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TEXAS

WINTER VEGETABLE SHIPMENTS—It is difficult to keep the average mind fixed closely enough on figures to comprehend just what they mean, but here are some about South Texas. More than 200 cars of winter vegetables and fruits are shipped out of the Lower Rio Grande points in one day. Laredo and the Winter Garden district—the territory between Laredo and San Antonio—is doing as well. Crystal City having shipped 145 cars in one day. An average car of vegetables is valued at around \$1,000. The shipping season is about three months, though some shipments are made over a longer period. Make your own calculations and draw your own conclusions.

BANDIT REWARD STICKS—Texas bankers are meeting recently held in Beaumont, Houston, Brownsville, McAllen, San Antonio, Coleman, Waco and Wichita Falls districts covering a large part of Texas, appeared to be practically unanimous in favoring the retention of the \$5,000 reward for bandits captured while robbing a bank, whether dead or alive. The sentiment, as expressed by Dallas bankers, seems to be: "The bankers feel that the movement is not only within the law, but is an encouragement of law enforcement." The reward has been criticised by numerous Texas newspapers.

OKLAHOMA MAY FOLLOW—One group of Oklahoma bankers has asked for the appointment of a committee to draw up a petition to the Oklahoma State Bankers' association asking that a standing reward of \$5,000 be offered in that State for each dead bank bandit. Bandits that had been operating in Texas before a similar reward was offered apparently have transferred their activities largely to Oklahoma.

PLANES FOR TEXAS DRY USE—There is now one air plane in use in Texas in finding stills in isolated sections and in trailing dry law violators. Others are said to be ready for such use as they may be needed. At least four qualified aviators are serving as dry enforcement agents in Texas, and it is stated that they may soon be supplied with planes. Hundreds of illicit stills have been found with air planes that could not have been discovered without them. The way of the illicit distiller seems to be getting hard in Texas.

SAN ANTONIO OPPOSES BOX BILL—The San Antonio chamber of commerce wired Senators Mayfield and Sheppard of Texas in opposition to the Box bill restricting Mexican labor immigration to the quota of European countries. The message stated: "Agriculture is suffering enough without a blow of this kind, which would deprive Texas and other southwestern states of a large portion of their seasonal agricultural labor. If the bill should pass the House, would consider it a terrible tragedy for Texas. It would mean peril to agriculture."

WANTS WOOLEN MILL—Lambert is not to be left without competition in efforts to locate the first woolen mill to be located in Texas during this century. San Angelo, the largest interior wool market in the world, is after a mill. There are rumors that Kerrville or some other place in that section may be favored if proper efforts are made. Years ago there was a successful woolen mill at New Braunfels. Later Waco had a large woolen goods manufactory. In those days most of the wool had to be shipped to Texas for mill consumption and the manufactured wools were nearly all shipped back East. Conditions have changed, and now Texas grows the wool to supply the mills and Texans are no longer prejudiced against the use of goods made in the state.

AMARILLO MUSIC MEET.—The Texas Federation of Music Clubs has perfected plans for the annual convention at Amarillo, April 16-19. The largest attendance in the history of the organization is expected and the program will be the best that Texas can present. Music has kept pace in its development in Texas with the other arts and with the general cultural progress of this and other southwestern states.

MCCORMACK HONORED BY POPE—John McCormack, noted tenor, so much beloved in Texas music circles, has been honored by Pope Pius by elevation to the papal peerage with the title and dignity of "count." Mr. McCormack recently appeared in concert at several Texas cities where he renewed acquaintances, and maintained his place as the favorite tenor.

Hotel Building to Start March 10

CONTRACT IS SIGNED FOR BIG BUILDING

Cisco's new \$400,000 hotel was assured this morning when representative Cisco citizens met at the chamber of commerce and underwrote the unsubscribed balance due on Cisco's quota of stock for the hotel, and closed the contract with Wm. C. Witt and associates. These enterprising citizens underwrote this balance in spite of the fact that each one had previously subscribed liberally to this stock, but they believed that the loyal citizens of Cisco will take this balance underwritten at the meeting this morning in order to secure such a splendid addition to the business section of Cisco. The building will have seven stories and roof garden.

Closing the contract for this hotel means more to Cisco than one can realize, as it assures a substantial payroll for labor that is not employed at present, or only partially so, and even after its completion the hotel itself will keep quite a force on its payroll, besides the additional money that will be brought here after the hotel is in operation.

The Cisco's material growth will doubtless be largely enhanced by additional buildings which will be constructed, and these buildings will continue to keep men employed, whose wages will be spent with Cisco merchants, and thus materially increase the circulating medium in business circles here.

With the completion of the hotel, Cisco will have added one of the most pretentious hostilities that may be found in any city West of Fort Worth, and a home for the traveling public that would be a credit to cities much larger. This will give Cisco a hotel equal or superior to any town in this part of the state, and will be another institution to the credit of these enterprising citizens who are responsible for the splendid position Cisco now occupies among her sister West Texas cities.

The new hotel has not yet been christened. The name for the new hostelry will later be decided by a committee for that purpose, and this name will be taken from some of the numerous suggestions yet to be made by the public. It has been decided to call for suggestions for a name for the new hostelry, and a coupon will be carried in the Cisco News, which may be filled out and mailed to this newspaper. From these suggestions the hotel will be christened. The Daily News will pay \$10 to the first coupon user suggesting the name selected by the committee for the new hotel.

Commence Work March 10. Wm. C. Witt, president of the hotel company, reached Cisco late Tuesday night and met with the committee this morning when the contract was formally closed. Just before his departure for Dallas today Mr. Witt said:

"Preparations have already been made to commence construction work on the new hotel by March 10, as all of the major problems have been worked out, and only the minor details are now to be taken up. W. H. Maclay, of the Bellows & Maclay Construction Co., which company has the contract to build the hotel, was here Tuesday afternoon and looked over the site for the building, together with J. F. Brown, who will superintend the construction. These gentlemen are now working out the details preparatory to commencing the work." Mr. Witt concluded.

The Cisco Hotel Co. has been organized, a charter applied for, which is expected from the secretary of state's office at Austin right away. The officers named for the company are as follows: Wm. C. Witt, president; Jack F. Hyman, secretary; W. H. Maclay, treasurer.

AGED CISCO LADY DIED LAST NIGHT

Another of the older residents of Cisco has passed on, the death of Mrs. W. G. Patterson, nee Miss Mary Russell Smith, at 11 o'clock Tuesday night, taking from the land of the living into the Great Beyond one of the beloved and most highly respected ladies of this city. Deceased was the mother of Mrs. C. H. Fee, at whose home she had lived for several years.

