Boaters, swimmers scurry to water

High temperatures boost state park, pool attendance

The Memorial Day Weekend kicked off the summer vacation season with a big splash.

Temperatures in the high 90s sent swimmers to cooler surroundings at the Colorado City swimming pool, while the weather and increase in the Lake Colorado City water level helped boost attendance at the state park.

Shelly Tyler, who manages the swimming pool in Ruddick Park, said 120 swimmers checked in on Memorial Day to seek relief from the climbing Fahrenheit.

The pool opened Wednesday, May 26. Pool hours are noon to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

When the temperatures are soaring, Tyler said the city pool is averaging 150 to 175 swimmers a day.

Tracy Ferguson, superintendent at the Lake Colorado City State Park, estimates 3,500 people visited the park Friday, May 28, through Monday, May 31.

He said the figure includes campers and day users.

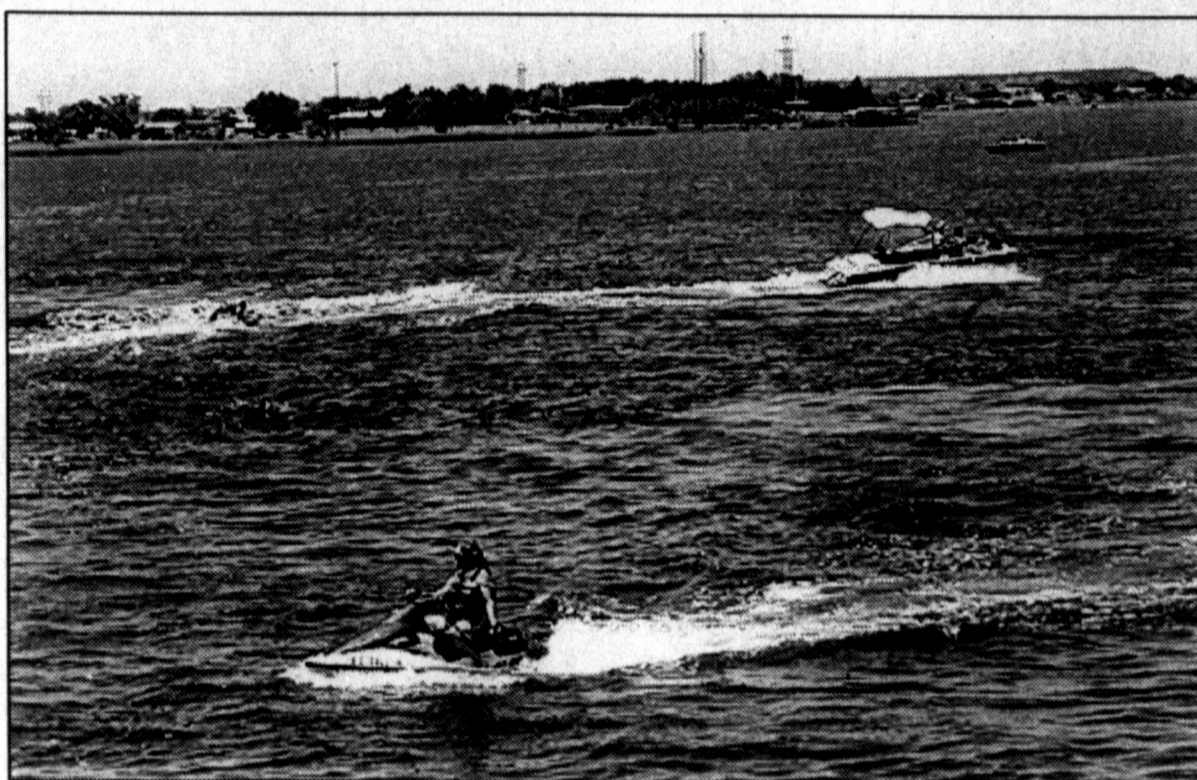
Ferguson said the majority of campers had checked out by Monday.

