Simple Statement of Facts About Highway Amendment

Special to The Ledger:

WACO, June 23.—W. V. Crawford, President of the Texas Highway Association, issued today a statement outlining the provisions of the proposed highway amendment to be voted on by the people on July 28th.

"In spite of all the discussion in the press," he said, "there seems to be a widespread misunderstanding of the proposed amendment. The many inquiries we have received indicate that a great many people do not know what it provides. It occurs to me, therefore, that a simple statement of its provisions is very necessary."

"The amendment proposes to add the following provisions to the state constitution:

"The legislature is authorized and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State, to be under the control of the State, and in order that the State may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities for the establishment and maintenance of such a system of highways, the legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition to those permitted for other purposes in the constitution, but such ad valorem taxes shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for herein after in this section.

"When said system shall have been designated and taken over for the State as provided in Section A hereof the legislature is authorized to make provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been theretofore constructed by the counties in the state.

"Provided, also that, save for the State highway system, in all other respects, counties shall have the right to build, construct and maintain roads, turnpikes and bridges within their respective boundaries, and the constitutional provisions relating thereto are not affected or repealed by reason hereof."

"Then there is a section authorizing and directing the legislature to enact legislation to put these provisions into effect.

"First of all it should be said that the provision which refers to ad valorem taxes can be ignored, for the section which would have authorized the issuance of bonds was stricken out by the Senate. It was intended to strike out also reference to ad valorem taxes, but in the rush of the closing hours of the regular session this was overlooked. But it is inoperative and the same as though it had been stricken out. For it applies only to the section which was stricken out, and no ad valorem taxes could be levied if the amendment is adopted.

"If that point is kept in mind there should be no difficulty in understanding the amendment. It provides for the creation of a state highway system and for the levying of 'specific excise taxes' for the establishment and maintenance of such a system.

"If the amendment is adopted the designated state highways will be taken over by the state and the counties will be relieved of the duty and expense of constructing and maintaining such highways in the future.

"The excise taxes it authorizes does not increase the power of the state to raise revenue. The state can levy excise taxes now, only they are called occupation taxes. But one-fourth of all occupational taxes must go to the school fund, and this amendment would make possible the levying of such a tax for other purposes only. The gasoline tax is an instance of this. Gasoline cannot be taxed for roads without also taxing it for schools under the present constitution. Under the amendment it could be taxed for roads alone."

"And finally the amendment provides that counties shall retain all their present powers and revenues with respect to roads. This will relieve the counties from constructing and maintaining state highways and leave them all their present revenue for purely county roads. The provision for compensating counties for roads taken over is a matter for the future and will require further action of the legislature.

"The system which this amendment would inaugurate in Texas is the same as that in operation in all the other states in the Union with the exception of two or three. A Federal law requires that every state must have such a system within the next three years or forfeit any further Federal aid in building highways."

BROADWAY OPEN FOR TRAFFIC

Paving was completed on Broadway at the Santa Fe crossing about four o'clock, the street cleared and immediately opened for traffic. Both Broadway and Eighth Street crossings have been closed for two weeks or longer, and it will be several days yet before Eighth Street is opened, but the traffic from the residential district North of the railroad and East of Eighth Street will come down Broadway, instead of being compelled to go to the Sixth Street crossing as has been the case for the past two weeks. The street paving here will be completed next week.

CRUDE OIL MAKES ANOTHER DROP

DALLAS, June 23.—A reduction of from five to twenty-five cents per barrel in Texas crude oil was announced by the Magnolia Petroleum Company today.

SAN MARCOS.—Approximately 21,000 pounds of wool was placed in storage here and pooled for sale by Hays county farmers at the annual meeting of the Hays County Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. The meeting continued two days.

Farmers are raising everything now and may be able to raise a little money next fall.

BELTON.—Robert J. Vilder, of Belton, has been named state counsel for the order of Modern Woodmen, with headquarters at Dallas. He succeeds John E. Swangler. Appointment was made by A. R. Talbot, Omaha, Neb., head consul for the order.

