'Big Shot' Gangsters Are Held

CHICAGO CONTINUES IN CLEAN-UP OF CRIME; 2,500 ARRESTED

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Seven "Big Shot" gangsters, found behind the drawn shades of a room in which not long ago two others were murdered, were held to the grand jury today as gunmen.

Altogether, police took 425 prisoners yesterday, bringing their "crime drive" total for the five days to more than 2,500, but the seven found in the dingy second floor restaurant were regarded by police as the most important of all.

In presenting them at last night's "showup," at which suspects are paraded across a small stage before the victims of recent crimes, chief of detectives Egan said:

"Their names would grace a penitentiary roster of a hangman's warrant. They are of the O'Donnell gang."

Two of them were O'Donnell brothers, Myles and Bernard. (There is a third and better known O'Donnell, called "Klondike.") There was "Three-fingered Jack" White, once convicted of murder; George (Red) Barker, known as a labor terrorist and once charged with murder; Mike Kirk, Edward Smith and John O'Connor.

With the seven, was arrested Frank Lacey, concerning whom police have no previous information.

Five minutes after the "showup," eight lawyers were demanding that the men be promptly booked so bail could be arranged and the men freed. They were successful only in the case of Myles O'Donnell, whom they represented as "a dying man."

TERRELL HEARING SET MONDAY

COMPTROLLER DRAWS BLOOD IN FIRST MIX

DEFENSE SUCCEEDS IN POSTPONEMENT PLEAS MADE TO HOUSE

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—Taking of testimony on charges preferred against Comptroller S. H. Terrell before the House of Representatives will not start until Monday. The House, sitting as a Committee of the Whole, granted a postponement until then on request of attorneys for Terrell.

Addressing the committee, former State Senator T. H. McGregor, representing the respondent, declared that the comptroller's department was now being audited by public accountants and it was desired to await completion of the work before starting to meet the charges preferred in the house. He said many of the items complained of in the state auditor's report as "unsatisfactorily accounted for" had been cleaned up.

Set Near Close
Postponement until Saturday was requested by attorneys for a quorum then as suggested a continuance until Monday, next to the last day of this special session of the legislature.

"We have no disposition to unnecessarily delay this hearing," McGregor said. "But we do not feel justified in sacrificing the right of Comptroller Terrell to expedition."

He pointed out that the charges had not been definitely preferred until Tuesday and declared that the house should not "crowd us into it."

Involves Big Fide
"A person charged with a felony has at least two days in which to respond," he said. "This proceeding will involve the handling of thousands of documents, hundreds of thousands of accounts and millions of dollars."

"Mr. Terrell had previous to the filing of these charges employed public accountants to check the accounts of his department and we

SCIENTIST LINKS HUMAN BODIES AND GENERATES NEW ELECTRICAL CURRENT

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—It would take two million people, hooked together in mental reaction to the same idea, to generate enough voltage to light an ordinary incandescent light.

Credit this to the string galvanometer, an instrument so sensitive that it will detect one one-millionth of a volt of electricity, used by Dr. Edmund Jacobson, of the University of Chicago, in experiments disclosed today tending to prove that mental activity and imagination are functions involving the whole body rather than brain action alone.

Two years of experimentation have proved to Dr. Jacobson that in the merest of ideas there is a neuromuscular action capable of being measured in the amount of voltage produced.

The subjects used by Dr. Jacobson were schooled in the technique of perfect relaxation; it was necessary virtually to eliminate all muscle tensions except those of vital processes.

Electrodes capable of detecting the slightest change in the electrical potential accompanying any muscular tension were sealed to the subject's right biceps, forming

APPROVAL OF HUGHES SAID NOT ASSURED

MUSCLE SHOALS GHOST DRAGGED INTO CASE BEFORE SENATE

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Confirmation of Charles Evans Hughes as Chief Justice of the United States by the Senate went into the doubtful stage today as his friends conceded "big threats" by the opposition over night.

Testimony that Mr. Hughes drew up the proposed contract whereby Muscle Shoals would be turned over to the American Cyanamid company, was presented today to the Senate Lobby committee.

Senator Watson of Indiana, republican leader, predicted a margin of 17 votes for the nominee as the fourth day of debate was resumed with Senators Glase, democrat, Virginia, and Nye, republican, South Dakota, carrying on the attack against Hughes.

Others Are Busy
Others who were busy checking the situation agreed there was beginning to be doubt on the outcome with decision depending on the final attitude of the democrats.

Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, who opened the attack on Hughes on Monday, said "he will be

REDUCE BONDS IN SIX CASES AGAINST POPE

EX-BANKER LIKELY TO FURNISH BAIL, IS INDICATION

(Special To The Journal)

POST, Garza County, Feb. 13.—Six bonds, of \$10,000 each and covering charges of acceptance of deposits in a bank he is alleged to have known was unstable, were reduced here today when attorneys for the state and counsel for J. M. Pope, former Southland banker, reached an agreement.

Each of the six bonds was reduced from \$10,000 to \$2,000 and indications were here this afternoon that Pope would make bond upon signatures of citizens of Lamb county, where he has resided for some years.

Under One Bond
Prior to his arrest upon the six charges covering deposits, Pope was free under a \$7,500 bond, charged with theft by bail.

The bank of Southland, which he operated for several months last fall, closed on December 2 and Pope, former Littlefield resident, was "missing" for a period of one month.

Attorneys in the case reached an agreement after Pope's counsel had filed habeas corpus proceedings in district court here.

TWO NATIONS ACCEPT PLAN

JAPAN AND FRANCE ARE WILLING TO ADOPT NAVAL PROGRAM

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The Japanese delegation in a statement this afternoon declared Japan was ready to accept a holiday in battleship construction until 1936, to reduce the tonnage of battleships to 25,000 tons and to reduce the maximum calibre of guns to 14 inches.

The statement, which had been eagerly awaited in view of the British and American announcement of naval aims, said Japan also was ready to agree to the prolongation of the life of battleships from twenty years to twenty-six years.

Japan attaches special importance to cruisers armed with 8 inch guns and wishes to maintain "the minimum force sufficient for the needs of national defense taking its consideration the forces possessed by other powers."

The maximum tonnage of 6 inch gun cruisers should be from 7,000 to 7,500 tons and that of flotilla leaders and destroyers should be adequately limited, the statement said.

The age limit of cruisers was suggested at twenty years and that of destroyers at sixteen years.

Noah Beery Very Low After Operation
HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 13.—Noah Beery, motion picture bad man, today in real life was waging a desperate battle against the death he has so ably portrayed in numerous villainous roles on the screen.

At the Hollywood hospital where the film "heavy" yesterday underwent an operation for appendicitis, his condition was described as dangerous.

LOCAL AUTO DEALER TO SEEK POST VACATED BY A. V. WEAVER

George E. Benson, long time Lubbock resident and engaged in the motor car business here, will be a candidate for the city commission in the forthcoming municipal elections, set for April 1st, he said here today.

Mr. Benson has filed for the post now held by A. V. Weaver, commissioner of streets and alleys. Mr. Weaver will not run for reelection, he has announced.

Mr. Benson has been prominent in business circles of Lubbock for the past decade and during the last several years has been closely identified with civic enterprises of the Rotary club, of which he is a member and of the Board of City Development. He is accredited with being largely responsible for the success of the municipal airport, project thus far and is in close touch with aviation advancement in this area as a member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce aviation committee.

Offers No Reforms
"I have no reforms to offer, no 'pet projects' to push but if I am elected to the vacant commission I expect to help give the city a business administration," he said.

Mr. Benson has not held official position here before but four years ago was a candidate for the position he filed for today. His announcement fills the city filings, one man having announced for each of the open places. J. H. Hankins, present utilities commissioner, has announced for re-election and Jerry J. Clements has announced his candidacy for the mayoralty, the present incumbent, Harley D. Woods, having decided to retire from public office at the end of his first term.

HOOVER AND SPOUSE SEEK TO REGAIN FISHING TITLE FROM HARLAN STONES

(By The Associated Press)

LONG KEY, Fla., Feb. 13.—Some sixty pounds of sailfish behind the judiciary in the battle of bending poles and slender lines the President and Mrs. Hoover set out today to regain angling honors for the executive branch of the government.

The capture of the expedition's largest trophy thus far, a 65-pound sailfish measuring seven feet ten inches, by Mrs. Harlan F. Stone, wife of the Supreme Court Justice, caused the Chief Executive to abandon plans for a 25-mile trip south of here and concentrate on the nearby island straddled water which Mrs. Stone visited yesterday.

Picture Is Taken
While Mrs. Hoover recorded Mrs. Stone's catch with a motion picture camera, Justice Stone landed a 40-pound sailfish from Mr. Hoover's boat.

