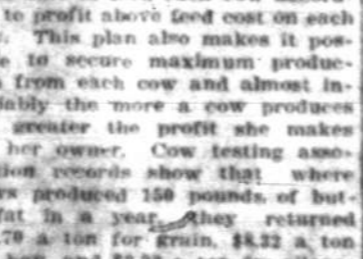

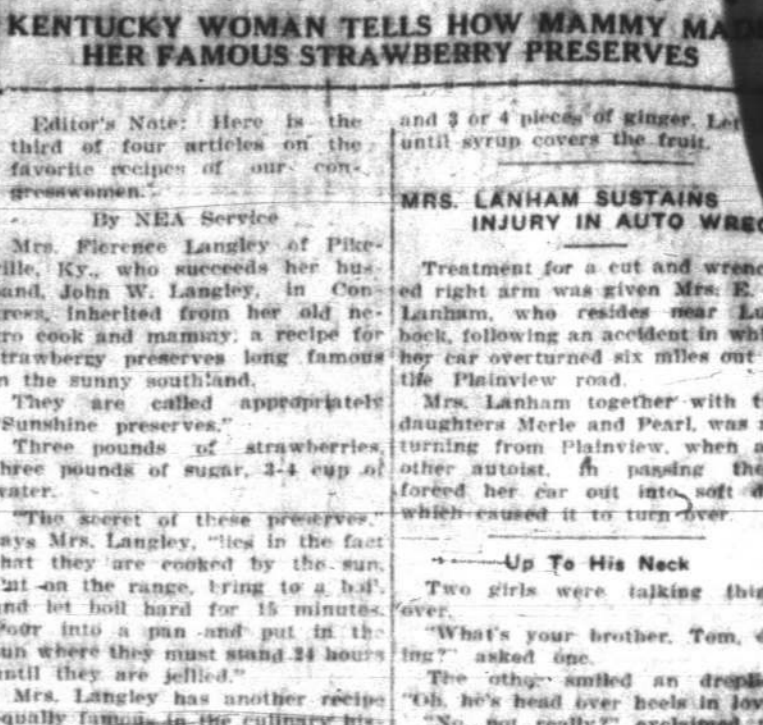

## MEXICAN ROW BETWEEN CATHOLICS AND GOVERNMENT MAY BE SETTLED SOON

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Aug. 8.—The newspaper Excelsior says it has received information that it is possible there may be in prospect an adjustment of the religious controversy between the Mexican government and the Catholic church which resulted in the new religious regulations a year ago. The paper also says it hears it is possible that the Catholic archbishops and bishops who were deported from Mexico after the Guadaluajara train outrage, several months ago, may be permitted to return to Mexico.

(The outrage to which reference is made occurred in April near Lamon, when outlaws attacked a passenger train. They slaughtered the military escort, set the train on fire and shot some of the passengers as they tried to escape. The Mexican authorities charged that members of the Mexican Episcopate inspired this attack and a number of archbishops and bishops were deported.)

It was announced semi-officially tonight that the department of the interior has no official information that the deported Mexican prelates are preparing to return to Mexico.

It was added that the department had no application from them for permission to return. None of the government departments thus far has revealed the government's plans or changes of policy, if any. Foreign Minister Saenz, who was General Obregon's campaign manager in the presidential contest, has been at San Antonio, Texas, where it is reported here, he conferred with the banished Mexican prelates. The Excelsior expresses the opinion that this conference possibly was for the purpose of paving the way for the return of the prelates and says that it may even lead to a settlement of the stalemate in the religious controversy, which resulted in the suspension of services, conducted by priests, in the churches. Archbishop Mora Del Rio, of Mexico City, and other leading figures in the Catholic episcopate of Mexico, who were deported after the Guadaluajara train attack, denied the government's charge that they were responsible.

For the so-called Catholic revolution, President Calles recently ordered the release from prisons of all the Catholic laymen charged with sedition. He announced the reason for the release was that the Catholic revolution had ended. This opinion is expressed by some political observers that if the government intends to permit the prelates to return to Mexico it can use the same reason as in the case of the release of the laymen.

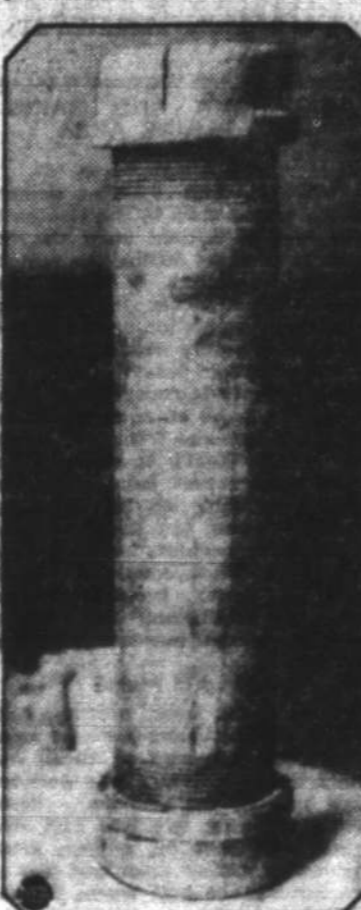

14,000 Police On Guard NE WYORK, Aug. 8. (AP)—Fourteen thousand police today continued their guarding of traffic centers, homes of the mayor and prominent citizens, banks and federal buildings against the depredations of bombers.

Although no act of violence was reported following upon the bombing Friday night of two subway stations, with a casualty list of a score of injured, police were still alert. During the day the search for the persons who placed the bombs in the subway veered to Boston.