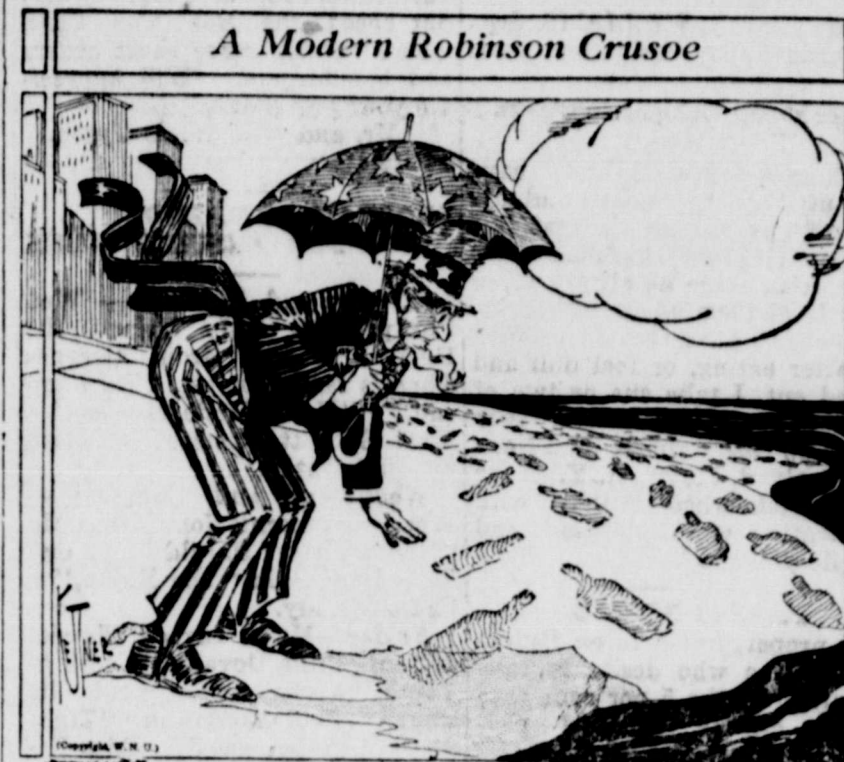
GOOSE CREEK MEN SERENADE JAIL

HOUSTON, June 23.—District Judge Robinson today notified Sheriff Binford that if there were any further demonstrations in favor of the three Goose Creek men held in jail for contempt of court, that he would send the three men miles away, and so far that it would be impossible for their misguided friends to see them.

The three men were sent to jail several days ago by Judge Robinson because they refused to answer questions concerning the floggings of certain persons in the Goose Creek community. When the men were brought here from Goose Creek and placed in jail for refusing to answer grand jury questions, they were accompanied by fifty autos loaded with friends who protested the action of the court.

A crowd of several hundred friends gathered in front of the jail where the men are confined Thursday night and serenaded.

MORE DIE FROM INTENSE HEAT HARDING TALKS WHEAT GROWERS

CHICAGO, June 23.—The hot weather was unabated in the Middle West today, while most of the Eastern states were experiencing some relief from the death dealing hot wave.

The death toll in this city yesterday included three drownings, one death from prostration, and scores of faintings from the intense heat. The temperature reached ninety degrees in Chicago.

The temperature was ninety-seven in parts of Ohio and eight deaths are reported from heat in that state. Michigan reported ninety-eight degree temperature, with three deaths. One death from prostration is reported from St. Louis.

TEXAS KLANSMEN CALL MEETING

SAN ANTONIO, June 23.—The San Antonio Ku Klux Klan, and a score or more of other local klan organizations in Texas, have adopted a resolution breaking with the Atlanta klan headquarters, and deciding to withhold all money and reports from the Atlanta headquarters until some order is brought out of the chaos into which the national organization has been thrown by reason of contests for control by two different factions.

This information was given out today by George Keeling, Kleagle for Texas. Keeling said that an invitation had been sent to the imperial state province officers to come to San Antonio next Tuesday and show cause why the resolutions should not stand.

MAN SHOT WHILE ROBBERING STORE

WAXAHACHIE, June 23.—A man giving his name as F. M. Green, of Dallas, was shot and seriously wounded early today when he was discovered in the merchandise store of Frank Owens, at Forrester, ten miles South of here. The man is in a hospital at Waxahachie where he was rushed for medical aid as soon as he was shot.

Owens says that a burglar alarm clock which he had arranged in the store warned him that his store was being raided. He went to the store armed with a shotgun and saw a man standing at the cash register. He declared that the man disregarded his call to surrender and when the alleged burglar refused to throw up his hands Owens opened fire on him with the shot-gun.

