Big Grass Fire Fought By VFD

One truck and several members of the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department went near Valera Sunday about noon to help control a grass fire on the Tex Collins and Max Jamison ranches. The fire which started about noon from a passing train, burned several hundred acres of grassland between the railroad and Highway 67. The fire burned up to the Collins home and barns, but the buildings were saved by the firemen.

Also helping with the fire were units from Ballinger, Coleman, and many neighbors and passers-by. The Santa Anna VFD also had a busy day Monday, answering four calls to grass fires in the area. Two of the fires were along the highway east of town, one along the railroad right of way west of town, and the other at Coleman. The local firemen assisted the Coleman Fire Department in extinguishing a fire at the east edge of that city, in which a large area of grass and one or two unoccupied buildings were burned.

The retention of one fully feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a whitewing season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken. This requirement also applies when doves are imported from Mexico or any foreign country.

Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Rifles are prohibited.

The map also reminds the sportsmen that no hunting is permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves, within corporate city limits or from public roads or road rights of way.

School Underway This Week

Santa Anna School students returned to classes Wednesday for the 1970-71 school term. High school students registered for classes last week and the elementary students registered Wednesday morning.

Faculty members were on duty Monday and Tuesday preparing for the new term, which includes five more days of instruction. And another change is the addition of the new public school kindergarten, which will have as many

as 25 children enrolled from the local school district.

Although Santa Anna will go from Class A to Class B this year the enrollment is about the same as last year. The new classification was made from enrollment figures during the 1967-69 years, and an increase during the past year and this year will return the school to Class A in 1972.

For the next two seasons Santa Anna will be in District 18-B for football and District 17-B for basketball. Schools in the 18-B group are Santa Anna, Eden, Rising Star, Richland Springs, and Blanket.

Schools in the 17-B basketball group are Santa Anna, Brooksmith, Mozelle, Lohn, Novice, Rochelle and Talpa-Centennial.

There are no scheduled activities on the school calendar for the next week. The first activity planned will be a football scrimmage with Wylie on Friday August 28, at the local stadium.

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In Our Opinion

THERE HAS BEEN MUCH ARGUMENT pro and con on the value of the anti-ballistic missile program in the United States. So-called experts have testified to its effectiveness and some of its lack of practical use.

I don't know who we are supposed to believe. The Senate Armed Services committee recommended that continued deployment of ABM sites, and critics say that they will be obsolete before they can be built.

Of course the object is to have retaliatory forces in the event the Soviets should decide to make a strike against us, and proponents feel that having the ABMs would be a deterrent to any enemy attack since their belief is that we would be able to intercept enemy missiles before they were able to destroy us, and also that we could return missile fire with as much devastation as the enemy could inflict.

Theoretically, it sounds good—if it works. That is the question that comes to us. I believe the United States should stay prepared, as in the last two major wars we have found out the hard way that we should.

However, the military spending has been so tremendous that some are suggesting that there should be a damper put on a lot of unnecessary spending in the services. Heretofore, they have only had to ask and they received. When we are in a conflict, of whatever proportion, most of us are in favor of seeing that our fighting men have everything they need, and rightly so. But they have been accused of willful waste and taking advantage of the situation in order to get things they really don't need. Even the late President Eisenhower, a career military man himself, warned that we should make sure this country didn't leave the decision-making to the service brass.

It is true the Soviets are building many intercontinental ballistic missiles and do offer a threat to the safety of this country if they should decide to make a missile strike. Their ordinary ICBMs could destroy an entire city in a single blow. Also, they are building a huge missile, at great expense, that is capable of delivering a nuclear warhead much larger than their regular ICBMs. It is their only weapon that could destroy one of our Minutemen silos. Their regular missiles could not penetrate the hardened concrete silos.

Supporters of the ABM fear that Russia's build-up of the missiles would give them world domination where other nations would fear not to do their bidding and that the result would be economic collapse here at home.

It seems to rest on the effectiveness of our ABM system. If it could stop a Red missile launch, then it would be good. If it can't, what good is it?

I, for one, don't want to find out if it can, or can't.

SCHOOL BELLS ARE RINGING again and the morning sees the youngsters trudging off to school with long faces, at least a lot of them, feeling persecuted at having to spend the day in the classroom, when the weather is so pretty outside.

Most of us above the generation gap, felt the same way at that age and if we will only reminisce a little, we can feel some sympathy toward them.

But the schooling is like discipline — every one needs some of it.

However, educators have come to the conclusion that it isn't every child who should go to college. Many who are more inclined to mechanical things should attend technical schools and trade schools for their advanced education.

Even now, at a time when unemployment is low, some with degrees are finding it hard to work at their learned profession. Even some engineers are working at some job other than engineering. Of course there is a shortage of doctors and dentists, but due to a lack of teaching facilities, that will remain so for some time because the demand is for more than are produced in our medical schools.

So, if your child wants to follow some profession that does not require him to have a college degree, encourage him. If he wants something that requires a college education, then he should be encouraged to go to college.

One thing for sure, if a child is sent to college when he doesn't want to go, you are wasting your money.

Don't misunderstand us, we are not knocking education. But in this day of overcrowded schools, there is no need to waste the time of both student and teacher unnecessarily.

STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — More than 2.7 million Texas students soon will be heading back to public schools again.

There will be a lot of changes in store for them, although most probably will fast adjust or barely recognize the differences.

Teachers will begin work a little earlier, and classes in some areas will start earlier.

School year will stretch out from 175 classroom days to 180.

Teachers will be on duty 10 more days of non-teaching work for in-service training and to help with school opening and closing.

For 224,500 little ones, the school experience will be brand new. They are the first graders and (30,000) five-year-olds in a new state-supported kindergarten program.

