POLICE FAIL TO DISCOVER CLUE IN CASE

BODY FOUND AFTER AN ALL NIGHT SEARCH FOR YOUNG MAN

(By Associated Press)
PORTSMOUTH, Ohio, May 1.—William Sanford Wright, 18, sophomore and star athlete in Wheelersburg high school, was found shot to death in a country lane near Wheelersburg, a short distance from here, today, by searchers who had spent the night looking for him.

Authorities, who began an immediate investigation of the slaying, said that they believed Wright had been shot elsewhere and his body carried to the spot where found. Wright was last seen about 10 o'clock last night at the conclusion of a moving picture show at the high school.

The youth's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Wright, and his friends were unable to advance any possible reason for the slaying.

MANY HERE TO FACE CHARGES

100 COMPLAINTS ARE FILED, ECHO TO VIOLATIONS

More than 100 complaints have been filed against Lubbock citizens for failure to connect with the city's sanitary sewer system, City Manager G. W. McCleary said today.

Warrants of arrest will be issued on the complaints as quickly as possible. The violators of the city ordinance will be arraigned in the city corporation court here they will be subject to fines ranging from \$1 to \$100.

According to McCleary, notice was served to all of the offenders about thirty days ago and drastic action is promised for the ones who have failed to abide by the ordinance.

In launching this city-wide sanitary campaign, city officials point out that every day the requirement violated constitutes a separate offense.

TECH STUDENTS MOSTLY COUNTRY

Majority Come From Small Towns, Survey Shows

Students of Tech college are generally from small towns, a recent survey of 2,088 students revealed. Towns of less than 2,500 population are represented by 46.3 per cent of the student body while only 8.2 per cent are from towns of population over 2,500 to 5,000.

More than five per cent of the students come from cities with population of from five to twenty thousand, and the local enrollment is 27.9. Only two per cent are from towns of more than 50,000 population.

Liquor Plot Is Told At Angelo

SAN ANGELO, Texas, May 1.—Judge W. H. Atwell of the United States district court was ready to hear more evidence today in the trial of Carroll Bates, former San Angelo police chief, and 19 others on charges of violating federal prohibition laws.

Court room tables were decorated with hundreds of bottles of evidence which federal attorneys said was liquor. Crowds filled the court room.

W. H. Hutcherson, prosecution witness, testified he paid Bates \$125 a week for protection against liquor raids when Bates was chief.

PARTY SEEKS TO BUILD UP FROM GROUND

OFFICES WHOLE YEAR WILL BE KEPT IN WASHINGTON

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Determined to build up their forces throughout the country, democratic leaders have decided to establish permanent party headquarters in Washington to conduct "active organization work 365 days in the year."

The headquarters will be established under the direction of former Representative Joseph Shouse of Kansas, one of the farmers of the federal reserve and farm loan acts and later assistant secretary of the treasury, as chairman of the Democratic executive committee.

Announcing the decision after an informal conference with a large number of democratic senators, Chairman John J. Raskob of the democratic national committee, said Mr. Shouse would devote his entire time to the work and would be in active contact with members of the national committee and members of congress and in complete charge of relations between state organizations, their chairmen and members.

The executive committee, he announced, will have monthly meetings in Washington in which he, as chairman of the national committee, and former Senator Peter G. Gerry of Rhode Island, chairman of the advisory committee, will participate. Other members of the executive committee are Senator Harrison of Mississippi, Senator Pittman of Nevada, Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York, and F. J. Hoey of New York.

Mr. Raskob also announced that the party deficit had been reduced from \$1,550,000 to about \$800,000 and that he expected it to be brought under \$500,000 within a fortnight. He told newspapermen he had no intention of resigning as national chairman.

Horse Owners At Aurora On Strike

AURORA, Ill. May 1 (P).—There will be no racing at Aurora tomorrow.

The horse owners strike, which caused postponement of today's scheduled opening of the spring meeting, still was deadlocked, with the result that tomorrow's program was called off, after turfmen refused to make entries.

Clifford Trimble, general manager of the track, demanded that the striking horse owners immediately vacate their stables. Trimble said the meeting would be held and other horses would be shipped to replace those of the strikers, indicating racing might start Friday or Saturday.

\$10,000 ASKED IN DAMAGE SUIT HERE

Damages of \$10,000 are asked in a suit filed in the 99th district court today by Oscar Korn, operator of a chain of theaters throughout Texas.

Against William Hoefs, former partner of Korn in the K. and H. Theater circuit.