Deceased was born near Bloomfield, Ky., on August 3, 1844, she being 83 years, seven months and 22 days old at the time of her death. She was married to William Gardner Patterson on March 7, 1861. Ten children were born to the union, six of whom are now living, they being Mrs. C. H. Fee, of Cisco; Mrs. J. R. Cade, of Rusk; Mrs. J. T. Foster, of Grapevine; Ira Patterson of Henrietta, Okla.; W. C. Patterson of Boyd, and Mrs. Olin Karkalis, of Brownwood.

She joined the Presbyterian church in childhood, but later united with the Baptist church with her late husband and continued in that faith during the remainder of her life.

Funeral services will be held at the home of C. H. Fee, on Fifth street, at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon after which the remains will be sent to Boyd for burial tomorrow, her husband having been buried at that place about ten years ago. Rev. B. C. Boney will be in charge of the services here this afternoon.

The many friends of deceased and of Mrs. Fee are sorrowing with the bereaved relatives in this saddest of all hours, the beautiful and numerous floral tributes attesting the high esteem in which she was held.

FORMER CISCO MAN DIED IN ABILENE HOME

ABILENE, Feb. 29.—J. T. Baugh, 60, prominent in cotton buying circles of Abilene and Texas, died unexpectedly Tuesday morning at 10:30 of apoplexy.

A member of the firm of Baugh Brothers, cotton buyers, Mr. Baugh was at his office in the Radford building when he suffered the fatal stroke. He was rushed to a local sanitarium in a Kicker-Knight ambulance, death occurring only a few minutes after arrival at the hospital. Attending physicians said that death was due to apoplexy.

Mr. Baugh came from Houston to Abilene in 1920 and joined his brother, Sam Baugh, in the cotton business here. Prior to that time he was prominent in cotton circles in Houston, where he resided for 15 or 20 years.

Mr. Baugh's home is near Lytle Lake. Besides his brother, he is survived by his wife and two sisters, Miss Betty Baugh of New York City and Miss Lila Baugh, of Kingsville, teacher in the Teachers College there.

ONCE LIVED IN CISCO. Mr. Baugh once lived in Cisco, where he was in the cotton business, associated with his brothers, T. R. Sam, and the late C. R. Baugh, and interment will be in widow of the late C. R. Baugh, just before her departure at 12:30 for Abilene, accompanied by her daughter, Miss Frances, to attend the funeral there at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The funeral services will be held in the home of Sam Baugh, and interment will be in the Abilene cemetery. Mrs. Lilly Baugh stated that of the four brothers, only Sam Baugh is now living.

FLOOD BILL APPROVED BY SENATE TODAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—A new compromise flood relief bill, appropriating \$325,000,000 for the construction of adequate levees along the flooded areas of the Mississippi Valley, and placing the burden of cost upon the federal government, was approved today by the senate commerce committee, after months of study.

NEW BILL ON FLOOD TO BE READY TODAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—The Senate Commerce committee will probably report a compromise flood control bill Wednesday, Chairman Jones announces.

The committee planned to complete its first draft Tuesday. Chairman Reid and the majority group of the House Flood Control committee are revising the Mississippi flood control bill they drafted recently, but it will not meet President Coolidge's demand that some form of local contributions be provided, according to authoritative information.

The bill still will provide for payment of all costs of flood control works, from Cape Girardeau, Mo., to the Gulf, by the Federal government, it was learned.

Reid and the majority group who voted for the original bill are willing to compromise on some other features, but will insist upon this principle, or at least that is the position they now take.

REVENUES UP FOR AIR MAIL ON TEXAS LINE

FORT WORTH, Feb. 29.—An increase of \$22,000 in revenue despite a reduction of 2,000 miles flown is shown for the Chicago-Fort Worth and Dallas line of National Air Transport, Inc., during the last six months of 1927, compared with the first six months. The figures issued at Washington Tuesday by the director of aeronautics, department of commerce, show the figures on that route covered 341,653 miles and that the mail income was \$175,712, or an income a mile of more than 51 cents.

The Key West-Havana route led the list with an average mail income of nearly \$3 a mile but it was operated but a short time. The only one exceeding the Chicago-Fort Worth and Dallas route in mileage was the San Francisco-Chicago route, which was nearly doubled, and the income from which was 86 cents a mile.

The Los Angeles-Salt Lake line enjoyed an income of \$1.62 a mile.

NAVY LOSES HOPE FOR MEN LOST SUNDAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—All available aircraft of this section took off at dawn today in another effort to locate the three naval fliers who have been missing since Sunday night. The navy department has almost despaired of finding the men, and believes their plane fell into the Chesapeake bay. Those missing are Commander Ellyson, Lieutenant Commander Hugo Schmidt and Lieutenant Roger Ranshousen. They vanished during a flight from their plane carrier Lexington, in Hampton Roads, to Annapolis, only 140 miles away.

THOS. QUINN PASSED AWAY TUESDAY EVE

Thomas Matthew Quinn, well known Cisco oil operator, died at his late residence, 1010 West Ninth street, at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday evening, terminating an illness of several months' duration. The funeral services will be held at Holy Rosary Catholic church, F avenue and West Twelfth street, Friday morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. Fr. Collins, of Ranger, priest in charge, will conduct the services. Interment will be in Oakwood cemetery immediately after the funeral. The body is being prepared for burial at the Wippen funeral home, from which place it will be carried to the residence to lie in state till the hour of the funeral.

Mr. Quinn was born in St. Joseph, Penn., February 16, 1867, and was 61 years, 11 days of age at the time of his passing. Coming to West Texas from California about nine years ago with the discovery of oil in Ranger, he located in that city, but later moved to Cisco, which had since been his home. He was prominently known as an oil operator, and was interested in many oil enterprises in this part of the state, but recently was operating in the Wichita Falls fields. He was a splendid citizen, having many friends here who are grieved at his passing.

He is survived by his widow and three brothers, one living in New York state, another in Pennsylvania and another brother living in California.

The crigin of such uniforms was the necessity felt in olden times of distinguishing students from other people—"gown" from "town." We don't do that in America today because we don't feel the need of it. When students are in college, we usually know it by the way they dress and act—they have their own ideas of costume and conduct. After graduation there is often no way of telling the student from other people, except perhaps by a special interest in college athletics.

No, Wall Street isn't a business barometer. Sometimes it's a clinical thermometer, registering the patient's fever, and other times it's a wind gauge.

