

A Letter From Home To Boys In Service

Abernathy, Tex.,
June 13, 1942.

To the Men in Service,

Dear Boys:

Your home town folks are constantly thinking of you. Every meeting, church social, lodge and civic gathering centers its interest on those of you who are in the service of the nation. On every street corner one hears references to our home town boys who have left. Our interest is not confined to talking, however. We are working, saving, buying and living with one goal in view—that of winning this war. Your part—actual service in the armed forces—is a role all of us can't play. But, what we can do, we are doing with all of our interest and all of our ability.

Our Farmers and Merchants club, working under the direction of the local war board, has organized several committees which are carrying on all types of defense work. Bond and Stamp sales are pushed by one such group, collection of scrap iron, metal by another, grasshopper poisoning is directed by a third, and, it now appears that another group is to have to work out means to supply labor for the wheat harvest. But, I assure you that Abernathy community is facing its difficulties and finding ways to overcome them. I am sure that you boys will meet with far greater difficulties than we have here at home, but I know that you have the courage to face them no matter what they might be and will overcome them victoriously.

Our home guard is drilling regularly, although several have left the home ranks for the service of Uncle Sam. Captain George Ragland was in the hospital in Amarillo but is back with us. At the last meeting we have been posting the guard. So far I have stayed out of the guard house. We realize our military work is little like that which you are experiencing in the army, but we feel it will help us in whatever we are called to do.

In many ways you would notice changes in our town, but there remains unchanged, that feeling of friendliness which Abernathy has always had. Your going has left vacancies in our town, but we hope they are only temporary vacancies, and that each of you will come back to take your place in this community again. As you make new friends while you are away, invite them to come back with you. There will be a place waiting for all of you.

First '42 Wheat Is Harvested

The first 1942 wheat harvested in this section was brought to Plains Grain Co. Friday afternoon by J. Wahlberg, farmer three miles northwest of town. The first load of grain had a total of 74 bushels and tested 60, E. B. Lindsey, elevator manager, stated. Wahlberg estimated the yield at from 15 to 18 bushels per acre.

Wesley Hardesty brought in the first load last year on June 21.

Shortly after Wahlberg arrived with the first wheat, a second load was delivered at Co-op Grain Co. by Odie Hamilton, farmer southwest of town. It was number one, dark, hard winter wheat testing 60, said Frank Tannehill, elevator manager. The load weighed 9,500 pounds.

E. J. Pope, farmer six miles west of town, also brought a load of new wheat to Plains Grain Co. late Friday. The grain, cut from volunteer wheat, tested 61, and Pope estimated the yield at 15 bushels per acre. He brought in 13,000 pounds.

Although work is not complete on construction of Plains Grain Co. Elevator, the plant is receiving wheat. Unloading facilities have been installed and the grain can be dumped and handled without inconvenience to the farmers. The new elevator, when completed, will have an increased capacity of eight to ten thousand bushels more than the old plant which was destroyed by fire early in 1942.

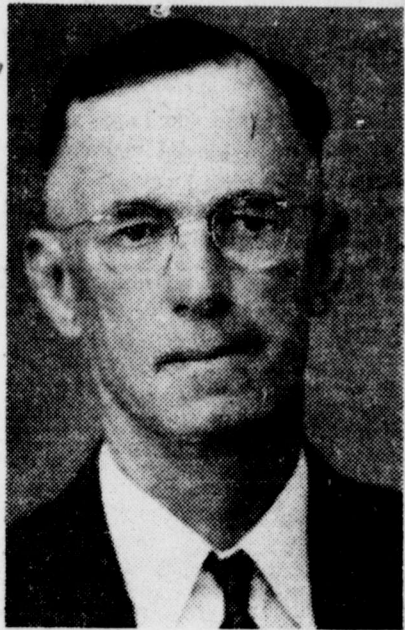

The behind the scenes life of both aviation cadets and enlisted men will be one feature of the special dedication services at the large Lubbock Army Flying school which the public may see on Sunday, June 21.

Besides the barracks themselves, mess halls, link trainer building, day rooms, hangar and the sub-depot shop and hangar will all be open to the visitors as part of the formal dedication of the advanced twin-engine school.

Opening the gates to the general public at one o'clock, Col. Thomas L. Gilbert has announced that Major-General H. R. Harmon, commanding officer of the Gulf Coast Training Area, will be principal speaker in the dedicatory service scheduled for 2 o'clock. Col. Gilbert will also speak.

The Lubbock Army Post band is to play a varied program under the leadership of Warrant Officer Geo. P. Attridge from one to two o'clock.

