COUNCIL ORDERS IN MORE SIDEWALKS

At the regular meeting of the Council on Tuesday evening an ordinance was passed ordering the city to construct sidewalks on the main part of town. These walks when completed will connect the new school building and all the churches. Arrangements have been made for the construction of these sidewalks. If an owner so desires he may put in the walks himself and pay the cash or carry the obligation thus making a saving of 13 per cent. If they are put in by the city a 10 per cent commission for the selling of the certificate will be added to the cost. Then these sidewalks which will be paid off in the form of three annual tax bills will draw 8 per cent interest. This is a move in the right direction and a person who objects to such a move is just plain TIGHT, that's all.

The lady who was killed was the wife of the section foreman having charge of the first section out of Shattuck.

MRS. R. P. GARRISON DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Died, at her home east of Perryton at 6:00 p. m. on Tuesday, September 26, 1922. Mrs. Grace May Garrison, aged 31 years, 4 months and 25 days. Seldom has it been our duty to record a death so sudden. A dark gloom spread over the entire community as it was whispered from one to another friend that Mrs. "Rube" Garrison was gone. She was of an affectionate disposition, bright and winning in her ways so that friendship's circle was to her a large one. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hines of Hereford, Texas being born near that place on April 29, 1922. On December 25, 1916 she was married to R. P. Garrison, a pioneer citizen of this county, whom she leaves with two small children to mourn her loss.

Mrs. Garrison's sickness was of but brief duration, being less than twenty-four hours. Seemingly with us today, active in life's round of duty and love but gone tomorrow. Besides the husband and the two children, Harold Bell, age 5 years and Truman Edward, age 3 years, there is the mother and father and two sisters and four brothers who are left behind. All the members of Mrs. Garrison's family came in from Hereford as soon as they learned of her serious condition.

The body was taken to Canadian by Funeral Director G. R. Wilson on Wednesday evening from where it was shipped to Hereford for burial. Gone from our sight, but because life and love are stronger than death she is their still. She is still the mother of the dear children, upon whom she doted with such clinging fondness, and the companion still of him who mourns earth's greatest loss and may she not by this very transition yield over them a stronger force for goodness and truth than before. Our most sincere and heartfelt sympathy goes forth to these loved ones in this sad hour of trial.

MANY BROOM CORN BUYERS HERE

The broom corn buyers are just about the busiest individuals in this county right now. Among the many buyers working out of Perryton are M. W. Dunlap of Liberal, Kansas, Abe Miske of Chicago, Chas. Motter of Liberal, Kansas, C. B. Powell of Guymon, Oklahoma, J. Hailey of Beeville, Texas, and C. E. Gillmer of Wichita, Kansas. They are all strong boosters for the future of our broom corn market but they say we must have a large warehouse. Several plans are now under consideration and we sincerely hope that some of them will enable Perryton to have a warehouse soon. Broomcorn growers have been getting good prices for their crop this year. The record price that we have heard so far is that of \$225.00 per ton which was paid to Claude Littleton by C. B. Powell of the J. P. Patten Co. of Liberal. Most of the corn is averaging around \$180.00 per ton. The majority of the buyers predict that about 100 car load will be shipped from Perryton this year. We are adjacent to the most productive broom corn section of the United States and if we had the proper kind of a warehouse we would be one of the largest broom corn markets in the United States. Let's get one or at least lend all assistance possible to any one who will build a suitable building.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK GETS SCHOOL MONEY

The First National Bank has been chosen by the Board of Trustees of the Perryton Independent School District as the depository for the school money for another year. This bank made the high bid for the money, they paying a rate of six per cent. In addition to the local bids there were several bids put in by out of town banks who wished to be custodian of these funds. The Board acted wisely in keeping them in a home institution, the only proper place they should be kept.

FALL AND WINTER GARDEN

For early fall garden, before frost comes, all of the tender, quick-growing vegetables can be had by making successive planting, and continued fertilizations.

If frost is not expected until after October 15, plant the Green Pod Stringless bean up to September 1. If one will notice about how long it takes a certain crop to grow, he can easily tell just about how late it will pay to plant.

I leave my carrots in the open ground all winter, and they are as good in the early spring as in the summer before.

I leave some of my late beets in the row where grown, and bank them up a little. In this way they will stand a good deal of freezing, and will be better than those put in the cellar.

Spinach can be sowed in August or September, either broadcast or in rows, and be used from late in the fall until late in the spring.

One of the most ornamental of our edible plants is the Dwarf Scotch Curled kale (sometimes called the Norfolk kale). Sowed the latter part of August, it is used from November to May, and needs no protection. It can be planted in rows or sowed broadcast. For the small garden, I would prefer it in rows, though it makes an excellent cover crop when sowed broadcast.

Those who like radishes will be likely to enjoy the winter varieties, particularly Chinese Winter Rose. I like them better than turnips for cooking, and they grow nearly as large. The latter part of August is a good time for planting. Plant in rows, thin to about three inches, and bank up a little when hardfreezing weather comes.