He said Monday's attendance was lower than expected, estimating that 200 to 300 people visited the park.

"Visitors actually started coming in Thursday," Ferguson said. "We had a lot come in Friday, and then Saturday and Sunday we were almost full."

"The cabins were full all weekend, and we used all but a few."

Chamber ready for trade days

The Colorado City Railhead Trade Days are set for Saturday, June 5, and Sunday, June 6, at the Railhead Building.

The trade days will run from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Sue Lowrance, executive director of the sponsoring Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, said a variety of items will be for sale, including crafts, toys, leather goods, dolls, woodwork, custom jewelry, candy and entertainment.

"We have about 50 vendors signed up," Lowrance said Tuesday, June 1. "We have several more outdoor vendors."

Lowrance said stepping stones and concrete yard decor will also be available to purchase, while a flea market area will be located outside the Railhead Building.

"We have a little bit of everything available," Lowrance said. "We have been advertising heavily in surrounding communities."

Lowrance said she hopes Mitchell County residents will support the trade days.

Several outdoor vendors will have food and drinks available.

Lowrance said the Chamber currently has 135 members, including 86 businesses and 49 individuals.

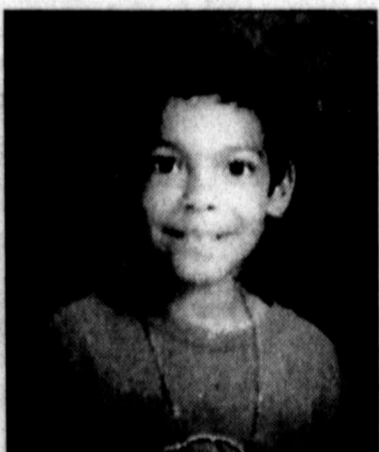
Lowrance said the Chamber serves Mitchell County and "we have 55 businesses that are not members."

Colorado City youngster improving

Ten-year-old Sebastian Villalon of Colorado City has been moved to a private room at Covenant Children's Hospital in Lubbock, but additional surgeries are still ahead for the May 21 accident victim.

Villalon, who will be a fifth-grader at Hutchinson Elementary School, suffered two broken legs in a vehicle-pedestrian accident five miles south of Colorado City on state Highway 208 south.

Villalon's mother, Angie Villalon of Colorado City, said

her son was taken out of the intensive care unit three days ago, and is scheduled to undergo surgery and a checkup on both legs Thursday, June 3.

She said her son suffered significant muscle damage to his right leg where a plate was used to repair the damage, while a rod was placed in his left leg.

She said Sebastian will undergo surgery in four to six weeks when the plate and rods are expected to be removed.

"So far, everything looks

good on his left leg," she said. "They may be able to let us know Thursday when he might be able to leave the hospital."

Angie said Sebastian is "ready to get up and get out of bed. He has been asking when he can get up. Overall, he is doing good."

The young Villalon was struck by a pickup truck a quarter-mile from the home of Villalon's grandfather Roberto Molina.

300 entries expected for junior rodeo

Colorado City is one of nine locations in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico to host High Plains Junior Rodeos.

Ramzie and Talon Messick of Colorado City are scheduled to participate in the rodeo, with proceeds benefiting the Mitchell County 4-H Club, D.A.R.E. program and the Colorado City FFA.

The 2003 rodeo raised \$4,300 for the three organizations.

Contestants range in age from 5 to 20 years old, and they can enter anywhere from five to eight events, depending on the age category in which they are competing.