The President got an early lead on his companions Monday when he brought in a 45-pound sailfish but since then he has been unable to snare one of the big gamesters.

A pouch of mail, containing among other things nominations of several secondary foreign officers, received Mrs. Hoover's attention last night before his temporary denial about the houseboat "The Sauter," was cleared.

The captain of The Sauter sent word in early that he was coming to the dock today for fresh supplies of food and water. The palatial houseboat was chartered by President Hoover to serve as a temporary White House during this week of fishing. He went aboard immediately after his arrival Monday and has not put foot on land since.

FATHER OF MAN, SAID TO BE SUICIDE, IS BEHIND MOVE

An official investigation into incidents of the reported suicide of H. B. Martin, 33, in this city last Sunday night at 10:30 o'clock, appeared probable today when W. W. Martin, father of the former, conferred with District Attorney Durwood Bradley with reference to the affair.

Mr. Martin is accompanied here by his son, Herbert Martin. They reside in Cape, in Taylor county and near Abilene.

Mr. Bradley said that the father expressed that he is not convinced that his son committed suicide. The latter requested an investigation on grounds that he is of the opinion that all circumstances of the shooting have not been brought to the surface.

It made an investigation of the shooting and agreed with other officials that circumstances indicated suicide," said Mr. Bradley. "It will make further study of the facts with the father."

H. B. Martin was formerly employed by a taxi company of this city. He is reported to have taken his own life by shooting himself in the heart. The shooting occurred in the yard at residence of G. E. Knight, 1813 Avenue O, following an alleged argument between Martin and his wife, a waitress at a local cafe. The couple lived in the Knight home. No inquest was held.

He died before emergency treatment could be rendered.

Mr. Martin, who was discharged by the taxi company February 3, visited several days with his parents and returned to this city last Sunday evening. He is said to have demanded of his wife the name of "the person who told her why he was discharged."

Allen Awaits Jury Verdict On Insanity

(By The Associated Press)

EASTLAND, Feb. 13.—Called insane by his own mother despite his own assertions "he was sane," E. V. Allen, 29, condemned bank robber, today awaited a jury verdict which either will send him to the electric chair or to a state institution, possibly for the remainder of his life.

Closing arguments in Allen's sanity hearing started last night. His hysterical mother closed Allen's plea for life behind bars in preference to death in the chair. Sobbing, at times hardly able to talk, and at the last hysterical, Mrs. Mattie Yowe, mother of twelve children, told the sanity hearing jury that six members of her immediate family—herself included—were afflicted with insanity.

Dates from Fever
Allen's insanity, she said, dated from an attack of fever when he was still in his teens, an attack from which he never recovered fully, physically or mentally. Besides this son, two other sons, a brother, and a cousin had shown signs of mental disorder.

Convicted of the bloodless hold-up of the First State bank at Carbon in December, 1927, Allen had exhausted every other means of escaping the electric chair when his petition for an insanity hearing was allowed, the day before his scheduled execution.

U. S. Ambassador Is Fighting For Health

MONROVIA, Calif., Feb. 13.—The United States' ambassador to Poland, Alexander P. Moore, recently appointed by President Hoover, today was fighting for his health in a sanitarium here. He is suffering from an infection of the throat and lungs.

ANOTHER BOMB EXPLODES

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—The 14th bomb of the year exploded today in the Elston avenue factory district, doing \$20,000 damage to the Right Welding and Boiler Repairing company plant and nearby structures.

Bill Allows Tech Funds For Session

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—The senate today passed a bill to appropriate \$1,602,900 for summer schools and other emergency educational purposes. The vote was 17 to 6 with two pairs.

The Senate took action in the face of a special message from the governor in which he put the legislature on notice that he would not submit appropriations until additional revenue had been provided through tax levying measures.

DR. HORN HOPEFUL OF BILL PASSING

Following the Senate's action today in passing a bill to appropriate \$1,602,900 for summer schools and other emergency educational purposes, Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, expressed hope that Tech would receive the "much-needed" funds which have been outlined for emergency purposes here.

Texas Technological college is applying for an aggregate appropriation of \$134,500. The divisional needs are as follows: \$25,000 for additional salaries; \$25,000 for maintenance; \$50,000 for equipment; and \$34,500 additional funds for summer school.

"I am hopeful," said Dr. Horn, "that the appropriation will be made without delay. I am not certain as how much of Texas Technological college's outlined funds would be included in the total appropriation, as specified in the bill which was passed by the Senate."