Rutabagas planted early in August are used from November until the last of May, and are given no protection. This year, though, I intend to try banking them a little.

Peas can be planted in August and September and eaten in October and November, perhaps later. In 1918, we had the Luscious, a variety of the edible podded pea after Christmas. —The Progressive Farmer.

It was our first visit to a country school in Texas and we can truthfully say that the schools that we visited are on a par if not better than those of the more thickly populated northern and eastern states. The teachers are of the very best and the intelligence of the pupils is above the average. We do not have any of the really illiterate in this county. The mentality of the pupils and their adaptability to their work is above the average. Most excellent order and discipline was maintained. The Black School, which is one of the largest schools in this county, we found Prof. Roy B. Orrill and Mrs. Ruth Orrill in charge. They are very competent instructors and have a total of 45 pupils enrolled. Mr. and Mrs. Orrill came to this country from McLain, Texas. They are both graduates of the Canyon Normal and Mr. Orrill also attended the East Texas Normal at Commerce, Texas. At the noon hour we enjoyed a most bountiful dinner at the home of those fine people, Mr. and Mrs. James Reed and son, Dennis. These people are old timers in that section and have made a success of the cattle and farming business. They are the type of people that any community should be proud to hail as citizens for they are truly country builders. After dinner we visited the Blodgett School which is under the able direction of Miss Esther Carter. She has 17 pupils enrolled and they are all learning fast and they think much of their teacher. IMPORTANT CAUTION TO SOWING OATS OR WHEAT

Wheat sowed with the drill has every advantage over that sowed broadcast. In some instances the seed are more evenly distributed. They are planted at a uniform depth where moisture conditions are likely to be more favorable and germination much better. And wheat seeded with the drill is less likely to suffer from winter-killing.

While the drill is an important factor in securing a better stand of wheat and carrying it through the winter, it is practically a necessity in the production of fall oats. Over much of the South it is unsafe to sow fall oats broadcast. Test after test conducted by the experiment stations have shown heavy or total loss of stands of oats sowed broadcast, while those sowed with the drill in the same field on the same day stood the same winter frosts with little or no loss of stand. Even in those sections of the Lower South where drilling of oats is not absolutely necessary it will pay in the same way that it pays with wheat.

Before the grain drill came into general use, farmers in some sections of the South began to plant oats in deep furrows to escape the danger of winter-killing. This method proved very effective. But with the one-horse implements generally used, this method is too slow. It is doubtful if this deep furrow method is any more effective anywhere than seeding with the regular grain drill provided the sowing is done in proper season. It certainly is not more effective in most sections. If sowing is delayed so late that the young plants do not have time to get well established before freezing weather the deeper furrows might be of some advantage. At any rate, it may well be said that sowing by the broadcast method is not safe except in the very lower portion of the South. Those who do not have grain drills and cannot secure the use of them, had better use the open furrow method of seeding oats where there is danger of winter-killing. —Progressive Farmer.

GOOD ROADS

LIGHT-EDGED ROADS FRIABLE

Some Sections of Bates Experimental
Road Break Under Traffic of
Light Trucks.

(Prepared by the United States Department
of Agriculture.)

Some of the lighter sections of the
Bates experimental road failed under
the traffic of light trucks driven along
the edge of the surfaces on the first
day of the test. The road, which was
especially constructed for the experi-
ments now being conducted by the
state highway department of Illinois
in co-operation with the bureau of
public roads, United States Depart-
ment of Agriculture, is two miles long
and consists of numerous sections of
different types of construction.

On March 30, the day the road was
opened for the tests, 12 trucks with
bodies removed to make a load of
2,500 pounds on each rear wheel were
started on trips, which will continue
with increasing loads until the suit-
ability of each type is determined. The
trucks were driven so that the outside
wheels were on the edge of the pay-
ing, and almost immediately some of
the sections began to fail. This was
expected, as the sections were of light
design and intended to demonstrate
the utility of such construction.

The road will be subjected to a num-
ber of tests under the destructive
pounding of the trucks, and it is ex-
pected that much valuable informa-

tion will be gained for use in future
road construction. In addition to spe-
cialists assigned to investigate soil
conditions, temperature effects, and
other factors, five engineers are con-
stantly observing the effect as the
trucks continue their daily grind. The
experiments will continue until all the
sections have been thoroughly tested.

BOOM IN MATERIAL TESTING

Increase in Facilities Has Grown Rap-
idly in Past Few Years in
Different States.

The great boom in highway build-
ing which has come since the federal-
aid act of 1916 has led to an increase
in the facilities for testing highway
materials. The bureau of public roads
of the United States Department of
Agriculture keeps in touch with all
laboratories which test material for
federal-aid roads and reports that the
number has grown from a scattered
few in 1916 to at least one in every
state with two exceptions. They are
distributed as follows: State highway
department laboratories 20, university
laboratories 27, and commercial labor-
atories 21, a total of 68.

