New Producer From Shallow Sand Reported

Still another oil producer is reported from the shallow fields of northern Eastland county. According to reports, there is a flow of 850 barrels daily from the T. J. Earnest well No. 3 of the Sinclair company.

The well is a little less than twenty feet in the pay sand at a total depth of 1,896. This is the second largest producer brought in up to date in the shallow field, being exceeded only by the discovery well, the Holleman No. 1 of the Hineco-Ranger Oil company, which was reported to have had an initial production of 1,200 barrels.

This is the third producer the Sinclair company has on the Earnest lease and the second to be brought in within the past week. The company's Earnest No. 1 is still making 450 barrels and No. 2, on the same lease, is making 470 barrels.

On the Harmony church lot the Mill-dren Oil company has drilled its well into the second pay at a little below 3,500 feet. The well is making about 150 barrels of oil and between 8,000,000 and 10,000,000 cubic feet of gas. It is thought that the greater part of the oil is coming from the first pay at about the same depth as the shallow wells to the north are producing.

The shallow sand district in the northern part of Eastland county is now producing about twenty per cent of the total production of the Eastland-Ranger district. This pool extends from the Holleman and Harrell on the east to the Ray, Nix and Parraek leases on the west, being broken only by stretches of territory that has never been drilled, but which it is believed will yield largely from the shallow sand.

In Stephens county the Texas company has just completed two good wells, according to reports from Breckenridge. The W. F. Houston, five miles south of Breckenridge, is in and reported good for 500 barrels. The Mrs. S. H. Houston, also a Texas company well, is in and said to be flowing at a rate of 1,200 barrels daily. This is the same district as the W. F. Houston well.

ORGANIZED CHARITY.

Systematization of charity and relief work in this city and providing of funds to carry on the work intelligently are the aims of plans now on foot. F. B. Barnes, community service man, and a number of others interested in putting Ranger on a sound basis from a standpoint of charity are endeavoring to make an arrangement to take two rooms in the Ranger General Hospital on a yearly contract. The rooms would accommodate four or five patients and could be secured at a substantial reduction under regular rates. They would be for the use of city patients when needed for this purpose and at other times could be used by the hospital.

At the present time the city has no funds to care for patients, and the Social Service bureau is also short on funds, while the Red Cross nurse has no authority to care for civilian patients, although she often does. Recently an aged man was taken seriously ill in this city and because there was no money available to pay for his care in the hospital, he was sent to Fort Worth.

Civilian relief work will be added to the duties of the Red Cross nurses here, if present plans materialize, and all charity work will then be under her supervision.

Plans have been formulated to secure a permanent source of revenue for relief and public health activities. It is estimated that there is enough indiscriminate giving in Ranger to support such a fund. It is one of the duties of the trained relief worker to investigate all cases needing attention and take proper steps to aid the unfortunate worthy person. Some part of the \$50,000 budget raised by the Chamber of Commerce will be devoted to charity, but additional funds are needed.

GOOD ADVERTISING.

It is imperative that the advertisement be more than a mere statement of fact; it must be artistic. Three parts reason and two parts art are the figures of the critics. This does not mean that it should be two-fifths picture and the remainder text, for the illustration may appeal to reason and the arrangement and meaning of the text to the artistic sense. Each ought to be both aesthetic and rational.

If the character of the commodity permits, the advertisement should, according to the critics, be dignified, refined, and free from vulgarity; for the aim of publicity may be defeated by objectionable pictures and statements. The subject matter of those relating to underwear and bathroom fixtures does not permit of particularly refined treatment. But what is one man's meat is another's poison what is crude to one is good taste to another. As vulgarity is disgusting to some, refinement makes others squeamish. In this respect again, the advertisement acts as an automatic sorter of readers, and, as water seeks its own level, each advertisement finds its own customers.

Lastly, the different parts of the advertisement should co-operate in driving home the message. This is particularly important with the picture and the text. If they are at variance, the person attracted by the illustration may lose interest in the remainder of the advertisement; whereas, if the two parts reinforce each other, the appeal is doubly powerful.

In addition to these general characteristics of advertisements, the critics also call attention to pleasing and discordant elements found in head-line, text, trade mark, slogan and picture.

