### Western Riding Arena Scene of 3-Night Shows

Riders and ropers have notified rodeo headquarters from Lubbock, Abilene, Sterling City, Rotan, Roby, Big Spring, Lamesa, Colorado City and San Angelo that they will be on hand for the three-night show being staged by Western Riding Club in their rodeo arena on the western outskirts of Colorado City, Highway 80. Early entries quickly filled up two events—bull riding for Friday night and bareback bronc riding for Saturday—by Wednesday noon. Names of hopeful contestants were taken with a promise of notification via long distance telephone in the event there were cancellations of riders in those two events. Saddle bronc riding, bull dogging and the barrel races for cowgirls were drawing fewer entries. A number of Mitchell County cowhands have entered the special calf roping event for Mitchell County riders only, to be staged each evening. Local boys have also signed up for several of the other colorful categories. Because the show is restricted to amateur rodeo performers, many of the out-of-town contestants called in early to list their preference for Saturday evening. Mitchell County calf roping champion will win a hand-made saddle, crafted by Elmer Pickens. Other event champions will win cash prizes. Prizes will be sized by the amount of entry fee money. Deadline for entries, costing \$15 each, was Wednesday night at 8 p. m. Rodeo stock of the Rafter K Rodeo outfit arrived from Henrietta late Tuesday. Rodeo headquarters in Baker Hotel lobby were opened Tuesday morning. ### TO TEACH ENGLISH

## Free Speech Classes For 1st Grade Start

Free summer school speech classes for children of Latin American heritage here begin next week. There is no charge of any kind for enrollment and attendance. Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock in Primary School building all Non-English speaking children and their parents are invited to attend enrollment day for the special language classes. Colorado City public schools will conduct the summer school for all Non-English speaking children who plan to start to school in September. The purpose of the school, announces Brooks Teague, principal at Primary School, is to help non-English speaking children get ready to enter the first grade. All children who speak little or no English will be taught simple fundamentals of English to help make them more familiar with the lan-

guage of the classroom and the first step reading books. "Through no fault of their own," Teague said, "many of our Non-English speaking children have had to spend two years in the first grade before being advanced to second grade because of the language problem. "In order to resolve the difficulty as much as possible in advance of the regular school term the summer program is open to Non-English speaking children. The program offers help with vocabulary and language training so that the little Non-English first graders can make better progress when school starts," Teague said.

There is no charge of any kind for the training in English. Classes begin Monday morning, July 1, and continue through August 24, 8:30 a. m. until 11:30 every morning, Mondays through Fridays in Primary School. Mrs. Swan Cramer is to be teacher. Transportation to and from school for the pupils will be the responsibility of the parents, Teague said. All friends of children who do not speak or understand much English are asked to see that their parents get news of the summer classes. They are planned to give real help to the Non-English speaking boys and girls of Colorado Independent School District.

## Livestock Owners To Talk Infestation

Mitchell County livestock men are urged to be present Friday at 2 p. m. for a called meeting in County Courthouse, Abilene. Screwworm infestation problems in this area will be discussed at the Friday meet. Progress of eradication and outlining procedures being used to deal with reported infestations will be explained. Confirmed cases of screwworm infestation have now reached 31 for this year, according to County Agent Buddy Logsdon. He noted that this year total infestations have been on the increase in a number of counties outside the warmer areas where the insect can normally survive winter temperatures. In Mitchell County where a countywide spraying program was set to start this week confirmed cases have shown up in four separate areas. Infestations have hit cattle herds in areas, east, west and south of Colorado City. Cattle in the Looney area have shown the highest incidence of screwworm infestation, Logsdon said. There are

other confirmed cases in the Spade area, Champion Creek area south of Loraine, and in the Westbrook area, he reported. "That takes in every direction except the northern portion of the county," he said. Screwworm eradication officials have said that immediate action is required to prevent a further increase in screwworm incidence. Widely scattered infestations are straining sterile fly production and release capabilities, as eradication workers continue to give special treatment to each reported case," Logsdon said. In order to continue this special treatment, new cases must be reported at once to limit spread of the pest. In addition, livestock producers can make the program more effective through use of preventive sprays and wound treatments, the county agent advised. Signing up for the spraying program announced last week here is continuing at the Extension Service office. Ten livestock producers have already asked for the service.