POLICE GUARD AGAINST MAY DAY LABOR RIOTS

Sheppard Will Get Sanity Trial

IS DEMENTED, ACCORDING TO PRISON CHIEF

ASYLUM MAY WIN OFF PENITENTIARY IN CASE OF SLAYER

(By Associated Press)

ANSON, May 1.—Basing his action on an affidavit from the warden of the state penitentiary, District Judge W. R. Chapman today ordered that Joyce Sheppard alias Bill Smith, convicted of the slaying of Deputy Jake Owens, of Fisher county, be returned to Jones county for a sanity trial on May 14.

Warden E. F. Harrell in his affidavit said that Sheppard, alias Smith, since his conviction had become insane and now remained in the penitentiary. He recommended that Sheppard be returned to the Jones county court for a sanity trial.

Harrell's affidavit was made at Austin, Governor Moody, because of Sheppard's apparent insanity, has granted several privileges to the man. The warden declared alienists and the prison physician declared that Sheppard now is insane.

Sheppard and Lloyd Conatser were charged with having slain Deputy Owens and Sheriff Bob Smith of Fisher county after the officers had arrested them for cotton theft. Smith was captured in Kentucky and Conatser in Mississippi. Conatser is serving a life term for the murder of the sheriff.

INFATUATION BLAMED FOR TRAGEDY AT WAXAHACHIE

WAXAHACHIE, Texas, May 1.—The infatuation of a middle aged veterinary surgeon for a 19-year-old divorcee was blamed today for a shooting affray which claimed the lives of Mrs. Lola B. Roller and Dr. Harry F. Dowling, both of Temple, here yesterday.

Dowling fell before a bullet fired by H. L. Hemphins, Mrs. Roller's uncle, who made a vain attempt to prevent the doctor from shooting his niece. Hemphins was taken before the grand jury immediately and was no-billed within less than five hours of the tragedy.

According to relatives of Mrs. Roller, Dowling had been making advances to the girl for some time, but had been discouraged. Mrs. Roller said, according to her relatives, that she would not tolerate attentions from a married man. A few days ago, she came to visit her uncle, who lives here, in order to avoid her unwelcome admirer. Monday night Dowling called at the Hemphins home, but she was out. Yesterday when he called he forced his way into the room where she was.

Brought Sheriff Back

Her uncle ran to his grocery near by for his gun, and returned with Sheriff John Davenport, who threw himself upon Dowling in an attempt to obtain the latter's gun. Davenport's body screened the doctor from Hemphins' fire and the

HEFLIN MOVE ON ENEMIES TURNED DOWN

ALABAMA SENATOR IN RESOLUTION HIT AT CRITICS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The senate refused today by a vote of 89 to 14 to adopt the resolution of Senator Heflin, Democrat, Alabama, condemning the attack on himself at Brockton, Mass., after he had delivered an address there.

Senator Heflin had aroused considerable debate over his resolution after he had charged opposition to it was influenced by Roman Catholics.

Senator Watson of Indiana, republican leader, called for a vote on the resolution today after Heflin had given notice he would discuss it again.

Those supporting the Heflin resolution included two republicans, Robinson of Indiana, and Sackett, of Kentucky.

At the time of his visit to Brockton to address a meeting of the Ku Klux Klan, Senator Heflin was assailed with missiles, one of them a bottle which missed him and struck a policeman.

Breckenridge Man Seriously Wounded

BRECKENRIDGE, Texas, May 1 (P).—Jimmie Veatch, 23, Breckenridge laborer, was in a hospital here today near death, and Clint Williams, tenant farmer, was charged with having fired four bullets into Veatch's body.

One of the bullets paralyzed Veatch's limbs. The shooting occurred on the Williams farm and was said to have been caused by family troubles.

WORLD HOSTS OF WORKERS IN CELEBRATIONS

CLASH AT BERLIN IS FATAL TO ONE OF DEMONSTRATORS

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, May 1.—Police and Communists clashed at various points in Berlin during today's celebration of May Day, one person being killed and several being injured.

One demonstrator in a clash at Hackerscher Market in old Berlin died in a hospital from a shot wound.

Socialists and communist organizations in Europe and the two Americas today celebrated May Day, the international labor day, while police in most countries undertook extraordinary precautions to prevent disturbances.

Disorders especially were threatened in Berlin, where minor clashes with police already had occurred, and in Mexico City, where an anti-American phase to the celebration developed. Police, while prepared, expected nothing untoward in London, Paris, Rome or the South American capitals.

Parades and outdoor and indoor meetings were arranged for New York and other cities of the United States but no disorder was feared. The day was a holiday in most of Spanish America.

Berlin reported its second clash in two days. Two policemen were wounded in the industrial suburb of Neukolln when 1,000 communists attempted to form a procession in violation of special May Day provisions.