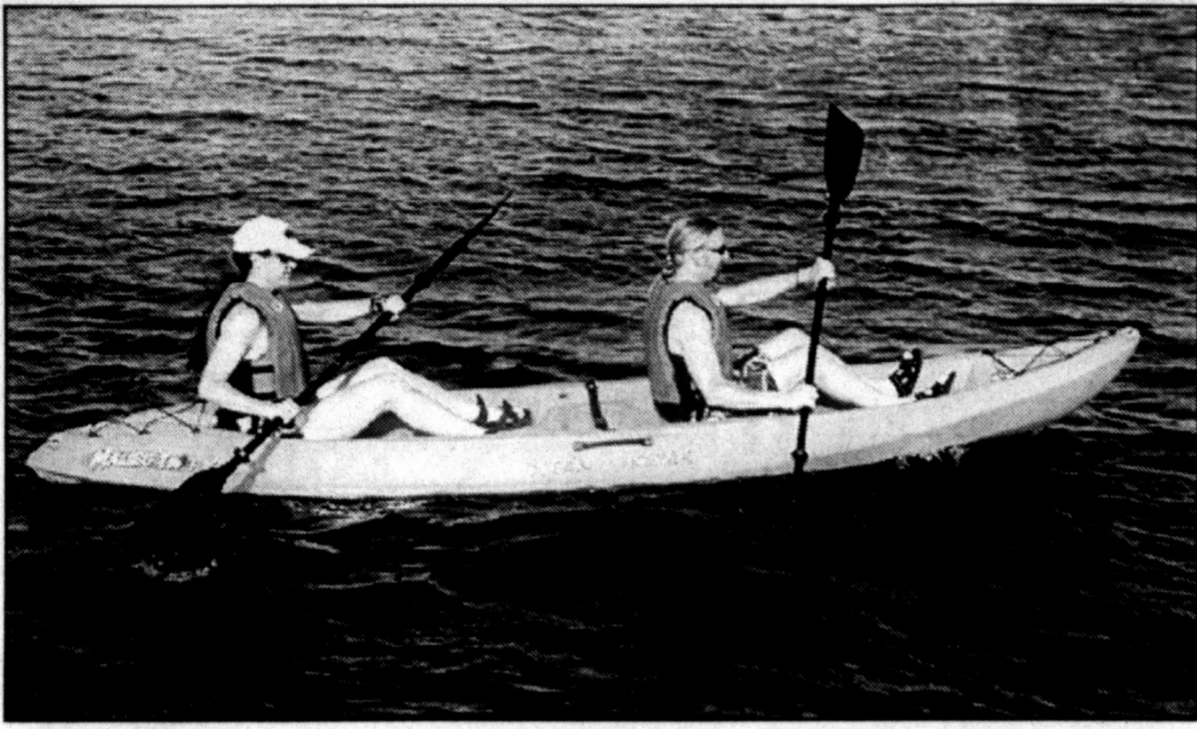
Arena chairman Charles Rice said at least 50 Mitchell County residents will help with the event that gets under way Thursday, June 10, with a Kid's Night.

couple of the electrical campsites" starting Friday night through Sunday, and then about half of the water only sites were used.

Ferguson said the Memorial Day Weekend crowd was "much bigger than last year."

He said an increase in the lake's water level and "the weather being nice really brought them out."

"We also had quite a few

people who came out and fished... a lot more than we've had in the past. Hopefully that is an indication of things to come. We're glad to have the fishermen back."

Ferguson said the water level is just over 6 feet below full stage, with a dry May contributing to a slight decline.

The lake was 15 feet low when Memorial Day arrived in 2003, forcing boaters to watch for hazardous objects in the water, with objects damaging some boats.

"We had a lot of jet skiers, and pleasure boaters out this weekend," Ferguson said, "but I would say most of the vessels on the water were jet skis by far."

"We didn't have that many problems, or anything major that I am not aware of."

Even with a slight drop, Ferguson said the 1,600-acre lake is "still looking really good. It's as full as I have seen it in the time I have been here."

"We had a lot of compliments from people about the condition of the lake, and the park as well. I think the reports about our restocking the lake has brought some of the fishermen back out."

"We've had a lot more fishermen out than we've had in the past. Several people said they are seeing a lot of fish."