PULLING TEETH

Pulling teeth, it appears, is really a two-man job. It calls for two good men, too—not merely any couple of huskies that happen to be around. Men of brains, and knowledge—to wit, a competent dentist and a competent doctor, acting in cooperation. There has been altogether too much careless tooth-pulling to get rid of bad teeth and remedy this or that disease. So says an editorial in the Journal of the American Medical association. "It is self-evident," says the writer, "that all sepsis and pathogenic foci in the mouth should be removed." That is, all decay and centers of infection which may spread disease through the system should be got rid of. "Success in this field demands more frequent consultation between the dentist and the family physician. The physician should not peremptorily order one or more teeth extracted, nor should the dentist extract the teeth of a person who is found by questioning to be under the care of a physician or in need of medical care." Often very serious results follow the unwise extraction of a tooth. At best, the loss of a tooth which might have been saved diminishes the patient's ability to chew his food and thereby prepares the way for digestive troubles. Progressive physicians have been taking this position recently in ever-growing numbers. Dentists are said to be slower in granting the necessity of consultation before extraction. Some physicians who are successfully using the ultra-violet light treatment for mouth infections insist that "a tooth should never be pulled if there is any way to avoid it." And they think there usually is a way.

Toads in corner stones are intriguing, but for the peace of future generations we hope it won't be considered necessary to bury one in every corner stone laid this year.

TROTZKY'S TRUNKS.

There are those who profess to be shocked by the report that Trotsky, the exiled Bolshevik leader, arrived at his destination with 70 trunks. "In the bright lexicon of Communism," says the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, "there are no such impedimenta as 70 trunks." No American millionaire or movie star ever traveled with that many. Let us be calm. Those trunks could not have been filled with clothes and personal goods. Probably 69 of them contained copies of Trotsky's speeches.

PAN-AMERICANS.

The Excelsior, a newspaper of Mexico City, calls the Pan-American conference at Havana a "complete failure," for this reason: The various Latin-American countries, it explains, did not present a solid front and were not united in their desires. "This demonstrates the absolute impossibility of the existence of Pan-Americanism as a regulated organization of the contrary tendencies of the people of this continent."

Here is revealed the extreme Latin viewpoint—that Latin-American nations ought to be united against this country and so dominate the Pan-American Union.

The extreme viewpoint in the United States is precisely opposite—that our people should be united against the Latin-Americans, and so dominate the union.

Real Pan-Americanism would be about half-day between those two extremes, each party compromising enough to find a natural policy and program. It is not yet in sight.

KEGS AND PADLOCKS. Milwaukee has passed from one kind of fame to another which is so appropriate that it deserves chronicling.

The beer that made the brewing capital famous is gone, and the Pabst brewery has been turned into a padlock factory, making the locks that are used to close places breaking the liquor laws in other cities.

Many of these padlocks are being used now in Chicago, and a cargo of 147,000 just been sent to New York City—an appropriate place for them.

Seldom are events in history so logical as this.

PENALTY OF FAME.

Millions of young men in this country would like to be as famous as Lindbergh. Possibly if they were in his place they would feel differently about it.

The way that harassed youth dodged crowds wherever he could even on his goodwill flight in Central America—showed that he is fed up on fame. Since his return he has been seeking in vain for privacy. Wherever he goes now he asks to be let alone, treated as a private person and not re-

garded either as a hero or a news source. He wants to drop out of public life.

Of course he can't. It isn't just the newspapers that drag him back into the limelight. Everybody's in the conspiracy to rob him of privacy. And that is the penalty anyone must pay for prominence and popularity.

Lindbergh, people say, "has everything." But there's one thing he can't have.

TEST FOR CANDIDATES.

This writer doesn't quite get Dr. Bunderson, former Chicago health commissioner, when he urges a physical test for all political candidates.

He argues that elections cost money, and sometimes the public loses on them because poor health interferes with the discharge of officials' duties. Sometimes they die, he says, and so are a complete loss. He wants to require every candidate a doctor's certificate stating that the applicant is in sound health and will probably live out his term.

As far as our observation goes, political candidates are a remarkably healthy lot. The public often does lose on them, but usually in other ways.

Now, if it were mental tests, with certificates from psychologists!

The Prince of Wales has been made admiral of the British shipping, and the next time he comes over here for a game of polo he can tell us what to do about our merchant marine.

In England they "stand" for office and in America we "run" for it. Yet somehow they seem over there to get as much as we do.

Naturally enough, that new automatic man is directed by spoken orders. Machinery is the only servant nowadays that will listen.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Feb. 29.—Democrats of Canton county, New Mexico, here for a state committee meeting Monday, endorsed Will Rogers, famous humorist, as presidential candidate. They announced they would support the cowboy writer if he should enter the race.

PARIS, Feb. 25.—Godets have got back into print this year after a short absence and are incidentally supplying the designers with a new idea in the skirt line just when it would seem they had run the entire gamut.

It is a skirt with two full folds in the back, appearing for the first time on new spring models. It is carried out in all kinds of materials and used on coats as well as frocks giving a new and graceful movement.

A number of sports frocks at Drecoll's have shoulder yokes and there are plain-backed skirts with pleats or straight fullness in front and at the sides. Daytime frocks have shaped hip yokes, fitting smoothly, flat backs and skirts with circular fullness cleverly hung in front and at the sides. Demurrers Upheld In Slaughter Suit

DALLAS, Feb. 21.—General demurrers by defendants were sustained here Tuesday in federal court by Judge W. Lee Estes of Texas, in the case of W. B. Slaughter against James C. Wilson, federal judge, the C. C. Slaughter company and the C. C. Slaughter estate, in which W. B. Slaughter sought damages and to recover from the Slaughter estate approximately \$2,500,000.

Judge Estes ruled that Judge Wilson had not overstepped his authority in issuing a restraining order and an injunction to protect action and judgments issued by federal courts in the case.

W. B. Slaughter had sought to recover property and other collateral which he said had been turned over to the C. C. Slaughter company as security for a loan when W. B. Slaughter was declared a bankrupt.

Counsel for W. B. Slaughter announced the case would be appealed.

MRS. W. R. POTTER MAKES CLEAR-CUT STATEMENT

Talks Frankly of Incidents Leading to Unfortunate Disagreement Twixt Mrs. Fields and Other Club Women

Bowie, Texas, Feb. 14, 1928.

Dear Club Friends:—A number of club members in the Sixth District have written me asking that I, as state president, give some explanation of the situation which exists between Mrs. Fields and the General Federation at Washington.

