Colorado City will become one of the busiest communities in the state this weekend as not one or two but three major events will take place. The three activities are expected to draw thousands into the streets and parks beginning on Friday.

"It's going to be a busy weekend for a lot of people," said Colorado City Main Street program manager Cecilia Scott. "There is going to be a lot going on."

One of the activities taking place this weekend will be the Main Street-backed Junktique Jamboree. The three-day extravaganza will begin Friday evening and run through Sunday, Oct. 8.

Fiery I-20 crash claims life of Arizona man near Lake C-City

The death toll on Mitchell County roads crept a bit higher Sunday morning when an Arizona truck driver was killed in a one-vehicle accident approximately 5 miles west of Colorado City.

According to Texas Department of Public Safety records, James Lowell Binney, 31, of Yuma, Ariz., was eastbound on Interstate 20 about 8 a.m. when the tractor-trailer rig he was driving veered onto the shoulder of the road and

struck a guard rail on the right side. As Binney tried to regain control of the 2006 Peterbilt, the truck swerved across the eastbound lanes and struck a concrete guardrail on a bridge at Lake Colorado City. After striking -- and taking out -- the concrete barrier, the 18-wheeler burst into flames and went over the guardrail into the creek with the cab submerged in water.

Officials with the Department of Public Safety, Mitchell County Sheriff's Department, the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Depart-

ment, the Mitchell County EMS and offenders from TDCJ responded to the accident.

Binney, the father of three, was pronounced dead at the scene. He was taken to Kiker-Scale Funeral Home.

With Binney's death, the death toll in Mitchell County in 2006 now stands at 16 with two months remaining in the year. At least three of the accidents with fatalities this year have involved 18-wheelers.

City OKs deal to develop RV park

The Colorado City City Council took a page from Kevin Costner's movie "Field of Dreams" on Monday evening. They truly hope if developers build Madera Springs and other transient and permanent accommodations, everyone will come.

Council members, after meeting privately with developers and Mitchell County economic leaders for more than an hour, tentatively agreed to a deal that would pave the way for the extension of water and sewer services to the east. Under the pending pact, the city approved a plan to extend its current water and sewer infrastructure east to Highway 208 with the understanding that should the growth planned in the area fail to materialize, developers would assume the cost of putting in a new lift station.

"It's a win-win situation for the city and entire community," said councilman Robert McNeal. "We're excited about it because this is something that could benefit the entire community."

McNeal said the city would -- pending an agreement with developers -- install a new lift station to improve

First Baptist Church to celebrate 125th anniversary this weekend

First Baptist Church Rev. Jerry Shields knows a little about birthdays and blowing out candles.

That is why he is sending out an invitation for everyone in Colorado City to come to the First Baptist Church this weekend. He knows it will take a lot of people to blow out 125 candles on a birthday cake.

The First Baptist Church of Colorado City will celebrate its 125th anniversary on Oct. 7-8. Activities will begin on Saturday, at 1:30 p.m. with registration, tours of the church, which is located at 3rd Street and Chestnut. At 5:30 p.m., a hamburger supper will be served followed by singing and visiting.

Registration will be at 9 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 8, followed by a worship celebration at 10 a.m. The morning service will include special recognitions, music and preaching. A catered barbecue luncheon will follow in the fellowship hall.

First Baptist Church has deep roots in the community. In the latter part of 1881, Rev. George Washington Baines arrived in

what was then known as Colorado, Texas (The names was officially changed to Colorado City later) to establish a Baptist mission. Rev. Baines was a former president of Baylor College and at one time was pastor to General and Mrs. Sam Houston. He was the great-grandfather of Lyndon Baines Johnson, 36th President of the United States.

The church was originally organized in 1882, after U.S. Senator and former governor of Georgia Joseph E. Brown donated a building site. Brown was instrumental in the formation of the community in the late 1880s.

The original small box structure was a meeting place for all

denominations until it was destroyed by a tornado in May 1884. It was replaced by a similar frame building.

In 1895, a four-room structure was erected. Classrooms and a basement were later added. At one time, the church was turned into a temporary emergency hospital for victims of a tornado which struck on May 14, 1923. The tornado killed 27 and injured 193. For several weeks church services were held in the Union Tabernacle.

The present church was built in 1928. An annex was added in 1961 and an activities building was constructed in 1991.

Attorney: City has police power over Lake Colorado City

Just who controls Lake Colorado City? The city of Colorado City does. At least that is the opinion of Mitchell County Attorney Tom Rees.