A drug education program also will be initiated, seeking an effective two-way communication between youth and adults. Utilized in the effort will be modern techniques and teaching methods which encourage students to express themselves rather than relying on lectures, preaching or moralizing. Training of local teaching terms in 1,206 school districts is slated to start in September and October.

Twenty-two school districts in major population and geographic areas will be pilot testing three key facets of the state's emerging plan for special education. These districts will serve as a proving ground for efforts in comprehensive special education, early childhood programs for exceptional children and teaching tailored for children with language and/or learning disabilities.

Even broader changes may be in store for pupils of 16 school districts sued in federal courts at Austin and Tyler for racial segregation. Districts held conferences at Texas Education Agency last week to prepare plans for conversion to no-discriminatory systems. Plans are due to go to courts by Friday (Aug. 21). Hearings may begin Monday.

EAGLE MAY BE OUT — A Railroad Commission examiner has prepared a report recommending Missouri Pacific Railway Company be permitted to discontinue its St. Louis Eagle passenger train.

Finding came after extensive hearings in several cities. Opponents of shutting down the train have 30 days to reply and restate their case.

Eagle was one of the last three passenger trains on a regular run across the state from Texarkana to Laredo and back once a day.

MP claimed a revenue loss and asked permission to cut it off its routes.

DRAFT CALL UP — September draft call for Texas is 704 — a considerable increase from 560 in August, but no man will be ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 195.

Col. Charles M. Duncan, deputy state Selective Service director, said it appears unlikely the ceiling will go higher than 195 for the rest of the year. Duncan said new manpower, mainly from formerly deferred students, helped hold the level on sequence numbers.

September quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations is 7,171, an increase from 1,490 in August. Texas' induction quota of 704 is the state's share of a national total of 12,000 men, all for the Army.

PARKS ADVANCED — Outstanding new Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall and across Ranch Road 1 from

the famed LBJ Ranch, will be officially dedicated on August 29 at 2 p. m.

Former president will attend the festivities which include a reception and luncheon in Stonewall.

Parks and Wildlife Department also announced approval of a \$355,050 federal grant for a development project in Abilene State Park.

Funds will be matched by the state on a 50-50 basis in the \$710,000 project which includes building of a headquarters, visitor's center, campsites, a group shelter, wading pool, playground equipment, roads and parking.

INSPECTION TIME AGAIN — Another auto inspection deadline is approaching for vehicles with red stickers and large numeral "9".

These cars, warned Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, must be reinspected before midnight September 30.

Texas now has a 12-month inspection system. Sticker in the lower left-hand corner of each automobile windshield contains a large numeral showing the month of inspection and expiration.

Speir said cars with red stickers and a number "10" must be reinspected before midnight on the last day of October, those with an "11" by the end of November and those with a "12" by December 31.

Fee remains at \$2, with adjustments or repairs extra if required.

LAND RECOVERY SOUGHT — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has called on Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to take whatever legal steps are necessary to recover lands of Calhoun County Navigation District not being used for navigation purposes.

Sadler noted that 47,000 acres were purchased by the district from the State in 1956 for \$1 an acre. In 1961, Sadler said, he refused to approve the district's application to buy additional lands, after officials admitted 20,000 acres of the original purchase were considered surplus acreage not needed for navigation purposes. Some of this land was sold, and has gone into private real estate development.

Commissioner said he urged the attorney general's office as far back as December 28, 1961, to take steps to recover the 20,000 acres for the permanent school fund but got no action. School Land Board, he related, has now requested that the land be recovered.

GRANTS APPROVED — Gov. Preston Smith has approved a federal grant for \$114,389 for operation of a family planning program for migrant workers in 26 Texas counties and six other states where they migrate.

Counties benefitting are Val

Verde, Kinney, Bexar, Jim Wells, Maverick, Zavala, Dimmit, Frio, LaSalle, McMullen, Duval, Webb, Live Oak, Bee, Refugio, San Patricio, Nueces, Kleberg, Zapata, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Starr, Willacy, Hidalgo and Cameron.

Smith also announced approval of a demonstration grant of \$72,344 to Las Colonias Del Valle Inc. in San Juan, Hidalgo County, for youth development program.

A state regional planning assistance grant of \$14,930 went to the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) serving 33 cities, eight special purpose governments and 11 counties.

AG OPINIONS — An off-duty policeman may not conduct a private enterprise, employing other off-duty policemen or officers, to perform guard duty or patrol without securing a license, says Attorney General Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

• An alarm agency, approved by the State Board of Insurance, may perform certain activities — send their representatives to answer the alarm, furnish a key to police officers for entrance to the premises, assist the police as they may request in their check of the premises, and reset the alarm after the police have finished their work — without its personnel having obtained a license.

• Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education has authority to hire an executive director, provided that his duties are solely administrative or ministerial, and do not call upon him to exercise discretion or judgment concerning the powers and duties required to be performed by the members of the

Commission.
SHORT SHORTS
Judge Joe Frazier Brown of San Antonio, executive director of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, has been named to the national executive committee and chairman of the committee on discretionary grants for heads of state criminal justice planning agencies.

Drug use among children committed to Texas Youth Council has increased from five to 70 per cent during last three years, according to new report of State Program on Drug Abuse.

South Texas groups (United Farm Workers, PASO, MAYO and Colonias del Valle) have filed suit against the governor and the Department of Public Safety, claiming they are being spied on by the state police.

