SEVEN BOYS AND SIX GIRLS RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

At the graduating exercises Monday night thirteen young men and women received diplomas from the local high school. Most of them are now using the first few days of their vacation for planning their future activities, which according to their expressed desires are rather varied.

The program as published was carried out with an additional number, a vocal solo by Mrs. French Murphey, and the large auditorium was crowded for the occasion.

The members of the class handled their assignments well and if their future success is to be judged by the ability they displayed Monday night, Junction will have thirteen future prominent citizens to feel proud of in the years to come.

Judge Stevenson delivered the Baccalaureate Address which, though brief, was a masterly discourse on the subject, "Four Keys to the Future," and fortunately it is possible to secure the address in manuscript. The Eagle will publish it in the near future as a permanent source of inspiration for the graduates as well as for its interest to the general public.

The address of County Supt. Farmer is available and will be published next week if space permits. Supt. Farmer presented the diplomas to the members of the class.

A short sketch of the graduates follows:

Sallie Blackburn, Valedictorian, was born in Junction and her school work has all been done in the local school. She is a daughter of Judge and Mrs. M. E. Blackburn. In addition to her school work she has taken Music. She expects to enter Southwestern next year and will specialize in English.

Marguerite Wright is a daughter of Dr. and Mrs. R. H. P. Wright. She was born in Junction and has done all her school work here. In addition to her school work, she has given considerable time to expression work and has won several honors in interscholastic declamation contests. She is planning to attend Texas Christian University next year.

Clara Fritz was born in London but came here in the primary grades and has done the remainder of her school work here. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe P. Fritz and her popularity among her school mates is attested by the fact that she was recently elected May Queen by the students. She expects to go to Rice Institute next year. She has done special work in music while carrying on her regular school work.

Verena Lawler, the smallest and one of the youngest members of the class, is a daughter of A. O. Lawler and was born in Junction, and has been attending school here for seven years. She has done special work in music and debating and expects to enter Baylor University next year, where she will take work leading to a degree in law.

Ruth Beasley is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Beasley, Sr. While she was born in this county, this was her first year in the local High School. She is planning to enter State University next year.

Lura B. Taylor was born in Junction and all her school work has been done here. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Taylor. She has done special work in music and her ambition is to become a skilled musician and she expects to con-

tinue her studies in Texas Christian University next year.

Albert Mayfield, president of the class was born in Mississippi, and came to Junction in 1920, but has spent only part of his time here since that date. He is a son of R. H. Mayfield, former resident of Junction. He expects to enter State University or Rice Institute next year and will select courses leading to an M. D. degree. This was his first year in Junction High School.

Irah Fleming is a son of Mrs. Lydia Fleming of Telegraph and was born near that place. He has spent the past three years a student here and in addition to school work has studied music. He plans to go to A. & M. College and become an electrical engineer.

Vic Urban moved here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Urban, last year and has taken a leading part in athletics. His ambition is to become an athletic coach and he is planning to attend Howard-Payne College next year.

Bill Wright, the youngest boy in the class, was born at Junction and has done all his school work here. He has taken part in athletics and made quite a record in football. He plans to enter Howard-Payne next year and his ambition is to become a lawyer.

Jack and Buddy Richardson were both born and reared in Junction, and while their real names are Clarence and Clyde, very few people know them other than Jack and Buddy. (Continued on Page 4)

EQUALIZATION BOARD COMPLETES WORK

The County Commissioners sitting as a Board of Equalization completed their work Monday in a manner satisfactory to practically to all of the 114 who were requested to meet with them and show cause why assessed valuations should not be changed.

While there were some raises, principally on land on which improvements heretofore had not

been considered in the assessed valuation, the result of the Board's work was a lowering of the total valuation in the county. Cattle valuations were lowered \$2 per head and sheep \$1 per head.

The Board sought to fairly apportion the tax burden so that the assessments would be fair to all citizens of the county. The rate for the state, county and precinct taxes will be worked out by next week, according to Tax Assessor Bissett and will be published in the Eagle. Also figures for comparison between the assessed valuation for this and previous years will be given.

