WE'RE BORROWING some material this week from the DeLeon Free Press, brought to us by our friend Jackie Morgan, who is a native of DeLeon.

It seems that Jackie's grandmother, Viann Morgan, owned a parrot who became quite famous in the Central Texas community.

The parrot had been brought to Texas in the late 1800s by Mrs. Morgan's sister Abbie, who was a Methodist missionary to Monterey, Mexico.

Polly lived the first 25 years with Morgan's great-grandparents. Living in a religious family, he did not pick up the salty language often associated with parrots, but did develop an extensive vocabulary.

When the parrot was hungry, he let it be known by repeating "Have you had your supper?" again and again.

Once, the folks were dressed for church when the preacher dropped by for a visit. "Have you had your supper?" he heard from the kitchen.

"Why no, I haven't," replied the preacher, enroute to the kitchen. The ladies hurriedly began to prepare a meal, much to Polly's delight.

When Polly came to live with the Morgans, he took to his new rural home and quickly learned the ways of farmers of that era.

He passed the warm days of summer in a mulberry tree from whence he summoned the dog, called the cows and tantalized the family cat.

The cat considered himself a fowl-devouring predator, and stalked Polly to the mulberry tree. With his tail lashing furiously, the cat moved in for the kill. Polly flogged the cat, notched his ear permanently and sent him under the house in wild retreat. The cat heard one taunting refrain from his place of safety: "Have you had your supper?"

Polly loved to shake hands with friends, but he'd warn a stranger, "Look out! I'll bite you!" He was true to his word—he could remove a healthy plug of finger with the skill of a surgeon. There are probably people around to this day who will testify to the accuracy of that statement, and own the scar to prove it.

When Polly was young, one of his wings was kept clipped to discourage his flying and in his later life he lost most of his interest in aerobatics, and he walked around the yard mostly. On one occasion he was enroute from his mulberry tree to the house and he was confronted by an old chicken hen.

He'd zig, she'd zag, and then they'd both zag. When Polly tired of the game, he extended a foot toward the hen. "Howdy!" he said.

The old hen lost all interest in hemming him up and returned to the chicken yard.

He was a curiosity in the De Leon area and people from all around came to catch Polly's act. He appreciated the attention as long as they didn't crowd him, and always told them, "Good Bye!"

Once when the Morgans forgot to bring him in for the night, Polly had a harrowing experience.

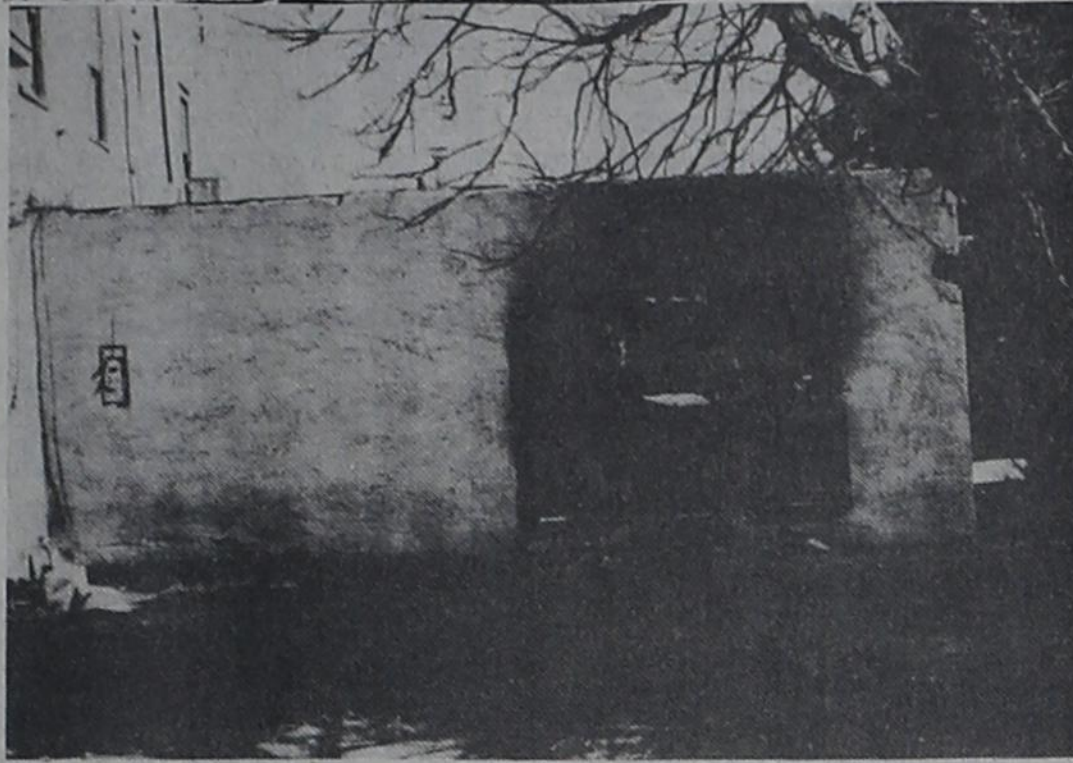
An owl almost got him and next morning a search party fanned out to look for Polly. He was located in the field beneath the stubble, and fear was in his eyes and in his voice.