Rees informed members of the Lake Colorado City Safety and Beautification Committee the city, not the county or even TXU Corp., was the entity the group needed to approach in its efforts to clean the lake.

"If you're asking me if the county can help you do something, I'm telling you no," Rees said. The city has police powers on the lake. Those powers are what Texas Electric granted to them.

Rees said the city was given police power over the lake when it signed a contract with Texas Electric to use the lake as a source of water. That lease, which was originally signed in March 1949, gave control of the lake to the municipality, which later built and maintained a park at the man-made lake.

The city signed a lease with TXU in 1994 saying it would use Lake Colorado City as an alternative water source. Under that agreement, the city again gained police power for a 25-year period, ending in 2011 -- a date that was extended to 2016.

Prior to Texas Electric purchas-

ing the land under the lake, Colorado City had water well sites in the region, Rees said.

"They probably don't want to hear from you because they have a lot going, but that is where you are right now," Rees said.

Armed with the information, LCCS&BC members said they would present a petition to the city leaders to create a permitting system for docks and other structures to improve the water and overall safety of the lake.

"We want to keep it safe," said committee member Mike Gamble. "That is the purpose of this."

The Lake Colorado City Safety and Beautification Committee is scheduled to meet again on Oct. 16 at the Just Stop convenience store. The meeting will begin at 6 p.m.

vide vital services locally as well as the organization's effort to help needy individuals all over the world with vision needs.

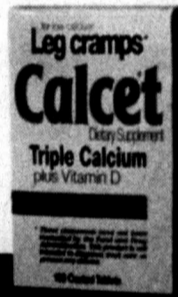

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Shooting pheasants in Hungary

Bob Jamison of Dayton is an outdoorsman deluxe. He shot his first squirrel when he was seven years old and has been a huge fan of hunting and fishing since then. He has his own wildlife preserve with a swamp where alligators live. Tall trees attract big birds.

When he was working as a volunteer with Ducks Unlimited, he had a chance to do some pheasant hunting in Hungary.

"At the time, it was behind the iron curtain," says Bob. "A friend and I did all the necessary paper work for each of us to get two shotguns into the country. You need two because when you shoot driven pheasants, you have a loader at your side and you shoot two times as the birds come over. Then you hand your empty gun back and the loaders pops the other gun in your hand and you shoot two more times and never take your eyes off the birds. You might have as many as 300 birds come over you just in a stream. They are flushed by beaters who come through the forest."

Bob says it's their way to harvest a product.

"The pheasants are wild-trapped and then hens are put in a fox-proof pen about two acres big. They start feeding the pheasants just prior to their nesting season. The roosters fly in and out all the time and mate with the hens. Then they collect the eggs and raise the birds until they get feathers. When that happens, they quit feeding them because they can fly and get feed in the forest. They're wild birds for the rest of the year. They're in excellent shape, fly real fast and it's quite a sport."

Bob says there is a kind of commissary where the birds are taken to be cleaned.

"We furnished the community with 1,700 pheasants in just four days. Citizens can buy them real cheap."

The beaters come from all levels of society.

"There might be 75 or 100 of these people who walk through the woods beating on pans or whatever. When the birds leave the protection of the forest, they fly. I was asking one of these beaters who spoke perfect English what he did for a living. He told me he was a university professor and translated English literature into Hungarian. I asked him what in the world he was doing out here beating the bushes. He told me it was the only way he can earn the right to hunt. 'If we don't contribute part of our time to conservation, we don't deserve the right to hunt nor can we get a permit. If we don't own a gun, we can check one out, but we buy our shells. That's our only expense.'

"So that's a lesson I learned a long time ago. If you take something out of what nature gives us, you should put something back."

Insurance claim backfires on lawyer

In his claim, the lawyer stated the ci-

the water and sewer services on the east side of the community. The cost for the lift station could exceed \$100,000, according to preliminary studies.

That cost would be a worthwhile investment for the city if the city's eastern half could grow from the expected impact of the proposed TXU coal-fired power plant.

"There is a lot of property out there that could become valuable, but as it is now, no one wants to make a move because there isn't sewer or water services. If we get this put in place, the entire area would open up," said McNeal.

One local businessman has already indicated he would build a large recreational vehicle park known as Madera Springs if water and sewer services were available. Ernie Wood spoke with council members and urged them to take action to help develop the area. Other area communities, he said, have already announced

expansion plans in hopes of attracting people associated with the power plant.

