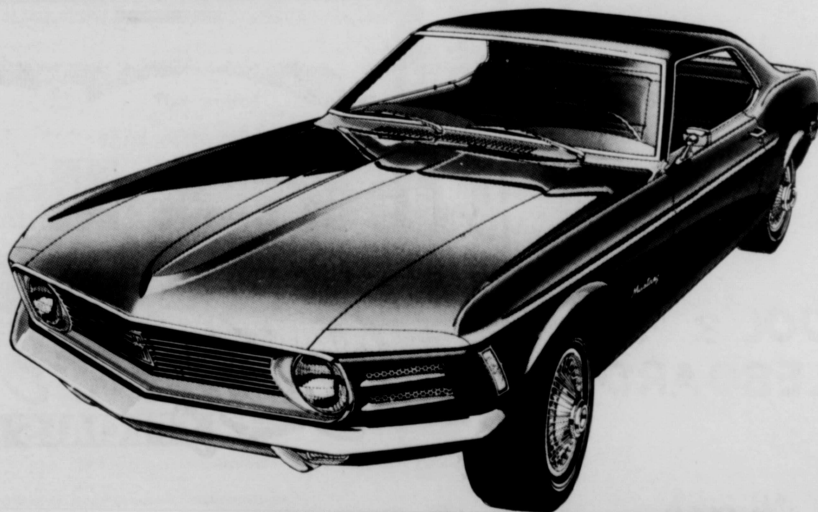

It is not uncommon for an angler to spend \$40 or \$50 on quality fishing tackle, then go and spoil it all by skimping on the hooks.

A hook is to fishing what a bullet is to hunting. Each is inexpensive, yet each is THE item that actually puts fish and game on the table.

The only time a good hook costs in excess of a dime is where big-game-fish species are involved. But for the usual largemouth bass, speckled trout, flounder, redfish, etc., caught in Texas waters, the general hooks sold in sporting goods stores will suffice.

Most fishermen buy a sufficient quantity of hooks. However, they err in trying to make hooks perform "above and beyond" this period of usefulness and purpose.

We know a few professional salt-water fishing guides who will not use a hook for more than one fishing trip. On the other hand we know some fishermen who try to hoard hooks and seek to make them stand for countless fishing trips.

The true life of a good fishhook is somewhere in between. If few fish are caught and those taken have soft mouths, a hook might be good for perhaps a dozen fishing trips. If fish are hard-mouthed and you catch a lot of them, the hook may lose its effectiveness in a trip or two. On the other hand the hook used in fresh water has a much longer life than its counterpart used in salt water fishing.

To be effective, a hook must have a needle-sharp point for quick and easy penetration. Fish with hard mouths take the edge off a hook in a hurry, and even a soft-mouthed fish can dull a hook if it happens to strike a bone. Fish with heavy teeth take their toll of hooks, too.

Every fisherman should examine his hooks frequently. When a hook shows signs of dulling, put a new edge on it with a hone. But remember every time a hook is honed, the point is shortened just a bit. After a while the point can be filed too short to be effective.

Barbs, too, must be examined as frequently as the points. Digging the hook out of a fish's mouth can bend a barb and sometimes will break the barb off. Either way it penalizes the fisherman.

Salt water is murder on fishhooks. Salt will quickly eat off platings and make hooks rust or corrode. A good way to preserve hooks in the salt water tackle box is to line the bottom of the container with a cloth saturated in fish oil. Make sure fish oil is used, not petroleum base oil. The latter has an odor and the taste is repulsive to fish.

Keep in mind that a hook is the business end of your fishing tackle. Keep it sharp! When it shows signs of wear, throw it away and replace it with a new one. Otherwise you may lose a big fish—possibly a record one—simply because of a dull or weak hook.

### TARLETON TUITION FEES TO GO UP IN FALL

Students attending Tarleton State College and other state supported colleges and universities will be paying higher tuition fees beginning with the fall semester.

Registration fees for resident students will be \$4 per semester credit hour or a minimum of \$50.

Clarification of the tuition rates, established at the last session of the Texas legislature, was made by officials of Tarleton.

Under the new schedule, the fee rate for a resident student calls for a minimum tuition of \$50 regardless of whether the student enrolls for one semester credit hour or 12 semester credit hours.

Beginning with the 13 credit hour load, tuition will be assessed at the flat rate of \$4 per semester hour. This fee is in addition to a student service fee and a building use fee. These vary in accordance with the total number of semester credit hours for which the student enrolls.

As an example, Registrar John Whiting, cited the resident student enrolled for 15 credit hours. He would pay tuition of \$60 (\$4 per hour) plus a \$30 student service fee, \$4 library building use fee, \$16 building use fee and \$1 identification card for a total of \$111 plus any laboratory fees. Also, for new students a \$10 general breakage requirement fee is charged along with \$2.50 campus parking fee for those who park on campus.

The out-of-state students will pay \$40 per semester credit hour. For a 15-hour

load he would pay \$600 tuition, \$20 building use fees plus other fees. However, returning non-resident students who were enrolled in Tarleton State during the spring semester of 1971 may continue at the same tuition rate that was in effect at the time of his enrollment subject to the following conditions: (a) he receives a degree at the degree level, i.e., that the bachelors or masters, toward which he is working during the Spring Semester of 1971, or (b) he voluntarily withdraws or the college involuntarily withdraws the student for disciplinary reasons or for failing to meet the academic standards of the institution, or (c) the termination of the Spring Semester of 1975.