SHEEP-GOAT SALE AT BRADY PLANNED

The annual sale of sheep and goats by the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas, in conjunction with the 1925 convention at Brady, July 28, 29 and 30, will be conducted each afternoon at a wagon yard centrally located. Entries for sale may be made up to July 1. The list will be published in the Sheep & Goat Raiser's Magazine official organ of the association, printed at San Angelo. An effort will be made to again secure Dwight L. Lincoln of Marysville, Ohio, as auctioneer.

These were some of the plans for the sale perfected at San Angelo Tuesday after a conference between members of a committee representing the association and Brady citizens. The session was held in the office of D. T. Jones of the Western Audit Company in the Trust building. Mr. Jones again will serve as secretary at the sale.

The mornings during the gathering of the sheep and goat men at Brady will be devoted to the business of the convention, the afternoons to the sale and the evenings to entertainment. It was announced. There will be entertainment throughout the day, however, for visiting women and for others who do not attend the sale. Baseball games and a rodeo will be among the

sport attractions, said William D. Cargill, secretary of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, who attended the conference. With Mr. Cargill was Ed Broad, member of the sales committee from Brady.

Members of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' sales committee attending Tuesday's conference here were: Fred Earwood of Sonora, chairman; S. S. Bundy of Roosevelt, and Jamie Brook of Brady. George M. Thurmond of Del Rio, attorney for the association; Ed Blanton, editor of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' magazine, and D. T. Jones also were present. T. Albert Kincaid of Ozona, president of the association, was in San Angelo at the same time on other business.

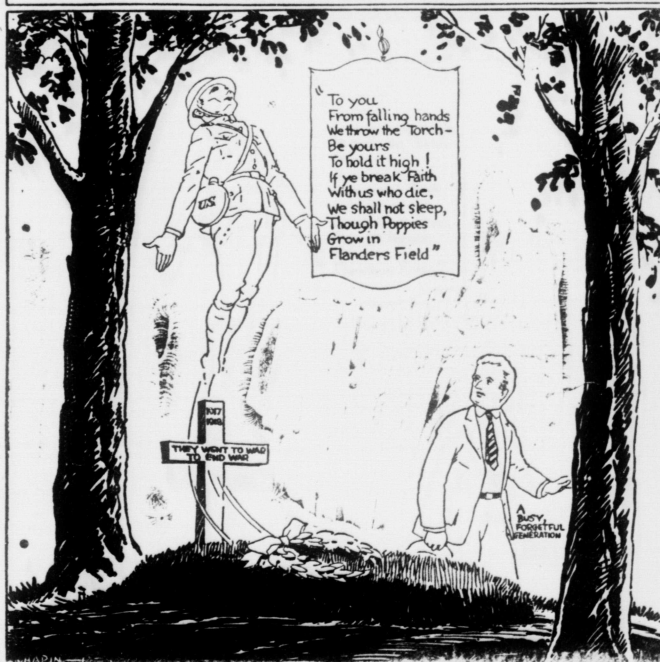

valuable advice that the A & M College can give at this moment to the cotton farmer of Texas. Don't forget the ingredients for the poison:

Wheat bran 25lbs, whit arsenic 1lb, 6 oranges or lemons or 3, ounce of banana oil or amyl acetate, 2 quarts low grade cane or sorghum molasses and 2 gallons of water.

It is best to put it out about sunrise as the grasshoppers feed in the morning. In some places it is being advised to substitute half saw dust for half the amount of bran but the A & M entomologists do not advise this in cases where the bran is available.

THREE MEN IN JAIL ON THEFT CHARGE

Three young men, apparently about twenty years old were recently lodged in the county jail in default of a bond of \$750 each after theft charges had been filed against them. They gave their names as Jack Young and Clyde Townsley of Lockhart and Bart Trotter of Kerrville.

MORE ABOUT SALADS

Between seasons there is such a comfortable feeling that lettuce we have always with us; other greens may come and go, but this is always dependable.

Vegetable Salad.—Cut into small pieces five stalks of celery, one small bottle of sweet pickles, two green peppers, one medium-sized onion, one-third of a cupful of capers, two large lettuce hearts, one cupful of cooked green beans, four small cooked beets and one small can of anchovies; mix with one tablespoonful of vinegar, two tablespoonfuls of olive oil and one small bottle of stuffed olives, sliced. Serve on lettuce.

Shamrock Salad.—Cut green peppers crosswise, choosing those which will give the trefoil form, when sliced. Fill the halves after removing seeds and veins with a nicely seasoned cream cheese, pressing the filling in firmly. Chill, then cut into slices and serve with a strip of green pepper as stem.