So, I feel that I owe my friends of the 6th District an account of the matter so far as my knowledge of the question goes. I have no criticisms to offer—so long as I am president of the T. F. W. C. every member of the organization will receive nothing but courtesy and consideration from me.

I have been besieged by reporters, but I have steadily declined to have anything to do with the controversy since it was strictly between Mrs. Fields and the General Federation in Washington. All statements made in this letter are matters of record and can easily be obtained by anyone who wishes to make further investigation in addition to what I have said. A brief history of the matter follows which covers my knowledge of the question.

Some months ago Mrs. Fields requested the authorities in Washington to permit a General Biennial committee in addition to the Local Biennial committee in San Antonio, giving as her reason for the request that the Biennial could not be successfully carried out without it. The General Federation deviated from its rules and permitted this. Mrs. Fields became chairman. She was accountable to the General Federation for the performance of the duties of this office and the reports of her work were required to be sent to the General Federation at Washington. I did not hear of any Texas woman objecting to Mrs. Fields holding this General Federation office. I myself wishing to ratify the plans of the General Federation, nominated her for the place and stood ready to co-operate.

Later on the General Federation frankly acknowledged they had made a mistake in deviating from their rule, because of overlapping work, overlapping expense, that the Biennial plans were not progressing and also made a statement in reference to finances with which you are familiar from the newspaper statements authorized by Mrs. Fields. Exercising their constitutional rights as an organization, the General Federation abolished the extra chairmanship and notified Mrs. Fields of its action, giving their reason for so doing. The General Federation then appointed Mrs. Henry Drought as sole State Biennial chairman for Texas.

At a meeting of the San Antonio women which followed they accepted the action of the General Federation as final and pledged their cooperation and support unanimously to their towns-woman, Mrs. Henry Drought, and sent a copy of their resolution to the press of the state which you no doubt read. As it stands there is no extra chairmanship. It has been abolished, hence does not exist. The Texas Federation of Women's clubs had nothing to do with creating this extra chairmanship and nothing to do with its abolishment. I know you are parliamentary enough to see that the entire matter rested with the General Federation.

The Texas board of directors met in Fort Worth January 7th. Three telegrams were delivered there before the board was called to order. One addressed to Mrs. Fields, one to Miss Ollie Bird and one to the board of directors requesting Mrs. Fields' resignation. During the session of the board a letter and a telegram were received from Mrs. Fields announcing the death of her grand-mother. Mrs. C. B. Kelly of Groesbeck moved a telegram of sympathy be sent and that the members stand in silent prayer for Mrs. Fields. Both were observed. The morning session ended and we adjourned for lunch. Still I was trying to think of a legitimate way to dispose of the two telegrams without the embarrassment to Mrs. Fields of having them read and discussed before the board. After lunch I quietly called the members of the executive committee together in a private room and asked the recording secretary to read the telegrams. I then said: "Ladies I regret this very much and I wish to extend the same consideration to Mrs. Fields that I would ask for myself under the same circumstances. As this is General Federation business anyway I am going to ask you to vote to not bring this before the board of directors. Mrs. Fields has had this sorrow. She is not present. Let us as women to women spare her this embarrassment and give her the opportunity to act as she pleases in this matter." The motion was made and carried unanimously.

Mrs. R. Q. Lee of Cisco then moved that a telegram be sent to the General Federation in Washington stating that the matter was not brought before the Texas board of directors because of Mrs. Fields' sorrow and absence, and asked that she be given an opportunity to report, and that a copy of this telegram sent to Washington also be sent to Mrs. Fields so that she might know the action of our executive committee and add this message—"We refused to bring this matter before the board out of consideration for you." This telegram together with the telegram Mrs. Fields received from Washington was sent to her at Haskell Jan. 7th.

Miss Ollie Bird, Treas., Mrs. Jno. B. Hunt, Cor.-Sec., were appointed to forward these messages to Haskell. Those telegrams are matters of record in the Western Union office in Fort Worth. The entire action of the executive committee may be learned by writing to Mrs. Frank Tompkins, Corpus Christi; Mrs. Fred Fleming, Corsicana; Mrs. John B. Hunt, Bowie; Mrs. R. F. Lindsay, Mt. Pleasant; Mrs. L. T. Shaver, Dallas; Miss Ollie Bird, Denison; Mrs. Henry Drought, San Antonio; Mrs. R. Q. Lee, Cisco; Mrs. Frank Friend, Ozona.

All were present and favorable to the action. Three days later the General Federation had requested the resignation. I together with Mesdames W. I. Whitsett, D. S. Peden, A. H. Bailey, R. Q. Lee, Charles Ashcroft, R. F. Lindsay, Henry Drought, E. E. Maloney, (all members of my board and the exception of Mrs. Peden all former members of Mrs. Fields' board) arrived in Washington as guests of the General Federation. As you know none of us had any vote, but as visitors we were permitted to hear the excellent programs.

It may be well for me to state also that the matter of the resignation was voted upon three times. First by the executive committee of the General Federation. I was given to understand that the Texas director to the General Federation insisted that the question be brought before the board of directors of the General Federation. This was done and they voted to refer the matter back to the executive committee of the General Federation. This body voted again and brought in the same report with which you are familiar.

Mrs. D. L. Stephens of Anson made this statement before the First District Board T. F. W. C. assembled in Fort Worth Feb. 2: "We know now that Mrs. Potter had nothing to do with the request for the resignation." I am glad she said that. It seems to me that no reasonable woman who knows me and my standards and who has a correct knowledge of club ethics would think for a moment that I would contribute to such a situation. The whole proceedings came as a distinct surprise both to me and to friends who went with me to Washington. I may be mistaken, but so far as I am able to see the matter has a very simple solution. It seems like the action of the General Federation was based on the reports Mrs. Fields sent to Washington. If Mrs. Fields is not satisfied with the action of the General Federation I think it is entirely within her privilege to protest against same and to make any investigation she may consider necessary. Every citizen has a perfect right to do this if she chooses.

I am very sorry this has come up, but as one club woman to another let me sound this little friendly note of warning. Who does the most good for your community life, the one who sows discord or the one who tries to unite? We are all hoping for a successful Biennial. Indeed as Texans we will be satisfied with nothing less.

But, remember this—the Biennial will be history in a few more weeks, but we must continue to live together in Texas as neighbors. Be loyal to any cause or any friend you choose—that is our right, but let us be careful in our assertions and in the opinions we form. We do not wish to be unjust or unkind to any man or woman. A wise jury reserves its verdict until the evidence is all in. I have made this simple statement at your request. I have tried to make the facts clear as I know them.