Until late in the afternoon the visiting public will be admitted to various parts of the Lubbock Field on a general inspection tour. The many aspects of camp life of both aviation cadets and enlisted men may be visited on this occasion.

During the progress of the program on the ground, the aviation cadets will carry out routine flying activities, including take-offs, formations and landings.

All friends of the Lubbock Army Flying school are cordially invited to be present at these dedication services. Since the general public cannot ordinarily be admitted to camp areas, the program on June 21 offers an excellent opportunity for a close-up view of the typical flying school.

5 Tons of Old Rubber Collected Here in First Two Days

Following announcement last week by President Roosevelt that the co-operation secured in a nationwide drive to collect millions of tons of scrap rubber lying idle on the farms and in the cities of the nation would determine whether or not gasoline rationing would be necessary later, local residents pitched in with a vim, and Monday morning saw interest high in the drive to "pounce on every ounce." Rubber of all kinds, no matter how old, or how small a piece, is needed in the nation's shortage now. Old sink stoppers, bathing caps, erasers, tires, innertubes, garden hose, rubber insulation on wire, and hundreds of other pieces, are wanted in this campaign.

Service stations of the nation are buying the scrap until June 30, paying a ceiling price of 1c a pound. In turn, they will sell it to the petroleum industry. All profit from the rubber will be divided equally among such organizations as the USO, Red Cross, Army and Navy relief funds, etc.

Abernathy service stations are collection points for the scrap rubber. They are paying the set price of 1c a pound, and are selling it for the same price. The stations are performing a patriotic service in handling it. Those persons having either small or large lots of rubber which they want to donate may do so and the money derived from the sale will be given to the service organizations.

Near five tons of scrap rubber was collected by Abernathy service stations and garages during the first two days of the drive this week. Boy Scouts are assisting in the drive.

Scrap Iron Contest

Residents of this area are urged to sell all scrap metal this week and turn their sale slips in to help their community win in the county contest which ends June 20. The Boy Scouts are sponsoring the contest for Abernathy and Lakeview War Board in that community.

Sales slips for the Scouts may be turned in to H. Schulz, Andy Reid, W. A. Richter or N. C. Hix. Members of the War Board will receive slips at Lakeview.

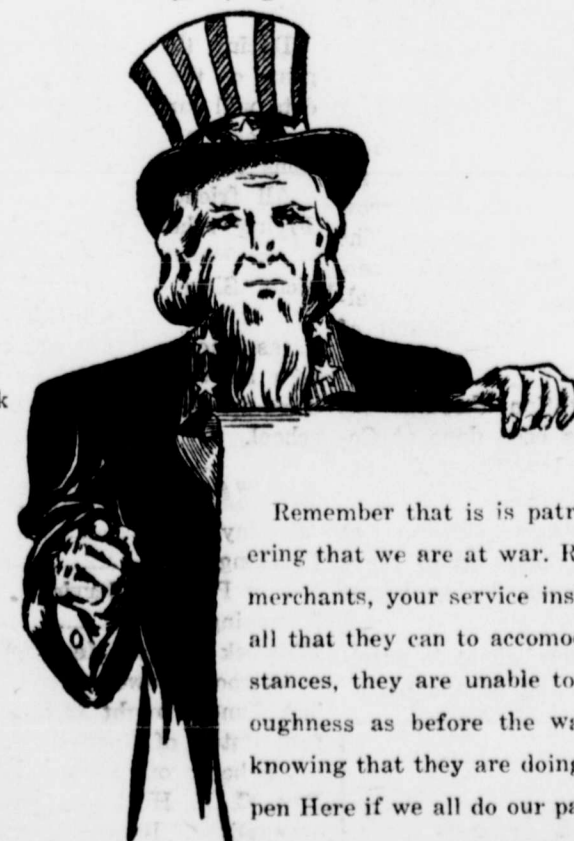

LUMBAGO
Lumbago is a form of rheumatism in which the site of pain is localized in the nerve endings of muscles or their point of attachment in the lumbar region in the small of the back. The beginning of lumbago is sudden, with severe pain of increasing intensity upon muscular action. One or many muscles may be affected. When localized in the small of the back muscles it is called lumbago, if it is located anywhere else it is given the name of where it is located.

If the attack is acute there is fever of a moderate degree. The pain is intense, the patient being unable to move the affected muscles, or, perhaps, unable to roll over in bed. There is muscular contraction, which may be spasmodic or continuous. The excretion of the kidneys is scanty and highly acid, the sweat has an acid odor, and there is improper elimination. The attack lasts from one to two weeks, and may finally become chronic. In the chronic form the pain is less intense, and may come and go