He was in dire need of a cup of coffee, and he got it. (Polly liked to dunk pastries and bread in his morning coffee.)

Polly passed away in 1948 at the ripe old age of 48. A velvet lined shoe box was his casket and a graveside service was conducted.

Polly's final resting place is at the foot of Uncle Jack Morton's grave in the De Leon Cemetery.

DESPITE OPPOSITION

Court Re-Affirms School Fund Plan

Parmer County Commissioners met with a group of county residents who were opposed to the dividing up of the Permanent School Fund as voted by the commissioners at a meeting in February, this past Monday in the County Courtroom.

Attorney Corky Green of Muleshoe, representing the opposing citizens, said the group was asking the court first to reconsider their decision to disperse the money, and if they could not do that, then "to at least follow the constitution and do it legally."

A lengthy and sometimes heated discussion involving members of the county school boards, superintendents, the commissioners, County Attorney Charles Aycock and other members of the audience followed Green's statements to the court.

Discussion centered on the fact that, as County Judge Porter Roberts stated, he felt bound by the motion passed on February 13, 1989, to write checks to the four county school districts, whether or not the schools had submitted a plan for capital improvements or reduction of bonded indebtedness.

According to an opinion from Texas Attorney General Jim Maddox given to Aycock in 1985, the permanent school funds can only be used either for reducing bonded indebtedness, or for making permanent improvements by the schools.

Statements were made by several of those attending as to the fact that due to the current status of the state's economic condition, they feared that the state might take steps to take the permanent school funds from counties which still had the funds, and the schools would be the losers.

It had been the assumption by the commissioners that before the funds would be touched, a bill would have to pass both houses of the Texas legislature, with even the possibility of an amendment to the state constitution.

Texico Man Accident Victim

A Texico resident, Albert Ancira Glavan, 33, was killed when a pickup struck him as he walked west along U.S. 60-70-84 in Texico last Friday night. He was the brother of Frank Galvan of Bovina.

The vehicle, a 1987 Chevrolet, was driven by Douglas Barnes of Lazbuddie, Texas. Police said the driver had not been drinking.

Galvan, who was wearing dark clothing, was walking west in the outside lane of traffic when he was struck from behind, police reports said. Joe Thomas, medical examiner, declared him dead at the scene, due to massive head injuries. The accident occurred at 8:10 p.m.

The body was taken to the Steed-Todd Funeral Home in Clovis.

The case was handled by Brent Byrum, Texico marshal, as well as officer Allan Collier of the State Police, and Curry County deputy Angelo Casarez.

Group Attends P-TO Meeting

The first meeting of the Parent-Teachers Organization was held on Wednesday of last week and was termed successful with forty people attending.

The next meeting will be March 29, following the dismissal of school in the afternoon. At that time, officers will be elected and bi-laws adopted. The meeting will be held at the high school cafeteria.

Activities will be planned for the month of April.

The P-TO got off to a good start and everyone is encouraged to be present for all meetings.

If this were the case, those dealing with the fund felt that the county commissioners would have had time to meet and disperse the funds before they would be lost.

"Have you considered the fact that you divide up this million dollars in interest every ten or 12 years, and that if you break up the fund now, you will be killing the goose that laid the golden egg?" asked longtime county banker Bob Anderson.