In closing this letter may I not say a word in behalf of your splendid young president, Mrs. John J. Perry of Sweetwater. She accepted her office in such good faith. She has expressed so much enthusiasm and interest in the work. She is making her plans for a successful district meeting, such as the 6th district always holds, she has such high aspirations for the forwarding of her district plans. I feel certain she will receive your co-operation in every way. Assuring you of my best wishes and my desire for your co-operation in our work together.

Missions of Mercy in Peace or War Await Red Cross Nursing Recruits

To enlist the young women of the nation in the cause of mercy, prepared to serve in time of the country's stress—in peace or war—is one of the purposes which has prompted the American Red Cross Nursing Service to call for the second annual observance of Jane A. Delano Nurses Recruiting Week, from March 5 to 12.

Only graduate trained nurses, from accredited schools, may enroll in the Red Cross Nursing Service. In honoring, nation-wide, the memory of Jane Delano—famous and distinguished head of the Red Cross nurses prior to and during the World War, it is hoped also to direct the attention of girls graduating from high school and college to the nursing profession as a career offering wide possibilities of service.

Regulations of the U. S. Army designate the enrolled Red Cross nurses as a reserve to the Army Nurses Corps, subject to call to duty in time of war. In addition the Red Cross nurses are called into service at times of great disaster, such as the Mississippi Valley flood of 1927, or in any other relief or humanitarian work conducted under the auspices of the American Red Cross.

During the World War, more than 20,000 graduate nurses were supplied by the Red Cross to serve with the Army and Navy and other Government services and the Red Cross; many hundreds of these were utilized for nursing relief

work under Red Cross commissions in foreign nations; and thousands gave great assistance in the crises of the several influenza epidemics in the United States.

"Marriage removes an average of 100 nurses from our civil roll each month," said Miss Clara D. Noyes, national director of American Red Cross nursing service, in discussing plans for Jane A. Delano Week, "and death, illness and resignation cause us to lose another fifty each month. The nurse who marries or who passes the age limit of 45, may enroll for Home Defense work, but she is not eligible for the Army service. Although we have had an average enrollment of 45,000 since the beginning of enrollment twenty years ago, to maintain our standard we must enroll the young graduate nurses as they come from school.

"We are anxious also to have the girl, just leaving high school or college, who is thinking of a career, consider what fascinating and interesting—and even romance—life in the also very sympathetic and helpful career of the nurse. Remuneration, whether in public work, in military or civilian work, or in private or hospital life, is comparable with that in other professions open to women."

Senior classes of virtually all nurses' training schools will participate in exercises March 12, the birth date of Miss Delano, in commemoration of her great service to nursing and of her heroic death in France, a sacrifice to war service, not long after the Armistice. Enrollment of graduate nurses is consummated through committees composed of Red Cross nurses on Red Cross nursing service in the various communities.

South's Tallest Building To Have Light and Airy Jail In Top Stories



Dade County Courthouse and Miami City Hall, Miami, Fla., Costing \$3,500,000, and Soon to be Occupied as Office Building and Jail

If one must be naughty and get himself locked up, it is quite likely that upon its completion in a few months, the most attractive place to be locked up in will be the Dade County Court House and Miami City Hall. For here six of the top stories are to be devoted to the jail.

Rising twenty-seven stories with its beautiful light grey terra cotta exterior, the building not only towers above its neighbors in other southern cities, but also stands brightly in the Florida sun and is attracting the attention of the thousands of winter visitors to that section.

At the top of the pyramid will be placed a very high powered light visible for miles inland and at sea, to be a government light for ships entering the port of Miami.

High-Powered Bootleggers Lack Principles of Old Moon Shiners Whose Liquid Corn Was Superb

International News Service Staff Correspondent.
DENVER, Feb. 29.—Moonshiners in the mountains of the old South, in the days when Volstead was unheard of, were gentlemen with principles and traditions as compared with the present day high-powered bootleggers who care only for profits.

And prohibition, following the advent of the bicycle and the motor car, has brought about a faster pace which would have made the old folks fall back in astonishment and shun the sheiks and flappers as outcasts.

These are the opinions of J. R. Calloway, former chief police at Longmont, Colo., and Fred A. Mangold, retired federal revenue officer and Colorado pioneer. Both attended the annual gathering of the Colorado Sheriffs association in Denver recently.

Despite the illicit trafficking, Calloway had high praise for the hill billy of Virginia, North and South Carolina, Alabama and Kentucky, where he worked years ago as a federal sleuth. They held themselves as free Americans primarily and stood upon their rights in vigorous Elizabethan language.

Expert Distillers
They had their code, the

duction of good whiskey, in high esteem, he declared, and their liquid corn output was hard to rival, even by the better grade of legal brands which once were permitted in the land.

"The hill men," he said, "connected their brew from their own corn, in their own pots and with their own firewood, and it was beyond their comprehension that Uncle Sam should interfere. No one ever heard of their stuff being poisonous for they inherited their liquor trade from generations of distillers and they also believed they inherited the right to make it."

They were hard fellows to catch, too, Calloway remembered. They always hid in the fastness of the hills, and usually the only clue to their whereabouts was a slip of smoke ascending far off from the fire under their stills. When they were apprehended they fought like madmen and engaged in gun duels that rivaled the present Chicago gang wars, according to Calloway.

The moonshiners also were taken under the wing by their law-abiding neighbors who hated the federal officers as much as they loved a nip of "red corn." The officers, Calloway said, ferreted out the moonshiners either on horseback or in a buggy and often times the harness would be cut by the friendly neighbors, who always said the faires had done the cutting.

Those days are over with forever because of prohibition, Calloway said. "In place of the genial hill billy, we have the unprincipled bootlegger, who is first and last a business man who sells his stuff fair or foul. Needle beer in Chicago, poisoned sugar rum in the Rockies, and gin on the coast and anything in New York are some of his productions. He is unsentimental and if he is caught he usually escapes with a small fine."

Do Not Fear Law
At worst, if he owns a still, he can be sent to the penitentiary for from three to five years under the Colorado anti-still law. Even that law has not perceptibly diminished the bootlegging business, which shows that most leggers are merchants or brokers purchasing their stuff from still men."

Mangold also has a colorful record as a federal revenue official in Colorado, coming here in 1879. He was sheriff in El Paso county in 1891 and was a spectator of the boom days in Cripple Creek. He agrees with Calloway that the liquor situation is "unsatisfactory," and declared that disobedience of the Volstead law is one of the weakening influences in modern life.