Conditions have become such that it
is practically a necessity for each
state to have means of quick testing
in order not to delay work. In pass-
ing on materials the laboratories are
governed by the idea that roads must
be constructed with materials close at
hand wherever possible and give as-
surance for the use of such material
where it is suitable.

ROAD DESIGNATED BY NUMBER

New Method Officially Adopted by
New England States to Replace
Color System.

The new method of designating
highways by numbers, officially adopt-
ed by the New England states to re-
place the color band system, is re-
markable for its simplicity. When
fully carried out it will provide a com-
plete and comprehensive plan possible
of extension throughout the country.
The numbers have already been as-
signed to most of the main trunk
routes by the highway commissioners.

PREPARING FOR FALL LITTERS

Now is the time to prepare for the proper care of the fall litters. Fall-farrowed pigs can be made profitable if properly handled, but it is doubtful if the fall litters are profitable if allowed to go through the winter and on the pastures the next summer to be fattened with the spring litters the next fall. They come at a season when there may be an abundance of cheap feed for the sows. They require but little feed to keep them growing during the winter, for the young pig makes the best use of feed. But they do not do well in mud and dirty sleeping quarters during the cold weather of winter.

If the pigs come in September and October, by the time they are weaned in November and December there may be ready for them green feed, which while saving a little feed will greatly increase the growth during the winter. Of course, there will be times during the winter, especially in the northern parts of the Cotton Belt and during severe winters, that the pigs cannot do much grazing, but during these short periods they will do well on corn, peanuts, soy beans, and tankage.

But fall litters require more attention to lots, feeding troughs, or floors, sleeping quarters, and general care. Some protection from worms and lice is also required as well as from mud, dampness, and cold. Now is the time to make ready for giving the fall litters the feed and care necessary to make them profitable. —The Progressive Farmer.

CHANGE PIG PASTURE OFTEN

Healthy Animals Become Infested With Internal Worms From Feed, Water and Soil.

The main trouble which hog raisers have in raising pigs seems to be that when a trouble, such as worms, gets started in the lots, they let it spread too rapidly over the entire herd. Healthy pigs become infested with internal worms from feed, water and soil which has become infested by other pigs having the same trouble.

The logical thing, then, is to see that pigs have a frequent change of pasture. This is not so big a problem where they are given plenty of range. There are other desirable points in having a range of pasture for the growing pigs, although they can be raised successfully, and are so raised, in close quarters if these are kept clean. Dividing up a pasture and letting the pigs run a while in each part will keep the pigs healthy and give the pasture a chance to come back when not in use.

SUPERIOR CORN FOR SILAGE

Some Growers Can Use to Good Advantage Larger Variety—Choice Should Be Limited.

"Generally the same variety of corn grown for grain production will prove satisfactory for silage also," says Prof. A. C. Army of the division of farm crops and farm management, University of Minnesota. "However, since it is not necessary that corn for good silage should mature beyond the beginning of the dent stage before cutting, some growers, particularly those in the northern part of the state, can use to advantage a somewhat larger corn for this purpose. The choice should be limited to varieties which will produce ears that reach the beginning dent stage before killing frosts."

Pigs Grow Vigorously.

On clover pasture and skimmed milk, with a little barley or oats, pigs grow rangy, strong and vigorous. They make quick and profitable gains when turned into the feed lots or corn fields.

Young Pigs on Pasture.

It is seldom if ever profitable to force young pigs to subsist on pasture alone. It is generally more profitable to feed two pounds or more of corn per 100 pounds of pigs than to feed a lighter ration.

ORDER NUMBER 53

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING RIDING BICYCLES AND OPERATING COASTER WAGONS AND ROLLER SKATES ON SIDEWALKS OF MAIN STREET IN THE CITY OF PERRYTON, AND PROHIBITING BOXING EXHIBITIONS ON THE SIDEWALKS OF MAIN STREET IN SAID CITY AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride any bicycle along, over and across the sidewalks, or any portion thereof, on Main Street in said city. And any person who shall violate this section of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars.

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to be found upon the sidewalks situated on any part of Main Street on roller skates, and any person or persons who shall violate this section of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars.

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for anyone to play upon the sidewalks or any portion thereof situated on and along the Main Street of the City of Perryton, with coaster wagons or coasters, and anyone violating this section of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars.

SECTION 4. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to engage in any boxing matches or exhibitions, with or without gloves or pads, on any part of the sidewalks situated on along Main Street in the City of Perryton, and any person or persons violating the provisions of this section shall be fined in any sum not to

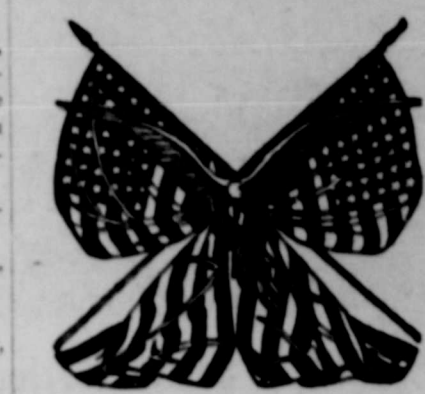
