Antelope Cindermen Capture Fourth at Crosbyton Relays

The Abernathy Antelope track team opened the track season Saturday at Crosbyton by winning fourth place in the fourth annual Crosbyton Relays.

The surprising Antelope cindermen captured fourth place in the A division of the relays with 24 points. Muleshoe won the division with 38 points.

The Lockney Longhorns, who are supposed to rule the roost in this year's district track competition, tallied only five more points than the Antelopes to gain third place honors.

Capture 2 First Places

The Antelopes captured 2 first places, 2 seconds, one third, and 2 fourth at the meet.

A. C. Harris, who was the Antelopes top pointsman with 6 plus being a member of the winning mile relay team, won the 440-yard dash with a 53.9 clocking.

The Antelopes won the mile relay with a good 3:48.6 time. The relay team is composed of Harris, Jimmy Nelson, Pat Attebury, and Jimmy Dye.

Jerry Oswald won second in the 880-yard run with a 2:12 timing and Danny Miller won second place in the 180-low hurdles.

Jimmy Dye placed third in the pole vault with a 9'4" leap.

Gerald Watson won fourth in the 120-high hurdles and A. C. Harris won fourth in the 220-yard dash.

Antelope Cager Selected to All-District Team

Junior Jimmy Dye, forward and co-captain for the Abernathy Antelopes boys basketball team, was selected to the second 2-AA All District basketball team by district 2-AA coaches in a meeting at Station on March 19.

Dye averaged over 14 points per game for the Antelopes, who finished the season with a 9-3 district record, only one game behind district and bi-district champion, Tahoka.

Two other juniors, Reggie Stephens and Lane Tannehill, the other co-captain, received an honorable mention from the district coaches.

The Antelopes, coached by Wayne Preston, will lose only two men by graduation, Larry Wilkinson and Bo Wright, neither one regular starters.

Cucumber Acreage Contracted Here

The W. W. Pickle Company of Montgomery, Alabama, manufacturers of Whitefield Pickles, has contracted for 200 acres of cucumbers to be grown in the immediate vicinity of Abernathy and marketed thru a grading and weighing station locally managed here in Abernathy.

The grading will be largely mechanical, as the only hand work in grading will be picking out bad shaped and otherwise undesirable cucumbers as they travel along a moving conveyor belt. At present this 200 acres is all that can be handled as there must be capacity in vats to handle the contracted acres and this vat capacity governs the acres to be contracted for. Cucumbers grown here will, after being graded and weighed at

the local receiving station, be trucked to Dallas and delivered to the pickle plant there.

Cucumbers will be planted, cultivated, and grown to picking size by the farmer who will also gather and deliver them to the local grading and weighing station. The grower will be paid for his cucumbers as soon as graded and weighed at the receiving station here. There will be no delay to the grower receiving his money because he will be paid at the local grading and weighing station.

Two pickers are required to the acre because cucumbers have to be picked daily in order to get the small sizes required for best quality and price. If the crop is planted at the normal time, picking should begin in the latter part of June and continue until the last of August. The picking begins

slowly as the crop begins putting fruit and works up to a peak of production then tapers off to the finish. As an example, 1,000,000 pounds were delivered at Hale Center during the peak week in 1957.

A local man is to be in charge and manage the receiving station here where the customers will be graded by sampling each load and grading the sample only.