"One fellow who came in to camp and brought his boat said his fish-finder located a mass of fish in several places around the lake. That's still going to be the smaller fish that were stocked recently."

"As time passes, they will grow into catchable fish."

County sets budget workshops for July

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court set budget workshops and accepted an audit of the county's financial statement May 24.

Commissioners Ed Roach, Carl Guelker, Wendy Inman and Bill Preston set July 12-13 as budget workshops where county department managers will submit their budget proposals for 2005.

County Judge Ray Mayo said additional workshops will be held before a final budget is adopted in August.

Commissioners also approved the county's financial audit of its 2003 records.

Melinda Graham of Stovall Grandey and Whatley of Fort Worth gave them an overview of the county's financial status.

Graham said the county received a "good, clean audit" and commended the county's "good" recordkeeping.

At their May 10 meeting, commissioners approved reimbursing \$500 to Julie Bullard who operates the concession stand at the Mitchell County Sports Complex.

Mayo said the county reimbursed the money since Bullard and her staff members turn out the lights, collect the bases and take care of other measures following baseball games.

Bullard has a six-month agreement with the county to operate the concession stand.

In addition, a portion of the reimbursement was made because of the number of games being held at the complex is lower than the 300 projected for the six months.

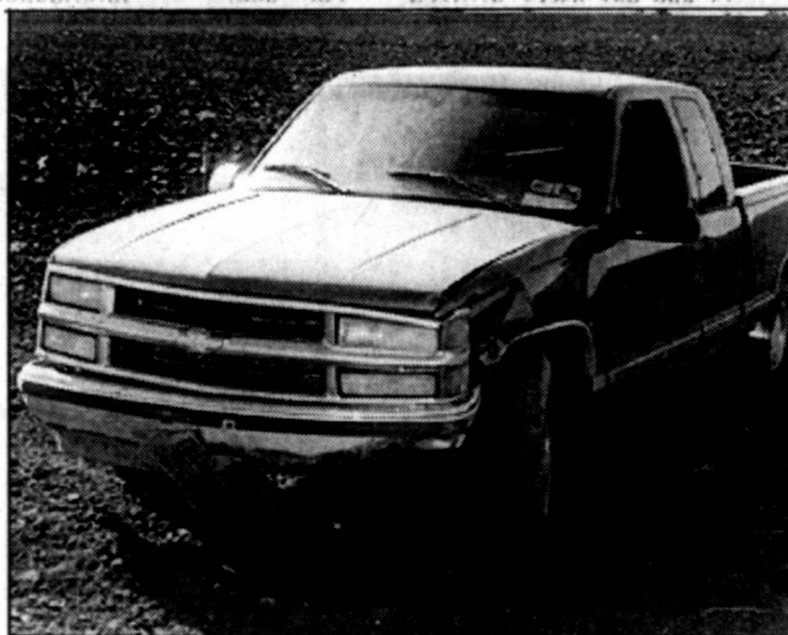
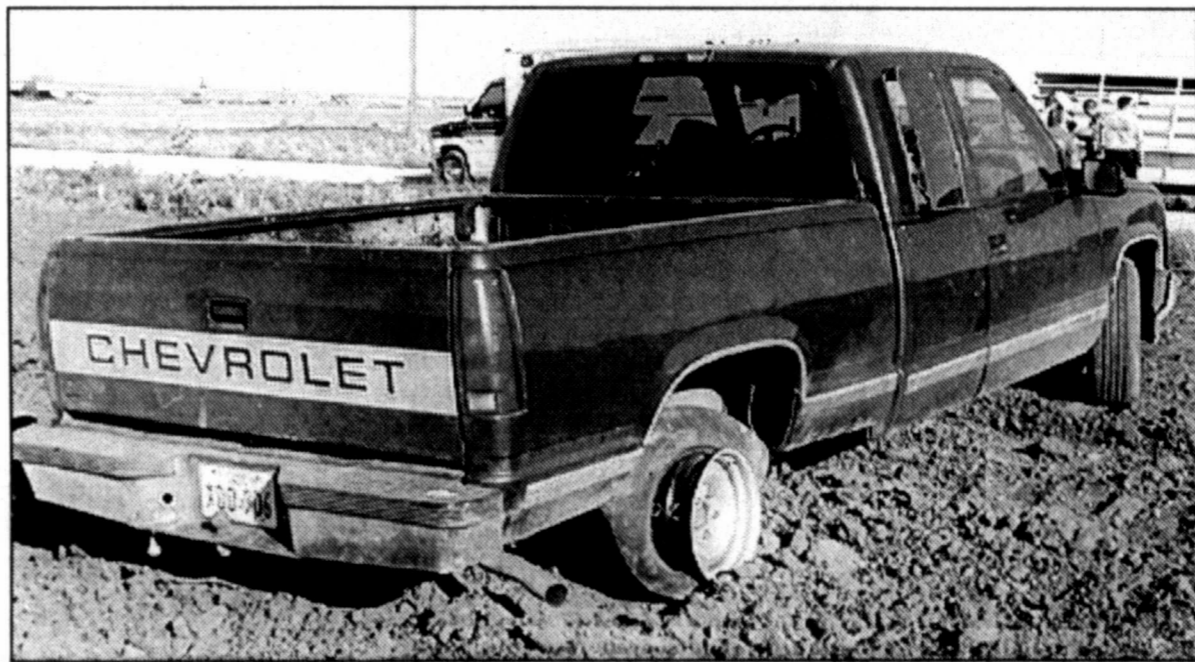

