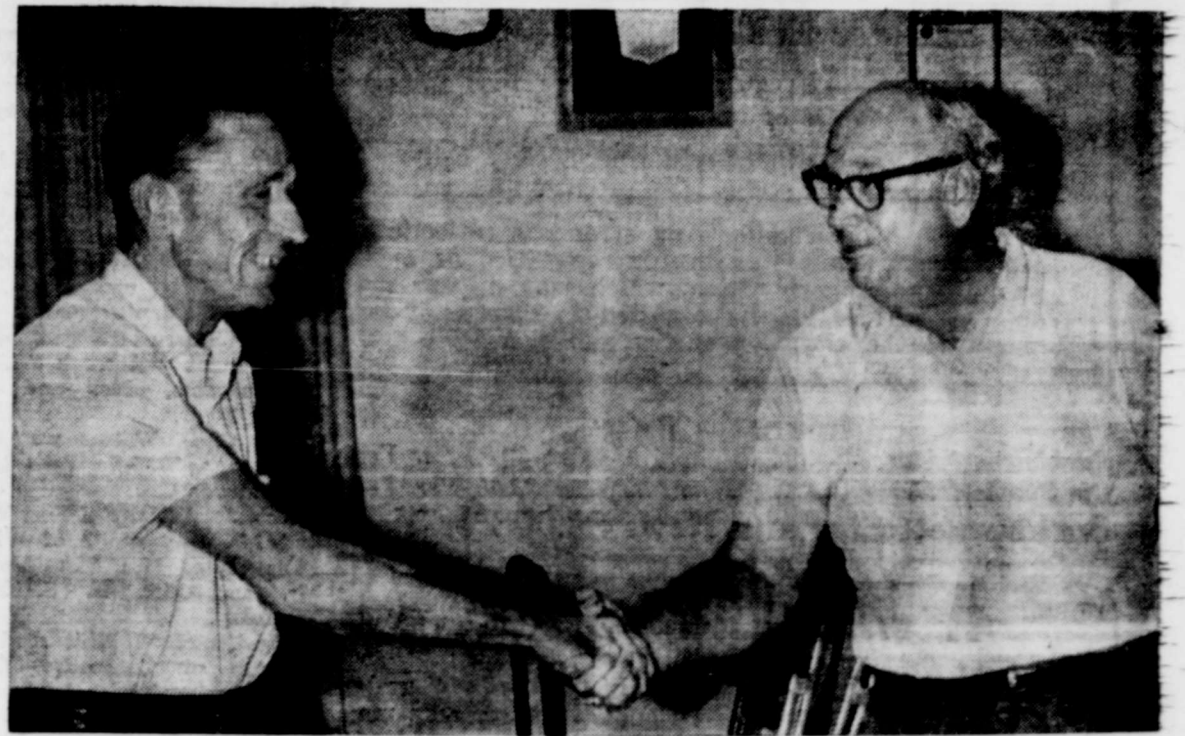

What is a blood transfusion? A blood transfusion is the injection of blood into the vascular system.

In its early development, transfusion was given by sewing the vein or artery of the donor to the vein of the recipient. Later, tubes were developed for insertion into the veins of donor and recipient, but with little control of the exact amount of blood transfused. Another method, developed early in this century, was to collect the blood from the donor into a paraffin-coated flask and then pump it immediately into the veins of the recipient. As experience accumulated, it became evident that it would be more convenient to transfer the donor's blood to a bottle containing an anticoagulant solution so that the blood

could be refrigerated and stored, available for use quickly during an emergency. When in 1914 and 1915 Hustin, Agote, and Lewisohn independently developed sodium citrate solution as an anti-coagulant, this indirect method of transfusion came into widespread use. With minor modifications, this is the method currently used.

How does one become a blood donor?

A person in good health between the ages of 18 and 66 should contact his local Red Cross chapter or the regional Red Cross blood center if there is one. If the chapter participates in the Blood Program, the prospective donor will be advised where and when the next blood drawing will be in his community. If the donor is in a locality not affiliated with the Red Cross Blood Program, there may be a community blood bank or a hospital nearby that would appreciate the offer to donate.

How often can a donor give blood?

Red Cross allows a person to donate every two months, but not more than five times a year. Frequency of donation sometimes varies according to state law.

A WIDENING CIRCLE

The right to strike is an important "equalizer" under the U.S. capitalistic system. But, sometimes strikers may fail to fully appreciate the injurious ramifications of their actions.