WEEKS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 23.—New and drastic regulations designed, it is said, to hasten the seizure of beverage liquors aboard incoming foreign liners, was sent by Assistant Secretary Moss of the treasury department, to customs and prohibition officers in New York today.

The new orders were made necessary, it was stated, by action of Public Health Officer Sprague, of New York, granting the request of the medical officer of the Berengaria to retain the entire supply of liquors as medical supply. The permit granting the Berengaria right to retain the liquor for medicinal purposes has been withdrawn. Asst. Secretary Moss notified the customs and prohibition officers that no such "unreasonable" grant of liquors could be allowed.

NEW YORK, June 23.—The United States customs agents today started to seize the liquor on the steamship Baltic and were halted a while, and then resumed their raid on the lockers which were stocked with liquor under British government seals, and intended for use on the homeward trip.

The captain of the Baltic lodged a formal protest against breaking the seals and the seizure of the liquor. The collector of the port explained the delay in seizing the liquors by saying that the seizure was temporarily halted until Chief Sprague, of the public

THE EYES OF THE WORLD ARE UPON BALLINGER

Ballinger's future depends largely upon the results of the work to be done during the remainder of 1923.

History bids fair to repeat itself here some day. Where there is so much smoke there is bound to be some fire.

The country is already experiencing an era of prosperity, and with normal prospects for a good crop, the development of irrigation, oil, and a fifty-fifty chance for the new Texas "Tech" College, we are not to wonder that the eyes of the world are upon us.

We have the natural advantages at our finger tips and if we fail to grasp the opportunity and make the most of it, why then we should move on and give a more progressive people a place to work, build and live.

SIGN PETITION FOR IRRIGATION

To the voters of Ballinger and adjoining territory:

Petitions addressed to the State Board of Water Engineers are being circulated in Ballinger, Bronte, Miles, Tennyson and Maybrick, which recite that "more than fifty property tax paying voters in the territory" desire to have the Water Board hold a hearing in this section to determine the advisability of creating an irrigation district; asking them to call an election for the purpose of organizing such a district, and electing five district supervisors.

This is purely a "submission" proposition, and has nothing to do with a bond issue. Before any voter in the district can determine the economic feasibility of the Colorado Valley project, an irrigation district must be created and directors elected. These directors will secure from competent engineers detailed estimates as to the cost of constructing the dam, canals, flumes, etc. They will determine the number of acres that can be irrigated; the taxable valuations of the district; the necessary tax rate, and all other questions which the voters will want answered before they can consider a bond election.

A signature to the petition for the district election does not necessarily mean that the signer will vote for the creation of such a district; it does not necessarily mean that the signer will ever vote for an irrigation bond issue, or that such a bond issue will ever be ordered. The district election and the organization of the district are necessary steps which must be taken before questions can be answered as to "what it will cost."

The State Water Board will hold a hearing in this section, and every property owner will be given an opportunity to appear before them. The voters will be given another opportunity to express themselves at the district election in August. The present bounds of the district are flexible. Land may be added to or taken away from the district. Any own-

er of land which cannot be irrigated by gravity flow may have his land removed from the district, by petition to the directors.

Ballinger's interest in the proposed project is that this city can then secure from the reservoir, through the canal system, an inexhaustible supply of water, sufficiently large to care for the needs of the town, regardless of how large it may grow. Water would also be sold to the towns of Bronte and Miles, and to farmers whose land is too high to irrigate by gravity flow.

The important thing to do at that time is to create an irrigation district, in order that a basis may be secured from which to work out the question of the economic feasibility of irrigating lands in the Colorado Valley by gravity flow.