Orange Salad.—Remove the peeling from oranges and as much of the white skin as possible, then cut into very thin slices, arranging them in overlapping slices on individual plates on lettuce. Serve with a nicely seasoned French dressing.

Prune Salad.—Arrange three or four stewed prunes, which have been drained and the stones removed, in nests of lettuce; sprinkle with chopped nuts and serve with any desired dressing. The prunes may be stuffed with nuts, cheese or a bit of tender celery.

This salad is especially nice with duck.

Southern Onion and Apple Salad.—Take a mild large onion, cut it into very thin slices, then into dice; mix with finely diced, good-flavored apple; add a good salad dressing and serve on lettuce. In any such salad the vegetables should be so fine, to be well-seasoned with the dressing. Large chunks of apple, or of any fruit or vegetable, are never well marinated, neither do they look appetizing.

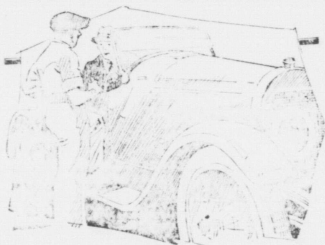

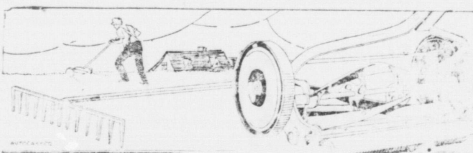

PALM CANYON

Nature richly endowed this country with much of the most majestic scenery on the globe. The choicest places "have been reserved for you, that you and your children after you may know and enjoy these unspoiled bits of native America." Uncle Sam is ever alert for new scenic assets of outstanding value in the old wilderness which come down to us as left by nature and practically unchanged by the hand of man.

One of the latest selections to form a link in Uncle Sam's chain of unmatched beauty spots is Palm canyon, which has been described as "A bit of Arabia transplanted to the Western hemisphere," located 55 miles southeast of Riverside, Cal.

Here in a series of canyons but little removed from a desertlike section grow scores of magnificent Washington palms—tall, graceful, picturesque and centuries old, undoubtedly, the only native palms in all California, as well as a number of species of interesting and unusual cacti—the entire ensemble forming a botanical collection both unusual and extraordinary.

These native palms are scattered along the banks of a tortuous little stream which flows through the canyon and clustered around it in groves where it emerges from the hills. The scene is both surprising and romantic. It is likewise magnificent because almost directly overhead Mount San Jacinto rears its lofty head. In one direction the canyon appears to be closed by a great wall of colored rock. Righting about face the view leads out onto the desert beyond.

Nearly may be seen other palms, larger perhaps, older too, possibly, which have been burned and scorched through enforced participation in certain Indian ceremonies having to do with the burning of the so-called "skirts" while still on the trees. Many of these unusual and peculiar-to-America trees have been cut down by various people and carried away for numerous uses.

As proposed, there are 1,000 acres in the reservation. The consent and relinquishment of a remnant of the Agua Caliente band of Indians is necessary before the tract may become a national monument. Assuming that the Indians give their consent, the ride from Riverside to Palm canyon and the trip through the canyon bit well to become a lure which will beckon untold thousands as the years roll by.

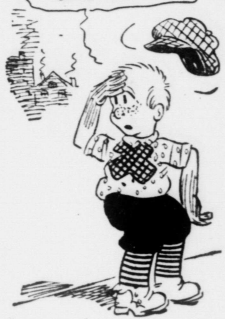

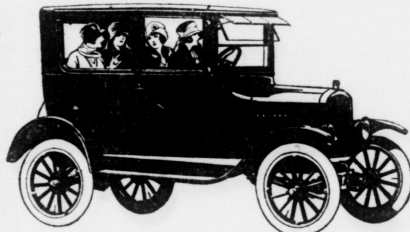

NIC COALSON'S

Mrs. Lou C. Roberts, Austin, Texas, in the Frontier Times. I have been reading in your magazine of the heroic deeds of the pioneer settlers of Texas, which recalls to my mind the courage and bravery of a wife and mother who saved herself and family from being murdered by Indians, and I feel that this brave woman deserves a name among the heroes of that time. I can not give the exact date of this incident about which I will write, but it occurred somewhere near 1868, Nic Coalson, whose sole occupation was hunting and trapping, located his family, consisting of wife, three sons and three daughters, on Copperas Creek in Kimble County on a small farm. Mr. Coalson did not locate himself. He lived with the animals. The house consisted of one picket

