Boat races on hold

It appears that Lake Champion won't be filled with sounds of high-powered racing boats this summer, but there's still a chance races will be held at the lake next summer.

Colorado City Council Monday, in a special meeting, tabled action on sanctioning the proposed boat races until further study can be completed and suggested that the races be held Memorial Day weekend next year.

Jimmy Leffler of Big Spring, representing a group of backers, had asked the council to support the project and to give permission to hold the races at the city-owned Fisher Park at Lake Champion.

Leffler said he estimated that \$13,700 in dirt work and other improvements at the park would have to be made before the races could be held.

Leffler said Tuesday that his organization wanted the city to make the park improvements, but the city council told him that this year's budget is already approved and there are no funds available for such expenditures.

A representative of the Texas Dragboat Association was in Colorado City Sunday to view the proposed race site, said Mayor Jim Baum.

Baum said the proposed site presents no obstacle, however there are several other problems including liability and the improvements to the park itself. Baum also noted that he had received several calls from concerned citizens who live in the lake area.

Leffler had told the council that any profits from the race would go to the city, and City

Attorney Tom Rees said that some type of agreement should be drafted holding the boat racing backers accountable for the bookkeeping.

Baum said it is his concern that the event, whenever it is held, be successful.

"I don't want you to lose money," he said. "And I don't want the city to have a blackened name."

"We want every person who leaves to have whatever money is coming to them," said Baum. "I don't think there is any way to do it (the races) in June and do it right," said Baum. "I think we have a potential good thing, but the first one has to be perfect."

Leffler had proposed that the races be held in June and if successful, perhaps more races could be scheduled in September or October.

Mayor Pro-tem Tom Carlock

said the "majority of us (council members) are for this thing," but questioned the time factor.

In other business, the council gave permission to advertise for bids for one new car and one used car for the police department. The item had been tabled at last Tuesday night's meeting pending committee study.

Carlock, a member of the study committee, said that it was the committee's recommendation to advertise for one new and one used car. He said that the action will have a net gain of one additional vehicle for the police department in that one of the retiring police cars will be used for reserves. The other retiring vehicle will be used in various other city departments.

The police department uses a fleet system for its cars with one car for each officer. Carlock said figures gathered by Police Chief Bobby Sparks shows that

the fleet system saves money in the long run because of lower maintenance and repair cost.

Council member Dan Johns, a member of the committee, questioned whether or not the committee should make a recommendation since there was confusion as to whom Baum appointed to the committee.

However, Rees said it didn't matter who met in the committee meeting as long as there wasn't a quorum of council members.

Baum announced that the police department has requested that residents place street numbers on their homes in order to facilitate emergency vehicles.

Council member Dee Hearn commended Saturday's clean-up day the city had for the cemetery, noting that results of the day are clearly visible to cemetery visitors.

Case said still pending

Colorado Independent School District Supt. Charlie Useiton said Monday that CHS senior Wylie Dakan may still not participate in graduation ceremonies May 29 pending a decision from 32nd District Judge Weldon Kirk.

Dakan was given a 20-day in-school-suspension (ISS) for allegedly sniffing a car air freshener during a class on May 4. He lost an appeal of the suspension in a hearing before the school board on May 11.

On Friday, Kirk denied a request by Dakan and his attorney, Lance Hall of Sweetwater, to put a restraining order on the suspension.

Useiton said that Kirk asked attorneys on both sides to file briefs concerning the 20-day suspension from extra-curricular activities. Tom Rees is the school's attorney.

However, Carol Sue Dakan, mother of the student, said her attorney told her following the Friday hearing that because of the way the school discipline management plan is worded, that Dakan will be able to participate in extra-curricular activities after May 25 even though he will continue to be in ISS through the end of school.

Mrs. Dakan said she was trying to contact her attorney Tuesday to determine the facts. Her attorney is involved in a trial in Eastland this week, she said.

Mrs. Dakan said the school's discipline management policy reads that if a student commits a level III offense, he is sentenced to ISS for 20 school days and

Election called to decide local sales and use tax

Mitchell County commissioners Tuesday morning called a special election for Aug. 8 to determine if voters favor a 1/2-percent sales and use tax to reduce property taxes.

House Bill 79, passed by the 69th Texas Legislature in last summer's special session, authorizes counties and cities to raise sales taxes by a 1/2-cent provided ad valorem taxes are lowered by the same amount.

Judge Bill Carter said if voters approve the tax, it would be effective Jan. 1, 1988, and that the effective tax rate would be reduced in the summer of 1988.

Of 31 counties which have proposed adoption of a 1/2-cent sales tax, 30 have approved the option.

In other business during Tuesday's special meeting, Carter said the county has received two applications for county attorney following the resignation of Pete McKinney who has accepted a position with an Abilene law firm.