As Mangold sees it, another bad influence was ushered in with the automobile, which increased contacts and resulted in a condition in which the smell of booze on the breath of young people is considered an achievement. Life was simpler in the old days, he said, and consisted mainly of church, mid-week prayer meeting, a weekly dance, maybe a buggy ride. Women were draped thoroughly from head to foot and whiskey breaths on young people caused their ostracism.

Both Calloway and Mangold, however, have faith in the young people of the day and believe that conditions will improve.

THREE SHOT; 2 MEN HELD FOR AFFAIR

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—Clarence Stelfox, his son, Eugene Stelfox, and Edward Blitch, all living near here, were shot Tuesday night by men said to have fired from an automobile. The affair occurred in front of a confectionery at Lake Austin. The three wounded men were taken to a hospital.

Two men were arrested shortly after the shooting. A .32-caliber automatic pistol was taken from them. The other had an army rifle. Blitch apparently was the most seriously wounded with a bullet through his lower stomach.

CONWAY HEADS RANGER C. OF C. COLLIE QUILTS

RANGER, Feb. 29.—Succeeding Marvin K. Collie, whose resignation was handed in some time ago, the Ranger chapter of commerce has elected W. D. Conway president of that organization at a meeting Monday night. Collie's resignation was formally accepted.

William M. McDonald, formerly second vice-president, was moved to the office of first vice-president and Marvin K. Collie was elected as second vice-president.

Conway has been active in chamber of commerce and civic work since he has been in Texas and has always been an enthusiastic worker.

He, together with McDonald, Collie, Wayne C. Hickey and W. W. Housewright, will assign the heads to the various departments this week, and concentrated work on a number of projects will be started.

There are some 14 various heads or subdivisions of the chamber and one of the directors is selected to act as chairman of the head and selects his members from the members of the chamber of commerce.

Conway presided at the meeting Monday night and set to work immediately naming committees to attend to various phases of work that has been before the directors for some time.

Collie was elected president of the organization at the beginning of the year but filed his resignation immediately. A lack of enough directors to make a quorum at previous meetings made it impossible to elect a man to fill the vacated position and it was not until the meeting Monday night that the position was filled.

Moody To Be Candidate To Succeed Self

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—Governor Moody's first direct definite announcement that he will be a candidate for re-election was made public Tuesday afternoon, when Tom Paulk, member of the State Democratic Executive committee, revealed the entire contents of a letter from the governor to that effect.

"I shall be a candidate for re-election, and I am not a candidate for any national office," the governor told Paulk, who had intended to present a resolution endorsing Moody for president. The governor gave this as one reason for requesting Paulk not to introduce a resolution.

As a second reason, he said, "I doubt if it is a proper function of the executive committee at this time to endorse candidates for National offices."

CHILDRESS, Feb. 29.—H. L. Lamar, prominent ranchman and stock raiser of Cottle county, was found dead at his home Tuesday afternoon. He was about 60 years old. He will be buried here.

Democratic Delegates to Go to Houston Uninstructed

Executive Committee Decides Important Question at Austin Tuesday; Ferguson Was Present

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—A small bloc of members of the state Democratic Executive committee was decisively defeated Tuesday afternoon when at the closing session of the committee efforts were made to put through resolutions that would call upon Texas Democrats to send an instructed delegation to the Houston National convention in June.

For nearly three hours Tuesday afternoon there was debate that became pyrotechnic at times over resolutions, as a result of which those adopted carry no teeth and merely seek to keep citizens who participate in the primaries lined up with the party at the November election.

One of the resolutions defeated was offered by John M. Henderson, Dalmierfield, strongly endorsing the administration of Governor Moody. But Moody's closest friends, including Chairman D. W. Wilcox and Harry Graves, Georgetown, raised objections, declaring such endorsement did not come within the province of the committee.

Purl Makes Fiery Speech
George Purl, Dallas, who held a proxy from W. L. Thornton, offered two resolutions, the first proposing the precinct conventions on May 5 should instruct delegates to county conventions, which in turn would instruct the state convention delegates. One motion of Frank P. Culver, Jr., Fort Worth, this resolution was tabled by a vote of 22 to 8.

The second Purl resolution, which would have committed the committee to nomination of a dry presidential candidate, suffered worse defeat when tabled 28 to 2. Purl made a fiery speech in favor of his prohibition resolution, but before beginning it Steve Pinckney, Houston, inquired:

"Have you any other resolutions from Thomas B. Love?"
There was a laugh among the delegates. Love heads a movement for instructing the Texas 40 delegates to Houston "against Smith, Reed, Ritchie or any other wet."

Beaumont Is Selected
The morning session was given over to selection of the convention city and election of three members to take place of three who had resigned.

Beaumont won the state meeting, which is to be held May 22, on the fourth ballot, obtaining 20 votes to Austin's 10. On the first ballot six cities contested, Austin leading with 9 votes, the others being: Beaumont 3, Fort Worth 4, Wichita Falls 4, Amarillo 3, and Galveston 2. Galveston dropped out on the second ballot and Fort Worth on the third.

Monday night the race was reported to lie between Austin and Fort Worth. After Cato Sells made a 10-minute speech Tuesday morning nominating Fort Worth, Dave Nelson, member from Orange, asked:

"Where is your auditorium?"
"The First Baptist church," Sells replied. A laugh followed, but Sells maintained his composure and declared it was the best auditorium in Texas, with a seating capacity of nearly 7,000 and where Joseph W. Bailey, James E. Ferguson, Governor Moody and Will Rogers had talked.

"It never hurts the Democratic party to hold a meeting in the House of God," Sells said, and Nelson replied:

"We want to keep the church and state separated."
Among those attending the Austin meeting were: Congressman Tom Connally, Marlin, candidate for United States senator; W. A. Rowe, Houston, candidate for that office on a wet platform; H. L. Darwin, of Paris, candidate for lieutenant governor; H. H. Haines of Amarillo, former Republican candidate for governor; James E. Ferguson, former governor; T. J. Holbrook, Galveston, candidate for congress; J. D. Parnell, Wichita Falls, candidate for lieutenant governor; Tom Simmons, Fort Worth, former district judge; Cato Sells, former commissioner of Indian affairs under Wilson.

Ferguson attended the morning and afternoon sessions. "I am here just to cover the meeting for the best paper in Texas," he said. He referred to the Ferguson Forum.

Committeemen who attended were: D. W. Wilcox, Georgetown,

Heading the party is Harry Denman, editor of the Farmington, Mo., News, and president of the Missouri Press Association, joint sponsors with the Missouri Pacific railroad of the good will tour into Mexico. J. W. Brown, publisher of Editor and Publisher, New York City, and Victor Murdoch, editor of the Wichita Eagle, were among other members of the party.