Anderson said he felt that the fund provided a nice back-up for the schools in case of an emergency.

"What constitutes an emergency?" asked one member of the audience.

"Probably something like what happened at Matador (whose school was destroyed by a tornado several years ago)," replied another.

"That's what we carry insurance for, to the tune of about \$40,000 per year," responded Friona School Superintendent Hal Ratcliff.

As to the schools providing plans for the use of the permanent school fund either for capital improvements or to repay bonds, each of the superintendents said that they had expected to do this.

"When we left here a month ago, we were under the assumption that we would be required to submit such plans to the court, in order to get the money," said Bovina Superintendent Bob Owen.

"We will have a plan," said Owen, who pointed out that the Bovina School board had retained an architect to work on some improvements their school needed.

Temperatures Return To Mild Levels

After several days of reminding residents that it's still winter-time by the calendar, the temperatures have warmed back up nicely.

In fact, the mercury climbed to a high of 91 at Friona's weather station on Saturday, March 11. At Amarillo, the high temperature set a record, and was one of the earliest dates on record for above 90.

Main concern at this time is the lack of moisture, which has become a problem virtually statewide. The area is desperately needing some moisture, to help with the farming community.

As to the fund providing emergency benefits to the schools, Owen indicated that Bovina had received approximately \$11,000 per year in interest, as its annual share from the fund's proceeds.

"\$11,000 won't keep our schools open," Owen said.

During the course of the conversation, Commissioner Tom Ware of Bovina told Green and his clients "What you're telling us is that we had the sense to take care of this fund for a number of years, but now we don't have the sense to distribute it (properly)."

After the commissioners recessed to Judge Porter Roberts' office to draft a new motion, Ware made a motion to replace the one that the court had passed a month earlier.

This motion spoke to clarifying the division of the school funds, setting out that the schools should submit a plan for either capital improvements or bond payments prior to receiving the money.

Before the money is distributed, the four county schools must come up with a "census" of scholastics. It is thought that the schools will divide up the almost million-dollar pot roughly as follows: Friona, 51 per cent; Farwell, 19 per cent; Bovina, 19 per cent and Lazbuddie, 11 per cent.

Judge Roberts had said recently that the four schools had divided up \$1,013,759.02 in interest from the school fund from 1975 through 1988.

The school fund has been invested in a certificate of deposit in the county's official depository, maturing every six months. The six-month period ends March 31, 1989, and Roberts said that due to the impending break-up of the fund, the court might consider making the new term for a shorter time, perhaps 90 days.

Deadline Approaches

Deadline for filing for a position on the City Council is March 22 at 5 p.m.

The terms expire for two city councilmen. They are Galen Hromas and Earl Whitten. Hromas has filed for re-election and Elton Venable has also filed.

Deadline for filing for the school board is also March 22. No candidates for the board position had been reported to the Blade as of this writing.

Boosters Will Discuss Banquet

From The Chief's Desk

Our topic this week will be something that I have discussed a few weeks back and that is out-of-state registration and tinted windows.

As I have previously stated in the paper, a person has thirty days after setting up residence in Texas to register their vehicle in the state of Texas. This means that if a person lives in Texas, then they must have Texas license plates, regardless if they own property in any other state.

If you work in another state, but live in Texas, you must have Texas license plates, unless you drive a company vehicle home.

I have stopped several vehicles and warned the owners about these out-of-state tags, but people aren't registering their vehicles, so it will become necessary for me to start issuing citations starting March 20, 1989, for persons violating this law.

I will be receiving a window trans-meter sometime this week, and this instrument will measure the amount of light that passes through the tinted windows, to determine if they are legal, or not legal.

I will be stopping all vehicles with tinted windows and checking them, in the next few weeks. If the tinting is found to be illegal, the owner of the vehicle will have ten days to remove the tint from the windows.

I will keep a list of vehicles

checked and the dates that they were checked. If you would like to have your windows checked, please call the Police Department for an appointment.

Once a vehicle has been checked and found to be illegal, you will have ten days to remove the tint or a citation will be issued, and a citation will be issued every time the vehicle is driven while the window tint is illegal.