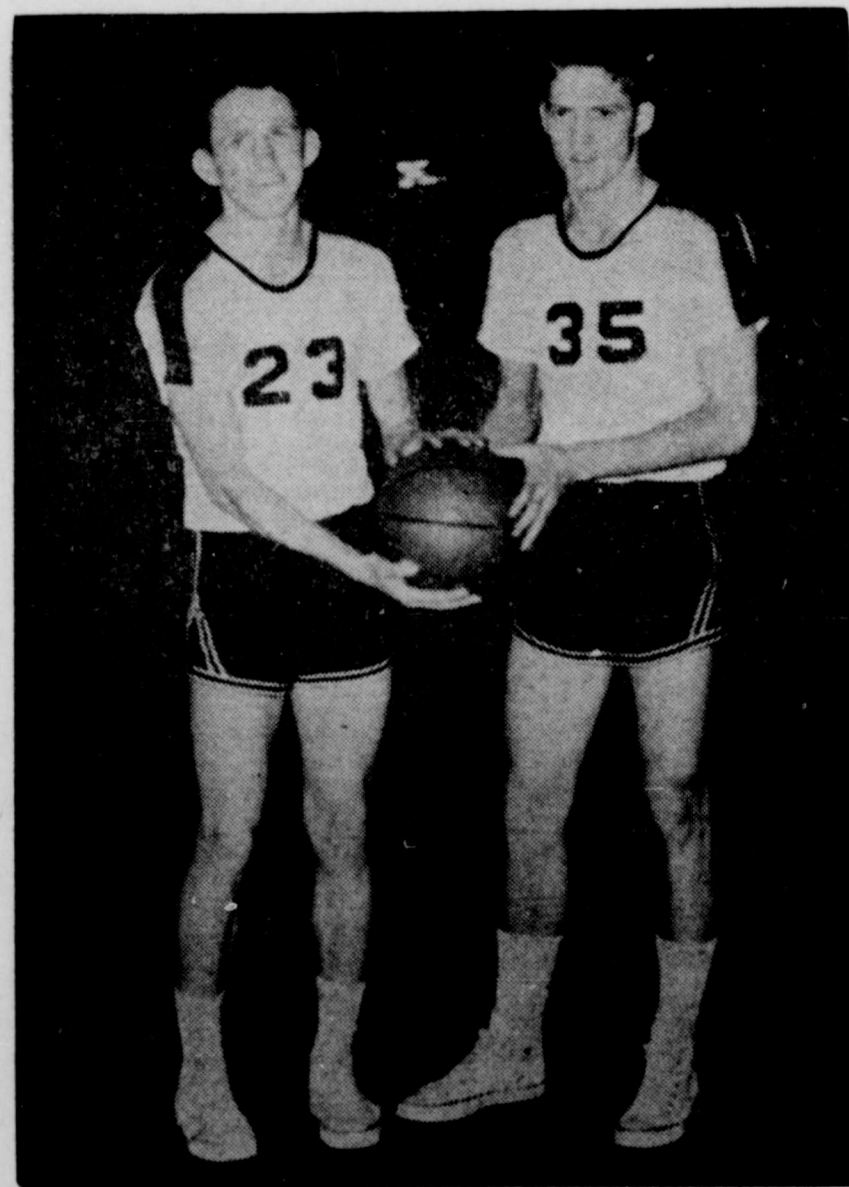

Clifford Smith, 17, of Willacy county, is a boy who believes that livestock is both fun and fundamental to an all-round farm. Named state winner in the 4-H Meat Animal program Smith received a smart pen and pencil set in recognition of his selection, the gift of Thos. E. Wilson, donor of awards.

After six years Smith's beef project has reaped big dividends. He handled 81 head of cattle. His herd bull, valued at \$11,000, is responsible for 42 award ribbons and trophies.

Smith is plowing back cash prizes and profits into his project to build up his herd of Herefords. He has made three trips to the Texas 4-H Round-Up, and was president and junior leader of his 4-H Club.

A boy who has no trouble seeing the forest for the trees is Keith Lowery, 16, of Nacoches county. He was named winner of the state 4-H Forestry award and received a handsome pen and pencil set from American Forest Products Industries.

For his tireless efforts in five years of 4-H forestry, Lowery owns over 40 acres of timber. Earnings from pulpwood sales will help finance his college education, he says.

This energetic lad cleared, pruned, measured and ringed trees in his father's 700 acres of woodland. He helped set out

30,000 slash seedlings. Also he built and repaired the fences to protect them.

Lowery has won 4-H awards for his poultry project, and was active in judging poultry, livestock and soils.

A friendly smile and a silver tongue paid off in top state 4-H honors for Ruby Jean Beasley, 17, of Brown county, and David Kuperman, 16, of Stephens county. The pair were named winners in the 4-H Public Speaking program, and their persuasive oratory was rewarded by The Pure Oil Company.

Miss Beasley was presented with a certificate of honor and a beautiful set of silverware. Her firm belief in the joys of rural living was the foundation of her winning speech, "Fun on the Farm."

During her nine years of 4-H Club work, Miss Beasley gave 23 speeches to audiences of close to 2,400 people. In addition, she appeared on radio and TV programs.

Kuperman also received a certificate plus a handsome 19-jewel wrist watch. An eloquent explanation of what 4-H leadership training means to America's future was the basis of his award-winning talk.

Several 4-H talent-night and radio speeches rounded out this talented youth's six years of 4-H Club work.

Summary of the nine constitutional amendments to be voted on at the general election November 4, 1958, in the order that they will appear on the ballot.

(1) Provides for annual Sessions of the Legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capital.

