

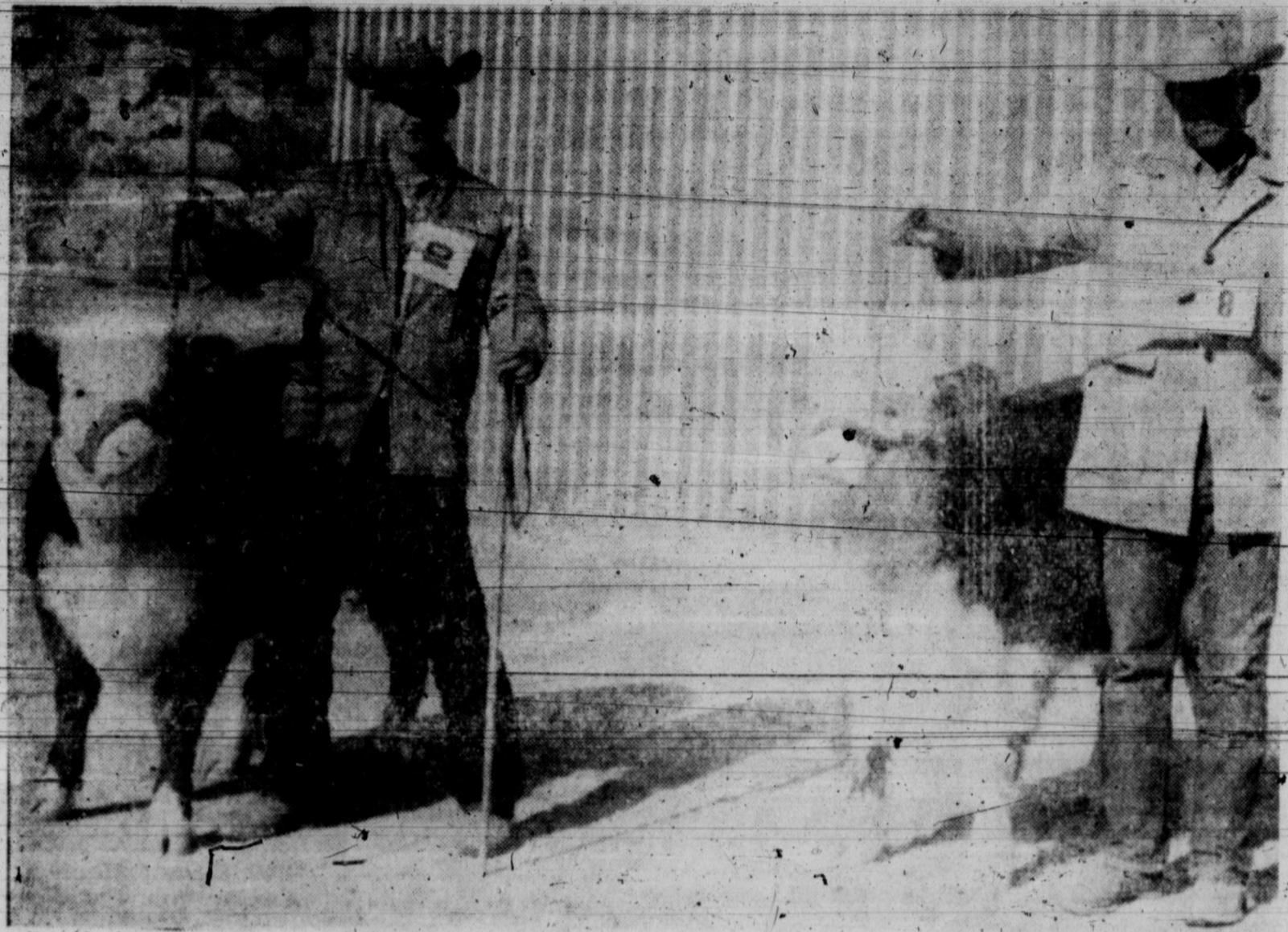

Fifty-four herefords sold for a record total of \$17,925 here Friday in the 13th annual show and sale of the Mitchell County Hereford Association.

Another mark topped too when Mrs. Dee Bassham of Colorado City paid \$1,030 for the grand champion bull, Noble Lamp 71, consigned by S. F. Buchanan of Big Spring. The figure broke the mark set last year when Charlie C. Thompson of Colorado City paid \$1,000 for the grand champion bull, Noble Lamp 42, also consigned by Buchanan.