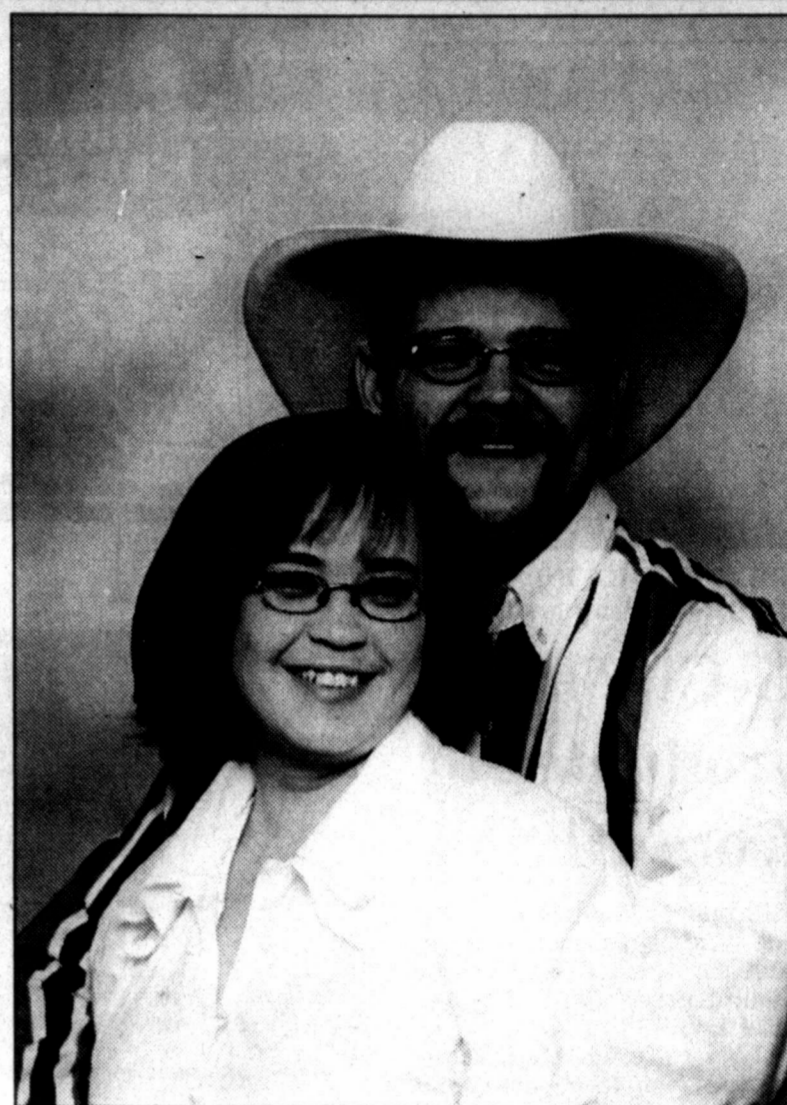

Scouting and Prevention Are Keys to Profitable Peanut Insect Control

Under the guidelines of the new peanut program, growers are rewarded for production efficiency. The greater the production of high quality peanuts, the greater the reward. 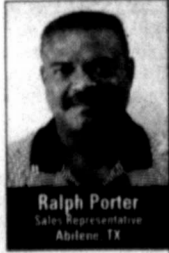

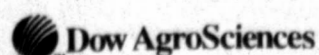

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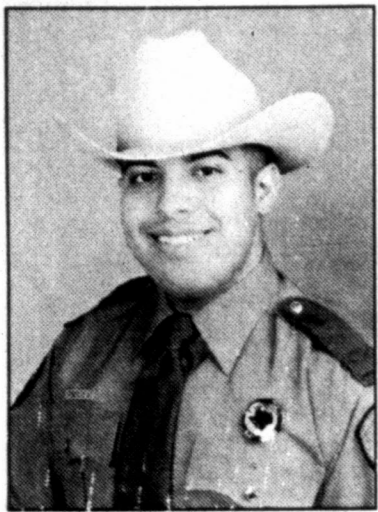

Windows for Remy

Bert Striegler met me at the museum in Brady the other day to tell me about windows for the cathedral at Remy, a city just north of Paris, France that has become Brady's sister city.

"The story goes back to World War II when a young man from Brady, Houston Lee Braley Jr. volunteered into the Air Force, became a P-51 pilot and was killed while strafing a German train that was parked on the tracks near Remy.

"The flight leader was a man named Roy Blaha, who has been here on numerous occasions. Roy went in first to strafe this camouflaged train. He fired at the full length of the train and nothing happened. Houston Lee rolled over and started his run on the train and almost the minute he fired his guns, the train blew up with an enormous explosion.

"Houston Lee's aircraft was demolished in midair. The fuselage crashed and slid across a road into a rock fence of a home that belonged to the most prestigious family in Remy. In fact, their name was Remy.

"A young teenage girl that lived in the home, who has also been here in the museum, ran out and pulled his body out of the aircraft and hid it.

