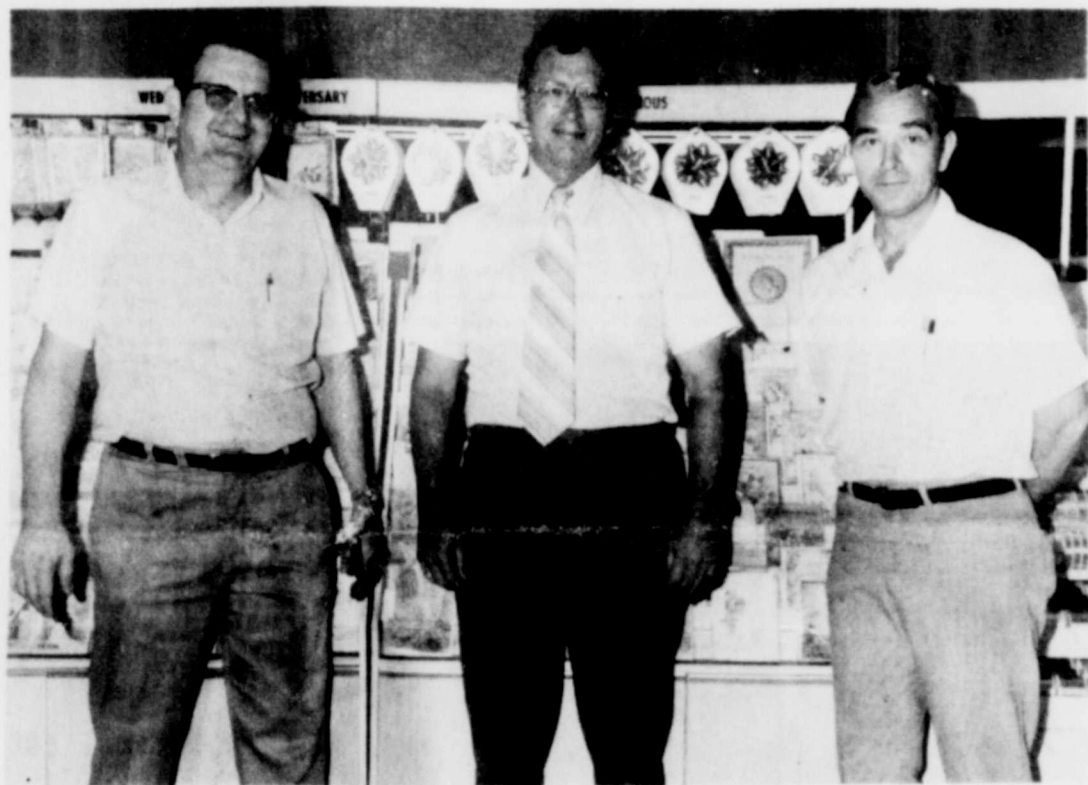

## Much Work Due Before Food Stamp Issuance

The first food stamps in Wichita County will be issued October 1st. But before the statewide food stamp program is implemented, there is much work to be done.

Commodities is the food assistance program currently operating in this county. The 62nd Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a statewide food stamp program to replace all county food stamp programs and commodity food distributions. By November 1973 the 254 counties in Texas will be operating the statewide program administered by the State Department of Public Welfare.

Before the first stamps are issued here, extensive preparation must be completed. Current commodity recipients will be notified that food stamps will replace the present food assistance program. Most commodity recipients should be eligible for food stamps also as well as others who might not receive commodity foods.

Certification for food stamp eligibility will begin at a later date. All persons who don't make much money or who are unemployed are encouraged to apply at that time. Welfare recipients aren't the only ones who can qualify for food stamps.

Local issuance officers will sell the food stamps to all who

are certified eligible to receive them. Participating households will be able to buy their stamps at the issuance office nearest them at their own convenience. The long waiting lines which are now a problem at commodity distribution centers should be eliminated.

Food stamps, which can be used for the purchase of most foods and food products, will be accepted by many of the local grocers. Payment is made by tearing the necessary amount of food stamps from the coupon book at the time of purchase. Tobacco, alcoholic beverages and imported items can not be purchased with food stamps.

Grocers can deposit food stamps just as they do money. Local bankers then send the stamps to the United States Department of Agriculture for redemption.