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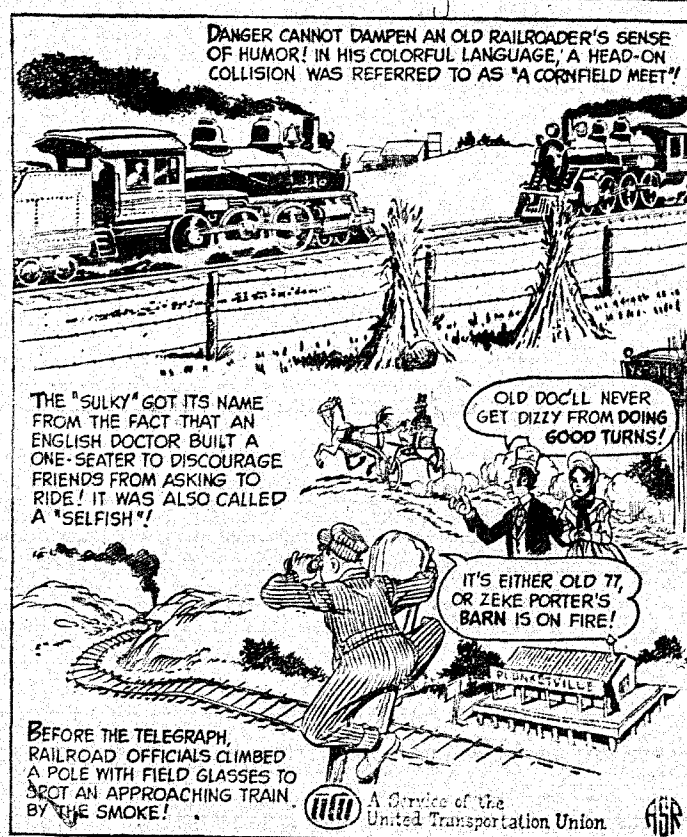
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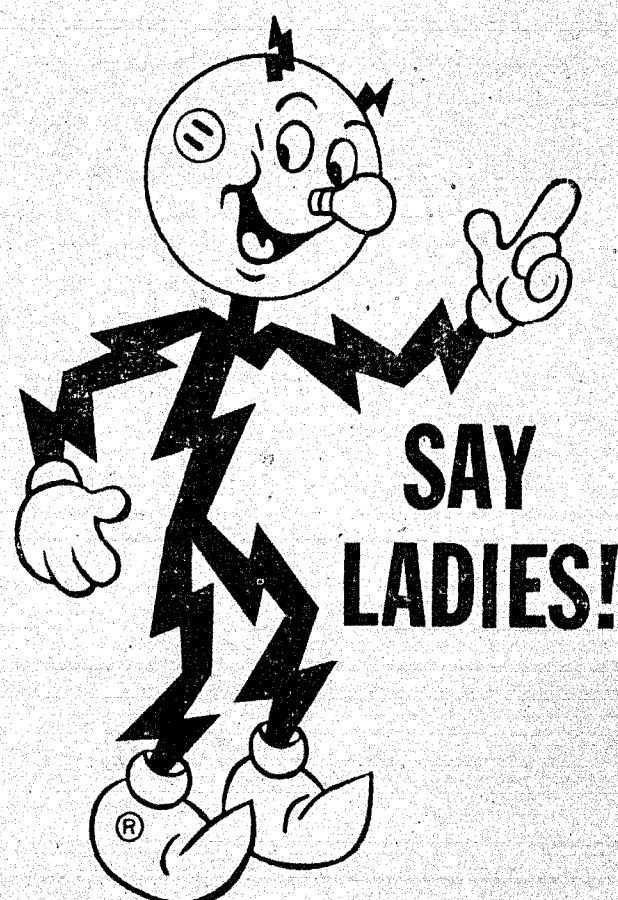
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
“(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.”
“Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:
“Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.”

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
“(a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: “The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county.”

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In Our Opinion

THERE HAS BEEN MUCH ARGUMENT pro and con on the value of the anti-ballistic missile program in the United States. So-called experts have testified to its effectiveness and some of its lack of practical use.

I don't know who we are supposed to believe. The Senate Armed Services committee recommended that continued deployment of ABM sites, and critics say that they will be obsolete before they can be built.

Of course the object is to have retaliatory forces in the event the Soviets should decide to make a strike against us, and proponents feel that having the ABMs would be a deterrent to any enemy attack since their belief is that we would be able to intercept enemy missiles before they were able to destroy us, and also that we could return missile fire with as much devastation as the enemy could inflict.

Theoretically, it sounds good—if it works. That is the question that comes to us. I believe the United States should stay prepared, as in the last two major wars we have found out the hard way that we should.

However, the military spending has been so tremendous that some are suggesting that there should be a damper put on a lot of unnecessary spending in the services. Heretofore, they have only had to ask and they received. When we are in a conflict, of whatever proportion, most of us are in favor of seeing that our fighting men have everything they need, and rightly so. But they have been accused of willful waste and taking advantage of the situation in order to get things they really don't need. Even the late President Eisenhower, a career military man himself, warned that we should make sure this country didn't leave the decision-making to the service brass.

It is true the Soviets are building many intercontinental ballistic missiles and do offer a threat to the safety of this country if they should decide to make a missile strike. Their ordinary ICBMs could destroy an entire city in a single blow. Also, they are building a huge missile, at great expense, that is capable of delivering a nuclear warhead much larger than their regular ICBMs. It is their only weapon that could destroy one of our Minutemen silos. Their regular missiles could not penetrate the hardened concrete silos.

Supporters of the ABM fear that Russia's build-up of the missiles would give them world domination where other nations would fear not to do their bidding and that the result would be economic collapse here at home.

It seems to rest on the effectiveness of our ABM system. If it could stop a Red missile launch, then it would be good. If it can't, what good is it?

I, for one, don't want to find out if it can or can't.

SCHOOL BELLS ARE RINGING again and the morning sees the youngsters trudging off to school with long faces, at least a lot of them, feeling persecuted at having to spend the day in the classroom, when the weather is so pretty outside.

Most of us above the generation gap, felt the same way at that age and if we will only reminisce a little, we can feel some sympathy toward them.