Whiting also pointed out that non-resident students enrolled during the Spring Semester of 1971, in a specific degree program cannot switch degree programs and remain eligible for the old tuition rate.

Alien students would pay \$210 for 15 semester credit hours. Minimum tuition for a foreign student taking one through 14 hours credit will be \$200. After 15 semester credit hours, the cost is \$14 per additional semester credit hour. Summer sessions call for a \$25 minimum for no more than six semester credit hours to resident students. Fees for seven hours credit will be \$28. Each additional one semester credit hour will be assessed at \$4 extra. Summer tuition for non-resident students is the same as regular semesters - \$40 per semester credit hour.

## ON THE BIAS

Summer is a time for cool refreshing foods, arranged attractively and served well chilled. It is the time to inexpensively fill those children and hubbies with all the vitamins, minerals and other nutritive ingredients found in the abundant fresh foods on the market.

Appetizers are fun (we classify them as "snacks" and they become more exciting to our small fry). This week I offer an appetizer recipe that tastes much like a cream cheese dip except it is lighter, is great for calorie counters and when served with fresh vegetables it is especially rich in food values. It is a good one for using your imagination . . . add whatever you feel brave enough to serve, once you have the two basic ingredients.

### APPETIZER

- 1 one pound carton cottage cheese (any type)
- 3 Tb. milk (Adding more will make a thinner dip if you prefer)

Put these two ingredients in your blender or use high speed of mixer. To this add any one or more of the following: minced onions, garlic powder, tabasco, chives, crumbled bouillon cube, bacon bits, worcestershire sauce or other seasoning of your choice. Vegetable juices can even be used instead of milk. Blend until smooth. Serve with any of the following: Fresh crisp raw carrots, celery, cauliflower buds, bell pepper wedges, turnip wedges or potato chips if you aren't worried about calories.

Serving suggestions for the above are: before a regular dinner party as it is rather light, or served in abundance it could precede a soup and sandwich supper for the family.

Remember that this is a completely nutritive appetizer (snack!). Try it yourself for a simple but elegant feeling lunch.

Using pesticides on animals which have been formulated for plants can be dangerous, says County Agent Ralph Lindsey. Don't do it, he advises.

Although the same material may be used in some cases on animals or plants, the concentration and chemical formulation may be vastly different. On the other hand, there may be considerable difference between insecticide formulations for plant and animal use. If manufactured specifically for plant use, the formulation may contain solvents that speed up absorption by animals and result in poisoning.

Trouble comes only when label directions are not closely followed. Pesticides are safe when used as intended by the manufacturer and in accordance with his directions. In the use of pesticides on or around animals, here are some suggestions.

Apply insecticides only when needed for the control of a specific pest problem. Use only recommended pesticides and at the exact rates suggested. Read label prior to each use of the material and

follow the instructions to the letter.

Also use care in treating crops to be used as livestock feed and observe all limitations and precautions.

Be careful when treating for other pest problems in areas open to livestock. Particular caution is advisable when treating around water and feeding facilities or milking equipment and supplies. Keep pesticides stored in their original containers so that there will be no confusion when they are used.

**Movie Ratings Lose Support**

The Film Review Board of the National Council of Churches and the Roman Catholic Church of the United States recently announced joint withdrawal of the film-rating system of the Motion Picture Association of America. (MPAA) "We can no longer commend this plan to the public", said the joint statement as reported in CHRISTIAN CENTURY.

The joint statement indicated that the MPAA system has failed to heed its basic criteria of protecting the young from material with which it is beyond their ability to cope.

The two religious groups called the GP rating (all ages admitted, parental discretion advised) a "catch-all" category for films which though sup-

posedly aimed at a wide audience, increasingly contain "overt visual-sex."

They further maintained that the MPAA system has become unreliable and the "public confidence in the plan has already been seriously eroded."

The continuing struggle of parents and concerned adults to exercise reasonable moral control over the impact of mass-media sex and violence reaches a new high of frustration with the failure of the code.

Fears of abuse of censorship and mind control run deep in American minds. Growing out of our determination not to repeat the mistakes of the totalitarian regimes from which they fled, American founders drew every line of res-

traint possible into the structure of our country. Yet the continued erosion of moral standards, fed by a separate breed of unprincipled men in some segments of the movie industry, pushes concerned Americans toward the precipice of that kind of social restraint.

It's sad when we can erect no legal barriers to put sensible controls over the flood of filth which inundates us. Sexuality degenerates into cheap eroticism. Violence is glorified. Impressionable minds, not yet equipped to cope with these destructive influences are affected. Moral fiber is weakened. Greed on the part of some and sensuality on the part of many creates moral chaos in the mass media.

It's not enough for Christian groups to declare the present system inadequate and reject it. This is a healthy step and an honest one. The next one is to move positively toward responsible action.

Freedom of communication does not license destructive and irresponsible acts. If moral leadership does not show up soon within the higher echelons of the movie industry, social control will inevitably result from outside the industry. Censorship is a dirty word. No one likes it. But concerned people are going to demand restraint from such a powerful influence on American character as the motion picture industry.

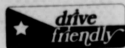