(H.J.R. No. 1) Establishes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability, and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

(S.J.R. No. 6) Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

(H.J.R. No. 30) Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years. (H.J.R. No. 48)

(6) Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows. (H.J.R. No. 17)

(7) Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational, and other resources of Texas. (S.J.R. No. 4)

(8) Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance. (H.J.R. No. 36)

(9) Authorizes the Legislature to

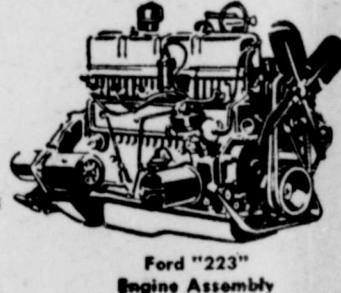
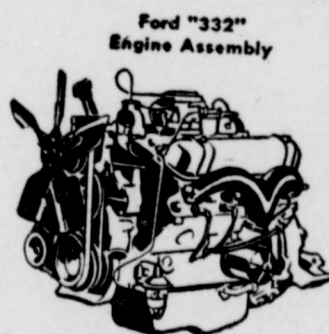

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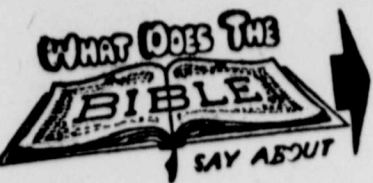
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Religious Lying? (No. 2)

By LOYD E. ASH

You will remember last week we showed the moral wrong in the sin of lying. Satan is the source of all lies (John 8:44), all lies are abomination to God (Prov. 6:16-18), and all liars shall have their part in hell (Rev. 21:8).

In this article, let us consider what the Bible teaches about lying as it relates to God's religious laws to man.

1. We Must Obey God's Commands

When God speaks, all men should hear and obey: "Fear God, and keep His commandments: for this is the whole duty of man" (Eccl. 12:13). If we hear God's word, and refuse to believe Him, we make Him a liar: "He that believeth not God hath made Him a liar" (1 John 5:10). We must keep His commandments to please Him: "And hereby we do know that we know Him, if we keep His commandments. He that saith I know Him, and keepeth His commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him" (1 John 2:3-4).

2. The Word of God Must Not Be Changed

God's anger is provoked when men disregard or change His word. He said to Moses: "Ye shall not add unto the word which I command you, neither shall ye diminish ought from it: that ye may keep the commandments of the Lord your God which I command you" (Deut. 4:2). Solomon said: "Every word of God is pure: he is the shield unto them that put their trust in Him. Add thou not unto his words, lest He reprove thee, and thou be found a liar" (Prov. 30:5-6). The Bible closes with the same type of warning (Rev. 22:18-19).

Therefore, any addition or subtraction from the Bible is not of God, but is a religious lie, for no lie is of the truth (1 John 2:21). Let us remember that only the truth will make us free (John 8:32) when we obey it (1 Peter 1:22).

3. Beware of False Teachers

Throughout the history of mankind there have been men who changed God's word and taught the people different statutes. Jesus warns us today: "Beware of false teachers" and "Take heed that

no man deceive you" (Matt. 7:15 and 24:4). Paul warned the Ephesian elders: "Take heed. For I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock. Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things to draw away disciples after them" (Acts 20:28-30). John said: "Many deceivers are entered into the world" (2 John 7).

Let us take heed lest we lead astray by following teaching that is not exactly like the Bible, the word of God! Many today "Subvert whole houses, teaching things which they ought not" (Titus 1:11).

4. How Shall We Know Who Is a False Teacher

You cannot tell by his manners, dress, or diction, but only by his teaching. If it is not exactly like the word of God, it is false teaching and he is a false teacher.

1 Peter 4:11—let him speak as the oracles of God.

Isaiah 8:20—to the law and the testimony.

Psalms 27:11—teach me thy way.

Psalms 119:104—through thy precepts I get understanding.

Psalms 119:105—thy word is a lamp unto my feet.

You should test the teaching you follow by comparing it closely to the word of God and accept it only if it is in complete harmony with God's word. "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good" (1 Thess. 5:21). You should "Believe not every spirit, but try the spirits (doctrines) whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1).

5. What Should I Do If I Find I Am In Error?

When a person discovers he has been following false teaching, he should "forsake the error of his way" (James 5:20) and "return into the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him" (Isaiah 55:7). Let us all remember: "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both Father and the Son" (2 John 9).

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Full Allotment Planting, Withdrawal of Acres From Soil Bank Urged by WTCC

ABILENE, (Spl)—Texas cotton farmers, faced with the best prospect in both moisture and prices in a decade, are being urged to plant every allotted acre in cotton this year, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce said today.

A group of cotton industry leaders—including ginners, growers, shippers, buyers, Texas Agricultural Service, representatives of the WTCC, and others—met in Dallas last Saturday (March 15) to appraise the outlook in view of a large soil bank participation.

They came up with a 2-point recommendation:

Plant every available acre in cotton.

Withdraw cotton acres from the soil bank while there is time.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture, indicating belief that the soil bank sign up is greater than desirable, has extended the withdrawal date to March 28, in order to give more cotton producers more time to withdraw from the program.

