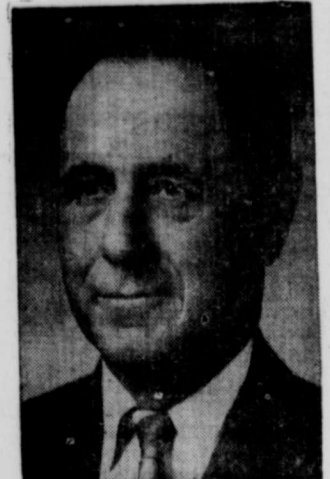

Mrs. Richardson Has 88th Birthday

Mrs. G. H. Richardson of Loraine celebrated her 88th birthday anniversary Wednesday September 17.

Mrs. Richardson has been a resident of Mitchell and Nolan counties for more than 60 years. She was born in Erath County September 17, 1864, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Carpenter. She recalls seeing her mother spinning and weaving cloth for their clothes and knitting socks for her family. Her mother died when she was young and she kept house for her father until her marriage to the late G. H. Richardson, August 1, 1888, at Whitney, Hill County, Texas.

They moved to Sweetwater in 1890, making the trip in covered wagons. Mrs. Richardson drove a team of horses and Mr. Richardson drove the other wagon pulled by oxen. It took about three weeks to make the trip. They located in Nolan County about 9 miles from Sweetwater which was then composed of only a few stores, no pavement, and stock roamed the streets. The country was filled with coyotes, rattlesnakes, and only a few people, most of them sheep herders and cowboys. Mr. Richardson engaged in stock and truck farming and hauled cedar post over the cow trails into Sweetwater.

Governor Will Open Prison Rodeo

Governor Allan Shivers will, for the fourth consecutive year, again officially open the Annual Prison Rodeo Sunday, October 5 and that date has been named Governor's Day by State prison Officials.

The announcement of the Governor's acceptance of the Prison Board's invitation to officiate at the rodeo's 21st year opening day ceremonies was made by the Board's Rodeo Committee Co-Chairman, French H. Robertson of Abilene, and H. H. Coffield of Rockdale. In addition to the State's first citizen, members of the Legislature and other State Officials have also been invited to attend the big convict show on that date as guests of the prison management.

To be featured as special guest attraction for the day, the 130 piece University of Texas Longhorn Band will come to Huntsville to play and perform drill and marching routines between inmate riding events. Featured with the Longhorn band will be the Texas Stars, a separate organization of twirlers and majorettes who appear with the band at football games wherever the band plays. On Saturday before the appearance at Huntsville the band plays at Memorial Stadium

Bank Deposits Are On Decline

As an indication of what the drought has done to the financial structure of this community is reflected in the statement of the First State Bank issued at the close of business on September fifth.

Deposits in the bank have gone down \$29,250.15 from \$1,178,417.84 on June 30, to \$1,149,167.69 on September 5. Loans, however, have increased only \$23.42 from June to September. Loans were \$127,052.60 and on September 5, \$47,740.92.

Trees were put out around the grounds a few years ago but they have not been properly cared for and many of them have died. They should be grubbed up and replaced. Such work could be carried on throughout the year by a custodian of the grounds if the school board had the money with which to pay him.

Funeral services for Delwin Scarborough, 17, were held at the First Baptist Church here Tuesday afternoon at 3:00, with his pastor, Rev. Wayland Boyd, officiating, assisted by Rev. G. A. McGee of Abilene, and Rev. A. C. Healer of Midland.



Delwin was drowned in Champion Creek Sunday afternoon about 5:30 while swimming in a pool several miles southwest of Loraine. He was accompanied by Arnold Lee Faulkenberry, Billy Dale Blair, Frankie Hart and Jackie Peterson. Delwin slipped from a log on which he was standing and became entangled in brush. His companions made desperate efforts to rescue him but were unable to release him.

The fire department from Colorado City went to the scene accompanied by Sheriff Dick Gregory and Police Chief Sam Hulme. The body was found in 8 feet of water only 5 feet from shore and was recovered by Sheriff Gregory. Dr. Kenneth Cowan gave the cause of death as death by drowning.

Delwin Russell Scarborough was born July 18, 1935, at Truscott, Texas. He was converted at the age of 13 and joined the Bethel Baptist Church and moved his membership to Loraine Baptist Church when he came here to live. He was a junior in high school and a member of the high school band.

Mitchell County and Colorado City News

Ed Williams, superintendent of Schools at Colorado City, reports an eight percent drop in enrollment as compared with last year.

