Voters Reject Bond Election

Titus County voters failed to give two-thirds majority approval to a three-part, \$950,000 road bond election Saturday, sending each proposition down in defeat.

A light turnout in the city of Mt. Pleasant, plus overwhelming rejection from most of the boxes in the rural area, brought about the downfall.

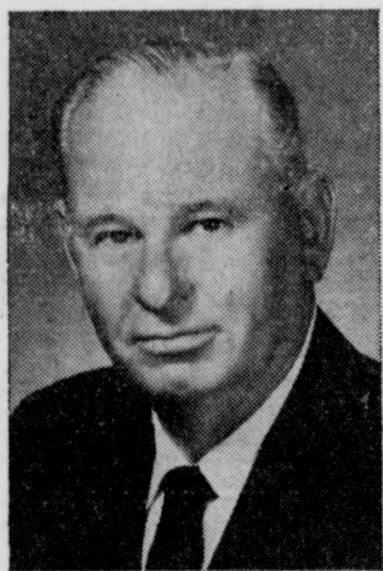
Voting for Proposition One, which provided that \$301,000 in bonds be issued to purchase right-of-ways on U. S. Highway 271 and State Highway 49 for the purpose of improvements, was 790 for, 561 against, but failed to gain the two-thirds majority.

Voting for Proposition Two, which provided that \$569,000 in bonds be issued to improve farm to market roads around the proposed Lake Cypress area and FM 71 (Talco East) and called for connection of Interstate 30, U. S. Highway 271 and State Highway 49 by an East Loop around Mt. Pleasant, was 706 for, 628 against, but did not gain two-thirds majority.

Proposition Three, which provided that \$80,000 be issued to purchase road oil for county lateral roads, also failed to gain the necessary majority. The voting was 750 for, 593 against.

The only box outside Mt. Pleasant city limits to cast assenting votes was Greenhill, which voted 17-13, 14-14 and 20-9 for the three propositions, respectively.

Precinct 9 (Talco) — Proposition 1: For 35, Against 29; Proposition 2: For 25, Against 37. Proposition 3: For 23, Against 37.



THE NOMINATION of C. L. Cooke to a term on the Texas Industrial Commission was included in a group of gubernatorial appointments confirmed by the Texas Senate May 31. Cooke, president of Community Public Service Company, also has been elected vice president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, an organization co-sponsored by ten investor-owned Texas utility companies.

Talco - Bogata School Board Action Plans

The Board of Trustees of the Talco - Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, June 3, and took the following action:

As to the building needs of the district, the Board voted to construct a new cafeteria on the Bogata campus. Tentative plans for the cafeteria calls for the facility to be connected to the elementary building. Plans are to begin construction on the cafeteria as soon as final plans are presented by the architect, approved by the Board, and submitted for bids.

Other plans being considered for the Bogata School are the removal of some of the old army barracks type buildings from the campus and some repairs to be made to the old high school building.

Rivercrest was recently approved for an additional vocational agriculture unit. Mr. Craig Ingram, a recent graduate from East Texas University, was employed for this new position which will make it possible to offer another class in Tractor Maintenance for students at Rivercrest.

The Board voted to continue the no-tuition policy for transfer students for the 1969-70 school year. A recent transfer law passed by the Texas Legislature authorizes a parent to transfer his child to any school of his choice if agreeable with the receiving school.

The resignation of Mike Dietrich, Junior High coach and science teacher at Bogata, was accepted by the Board. Mr. Dietrich has been employed as head coach in the Maud Schools.

The Talco State Bank was designated as the Depository Bank for school funds for the next two years. Even though the Talco State Bank is the Depository Bank for the school district, the First National Bank of Bogata also shares in the school deposits.

The Board was presented with a proposed Athletic Policy for the Talco - Bogata Schools for their study and approval at a future meeting.

Other action taken by the Board at a recent meeting was the election of Board officers for the 1969-70 school year. Dr. E. E. Brooks was re-elected as Board President; Alex Waddell, Vice-President; Kenneth Jeffery, Secretary. Other members of the Board are: A. D. Stephenson, John D. Wright, Paul Miller, and Carl Williams. Mr. Williams was appointed by the Board to fill the unexpired term of Rufus Ward.

Regular meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools are held the first Tuesday of each month at Rivercrest at 8:00 p. m. Meetings of the Board are open to the public and patrons are cordially invited to attend.

During the afternoon session, officers received information concerning their new responsibilities, and final arrangements were discussed for attending the National FHA meeting at Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colo., July 13-18. All area officers will be delegates.