At times the headline is placed at the top of the advertisement with the picture below, and again the order is reversed. There seems to be little differ-

ence in the merits of the two devices. Since the top of the page has the maximum attention value, that feature of the advertisement which is most brief and interesting should be put in that position. Though a picture is usually more interesting than a caption, the head-line has other advantages.—Foster in Scribner's.

TWENTY-SIX MILLION EXPRESS CO.'S LOSS IN YEAR, IS SHOWN

A determined drive to reduce damage and loss in express shipments will be inaugurated by Agent Steffens of the American Railway Express company tomorrow, with the co-operation of all express employees of the United States. In their desire to render a service to the public and the company, the local office has anticipated the date for the nationwide drive.

Mr. Steffens stated today that figures have been compiled to show the loss to the express company in claims for the period extending from July 1, 1918, to Dec. 31, 1919, was \$26,000,000. The remedy for this appalling loss is in proper packing and direction of shipments, Mr. Steffens said.

Uniform regulations regarding packing and addressing shipments will be rigidly enforced by the company in preparation to boycott certain firms, beginning May 1. The company will refuse to accept or handle mail orders and wholesale firms if they continue to refuse to meet requirements in this line, he explained.

The person who sends a shipment, the express company and the recipient will all benefit by the campaign to eliminate waste. Local employees will seek the co-operation of the public in enforcing rules regarding packing and addressing packages. In cases where this work is improperly done shipments will not be received. One frequent cause of lost shipments, according to Mr. Steffens, is the habit people have of addressing a package and failing to destroy old addresses already on the package. In a case like this a shipment might be addressed to Waxahachie and New York and the clerk would have to toss heads and tails to decide which place to send it.

RESERVATIONS MADE FOR A. E. F. WRITERS IN OIL FIELD TOUR

R. D. Gustine of the Fighting Journalists has returned to Fort Worth after a trip to this city. While here he made arrangements for the accommodation of the Fighting Journalists when they reach here May 5.

Captain Gustine reserved accommodations for fifty-two guests at the Hotel Theodore. The program outlined for the organization calls for four days to be spent in and around Ranger. Trips will be made to Necessity, Breckenridge, Desdemona and other points of interest in the field.

Newspaper men from many large papers and also a number of magazine writers are expected to make the trip. The organization is composed of newspaper men who saw service with combat troops in the war with Germany.

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce will assist in entertaining the visitors during their stay in this city.

HOTEL THEODORE ANNEX OPENS IN TWO WEEKS

A twenty room annex to the Hotel Theodore will be opened in about two weeks. Carpenters are at work on the building just back of the Theodore formerly used as a warehouse by the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil company. The structure was planned for a recreation hall. All sanitary arrangements and modern conveniences will be incorporated in the annex, Mrs. Mabel Wilson of the Hotel Theodore stated today.

Young has a sextet of pitchers which will win games if the boys make them any runs at all. Carroll played the past two seasons with an unbeatable semi-pro team, is very dependable, and is a fairly good hitter.

Joe Gaines has had four years' professional work, and led the Middle Texas league in 1914-15 and the Central Texas league in 1916-17. Last season he worked with the Cooper semi-pro team, pitched sixty-five games and won sixty.

Carl Hill is a promising youngster, a hard hitter and fields his position well. J. Billings (Josh for short) is the spitball artist of the club. G. Hill is a youngster with no experience but is showing up well, and Presley, who has had three years' professional baseball, is expected to win his share of games.

Young will hold down the pivot at first base. His fielding record is far above the average, and he always passes the 300 average as a hitter.

Grey, the middle-sneaker, is just a kid, barely past 18, a product of the sandlots of Fort Worth, but his fielding is phenomenal; he has an accurate throw, and hits the old pill on the nose.

Segrist, the college star from Simmons, is expected by fans to be the leading third sacker in the league. He has a wonderful throwing arm, and whips 'em across to first in great shape. If he keeps up his present pace set in college circles, he will be an invaluable man to the Eagles.

Grady White, with the experience of six years' professional ball behind him, a good throwing arm, and with the fact that he is a .275 hitter, will make him a very valuable man to the club.