Wood said he hoped to create a 100-unit RV park on the banks of Lone Wolf Creek from Interstate 20 to Highway 208 east of Skeet's Texas Grill. A travel center could also be constructed, he said.

Madera Springs won't be the only group prospering from the city improvements, McNeal said.

"They will be the immediate benefactor, but I don't think they will be the only one. Hopefully, it will help a lot of other people and help the city grow."

The tentative deal to cover the cost of the lift station, he said, was to ensure developers continue with their plans.

"We're making sure they have sewer and water to their property," McNeal said. "But if they decide not to build, they agree to cover the cost of the lift station."

concerns of public safety. The demolition of the building, which is located at 147 East 2nd Street, could begin as early as next week if an Abilene-based company is able to be on hand to supervise the disposal of asbestos materials.

"It's a safety issue," said councilman Justin Harris, who was part of a 6-1 vote to accept the building as a gift from Ben and Mary Martinez. "If we say it's your problem and you need to fix it, that could take another week or two. I don't know if we can wait that long."

Councilwoman Carol Sue Dakan agreed, saying the risks were far too great for the city.

"We're doing this for safety," she said. "We're doing it so the city doesn't get sued for \$4 or \$5 million should it fall on someone."

Councilman Robert McNeal voted against accepting the building, saying the decision for the city to take the building could put the community in an

awkward situation should another building need to be torn down in the future.

After voting to accept the building, the council voted unanimously to move immediately to have the structure taken down.

The building -- which has seen its roof fall in and has one wall leaning dangerously over an alley -- is one of several structures the Colorado City Housing Standards Commission discussed last week at a special meeting.

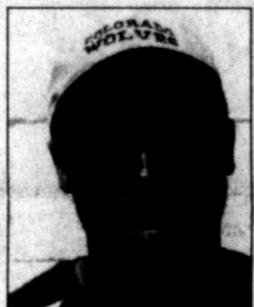
The Wolves and Indians exchanged fumbles from there before Colorado City was able to get on the scoreboard for the second time.

Free then hit Simon Reyna with a short pass. Reyna, after making a terrific leaping catch, collected enough yards to move the ball to the 1-yard line.

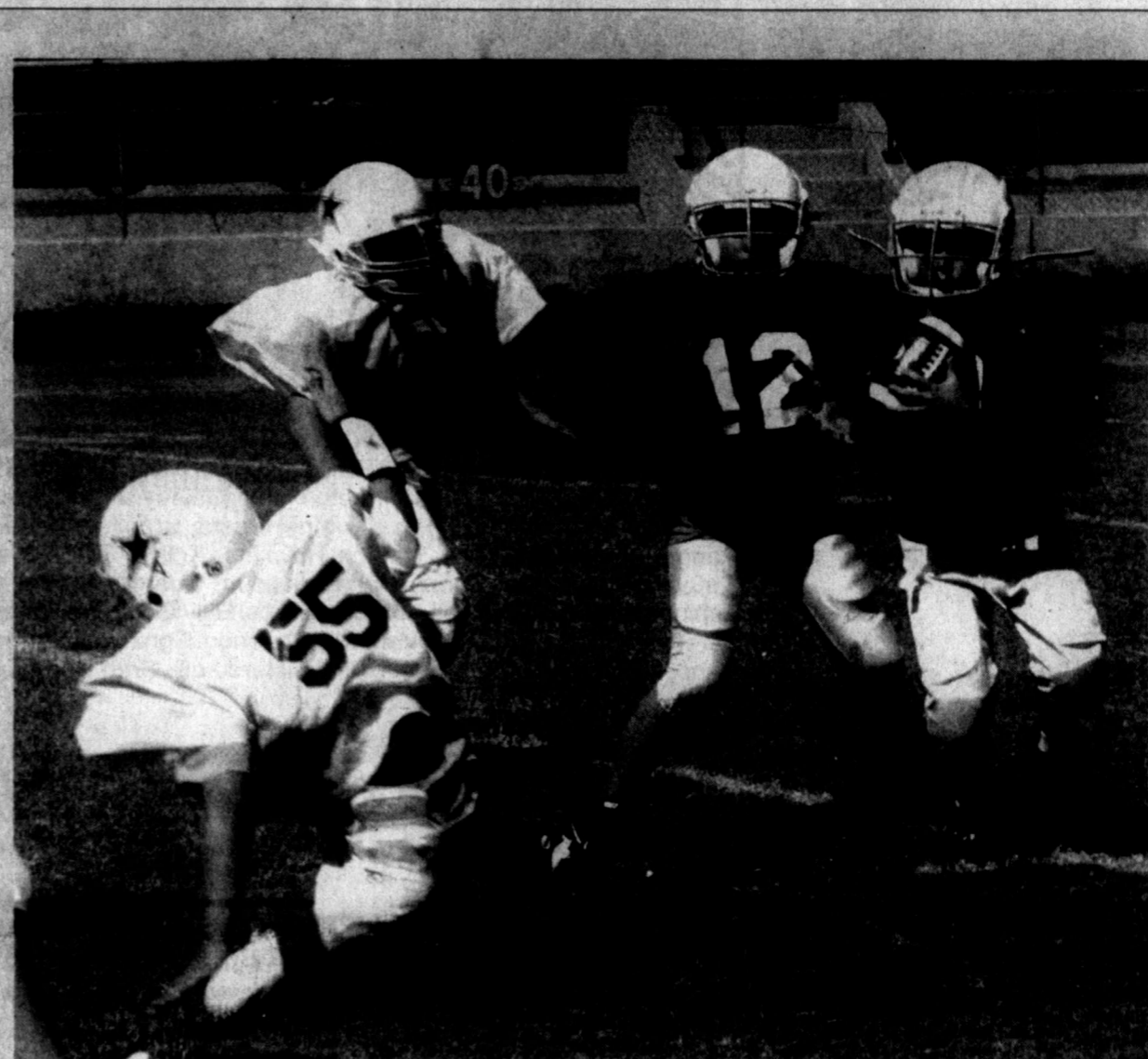
From there, Free punched the pigskin into the Indians' end zone and that put the Wolves up by a 13-6 margin with 10:42 left in the first half.