Food stamps are good for everyone. The community enjoys increased economic activity, new jobs are created and low income households are able to eat more and better food.

## Junk Vehicles Result In 53 Police Citations

According to Burkburnett Police Chief Buck Abbott, 53 citations have been given to various Burkburnett citizens since June 22 of this year, for failure to comply with city ordinance #282. City ordinance #282 states that junked vehicles are declared a public nuisance by creating hazards, which are visible from public places, tending to reduce value of public property, inviting vandalism, creating fire hazards, constituting an unattractive nuisance, creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, being detrimental to economic welfare of the city, producing urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the state of Texas and are therefore a public nuisance.

Chief Abbott stated that these vehicles must be and would be removed.

Ordinance #282 further states that a public hearing shall be required prior to removal of the vehicle or parts thereof as a public nuisance, to be held before the city commission of Burkburnett when such a hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises upon which said vehicle is located within 10 days after such notice to abate such nuisance.

We are starting at the south part of town and working north, Abbott said. Nuisance vehicles which are not on private property will be cited. Burkburnett citizens may help greatly by removing these old vehicles before being cited to do so.

The Burkburnett Volunteer Fire Department received their regular first week in July work-out as 8 fires were reported between July 1st and July 5th. Only one fire was reported on July 1st. That was a grass fire on East College. A fire was reported at the Neville Apartments on noon July 3rd. Firemen saved the apartments from serious damage. Another fire reported July 3rd was near the fireworks stand on Daniels Rd. near Cropper. This fire was a grass fire. A grass fire was reported at Shady Lane at approximately 11:00 a.m. on July 4th. On July 5th two fires were burning at the same time. One was burning across the river toward Devol and the other was a house fire at the home of Jeff Cannon.

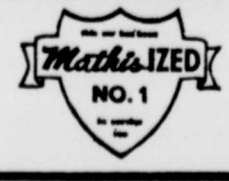

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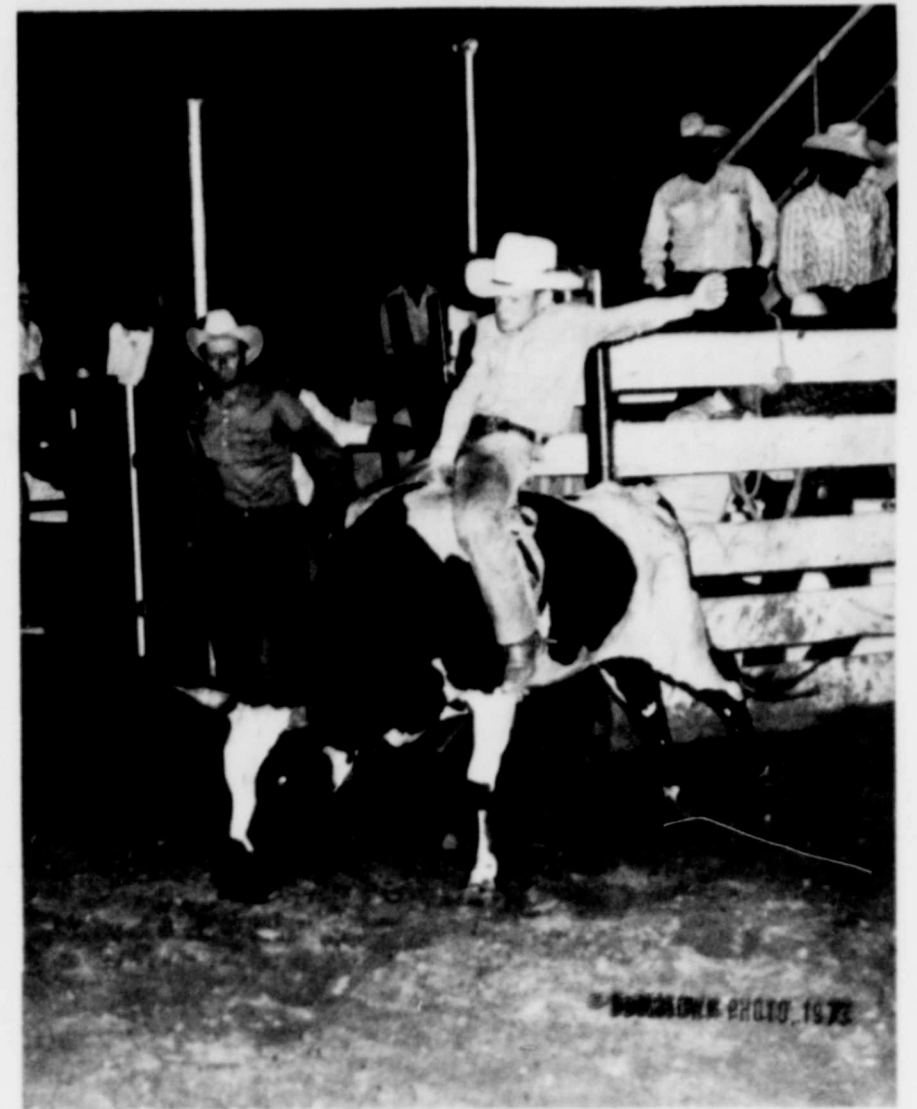