Deadline for applications was Tuesday at 9 a.m. The two applicants are local attorneys Tom Rees and Clay Strange. Commissioners agreed to interview the two applicants Thursday, May 28.

McKinney's resignation takes effect June 1.

Commissioners deferred action on a request by C. M. and John W. Newby concerning a delinquent tax statement.

Local man commended for assisting DPS trooper

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article appeared in a recent issue of the DPSOA Monthly, a magazine published by the Department of Public Safety Officers Association.

I would like to recommend that Roy Turnbull and David Childers be declared DPSOA Citizens of the Month.

On January 11, as Roy Turnbull of Colorado City and David Childers of Big Spring were returning home on a long lonely road, after a tiring day in the oilfield, and just thirty miles ago had received a speeding ticket from a DPS Trooper, they came upon a DPS patrol car that looked as though it had been involved in an accident.

They turned around to see if they could help. At that time, they noticed Trooper Ken Pittman, THP Midland, shining his flashlight at them. As they approached the car, they soon realized that the vehicle was heavily damaged by gunfire and that Trooper Pittman was injured and was leaning against his patrol car on the passenger side. They walked up to Trooper Pittman, who was holding a gun on them, and asked if they could be of any assistance. After reassuring Trooper Pittman that they were not the people that had shot at him (Trooper Pittman could not see very much due to glass in his eyes), the Trooper lowered his weapon and allow-

ed them to assist him. Trooper Pittman asked Roy Turnbull to reload his shotgun for him and to watch for the subjects in the brown van. He then asked David Childers to take the microphone and tell DPS Midland that he had help and to give his location. The night was very cold and all three were very excited and nervous. Trooper Pittman then asked that they get the first-aid kit and help to administer first-aid to his eyes. They also checked Trooper Pittman for a possible broken leg. After administering first-aid, they stayed with Trooper Pittman until the back-up units and the ambulance arrived.

C-City ranks high in tax burden

Colorado City taxpayers pay some of the highest taxes in the state, according to a survey of 250 selected cities by the Texas Research League.

Colorado City ranked 40th in tax burden in the survey conducted by the Austin-based public policy research group.

Local property taxes were highest in Crystal City and lowest in Highland Park (Dallas) in 1985-86, according to the league. Snyder was 326th, Sweetwater, 70th, and Big Spring, 59th.

The average tax on all types of taxable property was 2.7 percent of market value (selling price)

in Crystal City but only 0.7 of 1 percent in Highland Park. Locally property taxes were 1.9011 percent of value.

The rate consisted of .5514 percent levied by the city, .7893 percent by the Colorado Independent School District, .2184 percent by the Mitchell County Hospital District and .3390 percent by Mitchell County.

For a single-family house that would sell for \$80,000 the highest tax was \$2,602 in Crystal City and the lowest was a \$536 tax bill in Highland Park. If the house were eligible for various homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$482 in Highland Park

compared to \$2,533 in Crystal City.

Additional exemptions were granted to homeowners aged 65 or over which reduced the property tax bill to \$1,935 in Crystal City and to \$167 in that part of the City of Irving located in the Coppell school district.

In Colorado City, the tax bill on an \$80,000 house in 1985-86 averaged \$1,244 or \$1,203 if a homestead or \$1,090 if owned by a senior citizen.

The report points out that school tax bills for the elderly are frozen at the level when the homeowner turned 65 and such persons may pay less.

Inequitable appraisals among different types of property are significant in attracting new industry to a community. The 1985-86 property tax on \$80,000 of industrial equipment and inventories ranged from \$445 in Bonham to \$1,979 in Orange (Little Cypress ISD).

For commercial property, the tax bill on \$80,000 ranged from \$445 in Bonham to \$1,899 in Port Arthur (Sabine ISD).

For \$80,000 of value in Colorado City, the report shows a tax of \$1,521 for an average of all types of property, \$1,232 for

industrial equipment and inventories and \$970 for commercial inventories and fixtures.

The report cites two reasons for the wide range of taxes: First, local officials adopt budgets, set tax rates and homestead exemptions. Second, unless all property is appraised uniformly, tax burdens will vary. Average ratios of tax appraisals to market value (selling price) ranged from 22.4 percent in the Malta ISD to 165.5 percent in Allamore ISD. Locally, the report shows a ratio of 103.7 percent for all types of property in the Colorado Independent School District.

Mailbox improvement encouraged

The Colorado City Post Office is encouraging rural route customers to examine and improve, where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes. Tommy Reeves of the local

post office said each year the U.S. Post Service designates a Mailbox Improvement Week for customers served by rural delivery routes with May 17-23 designated this year.

He said the purpose of the week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are designed to protect the mail from the weather and are neat in appearance, conveniently located and safe to use.