GETS 99 YEARS

Convicted of the murder of his mother, Mrs. Ace Riley, Herman Riley, below, Lons Cedar, Tex., farm youth, has been given a 99-year sentence. MAYFIELD IS OPPOSED TO CHAIN STORES

ONCE SENATOR URGES TAX ON STORES IN TEXAS

DALLAS, Feb. 13.—Independent merchants in the field today to fight chain stores in Texas after a meeting here at which the Merchants Protective League was organized and 300 independent merchants heard former United States Senator Earle B. Mayfield deliver a scathing attack upon chain store systems.

In his address last night the former senator turned chain store systems "the greatest menace to the continued prosperity of Texas and the nation."

He centered his attack on what he termed absolute ownership and foreign control, under which the asserted chain units "took everything and gave little in return to the communities in which they were located, becoming mere siphons for the sucking of money to a few centers in the north and east."

The major remedy proposed by him was legislation to compel chain systems to become part of the communities they serve by paying their share of city, county and state taxes by contributing to clementary and charitable organizations, and by investing a percentage of their profits earned in Texas properties or securities. Such legislation, he said, would be constitutional as well as equitable.

Other speakers on the program were Mark McGee of Fort Worth.

TAHOKA PLANS TO BEAUTIFY TOWN

TAHOKA, Feb. 13.—(Special)—Plant more trees and make Tahoka more beautiful is one of the slogans adopted by the local chamber of commerce for this year. Arrangements have been made by Secretary C. C. Williams with a nursery where the organization is furnishing citizens almost any kind of plant desired at cost. Chinese elms, which are being planted almost exclusively in this section for shade trees, evergreens, fruit trees, and all kinds of flowering plants are being ordered.

Tahoka has long been noted as being one of the cleanest and prettiest of all towns on the Plains, and an effort is now being made to make it a leader in beauty for its plant life.

PARRISH'S BILL TABLED

LUBBOCK MAN'S PAROLE MEASURE DOWNED; FEES TALKED

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—The senate Wednesday tabled the bill sponsored by Senator Pink L. Parrish of Lubbock to amend the parole laws. Debate on the measure centered around an amendment of the author which would exempt the parole board from giving notice of application for parole to the sheriff and county attorney from the county from which the prisoner was committed. Parrish argued the giving of notice would permit the sheriff or county attorney to continue prosecution of the prisoner after he was convicted by needless objection to his release.

Might Conceal Facts. Opponents of the amendment held that notice of application for parole should be given as a means of protection to the community where the offense was committed, holding that failure to give this notice might result in concealment of the facts and permit the release of men who were dangerous to society.

An amendment designed to stop the present practice of collecting delinquent taxes by contract through allowing district attorneys in the large counties to employ assistants for this purpose was adopted.

The motion to change the maximum in counties of from 100,000 to 150,000 from \$10,000 to \$20,000 was made by Representative J. B. Snellgrove, of Henderson and was put through before representatives of the larger counties realized what had happened. Representative Joseph McGill of El Paso, however, stated that he approved the latter amendment.

Representatives Paul and Keller clashed when the latter supported Representative Beck of Fort Worth, sought to shunt official in the larger counties to retain one-half their excess fees rather than one-fourth.

GRAIN CO-OP HITS MARKET

NEW CORPORATION GO INTO MARKETS TO BUY WHEAT

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—The new grain stabilization corporation Tuesday went into the open market to buy cash wheat at Minneapolis, Omaha, Duluth, Hutchinson, Kas. Kansas City and Chicago.

Following the close of the markets, W. G. Kellogg, president of the corporation, made formal announcement of officers, including his own election, and revealed some of the policies of the new agency.

All purchasing for the stabilization corporation will be done through the Farmers National Grain Corporation, of which he is general manager, he said. Wheat bought by the new corporation will be stored, processed, and merchandised, either directly to the miller or abroad, and any losses sustained shall be paid by the federal farm board as a loan from the revolving fund. The corporation, formed on recommendation of the wheat advisory committee, will be guided by that body in the purchasing of surpluses. Purchases may be made either at markets or directly from producers.

Although organized to handle all grains, the corporation at present is limited to wheat, inasmuch as no other advisory committees have been created. To enter the corn market it must have definite powers delegated to it by a corn advisory committee to the Federal Farm Board.