As always, your cooperation in these matters will be deeply appreciated.

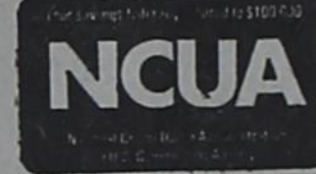

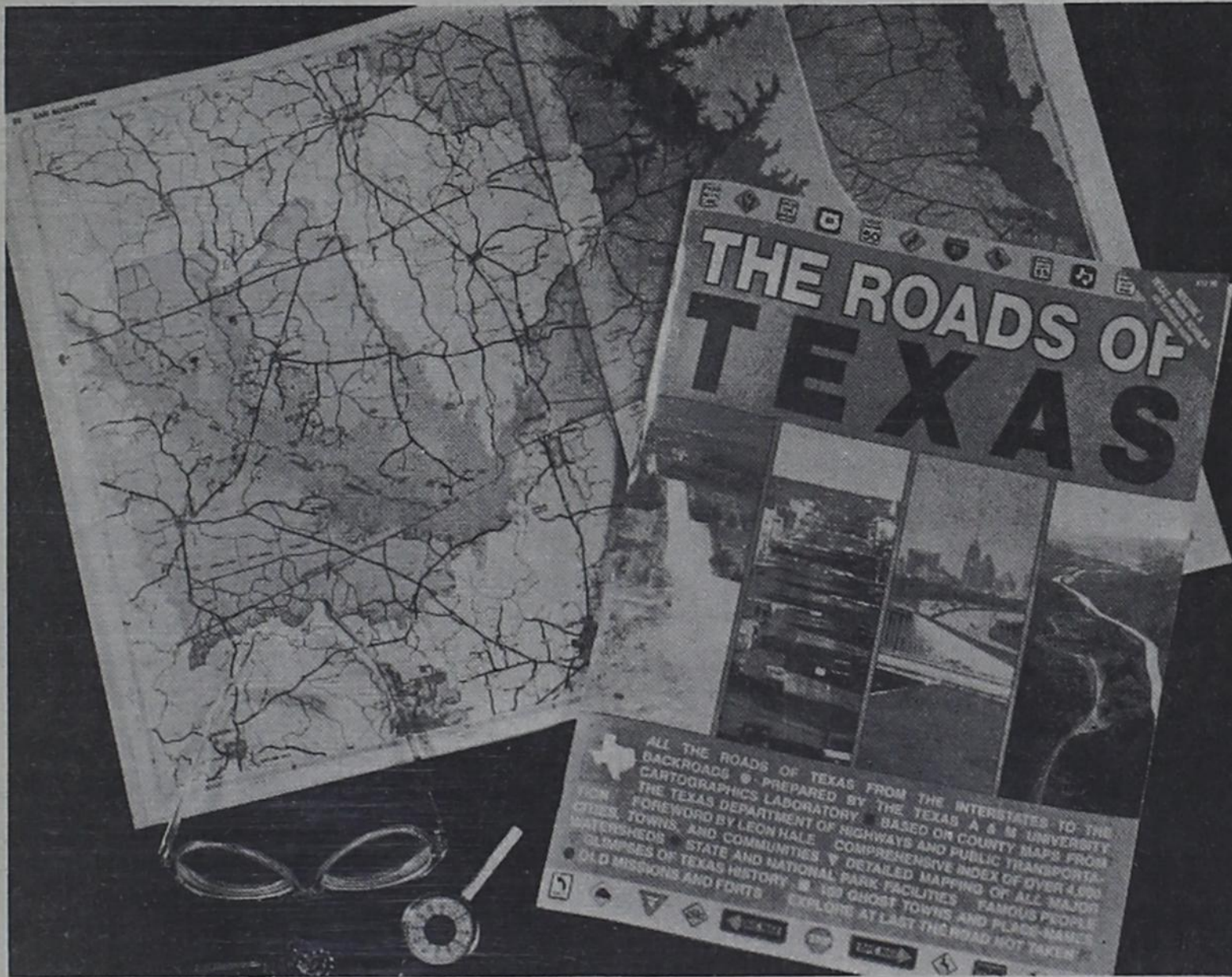

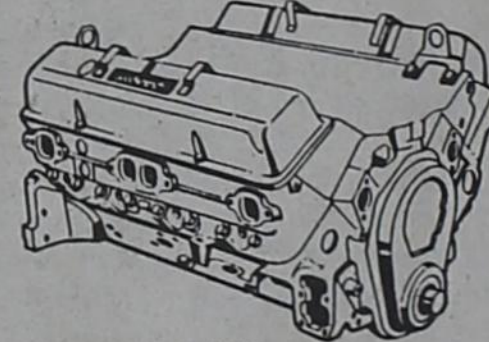

