Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

First Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

OUR FLAG, THE STARS AND STRIPES, which on June 14, 1777, became the national emblem of the United States, has special meaning for Americans today. Its thirteen stripes, representing the thirteen original colonies look back over a proud history of 193 years; its fifty stars — one for each state — speak of the mighty nation we have become and of the future that it is within our power to create, a land overflowing with agricultural and industrial abundance, a land of breathtaking natural beauty where rural homes and gleaming cities house a great and free people. With humility in our hearts, with confidence in our ability, and with trust in the Lord, this is a future that Americans can achieve — a nation over which the Stars and Stripes will wave in fulfillment of that wisdom which our first patriots wrote into our great historic documents, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution.

JUNE 14 THROUGH JUNE 20 is National Flag Week, a fitting time to show your colors, and display Old Glory both where you live and where you work.

"OUR FLAG." This popular 32-page booklet tells the story of our flag, sets forth the laws and regulations governing its display, and contains color reproductions of the flags of the American Revolution and off all 50 states. Available free to constituents upon request to my office.

THE BIG BANKERS ARE ORGANIZING their supporters and gathering a war chest of at least \$500,000 this year to finance the newly formed Bankers Political Action Committee (BankPAC), a group which will endeavor to influence elections for the U. S. Senate and the U. S. House of Representatives. This is a predictable development since the Big Bankers violently oppose my One Bank Holding Company Bill. I introduced this legislation in the interest of the people and to preserve the competitive position of the nation's smaller banks.

"GAMBLERS, SPECULATORS AND LOAN SHARKS" suffered a severe setback when the House refused to permit higher interest rates in the District of Columbia. In the language of the floor debate it was a vote to decide "who runs America . . . the banking interests or the people" — and the people won by a strong record vote.

DID YOU KNOW THAT TEXAS is 9.7 times bigger than Alaska, and 3 times the size of California when we exclude acreage owned by the Federal government. On this basis even the second largest state, Montana, is far less than half the size of Texas. As a matter of fact, Alaska, California, and Montana combined total only 133.45 million acres of non-Federal land, whereas Texas has 165.21 million acres free and clear of federal ownership!

NO I DO NOT FAVOR WAGE AND PRICE CONTROLS. There are from ten to twelve million wages and prices (conservatively estimated) that would have to be determined and fixed — and then each rule and regulation for each fixed price and fixed wage would have to be policed. The machinery to do all this is ponderous, complicated, expensive, and time consuming, and leads to black markets and corruption.

THE NIXON ADMINISTRATION claims it wants to do something to stop inflation, and there are selective devices that could be used, other than Wage and Price Controls. However, in an effort to give the President all that he requires to do something the Banking & Currency Committee is considering giving him the power to impose Wage and Price Controls — even though we would not like to see this done in the belief that he should have available for his consideration every possible economic weapon like another shotgun in the corner.

THE ONE THING THE PRESIDENT CAN DO to stop inflation (like a slug from an Army .45) would be to lower interest rates. He has the power to do this right now — but it would mean less profit for those Wall Street Bankers. Our President has the power and the choice. Meanwhile the people are faced with more inflation, higher interest rates and rising unemployment.

Austin. — Pollution of Texas beaches brought strong recommendations to Senate committee for curbs on offshore oil exploration, vigorous enforcement of anti-spill regulations and creation of a national oil company.

Senate beach and pipeline study committees listened to a full day of testimony. Highlights included:

- Complaints of pipeline consultant Terence O'Rourke that state agencies seldom file cases to collect fines for oil spill pollutions. O'Rourke said Texas would have a fund of "millions of dollars" from fines to combat pollution if strong enforcement were the rule. Railroad Commission Chief Enforcement Officer Roy Payne acknowledged under questioning that the Commission has never filed lawsuit to punish accident pollution through spills.

- Statement by Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston that the oil industry should not be permitted to drill in coastal waters until it can give assurances it has technology to prevent spills.

- Recommendation of Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur that double safety devices be installed on huge coastal rigs so emergency manual shut-offs could be used when automated equipment fails or is destroyed by fires.

- Suggestion by Austin journalist Ronnie Dugger that a national oil company be established to produce oil on public lands. Dugger said former Gov. Ross Sterling, himself an oil company executive, as far back as 1931 had proposed the state drill its own oil and that President Nixon's task force wants the federal government to finance exploration and development of an emergency standby reserve.

- Recommendation by governor's aide John Shanahan Jr. for tighter rules over oil industry operating in state waters and legislative designation of responsibility for oil spill contingency planning.

COURTS SPEAK — In district court cases at Houston and El Paso, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin won first judicial orders checking air pollution by trash burning and industrial smoke. Civil penalties were assessed in the Dobert's Dump case, Houston. An El Paso smelting and refining firm was given deadlines for installing anti-pollution devices.

Supreme Court held that cities under 5,000 (Lindale) cannot annex territory without consent of the people living in the area.

High Court set July arguments on the issue of whether an insurance company (Allstate) issuing uninsured motorist coverage should be allowed to enter court against its own policy holder on the side of uninsured drivers to prove its client was partly at fault or his injuries less than claimed.

Supreme Court reversed the \$42,892 judgment awarded a 79-year-old woman injured in a stairway fall at Houston's Astrodome.

Attorney General announced acceptance of voluntary compliance from a Beaumont housewares franchiser, agreeing to discontinue advertising and sales practices questioned as deceptive.

SHOULD JP'S BE LAWYERS? — State Bar will take up a resolution at its San Antonio convention July 2 urging the legislature to require urban county judges and justices of the peace have credentials as lawyers.