IRA -- It was a tale of two halves last Friday night in Ira.

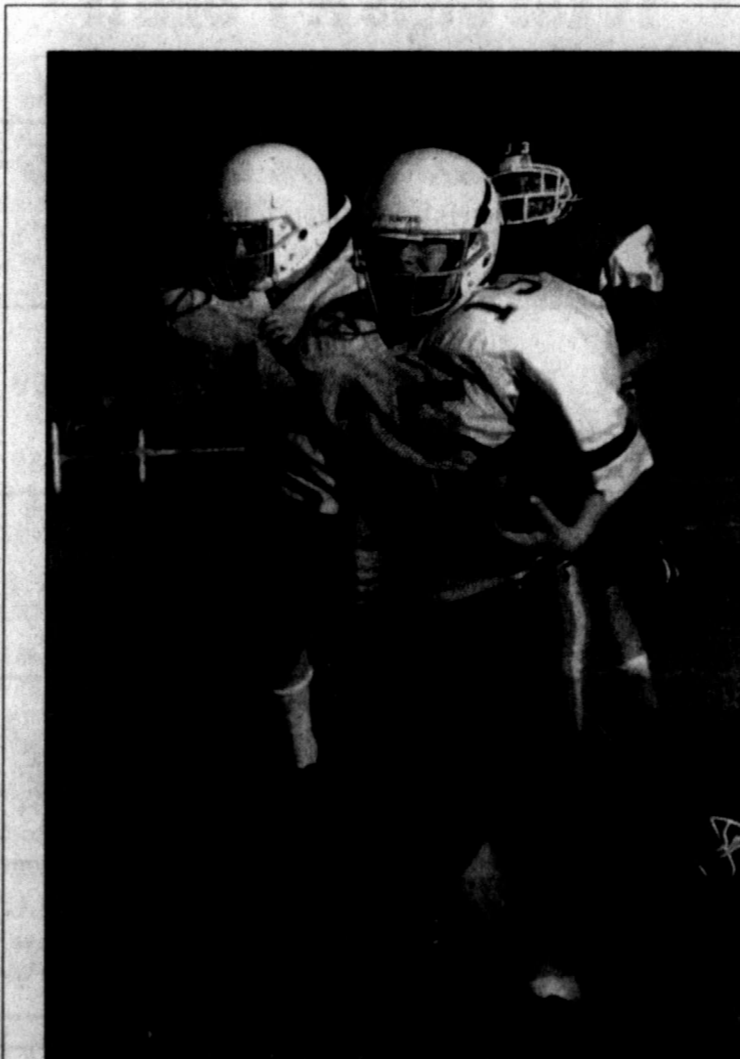
Ira took the first half by a 32-0 margin, while Loraine rebounded in the second to outscore Ira by a 36-32 margin.