Not long ago, the Annual report of an oil company appeared in skeletal form with a note advising stockholders that the printing of the report is a form comparable to former years have been delayed by a labor dispute at a printing company where the report was to be produced. Due to the strike, the shareholders of the company were not as fully informed of the company's activities as they might have been. This means that the people who work for this particular oil company—and its stockholders—were not able to prevent their accomplishments to the public, as well as shareholders, as fully as might have been desirable from the standpoint of future expansion plans and the enlargement of payrolls.

In short, the company's management was handicapped in telling the story of the company—a story upon which its future growth and prosperity ultimately rest. Thus, does a work stoppage in one concern penalize others in widely diversified fields. That is why the right to strike should be exercised with extreme restraint.

Corrective Action Needed Now

Administration spokesmen have urged labor and business to go slow on wage and price increases. They have also expressed opposition to any minimum wage increase on the ground that it would add fuel to inflationary fires. But, these stabilizing efforts may come to nothing unless a decision of a local District of Columbia Wage Board is set aside.

The board in question was created by Congress and holds wide powers. It recently ordered a minimum wage of \$2.00 per hour. Under its decree, the current rate of \$1.60 per hour would go to \$1.80 on August 1, 1969, and on July 1, 1970, to \$2.00. The real impact of the Washington, D.C. Wage Board decision reaches far beyond the environs of Washington. It has set a precedent that, if not stopped, may well establish new state minimum wage patterns throughout the country irrespective of the federal minimum wage level.

A release from the Variety Stores Association, Incorporated, declares, "This serious breaching of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) (Fair Labor Standards Act) rate is a deliberate move to undercut the 'hard' line policy of the Administration and Secretary of Labor Shultz. It is an unwarranted usurpation of authority which should belong only to Congress. It is designed to speed a federal rate of \$2.00. The only way to stop this Wage Board and to protect the nation from the political spreading effects of \$2.00 in 'Capital City' is for Congress to amend the law which created the D. C. Wage Board."

Corrective legislation has been introduced in Congress which would limit the level of local minimum wage rates to the highest minimum in effect under the Fair Labor Standards Act. It should be enacted without delay.

FACT AND OPINION

In the opinion of the U.S. attorney for the Northern District of California, campus violence should be reduced if universities will use the disciplinary tools they have at hand—expelling from enrollment to suspension and expulsion.

Mr. Ed H. Bailey, president of the Union Pacific Railroad, has remarked, "The public, the government and the regulatory bodies are becoming aware of the real need for modern, efficient railroads. . . . Railroads are going to be very much around 200 years from now."

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COUNTY H-D AGENT NEWS

Don't advertise your absence while you go on vacation. Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, recommends you take these precautions:

1. Leave shades and blinds in normal position, not tightly shut.
2. Leave a few lights burning, or use a device to turn them on at night and off in daytime.
3. Halt milk and paper deliveries.
4. Make arrangements to have your lawn mowed.
5. Have your mail held at the post office, or arrange for a neighbor to pick it up.
6. Leave a key with a trusted neighbor.
7. Notify the police of the length of your absence. Tell them who has your house key.

Soft-sided luggage often can withstand as much wear 'n tear as molded luggage, reports Thelma Wirges.

Most soft-sided suitcases should do well if you don't travel a very great deal and if you don't expect your luggage to be handled extremely roughly.

To help in buying soft-sided luggage, Miss Wirges suggests the following check list:

Make sure the closure rims fit properly; bindings are sewn securely; lining has no raw edges or dangling threads and is not separating from the shell; and there is no misplaced or sticking hardware.

Open and close the lid a few times. Work latches or zipper and the lock. See that fabric at the corners of the zipper, zipper tapes and adjoining fabric is not rippled. Check stability of the open lid, especially if it has no stays.

But, don't expect many guarantees. On the mail-order brands, you probably would get a general guarantee from the catalog, but many other guarantees may be vague.

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SENSING THE NEWS

The spirit that animated the American colonists 193 years ago this July Fourth is rare in the contemporary world. The colonists on the Atlantic seaboard, when they decided in 1776 to declare their independence of Great Britain and from a republic, wanted to stand on their own feet. The majority of new nations, formed in the post-World War II years, haven't had this desire. On the contrary, they expected other nations to bear their burdens and provide them with the financial means of development.

The most notable exception to the post-war pattern has been Rhodesia, which on June 20 held a constitutional referendum and voted to become a republic.