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OKLAHOMA TO FIGHT CASE

HOLLOWAY SAYS STATE NOT TO LET LAND GO TO TEXAS

(By The Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 13.—Oklahoma will "fight to the last ditch" to prevent the property title of persons involved in the western boundary dispute between Oklahoma and Texas, Governor W. J. Holloway declared Wednesday.

The governor's statement followed receipt of word that the Texas legislature had rejected Oklahoma's offer to pay Texas \$150,000 for 28,000 acres of contested Panhandle border land.

Six Hundred Involved
In the disputed area live six hundred families who heretofore thought they were in Oklahoma.

"I immediately will instruct the attorney general to take any steps possible, if any further steps can be taken, to protect the title to the land held by these residents," the governor said.

"I am sorry the legislature of Texas does not see the matter from our point of view."

CROCKETT DOCTOR HELD FOR DEATH

FLORESVILLE, Feb. 13 (AP)—W. Lorenz, 35, of Stockdale, is dead and Dr. C. W. Butler, a physician at Crockett, is being held in the Wilson county jail here without bond pending an investigation of the killing early Wednesday of Lorenz who was shot twice in the chest and twice in the back, at the gate leading to the home of Bob Sells, 14 miles south of Stockdale. Lorenz, oil agent of the Gulf Refining company and a former racer, was called to the Sells home early Wednesday and was shot as he entered the gate. Sells is the father-in-law of Dr. Butler who had been at the home since the previous night.

Sterling Requests State Compensation

PESHAWAR, India, Feb. 13 (AP)—Eight hundred Shinwari tribesmen have attacked and captured the post of Torkhan on the frontier of Afghanistan and the northwest frontier province, disarming the garrison and driving them into British territory.

The Shinwaris are partisans of Sardar Amin Khan, half-brother of the exiled king Amanullah of Afghanistan. British authorities here believed the attack may have been caused by the arrest in Peshawar of Amin Khan, who was suspected of plotting an uprising against the present king of Afghanistan.

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LOCAL LIONS HOST IN FEED LAST NIGHT

MELVIN JONES, LEADER OF LIONISM, TALKS IN PROGRAM

International service of Lions clubs was analyzed here last night by Melvin Jones, of Chicago, founder of Lionism and secretary-general of the organization, at a banquet given in his honor last night at the Hilton hotel.

The local Lions club was host to the visitor and Lions from South Plains cities attended.

Mr. Jones gave numerous instances where Lions clubs throughout the world have aided the cripple, the blind, the helpless and unfortunate, as well as having assisted to build cities and to better their communities in every imaginable manner.

Lions Unselfish.

"Our mission," said Mr. Jones, "is to leave the world better than we found it. We're building cities, and we're building men. You can't find anything that equals what the Lions club have done in unselfishly serving their towns, even if you review all ages of the past."

"Service clubs are making better men for the chambers of commerce, for the churches, for every other organization that is doing good. The Lions club is just as essential as any other institution, of any nature because it serves every organization that is for good—for everything that stands for unselfish service."

The code of ethics of the organization, its purposes, objects and

achievements were reviewed by the secretary-general in a talk that held more than a hundred Lions and Lionesses virtually spellbound for the hour during which he talked. He explained that the name Lions club is derived from the symbolic qualities recognized throughout all lands and peoples as being the nature of the Lion.

Symbols Defined.

The four symbols of Lionism, courage, strength, activity and fidelity, he defined well, and urged individual concentration to these symbols from every Lion.

During the past two and a half years, or in 956 days, he said there have been 865 new Lions clubs organized in the world. More than 100 of these were in Texas. This state, he told, now boasts of 240 Lions clubs, with 8,300 members, possessing more clubs and more members than all the other service clubs in the state combined, and the totals being more than any other club has in any other state.

Since its organization, in 1916, at Dallas, Lions International has grown to 2,100 clubs and 83,000 members in the United States, Canada, Mexico and China, he said.

For the past year, these clubs have reported to the International office a total of 10,715 worthwhile activities including 600 cases of help given to blind people, 1,200 boys aided, 400 child welfare cases, 2,300 instances of civic work accomplished.

In addition to the Lubbock Lions club, six other clubs of West Texas were represented, with two from Childress, one from Floydada, seven from Lamesa, one from Plainview, seven from Brownfield and 17 from Littlefield.

Invocation was by Sam J. McFarland.

Wilson Toastmaster.