Bovina To Host Two Track Meets

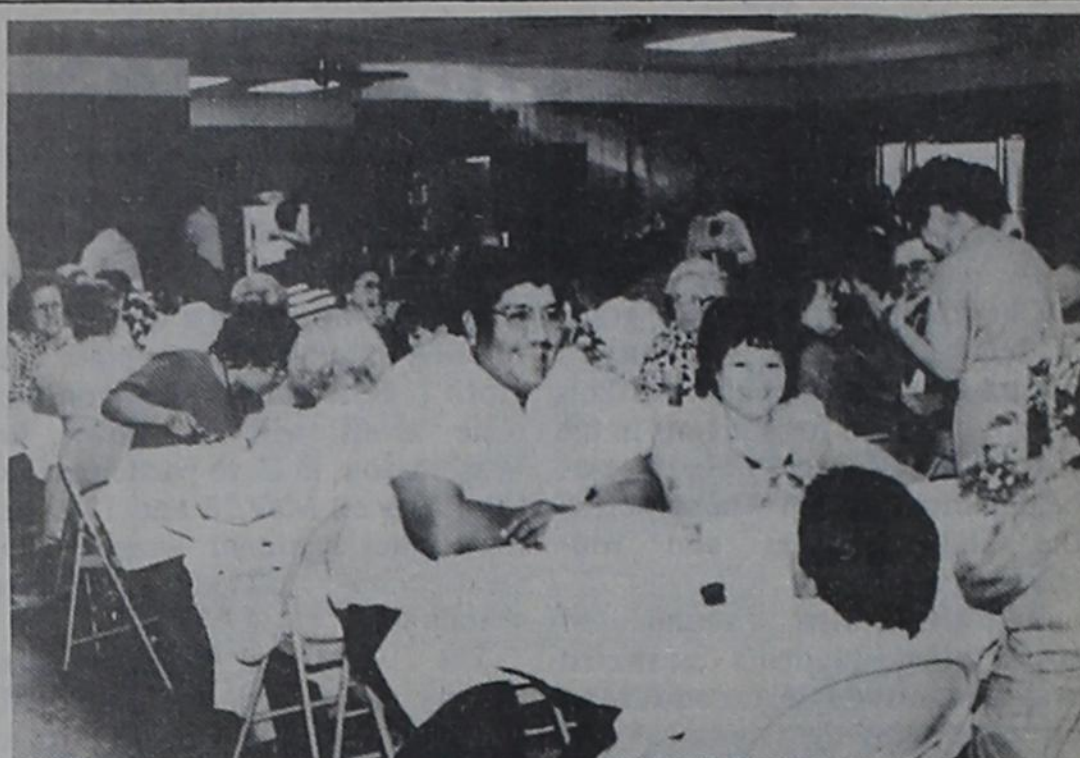
Bovina will be the site of two track meets this week. Bovina Junior High will be having a dual track meet with Farwell Junior High on Friday, March 17.

