'Bremen' Spans Ocean; Lands On Labrador Isle Wichita Falls Merchant Killed by Unknown Assailant

Robbery Thought Motive Of Attack On Storekeeper

Neighbor Heard Scuffling
At Door and Loud Calls
For Help; Found Victim
On Ground.

NO CLUE TO IDENTITY OF MAN'S ASSAILANT

Theodore Zimmerman Was
Rushed to a Hospital, Dying
Within a Few
Minutes.

(By Associated Press)
WICHITA, Falls, April 13.—
Theodore Zimmerman, 56, was shot
to death by an unknown assailant
at his small store here tonight.
While no money was taken, police
and friends of Zimmerman believe
robbery was the motive for the attack.

J. W. Lassiter, who lives in a
house adjoining the store, told police
he was awakened about 9:30
p. m. by a call from the store
owner, who said he had been
robbed. Lassiter rushed to the
store, but found no one there.
He then returned to his home,
where he found Zimmerman lying
on the ground outside the door.
Lassiter did not speak again.

ESCAPED MEN CAUGHT

Waco Pair Had Sowed Way
To Freedom

WACO, April 13. (P)—M. C. Wood-
son, sentenced bank robber, and
H. Halley, alleged forger, who
escaped from the McLennan county
jail about Friday morning by saw-
ing through three rows of bars,
were captured tonight by deputy
sheriffs when they were seen walk-
ing to town from north Waco cedar
groves.

Ben Elwood, being held on bur-
glary charges, and Temple White,
charged with forgery in 15 cases,
who made their escape at the same
time, were still at large tonight.
An arrest is expected Saturday.

San Angelo Killer Carried to Prison

At Huntsville, Byrnes Will
Await Action On Appeal
From Sentence of Death
For Killing.

SAN ANGELO, April 13.—Floyd
Byrnes, confessed slayer of
women, sentenced to death for
murder of a woman, was carried
to the state penitentiary today in the custody of
sheriffs Bob Hewitt of Tom Green
county and Sam Russell of Coke
county.

ECHO OF "SUICIDE"

Investigation Results In Ar-
rest of Husband

LOS ANGELES, April 13. (P)—
A secret investigation conducted by
Alfred Daniels, wealthy New York
City beauty parlor operator, into
the supposed suicide of his daughter,
St. Claire Evans, film extra, last
June 4, in Hollywood, today result-
ed in the arrest of Arthur S. Evans,
surviving husband, on a charge of
suspicion of murder.

Lubbock Considered As Probable Location For Catholic's Sanitarium

Selection of Lubbock as the site
for a hospital to be supported by
the Catholic church emerged yester-
day from rumor to definite proba-
bility when a party of Catholics,
headed by Bishop Gerkin of Amarillo,
bishop of this diocese spent
yesterday inspecting possible loca-
tions of a hospital here.

The party, composed of Bishop
Gerkin, Rev. Krukert, priest of
the Plainview church and two Sisters
of Mercy from Chicago, left this
city last night. Bishop Gerkin
returned to Amarillo, Rev. Krukert
returned to Plainview, and the
Sisters of Mercy journeyed to Stan-
ton.

One of the reasons why Lubbock
is being considered in the location
of the hospital is its central loca-
tion in respect to this Catholic di-
ocese, which includes members west
of the hundredth meridian.

What other towns are being con-
sidered for the location of the hos-
pital was not made public, but it
is generally known that both Plain-
view and Slaton are anxious for the
institution.

No information was vouchsafed
as to the impression of Lubbock the
party received, or what their report
on the locations would be.

Rumors have been current for
some time that the Catholic church
was contemplating locating a hos-
pital in this diocese, but yesterday's
visit was the first significant move
made public.

Government Rests Friday In Action Against Sinclair

Defense Blocks Evidence
Important To Case; Will
Call Younger Doherty To
Witness Stand.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 13.—Cl-
maxing its headlong rush to get
its conspiracy case against Harry F.
Sinclair, before the jury, the gov-
ernment rested today after the de-
fense had prevented—for the time
at least—the introduction of testi-
mony which the prosecution con-
sidered highly important.

