County Health Notes

(Dec. 23, 1921)

Last week the community was favored with a visit from Miss Besse Edwards of the A. & M. College of Texas. Miss Edwards is a Home Demonstration Agent and the Supervisor of the Home Demonstration Agents in the Panhandle. In the counties which have these agents, there are classes in sewing, cooking, millinery and other domestic arts.

Miss Edwards gave a talk to the public on Wednesday afternoon at the Perryton School, and she demonstrated the preparing and serving of one hot dish for the Hot Lunch. On Thursday morning she gave a demonstration to the sixth grade. The children had tomato soup to eat with their dinner, and enjoyed it very much. Miss Edwards was very well pleased to find so many schools in the county serving Hot Lunches, and as this was her first visit to the county we were glad to know that she was so pleased and intends to return some time next year and help to have a home demonstration in this county before long.

Thursday afternoon, Miss Thomas went to Wawaka and spent a short time in the school and talked at a community meeting there in the evening. The school there bought a nice sink which they have installed in the building and are the first school in the county to have such a home convenience. They also have a roll of paper towels, and their Hot Lunch equipment which is composed of a large kettle, spoon and fork for each room, which the teachers say is all that is necessary, for where the children ride to school, they bring their cups in small pails. On Friday, Miss Christopher's room had oyster stew, and Mrs. Zook's room had stewed chicken with gravy, the chicken having been a donation from one of the patrons. The children are fastly gaining weight and will soon be up to the 90 per cent normal.

On Friday, Mr. H. C. Coffee took Miss Thomas to Lone Tree school. Sixteen of the twenty-seven children weighed up to normal.

The class in home nursing met on Monday and next week, Dec. 27, the class will be on Tuesday and will have the last demonstration.

We wish all the children and patrons of Ochiltree County a very Merry Christmas.

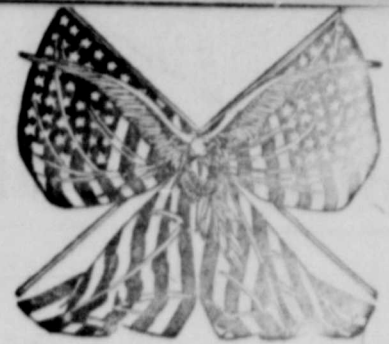

GLAZIER DOCTOR ELECTROCUTED FOR MURDERING HIS WIFE

The unfolding of a tale of a Blue Beard is the recounting of Dr. Wilmer Amos Hadley, physician and surgeon formerly at Glazier in this county, who was electrocuted at Richmond, Texas, for the murder of his wife, and the murder of a Doctor Griffith at the same time. He confessed to the murders in a written statement. The execution took place December 24th. The life of this man makes the story a story of romance, and the inexorable arm of

the law reaching, tirelessly searching for the cruel murderer. Doctor Hadley was born at Larned, Kans., and attended the Friends University in Wichita, Kan., about twenty years ago. His parents then moved to Texas, and Hadley graduated from the medical branch of the state university at Galveston. The next the record shows of his activities he was a doctor in a mining camp in Colorado. One night while answering a sick call his horse slipped on a mountainside road, throwing the doctor off the ledge which had a drop of over 2,000 feet to the bottom. Twenty feet from where he fell his body struck a nar-

row shelf and he lay there with his back broken, partly off and partly on the ledge, the thermometer registering 20 degrees below zero; and his faithful horse stood sentinel on the road twenty feet above. Finally the bus carrying a load of miners to their work found the horse standing there in the bitter cold, winter wind, and on investigating found and rescued the doctor. For sixteen months he lay completely paralyzed, unable to move; but finally he recovered. Next we find him hunting a location on the Plains, his physique not yet being strong from the broken back incident, and he decided on Glazier for a home, bringing his wife who was a musician and vocalist of marked ability. She sang a solo in Canadian at the opening of the P. time Theater. She was talented and a woman of marked personality.

One day while located at Glazier, Doctor Hadley and friends were out hunting, and a camper overheard the men address him as "Doc," so he stated that he had a sick boy, and asked the doctor to look at him. The doctor found the boy to be suffering from an attack of acute appendicitis, and he put him in his car and carried him to Canadian to the home of Mrs. J. B. Stickley, the building recently vacated by the Canadian Orphans Home and which Mrs. Stickley at that time had converted into a hospital. Doctor Hadley called Dr. A. M. Newman to come out that night and administer an anesthetic, and he performed the operation himself skillfully, and it proved a complete success. The work marked him as a very skillful surgeon. Doctor Hadley and his talented wife were at the opening of the institution that is known as the Canadian Hospital; but failing to make the arrangements to locate in Canadian, he went to Oklahoma City, and soon enlisted for service in the army. While in the army and stationed at Virginia he represented himself to be a single man and became engaged to marry a nurse.

He took his wife in a canoe on the river and drugged her with whiskey, then, bound her and tied rocks to her to cast her into the water. At this moment a Doctor Griffith appeared on the bank and saw what Hadley was doing. Hadley shot him tied rocks to him and threw him into the river. He then threw his wife, drugged, bound and weighted with rocks into the water. This double crime was committed

in October, 1918. In November the doctor received his discharge from the army. In December the body of his wife appeared on the surface of the water, and authorities sent descriptions over the country. The doctor had written to his wife's sister in Cincinnati, Ohio, stating that he and his wife had made a trip to the Bermuda Islands and while there she had died, and owing to the war conditions he could not ship the body home, so had buried her there.