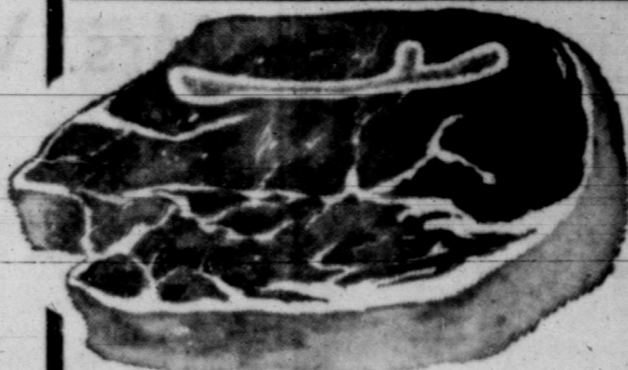

**Postmaster Notes

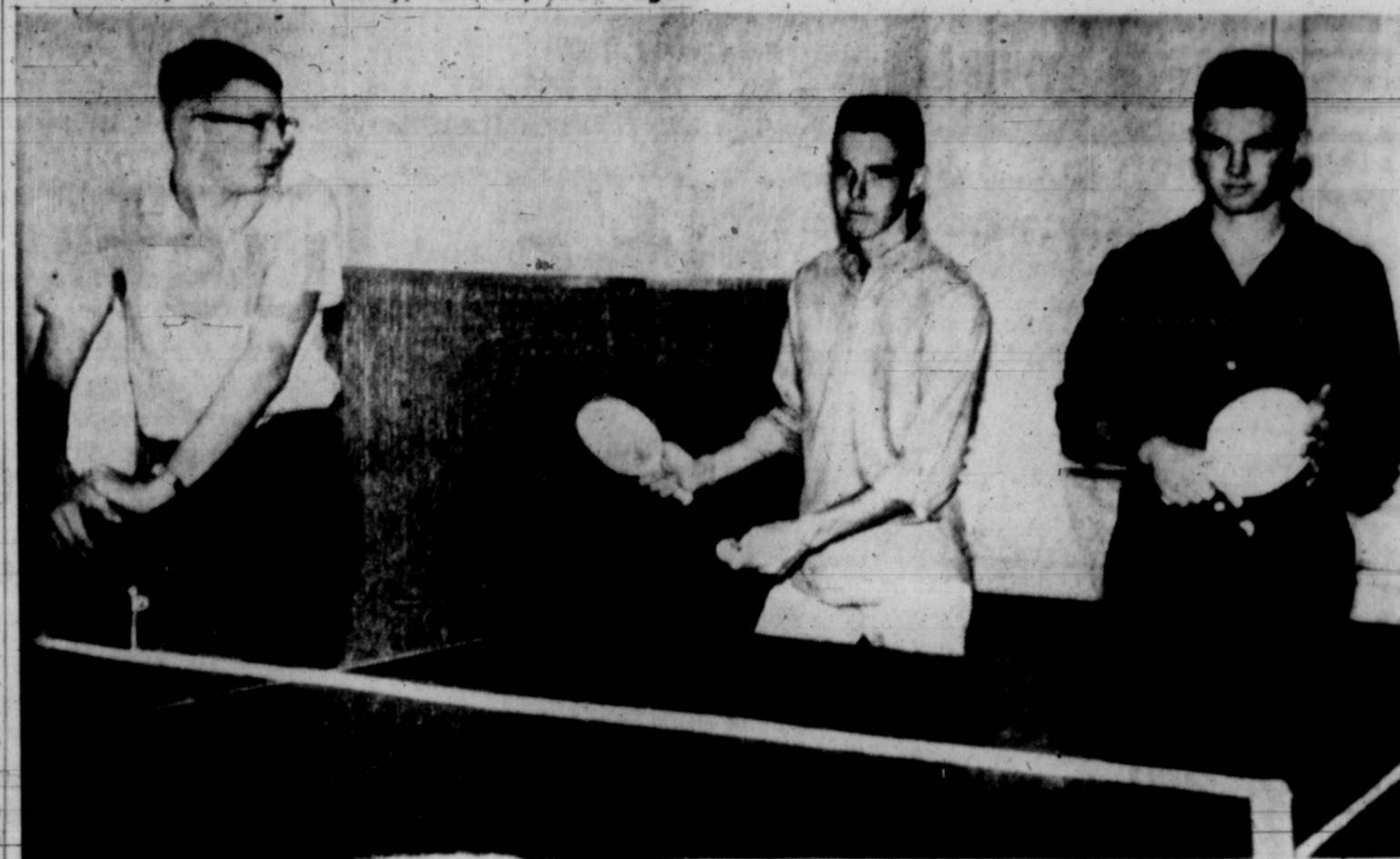

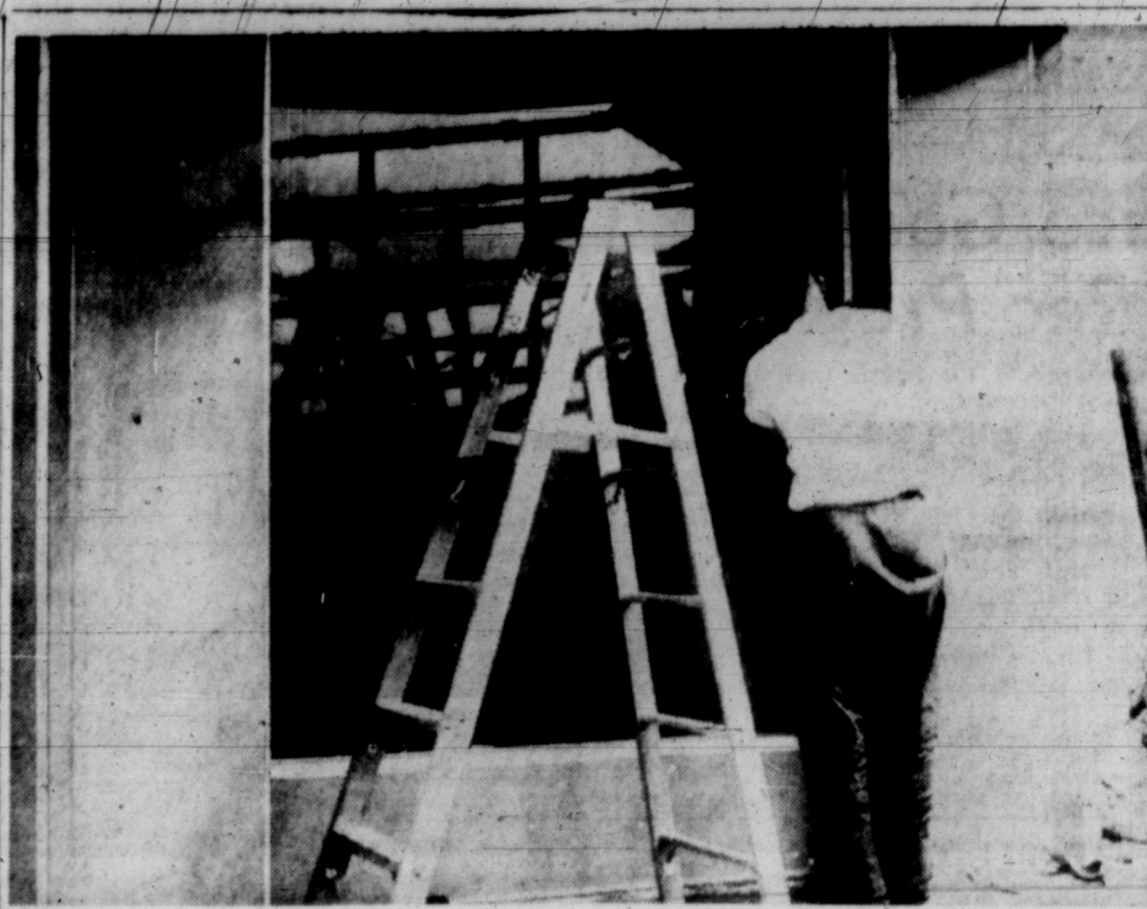

# Attendance Good At Summer Rec Program

City Summer Recreation program for all school-age groups has been progressing successfully, according to City Recreation Director Mrs. Dick Wistrand.