## Permits Can Avoid Suits On Odors

How can Texas livestock and poultry feeders protect themselves against law suits because of odors?

"Get a water pollution control permit," says Dr. John Sweeten, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Sweeten, who specializes in animal waste management, cites recent legal action in Texas in which a cattle feedlot successfully defended itself against charges of odor-related

nuisances brought by a neighboring land developer. A key factor in that trial, believes the engineer, was testimony by an expert from the Texas Water Quality Board that the feedlot operating under a "waste control order" was in compliance with state water pollution abatement requirements.

"This has a bearing on odor control because feedlot runoff holding ponds are sometimes the predominant source of feedlot odors," points out the Texas

A&M University System specialist. "However, with the state testimony that the operation had met existing pollution control requirements, the jury ruled in favor of the feedlot."

Sweeten feels another key factor in the case was testimony that odor levels measured at the feedlot were below allowable odor emission limits set by two other cattle feeding states. Texas does not yet have a specific odor emission standard.

## County Agent News

A new "Seasonal Borrowing Privilege" is designed to help rural banks expand loan fund sources where the local economy has a seasonal loan need, such as with grain sorghum, wheat, cotton or rice production. The lending change in the Federal Reserve System could make an estimated additional one billion dollars in loanable funds available to Texas residents from the state's rural banks.

Hanging baskets can add beauty and coolness to the landscape. Any type of container that has the proper drainage can be used. A wire basket can be used and lined with sphagnum moss to hold the soil. Hanging baskets generally do better in the shade. They require daily watering in hot, summer weather as well as regular feeding. A variety of plants can be used in hanging baskets, those with drooping growth being the most preferable.

Providing the beef cattle herd with an economical, yet nutritional diet will be the center of discussions at the Beef Cattle and Forage Short Course at Texas A&M University August 20-21. Emphasis will be placed on using good forage in the feeding program to lower ration costs. The use of protein supplements and minerals will also be discussed as well as different types of forage grasses and different grazing systems. An equipment display will feature new forage cutting and harvesting machinery.

Carpet beetles can damage home furnishings, fabrics and most clothing and stored food if not controlled. The tiny beetle larvae may be found behind baseboards, molding and radiators and in floor cracks, corners and clothing and dresser drawers. A thorough cleaning with the vacuum cleaner is the best tool.

The date set by agricultural agencies of Wichita County for spraying mesquite in the county is June 13 to July 24. The chemicals recommended to use are: 2,4, 5-T, Tordon, and Banvel. Mesquite is a real problem in the county. If you have questions on spraying mesquite,

contact the Soil Conservation Service or the County Extension office.

To prevent damage from cattle grubs, now is the time to treat your animals. Heel flies, the adult form of the cattle grub, have laid their eggs. The eggs have hatched and the small grubs have tunneled into cattle. Generally these grubs migrate through the connective tissue to the esophagus and from there to the back taking about eight months to make the trip.

Several animal systemic insecticides can be used to control grubs early in their development. These include Cor-Ral, Rulene, Reguvon, Warbex, Ronnel, and Tiguvon. Certain of these animal systemics can be administered to cattle as pour-on materials, sprays, dips, mineral formulations and feed.

Chemicals used as pesticides are toxic and care must be exercised to avoid accidental poisoning. Minimizing exposure to the chemical is an essential element of safe use. In one western state almost 80 percent of the occupational poisoning cases by industrial and agricultural chemicals resulted from absorption through the skin.