Williams had predicted the slump before the beginning of school, basing his guess on the population drop in Colorado City caused by drought and steel strike. The enrollment in all but negro schools totaled 1496 as compared with 1631 for the same period in 1951. Figures on negro schools were not yet available, but likely a decrease when completed.

"Our grades from one to five are hurt most," says Williams. "Junior high grades just about held their own and high school enrollment is up seven percent from 380 to 407."

The majority of the missing students are from Mitchell County's rural population, believes Williams, with the usual influx of seasonal farm labor absent this fall, and rural families still leaving the county.

The enrollment at Buford, a farm community 4 miles north of Colorado City, was down from 168 to 103.

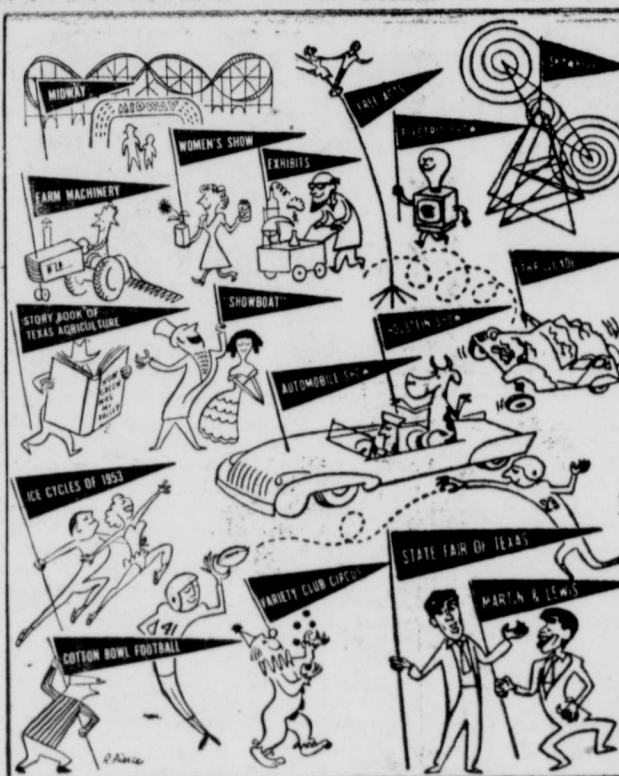

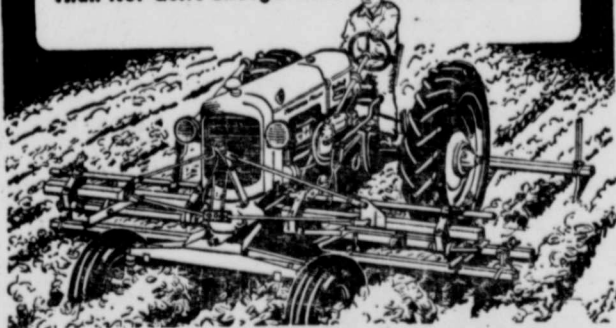

THE SOIL SAVING ARGUMENT

For a great number of years, much time, effort and money have been expended on a vast educational and promotional devoted to improving soil saving practices.

This program is gradually taking effect. Farmers in Texas, especially are becoming increasingly more aware of the importance of saving our soil for future generations. But every major undertaking has its obstacles. And the soil conservation movement is no exception.

Four major reasons loom as why the farmers are not applying all the beneficial practices recommended for their farms. They claim:

1. Mortgage debts and high operating and living costs make it a necessity to borrow money to establish these practices.
2. Many rental agreements do not provide for sharing costs of soil conservation with owners of the land.
3. Many farmers do not expect to live on their farms very long. This group includes renters with short-term agreements and owners who expect to sell or retire soon that they could not benefit from these practices.
4. If these soil saving practices were established, farmers would have to change their major farm enterprise.

To elaborate on these reasons, many farmers said adoption of all practices would make it necessary to change from cash crop and grain-consuming livestock such as hogs and fattening beef cattle, to roughage-consuming livestock such as beef and dairy cattle. They claimed the time and expense involved prohibited the change.

Over half the tenant operators surveyed said their rental agreements did not provide the share the cost clause. This was especially true in crop-share rental contracts. Nearly half the owner-operators had a mortgage debt which averaged \$4000. Other kept them from making additional cash soil outlays.

These arguments have valid points. As a result, continued technical assistance on how to overcome these obstacles may be necessary. It may also be desirable in some cases to give financial assistance where it is requested and definitely needed. But those who adhere to the short-sighted policy of neglecting soil work because the land will not be in their hands much longer have nothing to recommend them.

The land will be here after we are gone. We should pass it on to the next generation of farmers in a better condition than we found it.