But the schooling is like discipline — every one needs some of it.

However, educators have come to the conclusion that it isn't every child who should go to college. Many who are more inclined to mechanical things should attend technical schools and trade schools for their advanced education.

Even now, at a time when unemployment is low, some with degrees are finding it hard to work at their learned profession. Even some engineers are working at some job other than engineering. Of course there is a shortage of doctors and dentists, but due to a lack of teaching facilities, that will remain so for some time because the demand is for more than are produced in our medical schools.

So, if your child wants to follow some profession that does not require him to have a college degree, encourage him. If he wants something that requires a college education, then he should be encouraged to go to college.

One thing for sure, if a child is sent to college when he doesn't want to go, you are wasting your money.

Don't misunderstand us, we are not knocking education. But in this day of overcrowded schools, there is no need to waste the time of both student and teacher unnecessarily.

STATE Capital NEWS

Austin — More than 2.7 million Texas students soon will be heading back to public schools again.

There will be a lot of changes in store for them, although most probably will fast adjust or barely recognize the differences.

Teachers will begin work a little earlier, and classes in some areas will start earlier.

School year will stretch out from 175 classroom days to 180.

Teachers will be on duty 10 more days of non-teaching work for in-service training and to help with school opening and closing.

For 224,500 little ones, the school experience will be brand new. They are the first graders and (30,000) five-year-olds in a new state-supported kindergarten program.

A drug education program also will be initiated, seeking an effective two-way communication between youth and adults. Utilized in the effort will be modern techniques and teaching methods which encourage students to express themselves rather than relying on lectures, preaching or moralizing. Training of local teaching terms in 1,206 school districts is slated to start in September and October.

Twenty-two school districts in major population and geographic areas will be pilot testing three key facets of the state's emerging plan for special education. These districts will serve as a proving ground for efforts in comprehensive special education, early childhood programs for exceptional children and teaching tailored for children with language and/or learning disabilities.

Even broader changes may be in store for pupils of 16 school districts sued in federal courts at Austin and Tyler for racial segregation. Districts held conferences at Texas Education Agency last week to prepare plans for conversion to no-discriminatory systems. Plans are due to go to courts by Friday (Aug. 21). Hearings may begin Monday.

EAGLE MAY BE OUT — A Railroad Commission examiner has prepared a report recommending Missouri Pacific Railway Company be permitted to discontinue its St. Louis Eagle passenger train.

Finding came after extensive hearings in several cities. Opponents of shutting down the train have 30 days to reply and restate their case.

Eagle was one of the last three passenger trains on a regular run across the state from Texarkana to Laredo and back once a day.

MP claimed a revenue loss and asked permission to cut it off its routes.

DRAFT CALL UP — September draft call for Texas is 704 — a considerable increase from 560 in August, but no man will be ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 195.

Col. Charles M. Duncan, deputy state Selective Service director, said it appears unlikely the ceiling will go higher than 195 for the rest of the year. Duncan said new manpower, mainly from formerly deferred students, helped hold the level on sequence numbers.

September quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations is 7,171, an increase from 1,490 in August. Texas' induction quota of 704 is the state's share of a national call of 12,000 men, all for the Army.

PARKS ADVANCED — Outstanding new Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall and across Ranch Road 1 from

the famed LBJ Ranch, will be officially dedicated on August 29 at 2 p.m.

Former president will attend the festivities which include a reception and luncheon in Stonewall.

Parks and Wildlife Department also announced approval of a \$355,050 federal grant for a development project in Abilene State Park.

Funds will be matched by the state on a 50-50 basis in the \$710,000 project which includes building of a headquarters, visitors' center, campsite, a group shelter, wading pool, playground equipment, roads, and parking.

INSPECTION TIME AGAIN — Another auto inspection deadline is approaching for vehicles with red stickers and large numeral "9".

These cars, warned Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, must be reinspected before midnight September 30.

Texas now has a 12-month inspection system. Sticker in the lower left-hand corner of each automobile windshield contains a large numeral showing the month of inspection and expiration.

Speir said cars with red stickers and a number "10" must be reinspected before midnight on the last day of October; those with an "11" by the end of November and those with a "12" by December 31.

Fee remains at \$2, with adjustments or repairs extra if required.

LAND RECOVERY SOUGHT — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has called on Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to take whatever legal steps are necessary to recover lands of Calhoun County Navigation District not being used for navigation purposes.

Sadler noted that 47,000 acres were purchased by the district from the State in 1956 for \$1 an acre. In 1961, Sadler said, he refused to approve the district's application to buy additional lands, after officials admitted 20,000 acres of the original purchase were considered surplus acreage not needed for navigation purposes. Some of this land was sold, and has gone into private real estate development.

Commissioner said he urged the attorney general's office as far back as December 28, 1961, to take steps to recover the 20,000 acres for the permanent school fund but got no action. School Land Board, he related, has now requested that the land be recovered.

GRANTS APPROVED — Gov. Preston Smith has approved a federal grant for \$114,389 for operation of a family planning program for migrant workers in 26 Texas counties and six other states where they migrate.

Counties benefitting are Val

Verde, Kinney, Bexar, Jim Wells, Maverick, Zavala, Dimmit, Frio, LaSalle, McMullen, Duval, Webb, Live Oak, Bee, Refugio, San Patricio, Nueces, Kleberg, Zapata, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Starr, Willacy, Hidalgo and Cameron.

Smith also announced approval of a demonstration grant of \$72,344 to Las Colonias Del Valle Inc. in San Juan, Hidalgo County, for youth development program.

A state regional planning assistance grant of \$14,930 went to the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) serving 33 cities, eight special purpose governments and 11 counties.