Those mixing and loading pesticides are potentially subject to relatively high levels of exposure to the skin as well as those applying fine sprays and dusts. Of course, indoor spraying can be hazardous if proper precautions are not taken.

Other activities that can result in exposure of the skin to pesticides include the maintenance and repair of contaminated equipment and contact with treated surfaces. Hand harvesting, thinning, cultivating, irrigation and insect scouting can result in significant exposure if fields are entered too soon. Animals account for one out of every 10 accidents according to a recent survey by the National Safety Council. And with horses becoming more popular and horse related activities increasing by leaps and bounds, special attention should be given to safety precautions. The following are a few safety tips to follow while working with horses:

1. Always approach a horse at an angle, never directly from the front or rear. Always speak to a horse as you are approaching it.
2. While working around horses, stay in close to the horse so if it kicks, you will not receive the full impact of the kick. Work about a horse from a position as near the shoulder as possible.
3. Be calm, confident and collected around horses. A nervous handler causes a nervous, unsafe horse.
4. It is not safe to leave a halter on a loose horse. The horse may catch a foot in the halter strap or the halter may catch on a fence.
5. Never wrap the lead strap on reins around your hand, wrist or body. When leading, tying or untying a horse, avoid getting your hands or fingers entangled.
6. Be extremely cautious when leading a horse through a narrow opening, such as a door. Keep firm control, step through the door first and quickly get to one side to avoid being crowded. Discipline your horse to follow you through openings cautiously.
7. Use judgement when turning a horse loose. It is generally safest to lead the horse completely through the gate or door and turn the horse about, facing the direction from which you have just entered. Then release the lead strap or remove the halter or bridle. Always untie the horse before removing the halter.

Poor communication is the cause of many misunderstandings between adults and children. Just because a child doesn't respond immediately to something you have said, don't accuse him of ignoring others. Often he or she hasn't heard or comprehended the directive. Many youth develop an ability to shout out conflicting or undesirable noises. For example, they can get their lessons done despite a loud radio or record player. Therefore parents and teachers should determine whether they have also been "tuned out".

Adults wishing to improve a child's listening ability may utilize the following suggestions:

1. Minimize misunderstandings; make sure conditions favor good communication.
  2. Touch the child with a friendly hand on the shoulder or arm.
  3. Gain his attention by speaking his name clearly and distinctly. Wait for the child to respond before continuing the conversation.
  4. Look him "in the eye" when speaking. If he is small, get on his eye level.
  5. Speak in a quiet voice. Children are a product of their experiences; if adults yell to gain attention, youngsters learn to do the same.
  6. Discuss mutual interests.
  7. Pay attention when the child talks.
  8. Follow up family trips, outings and activities with "give and take" conversations.
- Children respond favorably when parents and other adults care enough to listen to them. This fosters self-respect, as well as respect for others. Sharing an experience together is the surest way to strengthen a relationship. Later, there will be "good old times" and fond memories to talk about.

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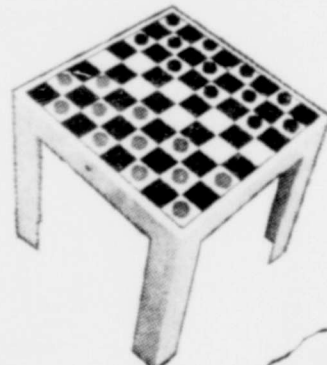
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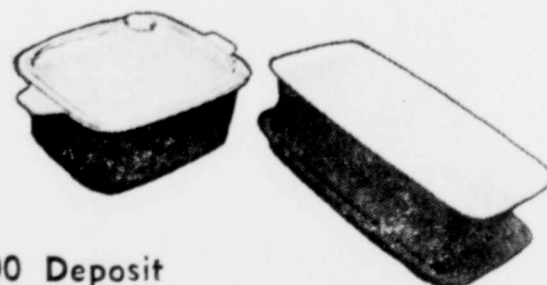

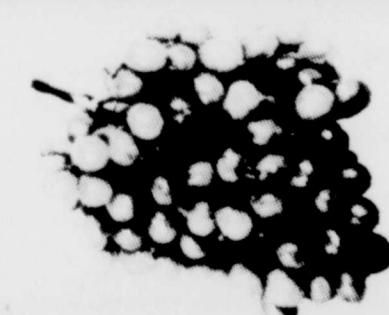