"Germans frantically looked for his body but never found it. The next night a bunch of partisans in Remy buried Houston Lee's body in the Remy cemetery. They took one propeller blade off his crashed aircraft and used that as the marker on the grave. They then covered the grave with flowers.

"The next day the Germans were really upset because those same partisans had refused to bury a German pilot in their cemetery a few weeks before then. The Germans took all the flowers from the cemetery and told the residents of Remy that if any more flowers showed up anywhere in the cemetery they would kill 30 residents of the town.

"The next night Remy citizens covered the whole cemetery with flowers.

"Nobody got shot because it was the end of the war. The Germans knew the Americans were already on the ground in Normandy and things weren't going well for Germany.

"The explosion of the train blew all the windows out of the cathedral at Remy. They were stained glass windows that were built into the cathedral during the middle ages.

"The windows stayed unrepaired until 1995, when Houston Lee's old fighter group, the 364th, decided to raise the money to restore the cathedral windows. They thought they'd need a quarter of a million dollars to do it. They started a fund called WINDOWS FOR REMY and had all the money raised within two years. The windows are now completely restored."

The people from Remy have sent three separate delegations to Brady and visited the museum which has a display case devoted to the story. They presented the museum with a carved plaque made of wood from the cathedral. In 1995, both Brady and Remy held commemorative events on Veteran's Day.