Mt. Pleasant FHA'ers were hostesses for a Coke party during intermission. Rhonda Mims, Area Fourth Vice-President, Blossom, presided over the evening's activities. Following a hamburger supper on the patio, members and advisors participated in games; then listened to the record, "Don Lonnie Talks With Teenagers."

During the Tuesday morning session, Beth Gordon, Rivercrest, Area Parliamentarian, assisted by Jerri Gage, Rivercrest FHA First Vice-President presented a skit on Parliamentary Procedure in the form of a puppet show.



Austin. — Texas lawmakers have written the record of the 61st regular session, but their toughest job — levying the taxes to pay for what they have ordered — remains to be done.

In adopting a \$2.8 billion one-year state budget (for 1970), they invited a special session to complete appropriations for 1971 and to decide on the inevitable major tax bill. Legislative leaders, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher, claim the latter will be smaller if the finance showdown can be delayed until next year.

Gov. Preston Smith, who holds the key to the timing of the special session, has made clear from the start that he feels the Legislature should face up to a biennial budget and the raising of needed revenue. He could veto the single-year bill and call another session immediately — or accept it and schedule the remaining financial work whenever he pleases.

Many all-time legislative records have toppled at this session.

Certainly, the 61st session passed more legislation than any before it, and it was committed in advance to spending more money.

A multitude of laudable ends were attained. Giant strides were made in the field of education. Teachers got a \$61.9 million pay raise. Overhauls were ordered in the field of vocational and technical education. Three new medical schools, a dental school and two new nursing schools were authorized. Also, three new universities, plus an experimental upper level branch college in Laredo. Never have so many new higher educational facilities been launched in a single session.

A master water plan got all the legislative support it could expect. Workmen's compensation laws were updated. Sweep air and water pollution. A constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink was submitted, along with many other proposed changes in the constitution. State employees got a 6.8 per cent pay raise.

Texas' 61st Legislature was a busy, productive session. It was a liberal-spending one with the bills yet to be paid.

"The citizenship of Texas will applaud our work at this session and give us their full support when we return to appropriate and finance the second year of the biennium," concluded Speaker Mutscher.

LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN ADVANCED — Texas' new State Criminal Justice Council has recommended a comprehensive \$1.1 million law enforcement plan that covers a wide scope of activities.

Governor Smith will analyze it before it goes to the U. S. Department of Justice for approval and funding under the Federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. Funds for a two-year operation must be committed by June 30.

Texas received \$234,000 for riot control and \$830,350 in planning money six months ago.

Council voted priority funding to these programs: Prevention of juvenile delinquency, education

and training in all elements of the criminal justice system, regional and statewide information and communication systems, community relations programs, experimental and demonstration projects to test and evaluate new approaches to solving problems in criminal justice system.

Approved funds will be disbursed to 21 geographical planning regions of the state. Congress now is considering funding which would provide Texas more than \$11 million in action money plus planning aid for next year to develop a long-range plan and begin putting it into effect.

BEAUTIFUL, BEAUTIFUL TEXAS — Governor Smith will keynote a one-day workshop June 11 to stimulate the preservation and enhancement of natural beauty in Texas. This second annual clean-up and beautification conference of the Beautiful Texas Council will be held at the Villa Capri Motor Hotel in Austin.

Other speakers will include O. P. Schnabel of San Antonio, president of the Council, DeWitt Greer, chairman of the State Highway Commission, R. H. (Dick) Hackendahl of Washington, D. C., director of the National Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up Bureau, Mayor C. P. Waggoner of Grand Prairie, Earl Rudder, president of Texas A&M University and Reagen Brown, sociologist - community improvement specialist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

Beautify Texas Council was organized in 1967 to combat the litter problem and to advise and act as a coordinating agency through business and industry, government, public and private organizations may work together to solve the problems of Texas beautification.

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES -- A person not registered as a voter is ineligible for election or appointment as an independent school district trustee. So advises Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin in ruling on a Spring Creek school election. Similar opinion was returned earlier following a Honey Grove controversy.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

• Texas Foundation School Fund Budget Committee must include cost estimates for the school program training all prison inmates over and under 21 years of age who are not high school graduates.

• A bill providing for private road construction and maintenance in counties of 10,000 to 10,050 population is unconstitutional as a local and special bill.

• Bexar County is required to advertise for competitive bids on all purchases including road machinery, although some emergency buying is expected.

• State funds cannot be used for payment of group insurance policies for legislators and their dependents.

• An act to prohibit corporations from engaging in farming or ranching (allowing a 10-year period to sell interests) would be constitutional.

• State treasurer must publish information on unclaimed funds over \$50 held and owing by life insurance companies.