Two questions were taken under
consideration by Justice Jennings
Bailey for decision on Monday.
These dealt with \$25,000 in Liberty
bonds which Sinclair gave Albert
B. Fall when he made a trip to
Russia, and the Elk Hills lease Fall
gave E. L. Doherty. The court said
he was inclined to exclude this evi-
dence but withheld a ruling on both
issues until the resumption of the
trial on Monday.

Owen J. Roberts, special govern-
ment counsel contended that the
Liberty bond transaction, although
it took place after the date set in
the indictment as the termination
of the alleged conspiracy—showed
the "color" and the secrecy of the
relations between Fall and Sin-
clair. Martin W. Littleton, for the
defense maintained that such tes-
timony was irrelevant.

high schools, grouped in 25 teams,
are here today for the third annual
judging contests to be held under
auspices of the Texas Technological
college. Events will start at 8 o'clock
today for the contest were arriving
hourly last night.

There will be three divisions in
the judging, for plant production,
livestock, and poultry judging.
Early last night entries had been
received from Matador, Dimmitt,
Halls, Bledsoe, Farwell, Tulla, Ol-
ton, Littlefield, Silverton, Hereford,
Taboka, Snyder, Abert, and
Sudan. Others were expected to
enter at the last moment.

More than 100 boys were ex-
pected to participate, a number intend-
ing to watch the contest and to partici-
pate for practice.

"Bull Market" Rides Over
Friday Jinx

NEW YORK, April 13. (P)—Wall
street's "bull" market, which has
been under full steam for more
than two months, today rode
roughshod over the Friday 13th
jinx.

Fifty individual issues crashed
through to new high records as
prices advanced \$1 to nearly \$13 a
share in the third largest market
in history. Total sales crossed the
4,000,000 share mark for the fifth
consecutive full session, reaching
4,579,200 shares, as contrasted
with the record of 4,762,400, on
March 27.

United States Asks World Powers To Join In International Arbitration

Extensive Move With Object of World Peace Made By
State Department In Invitation for England,
Japan, Germany and Italy to Cooperate

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 13.—Negotia-
tions for a world wide treaty
solemnly renouncing war in favor of
the Pacific settlement of interna-
tional controversies, were initiated
today when Secretary Kellogg in-
vited the British, German, Italian
and Japanese governments to join
France and the United States in
agreeing upon and signing a pact
to that end.

It is the first time in history
the United States has embarked on
so extensive a project for the pro-
motion of world peace. It has the
sanction of President Coolidge and
the state department is confident
of its ultimate success.

Just Like Magic

Physics Phenomena
Baffle Audience

Phenomena of physics, which
make the old time "black mag-
ic" performer's tricks look tame,
were presented for Lubbock peo-
ple by faculty of the Texas
Tech physics department last
night. Two performances were
given.

A physics orchestra, consist-
ing of six performers on bot-
tles, test tubes, and other labo-
ratory equipment, and which
actually made music, was a
feature.

Included in the features of
the show were demonstrations of
throwing a million volts of
electricity through the human
body, a voice talking through a
flame, heating iron white hot by
sticking it in water, a moving
picture of the human voice,
boiling water by applying cold
instead of heat, producing the
famed northern lights and various
other physical applications.

Moody Again Says He Wishes State, Not National Job

Declines To Have Name
Placed In Oregon Pri-
mary As Possible Presi-
dential Candidate.

(By Associated Press)
ASTORIA, Ore., April 13.—Gov-
ernor Moody again expressed his intention
to run for reelection in a telegram
Friday declining with thanks a
chance to get his name placed on
the Oregon primary election ticket
as a democratic presidential nomi-
nee.

The telegram was to Charles T.
McPherson, Portland, Ore., chair-
man of the democratic executive
committee of that state, who had
wired the governor at Houston
Wednesday and Austin Thursday
asking him to allow his name to
be put on the Oregon ticket.

"I sincerely appreciate the gen-
erous compliment you pay me,"
Governor Moody told McPherson.
"I am a candidate for reelection to
the office of governor of Texas and
therefore am not a candidate for
the nomination mentioned in your
wire. I cannot authorize the plac-
ing of my name on the ballot as
suggested by you."