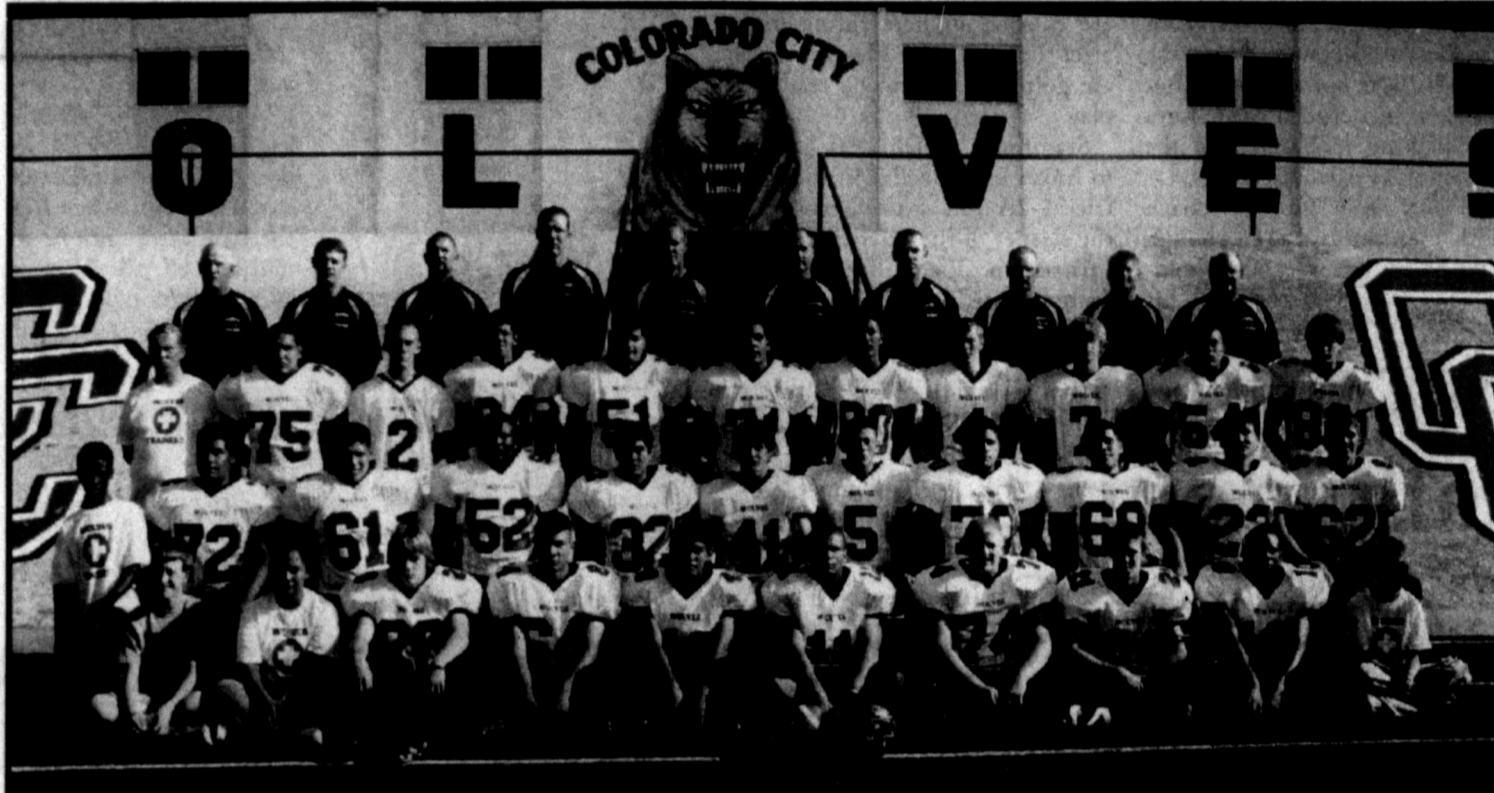

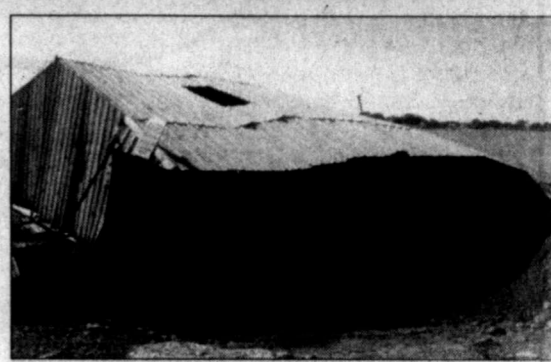