The price was far above the 1961 average of under \$300 and \$655 in the 1959 show. The 1962 average per animal overall was \$331.85. The 1962 sales total of \$17,925 was more than \$2,000 above last year's record setting total of \$600.

But the number of herefords consigned dropped from 1961's record of 67 animals to 54. 43 bulls and 11 heifers.

However, the average price of \$330 was paid by Sammy Baugh for W. L. (Dub) Harkrider's W LH Master 6, bull. Fourth highest money of \$225 was paid by Tom Houston of Stanton for Buchanan's Noble Lamp 78, bull. Buchanan's reserve champion heifer, Pretty Lady 68, was purchased by Roy Henderson for \$500.

Buyer Baugh, headline marker in the sports world, purchased a total of 3 bulls. He paid \$300 for C Choice Lamp 12, from James Coats of Big Spring and \$160 for Super Diamond 26, consigned by Earl L. Brown of Colorado City.

### AGAINST MANUFACTURERS

## Texas Electric Planning Suits

Texas Electric Service Company is preparing to file the first of several damage suits against manufacturers of electric equipment, president Benjamin Fisher reported Saturday.

The suit will be filed against electric equipment manufacturers who were found guilty last year of conspiring to fix prices in violation of anti-trust laws, he said.

Texas Electric operates a huge power plant on Lake Colorado City here, Morgan Creek Power Plant, and has its downtown business office at 153 Oak St.

The damage suits will cover purchases of electrical equipment in the period of 1948 to 1960, said Fisher.

Morgan Creek Power Plant on the lake here was initially constructed and later several additions made to it during this period. Apparently a portion or all of the electrical equipment used at the local plant came from the manufacturers Texas Electric is preparing to file suits against.

The amount of damages to be sought will be determined after studies of purchases and prices during this specified

period have been completed, Fisher said.

The suits will be filed in Federal District Courts, where the electrical equipment manufacturers maintain headquarters.

Similar anti-trust damage suits have been filed against manufacturers of electrical equipment by approximately 200 electric utility companies, with nearly one-half of them being filed in New York, Texas Electric's president reported.

In February 1961, a Federal District Court in Philadelphia found guilty and fined a number of the electric equipment manufacturers who were involved in a conspiracy to fix prices in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

## Poll Tax Is Necessary To Cast Ballots in 1962

The 1962 poll tax receipts now being issued by Mitchell County Tax Collector Assessor Monte Gardner will determine a citizen's right to vote in this election year.

Hardacre reported Saturday a total of 573 poll taxes issued to county citizens out of an approximate 3,000 eligible voters in the county.

All residents who have lived in the county 6 months and the state 1 year are eligible to vote in the 1962 election. Any one who reached the age of 60 before Jan. 1, 1961 is entitled to vote without securing a tax receipt or an exemption. However, exemptions are necessary for those who reached the age of 60 at any time during 1961, although they do not have to purchase a receipt.

Monday, Feb. 5 is the deadline for requests to be made to have a name placed on a ballot. Candidates must pay the filing fee to the county clerk by Saturday, Feb. 17.

The state executive committee met on March 12 and county executive committee met on March 19 to determine the order names that will appear on the ballot and to receive certificates showing the order.

- April 4—Minors and non-residents who became eligible to vote after Jan. 1 may obtain exemption papers from tax collector not later than 30 days before primary absentee ballots for the first election day.
- April 15—Primary election at any time but more than 20 days before primary absentee ballots for the first election day.

- May 1—Last day to cast absentee ballot.
- May 7—First Primary Election.

Morris was a member of the First Baptist Church in Big Spring and had served as one of its stewards for approximately 10 years.

