FEDERAL LAND BANK HOLDS MEETING OF LOCAL DIRECTORS

Better times on Texas farms and ranches are reflected in the "most consistent farm mortgage debt retirement in years," said Mr. Herman Schulz upon returning from a conference of leaders chosen by boards of directors of 14 national farm loan associations in this territory. The meeting was held in Lubbock on November 5th and 6th. The national farm loan association representatives discussed conditions and the plans for 1941-42 with officers of the Federal Land Bank of Houston.

Officials from the Bank attending this meeting were the president, Sterling C. Evans, and vice president, V. N. Johnson both of Houston, Texas.

Records of the Federal Land Bank reveal foreclosure sales and acquisitions of farms, for the year ending September 30th, were the smallest since 1931—twenty percent below the previous year. Delinquencies are the lowest in several years.

During the past year in Texas, land bank and land bank commissioner loans were made for a total of fourteen million dollars, which is the largest dollar volume since 1935. Total land bank loans in the amount of \$17,598,680.00 and land bank commissioner loans in the amount of \$4,382,773.00, were outstanding as of September 30th, 1941, in the associations represented at the meeting.

Mr. Schulz was elected as a delegate to attend a semi-annual meeting later this winter, in Houston, Texas.

REDELL SELLS FIRST BALE IN ONE-VARIETY PROGRAM
E. K. Reddell, Hale county farmer, sold the first cotton through the One-Variety Cotton Improvement and Marketing Program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. C. B. Martin, county agent, announced today.

Mr. Reddell sold two bales to Anderson, Clayton & Company, approved shippers under the program, for \$162.57 or an average of \$8.76 per bale above the loan. This program price was \$1.50 above the spot market price.

This cotton was ginned at the Plainview Cooperative Gin where it was sampled for free classification. The samples were sent to the Agricultural Marketing Service office in Lubbock where the cotton was classed by impartial government classifiers. The two bales Mr. Reddell sold were classed strict middling, spotted, 31-32; and strict low middling, white, 15-16 inches staple length.

Any farmer in Hale county producing Paymaster-Jennings cotton is eligible to sell his cotton through the program and receive the benefits similar to those received by Mr. Reddell. A producer who wishes to sell his cotton through the program should tell his ginner that he is producing the approved variety and wants to sell to one of the approved shippers.

About six weeks ago the directors of the South Plains One-Variety association selected Anderson, Clayton, & Co. and M. Hohenberg and Co. as the approved shippers for the area. Mr. R. E. (Bob) Wilson, Petersburg, is president of the group. J. J. Caudle Gin in Abernathy is cooperating in the One-Variety program, announcements said.

War Hits Housewives

Dallas Texas, Nov. 12—Blame it on the war in Europe: Texas housewives may soon start carrying shopping bags again, to hold the articles which they buy in stores. Wrapping paper is getting scarce.

Retail merchants, cooperating with the government in a campaign to prevent the waste of paper so that supplies will be available for the army and navy and defense industries, today began a campaign to eliminate all unnecessary use of paper bags and wrapping paper. Today was chosen to start the campaign because it is "War Against Waste Day," established in President Roosevelt's proclamation of Civilian Defense Week.

The reason for the campaign is simple. The United States is producing only twenty-one million tons of paper a year, but it is using twenty-six million. That situation cannot go on forever. The government and the merchants want to bring the figures together while there is still time.

The war is directly responsible for this shortage. Huge quantities of paper, especially the kind used for wrapping and paper sacks, are needed in defense industries. In addition, much of the wood pulp which this country uses for making its paper comes in normal times from Finland and Norway, and these supplies, of course have stopped.

To solve the problem presented by this paper shortage, organizations representing retail stores of all types have joined a conservation movement and have asked the cooperation of consumers. A resolution approved by eleven retail organizations explained:

"Urgent advances from governmental departments indicate that at the present time the consumption of paper in the United States is exceeding the sources of supply. In the interest of national defense it becomes necessary to immediately curtail all waste and to reduce some of the ordinary civilian uses of paper."

"Therefore, the retail merchants of Texas have pledged themselves to reduce, as far as possible, their use of paper, and to advise their customers, the consumers of the state, that this program will be carried out at once."

"Consumers will be able to cooperate greatly by reducing as far as possible the demand for paper wrappings, paper bags, and paper in any form not necessary to the processes of distribution or to the comfort or convenience of the household."

It was moved by Alderman Hix and seconded by Alderman Hurst that there be submitted to the qualified voters of the said City, who are property taxpayers therein, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, propositions for the issuance of the bonds of said City, in the following amounts and for the following purposes, to-wit:

\$25,000.00 revenue bonds, for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of constructing a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City; and,

\$20,000.00 tax bonds, for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of constructing a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City.

The above motion carried by the following vote: Alderman Hix, Richter, Schulz, Reid, and none voting "AYE"; and none voting "NO".

And thereupon, Alderman Hix introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Hurst.

The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote: Alderman Hix, Hurst, Schulz, Reid and Richter voting "AYE"; and none voting "NO".

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of

the City of Abernathy, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes herein-after mentioned; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

I. That an election be held on the 21st day of November, 1941, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue the revenue bonds of said City, in the principal sum of TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS, (\$25,000.00), maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of constructing a Sanitary Sewer System, in and for said City, as authorized by the General Laws of the State of Texas, said bonds to be special obligations of the City of Abernathy, payable as to both principal and interest solely from the revenues of the City's Sanitary Sewer System, and shall the City Council be authorized to encumber the City's Sanitary Sewer System, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the purpose of securing the payment of principal and interest on said bonds, said encumbrance on said revenues to be an exclusive first lien on and pledge of said revenues, after the deduction of the reasonable expenses of operating and maintaining said Sanitary Sewer System, as said expenses are defined by statute?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2
"SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$20,000.00) tax bonds of said City, maturing serially over a period of years not to exceed thirty (30) years from the date thereof, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, for the purpose of financing a portion of the cost of constructing a Sanitary Sewer System, in and for said City; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

II. In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said City, voting at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

III. That said election shall be held at Chapman's Motor Co. Building, in the CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: R. M.