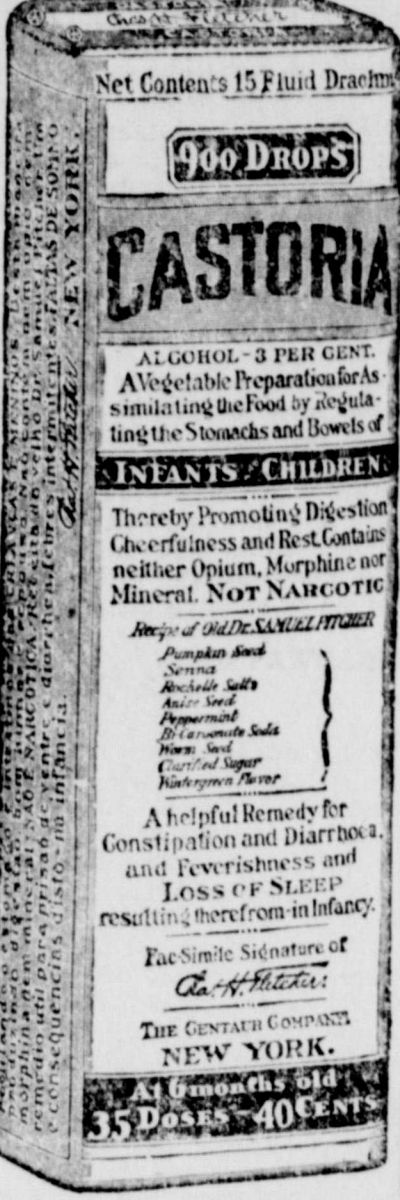

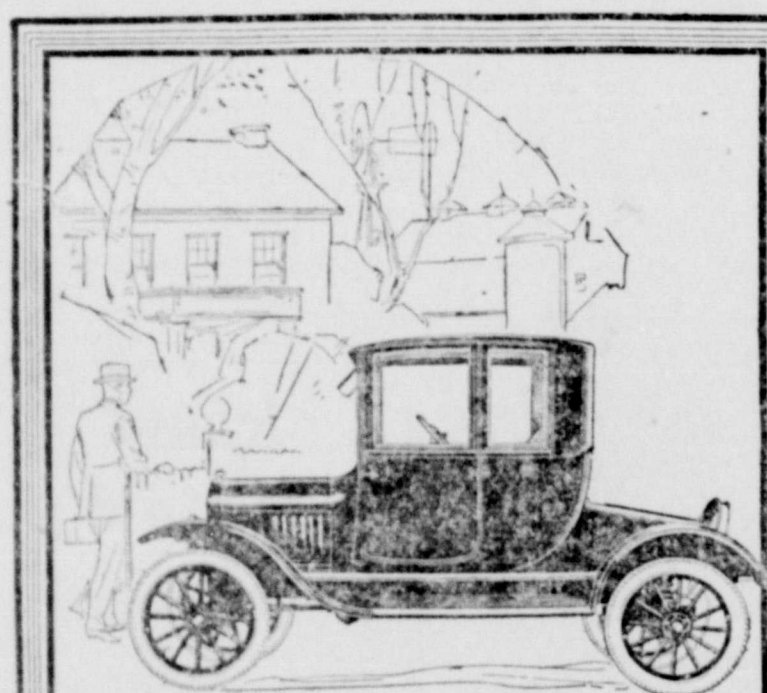

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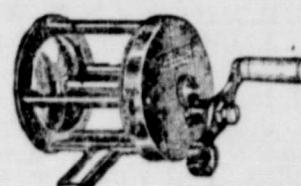

GODFREY MASSEY DIES IN IRELAND

Death from tuberculosis claimed the life of Godfrey Massey in Bray, Ireland, according to a letter from Mrs. Massey to R. G. Erwin, cashier of the First National Bank of this city. The death notice was received Friday, and stated that Mr. Massey died on June first, and the remains were buried in that country.

Godfrey Massey was one of the early settlers in this country. He came to West Texas from the old country in the early days and settled in Concho county, where he purchased a ranch and engaged in the cattle business on a rather extensive scale. He was successful here, and a few years ago leased his ranch and returned to his native land where he married, and after a sojourn of several months in Ireland he returned to America, living on his ranch with his bride and later spending several months in Ballinger.

About two months ago Mr. Massey sold his ranch, disposed of all his interests in this country and returned to Ireland. The news of his death will be received with sorrow and surprise by those who had known him through his residence in this country and by the friends he made while here. De-

ceased was well known by the early settlers of Runnels and surrounding counties. He was a great admirer of good livestock, and when he returned to Ireland he shipped his favorite buggy team, employing a man to accompany them on the voyage over seas.

Mrs. Massey did not like this country, according to friends, and it was probably to please his wife that Mr. Massey disposed of his interests here and returned to the old country. While not robust, Mr. Massey was apparently in good health when he left Ballinger. Leaving a high altitude and dry climate and returning to a low altitude after living in the open so long, probably brought on the trouble which claimed his life.