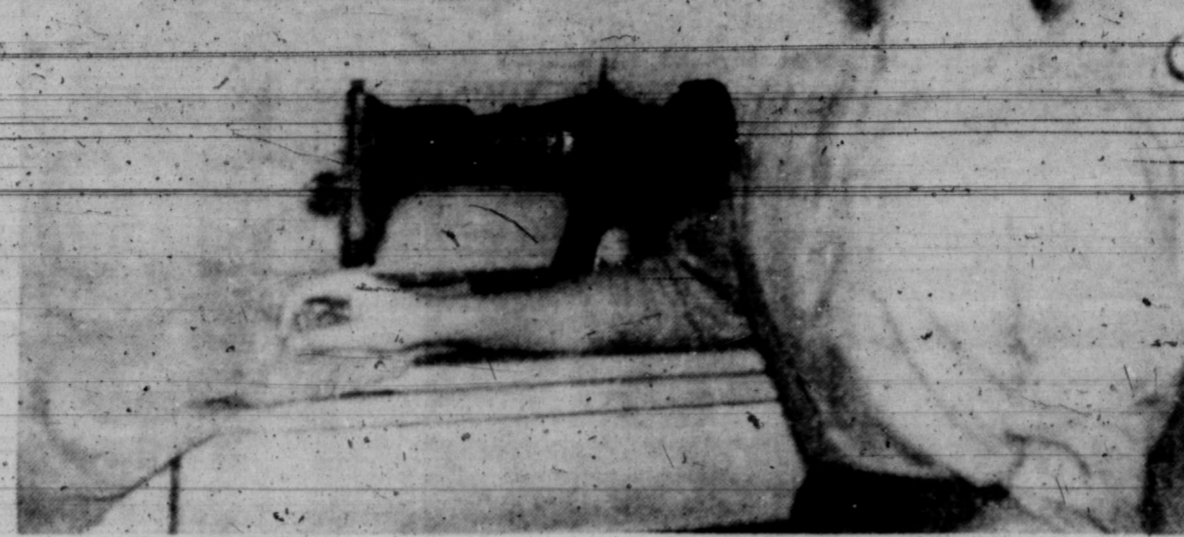

Miss Orinea Faye Feaster Enters State Wool Contest

Miss Orinea Faye Feaster has a special admiration for her sewing machine. It plays a big part in the all-expense-paid trip she began Friday. Miss Feaster has been selected as one of the girls from this district, District I, which includes 60 counties, to compete in the 1961 "Make It Yourself With Wool" State Contest in Lubbock. The contest is sponsored by the American Wool Council and any girl student is eligible. The "Make It Yourself With Wool" Contest is expanding in this, its 15th year, to cover the entire United States. This contest has been on the Approved List of National Contests and Activities of the National Association of Secondary School Principals for 6 of these years. Nine scholarships are awarded among the 1961 awards; many of these are renewable if grades are kept up to standard. Savings bonds and educational trips will also be awarded. Thus the winners' education will be enriched directly, and further study will be encouraged. The district contest was conducted Dec. 9 in Texas Tech College in Lubbock. Seventy-one girls from this district were entered, and the top 10 per cent of these girls are awarded the chance to compete in the contest on the state level at the same college. The state contest was Saturday, and Miss Feaster, along with other girls from

all districts in Texas, competed in the state-wide contest. The contest is conducted on 3 age-division levels. They are: sub-junior, age 13 through 15; junior, age 14 through 17; and senior, age 18 through 21. In some states the contest is conducted on an adult level also, with entrants of ages over 21. Miss Feaster is classified in the junior division, entering a basic gray-blue solid dress. The dress is fashioned with a plaited skirt, fitted bodice and high round neck. It features long sleeves and a self-material belt. All contestants must construct their entries themselves. Friday night all contestants were honored with a party in their hotel in Lubbock. The judging started on Saturday, when they modeled their entries before judges in a private showing. After a later public showing, the winners will be announced. Winners in this state-wide contest will be given a chance to compete in the national contest in Salt Lake City, Utah, later this month. State winners will travel first class, all expenses paid, by train or plane, courtesy of F. W. Woolworth Company, to arrive in Salt Lake City Jan. 19. On Jan. 20, they will model their entries before judges. January 21 will be devoted to a sightseeing tour around Salt Lake City. The National Style Review and presentation of awards will take place on Jan. 22. Prizes in the national contest will include new sewing machines by Singer Sewing Company, college tuition scholarships, United States Savings Bonds and garment lengths of 100% wool fabric. First prize in the national contest is an all-expense-paid trip via Pan American Jet Clipper to California Fashion Centers and the Island State, Hawaii. Miss Feaster, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orin Feaster, 1030 E. 10th St., is a 17-year-old senior student in Colorado City High School and has 3 years of Home Economics to her credit. Mrs. J. D. White was guest speaker at the Wednesday meeting of the First Presbyterian Church Women in the church parlor here. The meeting was the regular monthly meeting—the president, Mrs. Frank Ginzel, presided.