Loyan H. Walker, WTCC agricultural manager who attended the meeting, said the group is urging cotton farmers to reconsider their soil bank participation and place soil bank acres into production.

"Because of the excellent moisture we've received thus far, and due to the present shortage of quality cotton, the promise of cotton prices that will be considerably above government supports, it is highly likely that the farmers can make a larger net profit by putting his acres in production than he can by placing his land in the soil bank," Walker said.

In addition, because the production will create jobs in harvesting, ginning, and such, the farmer will be helping to insure Texas and particularly West Texas from feeling the serious effects from the recession that is creating such hardships in other sections of the nation.

"Perhaps equally important in the long run," Walker stated, "is the fact that unless we produce quality cotton in the largest possible quantities, we will be losing more of our market to synthetics and foreign produced cotton."

Walker stated that presently there is a scarcity of high quality cotton, a condition brought about by last year's bad weather which lowered the cotton grade. Both domestic mills and foreign customers are bidding for cotton of high quality, he said.

"Increased world consumption, combined with the shortage of high grade lint, should cause the better grades of cotton to sell above the support price of \$190 per bale (for middling inch)," the

operator at Burnie's Beauty Shop.

Walker's views were supported in the Dallas meeting by Burris C. Jackson of Hillsboro, chairman of the Statewide Cotton Committee of Texas. At the Dallas meeting of the group, Jackson said the heavy participation in the soil bank is a threat to the state's economy.

The tragedy, he said, is that a great industry is about to be wrecked, and millions of people will be financially hurt.

It has been estimated, according to Walker, that the 1,868,913 acres in the soil bank in Texas would represent a production drop of 180,000,000 worth of cotton. And, since a bale of cotton generates business worth five times its original value, this means an economic loss of nearly a billion dollars.

Walker said roughly 50 per cent of the economic loss will be in West Texas.

Walker said it was learned that the reduction in cotton ginning would amount to labor totaling 2,167 employees with a salary loss of \$4,352,000. The loss in gin work from the acres in the soil bank would be equal to the shutting down of 544 cotton gins in Texas.

J. D. Previtt, assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the soil bank acres would result in the following business in Texas:

Seed, \$3,513,556; fertilizer, \$2,446,965; hired labor (except harvesting), \$3,513,556; insecticides, \$6,541,195; tractor fuels, oils, repairs and other machinery costs, \$5,606,739; harvesting and hauling, \$25,230,325; ginning, \$5,887,075; bagging and ties, \$1,962,359. This loss totals \$4,721,770.

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Seed Treatment Information

College Station—Seedling diseases account for yield losses of about two to two and one-half percent of the potential cotton crop each year in Texas.

These losses can be greatly reduced by proper seed treatment with an approved chemical. Such treatment helps prevent seed decay and damping-off from both seed and soil-borne organisms.

This treatment is the theme of a leaflet recently released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, "Cottonseed Treatment for Texas."

For effective production, the chemical should be mixed with the seed in such a way that it is spread uniformly over the entire seed surface, according to the leaflet. Special machines for large scale seed treatment are available for applications as a slurry, liquid, or dust.

The importance of following the recommended rate of the chemical to be used is emphasized. A smaller amount would give ineffective results while a larger amount could damage the seed. A poor job of seed treatment is often little better than no treatment at all.

The results of cottonseed treat-

ment tests with acid-delted and reginned seed, and recommendations as to the materials to be used as well as the rates for effective treatments are given in the leaflet.

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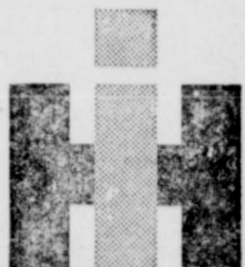

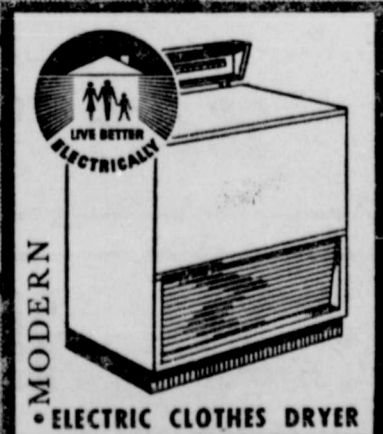

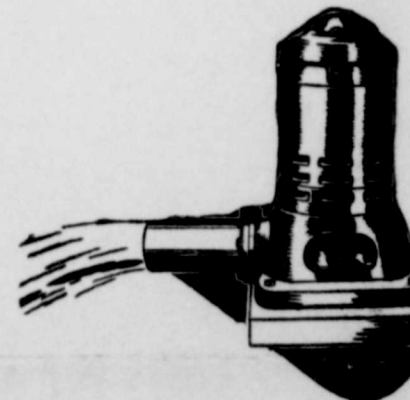