Houston Lee Braley, Jr. is now buried in Brady.

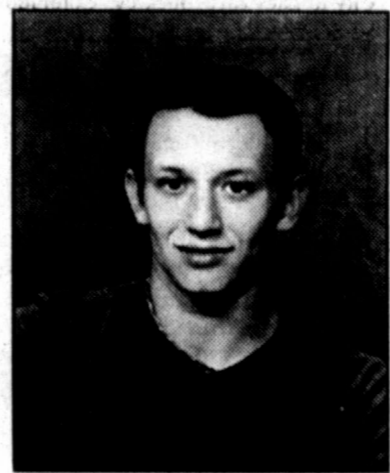

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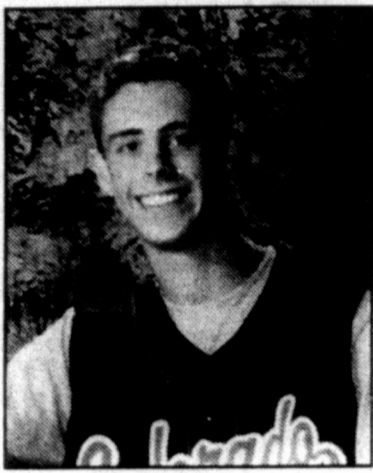

The husband said, "That's mighty nice of you judge and I'll give her a dollar or two every once in a while."

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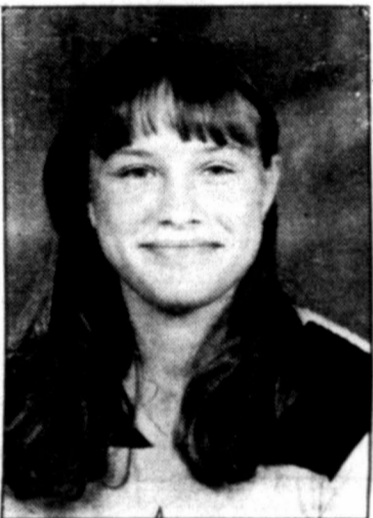

Another freshman, Jessica Castillo, was named to the first team as an infielder where she played shortstop.

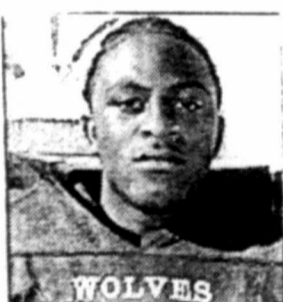
Freshman Michelle Arispe, the Lady Wolves second baseman, was named to the first team at that position.

Russell set numerous records during his four-year high school career at Colorado High School.

Getting the call to the varsity early in his freshman season, Russell ended up with 172 yards rushing on 34 carries, scoring one touchdown that year.

In his sophomore season Russell increased those numbers to 794 yards on 162 carries, scoring nine more touchdowns.

By his junior year Russell began to show district opponents just what he could do, rushing for 1,245 yards on 193 carries, scoring 15 touchdowns along the way.

That year he was rewarded by being named to the All-District team, All-Region, All-Big Country, All-South Plains, All-West Texas, and honorable mention All-State.

This past season, his senior year, Russell almost doubled

every category from his previous season as he rushed for 2,454 yards on only 238 carries. He scored 30 touchdowns for the Wolves.

Once again he was selected to the All-District team, this time as the District MVP. He also made first team All-Region, first team All-State as well as being named All-Big Country, All-West Texas, and All-South Plains.

Russell has set his goals high for the future.

"I hope that I can go to ACU and make an immediate impact for their football program," said Russell. "My goal is to make the starting team as a freshman, and to also make their track team. I would like to one day be a coach after my playing days are over."

Russell will be playing for the North team this Saturday. The team began two-a-day workouts on Wednesday after picking up equipment Tuesday evening. They will practice at the Abilene Wylie football field.