AG OPINIONS — An off-duty policeman may not conduct a private enterprise, employing other off-duty policemen or officers, to perform guard duty or patrol without securing a license, says Attorney General Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

• An alarm agency, approved by the State Board of Insurance, may perform certain activities — send their representatives to answer the alarm, furnish a key to police officers for entrance to the premises, assist the police as they may request in their check of the premises, and reset the alarm after the police have finished their work — without its personnel having obtained a license.

• Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education has authority to hire an executive director, provided that his duties are solely administrative or ministerial, and do not call upon him to exercise discretion or judgment concerning the powers and duties required to be performed by the members of the

Commission.

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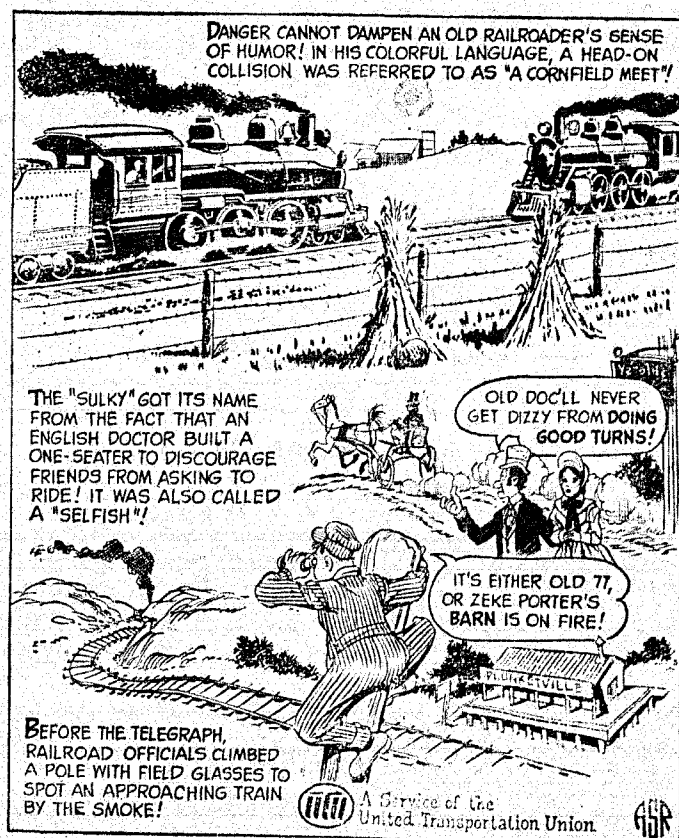
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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

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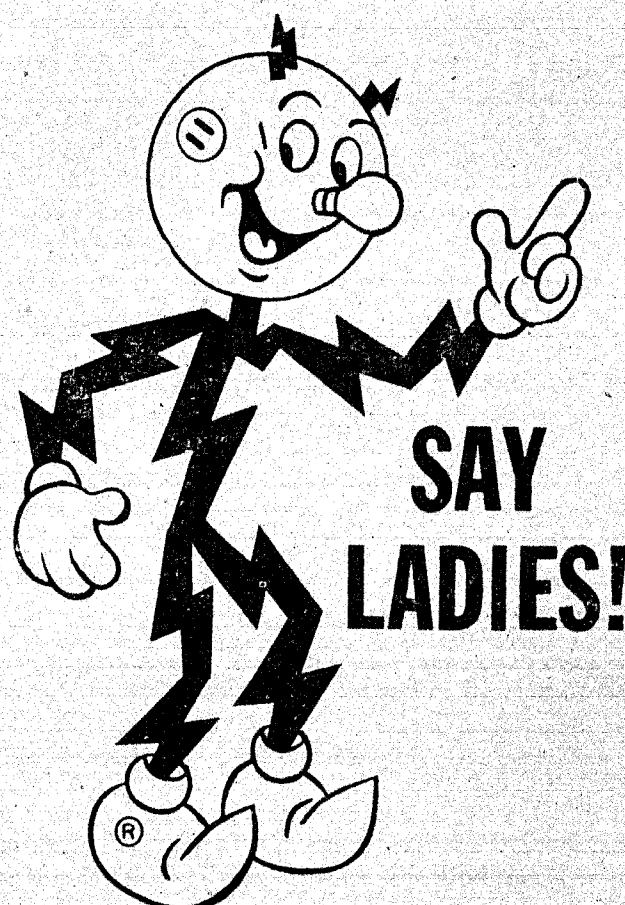
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under

such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

Second Bass Son to Viet Nam

Santa Anna—In about a week Mr. and Mrs. Richard D. Bass of Santa Anna will have two air force sons on duty in Vietnam.

The two, T-Sgt. Dean Bass and M-Sgt. James D. Bass, are following in their dad's footsteps as military professionals who go where the action is. Richard Bass served in the army all during World War II, retiring in 1949 after suffering disabling wounds in the war.

Sgt. Dean Bass has been assigned to Vietnam duty on Aug. 17. Sgt. James D. Bass is already at Saigon where he recently received the Vietnam Service Medal and the Bronze Star. Richard Bass received his disabling wound while a member of the 36th Division participating in that unit's famed 1943 landing on Anzio beachhead.

The professionals' wife and mother, Mrs. Rose Bass, who is deputy tax assessor of Coleman County and a cosmetics demonstrator, has also been busy taking her husband to various hospitals and assisting her only two sons with their travels from one assignment to the next.

Richard Bass became a member of the National Guard in 1925. He and Rose were married in 1931. Later, he became a first sergeant in Co. D, 143 Infantry, at Temple. It was a part of the 36th Division which was called into service Nov. 25, 1940, shortly before the division reported at Camp Bowie in Brownwood.

In and out of hospitals since his wounds, he remained in the service until 1949.