PRAYER MEETING TONIGHT

ASK FUNDS TO FIGHT WOLVES

LEGISLATURE WORRIES OVER LONE COYOTE AND THE EAGLE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, May 1.—The "money" committee of the two house of the legislature today had the habits of the bobcat and golden eagle to consider along with the financial ailments of state institutions.

A group of sheep and goat raisers appeared last night before the senate finance committee and the house appropriations committee and asked for \$100,000 each year during the next biennium to make life miserable for predatory animals and rodents.

C. R. Landon of the predatory animal control bureau of the United States Biological Survey, led the discussion and introduced the speakers, who were Oscar Callaway of Comanche, Alexander Mitchell, Terrell county, D. M. Bishop, Bosque county, J. C. Hunter, Culberson county, Sim O'Neil, Coleman county, Frank E. Harrell, Eastland county, John Chamberlain, Palo Pinto county, and C. C. Belcher, Val Verde county.

Without exception the ranchers raised the trapping work which has been carried on under Landon's direction and urged its extension.

Ranges infested with Lobos, bobcats, coyotes, prairie dogs, gold-mountain lions and wild cats were a most unhealthy environment for sheep, goats, turkeys and chickens, they agreed.

The assertion was made that the average wolf did \$1,000 damage yearly. Chamberlain told of 600 wolves being killed by Landon's rangers in less than two years. Callaway said 32 counties had been cleaned, and the work should be extended to 120 other counties.

Special Rates To Farm Bureau Meet

Railroads of Texas have granted special reduced round trip fare to and from Dallas for the annual membership meeting and convention May 13th, of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, according to an announcement by N. H. Rayne field service representative of the organization in this county.

The reduced rates are based upon mileage traveled and the plan presented by the carriers prevent the necessity of securing the usual certificate for later validation.

Plans are being made for the attendance of a number of members from Lubbock county to the annual meeting. It was said. An exceptionally large attendance is looked for from all sections of the State, Mr. Rayne stated. At the annual membership meeting all phases of cotton cooperative marketing activities and related operations of the State association will be reported upon and discussed, directors and officers elected for another year and plans and policies outlined for the coming year.

BANKHEAD ROUTE IN GOOD SHAPE

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 1.—The Bankhead highway running through Texas from Texarkana to El Paso is in good condition with a few exceptions on the western leg of the district, Fred B. Robinson of Waco, Texas, traveling director of the Bankhead National highway, said in a report prepared for delivery at the annual joint meeting of the United States Good Roads association and the Bankhead highway association here today.

A paved road from Texarkana to the Mitchell county line will be ready in a few months, Robinson said, when projects in Mitchell county, together with work in Taylor, Nolan and Callahan counties, is completed. There are two or three short portions between Midland and El Paso which are not so good, he said, but there are mostly hard-surfaced, and "little trouble is to be encountered by the traveler the entire distance through Texas."

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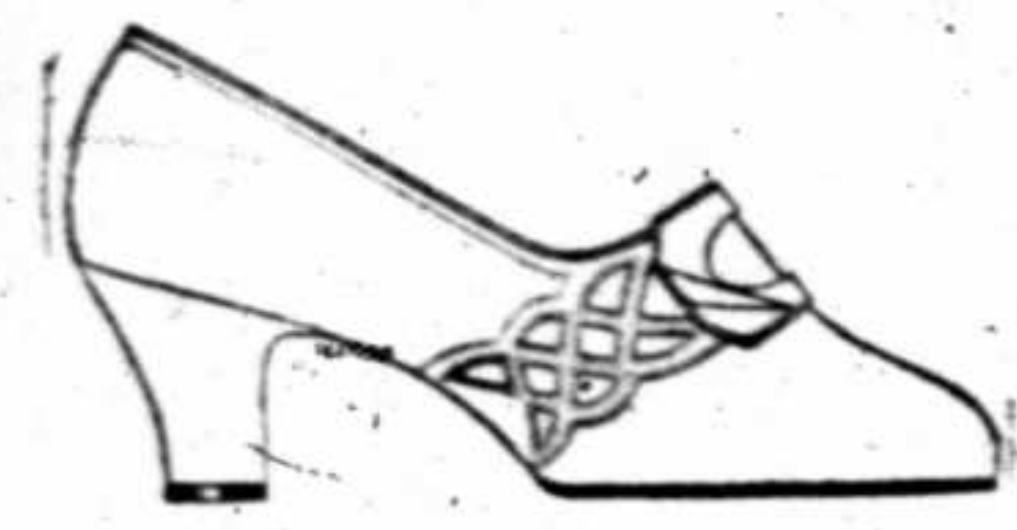

VOTE NEAR ON FARM MEASURE

NORRIS AMENDMENT IS ADOPTED IN THE SENATE

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—Having adopted the Norris amendment to the export debenture section of the farm relief bill, the senate was in position today to proceed toward a vote on that disputed provision itself.