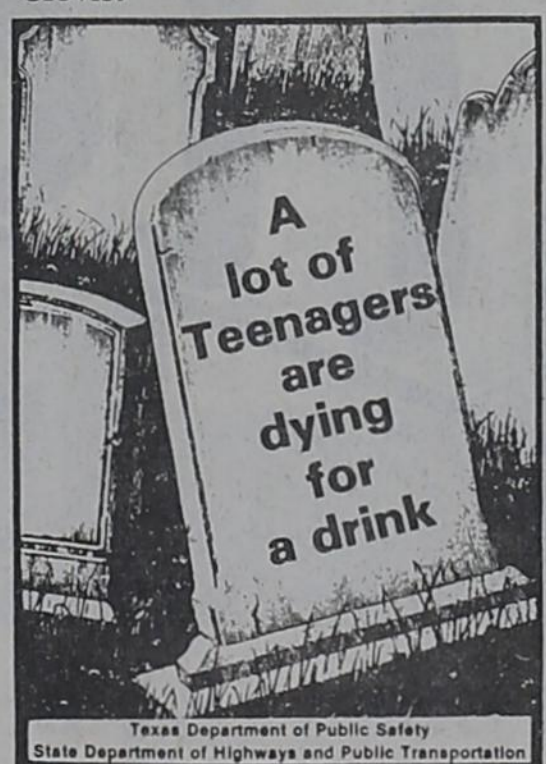