He added that mailboxes that meet these four important requirements contribute to a more efficient delivery operation and the result is improved service to the entire route.

He said letters explaining the need for improved mailboxes is being delivered to rural customers this week.

Their hopes ended after one leg of the 400 meter relay Saturday at the University of Texas' Memorial Stadium.

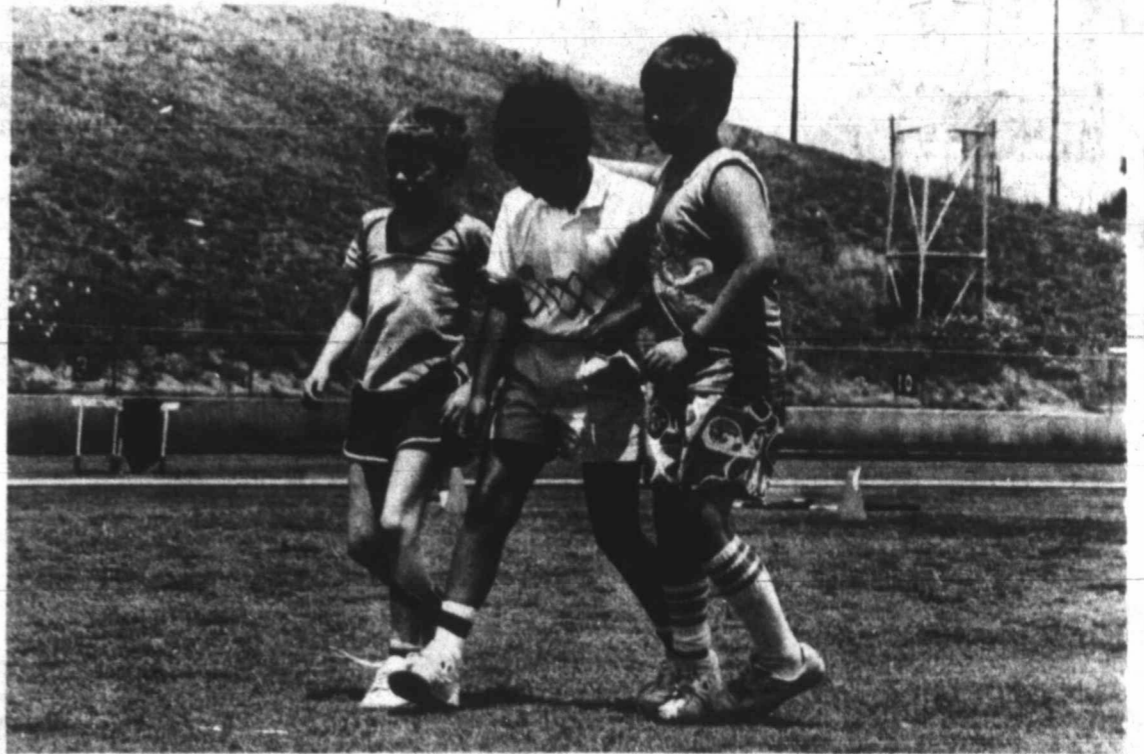
"We were ahead by three yards after the first handoff," said Meredith. "It's usually our

Section 1. Definition of terms. For the purpose of this ordinance, the following words shall be defined with meanings prescribed to them:

a. At-large: Not controlled by owner with a lease, chain, or cord attached to the dog collar.

b. Dog: The canine species of animals.

c. Owner: Any person controlling or owning a dog.

Section 2. Prohibiting dogs running at-large. No dogs shall be allowed to run at large within the city. They should wear a leash at all times.

Section 3. Certification of rabies vaccine.

a. Age of dog. All dogs over 3 months within the city must have a rabies vaccine.

b. Issuance of Certificate. Every veterinarian who vaccinates any dog shall issue a certificate of vaccination to the owner stating the name and address of owner, type of dog, date of vaccination, the number of the vaccine, and the type of vaccine used.

c. Issuance of Vaccination Tag. The veterinarian shall give the owner a tag stamped with the words "Rabies Vaccine Administered" and the date of the vaccination. The tag should be put on the dog collar.

Section 4. Authority of Police Dept. to dispose of dogs not tagged.

It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to dispose of any dog who does not have a vaccination tag attached to its collar.

Article II-Penalty and Severability

Section 1. Penalty. It shall be unlawful for any person owning a dog to permit it to run at-large within the city limits. It is also unlawful for a dog to go without proper vaccination and tags. If convicted of any violation of this ordinance, the person shall be fined not more than \$200.

Section 2. Severability. It is hereby declared the intention of the City Council of Loraine that the sections of this ordinance are separable and if any section is found to be unconstitutional by a valid judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect any remaining sections.

Passed and approved on April 8, 1980.