18-Year-Old Operator Got First Radio Flash

MANCHESTER, N. H., April 13.
(P)—Stewart Davis, 18-year-old
amateur radio operator of this city,
tonight flashed to the world news
of the landing of the German plane
Bremen on Greenly Island, Davis,
who has a small experimental sta-
tion, intercepted the first message
sent out by the Canadian govern-
ment radio station at Louisburg, N.
S., describing the forced landing
and relayed them immediately to
the Manchester union.

World Rejoiced

At News of Fliers'
Safe Arrival

LONDON, April 14. (P. (Saturday).
London was chary about accepting
first reports that the Bremen had
landed safely on Greenly Island.
Several such dispatches came
through about 1 a. m. by radio pick-
ed up by Atlantic steamships and
relayed to England.

When the direct cable confir-
mation came from New York, how-
ever, about an hour later, the news
was received with a distinct feeling
of relief.

Unwillingness to accept the first
rumors came from the experience
of earlier in the night when hopes
were raised high by the report that
the plane had reached Mitchell
field. The complete dashing of these
hopes left London in a "show me"
state of mind.

Applause Halted Working Of Canadian Legislators

OTTAWA, Ont., April 13. (P)—Ap-
plause broke out in the house of
commons tonight when the safe ar-
rival in Canadian territory of the
monoplane Bremen was announced.
Government business was held up in
order that the announcement might
be made.

When asked tonight of the gov-
ernment was to send aid to the air-
men in Greenly Island, Col. Ralston,
minister of defense, said:

"We'll have to know more of con-
ditions and discuss the matter with
the department of marine and fish-
eries. Hon. P. J. A. Carlin, minis-
ter of marine, is not in the city to-
night."

Congratulations to the members
of the crew of the monoplane Bre-
men were sent by Premier MacKen-
zie King tonight.

All Day Long Great Crowds Were Waiting

MITCHELL FIELD, April 13. (P)—
All day long a great crowd waited
here for the monoplane Bremen
from Ireland, but the Bremen did
not come.

Representatives of the German
government and the Irish Free
State, Mayor Walker of New York,
and other distinguished mingled with
a throng estimated as high as 5,000.

Huenefeld and Fitzmaurice

By Dog Teams.

DUBLIN, April 13.—A four-leaf
Irish shamrock was von Huenefeld's

brought him safely back to the sands
of Valleybrook beach, when their
plane was unable to fight its way
through the storms off the Irish
coast.

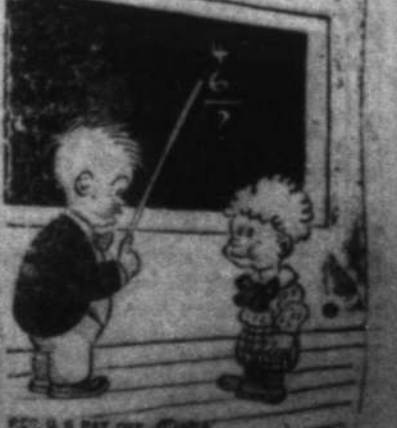
Problems Confronting The

500 Enrolled For Boys, Girls Clubs

Unparalleled Interest Is Shown Over County, Says D. F. Eaton—Participating in Contests.

Unparalleled interest in boys and girls club work is being shown throughout Lubbock county at this time, it was stated yesterday by County Agent D. F. Eaton, who is making a survey of club work. There are now 500 boys and girls engaged in the work.

This year there are 18 boys' clubs and 15 girls' club in Lubbock county. They are participating actively in all agricultural contests of the year.

With the completion of Mr. Eaton's survey, regular work on various farm projects will be begun. Organization of a Jersey calf club is to be a new feature of the work this year. Entries are to be made from Lubbock county in the lion lily contest, the baby beef contest, the Santa Fe production contest, the Swift and company beef contest, and the national club trip contest. The Jersey club will have an exhibit in the ranchman-Plains fair.

Applications for membership in the club must be in by May 1. A county club council meeting has been called for next Saturday, April 21, at which time various club leaders and officers will make their reports.

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Baked haddock, apple, cereal, cream, tomato, onion, cinnamon coffee cake, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable loaf, cheese muffins, meringue pudding, milk tea.