Vaughn Wilson, of Lubbock, acted as toastmaster, explaining at the beginning that Lions clubs were created for cementing friendship and performing service for the community. Ben F. Condray, Jr., welcomed visiting Lions and Deputy District Governor W. C. Davis, of Childress, introduced the Texas District Governor A. C. Kayer, of Houston, and Mr. Kayer introduced Mr. Jones.

In his short talk, Deputy Governor Kayer told of the wonderful growth of Texas clubs during the past year, 12 new ones having been established and eight of these in West Texas. He announced that the state is to be divided into 40 districts, with 14 deputy governors and

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HUM TAKEN OUT OF RADIO TUBE BY NEW PROCESS; CONSTRUCTION ALTERED

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 13.—Hum, considered a necessary evil in the receiver operated by house current, has been taken out of the radio tube.

This bugaboo, introduced to household radio when battery sets became passe, has been conquered in the laboratory through the development of a new tube, it was announced today.

Problem Solved.

The problem was solved by Benjamin P. Meisner, research engineer of Short Hills, N. J., who has been identified with radio development more than ten years. The secret of overcoming hum was not disclosed further than the statement that the internal construction of the radio tube had been altered and this reception defect eliminated. Otherwise tube characteristics are unchanged.

While the method has been practically applied only to the indirectly heated types of AC tubes, such as the 227 and the screen grid, Mr. Meisner expressed the belief that it was possible to use the scheme on raw AC filament tubes like the 226.

In comparative tests, the tube developed only from one-fifth to one-one hundredth the amount of hum produced in present day tubes. For example, tubes in wide use today generated from 6 volt to 19 volts of hum. That from the new tube was so small as to be almost immeasurable.

STATES WAGING FIGHT TO STAMP OUT ILLITERACY BEFORE CENSUS TAKING

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—A race with the census taker is being waged by all states to blot out high illiteracy records by April 1.

For the first time the 1930 census will list the names and addresses

of all illiterates with the state superintendents of education. Five southern states, where the illiteracy percentage is highest—Louisiana, Georgia, South Carolina, Mississippi and Alabama—are putting forth the greatest efforts in the race.

Word has gone out through the cotton fields and along the bayous. Late lights are flickering in countless school rooms. Louisiana, which had the highest illiteracy record of all the states in the 1920 census—21.9 per cent—is working to remove the stigma. Georgia raised a fund of \$30,000 by private subscription and is putting on a campaign. South Carolina has 110 night schools running in one county.

Mrs. Cora Wilson Stewart, director of the national illiteracy crusade, predicted that as a result of the strenuous efforts of these backward states to overcome their illiteracy handicap, the coming census may reveal a surprising change. Iowa, with 1.1 illiterates, snatched first place from Nebraska, in 1920. Nebraska is working to resapture the honor.

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REUNION OF PARTY ASKED

SENATOR FLETCHER IS OPPOSED TO LAWS OF PARTY GROUPS

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Pleading for "a reunited democracy throughout the whole country," Senator Fletcher of Florida today announced his opposition to party regulations penalizing democrats for "refusal" to support the national ticket two years ago.

"I trust that no one will propose at any gathering of democrats or elsewhere," he said in a formal statement, "that only those who voted for the democratic electors at the 1928 election may look for recognition or preference in any future primaries."

Why Please Republicans

Asking "why play into the hands of the republicans," Fletcher warned against "what may be considered persuasive laws," adding that is "just what the republicans are hoping and praying will happen in several states."

"There were many good men and women who felt that they could

not—for one reason or another—vote for the democratic presidential electors," said the statement, "but who did vote for all other nominees of the party. These men and

women were and are democrats at heart, and will continue democrats unless assailed or penalized and, thereby, compelled to seek strange associates."

"The comptroller clamored for fragmentary reports, but he did not get a fragment until the report came to the House," General Keeling said. "We are not going to pass around any fragments of our report."