Galveston, Corpus Christi and the Lower Rio Grande Valley were points on the itinerary en route to Tampoco, San Luis Potosi and Mexico City.

DAVENPORT TO TRY TAX CASE IN MARCH TERM

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 29.—V. L. Shurtliff has been retained by the county commissioners court to represent Stephens county in the tax injunction suits brought by 13 oil companies and set down for hearing some time during the March term of court.

The cases, said to involve about \$50,000 of county taxes due on road bond series A and B and court house and jail bonds by the plaintiffs, originated during the latter part of January when the companies applied to Judge George Davenport of the 91st District court at Eastland for a temporary injunction restraining Stephens county from the collection of taxes complained of as illegal. The case was carried to the Eastland court after Judge C. O. Hamlin, of the 90th District court here, had disqualified himself on the ground that he is a resident of Stephens county and a taxpayer in the county.

Judge Davenport granted the temporary writs and made them returnable to the 90th district. The date for the hearing at which the plaintiffs will ask that the injunctions be made permanent, has not been named, however.

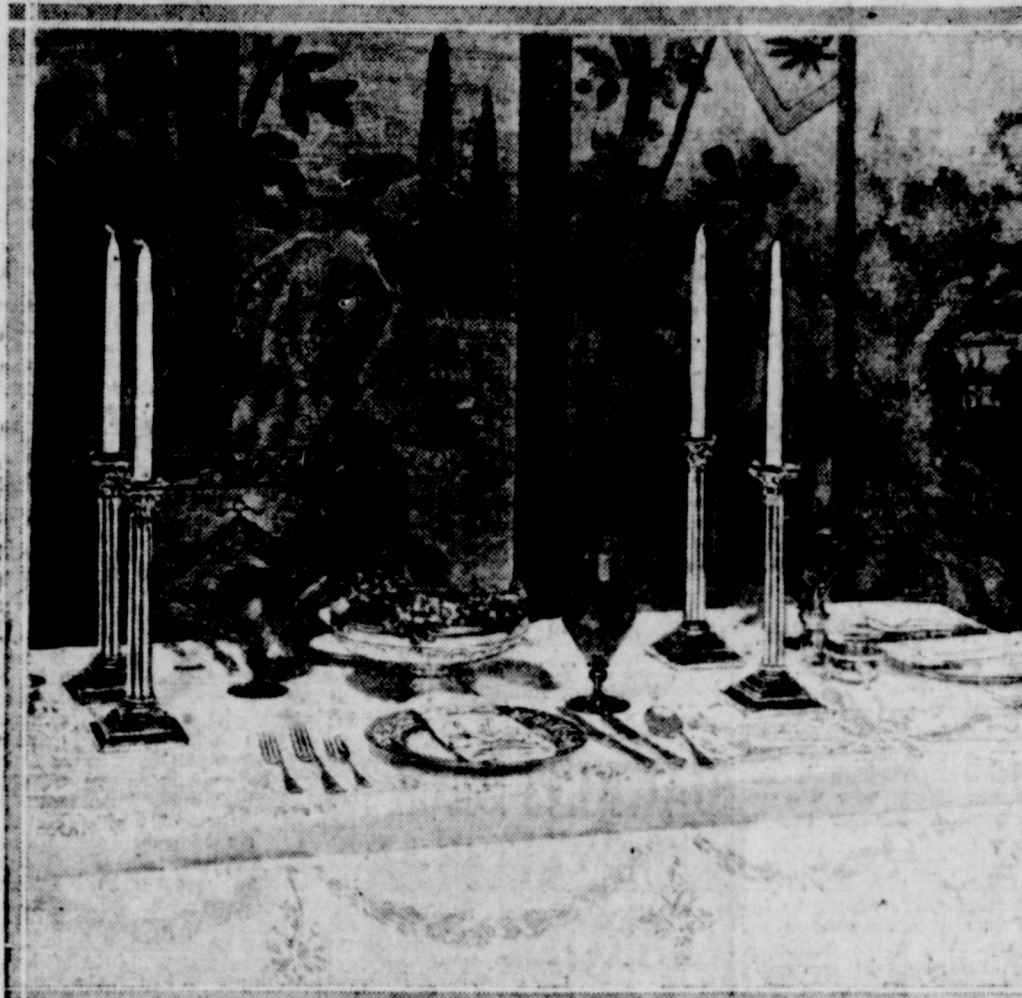

Seminole Field Is Off 10,000 Barrels

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 29.—Daily average oil production in the Oklahoma field showed a drop of approximately 10,000 barrels during the week ending February 25, the Oil and Gas Journal said today. The greatest loss was in the Seminole field, which declined from 318,740 barrels during the week ending February 18 to 306,910 barrels last week. A small part of this loss was offset by slight gains in other fields. The Mid-

Continent area also showed a loss, declining from 1,365,513 barrels of light crude for the previous week to 1,363,291 barrels last week. The loss in the Oklahoma field was partly made up by gains in the past coming West Texas field, which had a production increase from 229,250 barrels during the week ending February 18 to 310,669 barrels last week.

The West Texas field thus takes the lead for the first time over the Seminole area. Other Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas fields had little change during the week, some slightly decreasing and others

showing small increases. The Gulf Coast production increased from 112,864 to 119,183.

California lost about 2,000 barrels for the week. Despite the losses in Seminole and elsewhere, the total for the United States showed an increase of 1,857 barrels, thanks to the continual gains of the phenomenal West Texas fields.

NEARLY \$75,000 AUTO TAX PAID TO TAYLOR CO.

ABILENE, Feb. 29.—Taylor county has received \$74,904.88 as its part of the highway license fees for 1928 paid on automobiles and motor trucks, according to records of Earl Hughes, county tax collector. The total represents the horsepower fee and 30 per cent of the weight fees collected on 9,454 automobiles and 636 trucks, the total registered in the county to Monday, February 20. During last week 130 additional automobiles and 65 trucks were registered. Of the money derived by the county from auto license fees \$40,745.31 represents horsepower fees and \$34,159.27 weight fees. Until this year the county has received only the horsepower fees. A new provision in the law allows a county to receive 30 per cent of weight fees up to a maximum of \$50,000.