DINNER—Haddock, stew, stuffed, pudding, rice, milk, coffee. The whites of eggs are used to make the meringues and the yolks are used in the custard for the luncheon pudding. About 1-3 cup granulated sugar is added to the stiffly beaten egg whites with a few grains of salt and vanilla. This is dropped from a teaspoon onto a sheet of "foolscap" paper stretched on a damp board and the mixture is baked in a slow oven. The crunchy little puffs are served with "boiled" custard.

Haddock Stew.

One pound haddock, 3 medium sized onions, 3 cups diced potatoes (raw), 2 cups diced carrots, 1 cup diced turnips, 1 cup diced celery, 2 tablespoons minced parsley, 2 cups boiling water, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 cups hot milk, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon flour.

Melt three tablespoons butter or drippings in drip-drop kettle and add onions peeled and sliced and cook for five minutes over a low fire. Add vegetables and water and simmer, closely covered for 15 minutes. Add fish, skinned, boned and cut in two-inch cubes and simmer 15 minutes. Add salt, pepper, paprika and Worcestershire sauce. Melt remaining butter and stir in flour, add enough hot liquid from the stew to make mixture of a consistency to pour. Push fish and vegetables to one side of kettle as much as possible and add butter and flour mixture to liquid, stirring carefully. Bring to the boiling point and shake kettle to thoroughly blend all ingredients and simmer without bubbling for five minutes longer. Serve from a deep platter or shallow vegetable dish. NEW ORLEANS, April 13.—The prohibition law is all wrong and smoking by girls is all right, says Miss Golda Schill, New Orleans, the only woman due to receive a degree at the law school graduation exercises at Louisiana State University in June.

Miss Schill has some pronounced ideas, but let her tell them:

"I am opposed to national prohibition because I don't think it can be enforced, because violation of the prohibition act lessens the respect for law, and last of all because if it could be enforced, it shouldn't be because drinking is not a fit subject for legislation."

"Drinking is not a moral question but one of hygiene. Only excessive drinking becomes a moral question."

"Women have as much right to smoke as men."

"It is not a sin for a woman to smoke or drink although she may suffer more serious physical consequences than a man and should be governed accordingly."

"It is hard taste for a woman to smoke or drink in the presence of conscientious persons who find it offensive."

Miss Schill intends to go into the practice of law when she is graduated.

"There is no more worthy profession than that of housekeeping," she said, "but I haven't spent five years in college just to be a housekeeper."

Naval Personnel Increase Okehed

Final Passage of Appropriation Bill Delayed By Opposition On Question Of Marines.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 13. (AP)—After approving an increase in the navy enlisted personnel from 83,250 to 88,000, the senate today deferred final action on the naval appropriation bill in the face of a fight by the group of senators who have been opposing the use of American marines in Nicaragua.

These senators, led by Senator Norris of Nebraska, a leader of the Republican independents, will undertake tomorrow to have inserted in the bill a provision that none of the funds for the marine corps can be used to maintain American marines in foreign lands for the purpose of supervising elections.

Immediately after Chairman Hale of the naval committee, began his explanation of the bill, Senator Norris brought up the Nicaraguan question, inquiring whether under the measure the marines could be maintained in foreign countries to supervise elections.

"There is no specific provision," Senator said, "The bill merely appropriates funds for the maintenance of the marines no matter where they may be stationed."

An indication of the fight that is to come on the House Bill proposing the construction of fifteen additional 10,000 ton cruisers was given by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, who wanted to know whether new construction was proposed in the bill. Senator Hale replied in the negative, but explained that the construction bill would be taken up by his committee early next week.

CONFER ON RULE

Appeal Of Case To Be Strongly Defended

AUSTIN, April 13. (AP)—Legal representatives of water control districts affected by the recent civil appeals court decision here declaring unconstitutional the law under which the San Saba district was created, conferred Friday on moves to defend the law on appeal of the case.

It is understood that a motion for rehearing will be filed in the appellate court and that the constitutionality of the law will be urged upon the supreme court if the motion fails.

Some of the districts represented at the conferences are organized under different laws, and some have been converted to water control districts since the law purporting to authorize creation of these was passed. These facts figure prominently in the defenses of the districts.

KING LEAVES

Italy In Demonstration Over Ruler's Safety

ROME, April 13. (AP)—King Victor Emmanuel, whose brief visit to Milan to inaugurate the industrial fair was made the occasion of a bombing outrage, left the Lombardy capital this afternoon on his return journey to Rome. At all the stations along the way he was greeted by enthusiastic demonstrations rejoicing over his escape.