James (Bennie) the eldest son, graduated from Brackenridge High School at San Antonio in 1949 where he was a member of the ROTC. He enlisted in the 36th Division National Guard that year. On active duty with Quartermas-

ter Food Service at Fort Sam Houston, he graduated second in his class and later took the mess steward's course.

In December 1949, he enlisted in the air force and trained at Lackland AFB. Shipped to the Philippines in 1950, he served 14 months in Korea during the war.

But after passing the tests for the air force officers training school and air cadet program in 1952 he was the victim of a hit and run auto accident which kept him hospitalized at Lackland for seven months. Due to limited motion in his left arm, he was disqualified from OCS. But he was assigned as first cook in the field training mess at Lackland and was discharged as a staff sergeant in 1953.

However, James enlisted at Goodfellow AFB where he rose in the food program prior to being shipped to Japan, then Johnson AFB, Chennault AFB, two years in Germany and back to Lackland.

His next assignment was Naples, Italy, then after three years, he was assigned to Randolph AFB and Laredo AFB before leaving for Vietnam. He and his wife have two daughters.

Dean graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1956, married and entered Texas Tech for the fall semester. But he joined the air force in January 1957. After four years training recruits at Lackland, he was transferred to Gray AFB at Killeen.

He spent three years in Germany prior to being stationed at Dyess AFB at Abilene and receiving his discharge in 1965. He took a civilian job but re-enlisted in the air force that same year.

He was stationed at Tinker AFB when he received his Vietnam duty orders. He and his wife, the former Faye Parks, have four sons.

Their father was awaiting

shipment at Cape Cod, Mass. April 1, 1943. "The temperature was 25 degrees below zero there," he said. "But when we landed at Oran it was 120 degrees. After six months in Africa we received news we were to make a spearhead landing near Salerno and Paestum."

The landing was rough, he said. "Gen. Mark W. Clark, commander of the Fifth Army in Europe, said 'we would make the landing if we had to walk on the dead to do it—and we had to walk on the dead.' The landing was made on Sept. 1, 1943.

After three days and nights around Paestum, we were sent to Malori near Naples," Bass said. "There we were to meet the second ranger battalion and make another landing. After 13 more days and nights of constant fire from the Germans, I was hit almost directly by an 88mm shell. I was conscious about three more hours, but five days later I came to at Bizerte, North Africa."

But he returned to the scene.

"In June 1967 when one son was in Germany and the other in Italy, my wife and I went to Europe," he said. "The visit at Malori meant more to me than anything else. I visited the church where I was taken after being wounded in 1943 and to the mountain spot where I got the shell."

He said he also visited the graves of the men he had served with and to the beach where they landed. "We went to the tobacco factory where we had first set up—where the first ones killed had been buried. But their bodies were later returned to the states."

Their appearance in Naples was taped by Art Linkletter during their visit at the Flamingo Club and later nationally telecast in this country.

COMMON SENSE BOATING RULES

Although recreational boating is governed by a minimum of written rules and regulations, every boatman should be thoroughly familiar with the unwritten or common sense rules of the sport. Here are a few which, according to the Evansville News Service, are especially important.

Never overload a boat. Especially in smaller craft, the seating space provided is not necessarily an indication of the number of passengers the boat will safely carry.

Be sure your boat is equipped with legally required items as well as others that may prove helpful in an emergency. Life preservers, of course, are a "must." But don't forget things like extra line, anchor, paddle or oars, basic spare parts and tools and a first aid kit.

Take it easy when boating on unfamiliar waterways. Watch for shoals, submerged obstructions and signs. Try to get information in advance from someone who is familiar with the area.

Distribute the load evenly. Passengers should be seated so that the boat rides level. Proper placement of equipment will also help.

When boarding a small boat, step toward the center and not on the gunwale. If equipment is to be taken aboard, it should be placed on the pier where it can be easily reached after you have boarded. Don't try to board with your arms full.

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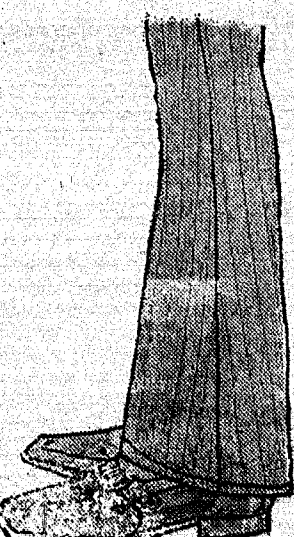
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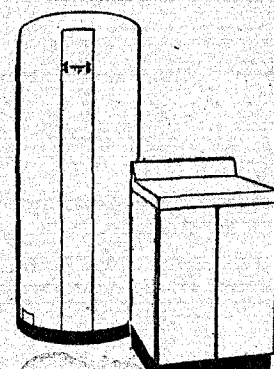

One expression I often have heard and read is "This is the hippie generation." I do not agree with this for several reasons, not the least of which is the fact that these people are only a small part of this generation—less than 2 per cent.

I once read an article by Billy Graham which I will quote. This was one of those question letters to Mr. Graham which he answers in the newspapers.

The letter read: "I am a so-called 'hippie.' Which is to say that I believe in the freedom of the individual to be himself. I don't see what everyone is so shook up about regarding this philosophy. I have even heard you make remarks about us hippies. Can't you put in a good word for freedom of the individual to be himself?" signed G. F.

Now I will quote Mr. Graham's answer: "Christ above all men taught freedom. He said, 'You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.' He, Himself, was a non-conformist, and believed in people being themselves, and not artificial dupes. None of us is free to live under unsanitary conditions which may threaten the well-being of our neighbors. None of us is free to flaunt the law of the land, to set shabby moral examples before our children, and to break the moral laws of God without suffering the consequences."

I believe Mr. Graham answered this hippie very well and further comment by me is not needed.