The program, operating Monday through Friday at the Community Center Building on East 10th St., has been averaging a daily attendance of about 63 participants. The number is expected to reach as high as 80 when ping pong and billiard tournaments begin in July and August.

Children and teenagers are welcome at the "free center," where the summer program will continue until around August 23. Cost is \$50 per person for its duration.

Miss Carolyn Shimer and Cleve Moore are Mrs. Wistrand's assistants at the center and divide their duties between the various departments.

Primary children start arriving at the center at 9:30 and entertain themselves with a variety of games (the TV set is used only by a few) until 10:30 when the crafts class, led by Miss Shimer, begins. Types of handwork done include rock mosaics, plaster-of-paris work, and papier mache. At 11:30, the youngsters leave for lunch.

During the morning crafts period, high school and junior-high age youth have use of the recreational facilities, which include tetherball, baseball, carrom games, canasta, ping pong, billiards, and shuffleboard. Cleve Moore is in

charge of the games and the boys' recreation.

From 1:30 to 3:00 in the afternoon, elementary school age youngsters "recreate." Their game-time ends at 3:00, when Miss Shimer again leads the crafts class (this one is of a more advanced nature) until 4:30.

Breaks between the different periods enable the groups to buy soft drinks, available at the center.

The summer program continues to run smoothly, and

Mrs. Wistrand commended Miss Shimer and Moore for their excellent work at the center.

"There is a very healthy atmosphere in this program," she stated. "The youngsters are supervised but yet allowed to do what they like... they are 'on their own' but at the same time are being taken care of. And they are learning to handle their personal relations without the help of home or scholastic supervision," Mrs. Wistrand concluded.

## State Collects \$1,6 Million By Escheat Law Process

It took the 1961 Legislature two special sessions to pass escheat reporting laws to insure the state's right to dormant personal property and bank accounts, unclaimed for more than seven years by owners whose whereabouts are unknown.

To date more than \$1,600,000 has been collected by the state.

Most came from the "bank escheat" law, which became effective on May 3, 1962. Law requires banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions to publicize dormant accounts in an attempt to uncover lost owners. Unclaimed deposits then are turned over to the state.

So far, this has totaled \$1,340,953.15. A provision in the law allows a person claiming interest in escheated properties to recover his money. This has caused \$1,686.68 to be refunded.

Originally, utility companies, county treasurers, insurance firms, court officers and others affected by the first escheat reporting law reported more than \$3,300,000 worth of unclaimed holdings.

However, by the time public notice was given, the amount dwindled to \$2,260,691.88. Newspaper publicity relative to the new act resulted in numerous inquiries and claims.

## CASE—BRACERO DEATH

KNELL—Congress killed the Bracero program and set a burial date of December 31, when it refused to extend the agreement to import Mexican farm laborers for two more years.

It may help agriculture workers in other states, but Henry LaBlanc, Director of the Texas Employment Commission's farm labor division, says it won't help Texas farm workers.

It might even hurt local workers, LaBlanc allowed, "because the Bracero program has kept the pay rate up."

Absence of the Bracero competition, LaBlanc explained, could result in lower wages for this state's workers.

It is rumored that Colorado lawmakers plan to introduce a bill to extend the Bracero program there for one year. Purpose is to allow more time for readjustment of the farm labor system.