room, no windows, one door and no shutters. Mr. and Mrs. Harris lived with them. The former, with the aid of the boys, cultivated the farm; the eldest boy being fourteen, the second twelve, and the third ten years of age. The girls were younger. The family was well provided with firearms and knew how to use them. Mr. Coalson's occupation made it necessary for him to live on the frontier, and it is said that he moved to Copper Creek from his former home because a family moved within ten miles of him. He claimed he was being crowded out.

One morning about ten o'clock while Mr. Harris was in the field, Mrs. Coalson discovered fifteen Indians riding toward the house. She put on a man's hat and coat and went out in the yard hoping to deceive the Indians in the belief that there was a man on the place. But they did not change their course and continued to advance in the direction of the house. She then went into the house, hung up a quilt in the door as that had to serve as a door shutter. She gave the two older boys guns and placed them in most advantageous place for shooting, with instructions not to shoot without

her order. While the house was not provided with windows, it was well ventilated and there were plenty of picket holes from which to shoot. Mrs. Coalson stationed herself at the door. In the meantime Mr. Harris had discovered the Indians and ran to the house, but unfortunately he reached the house at the same time they did. He called to Mrs. Coalson to bring him a gun and she stepped outside to take it to him when she saw him fall. When she stepped back into the house, Mrs. Harris, had seen her husband fall, commenced to scream. Mrs. Coalson said, "if you scream again I will have to knock you down with the gun. I am trying to save my family from being murdered and you must be quiet." The Indians becoming emboldened by Mrs. Harris' screaming started into the house and Mrs. Coalson killed the one that was leading the way. The Indians took their dead comrade and retreated out of gun shot range. They stayed there three hours and in their parley they decided they did not have any more Indians to spare.

Mrs. Coalson then moved to Menard, where she died two years later. Mr. Coalson married again. I do not know how soon, but I do know he still followed his favorite vocation, which kept him on the extreme frontier. His wife and two of the older girls were returning from a horseback ride and when within a mile of their home they were killed by Indians. Later, after the oldest boy had grown to manhood he enlisted in Captain Robert's Ranger Company, which was stationed in Menard county. The one incentive which seemed to actuate Doug Coalson was to be revenge on the Indians for the murder of his sisters. When rangers were enlisted to follow an Indian trail and he was not included, he would rush frantically to Capt. Roberts and beg to be allowed to go, which privilege was always granted him. He never tired on an Indian trail, and did not know what fear was. Later, his younger brother joined, and also made a good ranger. I am sorry to record that Doug Coalson passed away a few months ago in California, where he had gone in search of health.

STATE FISH HATCHERY ON JUNCTION KERRVILLE ROAD

An article of more than passing interest was crowded out last week on account of the

heavy run of sales advertising and while it is rather late to be called news, we are giving the information below for the public generally and more particularly for those who donated to the Fish Hatchery Fund.

On account of the political pressure that was being brought to bear on the Governor, and all administrative officers who could have any influence on the location of this hatchery, by interested parties in east and central Texas, the Eagle refrained from publishing any information as to the efforts being quietly but energetically by the Kerrville Chamber of Commerce until the present site was definitely accepted by the state.

When the committee from the Kerrville Chamber of Commerce appeared before the directors, and as many members who were also donors to the fish hatchery fund, as could be summoned the morning the committee was here, the matter of establishing a hatchery in this county or Kerr county was discussed thoroughly. One thing was evident to all, viz, that it was going to take concerted effort on the part of the citizens of Kerr and Kimble counties and whatever action was to be taken must be taken at once.

The Kerrville committee came here with a definite proposition. They would help us to get the hatchery if we could procure a suitable site, or if we had no suitable site, they asked that we help them. The members of the fish hatchery committee had searched for more than a year for a suitable site for a small hatchery and had failed to find one that was suitable and that was available for any reasonable price. The Sunday before the Kerrville committee was here, the local committee spent a day with Mr. Shelton, Engineer for the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission and found that the requirements were such that an acceptable site could not be secured in this county with the funds available.