Money thus derived goes into the second class road and bridge funds of the four commissioners' precincts of the county, according to Austin Pitts, county treasurer. The money is divided among the four precincts on the basis of percentage of cars owned, the basis of division being: Precinct No. 1, 35 per cent; No. 2, 27 per cent; No. 3, 17 per cent; No. 4, 21 per cent. On this basis the precincts have received the following sums to be used on lateral roads: Precinct No. 1, \$26,216; No. 2, \$20,224; No. 3, \$12,732; No. 4, \$15,729.

The basis of dividing money obtained for second class road and bridge funds from collection of county taxes is: Precinct No. 1, 31 per cent; No. 2, 24 per cent; No. 3, 24 per cent; No. 4, 11 per cent. Provision is made on the basis of tax valuation in each precinct.

CANDIDATE FORMERLY EDITED CARBON PAPER

W. E. Reid, of Colorado, who has announced for congress from the 16th congressional district against Claude Hudspeth, is a former Eastland county man having edited and published a newspaper at Carbon. Reid is credited with owning stock in four banks and has title to several hundred acres of farm land, as well as owning residence and business property. However, the report does not say he acquired these material possessions from the proceeds of his newspaper enterprises.

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—Applications of two bus corporations for permission to operate between Dallas and Los Angeles were taken under advisement Tuesday by the State Railroad commission.

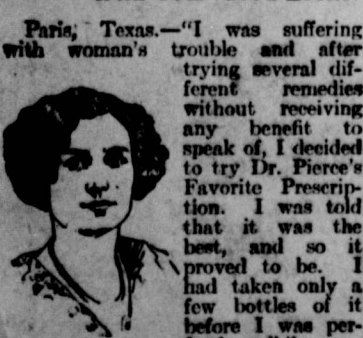

HAWKINS BACK HOME; REGULAR CANVASS SOON

BRECKENRIDGE, Feb. 29.—Judge William E. Hawkins, candidate for the democratic nomination for governor of Texas, is back in Breckenridge on a stay of indefinite length.

Judge Hawkins stated Tuesday that he has not yet begun what he plans to be his intensive campaign to secure the nomination he seeks but that he will undertake such a campaign in the immediate future.

"I have been tied up with litigation at Austin and elsewhere, which it was necessary to complete and I have not yet had the time to prosecute my campaign as I intend to do," Judge Hawkins said.

Several statements have been issued by Judge Hawkins since he announced himself a candidate some months ago, but he termed these statements as only partially outlining the platform upon which he will base his fight for the nomination.

"I shall prepare a platform that is broad gauged and constructive," he declared, "something which will be of value to the people of Texas. I don't want the office if I cannot be of benefit to the people."

An intensive campaign will be started by Judge Hawkins in the near future. He plans, as he said, to cover the entire state with this. During the campaign he will take the stump with an itinerary including every point he considers it important to reach.

RANGERS COP 150 AT WINK IN ONE NIGHT

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—A report saying tersely that Ranger Capt. W. L. Wright and his company made about 150 arrests in Wink, Winkler county oil town, recently in a one-night raiding party, was received Tuesday by Adj. Gen. R. L. Robertson.

The communication was the first one direct from the captain since he was ordered to transfer his men from Marfa to the McCamey section. No details were given as to what complaints, if any, were filed. Two men from Capt. John Rogers' Del Rio contingent aided the Wright squad.

RESERVE BANK DALLAS HEAD HIT SEVERELY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—Assailing the policies of Lynn P. Talley, governor of the Federal Reserve bank at Dallas, Representative Guinn Williams, speaking in behalf of his concurrent resolution for an investigation of that institution in the house, declared there are at least 300 member banks which will not apply to the Dallas branch for the rediscount privilege.

The congressman is seeking to have a joint investigation made by the senate and house on the grounds that if there is to be remedial legislation "both branches" of congress should be informed as to the facts. Senator Mayfield already has obtained passages of a simple resolution through the senate and Tuesday the committee on banking and currency named Senators Glass, Steiwer and Sackett as a subcommittee to hear the case.

Prefacing his remarks with the statement that he is a friend of Talley, Representative Williams insisted that the question is not one of politics or a personal matter. He insisted that while there is a rediscount committee in the Dallas bank that Governor Talley dominates it and is really the only member of the committee to pass on rediscount applications.

Comparison was made between conditions in Dallas and Atlanta, as of June 29, last year. At that time, he said, the Atlanta branch was carrying rediscounts for its members, secured by other than government securities, amounting to \$27,996,000, whereas similar rediscounts by the Dallas branch totaled but \$3,802,900. By contrast, the Atlanta branch was carrying bills bought on the open market and government securities amounting to \$19,859,000, while the Dallas bank was carrying \$36,847,000, he continued.

As an indication of what these policies have meant, Congressman Williams said that whereas earnings from bills discounted for member banks during 1926 amounted to \$325,993, the same earnings in 1927 were but \$254,983, a reduction of more than 50 per cent in such earnings. The purpose, he declared, has been to try and force the small country bank out of existence.

"The country banker in Texas," asserted Williams, "is a loyal citizen and as high a type of man as is found anywhere, and when he is accorded the treatment which was accorded him by the governor of the Federal Reserve bank, when he applied for the rediscount privilege, he refuses to do business with that Federal Reserve bank."

DALLAS, Feb. 29.—Federal Re-

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serve bank officials here maintained silence today in the face of criticisms by Representative Guinn Williams from the floor of the house of representatives.

State Will Fight Humble Pipe Plan

AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—The state Tuesday declined to concede to the Humble Oil company the right to lay a crude oil loading pipe line into Corpus Christi bay, despite the ruling of the third court of civil appeals that the company has that authority.

In a conference with Humble attorneys, Governor Moody, Attorney General Pollard and Game Commissioner Tucker tacitly announced that they will carry the case to the supreme court for settlement.

When the project was started, Pollard obtained a Travis district court injunction stopping it. The Humble turned to the appellate court, which dissolved the injunction and ruled the organization, as a public utility, was entitled to a

right of way on state tidal lands and water.

Moody, Pollard and Tucker met Monday with the company's representatives, but this conference, like Tuesday's, failed to result in the compromise desired.

REQUISITION SENT. AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—Governor Moody Tuesday asked the New Mexico governor to extradite Claude Stapp, charged in Nolan county with automobile theft and reported to be in custody in Alamogordo, N. M.

TAX RECORDS BROKEN. AUSTIN, Feb. 29.—All records for tax remission by a single county were broken today when Harris county sent \$1,367,807 to the state treasury.

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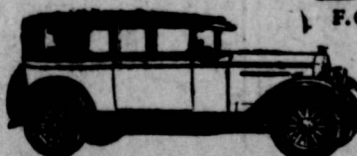
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