Many thousands of residents of Rome, however, too impatient to wait for the arrival of the king tomorrow, gathered in the spacious Piazza Venezia around the Victor Emmanuel monument, near the top of the unknown soldier, to cheer the sovereign's name, while the government moving picture organization projected a film of the opening of the Milan fair by the king.

CROSS-EXAMINATION

Court Adjourns In Ouster Suit Trial

WAXAHACHIE, April 13. (AP)—Cross examination of County Attorney L. J. Woods of Navarro county was in progress when court adjourned Friday afternoon in the ouster suit against Woods on trial here. No session was held Friday morning on account of the absence of W. R. Gumma, court reporter, who was suffering from partial paralysis.

Woods testified in refutation of the testimony of numerous state witnesses and pointed out that the ouster suit was filed after he had brought suit for damages against the grand jury. He continued to deny that he had "corruptly cooperated with W. Lindsey Bibb, Odessa attorney, as charged."

WILLIAMS BOY DIES

Illness of Several Weeks Proves Fatal

John Elbert Williams, seven-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Williams of Lorenzo, died yesterday afternoon at a local hospital, following an illness which lasted for several weeks.

The body will be sent to Lorenzo by his undertakers, and funeral services will be held at Lorenzo at 3 p. m. today.

Besides his parents the boy is survived by three brothers.

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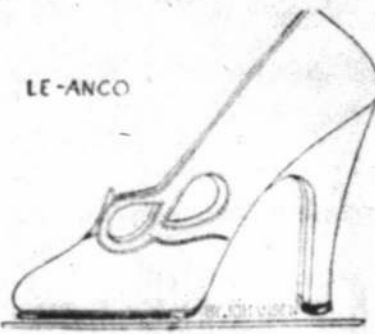

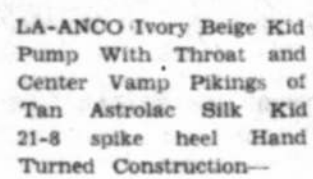

Heflin Makes New Attack On Smith

Outmaneuvers Senate Leaders Who Sought to Halt Speech; Says Campaign Fund Most Corrupt.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 13.—Outmaneuvering senate leaders who sought to delay his speech, Senator Heflin of Alabama, made a new attack today on Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, and brought into the range of his fire, Mayor James J. Walker of New York city.

The Alabamian charged the New York governor and candidate for the democratic presidential nomination is the head of "the Roman Catholic political machine in America," and asserted the Smith campaign fund was "the largest and most corrupt ever used."

Mayor Walker was declared by Heflin to be "a smooth artist, the slickest eel in the pond."

The Alabama senator urged Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, to introduce a new resolution for investigation of campaign expenditures and said Mayor Walker should be the first witness called, but he added that all of the "Tammanyites" should be examined by the senate committee he would have created.

Heflin charged and Senator Steck, Democrat, Iowa, vigorously denied the Smith forces had used huge sums in Iowa in the contest against Edwin T. Meredith for the Iowa delegation to the Democratic national convention at Houston.

Asserting Arkansas is ten to one against Smith, although the state is claimed for him, Heflin warned if the Arkansas delegation was delivered to "The appointed of the pope" there would be "more political bombast around here than you have ever seen."

The claim Oklahoma is for Smith was described by Heflin as "shocking."

SHIP MANY HOGS

Amherst Finds Swine A Source of Income

AMHERST, April 13.—Amherst is now shipping around three cars of hogs each week to California markets, and indications point to a large increase in hog shipments from here, as all farmers are increasing the number of brood sows. Hogs from this locality are sold when they reach the packers, top size from 180 to 220; and California buyers claim Amherst hogs are shipped more evenly at packer's top size than from any place they buy.

On account the Amherst country contains an abundance of feed, hogs are one of the best diversifying crops which can be marketed all around the year, giving the farmers money during the spring and summer which they would not have if they depended on cotton.

FRANKFORT, Ky., April 13 (AP)—Indictment today by the Franklin county grand jury of a former state auditor, his assistant, and twenty-three lobbyists at the 1926 general assembly caused intense excitement in political circles, the majority of party leaders expressing amazement.