The only thing that could be done was to build a small hatchery and there could be no provision for maintaining it. The experience of the Kerrville hatchery for the past two years has been such as to demonstrate the fact that a small hatchery, without ample funds for maintaining it, was a failure. The committee had less than \$1,000 in hand with which to do anything towards a hatchery.

The Kerrville proposition was this: They would give us \$1,000 on a location in this county, if we could secure the state hatchery, if we would agree to give them \$1,000 if they could locate the state hatchery in that county, between Kerrville and Junction. With the Schreiner interests ready to put up half the \$11,000 necessary to buy the site and with the site that was acceptable to the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, there was apparently only one thing to do—help Kerrville locate the hatchery on their present site, eighteen miles west of Kerrville on the Kerrville-Junction road.

The state proposes to establish a hatchery on a gigantic scale—eventually covering about thirty acres, with more than \$25,000 now available for construction work that will start about the middle of next month. Four attendants will look after the hatchery and millions of bass will be propagated for the streams of the Hill Country and Kimble county will get a great many more fish from this hatchery, immediately accessible to our streams, maintained and distributions made at the expense of the state, than we could ever hope to get from a small hatchery that we could destablsh, and there is not heavy future expenses for maintenance. It will be less than 25 miles from the hatchery to the nearest streams in this county in which baby fish can be distributed and

this short distance over a good road means that it will be only a natural consequence for this county to get their full share of the hatchery production.

WHY THEY LOST THE JOB

One of the great business houses conducted a survey of employment conditions with the purpose of finding out why some men are failures, according to the Los Angeles Times. Of some 200 persons who had been discharged by the firm during the term of survey 30 per cent were dropped for "lack of industry." In other words, three was a streak of laziness which prompted them to neglect their duties. They were not necessarily incompetent, but they did not fitly respond to their tasks.

Sixteen per cent were freed because of their refusal or inability to follow directions. They neglected to do as they were told. They were as soldiers who could not obey orders. Twelve per cent of the discharged employees were let out because they were conspicuously lacking in courtesy and tact. In the business and industrial world politeness is a distinct asset. Grouch manners will get a man nowhere except into jail or trouble. These released employees were deficient in manners and the ordinary amenities of commercial contact.

Eight per cent were described as being without sufficient "stick-to-itiveness" to justify their continued employment. They were perhaps courteous, tactful and competent, but they did not take active hold upon their tasks. They were mechanical in their performance. They did not put their heart into the business.

Another eight per cent lost their positions because they could not beget or inspire confidence. They were supposed to be tricky. There were a few out-and-out crooks in the whole list and the house has an enviable reputation for the character of its employees. The figures showed that a man who is courteous, competent, industrious and ambitious is reasonably certain to obtain recognition in any business or industry.

PRESERVING EGGS

By R. S. Miller in the Fredricksburg Standard.

At this time of the year and the early part of June is a very good time to preserve eggs for winter use. Good fresh eggs can be kept for about twelve months if properly preserved. It is very important that eggs are clean and fresh. Eggs that float when they are placed in the solution are not fresh and therefore cannot be preserved. If the eggs are only slightly stained it may be removed with a cloth dampened with vinegar but be sure not to use badly soiled eggs for they will spoil when placed in the solution.

The water-glass solution consists of 1 quart of sodium silicate to 9 quarts of water that has been boiled and cooled. This mixture should be placed in a five gallon crock or jar and will be sufficient to preserve 15 dozen eggs. Be sure to have at least 2 inches of the solution covering the eggs at all times. If you haven't enough eggs to make up 15 dozen, additional eggs can be added from time to time.

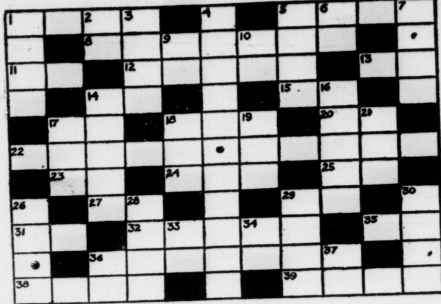
After the eggs have all been added place the jar in a cool dry place and cover well to prevent evaporation.

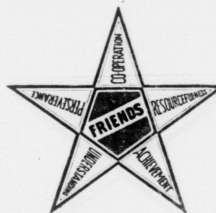