The sister in Cincinnati saw the newspaper accounts of the finding of the body, and wired the authorities to measure the woman's hands and see if one was larger than the other. On receiving the reply that such was the case, she went to Richmond and identified the body. Mrs. Hadley came from a prominent and wealthy family in Cincinnati and was known to have been wearing diamond rings to the value of \$2,000 or more. When the body was found on the river all rings had been taken from her fingers.

The doctor was evidently keeping much with the case for as soon as the sister began wiring he disappeared. He was next seen around an old home in Texas, Friendwood, a passing station between Houston and Galveston. But he stayed there only a day or two, and the authorities were after him for they arrived there the next day after he left. It seems that the doctor then went as far as he could from the arteries of the world, and selected Farmington, New Mexico, a small town in the northwest corner of that state, where he could live as a hermit. He built a hut in a grove of trees on the mountainside, and camouflaged it into the branches of the trees. He always carried a high power rifle, and his peculiar actions caused the comments of a neighbor to be reported to the police at Denver who arrested him and secured his confession.

Until his confession was made the murder of Griffith was not known to the authorities. As soon as the nurse, a Miss Gladys Mercer, in the government hospital at Westhampton, Va., learned that her lover was a married man and was wanted for murder, she appeared before the authorities and told of all associations he had had with the doctor. —Canadian Record

The mental development is so closely tied up with the physical development that one definitely influences the other. If the body fails to grow properly and function harmoniously, the brain likewise is affected. Malnutrition has been found to be second only to poor mentality in its retarding influence.

A few facts gleaned from experiments will show some of the serious results of malnutrition or the insufficient building up of tissues due to deficiency of food in quantity and quality. Experiments show that serious eye trouble result; diseased glands occur in twelve per cent of the worst nourished children against five per cent in the best nourished; adenoids in twenty-six per cent of worst nourished over seventeen per cent of well nourished; unhealthy heart murmurs occur in twenty-six per cent of the badly nourished over three per cent of the best nourished.

The best school work for what is good for the body is good for the brain. Naturally following this statement one deduces the fact that with a better body and better school training the child is better fitted to be helpful and successful when he grows up and this deduction is correct.

Those who have tried the school lunch add innumerable lists of advantages resulting from the hot school lunch, such as:

1. Greater resistance to disease on part of child; due to better health and physical conditions.
2. Better school work results from better health conditions.
3. Better school attendance as result of enjoyment of work by children.
4. Higher average in scholarship, better report cards.

THE BETRAYAL OF A NATION

The history of the fight to destroy the League of Nations, or at least to make it impotent, is being written much earlier than many politicians anticipate. The motive behind the fight was thought to be hidden in the innermost recesses of the minds of those who conceived the plot and executed it. Crimes against individuals have often remained concealed apparently for all time, but crimes against a Nation are eventually recorded in history. In the case of the League of Nations, the inside facts are being revealed and a record made. The motives of those who met in secret even before all the contents of that famous document were known to them, and planned its destruction along with the elimination of President Wilson, stand out today as the most damnable and selfish ever conceived in the mind of a politician who places party first and the Nation second.

Prior to the receipt of the treaty of Versailles and League of Nations document in this country, but after party leaders had been informed somewhat of its scope, Senator Lodge, Knox, (now deceased) Brandegee and a few other party leaders, met in secret at a prearranged dinner where Senator Lodge presented his plan to restore the Republican party to power. At this dinner Senator Lodge is reported to have said:

"President Wilson has brought back from France the most important State document ever formulated in the history of the world. If the Senate of the United States ratifies this League of Nations covenant and treaty of peace, it will be known, recorded and heralded as an achievement of the Democratic party. As Republicans we cannot allow this to occur. For such an instrument of such world-wide importance to be ratified and chronicled as the achievement of a Democratic President and a Democratic Administration would cast a blight upon the Republican party and its future and would keep us in the background perhaps for years. Our only remedy is to kill the League of Nations and treaty of peace and in order to do this we must eliminate President Wilson."

In this statement Senator Lodge acknowledged the treaty of Versailles and the League of Nations as the greatest state document ever formulated in the world. His objection to it was that it was the product of a Democratic president and a Democratic administration. To him the success of his party was greater than the revival of industry and the promotion of the cause of peace throughout the world. The fact that failure to ratify this treaty would plunge Nations into war; that millions of women and children would suffer the pangs of starvation; that the world would continue in a state of turmoil and that the United States would be placed in a position of renouncing her world obligations, were of little weight as compared with party success.

This editorial is not written in support of the League of Nations but in condemnation of all party leaders, Democratic and Republican, whose loyalty to party and to their own selfish interests is greater than their loyalty to the Nation itself.

How long will we continue to send men to the United States Senate and to the House of Representatives whose only thought is for political power and who subjects the welfare of the Nation to whims of leaders who play the game from a professional standpoint and according to the rules of a half century ago?

Judas Iscariot betrayed Christ for a few pieces of silver. Benedict Arnold surrendered the fortress of West Point to the enemies of his country for a few dollars and a commission of Colonel in the British army. Both acts are condemned by all Christian people. Crimes as black as any recorded in history are committed in the name of Party—Farm and Ranch.