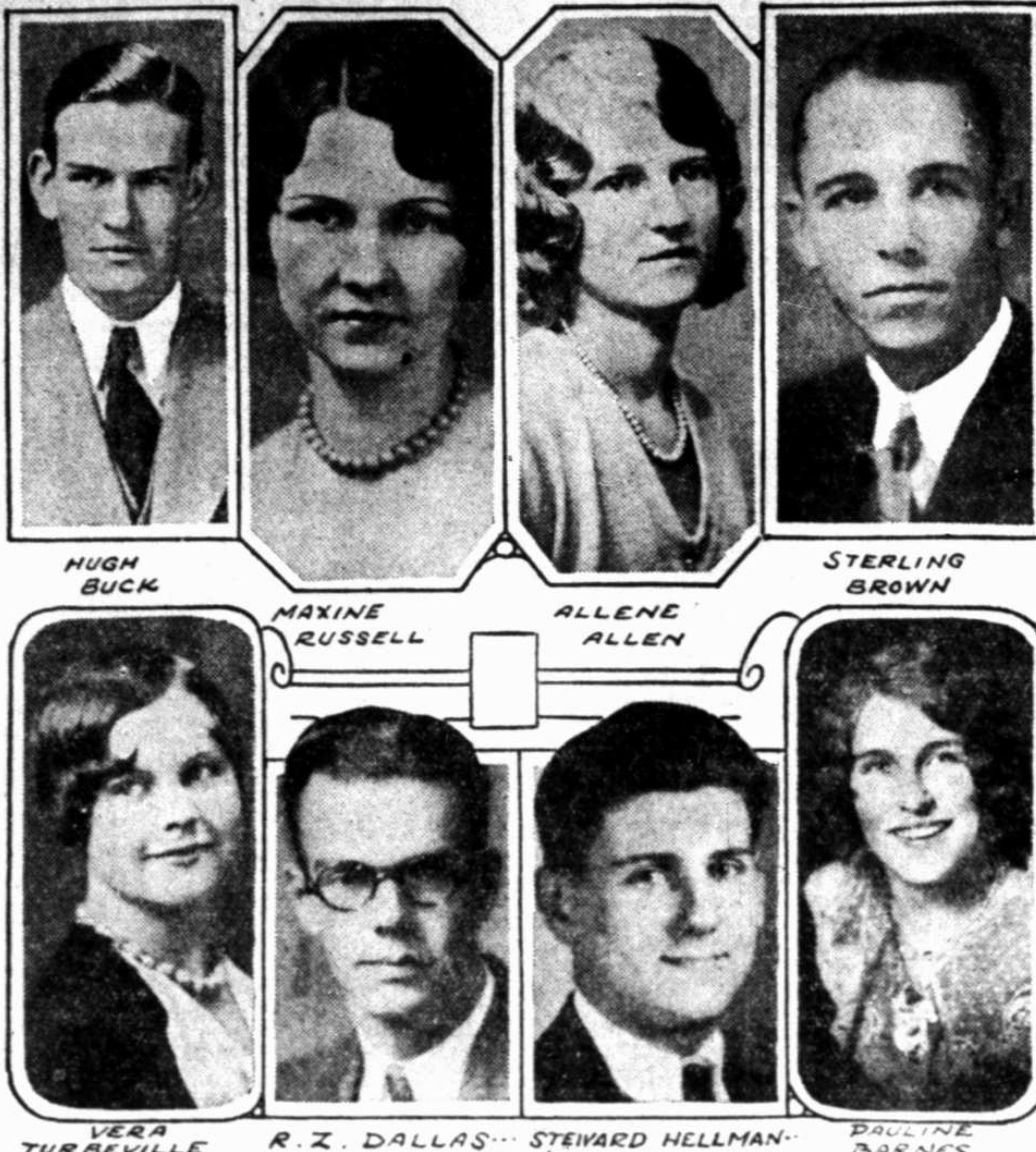

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 13.—Memories of seeing a White House circus her brothers staged with Tad and Willie Lincoln in the absence of the first lady were recalled in the "emancipator" birthday anniversary Wednesday by Mrs. Julia Tait Bayne of Wichita.

Mrs. Bayne also had a vivid recollection of Lincoln's scratchy whiskers when she traded a kiss for the president's photograph.

The Wichita woman's father just prior to the Civil War was chief examiner of the steam department in the patent office at Washington. She often accompanied her brothers on visits to the White House. Willie and Tad Lincoln and her two brothers arranged a circus one day when Mrs. Lincoln was in New York to get tapestries and rugs for the executive mansion.

She helped her brother, Charles, into Mrs. Lincoln's best white dress and blacked Tad's face with shoe polish. Willie paraded his father's spectacles.

She was leaving when Lincoln met her and asked her how much the circus cost. It was their first meeting.

"I told him only a nickel and he tried to catch hold of my hand to take me up," she said. "I went home because I knew it wasn't a place for a little girl to be."