Along the same theme I read another article from Shorewood, Wis.: "To emphasize the theme of change in everything now, a Lutheran minister in the middle of his service switched from his robes to what he called his psychedelic outfit. The Rev. Warren K. Sigwalt appeared before his congregation in a multicolored jacket, hip hugger trousers with a stylized floral pattern and red shoes. He added that times and fashions change so rapidly that his outfit was a bit old-fashioned already. But, he declared, people need not be afraid of change. "For in the midst of all the change," he said, "there is something that doesn't change in our God."

If certain foods are allowed to stand in a warm, dark place, they undergo chemical changes. Very often, gas is given off. Such food is said to ferment; the process is called fermentation. The word "ferment" comes from a Latin word meaning "to boil." When fruit juices ferment, the gas bubbles up slowly and the liquid looks as though it were boiling.

What is a foreign service?

Since the days of ancient Egypt, there have been people who represent the government of their own country in a foreign country. Today we say that these people are members of the foreign service or diplomatic corps of their own country. The rules of modern foreign services were established at the Congress of Vienna in 1815. Most countries of the world have a foreign service modeled on these rules.

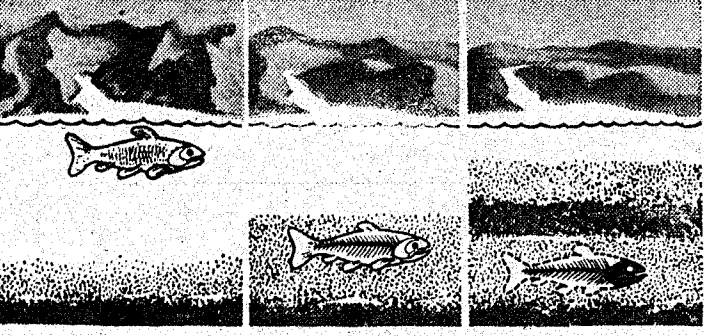
A foreign service is made

up of two branches—the diplomatic service and the consular service. In a foreign country the headquarters of the diplomatic service is called an embassy. An embassy officer is called a diplomat. The headquarters of a consular service in a foreign country is called a consulate. People assigned to the consular service are called consular officers.

Do you know how fossils are formed?

A fossil may be formed when a plant or an animal, such as a fish, dies. When it falls to the floor of a lake, the fish may be covered with a layer of sand or silt. Other layers build up over a period of many years. Gradually, the layers of sand turn to rock. The soft parts of the fish decay. Minerals replace the bone cavities of the fish, making a fossil in the rock.

Eventually, folding, cracking, and erosion cause changes in the surface of the earth. Such changes may uncover a fossil that has been buried for many years.

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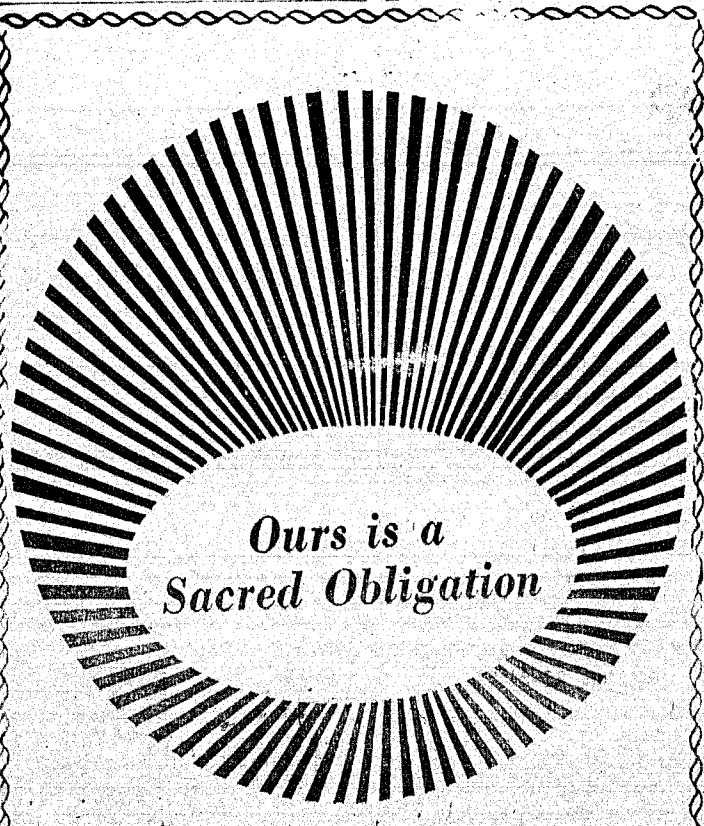
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BACK TO SCHOOL TIPS FROM TSTA

It's back to school time again for more than 2.7 million students in the Texas public schools.

Among numerous changes in Texas schools this year, the teachers will begin work a bit earlier, and students in some localities will begin classes earlier. The school year will have 180 classroom days instead of 175. Teachers will be on duty for 10 more days of non-teaching work during the year to help with school opening and closing, and to receive in-service instruction that will help them to teach better.

Despite these changes, the experience of heading off to school for the first time won't be much different for this year's 5 and 6 year olds than it was for their parents. It's a giant step for little people.

To help parents make it easier on their youngsters, the Texas State Teachers Association offers some basic tips in a leaflet titled "To Help the Child and Parents, Too!" Here are some of the pointers:

Registration Procedure

Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 may be admitted for the 1970-71 school year.

The child's birth certificate must be presented at time of enrollment. Some schools, in the interest of good health, require that the child be vaccinated against mumps and immunized against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus.

Other information which

the school will need includes name, occupation, place of work, and phone number, of the father; and the family's home address and phone number.

