SAN ANGELO BANKER SHOOTS FOUR

Mexico Paid Four U. S. Senators \$1,215,000.00 Washington Paper Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—The Mexican government ordered paid an aggregate sum of \$1,215,000 to four United States senators in furtherance of propaganda favorable to the Calles government in America, the Washington Herald announced today.

Photostatic copies of Mexican documents, secured from the secret files of the Mexican foreign office with the names of the senators deleted.

The Herald states the names of the accused senators will be furnished to congress if desired.

200 Dead in Caspian Sea

MOSCOW, Dec. 9.—A pitched battle between hundreds of fishermen marooned on ice floes in the Caspian Sea and bands of marauding pirates seeking to plunder the helpless, half-starved fishermen, was reported here today.

Seven hundred fishing boats are marooned and about 200 fishermen are believed to be dead from exposure and starvation.

Four hundred and sixty persons have been rescued. Property loss is estimated at about 6,000,000 rubles.

SAN ANGELO, Dec. 9.—Wm. Schneemann, 45, president; Karl H. Word, 50, cashier; and Ira Swope, 30, assistant cashier, all of the Guaranty Bond Bank, are in San Angelo hospitals this afternoon expected to die as the result of a shooting which occurred in the executive offices of the bank here at 11:40 o'clock this morning.

Mrs. Selma Walling, a young married woman, is suffering a slight wound in a lower limb, and Earl Gibson, filling station operator is also suffering from a leg wound.

The shooting occurred in the bank as Schneemann, Word and Swope were talking. Word is alleged to have done the shooting with a .45 Colt's special automatic which contained nine shells.

Word is expected to die. He is being kept alive by artificial means in order that a blood transfusion may be made. He refused to make a statement when given a chance here this afternoon. He merely shook his head when members of the district attorney's office called at his bedside in a local hospital. He shot himself twice, it is alleged, in the abdomen.

Schneemann, president of the bank for slightly more than one year, sustained four bullet wounds; one just above the stomach, which is expected to prove fatal; another above the heart; and two slight flesh wounds. His condition is critical and doctors hold out little hope for his recovery.

Swope, who was to have been made cashier of the bank, sustained a bullet wound in his left side. It is believed the missile missed his lung but he is in a dangerous condition and little hope is held for his recovery.

Mrs. Walling and Gibson were

struck by the bullets which Word sent into his own body after shooting down Schneemann and Swope. They were slight flesh wounds.

On Thursday, it was learned from bank officials, it was voted at a meeting of the board of directors to make a change in the institution and place Swope in the cashier's chair. Word, Schneemann and Swope were talking together when it is said Word pulled a pistol and began firing.

No charges had been filed by county officers at a late hour this afternoon. They were being withheld pending the death or recovery of the victims.

The bank was closed this afternoon because all executives of the institution were in hospitals as the result of the shooting, but the bank will be reopened Saturday morning for business.

Presidents of all other San Angelo banks this afternoon made statements placing faith in the financial condition of the Guaranty Bond Bank, declaring they were positive that the bank was in good condition and that there was no cause for alarm.

Gibson, a filling station operator, who was preparing to make a deposit, declared that about six shots were fired. It was not learned, however, just how many times the pistol was fired.

1928 TUBKING AN EPIDEMIC IN OCEAN FLIGHTS

(By International News Service)

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 9.—Glenn L. Martin, Cleveland aircraft manufacturer, has voiced the belief that the world will see an epidemic of long distance and trans-oceanic flights next year.

Mr. Martin, back from Washington where he had been conferring with government authorities concerning construction of navy planes, declared that if the number of inquiries being received by the meteorological department and other branches of government service were any indication, there would be at least 50 long distance flights attempted next year.

"Next year's flights will receive more preparation than the ones made or attempted this year," Martin said. "The pilots are getting set now. This is a hopeful sign."

In this connection it was recalled that the \$25,000 offer of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce for the first non-stop flight from Paris to Cleveland still stands. An attempt to win this prize will undoubtedly be made next summer, as European flyers are just as anxious to make new records as American flyers.

There are also indications, Martin said, that large amounts of capital will be invested next year both in the manufacture and commercial operation of aircraft.

"The manufacture of aircraft appeals to many as an art and as a business," he said. "Unfortunately a great number of those who are planning to manufacture aircraft do not realize, perhaps, that it requires very exact and

hard work and a tremendous amount of attention to details.

"A realization of these things may cause some prospective manufacturers of aircraft to change their minds about the attractiveness of the business, and some of them may lose money at it before they get through, but nothing can stop the manufacture of aircraft from becoming one of the great industries of the country."

Martin has an order for 100 all-metal, three purpose planes for the navy. The first plane is scheduled to be assembled March 1st. On a previous order from the navy the Martin factory were turning out five planes a week this fall.

PARIS STYLE HINTS

PARIS, Dec. 9.—The cape is cutting an important figure in the demi-season collection now being shown in Paris salons, besides perhaps hinting at a tremendous winter ahead of us.

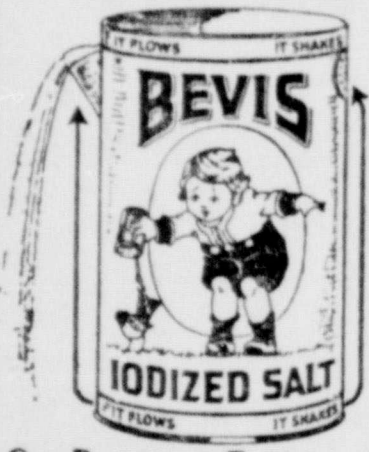