General Topic—Transfiguration and Service.
Scripture Lesson—Mark 9:2-8, 17-18, 28-29.

2. And after six days Jesus taketh with him Peter, and James, and John, and bringeth them up to a high mountain apart by themselves, and he was transfigured before them.

3. And his garments became glistening, exceeding white, so as no fuller on earth can whiten them.

4. And there appeared unto them Elijah with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus.

5. And Peter answered and said to Jesus, Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; and let us make three tabernacles; one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah.

6. For he knew not what to answer; for they became sore afraid.

7. And there came a cloud overshadowing them; and there came a voice out of the cloud, This is my beloved Son; hear him.

8. And suddenly looking round about, they saw no one any more, save Jesus only with themselves.

17. And one of the multitude answered him, Teacher, I brought unto thee my son, who hath a dumb spirit.

18. And wheresoever it taketh him, it dasheth him down; and he foameth, and grindeth his teeth, and pineth away; and I spake to thy disciples that they should cast it out; and they were not able.

26. And when Jesus saw that the multitude came running together, he rebuked the unclean spirit, saying unto him, Thou dumb and deaf spirit, I command thee, come out of him, and enter no more into him.

27. But Jesus took him by the hand and raised him up; and he arose.

28. And when he was come into the house, his disciples asked him privately, How is it that we could not cast it out?

29. And he said unto them, This kind can come out by nothing, save prayer.

Time—The transfiguration occurred in the summer of A. D. 29, the third year of Christ's ministry.

Place—On one of the rugged ridges radiating from Mt. Hermon, and also at the foot of the ridge.

Golden Text—He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same shall bear much fruit; for apart from me ye can do nothing.—John 15:5.

Introduction
Our Lord and his disciples had gone to the most northern limit of Palestine, the region of Caesarea Philippi, and there we find them in today's lesson. We are to study the events which, of all the happenings of Christ's life save only the resurrection, must have seemed to the disciples the most surprising and the clearest evidence of his deity.

his was six days after Peter's bold and complete acknowledgment of Jesus as the Son of God, the prophesied Messiah, the Saviour of the world. That great confession was a fit prelude to the disclosure of Christ's deity in the wonderful event we are to study. Confession precedes illumination.

The Three Chosen Disciples, v. 2.
"Jesus taketh with him Peter, and James and John." Peter who loved Jesus so much, John whom Jesus loved so much, James who first of the disciples was to bear witness in martyrdom to his love for the Lord. These three were the inner circle of the Twelve, those closest to Jesus, the three who, with the exception of Paul, were to lead all Christians in the service of the Saviour. They had been singled out to witness the raising of the daughter of Jairus from the dead, and they alone were to share Christ's anguished vigil in Gethsemane.

"Apart by themselves." St. Luke (9:28) tells us that one object of Christ's own withdrawal was that he might engage in solitary prayer. We may infer, therefore (comparing Luke 17), that evening was the time of this solitary retirement. The fact that it was night must have infinitely enhanced the grandeur of the scene.

Moses and Elijah, v. 4.
"And there appeared unto them Moses and Elijah." Moses the great law giver, Elijah the great prophet. In Jesus was the fulfillment of both the law and the prophets. Both had gone to the Glory land from the same general section, the rough mountains east of the Jordan river. But they had gone years apart. Moses had been invited by Jehovah to the top of Pisgah and there he died and had a celestial funeral. Elijah had been translated, going to heaven in a whirlwind (2 Kings 2:11), accompanied by a chariot of fire and horses of fire.

Both are alive, conscious and are deeply concerned about the things taking place in this world. The conversation of Jesus with Moses and Elijah is as true a narrative as is the account of the baptism of Jesus or any other incident in his life.

"Three Tabernacles," v. 5.
"Let us make three tabernacles." The Feast of the Tabernacle was near at hand. The Jews celebrated this feast in the fall when all of the fruits of the earth were gathered. All of the male population were to gather at Jerusalem and live in booths during the continuation of the feast.

And note how unselfish was his request. He requested that he and his fellow disciples should be allowed to make three tabernacles, one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elijah. He and James

and John would dwell out in the cold.