Three and a half years ago, the Rhodesians declared their independence of Great Britain. They did not break their ties with the British Crown, however. Because the vast majority of educated Rhodesians are of British origin, and many of their leaders including Prime Minister Ian Smith — fought bravely for Britain in World War II, they sought to retain ties to the motherland.

Repeatedly, the Rhodesian leadership met with Prime Minister Harold Wilson of Britain and other officials in London, trying to agree on constitutional arrangements satisfactory to both peoples and governments. The Rhodesian good will mattered for nothing, however, inasmuch as the socialist government of Great Britain was bent on appeasing the Afro-Asian extremists in the Commonwealth. These extremists would be satisfied with nothing less than the liquidation of independent Rhodesia. Finally, the Rhodesians lost patience, and decided their only alternative was to form a republic.

The British government, in its haste to bring down the Rhodesian government, imposed economic sanctions and enlisted other governments, including the Johnson administration, in resorting to means of injuring Rhodesia's economy.

The Rhodesians, like the American colonists after July 4, 1776, refused to bend their necks or abandon their fight for independence.

The Americans of almost two centuries ago found a good friend in France. The Rhodesians, in their struggle for economic survival, learned that several European nations were eager to participate in the country's economic growth. Thus Rhodesia has continued to receive foreign investment and has found markets for its goods. Because of Executive Orders issued by President Johnson, American free enterprise has

not been permitted to participate in the economy of one of the few African countries with a stable and substantial economic future.

Ironically, the ban on trade with Rhodesia has caused the U.S. to import chrome ore — one of Rhodesia's resources — from Soviet Russia, a major enemy of freedom. In the eyes of Washington officialdom, it is better to deal with communist Russia than with anti-communist Rhodesia.

Many thoughtful British parliamentarians realize the folly of British policy towards Rhodesia. If the Conservative Party were returned to power tomorrow, sensible diplomatics and trade relations with Rhodesia would be established. But Prime Minister Wilson and the Labor are the victims of their socialist dogmas which deem it intolerable for educated men to direct the governmental affairs of an African nation with a large, underdeveloped population.

It is time, however, that the United States government stop catering to the prejudices of the British Labor government. The Rhodesians are no different than the millions of Americans who want law and order in their communities. The Rhodesians, who have built up their country and government and financed it since 1923, cannot accept their land's reversion to savagery.

Since they declared their independence in 1965, the Rhodesians have seen the tragic example of mis-rule in Nigeria and the resulting outbreak of black in the Nigerian-Biafran war. Understandably, they will not accept a form of government that could lead to tribal strife in their own happy land.

The Nixon administration, which is alert to the need for a greater degree of order at home, should be sympathetic to the Rhodesians' wish for progress and stability. For the last decade, U.S. policy toward Africa has involved catering to irresponsible new regimes. It is time the U.S. policy in this area be reoriented, with attention to those countries that have quality leadership to raise the living standards of all the people. President Nixon could open a new era of constructive policy toward Africa by granting diplomatic recognition to Rhodesia and by permitting resumption of normal trade.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Marry Me — I Dare you!"

During a teenage party, one of the girls tossed a playful challenge at her boy friend: "Marry me—I dare you!"

The idea seemed so hilarious that they drove across the state line, found a justice of the peace, and went through a formal wedding ceremony. Afterward, both the "bride" and the "groom" returned to their respective homes.

A few days later, uneasy about what they had done, they went to court to have the ceremony annulled. And the court ruled that, despite the formalities, they were never truly married.

"Mere words," said the judge, "without any intention corresponding to them will not make a marriage."

Most courts agree that, if a marriage is purely in jest, it has no legal standing. However, it is a different story if the marriage — although meant to be temporary — is no joke. Thus:

An engaged couple had a bitter quarrel the night before their wedding day. In tears, the girl said they should break up. But the young man pleaded:

"My boss has promised me a raise on the basis of our getting married. Let's go ahead so I can get the raise. Then, later, we can have the marriage annulled."

But in this case, the court refused to grant an annulment. The judge said the ceremony, even though entered into for a special, limited purpose, was still a marriage at the moment it was performed.

What about a "trial marriage?" One couple got married with the private understanding that, if things did not work out, either one of them could have it annulled.

But here, too, the court found no ground for annulment. As one judge put it:

"Marriage is not something to be swept aside lightly. To permit the annulment of a marriage otherwise legal, upon mere proof that the parties agreed beforehand to have it annulled, would destroy the dignity of the marriage relationship."