Police reported that a detective had been sent there to arrest a man whose automobile, identified by license plates, was said to have been outside one of the subway stations just before the explosions. Several Theories Given Police Commissioner Warren said that the force was still working on four theories of the explosions, with "Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers" just one of them.

Paris taxicab drivers and 1,000 Colorado coal miners went on protest strike. A group of New York radicals and labor leaders estimated that 500,000 workers would strike today. A general strike was scheduled in Montevideo, Uruguay.

While workers in Buenos Aires returned to work at the end of a three-day strike, another strike was planned for Wednesday. Newspapers in several of the world's foremost capitals devoted first place to the Sacco-Vanzetti case. The Philadelphia American embassies and consulates.

Many Sympathizers Protest Among many protests reported yesterday were mass meetings of sympathizers at Vancouver, B. C. and Birmingham, England; a number of sporadic demonstrations in Paris where only the taxi drivers responded to a general strike call; and a plea to the American consul at Plymouth, England, by a group of revolutionists.

In Philadelphia, where the Emanuel Presbyterian church was damaged by a bomb Friday night, three dock workers were arrested while distributing literature calling for a general protest strike.

As an aftermath of a demonstration on Boston Common Sunday, Edward Milton James a wealthy radical, arraigned for inciting to riot and assault, refused to plead, stating he would not stand up "before murderers" and in preference to a \$75 fine took a sentence of 90 days in jail.

Responding to a call from the Boston Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee to liberals throughout the country, a march was held in Boston in a monster demonstration tomorrow, the New York committee announced that several thousand New Yorkers would take part and that his transportation had been arranged for the same without other means of travel.

Responding to the Boston committee's call for a "death watch" over Charleston prison, Miss Rose Baron, secretary of the New York committee, said "Trains, buses, automobiles and some on foot are headed for the Massachusetts institute."

CROPS DEPEND ON FUTURE RAINFALL

WEEVILS AND WORMS DAMAGE OKLAHOMA AND RAINS AID PLAINS AREA

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Aug. 8.—The outcome of the cotton crop in the Southwest will depend largely upon the frequency of rains during the remainder of the season. R. C. Andrews, district manager of the American Railway Association, predicted in his semi-monthly report today. "Considering weevil and boll worm activity is reported in Oklahoma and some other northern sections and damage from this section is now very heavy in southern districts," the report says. "Showers over practically all of the belt during the past few days are causing much uneasiness as such weather affords ideal condition for the rapid and heavy propagation and spread of weevil and leaf worms. Root rot is also increasing in some sections."

Rains Aid Plains "Good rains over northern and western Texas have been of much benefit to the crop in those districts where moisture was deficient until late in the season. These crops, however, are late and their success depends on a long growing season before frost and also on the absence of boll worm infestation."

The outcome of the crop will depend practically altogether from now on on the frequency of rains. Moisture is generally sufficient to mature the crop and every rain will take its toll of damage. Picking and ginning operations have now advanced to south-central sections of Texas and will become heavy within 10 days or two weeks."

Exports have offered 10 cents per bushel over the Chicago market for Southwestern wheat and mills have paid even more, comparatively small, Mr. Andrews said. Exports, however, for the last half of July were considerably greater than for the first half of the month and indications point to about the same volume for August unless there is a change in market conditions which will have the effect of stimulating foreign buying.

One accumulation and elevator stocks at Gulf ports have been reduced to much smaller proportions. Advice has been received that the new loading boat of the Terminal Elevator at Houston is completed and that two boats can be accommodated at the plant at one time.

### MANY ENTER SLATON'S PRETTY LAWN CONTEST WHICH CLOSES NEXT MONDAY

SLATON, Aug. 8.—The pretty lawn contest which is being sponsored in Slaton by the Chamber of Commerce will close Monday, August 15, at which time six judges will make a tour of inspection through the city to select the four winners of cash prizes offered by that organization.

The work which will confront the judges will probably be rather difficult. A total of thirty-seven lawns have been entered in the contest, and close competition is expected, according to J. T. Overby, chairman of the committee which arranged the detailed plans for the race for prizes. The prize winners will win with the full knowledge that they did so by close margins.

**Water and Trees**  
Having an unlimited supply of city water at their disposal and with special irrigation rates offered to home beautifiers by the city government, the contestants have been able to keep their trees, flowers and hedges abundantly supplied with water all through the spring and summer, though for the last two months ample rain has fallen and little irrigation has been necessary.

The contest soon to end is the first one ever conducted here by the Chamber of Commerce, though for many years it has been the annual policy to encourage home beautification by giving it much publicity and furnishing helpful information. The results accomplished this year, it seems very apparent, are far greater than in any former year, and exceed the highest hopes of officials when the contest was announced early last spring.

**Every One Entering Meets**  
Not only have the residents who entered the contest brought about vast improvements in the appearance of their home premises, but their efforts have inspired their neighbors to take a fling at home beautifying, also, though not entering the contest. Many of these neighbors of the contestants have said "We are getting ready to make a good showing next year by getting this year." Expressions of this nature the preparatory work done this year point to a much larger number of entries in a similar contest next year if one is conducted. And the success of this year's work will doubtless lead to its continuance each year thereafter.

It has been estimated that as a direct or an indirect outgrowth of this season's prep work, the Chamber of Commerce is responsible for approximately 2,000 shade trees having been set around various Slaton homes this year. An inestimable number of all kinds of flowers, several new hedges and many grass lawns have been planted. Slaton residents began several years ago to realize the importance