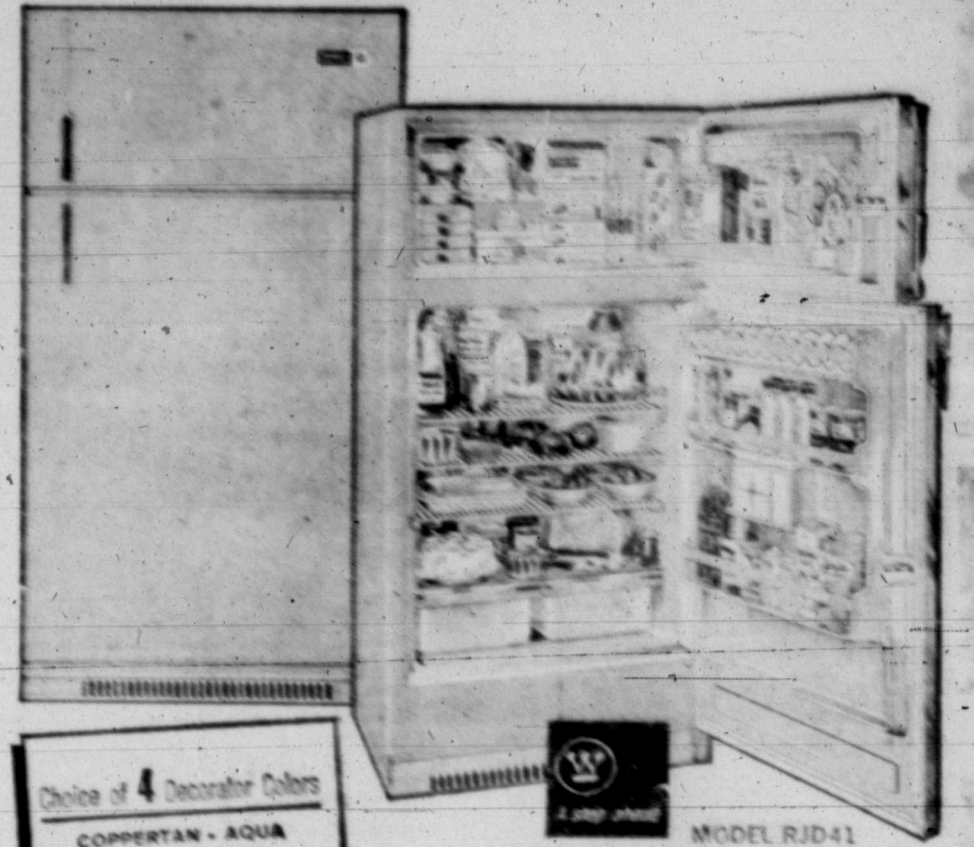
RULING—Attorney General has ruled that a recently-passed bill by Rep. Forrest Harding of San Angelo gave the State Highway Commission authority to alter maximum speed limits. Commission could set them as high as 70 miles per hour.

Also it could set minimum speed limits on controlled access highways, whether within or without a city's limits, regardless of any speed limit set by city ordinance.

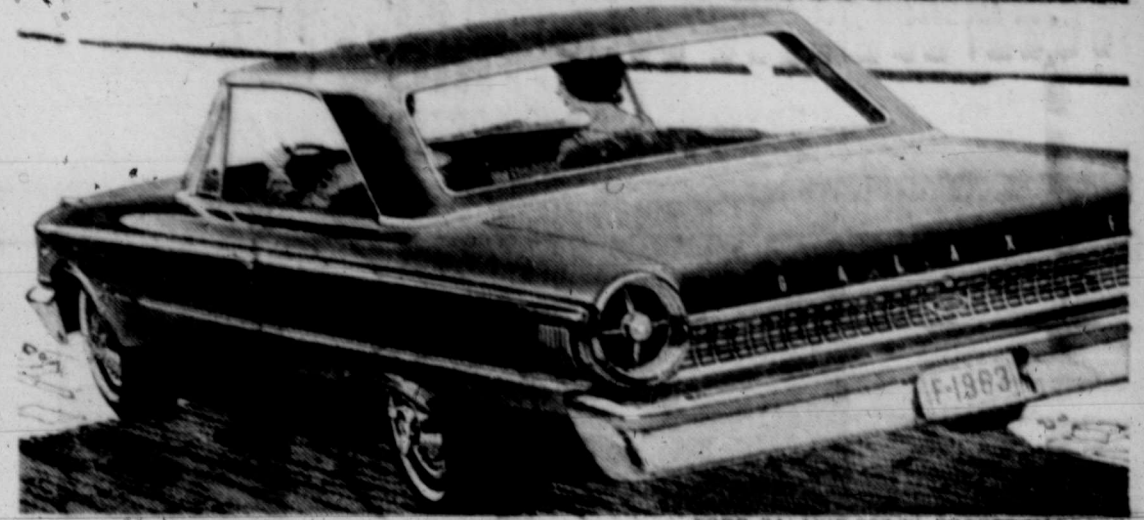

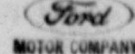

**EASY COOKING, GOOD EATING**

**Homemakers' Pet Summer Recipes**

Lots of good, easy cooking abounds in the hot "dog days" of summer.