Mrs. John Brown brought the opening prayer and reports were read from the circle chairmen. A letter was read to the group from Mrs. Evelyn Green, who is the executive secretary of the Board of Women's Work of the Presbyterian Church. She was on her way to New Delhi and the meeting of the World Council of Churches, and was visiting churches in Taiwan when she wrote the letter.

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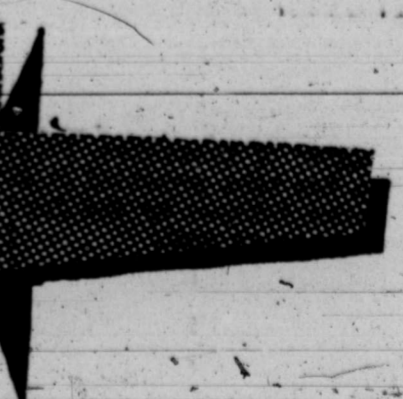


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# Mrs. H. B. Wilson Honored On 95th Birthday New Year's

ANDREW J. HERRINGTON

Former Resident, Business Man Marks 94th Birthday

Andrew J. Herrington, former Colorado City resident, observed his 94th birthday Thursday, Jan. 4, in Brady. He was a citizen of Colorado City from 1907 until 1931 when upon the death of his first wife, he moved to Rockwell.

Herrington was the first auto dealer in Colorado City. He sold 95 of the first 97 automobiles registered in this county. He once had dealership for Ford, Rambler, Mitchell and Overland.

The first Rambler dealer in Texas, he later cut his sales to Ford, then changed to Oldsmobile and Pontiac. He was a dealer for Ford for 17 years in Mitchell County.

When Herrington moved from Mitchell County, he left his mark upon Colorado City. The 130-by-105-foot structure he erected to house his auto business in Colorado City still is considered one of the town's best structures. The former auto showroom is presently Colorado City's Civic House.

Herrington has been a Texas Tech College in Lubbock, she now teaches piano privately. She was a piano teacher in Colorado City for some time.

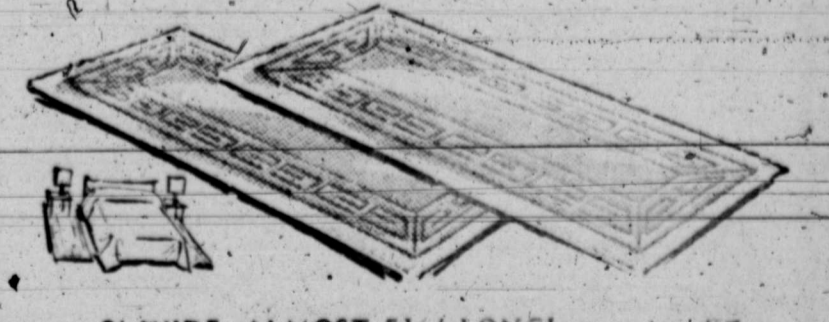

## Ventilate for World War I Safety in Vets Install Cold Weather New Officers

Cold weather requires that  
windows in the home and car  
be closed and increases the  
need for proper ventilation. A  
potential killer, warms the  
Texas Farm and Ranch Sale  
County is a product of  
poor ventilation and poor  
the name of carbon monoxide  
gas, reports Jack Burkhalter,  
Mitchell County Agent.

Every year Texans die from  
this odorless, colorless and  
tasteless gas. Deaths from this  
cause are most common dur-  
ing the winter months and  
usually result from a high  
open fire in a room without  
proper ventilation, a clogged  
flue, unvented gas stoves or  
defective gas stoves or leaky  
exhausts on the automobile.

Keeping an automobile in  
good running order is good  
insurance against carbon mon-  
oxide poisoning. Check free  
combustion and exhaust sys-  
tems, points out Burkhalter,  
agent of major importance.

Many automobile accidents  
result from carbon monoxide  
and studies have shown the  
presence of the gas may cause  
a driver to blackout or fall  
asleep. It is always wise he  
says, to keep a vent or win-  
dow partially open while driv-  
ing. Letting a car engine run  
in a closed garage is extreme-  
ly dangerous.

Symptoms of carbon mon-  
oxide poisoning include head-  
ache, dizziness, eye burning,  
nausea and vomiting, and  
throbbing of the heart. A  
check of heater equipment  
and installation to ventilate  
will eliminate most of the  
hazards of carbon monoxide  
poisoning.