The amendment, which changes the debenture section to provide for reduction of debenture rates whenever overproduction is forecast in affected crops, was adopted without a record vote. It had the support of members opposed to the plan as a whole who, as Chairman McNary of the agriculture committee put it, see no objection to perfecting a legislative proposal even though they intend to vote against it.

At the same time, the amendment was opposed by some proponents of the debenture plan, including Senator Caraway, democrat, Arkansas, who were not swayed by the argument that it would gain supporters for their stand but insisted it would deprive the farmers of the full benefits proposed.

Holding his amendment would tend to discourage overproduction and thus help to overcome one of the principal objections to farm relief legislation, Senator Norris declared.

"Any legislation to increase the prices of farm products will tend to increase production. No one denies that. It is true of every protective tariff ever adopted. There may be more danger in this instance and therefore I think we should be willing to put a penalty on overproduction."

Forest Fire Does Damage In The West

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., May 1 (AP)—A forest fire, whipped by a north wind which fanned into flames coals left from the burning of a fire break, today swept over valuable timber lands in Day Canyon in the San Gabriel mountains, west of here and was said by rangers to be out of control after burning 25 acres.

More than 10 men were quickly mobilized and sent to the fire scene as the flames threatened extensive timber tracts in the Federal and the San Bernardino county forests.

At 3:08 a. m. a bomb exploded in the door of a northwest side saloon and at 3:10 another at a saloon a few blocks away. At 3:13 a third went off in the doorway of a third soft drink parlor in the district. Each caused about \$1,500 damage.

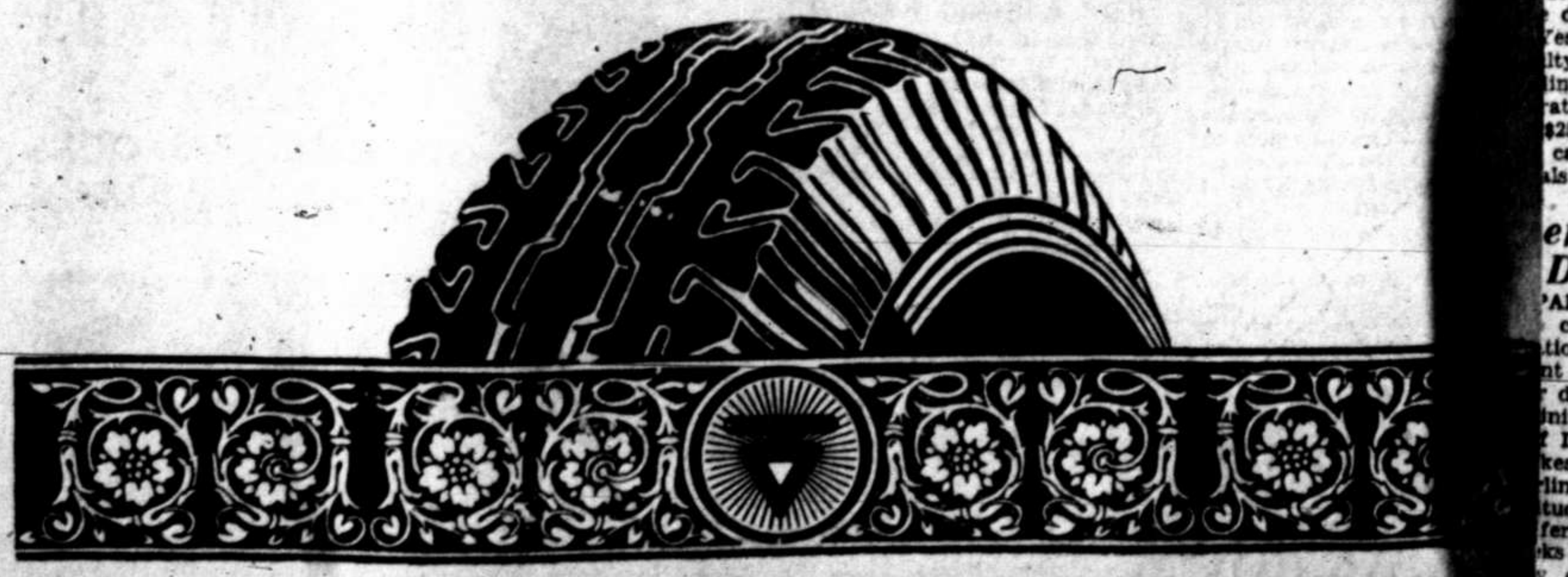