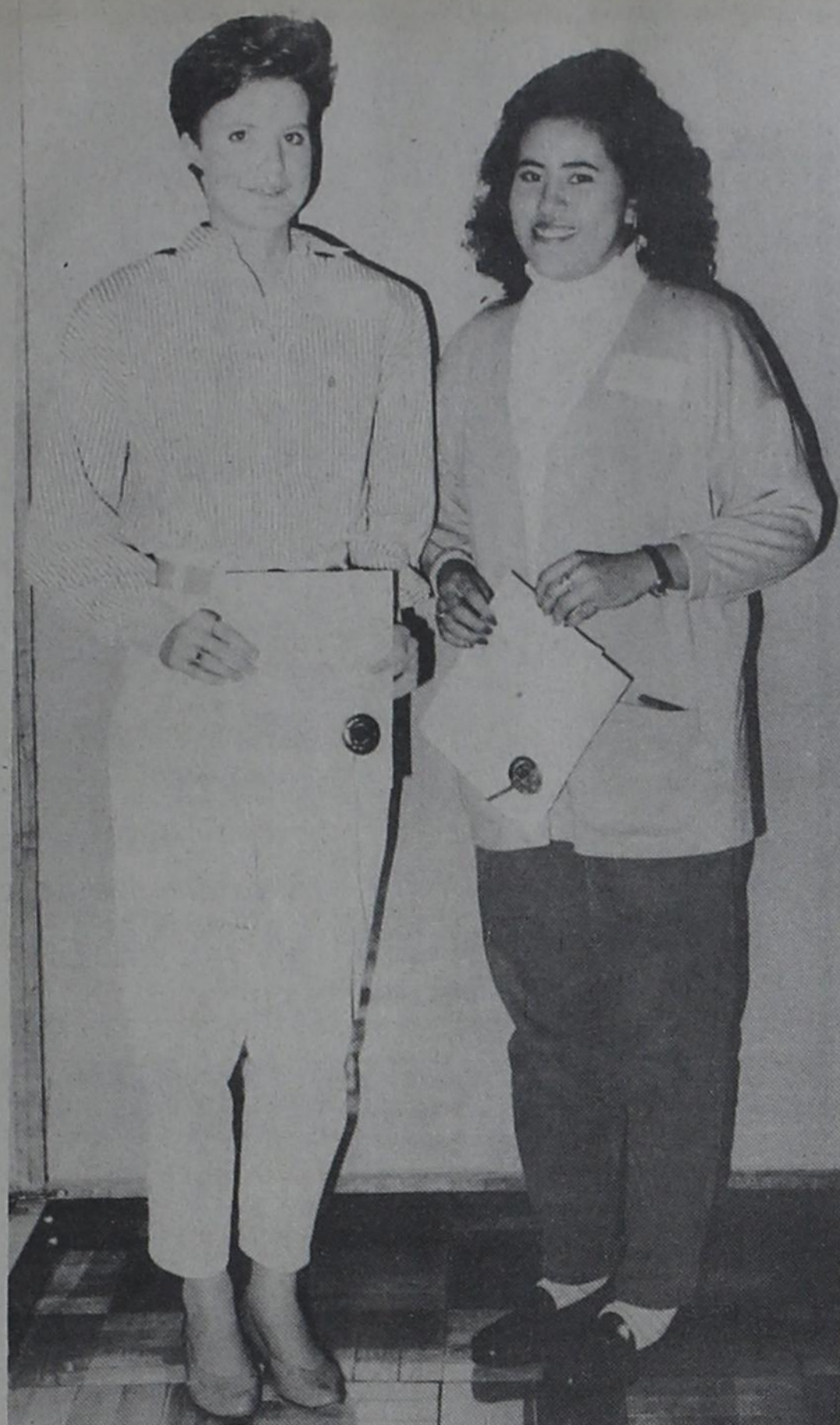

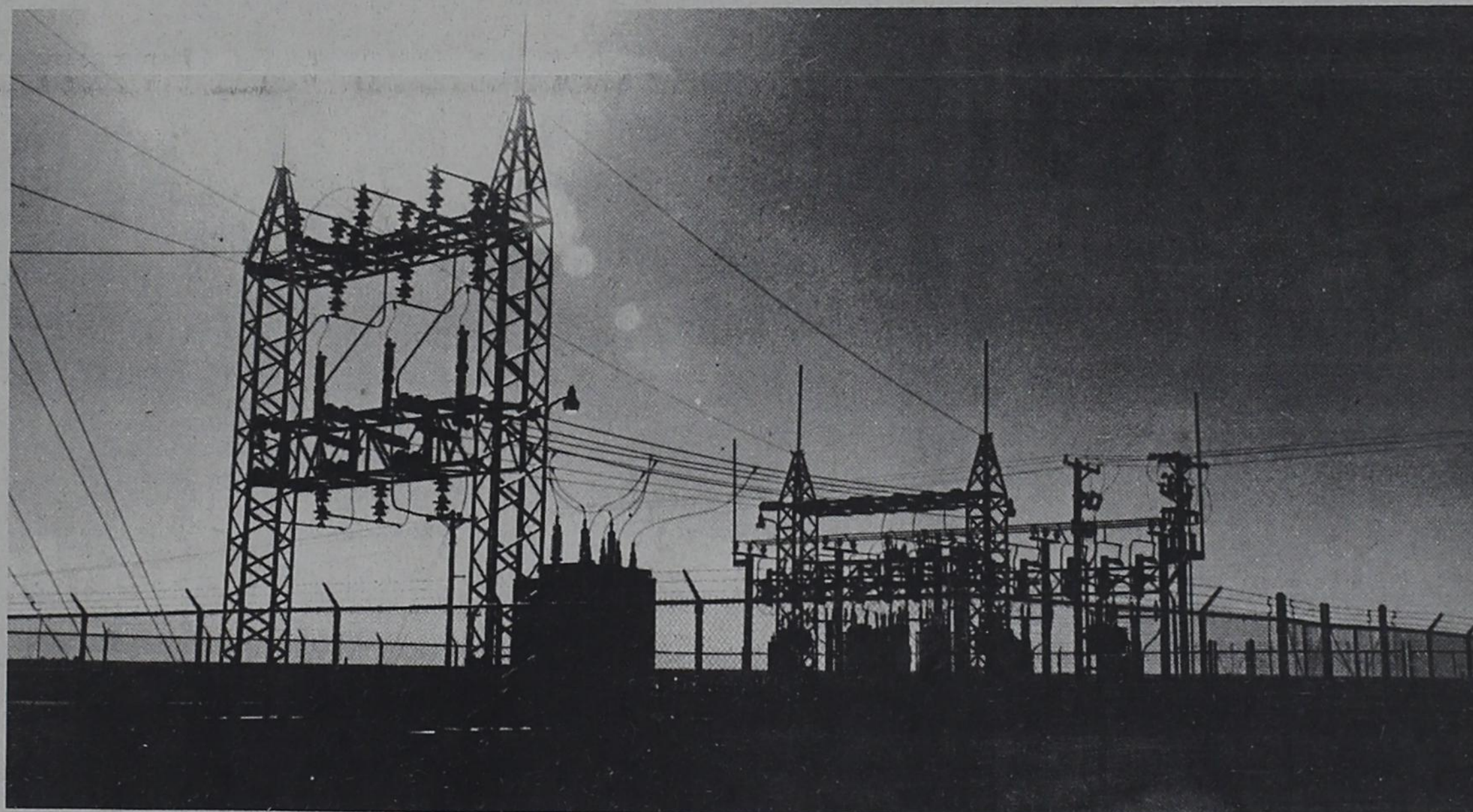