The Sleepy Disciples, v. 6.
"For he knew not what to answer." Peter was in half dazed condition because he was so tired and sleepy (Luke 9:32). There is no wonder that Peter did not know what to say. He and the other disciples missed a part of it because they went to sleep. There had been a long, hard climb, and they were tired. It was probably far into the night. Just as it was on that other occasion when they went to sleep in the garden of Gethsemane he found them asleep three times (Mark 14:37, 40, 41). Sleepy Christians miss a good many things.

The Voice of God, v. 7.
"And there came a voice out of the cloud." It was the voice of God the Father. Always keeping watch above his own, the Father is deeply concerned for the Son and for those whom he had come to save.

A cloud settled on the tabernacle in the wilderness to indicate the presence of Jehovah. When Solomon built the temple a cloud filled it to indicate the presence of Jehovah (1 Kings 8:10). These three men with Jesus knew the Old Testament scriptures and they understood the cloud to indicate the presence of Deity. It is therefore natural that they feared as they entered into the cloud. (Luke 9:34).

The Afflicted Boy, v. 17.
"Master, I brought unto thee my son." The fame of Jesus had spread far and wide. Here in the land of Syria comes a man with his afflicted son. Jesus was in the land in order to get away from the multitude, but that was impossible. The man whose son was so sorely afflicted had no doubt heard that Jesus was in the region and so he had brought his son to Jesus. Finding him gone, he appealed to the disciples to heal him.

But they could not do it. Why? They had cured the sick. They had been on tours and healed many. But they could do nothing in this instance.

Jesus The Healer, v. 27.
"But Jesus took him by the hand and raised him up." The scribes had gotten in their work. They had been asking all kinds of embarrassing questions. The disciples were powerless because they did not have sufficient faith. "Oh, Faithless Generation," said Jesus. They had been trying in their own power to solve the problem.

Jesus is the solution to all of the world's problems. "Bring him to me," said Jesus. The same gracious words are spoken to us in this generation. Bring to Jesus your problems, problems of suffering, disease, sin, demon-possessed people.

Life After Death.
"There appeared unto them Elijah with Moses." Death does not end life. The grave is the robing room where we dress for eternity. Death is the servant who opens the door into our Father's house. Victor Hugo in his later years said, "When I go down to the grave, I can say like so many others, 'I have finished my day's work, but I cannot say, 'I have finished my life.' My day's work will begin the next morning. My tomb is not a blind alley, it is a thoroughfare; it closes with the twilight to open with the dawn." A Scotchman said, "It matters little to me whether I live or die. If I die I will be with Jesus, and if I live, Jesus will be with me."

The bodies of the three victims were found in one room of the mine after rescue workers had labored for hours to reach them. Those killed were William McFeneric, engineer of the company; Ross Winthrop, his assistant and D. M. Hall, assistant mine foreman.

Difference Over Fight Reduction Is Threshed Out

Administration and Chamber of Commerce of United States Tangle Up In Senate Committee.

WASHINGTON, April 13. — The administration and the chamber of commerce of the United States fought out their differences over tax reduction before the senate finance committee today as the chamber repeated its demand for a total slash of \$400,000,000 or double that proposed by the treasury.

In a heated reply to the chamber's program, Under Secretary Mills declared it would force a treasury deficit, called for a complete change of treasury and staff off debt retirement.

Chamber's Proposals. The tax cut program of the chamber, supported by some democrats of the committee, called for a 10 percent corporation levy instead of the present 12 1/2 percent rate and the 12 percent figure proposed by Mr. Mellon; repeal of all remaining war excise taxes on particular businesses; and repeal of the federal inheritance tax.

Mr. Mills declared the chamber's plan, first announced last August, was based on the supposition that there would be a surplus of \$400,000,000 available next year for tax reduction. He said the chamber now admitted that this amount would not be available but that it proposed, nevertheless, to make tax cut of that figure by carrying over surpluses from year to year "in violation of sound business principles" and by using war debt payments now applied to debt retirement.

Claim Effort Confession. The statement of the chamber today is a complete confession of error, Mr. Mills declared. "It is carefully masked retreat but a retreat nevertheless. The chamber has completely shifted its position. It no longer says that \$400,000,000 is available for tax reduction but says that \$400,000,000 can be cut if the government changes its policy of closing its books at the end of each year and slows up debt retirement."