How Parents Can Help

When parents meet their child's principal and teacher for the first time, they may offer these suggestions:

- * Teach your child the safest way home.
- * Teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the way.
- * Remind him not to go with strangers.
- * Give your child definite duties at home and see that he performs them.
- * Help him to establish good listening habits.
- * See that your child gets enough sleep.
- * Provide your child with a good breakfast each morning.
- * See that he is happy before he leaves for school.
- * Teach your child that policemen are his friends and that he should go to them when he needs help.
- * Teach him to dress himself properly.
- * Teach him to have confidence in his teacher.
- * Teach your child to respect the property rights of others.
- * Allow your child to do as much for himself as he is able to do.
- * Show an interest in what he has to tell you about his work and play at school.
- * Help him see likenesses and differences in objects and forms.

* Encourage him to have playmates.

* Help him learn habits of promptness, obedience, and respect for authority.

* Read to your child.

* Take him to places of interest such as the zoo, park, and library.

* Label his personal belongings with his name and address.

* Praise your child frequently; help him to feel successful.

Parents are invited and urged to visit school and to take an active part in the school activities.

The TSTA leaflet points out that the parents' attitude toward the school and the teacher will be observed—and often copied—by the child. Parents therefore should avoid criticizing school or the teacher in the child's presence. Instead, they should do what they can to solve such school related problems as conflict with another child, a difficult activity, or a school rule that the child does not understand.

School Wants To Know
The school principal will want to know—in advance if possible—when a family moves to a new address.

A child with a cold, fever, sick stomach or other severe ailment is better off at home than at school; however, parents should encourage and require good school attendance by their children. A written excuse from the parent may be needed when the child returns from an absence.

When child-school problems of any kind arise, the parent should feel free to discuss them with the child's teacher.

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SDA DISASTER RELIEF SERVICE SERVES VICTIMS OVER STATE

It all began in 1954 with the Waco tornado. The Seventh-day Adventist church saw the need for a type of program of service that would be ready and available to those in need at a time of disaster. Realizing that clothing was so badly needed at such a time, the church went to work gathering, cleaning, mending, sizing and packaging. The test of the idea came when a tornado struck Dallas a little later in 1954. Just hours after the funnel had cut through the city, this clothing was taken out of storage, placed in a truck and rushed to Dallas.

The heartfelt thanks from the many people who were aided in this way, convinced the church that there was a real need that dedicated Christians could fill.

Since that time the program has grown so that today the clothing is stockpiled in a specially designed 40-

foot truck, ready to roll at a moment's notice. When such a call is made a crew heads the truck for its destination and upon arriving receives their assignment from the Red Cross. Then the truck is parked at the designated location. The doors are opened and the business of helping people begins. The truck is equipped with a generator which supplies power for the lights and the ham radio set that helps communicate with the world. 500 gallons of drinking water is also ready as well as first aid supplies.

If you are ever in a disaster area and need clothing, communication, water, or first aid, look for the big white truck that says, "Seventh-day Adventist Disaster Relief Service." It is there to help you.

The local church welfare department, contributes much to keep this van or truck in readiness at all times. After a disaster, and the supply has been depleted, a call is sent to our local church, as well as other churches in Texas, telling us just what is needed and what should be sent from this one body. Three boxes of clothing were sent in just before Celia struck.

Drownings Take 275 In Texas

A number of recent drownings indicate an alarming fact, according to George Cook, director of Water Safety Service for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The fact is that a great many people go to the water for outdoor recreation and yet can't swim 20 feet to save their lives.

"Texas had 516 drownings in 1969, and we have had 275 since January this year," said Cook. "In many cases just a few swimming strokes could have gotten the victim out of trouble."

Cook said a recurring, almost inexplicable, situation has to do with waders who step in deep holes and drown. In cases such as these, safety is only a step away, yet these waders can't make it.

"Three-quarters of this planet is covered by water. Texas is second to Alaska in the amount of inland water. It would seem that if we are to live on this planet in Texas, learning to swim would be in order," said Cook.

Cook said that for the most part drowning victims are solely responsible for their fate due to their own carelessness, but there are exceptions.

The exceptions are children who go unattended around bodies of water. "Over and over again we get reports of tragic instances in which a small child topples into a swimming pool, a lake or a drainage ditch and whose absence is noted only too late," said Mr. Cook. "Children must rely on their parents for proper supervision and protection, and if this supervision is relaxed, children pay with their lives."

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Love Thy Neighbor

In half a dozen places, the Bible tells us to "love thy neighbor." But it may be difficult to apply this general rule to the specific people who live next door. To what extent does the law insist on a "good neighbor policy?"

Under traditional legal rules, a home owner owed very little regard for his neighbor's sensibilities. He could do almost anything he pleased, so long as he did not actually intrude upon his neighbor's property.

In one early case, a home owner dug such a deep excavation near the boundary line that his neighbor's home had to be abandoned as unsafe. Yet, even though he had acted with malice aforethought, a court held him not liable for ruining the neighbor's house.

And in another case, a court refused to condemn an enormous "spite fence," care-

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fully designed to shut out the light and air from the people next door. The judge said "It would be intolerable to allow a man's neighbors to question his motives."

But in recent years, as people began living closer together, the attitude of the law has changed. Today the right to excavate is limited by considerations of safety and fair play. Almost everywhere, the spite fence is forbidden. As one court put it:

"No one ought to have the legal right to make a malicious use of his property for no benefit to himself, but merely to injure his fellow man."

Of course, moderate annoyances—even if unneighborly—are still legal. A home owner may still be reasonably noisy, even if the neighbors like it quiet. He may still paint his house a color that the neighbors consider frightful.

In one case, a man turned a deaf ear to a neighbor complaint about his four big maple trees. It seems the trees kept the neighbor's house in almost constant shade.

But after a court hearing, the judge ruled that the neighbor had no legal grounds for complaint. This was the kind of "wrong," said the judge, for which the law provides no remedy.