We have asked several Colorado City homemakers for their favorite summer recipes and been rewarded with some mouth-watering samples. For the most part the ladies gave the recipes by memory—and we had to nail them down to exactly how much of this and that ingredient was needed. Through no set timing for preparing the dishes—they have been prepared successfully for years, without a thought to any of these minor details.

But here they are—tried and true and bound to be good.

**Turner's Goulash**  
Mrs. Dewey Turner, mother of five, likes this dish because "it's easy to fix" for

her large family at Seven Wells Community. "We usually serve our goulash with creamed potatoes," she added.

The Turner's ground beef is pre-packaged in chunks of about 2 lbs. Mrs. Turner browns the contents of one of the packets in drippings (with all other seasoning), then drains off excess grease. Next, a small grated onion (more if you like more onion taste) and 2 cups tomato juice are added to the meat. Simmer mixture over low flame for 30-30 minutes, then add about 2 cups broken macaroni and continue cooking for about 10 more minutes. The Turners like their goulash "juicy", so if you don't, cook it longer and some of the juice will cook off.

**Stovall's Cobbler**  
Mrs. Pink Stovall, 617 Cy-

press, has been cooking 53 years. She has two daughters, five grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Old-fashioned peach cobbler is her summer favorite—and her family's too. "My family says I make the best peach cobbler they ever tasted," she said proudly.

First, Mrs. Stovall combines the contents of a large can of peaches, 1/4 cup sugar, and 1-3 teaspoon cinnamon in a stewer. (fresh peaches may be used instead of canned.) While the mixture is being brought to a boil, mix together about a cup of Bisquick and enough sweet milk (also about a cup) to make a thick batter. "I used to mix my own thick batter, but I discovered Bisquick was easier and just as good," Mrs. Stovall said. Drop some of the batter around on the bottom of the

buttered cobbler pan, in order to thicken the peach mixture as it cooks. Pour in the peaches, then drop the remainder of the batter in spoonfuls on top. Sprinkle the cobbler with a little sugar, dot with butter, and cook at 350 degrees until brown.

**Richardson's Salad**  
Mrs. J. Ed Richardson, 1826 Chestnut St. is a firm believer in salads for summer-time fare. "Salads are best at this time of the year—you don't have to stand over a hot stove to prepare them," she said. Her three grandchildren live only a block away, and are frequent visitors to their grandmother's dining table.

One package of lime jello is dissolved in one cup hot water. One cup cold water is added and the jello is set in the refrigerator until it reaches the consistency of egg white. Then fold in 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, and one small package Philadelphia creamed cheese (whipped). Place the mixture in molds and return to refrigerator. When set, place in warm water so that the salad will flip out easily. Serve on lettuce leaf and with Ritz crackers.

**Lee's Custard**  
Mrs. J. Ralph Lee, 427 Vine, has many pet recipes, but considers her custard one of the favorites of children, who drink it from glasses. "The custard is also good poured over vanilla ice cream and sprinkled with nutmeg," Mrs. Lee commented. "I often make a triple recipe and save the unused egg whites for divinity candy or angel food cake."

Heat (don't boil) 2 cups sweet milk in double boiler until it coats the spoon. Mix together 3-beaten egg yolks and 1/4 cup sugar and add to the milk. Stir constantly until the custard coats the spoon then add 1/2 cup vanilla and remove from heat.



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**Insect Control Guide Here**

Home owners in Colorado City bothered during this season with household insects can get control information pamphlets at the Courthouse here.

A leaflet compiled by entomologists at Texas A & M gives up-to-date control measures to help fight invasions of insects. The leaflet, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," classifies insects in categories relating to type of damage and concise control measures are given for each. Also listed are some of the important cautions to observe in using insecticides.

Copies of the "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects" are available from the county Extension Service agent's office.
